



The Latest In Paperback

A Stone Boat (Plume, \$10.95) Andrew Soloman's critically acclaimed novel focuses on the experiences of a young gay concert pianist named Harry and what happens when his mother dies and he blames her suffering on his sexuality.

Franny: The Queen of Provincetown (St Martin's Press, \$9.95) A short funny book by the late John Preston chronicles society's changing attitudes towards gays from the 50's to the 80's. Told through the voices of a series of quirky gay characters that make the read well worth while.

Different Loving: The World of Sexual Dominance and Submission (Random House, \$18) Gloria and William Brame's non-fiction exploration into the world of S&M, B&D and the like. The book looks at both the queer and straight sides of the issue. Very detailed and concise with first person accounts, the book delves into role playing, fetishism, erotic combat, corporeal punishment, piercing, scarification and corsetting.

Bernhard left the ship in a hurry the next morning in Mazatlan. Although Bernhard insists that she had a "fabulous time," her booking agent admits that "[the performance]" was just a little strong.

Queen Mum's Doc in Drag

According to a report by Reuter News Service, a top surgeon who was part of a team of doctors which carried out hip replacement surgery on Britain's **Queen Mother** has admitted he is a transsexual. **William Muirhead-Allwood**, 49, decided to reveal his secret life and issued a statement as a British Sunday newspaper was about to publish the story. "For years I have called myself Sarah, and that is how many of my friends know me," Muirhead-Allwood, a father of two, said in a statement.

The surgeon said his wife has known about his double life for years and his two sons learned about it several months ago. He separated from his family last year but they and his medical colleagues have been supportive, the doctor said.



CHRETIEN PLEDGES GAY PROTECTIONS

Toronto — Canada's Liberal party government will at long last make good on its pledge to ban discrimination based on sexual orientation under the Human Rights Act, Prime Minister JeanChretien said late last month.

According to Toronto's Globe and Mail, Chretien's statement came one day after federal Human Rights Commissioner Max Yalden issued a "scorching report" accusing the Liberals of breaking their promises to gays.

ILGA HONORS MAYOR BROWN

Madrid — International Lesbian and Gay Association Secretaries General Jordi Petit of Spain and Inge Wallaert of Belgium sent a bouquet of pink roses to San Francisco Mayor Willie Brown March 28 to thank him for conducting a mass gay wedding March 25.

Wallaert commented:

"ILGA recognizes this as a good example for other mayors who have distinguished themselves for their opposition to gay rights. ... Acts of recognition of the rights of lesbians and gays, such as that of Mayor Willie Brown ... indicate the unstoppable progressive advance of the recognition of same-gender couples in all the world."

ILGA said it is involved in "high-profile battles for the recognition of samesex marriage" in the Netherlands, Brazil, Finland and Iceland. The issue is also on-the-move in Belgium, Spain, Germany, Latvia, the Czech Republic and the U.S., where Hawaii is expected to legalize gay marriage within two years. Under the U.S. Constitution, the other 49 U.S. states likely would be required to recognize Hawaiian gay marriages.

ILGA is a federation of 450 gay organizations from 75 nations.

GROUP: CHINA JAILS GAYS

London — Although homosexuality is not illegal, China jails gays for "disturbance[s] against the social order" (a violation of Penal Code section 158), says the British organization War on Want.

Sentences can run up to five years. Other gays are treated with electric shocks to "cure" their homosexuality, the group said.

China also reportedly is requiring certificates of HIV-negativity from all visitors from Hong Kong, Taiwan and Macau.

War on Want recently launched a "War on Prejudice" campaign after discovering "that no other [British] aid organization funds lesbian and gay projects ... in the developing world."

Gay British Member of Parliament Chris Smith has endorsed the campaign, calling it "an important development in understanding our responsibilities as lesbians and gay men."

HONG KONG MAY BAN QUEER DISCRIMINATION

Hong Kong — Hong Kong's Legislative Council is considering banning discrimination against gays and lesbians.

A recent Council report, "Equal Opportunities: A Study on Discrimination on the Ground of Sexual Orientation," found that stigmatization of homosexuality is widespread and that discrimination exists in such areas as employment, housing and public services.

The report concluded, however, that the rights of one group must be balanced against the rights of other groups. According to gay activists, this hints that the Council may be leaning toward education rather than legislation to improve gays' lot.

BRAZILIANS SEEK HELP WITH GAY PARTNERS BILL

Brasila — Gay registered-partnership legislation is pending in Brazil's parliament and activists are seeking lobbying assistance from abroad.

Federal Deputy Marta Suplicy introduced the bill last October and it is now being studied by the parliament's Social Security and Family Commission. It grants registered gay couples rights in such areas as inheritance, social security and immigration.

GAY BANK TO OPEN SOON IN AUSTRALIA

Melbourn — A gay bank will open in Australia later this year, reported Britain's *The Guardian*. The still unnamed institution will have offices in Melbourne and Sydney and offer joint accounts, home loans, superannuation, insurance and credit cards to homosexual couples.

A spokeswoman for the Gay and Lesbian Financial Institution Project predicted the bank will drain millions of "pink dollars" from mainstream institutions, where some gay couples say they do not receive equal treatment.

ICELAND TO LEGALIZE GAY MARRIAGE

Reykjavik — Following in the footsteps of its Scandinavian neighbors, Iceland will legalize marriage-like registered partnership for gays and lesbians by July 1, reports Samtökin '78, the island's main gay organization.

As in Denmark, Greenland, Norway

— Q.Voice Magazine —

and Sweden, the partnerships will carry all the rights and responsibilities of marriage except access to church weddings, adoption, artificial insemination and in-vitro fertilization.


