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LAUNCH OF WISCONSIN DIVISION OF PUBLIC HEALTH LGBT HEALTH WEBSITE

Wisconsin - The Wisconsin Division of Public Health has launched a website dedicated to increasing knowledge about lesbian, gay, bisexual, and transgender (LGBT) health disparities and health resources in Wisconsin. The website is congruent with Healthiest Wisconsin 2020, a plan for the decade to improve health across the life span, and eliminate health disparities and achieve health equity.

LGBT people share many of the same health concerns as heterosexual men, women and youth—they should maintain a healthy diet, exercise regularly, limit alcohol consumption, and avoid exposure to cigarette smoke. However in addition, LGBT people face significant health disparities related to health behaviors and conditions and access to healthcare. For example:

- 27% of lesbian, gay and bisexual adults in Wisconsin were uninsured, compared to 10% of heterosexual adults; and
- One in four Wisconsin high school students who had had same-sex sexual contact attempted suicide in the previous year—a rate more than four times higher than that of students who had had only opposite-sex sexual contact.

The LGBT website emphasizes the diversity the LGBT population in Wisconsin, highlights health issues facing particular populations, and provides links to resources, both in Wisconsin and on the Internet. The site addresses health issues, including alcohol and drug use, cancer, HIV/AIDS, mental health, tobacco, and violence and safety.

The election of Katie to serve on the Equality Federation national board is just one example of how Wisconsin continues to move in the right direction."

Milwaukee - With a current estimate for reconstruction of the new community center space at 4-6 weeks, a move-in date of late September to mid October 2010 is in the planning. "We are working with movers, security system vendors, phone service providers and other vendors to ready the building for our move. Currently, there are tenants on two floors who will be moving in the next six weeks or so," states the Center Connection newsletter emailed to Quest's office.

The Milwaukee LGBT Community Center received its special use permit from the City of Milwaukee Board of Zoning Appeals on July 29, 2010. This allows the reconstruction of three spaces in the new Community Center building at 252 E. Highland, including Project Q, a large Community Room, and two office suites. The remainder of the building is in great condition requiring only paint and new carpet.

With the expansion of the Center will come the planning and creation of a new LGBT Mental Health Clinic

Since that first Challenge Party, participants have raised more than half a million dollars (or more than an average of \$38,000 annually) to support the innovative and critical services and programs needed by Milwaukee's LGBT community.

The OutReach Awards Banquet is our primary annual fundraising event. It showcases the services of OutReach and honors the contributions of individuals, community members, and organizations that support our mission "to promote equality and quality of life issues for LGBT people".

- Woman of the Year for 2010 goes to Kristina Kosnick. Ms Kosnick is currently a Humanities Exposed (HEX) Scholar of the University of Wisconsin. She is being recognized for her ground-breaking work in creating the LGBTQ Reading, Writing, and Relating Narratives Project at OutReach. The project, which seeks to provide a forum for LGBTQ people to write, share, collect and publish personal narratives, has served as a launching pad for community education/networking, youth outreach, and the "personal is political" activism.
- The **2010 Man of the Year** is Rev. Ellwood (Woody) Carey. Rev. Carey is being honored for his contributions to the LGBT communities in Madison over the past couple of decades. Now retired, he served as an openly gay minister in the Presbyterian Church, and during that period was a very active and vocal supporter of LGBT rights. In addition to his religious work, Rev. Carey has served four terms on the New Harvest Foundation board, part of that time as Co-Chair. Woody's leadership has been instrumental in expanding the reach and impact that the New Harvest Foundation has had in Madison.
- 2010 Organization of the Year goes to Perfect Harmony Men's Chorus. This award goes to a business, non-profit, or community group that makes a notable effort toward the advancement of LGBT equality and quality of life. Perfect Harmony Perfect Men's Chorus (PHMC), Madison's gay and gay-friendly men's chorus, embodies this spirit. Formed in 1997, its singing membership of 30 men strives to provide gay bisexual, transgender, and gay friendly men with opportunities for the performance of choral music in a supportive and affirming environment. Feeling strongly that music is a common link among all people, PHMC partners with other community organizations to provide entertainment for a wide range of events which include fundraising, social change, education, and just plain fun.
- OutReach Volunteer of the Year for 2010 is Caroline Werner. A retired social worker, Ms. Werner has a long history of working as a LGBTQ older adult advocate, attempting to secure better awareness of and sensitivity to the needs of our communities by service providers. She is being honored here for her incredible effort in organizing seventeen different presentations on weekday afternoons from June through December 2010 at OutReach and the Madison Senior Center. The presentations are designed to inform LGBTQ seniors and their support network about services available in Dane County and teach individuals how to self-advocate.

