

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GREEN BAY COUNCIL POSTPONES RESOLUTION TO JOIN DP SUIT

Green Bay - Just 24 hours after the polls had closed on Election Day, the first fruit of Wisconsin's steer to the political right blossomed at Green Bay City Hall. The City Council voted to indefinitely postpone a proposed resolution to join a lawsuit against Wisconsin's Domestic Partners laws.

The alderman who wanted the council to endorse a lawsuit to overturn the state's DP benefits said the election results had changed his mind. Shae Sortwell said that, in light of the state election results, he wanted the council to ignore his proposal. "We have a whole lot of new people in state government at all levels."

Green Bay's newspaper had run an editorial on Election Eve that said joining the lawsuit filed by Wisconsin Family Action was inappropriate for the city. A day later, voters decided to withdraw Democrats from control in the Assembly, Senate and Governor's Office. It was against this backdrop that the Council voted 9-to-2 bypass further discussion of Sortwell's resolution and table it indefinitely.

As soon as the vote was finished several dozen domestic rights supporters left the council chambers. Disappointed that they lost a chance to speak on the issue, some vented their frustration to TV reporters who had followed them out into the hallway. Among them was a Jenny Sykes-Schwenk, a Sunday School teacher at Green Bay's gay-friendly Union Congregational Church. She had planned to read a letter from its pastors to the council.

The church's letter urged the council to provide DP benefits to the city's 950-odd employees. And, it implored them not to join forces with Wisconsin Family Action, an organization the pastors wrote have "clear connections to radical Christian fundamentalism." Doing so, said Pastors Chuck Mize and Peggy Feyen, "would be highly improper."

The issue of DP benefits for Green Bay's municipal workforce initially surfaced in mid-Septem-

ber. That's when a long-time city employee approached the Council's Personnel Committee asking for health insurance coverage for the man he loves and lives with.

David Fowles got a cold shoulder from the committee when he asked them to add his registered domestic partner to City Hall's definition of family for insurance purposes. Fowles request was officially 'filed' on a unanimous vote. And, although Fowle's request had been deep-sixed, the fact that he had come out to the city fathers and asked for equal benefits for his man-mate prompted Alderman Sortwell to light a political backfire.

Sortwell, elected last spring on a razor-thin margin with Tea Party backing, had drafted a resolution to direct the City Attorney to file a Friend of Court brief in the lawsuit filed in Madison by Wisconsin Family Action. WFA is the virulently anti-gay organization that spearheaded the campaign to pass Wisconsin's constitutional amendment that limits marriage to hetero-couples only. Ironically, it's headed by Julaine Appling and her longtime domestic partner Diane Westphal who-according to public records—share a house they purchased jointly in Watertown.

At a council meeting in October, Sortwell insisted that City Hall needed to contribute attorneys to battle what he sees as an ongoing moral war. "The people of Green Bay want marriage to only consist of one man and one woman. This is a direction violation of what the people want." He told the Council that he'd spoken with the plaintiffs and that they'd welcome the free legal aid.

The staff attorney for the council told Sortwell that his proposal made no sense. Allison Swanson, the city's number-two lawyer, told Sortwell and the council that Friend of Court briefs are normally filed only in appellate cases. "There are complex issues in this case and you don't know how it's going to play out."

Swanson said that although the lawsuit filed by Wisconsin Family Action has targeted the state's Medical Leave Act—a law that loosely defines 'domestic partners'—it seems to be ultimately aimed at the the state's official Domestic Partners Registry. Those two laws, said Swanson, "are not necessarily synonymous with each other." Intervening now, she said, could have unintended consequences for the city.

She also told Sortwell that she doubted the City of Green Bay had any legal basis to file a brief. "The city has no administration of the Domestic Partners Registry. It's done at the county level."

Alderman Dorff made his opposition clear. "I don't want to see us take the attorney time," Dorf said. "The Wisconsin Supreme Court has already denied the overturn of Domestic Partners. And, the Family Medical Leave Act is only about providing care to sick and dying loved ones."

Just as the council was about to decide Sortwell's request to table his resolution, Alder Amy Kocha asked for a roll call vote. As it was, only she and Doff voted against Sortwell's resolution—in the hope that the idea to join forces with Wisconsin Family would be openly discussed and voted down.

FAIR WISCONSIN EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR KATIE BELANGER TALKS ABOUT MOVING FORWARD POST ELECTIONS

On Tuesday, November 2, Wisconsin voters went to the polls to determine the fate of our state and our country.

We now live in a very different Wisconsin.