Unlike in the other nations, Icelandic gay couples will be permitted joint custody of each other's biological children.

Parliament also is expected to pass a measure banning defamation based on sexual orientation.


\$55,000 Grant From the Estate of Earl Koch Given to Wisconsin AIDS Research Consortium

Mr. Koch's interest in the work of the Milwaukee AIDS Project and its affiliated research program WARC, came from many sources, particularly friends who have died of AIDS, and through his awareness of the pain and suffering this disease brings to friends, families and victims. This statement was related by Tom Landers, the personal representative of the Estate. Earl Koch died at the age of 83 on October 14, 1995 after a brief fight with pancreatic cancer. According to Landers, Earl Koch would be pleased to see his gift contribute to scientific progress in this needed area. Doug Nelson, Executive Director of ARCW stated, "I'm delighted to receive this gift on behalf of Earl Koch and his estate. We hope that this gift will lessen the tragic continuing toll of AIDS, and advance scientific research for effective therapy and

treatment."





Gay Youth HIV Conference Planned in Milwaukee

Milwaukee - The Wisconsin AIDS/HIV Program, Sinai Samaritan Medical Center, and St. Luke's Family Practice Program in Milwaukee, together with a team of youth advisors, are planning a May 3rd conference utled "Diverse and Resilient", to focus on the issue of youth and HIV infection. One teen an hour is infected with the HIV virus and in Wisconsin, AIDS was the leading cause of death for men aged 24-44, which shows strong evidence that HIV infection occurs between the ages of 14-24. The conference and the idea for it was born from these recent startling statistics. Nationally-known researcher, Tony D'Augelli, Ph. D., will open the conference with information about lesbian and gay youth. Kevin Cranston from the Massachusetts HIV Prevention and Education Department will also discuss safe school environments in which HIV prevention can be meaningful for these youth. Participating teens will then break out into small sessions to address the particular needs of gay youth of color, the unique challenges for urban and rural areas, campus education and other areas.

Beyond education, "Diverse and Resilient" seeks to encourage new HIV prevention services around Wisconsin. As the conference closes, teams will be invited to think about programs they would like to create, and then be given proposal materials for mini-grant funds. Within a month of the conference, grant proposals will be due. Five grants of up to \$5,000 each will be awarded to organizations to create or enhance programs to reduce HIV risk among Wisconsin gay, lesbian and bisexual youth. Registration materials for "Diverse and Resilient" will be mailed in early April, and are due April 26, 1996. Avengers Hit Madison Firefighter


Madison — The home of a Madison, Wisconsin firefighter who voiced approval of a blaze that destroyed two gay bars, was the target of an attack by the group Lesbian Avengers.

Firefighter Ron Greer was already under investigation by the Madison Fire Department for handing out anti-gay brochures earlier this year. When a February fire destroyed the Washington Hotel building in downtown Madison, which contained two gay bars, Greer voiced approval of the fire with comments that angered many in the gay community.

The Washington Hotel was billed as "Madison's Adult Playground for Twenty Years!" The newly remodeled turn of the century hotel had 20 guest rooms and was home to a gay video dance bar called The New Bar and to Rod's a popular levi/leather gay bar. Also in the building was the Cafe Palms restaurant and three other bars.

In the attack on Greer's home a banner was strung across his front porch, stickers were placed on the windows, and dozens of pink triangles were strewn about the yard. The triangles bore the logo of the action group Lesbian Avengers and were printed with messages such as "Welcome to Fag City, USA," "Born Again Bigot," and "Wisconsin Lesbians Against Greer."

Greer reports that the attack was just the latest in a string of harassments since he voiced his opinions. His Work shoes and key chain were stolen at work and he says some firefighters don't speak to him anymore.




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

Tom Reed Works to Help Express Willer Brewing Company's Commitment to Gays and Lesbians Tom Reed Works to Help Express Willer Brewing Company's Commitment to Gays and Lesbians of the pay and lesbian community, particularly on the issue of ADDs, has less to do with himself and more to do with Miller's commitment to be a good corporate citizen. Originally from Ohio, Reed worked as lobbyist in Chicago, hired by Miller to represent seven Midwestern states for the Government Affairs division. Several years ago, Miller increased his responsibilities and moved him to the corporate headquarters in Milwaukee.

> Recently I sat down with Reed in his office in Miller corporate campus, we discussed Miller's commitment to the gay and lesbian community and more.

Q: What is your responsibility here at Miller Brewing? What do you do?

A: I wear two different hats. My primary responsibility as the Director of Public Affairs is to oversee our Public Affairs Department, which has



responsibility for all state and local legislative and regulatory activity in all 50 states. We have an extensive staff out in the field. There are seven field offices with two people in each one that cover a number of states. We have a Federal office in Washington Dc. We don't oversee the Federal office, but we coordinate with the Federal activities.

The second hat I wear is liaison to the AIDS community and liaison to the gay and lesbian community for Miller Brewing company. This all goes back a number of years. At Miller we want to make sure we stay in touch with our consumers, that we understand our consumers and that we are sensitive to our consumers and our corporate image in front of those consumers. The gay and lesbian consumer group is just one of many that we look at.

Q: Are you able to judge what percentage of their sales come from gay and lesbian consumers?

A: I'm sure that there are some ideas, but it's really difficult. I mean, you tell me how many gay and lesbian people there are. The figures are all over the place. There is a number and it's significant and we are well aware that it's an important consumer group and consumer audience for us.

Q: A lot of Miller Brewing's advertising directed to gays and lesbians is community orientated, rather than direct marketing of



specific products. Would that be accurate?