- Cass Marie (Domino) Downing is this year's Courage Award recipient. Ms. Downing is recognized for her determination over the last year to maintain her public role as an entertainer and AIDS Network fundraising hostess in the face of some significant personal health challenges. With characteristic grace, energy, and warmth, Ms. Downing exemplifies the qualities of the human spirit that we can all take hope from in the face of adversity.



The teens of Proud Theater collaboratively create all the plays and theatrical pieces themselves, with guidance from Proud Theater Artistic Director Brian Wild and prominent adult members of the Madison community. These include Callen Harty - Local Playwright and recent Artistic Director of Broom Street Theater. Sol Kelly-Iones – Proud Theater Co-founder and LGBTQ activist, local playwright/actor Heather Renken, Emma Zeldin – LGBTQ activist, youth councilor/adult mentor Amber Becker, Musical Director Galen Olsen, Technical Director N-dig0, and local musician/Actors Shaun Petts and Gabriel Swimm. Proud Theater is supported as a project through Outreach Inc. and is associated with Art & Soul Innovations, StageQ and other members of the Madison area theater and business community also lend their support. Proud Theater also enjoys generous support from The Mukti Group - dedicated to the support and development of LGBTQ youth through theatrical works across the country. Proud Theater's tradition of celebrating rainbow symbols has a dual meaning for those members of the group who have multiracial identities. In addition to producing pieces that work to counter homophobia, anti-racist and multicultural themes are integrated into their works.



DAIRYLAND CLASSIC RETURNS TO MILWAUKEE

The Dairyland Classic (DLC) softball tournament returns to Milwaukee on Labor Day weekend, September 2nd through 6th. This city's gay softball tradition dates back to the late 1970's, when it began as the Wreck Room Classic. The tournament has since evolved over the decades. A founding city of the North American Gay Amateur Athletic Alliance (NAGAAA), Milwaukee hosted NAGAAAFest, the gay softball world series in 2009.

NAGAAAFest's spectacular success, based on the many year's of organizing the Dairyland Classic, provided the groundwork for another world-class softball experience. Brian Reinkober leads the present Dairyland Classic Committee. "Our members have taken the best of past Dairylands, added some things that worked very well during the Gay Softball World Series 2009 and mixed the two together to produce something uniquely Milwaukee, something uniquely our own," Reinkober said

SSBL assistant commissioner Pete Nys expects over 35 teams. They represent recreational and competitive levels. The D recreational division plays at Wick Field located on Vliet and 51th streets. The C recreational and competitive both play at Brookfield's Wirth Park, one of field complexes used during NAGAAAFest 2009.

According to Nys, nine local teams from Milwaukee have registered to participate. Boom, a Dairyland Classic sponsor, has a C division team. Brad Yates joined the Boom Bulldogs this season. Known for his versatility, Yates plays second base, outfield and pitches. "It takes a phenomenal catcher to be a great pitcher," Yates said.

Hybrid Hustlers, a new SSBL team, makes its DLC debut. The team was formed under manager Sean Felice. It consists largely of members of

the Milwaukee Gay Volleyball Association (MGVA). MGVA president Eric Euting explains the relationship of the newly

formed volleyball organization with SSBL's newest softball team. "MGVA wanted to form a

softball team but it wasn't fair to the membership to use the association funds. Hybrid was a new bar looking to sponsor a team but didn't have enough people. It worked out perfectly," Euting said. About half of the Hybrid Hustlers are volleyball players. Jimmy C, a former umpire who began his softball career as a SSBL player in the early 1980's, joined *Hybrid Hustlers* to offer his experience as a coach. "They're a great bunch of guys and gals. We're a good mix of talent — we even have a couple of straight guys. We have the potential to go all the way in the tournament," Jimmy said.

The Milwaukee Gay Arts Center fields *Scream*, the only SSBL team not sponsored by a bar *Scream*'s fully diverse roster ranges from university professors and MD's to barristas. Asked about Scream's upcoming second Dairyland Classic, shortstop and co-manager

Will Pelfrey said, "we have a great recreational team and we're looking forward to a wonderful weekend of softball. People join Scream because we're all about having fun."

After the Last Out

Unlike previous tournaments that ended with a banquet, Dairyland Classic 2010 concludes with a street party. "A highlight of NAGAAAFest was the Street Bash so we decided to bring it

back," Nys said. The Street Bash takes place Sunday evening from 3 to 11:30pm between Boot Camp and

Kruz on East National Avenue.