A state with a long-progressive tradition, a state that took remarkable steps in 2009 to advance equality for the LGBT community, now has a government led by the very people who sought to ban marriage equality and civil unions in 2006.

But as we take stock of the new political realities in our state, we must determine how, not if, we can continue to move forward.

The change in our government has certainly put us on the defense. As Senator Glenn Grothman and Rep. Mark Gottlieb outlined on Wisconsin Eye on November 3, one of their top priorities when the Republicans take over in January is to dis-

mantle the domestic partner health care coverage for state employees.

I do not question either party's intention to do what they think is best for our state. I do, however, believe that there is a fundamental lack of understanding about why these types of protections are important to our state. It's not about a price tag — it's about creating a stronger state for every Wisconsinite. It's about building a stronger economy by attracting and retaining the most talented employees. It's about the government not standing in the way of caring, committed same-sex couples and their ability to take care of each other in times of need.

Playing defense is not a new phenomenon in the LGBT equality movement. Following the Republican takeover of Congress in 1994, we saw anti-gay policies like the Defense of Marriage Act pass that continue to have a negative impact on the lives of LGBT people in Wisconsin and beyond.

However, the landscape is different in that not only do we have those antiquated and discriminatory policies to dismantle, but we also have concrete victories to defend.

With the passage of domestic partnership protections in 2009, Wisconsin became the first state in the nation with a constitutional amendment banning marriage equality and civil unions to pass a domestic partner registry. Wisconsin is now the first state in the Midwest to pass protections for same-sex couples through legislation.

Whether it is a repeal measure or through the legal challenge Wisconsin Family Action brought forward for a second time this summer, Fair Wisconsin is actively working to defend the critical protections that more than 1500 couples across the state currently enjoy.

I remain hopeful that the new leadership in our State Capitol remembers the day they won their discriminatory amendment fight and simultaneously lost their majorities. That day was a turning point in the fight for equality. Conservatives are no longer able to use the LGBT community for political gain; to use equality as a wedge issue to turn out anti-gay voters and elect conservative leaders. In fact, when they attack, the community responds in droves, fighting harder at every turn.

As we prepare to defend our victories at the state level, our work to proac-



tively advance equality shifts in focus to the local level, where we were successful in blocking an anti-gay resolution just last week.

Fair Wisconsin, our local partner organizations and our members turned out in force to the Green Bay City Council meeting on Wednesday, November 3, when Alderman Shae Sortwell was advancing a resolution to join Wisconsin Family Action's lawsuit challenging the domestic partnership registry.

In an act of bullying and retribution, Sortwell's resolution emerged following a request made for domestic partner health care coverage by David Fowles, a City of Green Bay Department of Public Works employee.

Fair Wisconsin refuses to allow Sortwell and others like him to bully brave LGBT people who dare to stand up for basic protections.

Ultimately, the City Council voted to postpone the measure indefinitely, resulting in a victory for the LGBT community, for equality and for the more than 100 people who joined us on Wednesday evening to stand up against Sortwell and his actions.

But our work is not over. As we redouble our efforts to defend domestic partnerships, we will remain vigilant in cities like Green Bay across Wisconsin to continue speaking out against discrimination, building inclusive communities and workplaces and, one day, create a Wisconsin that treats all its citizens fairly and decently.

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REPORT RELEASED ON LESBIAN, GAY, BISEXUAL, TRANSGENDER AND QUEER (LGBTQ) DOMESTIC/INTIMATE PARTNER VIOLENCE IN THE US

LGBTQ domestic and intimate partner violence reports rise by 15% since 2008; Murder rate up 50% since 2007; Economic crisis and anti-LGBTQ discrimination present barriers for survivors

NATIONAL— The National Coalition of Anti-Violence Programs (NCAVP) today released the Report on Lesbian, Gay, Bisexual, Transgender and Queer Domestic/Intimate Partner Violence in the United States in 2009. The Report found that LGBTQ domestic/intimate partner violence reports rose 15% since 2008 and is a pervasive social problem at a time when LGBTQ-specific programs were losing staff or closing altogether due to the economic crisis. In 2009, NCAVP documented 6 murders related to LGBTQ domestic/intimate partner violence, representing a 50% rise since 2007.

"NCAVP member programs face sharp increases in calls from LGBTQ survivors while sustaining 50% or more in cuts to staffing and programs closures because of the financial crisis," said Lisa Gilmore of the Center on Halsted Anti-Violence Project, "We know that LGBTQ survivors need specific and culturally competent services to stay safe and our primary recommendation in this Report is that funding for LGBTQ-specific anti-violence programs is needed now more than ever."