A: I think you are going to see quite an increase in our brand advertising in gay and lesbian publications. There certainly is an interest by all the brewers right now an increased interest and an increased advertising by the brands. Miller is one of the only brewers that really have the corporate image advertising. Most of that has been directed to the AIDS community or about AIDS. It's really about the issue of AIDS. The reason for that is, we will talk to a number of our consumer groups and ask them what would the like to see Miller Brewing Company, as a corporation do? What causes should we be focused on? Where should we be throwing our support and our commitment as a corporation?

From the gay and lesbian community, clearly for a long time the priority issue has been AIDS. We then, as a request from the gay and lesbian consumer, focused on AIDS. We were really one of the first corporations, certainly in the Milwaukee area, but also nation-wide, along with our parent company Phillip Morris, to focus on the issue of AIDS. Now Phillip Morris Companies, which includes Miller Brewing, has given over \$7 million dollars to AIDS in the last six years. I don't think there is any company or corporation that even comes close to that kind of commitment to the issue of AIDS. A lot of our corporate advertising has been on the AIDS issue. As you've seen through the advertisements that we've run over the last year or so, it's not about what Miller Brewing Company is doing, it's really more about what the local AIDS organizations are doing. We are trying, through this advertising to get people to understand the importance of volunteering for AIDS, to give money to AIDS and to help their local organizations, because that's where the battles are being fought. It's all at the local level.

Q: What other causes, similar to AIDS does Miller Brewing get involved in?

A: It's all over the map environmental issues; United Cerebral Palsy is a big organization that the company supports. Here in Milwaukee, I don't know that there's almost any organization or activity from MAP and ARCW to the Symphony that we are not behind in a big way with our name and our staff and our people in our commitment. I'm on the board of the AIDS Resource Center of Wisconsin. We have people on boards in a lot of different charities and a lot of different organizations. It's part of being a major employer in the community. Not only do the consumers tell us, "We want Miller Brewing Company to be looking at various causes," but also our employees will say, "We want Miller to get involved in this," or they'll get



involved on their own and come back and Miller, through their employee involvement will get involved.

Q: Last year you won an award from the Cream City Foundation for your work with Miller in Milwaukee's gay and lesbian community. What is it that you bring Miller that's special?

A: I am personally committed to the issue of AIDS. I'm personally committed to gay and lesbian issues. That's something that Tom Reed, as an individual, involves himself in. I have in this role with Miller, a sensitivity to some of these issues. I have a lot of friends who are living with HIV and AIDS. I have a lot of friends as we all do in the community that have died of AIDS. I may have a bit more exposure and a bit more sensitivity to that issue. As a result, the tone of our advertising is [in the gay and lesbian press] is very respectful. Maybe it's that sensitivity, that awareness, that exposure, maybe it's being able to be a part of the community and express to the community Miller's commitment. I'm not sure that the company wouldn't do this on their own anyway, because it's the right thing to do, and maybe it's the smart thing to do, but the tone of the ads is kept very respectful, and it's not about what Miller is doing, it's about what our audiences, or the people reading the ads could be doing to help fight the battle against AIDS.

Q: How did you feel about getting the award?

A: I was very surprised, very pleased. And again, it's not about me, it's about the company and anytime there's any recognition, I may be the person accepting an award but I'm really accepting it for the company. If it wasn't for the company I would just be out there doing my thing.

Q: Some people might read this and say "Well, he works for Miller Brewing, of course he's going to say that." How do you respond to that?

A: I believe it, I really believe it. I don't know of any company that is as committed, especially to AIDS. I go back a number of years when AIDS was much more controversial, much more difficult for corporations to lend their names and their support. Our chairman at that time, Leonard Goldstein, at the Leadership Breakfast, on the day of AIDS Walk Wisconsin, gave an impassioned speech to other politicians and community leaders and corporate leaders that were in the room about how they could involved, and why they should get involved. It was one of the best speeches I've ever heard. That wasn't Tom Reed, that was Leonard Goldstein, that was the Miller Brewing Company.

That's where my sincere belief in what Miller is doing is the right thing to be doing, and I'm very proud of the company.

Q: Miller has quite a long history of working with the gay and lesbian community in Milwaukee can you give me a little history on that?

A: It goes way back. Our distributors and our regional offices have been involved over a decade, and even longer. Much of the initial involvement was through the gay pride parades, local

> fund-raising events, and of course when AIDS came onto the scene,

then the request was for a lot of that attention to shift to AIDS fund-raisers. We have been the sponsor of the San Francisco Gay Pride Parade for it seems like forever. That's the biggest one. Maybe New York is bigger, and we sponsor that one as well.

Q: Do you catch any heat from that?

A: I think maybe a long time ago there was some. It never has been that great. There have been a few calls here and a few calls there, but nothing overwhelming. I think as Miller has been out there doing some of this, more companies, certainly Anhueser Busch is there doing it and Coors is there doing it. If somebody gets mad at Miller and says, "I'm going to go to another beer," well where are you gong to go? Everybody in the brewing industry, and in the alcohol beverage industry are sponsoring all kinds parades, festivals and events.

Q: Late last year, I heard that Miller had trouble with homophobia in a distributorship...

A: I think you're talking about Louisville. The situation was about the president of the distributorship. His wife was very active in the Republican party in the state of Kentucky, and the Gay community felt that her activity was detrimental to their cause. They called for a boycott of the products that were distributed by that distributorship because of the president's wife's political activity.