Milwaukee icon Dear Ruthie will host the outside festivities. Included will be the DLC trophy pres-

entation and live entertainment featuring the Chicago based band, Sensation as well as local entertainers. The evening's headliner is 80's pop star Tiffany. Milwaukee DJs will provide dance music throughout the evening.

In addition to the Street Bash, DLC amenities include a shuttle bus from the Hyatt and Doubletree host hotels to the sponsor bars, a Sunday morning Dairyland Classic Send Off Brunch at Charlie's in the Third Ward and, on Monday, Woody's Annual Dairyland Classic Drinking Team Day at Miller Park with tailgate party.

Volunteers are needed for a variety of tasks from registration to field support as well as Street Bash set up, break down and talent assistance.


Steven Slater





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LOVE LAUNCHES THE BOULEVARD'S 25TH SILVER ANNIVERSARY SEASON

The Boulevard Ensemble Studio Theatre opened its 25 season with *Fourplay: 4 Comedies of Seduction*. The quartet of one-act love stories presents a glorious spectrum from too sweet to too sexy to miss.

True to its mission to train new actors and directors, this production allows several to make their respective debuts in the program's first half.

Paul Madden directs for the first time with John Patrick Shanley's *Red Coat* and Elaine Jarvik's *Dead Right*. Shanley's vignette of adolescent "love" stars two new young actors, Hugh Blewett and Keigan Vonnoy. They portray love struck teens with apt innocence and palpable affection.

Dead Right approaches love from a different angle. An older couple discover their bond though a dead acquaintance's obituary. The wife (Barbara Weber) harps incessantly on the deceased's shoddy remembrance. Her pummeled husband (Mark Bucher read the part for the absent Mark Ninneman) offers a dose of reality.

Thomas Mertz-Dillon directs the third play, Sure Thing by David Ives. This cleverly contoured play deconstructs the art of the pick-up. Brooke Wegner plays the aggressive female in artistic director Bucher's clever role reversal of the original casting. It's 2010 after all. Now women are granted the same prerogative of firing the first shot – or, in this case, delivering the first lame pick-up line. Wegner delightfully dominates the repartee with rapid-fire variant pitches (each punctuated by a "ding") to move in on her prey, the lonely male reading Faulkner, adeptly played by Ken Dillon

The evening's theatrical weight comes after intermission. It's the meat course after the trio

of light appetizers.

Harold Pinter's *The Lover* was a scandal when first performed in 1963. A happily married, middle class couple has moved to the "village" outside London. Like any good bedroom community residents, he, Richard (Jason Will), goes off to work in the city whilst she, Sarah (Ericka Wade), entertains her lover. It's all very mutual because he, Richard, has his whore in the city. This exposed, indiscreet charm of the bourgeoisie has a twist, of course.

The Lover can be played with a dire existentialist distance. But Bucher has his cast deliver Pinter in Anglo-accented and sophisticatedly intoned conversation. The opening exchange:

Richard: Is your lover coming today?

Sarah: Mmmmmm Richard: What time?

Sarah: Three

Richard: Will you be going out or staying in? Sarah: Oh...I think we'll stay in.

And so it continues. The couple's casual, candid and detailed discussions of apparent extramarital exploits explore the dynamics, intricacies and power plays of partnership. It's delicious.

Will as Richard is glorious. He carries the modern yet classic English gentleman with mercilessly aloof charm. He describes his whore's wit and grace with the same perfectly English ennui as when talking about the traffic, then deflects moments of spousal tension with a polite offer of another drink. Will's physical presence wonderfully balances Pinter's wrestling gender roles.

Wade's Sarah displays a natural comfort as the stay-at-home mistress. Her poise belies her frisky inner-kitten. She captures the congenial but naughty wife with just a hint of pouting jealousy. Wade loves the role and it shows.

The Tom Jones soundtrack, although slightly loud, provides an appropriately retro mood.

A nod to the 21st century reality of same sex partnerships on an equal footing with the other side would have been appreciated. It's an unfortunate sin of omission. Still, the Boulevard's next show is gay playwright Evan Smith's *The Savannah Disputation*.

Fourplay – 4 Comedies of Seduction runs through August 29 at the Boulevard Ensemble Studio Theatre, 2252 South Kinnickinnic in Bay View. Ticket information: 414-744-5757

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



NEW LGBT FILMS ON DVD by Glenn Bishop

"Dream Boy"

Back in the mid-1990s, mainstream publishing suddenly discovered gay books. Don't know how; don't know why. One such book was Jim Grimsley's poignant coming of age novel, "**Dream Boy**."