LGBTQ survivors reported that from 2008 to 2009, there was a 99% increase in calls for police assistance, with a 135% increase in arrests being

made; however during this same time, reports of misarrest were up 144% and reports of police misconduct rose 74%. "NCAVP knows that the police are 10 to 15 times as likely to make a dual arrest in cases of same-sex domestic/intimate partnerviolence than in heterosexual ones," said Kelly Clark at the Gay Alliance of the Genesee Valley's Community Safety Program, "This Report demonstrates the critical need for LGBTQ-specific cultural competence for first responders, such as law enforcement, to prevent re-traumatizing the survivor of violence."

NCAVP also found significant barriers related to anti-LGBTQ bias and discrimination to service provision and shelter options for LGBTQ survivors. In this Report, NCAVP calls on local, state and federal governmentsand private funders to increase funding for community-based LGBTQ-focused domestic/intimate partner violence direct services and prevention. "Policy makers, community organizations and the general public must work to eradicate the anti-LGBTQ bias and discrimination in our laws, culture and society that are barriers to LGBTQ survivors seeking access to vital services and supports," Terra Slavin of the LA Gay & Lesbian Center's Domestic Violence Legal Advocacy Projects

ect. "Legislators must take immediate action to overturn discriminatory legislation, to implement laws that prohibit these practices and to support the civil rights of LGBTQ communities including survivors of domestic/intimate partner violence."

The findings and recommendations made in this Report, and the compelling real-life survivor stories that are highlighted in the accompanying Survival, Support and Resilience: Stories of LGBTQ Survivors and Victims of Domestic/Intimate Partner Violence, highlight the distinct experiences and challenges encountered by LGBTQ survivors of domestic/intimate partner violence. Policymakers and the public have the responsibility to support NCAVP member organizations in our work to foster survivor self-determination and safety, to eradicate LGBTQ domestic/intimate partner violence, and to end institutional discrimination against LGBTQ communities.

The Center for AIDS Intervention Research (CAIR) in the Department of Psychiatry and Behavioral Medicine at the Medical College of Wisconsin announces openings for two positions in a new National Institutes of Health-funded research project that will develop, implement, and evaluate the effectiveness of community HIV prevention programs for African American men who have sex with men (MSM). The project's objective is to determine if friend-to-friend HIV prevention approaches that work through natural social networks of African American MSM in the community can reduce sexual risk behavior, sexually transmitted diseases, and HIV infection. Both Research Associate positions require extensive experience, knowledge, and understanding of Milwaukee's African American MSM community including settings, ways, and places where African American MSM at high risk for HIV can be reached. For both positions, relevant community experience and involvement with organizations that serve African American MSM are more essential than prior formal research experience. Positions will require frequent field work on evenings, nights, weekends, and during nontraditional hours.

Research Associates will perform activities related to the identification of community settings in Milwaukee for reaching African American MSM and for carrying out community outreach to recruit, interview, and conduct HIV prevention activities with social networks of Black gay or bisexual men. The Research Associates will also be responsible for outreach-based recruitment of friendship groups of African American MSM in community settings, for interviewing participants, and for seeking to engage friends of already recruited men to also enroll in the research. Strong interpersonal communication skills and comfort in community settings where the target population meet are important position requirements. Relevant community experience may substitute for some educational requirements.

Both positions offer competitive salaries and excellent fringe benefits. In addition to a resume or completed job application, we welcome applicants to provide an accompanying letter that describes any additional formal or informal community experience, volunteer work, or involvement with community organizations that serve the targeted population if those experiences are relevant to these positions.

MILWAUKEE LAGS BEHIND NEIGHBORING STATES ON LGBT WORKPLACE RIGHTS



Milwaukee - A recent report by the Cream City Foundation shows that Milwaukee lags behind Minnesota and Illinois on workplace rights for LGBT employees. In addition, an estimated 30% of lesbian, gay, bisexual, and transgender (LGBT) employees feel that their being open about their sexual orientation or gender identity hurts their careers.

"Creating a thriving Milwaukee is deeply dependent in the ability of our region to attract and retain a high quality workforce," said Maria Cadenas, executive director of the Cream City Foundation. "Our report is a starting point to discuss how we need to look at the full spectrum of diversity to ensure we are able to attract and retain the best talent – regardless of sexual orientation or gender identity."

The report uses data collected during local focus groups and online surveys, as well as data gathered by the Human Rights Campaign Foundation (HRC) during their annual nation-wide survey on corporate equality. HRC's Corporate Equality Index (CEI) data shows that in the 2011 report, 16 Wisconsin corporations were rated and only two received top rating CEI scores of 100%.