Our response was first of all, that's a independent business that we absolutely have no legal or ethical right to tell an employee of a distributorship to tell a spouse what they can or can not say on political issues. The First Amendment is real important to us as an advertiser. We would never even think about getting involved in something like that. Legally we can't. To use an analogy of it would be like if somebody knew that an employee of Miller had a gay partner that was working at a certain place. And, they said; well, you have to stop buying from that place because they have a gay employee that has a partner who works for Miller. It would be trying to do something like that. We're not going to get involved in that. Unfortunately, the gay and lesbian community in Louisville didn't see it that way. They continued to boycott Miller products. It all worked out because he was removed for reasons totally different from this issue. Miller had no role in this, it was through the distributorship.

Q: How did you get involved in that?

A: My involvement was to talk to the community to try to convince them that this was not something that Miller had anything to do with. Because of our record across the country, because of our giving, because of our support for the community and they came back, and they were very respectful of Miller Brewing Company, and said in their releases and their publications and their interviews, "This is not about Miller Brewing Company, this is about the distributorship." Unfortunately the distinction is lost in the fact that if you are boycotting a product the distributor carries, and it's our product, it's about Miller. It's hard to remove the two. It's been taken care of and it did not spread outside of Louisville.

Q: Do you get a sense that positive change is coming for the acceptance of gays and lesbians in our society?

A: It's just a personal observation that I believe there seems to be a trend towards things changing for the better. One example is what you are seeing on television. Almost without exception, every sitcom has gay characters now. It's becoming more difficult for those who don't want to see gay characters o television to attempt to mount a boycott against any one sponsor because there are so may programs that have gay characters, and they are doing it appropriately, they are doing it in a respectful way, and audiences must be accepting of it because its everywhere. It's on all the networks and so many of the different programs. I think that's an indication of that if it wasn't going to be acceptable, I don't think the networks would be would be out there presenting these shows.

Q: There has been much talk in Milwaukee about starting a gay and lesbian community center. Is that the type of project that Miller would take an interest in supporting?

A: Possibly. I know that there has been a lot of discussions in the community about a community center. There are some community centers across the country. We'll look at all kinds of opportunities for involvement. Again, if it's something the community thinks is important and there's a natural fit for us, we would look into it. Talk about naming rights! I'm not sure, (laughter) how about the Red Dog Community Center? That's a personal opinion. I'm not speaking on behalf of the company.

Q: How do you find being gay in the corporate environment? A: It's really not an issue. It's just not an issue.

Q: And, you have a partner? A: Yes.

Q: Who is your partner? A: John Martin.

Q: Do you attend corporate functions together?

A: When I go to the company functions, he is welcome to come and he has attended. The one area that I would say I most appreciate is that when there are events or activities that it would be appropriate for John to go with me, such as Miller sponsoring an event in Washington DC, he goes with me and he goes as a partner and Miller covers his expenses. I'm real pleased with that. I think it's very forward thinking. He is a representative of the company as well.

Q: How long have you been together?

A: John and I have been together ... it will be 12 years in August.

Q: I have to ask a really tough question now. How old are you? A: 44, as of March 4th.

Q: Do you feel like you're 44?

A: Yes. (Laughter) On some days I do, on some days I don't. It really depends on the mood.

Q: What to you do with your personal life when you're not working here at Miller Brewing?


A: We work a lot on the house, because both John and I work. It seems that aren't enough hours in the day to get things done around the house. Q: Did someone approach you?

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

Q: What do you think people will be surprised to know about you?

A: I don't know. That I'm 44, I hope.

Q: Why, do people think you're older or younger.?

A: They probably think I'm about 29 (laughter).

Q: Where do you think you'll be in five years? Will you be running Miller?

A: Hah! (More laughter). Yeah! The first gay CEO of a major corporation that we know of. I'm happy right where I am. I love the job and I love the challenge of it. Every day is totally different. I'd like to spend a little more time off the road, but that may or may not happen.

Q: How much time do you think you spend traveling?

A: I'm out all the time. Every week I'm on the road at least a couple of days. I go to all different kinds of places and some of it's fun, I don't mean to have it sound like it's all bad. John and I just attended the (GLAAD) Gay and Lesbian Alliance Against Deformation banquet in Los Angeles. It was spectacular, it was one of the most enjoyable events that I've ever attended. So, we do get to do some fun stuff. I attended the inauguration of President Clinton as part of my job.

Q: Have you met the President yet?

A: I actually have not. I met Hillary. It was not a one-to-one. I was at the Whitehouse AIDS Conference reception and she was there and it was a room with a number of people. It was as they say, "Hello," and she moved on! It was kind of like a hand-shake.

Q: Did you see anybody famous at the GLAAD banquet?

A: Oh, it was just packed. Boy George, Arsenio Hall, Lilly Tomlin and on and on and on. Paul Reiser from Mad About You. It seemed like a lot of the television programs had a representative there. Which again goes back to the point that if these and it was the night of the People's Choice Awards in Los Angeles if these people chose, and there were lots of them, we haven't even started to list all the celebrities who were there, they chose to be at the GLADD dinner. So they didn't have to do that. That makes a statement about Hollywood and makes a statement about where the whole acceptance level is going.

Q: Who looked really, really good?

A: I wish I could remember his name, because he's in "Friends". David Schwimmer! He looked fabulous. We had to practically hold one guy at the table down. Tony Curtis looked really good and he was funny. It was a fun evening. Lilly Tomlin was good. She did her telephone bit, but it was on the computer she was on the Internet. She was talking to Bob Dole and Pat Buchanan through the Internet. So you see, not all the travel is boring and tedious.

Q: And who looked really bad?

A: I'm not getting into that.

Q: What strikes you about the gay and lesbian community of Milwaukee?