At the time, Grimsley's novel was nothing less than an absolute sensation. Think "Brokeback Mountain" before "Broke-

back Mountain" and then substitute a rural Southern high school setting for Big Sky country. Alex Sanchez had yet to introduce his out 'n proud Rainbow Boys; the gay teens in Mark Roeder's "Gay Youth Chronicles" hadn't yet found themselves in peril. Nor had the gay coming of age novel become the sta-



ple (cliché?) of Gay Lit it's become today.


In fact, everyone in Glenn's acquaintance read "**Dream Boy**." Everyone. So, of course, Glenn hastily followed suit.

In "**Dream Boy**," Grimsley introduces Nathan (Stephan Bender), a sensitive (read: gay), painfully shy boy who is starting at a new school. Nathan's family moves around a lot. It seems that Nathan's Daddy has something of a drinking problem. He also sexually abuses his son.

And yet, just possibly, there might be hope for Nathan. In short order he discovers Roy (Max Roeg), the sexy, confident boy next

door. Nathan spends an inordinate amount of time each afternoon watching Roy as the lad completes his chores out back. More importantly Roy discovers Nathan. Roy surreptitiously glances at Nathan in the rearview mirror as he drives the school bus each day; his smile broadening as Nathan oh-so tentatively smiles back.

Their innocence, the sim-



plicity of their longing will surely strike a chord with most audiences; certainly for those gay moviegoers who, like Glenn, are gentlemen of a certain age.

No surprise that Roy accepts an offer of help with his English essay. Their hesitant hand-holding as Roy later tutors Nathan

with his Algebra homework left Glenn neither surprised nor shocked. After a very short hop, skip and a jump, the two lads are down to their tighty-whities and making out amongst the tombstones in the deserted cemetery located conveniently nearby.

Sadly, Bolton's film here begins to go horribly wrong, veering disturbingly into the world of adolescent

soft-core.

Roy proves to be a bit skittish after any expression of affection or physical desire for Nathan; Nathan himself has no such qualms. Yet, unlike so many stories such as this, Roy doesn't shun Nathan at school. Rather, Roy is determined to include Nathan when Roy and his two sexy friends Burke (Randy Wayne) and Randy (Owen Beckman) head off to the local swimming hole; later as the group plans an overnight camping trip.

Still, the course of true love never did run smooth, either in Shakespeare's time or in

Grimsley's sparse, lyrical ghost story manages (only just) to elude the worst of the melodramatic excesses of so many Southern Gothic novels. Glenn wishes he could say the same of director James Bolton's cinematic adaptation. There's certainly plenty of blame to toss around. Glenn would most likely want to start with Richard Buckner's ponderous, mind-numbing score. Equally mind-numbing visually is Sarah Levy's cinematography which offers clouds: clouds at sunset, clouds at sunrise; storm clouds looming on the horizon, etc. Clouds, clouds and more clouds.

But ultimately the lion share of blame rests entirely on James Bolton's shoulders for his slavish devotion to Grimsley's novel. Scenes straight from the novel tumble forth, one after another, albeit lacking Grimsley's evocative storytelling which skillfully brought his characters, particularly Nathan and Roy, to life. Nor does Bolton's screenplay offer his young cast members much help. Looking to the novel for dialogue, what often proved picaresque on the page emerges as painfully stilted onscreen: "Please, ma'am, I was hoping you might let Nathan go out riding with me tonight... We won't be out too late. I'll bring him back by eleven o'clock." Vaguely set in the 1970s, "**Dream Boy**" often feels as if time-warped back to the 1950s.

For the film's first 40 minutes or so, audiences might well become swept up in Nathan and Roy's burgeoning relationship by filling in for themselves details otherwise missing. Most in Glenn's devoted focus group managed to do so. The film's extraordinary concluding section is, however, another matter entirely. Here the sexual abuse subplot, never properly fleshed out, dominates before the film spirals totally out of control with a cinematic flourish of rape, murder and resurrection. Many readers found Grimsley's conclusion of "**Dream Boy**" to be both frustrating and unsatisfying. Glenn suspects that moviegoers won't be any happier when the final credits roll.

very many gay films; nor does it here.

In the novel Roy's girlfriend Emily (Tricia Mara) is a female rival never met but rarely absent from Nathan's thoughts. In the film she's brought front and center. Perhaps Bolton felt a flesh and blood Emily necessary to establish Roy's initial heterosexual credentials. Or perhaps Bolton merely wished to include the inevitably cringeworthy scene where poor Emily begins to sense that her boyfriend has lost interest in her.

Still, this is merely the first in a nearly unceasing sequence of increasingly cringeworthy scenes as Nathan's dad (Thomas Jay Ryan) starts up again with his "interfering ways" and later Nathan must pay the price for the sin of seducing Roy.



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
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
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