Both, Illinois and Minnesota, have significantly higher number of top rating CEI companies, 34 and 14, respectively. Wisconsin's average CEI of 51% falls significantly behind to these neighbors' rate of 81% and 80%.

But even within Wisconsin, Milwaukee area headquartered employers fall behind. Madison based companies average rating was of 78% to Milwaukee's 47%. Even when we only review Milwaukee's largest HRC rated private sector employers, regardless of headquarters location, Milwaukee's CEI average rating remains below Madison, Illinois and Minnesota's, going up only to 70%.

While Milwaukee has moved forward on offering non-discrimination policies and same-sex benefits for domestic partners, regional and national corporate leaders have increased diversity training, provided employee network groups, supported local professional LGBT associations, conduct LGBT marketing, and provide community support to LGBT programs.

SAGE/MILWAUKEE BECOMES A UNITED WAY AGENCY

Milwaukee - United Way of Greater Milwaukee awarded this past October a \$20,000 grant to SAGE/Milwaukee to develop a structured senior center program. Working with Katie Hamm of United Way, Sue Kelley and Bill Serpe wrote a proposal for this grant seeking funds to begin the work of making SAGE/Milwaukee a full-time senior center.

"Our ultimate goal," said Serpe, "is for us (SAGE) to be in our own building with a full complement of activities and opportunities for seniors who are LGBT in a space that is safe and free from discrimination and homophobia. This grant from United Way is just the beginning, but it provides us with the opportunity to begin working toward that ultimate goal." To that end we will now be calling our space at 1845 N. Farwell The SAGE Senior Center.

United Way of Greater Milwaukee gives out short term grants yearly from it's Community Impact Division. United Way's Philosophy is that everyone deserves opportunities to build a good life ... through all of life's stages, good health and a safe home. Community Impact is positive change in a community over time. The changes are measurable, sustainable and meet current and emerging needs within the community.

SAGE/Milwaukee will apply again next year for this grant. If successful they will become a permanent United Way Agency with all of the benefits that that implies.

With this assistance from United Way, SAGE/Milwaukee is going to develop a structured senior center program, building upon their strength in offering social opportunities to reduce isolation and recognizing the need for LGBT Milwaukeeans to have a place of their own as they age.

"We will be adding a part-time Senior Center Activities Planner who will work with the Milwaukee County Department on Aging's "Senior Center Directors' Roundtable", SAGE will be able to plan and implement a greater number of structured activities based upon member input, and we will recruit a greater number of participants from the LGBT community, thereby decreasing isolation within this vulnerable population," states Mr. Serpe. "Eventually we will have our own space, where ever that may be, be open from 9-5 daily with special events in the evening and on weekends," he continues.

SAGE/Milwaukee is excited about this opportunity from United Way of Greater Milwaukee to move the organization forward by building a stronger program for today and for the future seniors in the LGBT community.

Quest Cover Feature - Interview by Paul Masterson

Nea Marshall Kudi was a model in his native Cameroon. His inadvertant transformation to drag began a carreer in the fine art of illusion. That career spans a spectrum of genres from fashion design and modelling to music video production and national tours. Since winning season 1 of

RuPaul's Drag Race in February 2009, Bebe Zahara Benet has triumphed on the drag stage. Now relocated from Minneapolis to Brooklyn, Nea is climbing the ladder to drag superstardom.

QUEST's Paul Masterson interviewed Nea who, as BeBe Zahara Benet, will grace the La Cage Montage Lounge stage on Friday November 19 at 11pm.

QUEST: Nea, let's start with the basics: why drag?

Nea: Everyone does drag for a different reason. Some do it for fun or for a hobby. Some do it as a profession to build a brand. I do it as a profession. It's hard work. If I weren't building a brand, I wouldn't do it. Doing drag allows me to do other work, like fashion and modeling. It's a different story for other people.

QUEST: What is the state of drag today?

Nea: People have realized drag is now an integral part of pop culture. Drag is moving towards acceptance as legitimate mainstream entertainment.

QUEST: You were a male model before your drag debut. How did that happen?


Nea: I was a very young male model and working with an African designer in Paris. There

was a shortage of girls for a fashion show. I thought "I can do this," and I did. I became a female model for the show. I just walked the runway. When I got back to Cameroon I kept it hush-hush. Cameroon isn't big on drag. But, I secretly worked at creating the illusion that became Bebe.

QUEST: How is illusion different from female impersonation?