A: I'm real proud of the Milwaukee community ... I think we have some good organizations and some excellent people. As I travel around the country and talk about what we do here. Wisconsin is the first gay rights state. I love when I am out there talking to people in New York and Illinois to remind them that I come from a gay rights state and the importance of that. It's not so much about the community, but about Milwaukee and Wisconsin. I came up here from Chicago and before that Ohio, and I tell them just how different it is here. I have found it to be a more accepting environment. There are ups and downs. There are things that occur and


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



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
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






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Short Fiction by Craig Hickman

Chil, they lost a whole lotta something when she left that show, honey. Um-hum. She the one shoulda been made into a movie star. Put them together a new look for the CD jacket, and come right on up in here for a new stylist. "If you see it, call again," the fireman says. I close the door behind him and



But Flash is not impressed. "Let's go to bed," she says. She falls asleep and I fume. But the next day, I get revenge. On page three of the Lesbianville Ledger, a headline blares: "Firefighter Rescues Femme From Ferocious Bat at Forty-four Amazon Ave." The phone rings all day: femmes call to offer me sympathy; butches call to rib Flash. "Scared of a little bat?" they tease. "Tell them I wasn't home." Flash hands me the phone.

I hesitate. Yes, revenge is sweet, but if I don't defend Flash now, will she protect me when the next bat comes to call? I tell the truth, restoring Flash's butch ego and making our house a safe place once more.

Snakes, Witches and Rust

mid a studio decorated with pink flamingos and rubber snakes Sally Gauger Jensen sips a beer and nervously sharpens a pencil. Best known for her prismacolor images of Jones Island and the Menomonee River Valley, Jensen is a surprisingly versatile artist who finds adventure in the industrial backroads of urban society. "When I was young I always played in the frameworks of houses they were putting up. I'd scrounge for those little slugs they punch out of electrical boxes. The highpoint of

my youth was when they built a church next door and they made all of these big piles of dirt to play on. I climbed to the top and built myself a fort."

Sally started to seriously pursue art in the second grade. "I always loved horses and we had a World Book Encyclopedia with wonderful color plates. I started to draw every single horse in the *World Book Encyclopedia*. I drew them on cardboard so I could cut them out and bend their legs and move them. My mother says she still has that collection somewhere. I always took art seriously, it was always the one thing that I wanted to do."


Born in Oshkosh, Sally moved to Milwaukee when she was eighteen years old. She attended the University of Wisconsin, Milwaukee and took a Bachelor in Fine Arts in 1975. After a year



and a half of Graduate School, Sally decided "The political stuff at the school wasn't going to work for me. I ended up not only dropping out of Grad School, but out of art altogether. I got married for the first time. For nine years I ended up not doing any art. But I did make a lot of strawberry jam."

Anyone who has seen Jensen's prismacolor creations will agree that it was fortunate she stopped making jam and finally got back into art. Sally's fascination with the forgotton alleyways and vacant lots of urban life manifests itself in beautifully drawn studies of the undersides of railroad bridges, fields littered with rusting industrial decay, mountains of coal and noble old bulldozers. She is drawn to the true wildspaces of our cities. Not the manicured lawns of our parks, but the weedy junk-ridden landscapes that seem to follow railroad tracks into our industrial centers. It is here where racoon and possum forage among forgotton sewerpipes and wire spools. You can find Sally in that strange netherworld to the east of the Boot Camp and Gargoyles, beyond Fannies, or to to the west of C'est La Vie.

"I've been making my way down to the industrial valley for years. The immediate contact with the valley is that my husband works on Jones Island. So I have an immediate report on what ships are in. If he sees something he thinks I might like he makes sure that I will go see it.



I've already been on the tugs: the Californian and the Washington. I had a ride on the Californian out into the harbor. I've always liked being around big equipment and being able to climb over the bulldozers and things. In places like Jones Island and the Valley, there are all these neat things lying around. Big spools and rusty this and that. Metal that is rusting is more interesting to me than metal with a nice enamel coat."

Sally takes another sip of her beer and points to a photo of the Lewis Wilson Foy, a "laker" that no longer comes into the port of Milwaukee. After explaining that "lakers" never leave the Great Lakes, whereas "salties" are ocean-going vessels, she traces with her thumbnail the scratches and marks that chains have made across the hull of the ship. "The hull of a ship is like a skin. They're kind of like people. Your face and hands tell a lot about you. I've worked as a press operator for much of my life. I've worked with chemicals and all kinds of damaging things. I couldn't get my fingernails to grow now if I tried. Ships have skins like that too. They tell where they have been and what they've been doing. You can look at their skins and see if they've had a rough time over the past several years."

n the years immediately after the breakup of her first marriage, Sally weathered her own rough time and found fulfillment in her art. Her paintings from this period depict quite, lonely interiors, populated with snakes. An antique dresser sits on a wooden floor in a simple Victorian room. In the mirror a boa constictor is seen moving out from behind a door. These paintings touch upon the surrealism of Dali. "After my divorce I needed a whole lot of bolstering to my self-confidence. I read a lot of books by woman and got into the symbolism of snakes. Snakes are symbols of the goddess. Despite the negative symbols of snakes and woman with Medusa, or Eve in the Garden of Eden, if you dig deeper you



find that snakes were once symbols of rebirth, the changing seasons, the shedding of the skin and being transformed. In my paintings I went through about a three and a half year period of self-examination, basically trying to clean out the gunk from the past years. These paintings helped tell me where I was and where I was going. It was a cleansing process. The snakes in those drawings were a representation of myself."

Sally was born in the Chinese year of the snake.She has taken this to heart, not only drawing them but making constructions that utilize rubber snakes to form strange wreath type hangings . She has never been afraid to leave her drawingboard to construct three dimensional works that drive home a message. Jensen once exhibited a wooden ammo box filled with bundles of sticks and tiny torn pieces of cloth. On the open lid of the box were pasted innumerable newspaper clippings that chronicled man's propensity to literally set fire to women. "When I first moved to Milwaukee I started hearing about things like a guy who doused his girlfriend with gasoline and set her on fire. There was another horrible incident in Illinois where a workman raped a woman on her property and then took her to the woodpile and set her on fire. I equated these horrendous stories with the burning of witches. In the middle ages there was a lot of violence against women. Particularly herbal healers and midwives who were becoming a threat to the rising medical establishment. Or, there were attacks upon single women with land and property. There was a lot of burning of 'witches' who somehow threatened the male society in which they lived. Burn, Baby, Burn picked up on that phenomenon. I collected clippings of contemporary burnings of women and incorporated them into the piece. Why would anyone go to the length of burning a victim? It almost seems like it might be something in the collective consciousness to consider burning an appropriate punishment for someone who is bewitching you."

Her growing feminist consciousness manifested itself as Sally organized and curated a series of women's shows.



Starting with the now well-known Gang of Four show, and continuing with several variations on the same theme, Sally and her cohorts explored feminism through their art and challenged the predominately male art establishment. The high point of Sally's feminist era was perhaps the Gang of Forty show at Gallery 218 in 1993. The simple Gang of Four shows had evolved into a nationally juried competion that featured the works of forty different women.

> But Sally seems to be putting this part of her art career behind her. "I don't consider myself as much of a feminist as I did four years ago. Maybe I've gotton to a point where I don't feel I need a movement behind me in order to feel like I'm entitled to do what I want to do. At this point in time I pretty much consider myself an individualist. I'm still very much interested in

women's issues and women's shows. I feel I'm somewhat of an anomaly. You aren't going to find many woman painting pictures of oreboats and freighters and crawling around on Jones Island."

Sally likes to think of her prismacolor drawings as paintings and insists that people call them such. "When you say 'drawing' a lot of people think of a quick sketch. I like to call them 'paintings' because they are very carefully crafted works of art." Though many people would describe her work as superealist, surprisingly she herself sees a lot of abstraction. "I look at my paintings and see large area of white space. And I see large abstract shapes that break up that space. The painting becomes a study in shapes and colors to me. A painting of a freeway bridge becomes a large black shape that is cutting up the picture plane."

Sally Gauger Jensen is once again married and seems to have an optimistic outlook on the future. "I've become a fanatic catalogue shopper. I love to browse through the pictures and pick out things that I want." She shows in Green Bay and Rockford and Milwaukee, and is looking forward to a show in Philadelphia this summer. She cautions Milwaukeans to take their local gallery scene more seriously. "There is a lot of talent in this town that is struggling to survive. People need to dig into their collective wallets. Gallery going is not just free entertainment. People need to support their local artists by actually purchasing things once in a while. Milwaukeeans should better support their local art scene, and this means more than attending openings and sipping free wine." But for Sally Gauger Jensen the artworld is becoming a brighter place. "My own exhibit schedule has increased to the point where I have to finish at least one painting a month to keep up with the demand". Her new show, entitled One If By Land, Two If By Sea, opens at Grava Gallery on Brady Street this month.

As we finished talking, Sally excitedly told me she would have the chance to go out onto one of the ships that very weekend. "Probably a Russian freighter." There's no way Sally Gauger Jensen will spend another nine years making strawberry jam.

One If By Land, Two If By Sea, new paintings by Sally Gauger Jensen opens Friday April 19th, from 6 to 9 pm at Grava Gallery, 1209 East Brady Street. The show runs through May 31st.

Los Angeles opens Virtual Doors to the "Cyber Center"

The Los Angeles Gay & Lesbian Community Services Center, in its commitment to creating a stronger gay and lesbian community, broke historic ground on Tuesday, March 26 with the opening of its Queer CyberCenter, the first of its kind and the first community-based program in Los Angeles to offer universal access to the Internet.

Partially funded by the University of Southern California, the CyberCenter located in the heart of Hollywood at the Gay & Lesbian Center will provide equal,

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non-discriminatory access to the Internet and the multitude of resources and information available in the World Wide Web.

"The Internet is an incredibly valuable tool in mobilizing, educating and uniting people around the world," said Lorri L. Jean, executive director of the Gay & Lesbian Center. "It's vital that access to the internet and the wealth of information on the World Wide Web be available to all members of society, not just those fortunate enough to attend a school with the required computer equipment or those wealthy enough to afford their own Internet connection."

The Queer CyberCenter's home page can be accessed not only by visitors of the new CyberCenter, but by people around the world at: www.qcc.org. It provides links to gay and lesbian-related information on politics and activism, people of color, youth, women, transgender issues, health, arts and entertainment, research data, international resources and lifestyle issues.

The CyberCenter will also provide USC researchers and the Gay & Lesbian Center a unique opportunity, through on-line surveys, to measure the political attitudes and beliefs of a broad spectrum of gay and lesbian people including those who are not "Out."

"The gay and lesbian community is one of the many populations that the University of Southern California is committed to learn more about," said Eric Schockman, a faculty member of the USC Department of Political Science and coauthor of the grant. "We're excited to be embarking on this new partnership."

Gay & Lesbian Center volunteers will empower the community by offering free classes on exploring Internet resources, email and other Internet tools.

New Interactive Web Site Serves LesBiGays with Chat, News, Resources

Any Lesbian, Gay man, Bisexual, or Transgendered person with a connection to the Internet and browser software can now find live conversation, news, features, and community resources 24 hours a day with the launch of QWorld, a new location which opened this year on the World Wide Web. Its address is http://www.qworld.org.