Nea: It's all drag. Impersonation is portraying a

character in existence. It mimics or imitates celebrity - a personality, like Cher. But, illusion is different. Illusion is a personal creation. It's unique. You create your own persona. You can be glamorous or do comedy. It's whatever you want to be.



QUEST: And your illusion is BeBe Zahara Benet. Who is BeBe?

Nea: BeBe is strong. She's very fashion, very extravagant and a visionary. She's international, dynamic, and sexy. She's wild in the way she dresses. People think of BeBe as a wild Amazon. It is a jungle out there and you don't survive the jungle being shy. BeBe is definitely not shy. It's survival of the fittest.

QUEST: Looking at your fashion shoots and videos, the costumes are amazing. Who does BeBe's wardrobe and all the details?

Nea: I design all my costumes. I've developed a concept. It's part of my brand. People don't

know how much work goes behind the scenes. Creating drag is an incredible amount of work. When I got started it took hours to do make-up and dress. Now I know how to do it and it's much easier. Now it's second nature. But I'm always adding new costumes so BeBe is always fresh.

QUEST: How did winning the title "America's Next Drag Superstar" at Ru-Paul's Drag Race season 1 affect your career?

Nea: RuPaul's Drag Race gave me a platform. It gave me the chance to reach more people. I was already creating a career. The show definitely helped that. Eventually I would have gotten where I am but just not as quickly.

QUEST: So what about your Milwaukee appearance at La Cage?

Nea: I'm really looking forward to it. It'll be exciting and fun playing with the kids. The show is called "Cameroon." I'll be performing my song "I'm the shit." I can't wait to see what Milwaukee has to offer.


VERBAL ACUMEN READING @ MGAC

New play by Ray Proctor and Olivia Dawson addresses issues of race and friendship

Verbal Acumen might just be a play about friendship. It might question the intricacies of African-American friendships. It might be a play about intellect versus intuition. It might be a play about finding and defining love. It might have a rousing Gospel number with singing and dancing. It might. It probably won't have an angry black man or a pregnant teen mother. But it might. It probably won't mention liberal white guilt, privilege or entitlement. But it might. It might be about how two lives can intersect for a period of time and two people find a way to be honest with each other. It might be a play about nothing at all. But it's not.

Verbal Acumen is a collaborative playwrighting effort b by Ray Proctor and Olivia Dawson. A little more than six years ago Ray Proctor met Olivia Dawson in The Next Act Theatre's production of Between Men and Cattle. At the time. Proctor was a doctoral candidate at the University of Wisconsin-Madison, pursuing a PhD in Shakespeare Studies and Dawson was a professional actor working in Madison, Chicago. Milwaukee and Dawson subsequently enrolled in the MFA program at the University of Wisconsin-Madison, where the two became roommates, friends and colleagues. They npw live in Chicago.

Verbal Acumen negotiates the terrains of pretense, race and friendship. Sometimes it interrogates the complexities of being black in a world that is not. Parts of it consider what it's like to want...simple desires...nothing fancy. Occasionally the play talks about expectations and what happens when those expectations are not met. Parts of the play look for ways to be black and gay...to exist...on stage and in the world without being a caricature or a stereotype. Parts of the play focus on rejection and tenacity. But mostly it's just a play about two people who learn to love each other, in spite of themselves. Did you ever notice how the holidays are all about OY?

Oy, as in JOY: a joyous season for family.
Oy, as in TOY: what the kids want from Santa.
Oy, as in OY, I don't have my Christmas shopping done so now what am I going to do?
Yeah, and that last one is the toughie. So why not relax & head to the bookstore. Look for some of these gift ideas & wrap up a book....

FICTION

There's a little intrigue and lots of small-town flavor in "Cranberry Red", the fourth in the Ames County series by Jerry Apps. In this new installment, people are getting sick because of a new chemical added to Wisconsin's beloved cranberry crop. Can there be a connection?

And more: if your giftee loves a good whodunit, check out "Truthful Moments" by Tom Reed. When a veteran witnesses a killing, it triggers his PTSD. Separating memory from murder might be a challenge. "Easy As Pie at Bobby's Diner" by Susan Wingate is another fun mystery with a Thelma-and-Louise flair, and look for "The Shadow Woman" by Ake Edwardson. Set in Sweden, it will make your shiver.

Is your giftee a major fan of "The Office"? Then they'll love "Russell Wiley Is Out to Lunch" by Richard Hine. Professionally, Russell Wiley's life stinks and his job at a newspaper is practically causing ulcers. Personally, things are no better. And then it gets worse. If time is always of the essence for your giftee, then wrap up "Blue Vegas", a quick-to-read anthology of short stories by P. Moss. Looking for something for the armchair genealogist? Wrap up "Shaking the Family Tree" by Buzzy Jackson. This is the story of a woman in search of a story about her family and where they came from. It's a fun book and may spur you to get involved in your family's history, too. You might also want to look for "Stealing Secrets" by H. Donald Winkler, a history book about women spies during the Civil War and how they may have changed the outcome with their courage and talents.

Does someone on your list love to travel? Then you can't go wrong by giving "Turn Left at the Trojan Horse" by Brad Herzog. This book – written by homeless women living in shelters – tells the kind of stories that could happen to any of us. And speaking of thankful, look for "Dove on a Barbed Wire" by Deborah Steiner-Van Rooyen. It's the true story of a concentration camp survivor and the author's almost-forty-year journey to piece together his memories and to find family. There's brutality in this book, but also beauty. I liked "A Sense of Duty" by Quang Pham, too. That's a memoir from a former Vietnamese refugee who escaped and later became a U.S. Marine combat aviator.

Beatles or Stones? Mick or Paul? Brian or Ringo? Your giftee has definite opinions on those questions, so you'd be well-advised to look for "The Beatles vs. The Rolling Stones" by Jim Derogatis and Greg Kot. Filled with pictures and tons of stats, this book will make your giftee smile big. For an added grin, wrap it up with "Star Guitars: 101 Guitars That Rocked the World" by Dave Hunter. This picture-packed, heavy tome tells the story of Lucille, Blackie, Frankenstat, and more.

Tired of giving the same old thing (cookbooks) to your foodie friend? Then wrap up "Best Food Writing 2010", edited by Holly Hughes. This book contains stories about eating, eats, and what to eat — and it includes recipes, too. And if your cook is into growing it her- (or him-) self, then a can't-miss gift is "The Polytunnel Handbook" by Andy McKee & Mark Gatter. This book gives relatively easy, step-by-step advice for building an eco-friendly greenhouse that will allow any gardener to indulge in the passion year 'round. Oh, and don't forget to look for "Ripe: The Search for the Perfect Tomato" by Arthur Allen. Yep, it's a book about tomatoes. Who could resist?

Filled with pictures, this is the perfect gift for anyone with a curious streak. Also look for "How to Disappear" by Frank M. Ahearn. This book is perfect for conspiracy theorists, the curious, and anyone who just wants to be left completely alone with their books.

Soap fans will love opening a package that contains
"The Days of Our Lives: The True Story of One Family's Dream and the Untold History of Days of Our Lives" by Ken Corday. This surprising book tells the story of a family that conceived the serial that has kept fans' attention for over forty-five years. Since you wouldn't want to burst your soap fan's bubble, wrap up this book filled with insider peeks, trivia, and reminiscings. And speaking of reminiscing, you might want to look for
"The Thunder and the Sunshine" by former Senator Gary Hart, a hard look back at politics, America, and living a life of service.

One of my Best Books Ever celebrated the 15th anniversary of its initial publication this year, and I promise you won't regret wrapping up "Salvation on Sand Mountain" by Dennis Covington, the true story of a journalist who joins a snake-handling church in order to report on an attempted murder. Though the first few pages are a little slow, it's worth the wait because this book is brilliant. This version updates readers on the lives of the people inside. Also look for "A Beggars Purse" by Toni Nelson, a faith-based look at homelessness and poverty in Las Vegas.

Got a cook on your list? Then wrap up "The Mitsitam Café Cookbook" by Richard Hetzler. This book is filled with recipes from the Smithsonian National Museum of the American Indian, so you know this is a very different kind of cookbook and the sidebars and pictures make it an even better gift. Wrap it up with "Muffins & Mayhem: Recipes for a Happy (if Disorderly) Life" by Suzanne Beecher, a memoir with recipes.

Here's a book you'll want to wrap up and you'll also want a copy of your own: "Never Pay Retail Again" by Daisy Lewellyn. Filled with tips, ideas, and ways to look and feel smart on a budget, this book will make you and your giftee both smile in the coming year.

Does your giftee relish a good biography? Then wrap up "Designated Fat Girl" by Jennifer Joyner. This is the true story of an obese woman: her life, her trials, and her decision to save her own life. Sobering, but a great

read. Another great book (think: lots of biographies) is "Gold Diggers: Striking it Rich in the Klondike" by Charlotte Gray. This is a book about gold in them thar hills, and for anyone who feels rich this holiday, it can't be missed.