QWorld is one of the first sites on the Web to offer interactive chat, much like that found on proprietary online services such as America Online and CompuServe. Visitors can chat in any of three lounges: Sappho's, the Gay Bistro, or the Rainbow Lounge — or open their own room. A crew of trained chat hosts, online from 8pm to midnight, ensures a welcoming and pleasant environment.

"Our experience with managing and facilitating online interactivity through chat sets us apart on the Web because it lets us establish realtime community — something missing from the Web until now," says Dr. Becky Boone, QWorld President.

"QWorld creates a community with chat, games, workshops, and guest speakers. It fills a growing need because those of us who love to talk online need an alternative to the \$2.95 an hour the commercial services charge."

Users are not charged an hourly fee to visit QWorld: they simply pay their Internet service provider, most of which offer unlimited hours for a flat fee.

ALSO ONLINE: "QZINE"

In addition to interactive chat, the QWorld web site also features an online magazine, QZine, which offers monthly articles, fiction, and cartoons by established and new authors. The guest author for the first issue is John Pivovarnic, author of the Idiots' Guide to... series of computer books.

Other elements of the QWorld Web site will include regional listings of Lesbian and Gay professionals, a software library, a travel service, and a vendor area where subscribers can browse and order products and services from Gay- and Lesbian-owned businesses. The site lists many links to other Gay and Lesbian locations on the Internet. A message board area where members can post questions and opinions opened in February.

"Lesbians and Gays constitute far more than 10% of all Internet users," says Boone, a psychologist, Lesbian activist, and President of SIS, Inc., which manages QWorld.

"For those of us who are out, Internet services such as the QWorld Web site are an extraordinary resource for activism, making it possible to disseminate news and information instantly to the thousands of grassroots organizations and community activists, as well as to the worldwide Gay community. And for those Lesbians and Gays who live closeted lives out of necessity, Internet resources can provide a life-line to community." Boone and SIS successfully launched three forums on Apple's World online service and are now expanding their efforts to the Web.

QWorld is supported by advertisers who recognize the purchasing power of the LesBiGay community. STREET BEAT

n Saturday night, March 30th, I covered Street Beat!, the Spring Fashion Extravaganza held at the Survival/Revival Resale Shop at 246 East Chicago Street in the Third Ward. The profits from this refreshing entertainment will benefit the Milwaukee AIDS Project.

Survival/Revival was nearly empty when I arrived to have a look around. The place looked squashed. All the racks were pushed to the back to make a space up front near the stage area where there were a few chairs scattered around. Elsa Klensch, the Goddess of "Style" at CNN would have been shocked no runway, but she would have had a great time.

I ran into BJ Daniels who emceed the whole thing and we chatted about the lineup (three mini-shows interspersed with raffle drawings and shopping) and how many models there were (15). He was testing out his communication headpiece with Kathy Fortier who runs S/R. She seemed a little hyper and got angry when people tried to get in. She banished the masses and made them wait outside.

The live music by **Melting Prophets** was to go on for an hour before the show started. Smart move! People could mill around and look at merchandise, have a beer (donated by Miller Brewing) or a soda (donated by Pepsi) for a suggested donation of \$2.50 each, and generally enjoy themselves. Bowls of pretzels were placed around the shop.

While the music was blasting away I was thinking about all those fashion shows I was involved in during my career in Visual Merchandising. There, I said it! God, I hate that word. It's so phony. I had been at Lord & Taylor in New York. J. Magnin in San Francisco and had finally arrived at Sak's Fifth Ave. in Washington DC, where I did lots of in-store fashion shows. Those were easy; just order plenty of fresh flowers, put out all the designer's clothes and sit back and watch. I did two shows at the Shorecrest Hotel for the National Heart Foundation (Norman Norell and Bill Blass) and those were work, my dears. When one is decorating a space that will seat four to five thousand people, one has to keep in mind that any decoration is going to look like a postage stamp. The runways went on forever you've got to think BIG! Naturally, the designers all brought their favorite models from New York and the clothes were trucked down at Sak's expense. I had to order arrangements for 500 tables and when florist saw me coming, he beamed. I got anything I wanted. The Norell show got all Calla Lilies, Rubrum Lilies and fullblown red and pink roses; no greenery. The "ladies" loved them they got to take them home! I heard about that one from my boss. But hey, it wasn't my money and it looked great!

The event at the Spanish Embassy for Oscar de La Renta was kept very simple. That place was gorgeous. We just had some low carpeted platforms for the models to get up on occasionally and the rest was parquet floors, little gold chairs and fresh flower arrangements. Oscar had sent the music tapes he used in New York for his shows by plane and they were all erased by the static electricity. We had NO music a crisis with only hours to the show. I had always used the National Symphony Jazz Orchestra doing Broadway show tunes. I called and they came up with a combo in the nick of time. They were wonderful and Oscar was thrilled.

This show, however, was different. It may all look easy, but there's a lot of work that goes into producing something like the one I was about to witness. Congratulations to all the volunteers who were behind the scenes and "made it work".

BJ Daniels, in white tux with tails and a sport shirt and a big piece of junk jewelry, opened the festivities. He introduced the commenataor, Sister Cash Box. She delivered her remarks in a monotone style I will call Fashion Rap! The first section was called "Geek Chic" and was the best.

The young models (and one elderly drag who was hysterical throughout) had been given guidelines and were allowed to pick their own outfits. Lots of pattern-on-pattern and everything was bright, youthful and zany. There was another break for shopping and some people headed outside to smoke, or to use the port-a-potty that was placed on the street.