TRUE CRIME

If there's a CSI fan on your gift list, you'll be glad to give "The Profiler" by Pat Brown with Bob Andelman. This is the true story of a woman who knows killers like she knows her own face — because she hunts them down for a living. This book is not for the faint of heart, but it's an excellent read for your armchair detective. Also look for "Denial: A Memoir of Terror" by Jessica Stern, the true story of an expert in terrorism and PTSD who is forced to remember her own assault at the hands of a serial rapist. This is a lock-the-door kind of book, so be aware.

Armchair psychologists will love "The Measure of Madness" by Cheryl Paradis. What goes on in the mind of a serial killer or psychopath? Paradis, a forensic psychologist, teases the truth and your giftee will love it. After all, with a subtitle like "Inside the Disturbed and Disturbing Criminal Mind", what's not to love? Another mustread is "The Anatomy of Evil" by Michael H. Stone, MD. This uber-scary book, filled with inside looks at many (too many!) despicable people will keep your true crime fan up all night, one way or the other.

Crime fighters love true crime stories, but this one is different: "Murder Behind the Badge: True Stories of Cops Who Kill" by Stacy Dittrich is a chilling look at the bad guys within the good guys. This book is filled with intriguing and fascinating chapters, each one about a flatfoot with a flat-out need for blood. I also liked "History in Blue" by Allan T. Duffin, a book about women in law enforcement from the 1840s to now.

If your true crime buff is tired of the same-old, same-old, then why not wrap up something different? Put "The Autobiography of an Execution" by David R. Dow under the tree. This is a memoir by a lawyer who has represented dozens of death-row inmates; it's about his life, his work, and his beliefs. Wrap it up with another different book: "I Fell in Love with a Con Man" by Elizabeth Grzeszczyk.

TRIVIA & FUN STUFF

I'm a big fan of trivia, so I can tell you for sure that "The Judge Who Hated Red Nail Polish" by Ilona Bray, Richard Stim, and the Editors of Nolo is a trivia-lover's dream. This light-hearted book is filled with "crazy-but-true" stories of law and lawyers, and it made me laugh. Wrap it up with "But They Didn't Read Me My Rights!" by Michael D. Cicchini, JD & Amy B. Kushner, PhD for a great gift for lovers of humor, arcane knowledge, and law. I also liked "The Handy Law Answer Book" by David L. Hudson, Jr., a wonderful book for the curious and anybody who needs clarification on anything legalese.

Everybody needs to count their blessings, especially at a time like this. If your giftee has things like that on his or her mind, then be sure to give "The Book of Awesome" by Neil Pasricha. What simple pleasures do you

love best? What things make you smile? This book will, for sure...

Without a doubt, anybody who's curious – and that includes the squeamish – will love reading "The Curious World of Bugs" by Daniel Marlos, creator of WhatsThatBug.com. 

Your historian is going to enjoy unwrapping "Tradition and the Black Atlantic: Critical Theory in the African Diaspora" by Henry Louis Gates, Jr. This book, part history and part personal anecdote, takes a look at cultural studies from Britain to the U.S. to Africa. Also take a look at "Race and Renaissance: African Americans in Pittsburgh since World War II" by Joe W. Trotter and Jared N. Day. This hard-hitting, hard-history book is filled with stories, graphs, and lots of information, making it the perfect gift for a scholar.

"My Darkest Hour: The Day I Realized I was Abusive" by Harold L. Turley II is one of those books that you're going to hate to give away – but in some cases, you know you'll have to. Here, Turley comes to terms with the abuse that he endured, and he admits that he, himself, was an abuser. There's advice in this book and more motivation to spur readers to get the help they need. This is an amazing memoir, but give it carefully... Also look for "At the Dark End of the Street" by Danielle L. McGuire, a story of "black women, rape, and resistance", starting more than fifty years ago.

The historian on your gift list will definitely love unwrapping "Our Black Fathers: Brave, Bold & Beautiful" by Joslyn Gaines Vanderpool and Anita Royston. This book is filled with stories about and tributes to Black Men, including athletes, writers, men who made a difference, and men who created traditions within countries and within individual homes. Wrap it up with "Dare to Take Charge" by Judge Glenda Hatchett, a book about a woman who makes a difference, and the stories she has to tell, or "Say It Loud!", edited by Catherine Ellis and Stephen Drury Smith. That book is about great speeches on Civil Rights and more, and includes a MP3 CD.







LGBT CINEMA AVAILABLE ON DUD by Glenn Bishop "BEAR CITY"

While planning a recent get-together, post Milwaukee LGBT Film Festival, many amongst Glenn's nearest and dearest laid down the law: no tragic endings. Period. End of discussion!

Well, with so many screeners and yet so little time, what better film to choose than director Doug Langway's upcoming DVD release, BearCity? Focusing on a community of NYC bears and their ardent admirers, BearCity held great promise for many of Glenn's closest acquaintances, a large group in which a tshirt emblazoned with "Real Men Wear Fur" would hardly warrant even a second glance from the most fervent PETA supporter?

How curious to discover that the central character in **BearCity** is neither bear nor cub. Tyler (Joe Conti) is a cute, rather cherubic "bear-curious" twink hiding a great big (not to mention hairy) secret from his sweet, flaming roommate Simon (Alex Di Dio). As is often the case in stories such as this, while his roommate Simon pines unrequitedly away for Tyler, Tyler lurks, under the cover of night, on hot bear porn sites identified merely as "boy4fur21."


After one such online encounter, Tyler ventures out, a virgin visit as it so happens, to the Ramrod, a place where big men go to let their fur down. Tyler is welcomed with open arms (and then some) and can't help looking like the proverbial kid in a candy store. So warm is his welcome in fact, Tyler very quickly finds himself not only a new place to live but a whole new set of friends including Tyler's soon to be new roommates: the bearded and seriously cuddly Fred (Brian Keane) along with Fred's gently acerbic, totally monogamous boyfriend Brent (Stephen Guarino). Taking the role of Mama Bear in this hairy fairy story is Michael (Gregory Gunter), an obese, unemployed and desperate bear blessed with Carlos (James Martinez), a red-hot wildly jealous significant other.

And by the very next morning, Tyler has even gotten a new job as a barista at *The Bear Café*, a bears-only coffee shop where many of the fat and fabulous guys he met at the Ramrod also happen to hang out. Yes, yes, this is all sounding very familiar to Glenn: think Mary Ann's arrival in San Francisco (Tales of the City) or Dorothy landing in Oz (The Wizard of Oz).

Well, Tyler doesn't need a house to fall on him not to realize that he's got a good thing going.

Tyler might not know a Cappuccino from a Frappuccino but he'll manage a-okay at *The Bear Café* as long as he's a smile and snappy comeback at the ready, which thankfully, he does. Then into this furry madness enters Roger (CSI's Gerald McCullouch), less a bear really than a hunky Silver Daddy who is rugged, randy and totally confident. Think Brett Favre wearing his favorite Open-Fly Wrangler jeans. Not so much boyfriend material, Roger seems more the "f*ck 'em and forget 'em" type.


One sight of Roger leaves poor Tyler totally tongue-tied – really a blessing in disguise, thinks Glenn. When Tyler



does managing to regain some semblance of composure, he attempts to bring the gang their round of coffee drinks. Big mistake. A glimpse of Roger's sounding set finds Tyler weak-kneed and suddenly wearing his tray of (fortunately iced) coffee drinks.

Glenn couldn't help but ponder how this virginal studmuffin recognized the dazzling to the eye tool kit as a sounding set?

From here Doug Langway and Lawrence Ferber's screenplay, in turn, fleshes out each couple's story. Unemployed Michael must decide if radical weight-loss surgery will provide him with sufficient self-esteem to get hired, even if the consequences include losing Carlos in the bargain. Even as Fred is tempted by young Tyler, he seeks to persuade a decidedly dubious Brett that their relationship needs some spicing up. The final subplot requires moviegoers to believe that after a few furtive looks and a heated game of bowling, unlikely lovers Roger and Tyler find themselves learning to accept their May-December relationship and shout out that they fallen truly, madly, deeply in love.

BearCity left Glenn's unofficial (to say the least) focus group split right down the middle. A Sex-in-the City for the fabulous furry set, thought some; shamefully evoking the excesses of The Boys in Band, many others countered.

Glenn, as often happens, split down the middle. On one hand, Glenn found it refreshing to learn that just like the rest of the known gay universe; bears can be bitchy, campy and think only of sex. And let's give credit to director Doug Langway's determined (and for the most part successful) attempt to eroticize the bodies of bears. But just as surely it is a step back or two to then have Tyler in turn become the center of so much attention. His arrival at the Ramrod immediately ignites a virtual sexual frenzy; later Fred is on the brink of ravishing the slumbering (passed-out?) twink even as Brent is in the kitchen ordering Chinese. Why don't any of the hot, hairy bears end up with another hot, hairy bear?

But I guess that's why I give him the right number.

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