There was more raffle drawing (lots of Lixx Custard gift certificates) and then the second section titled "Rave Slaves" was presented. It wasn't exactly what I expected. There was one young man in a fake leather outfit with chains and a very long shoe horn that was used as a whip. But, out in the crowd was an androgenous trio who were fabulous! A dominatrix and her slaves: they were all in black with spikes and chains. The gal had a dog leash on one of the young men, who were both in drag. The hair for all the models was done by Beauty on Brady Street and I got the impression of "a bad hair day on acid". There were neon wigs, and then there were neon pieces that were frizzed and twisted and attached to the models' hair. The makeup throughout was by Rita, of Art & Science of Evanston, IL.

The last drawing of the night was for the Grand Prize: A color TV donated by Channel 6. This was followed by thunderous applause and more shopping. Most of the people left just before 11 pm on their way to wherever their heart's desires were taking them. Afterall, it was Saturday night.

My personal musical tastes are diverse and eclectic. I always seem to gravitate towards artists with unique sounds, hybrid styles and/or flamboyant images—they are the ones who catch my eyes and ears when pouring through the piles of records, tapes and cd's that cross my desk. This issue's crop of new releases is no exception, with debuts from dance sensations **Planet Soul** and avant-garde jazz-punkers **Vitapup**, as well as the latest from vocal performance trio **BETTY** and queercore darlings **Pansy Division**.


Topping my list of current favorites on the dance music scene is the Miamibased duo **Planet Soul**, comprised of Cuban-American DJ/producer **George Acosta** and Puerto Rican r&b/salsa diva **Brenda D**. Their first single "Set U Free" has topped dance charts for over six months, selling more than 500,000 copies worldwide with it's groundbreaking hybrid sound which mixes up hard beats, acidic rhythms and old school freestyle funkiness with **Brenda D's** hypnotic, melodic vocals and creative tempo changes and breakdowns. They've brought the hottest sounds of the underground dance club scene to the mainstream, and now the duo are poised to release their debut album, entitled Energy and Harmony (Strictly Rhythm Records), which is sure to continue their success. Pumping its way through nine outstanding tracks, the album includes the aforementioned single and their latest that you're sure to hear soon in every club in town, called "Feel The Music." Though most tracks here follow the same creative pattern of "Set U Free," their sound doesn't grow weary like most formulaic dance music albums. In fact, it only grows on you the more you listen.

Another album that just might grow on you is the cd-rom enhanced *Limboland* (Intersound), the second effort from New York-based female performance trio **BETTY**. Sporting both a flamboyant, comedic stage presence and a unique, wide-ranging sound, **BETTY** is a multi-media phenomena best experienced live—more akin to performance art than a one-third dyke rock

band with perfect three part harmonies, though they are that as well. Their performance persona is a meld of gay camp humor, cabaret theatrics and feminist spunk, while their sound draws upon the three members' various musical backgrounds in classical, rock, jazz, and blues. Sounds on the album range from the polished pop cover of the Association's hit "Windy" to the slick, funky dance grooves of "Limboland," from heartwrenching ballads like "Impossibly Blue" to the

fierce rocking fun of "A Typical Love" (featured on the soundtrack for last year's *The Incredibly True Adventures of Two Girls In Love*), and everything in between. In addition to the thirteen musical tracks on the album is the inclusion of a cd-rom track—both for the edification of BETTY-virgins and the immense satisfaction of die-hard **BETTY** fans. It includes a random assortment of videos, live performance footage, interview segments and other background info on the band that aptly represents their eccentricity and ingenuity.

Not short on eccentricity or ingenuity themselves, New York's **Vitapup** blend elements of hip hop, jazz, spoken-word (poetry), and punk rock on their debut disc *An Hour With Vitapup* (Plump Records). With lesbian drummer Melissa York (better known from the dyke punk band Team Dresch) they've got the queer angle covered; with contributions from Brooklyn's Crew Eye Cue ("Blast Off With A Verse") and Reality ("Come Thru In A Circle"), they've got the rap angle covered; with bassist Ray Heatley's impassioned, screaming vocals




("Dragonfly," "Burger King") and guitarist Greg Griffith's searing, discordant cacophony ("Disbelief," "Dragonfly") they've got the punk angle well covered; and with contributions from poet-wordsmith Jane Hohenberger ("City Soul," "Come Thru In A Circle," "Build Your Own Home") they've even got the spokenword, poetry angle covered. They're one of the hardest working and most inventive punk-rooted bands around, with big hearts and strong opinions, and I for one look forward to hearing much more from them.

Speaking of big hearts and strong opinions, prolific queer-core darlings Pansy Division return to the spotlight with their latest in camp-rock, Wish I'd Taken Pictures (Lookout Records). Opening with "Horny In The Morning," and continuing on in that vein with humorously titled ditties like "Pee Shy," and "Dick of Death," this fourth collection of wry two-to-three minute wonders places Pansy Division at the top of the queercore heap. Not only are their lyrics openly, honestly, brazenly, and comedically queer, but these righteous rockers also include as standard liner note fare a listing of contact info for queer youth resources like PFLAG, the Lambda Youth Network, and OutProud, the National Coalition for Gay, Lesbian, and Bisexual Youth, as well as detailed instructions and accompanying illustrations depicting proper condom application for safer sex. Now that's putting your money where your mouth is, as it were.

Quick Note: For you X Files addicts out there, be sure to run to the store to pick up the new Songs In The Key of X (Warner Brothers Records), subtitled Music from and inspired by the X Files. It features an incredibly diverse line-up that ranges from **Sheryl Crow** to **Danzig**, with several notable collaborations, like **William S. Burroughs** with **R.E.M.** and **Elvis Costello** with **Brian Eno**.
