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


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#### Letter from the Publisher





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
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#### **GAY SOFTBALL WORLD SERIES TO REMAIN IN MIDWEST**

The Center for AIDS Intervention Research (CAIR) in the Department of Psychiatry and Behavioral Medicine at the Medical College of Wisconsin announces openings for two positions in a new National Institutes of Health-funded research project that will develop, implement, and evaluate the effectiveness of community HIV prevention programs for African American men who have sex with men (MSM). The project's objective is to determine if friend-to-friend HIV prevention approaches that work through natural social networks of African American MSM in the community can reduce sexual risk behavior, sexually transmitted diseases, and HIV infection. Both Research Associate positions require extensive experience, knowledge, and understanding of Milwaukee's African American MSM community including settings, ways, and places where African American MSM at high risk for HIV can be reached. For both positions, relevant community experience and involvement with organizations that serve African American MSM are more essential than prior formal research experience. Positions will require frequent field work on evenings, nights, weekends, and during nontraditional hours.

Research Associates will perform activities related to the identification of community settings in Milwaukee for reaching African American MSM and for carrying out community outreach to recruit, interview, and conduct HIV prevention activities with social networks of Black gay or bisexual men. The Research Associates will also be responsible for outreach-based recruitment of friendship groups of African American MSM in community settings, for interviewing participants, and for seeking to engage friends of already recruited men to also enroll in the research. Strong interpersonal communication skills and comfort in community settings where the target population meet are important position requirements. Relevant community experience may substitute for some educational requirements.

Both positions offer competitive salaries and excellent fringe benefits. In addition to a resume or completed job application, we welcome applicants to provide an accompanying letter that describes any additional formal or informal community experience, volunteer work, or involvement with community organizations that serve the targeted population if those experiences are relevant to these positions.

# LESBIAN, GAY & BISEXUAL TEENS ARE SINGLED OUT FOR PUNISHMENT Study in leading pediatric journal finds unfair treatment nationwide

Lesbian, gay and bisexual (LGB) adolescents are about 40 percent more likely than other teens to receive punishment at the hands of school authorities, police and the courts, according to research published in the January 2011 issue of Pediatrics and already released online at http://pediatrics.aappublications.org/papbyrecent.dtl.

The analysis, conducted at Yale University, found that the disparities in punishments are not explained by differences in misbehavior. Youth who identified themselves as LGB actually engaged in less violence than their peers, for example. Nonetheless, virtually all types of punishments – including school expulsions, arrests, juvenile convictions, adult convictions and especially police stops – were more frequently meted out to LGB youth.

For instance, adolescents who self-identified as LGB were about 50 percent more likely to be stopped by the police than other teenagers. Teens who reported feelings of attraction to members of the same sex, regardless of their self-identification, were more likely than other teens to be expelled from school or convicted of crimes as adults. Girls who labeled themselves as lesbian or bisexual were especially at risk for unequal treatment: they experienced 50 percent more police stops and reported about twice as many arrests and convictions as other girls who had engaged in similar behav-

ior. Although the study did not explore the experiences of transgender youth, anecdotal reports suggest that they are similarly at risk for excessive punishment.

The study is the first to document excessive punishment of LGB youth nationwide. It was based on the National Longitudinal Study of Adolescent Health (Add Health) and included approximately 15,000 middle and high school students who were followed for seven years into early adulthood. Add Health utilized special techniques to ensure participants' privacy: for questions on more sensitive topics, respondents listened to questions through headphones and entered their responses directly onto laptop computers. The study collected details on subjects' sexuality, including feelings of sexual attraction, sexual relationships and selflabeling as LGB. Add Health also surveyed participants regarding how frequently they engaged in a variety of misbehaviors ranging in severity from "lying to parents" to using a weapon.

The study authors hypothesize that the excessive punishments of LGB youth may reflect authorities' reluctance to consider mitigating factors such as young age or self-defense in determining punishment for LGB youth. Moreover, they note that LGB youth frequently encounter homophobia in the education, health

care and child welfare systems, and may therefore fail to receive services offered to other young people.

"The painful, even lethal bullying that LGB youth suffer at the hands of their peers has been highlighted by recent tragic episodes. Our numbers indicate that school officials, police and judges, who should be protecting LGB young people, are instead contributing to their victimization," said Kathryn Himmelstein, the study's lead author. She continued, "LGB teens can't thrive if adults single them out for punishment because of their sexual orientation." Himmelstein, who initiated the study while a Yale undergraduate, currently teaches mathematics at a public high school in New York City.

The research was supervised by Dr. Hannah Brückner, a Yale sociologist and nationally recognized expert on adolescent sexuality. Pediatrics is the world's leading journal of pediatric medicine. As Benjamin Franklin wrote, "In this world nothing can be said to be certain except death and taxes." Had he lived in

Milwaukee, he may have added "and A Christmas Carol at the Rep."

Mercifully, if you've run out of insulin, there's an alternative fix for that inevitable dose of holiday saccharine. In Tandem Theatre stages its own savory version, Scrooge in Rouge: A British Musical Hall Christmas Carol by Ricky Graham and Jefferson Turner with additional material by Jeff Roberson (aka Varla Jean Merman - that amazing drag queen who really sings - even while shooting a can of cheesewiz down her throat) and Yvette Hargis. It's a remount of last season's hit production. And, I've been assured by Chris Flieller, though it's our

local wont, Scrooge in Rouge won't become yet another Milwaukee Yuletide tradition.

It's the turn of the century (not the last turn, the one before). A Royal Music Hall's 23 members put on A Christmas Carol. As fate would have it, 20 of the cast are in the throws of food poisoning. Intrepid troupers that they are, the remaining trio go on with the show.

The inevitable ensues. Cloaking the traditional story of Jacob Marley, Bob Cratchit and Ebenezer Scrooge with its supporting ghostly entourage is a musical of outrageous proportions. A dozen and a half songs, with sprightly piano accompaniment by Alfred (David Bonofiglio) propel the 90 minute show into a spin on roleplaying one mightn't expect. It's a delicious and refreshing cocktail of Oscar Wildean

Directed by Jane Flieller, the Scrooge in Rouge remount includes last years cast:

> Matt Daniels as Lottie and Chris Flieller as Charlie. Marcella Kearns plays Vesta. Of course, they each perform more roles than even they can keep track of. The three create a wit-paced whirlwind with everyone in sync and the audience straining with laughter to keep up. Costume changes are almost instantaneous as characters pop on and off stage. Speaking of costumes, Kathy Smith's smart designs range from fine English wardrobe with natty bonnets and bustles to a living two-man Christmas tree.

Daniels stands out. How could he not? It's not often one sees a six-foot something man in vividly Victorian woman's attire.

If you're familiar with drag diva Varla Jean Merman who originally played the role, you get the idea. But aside from his commanding physical presence, his vocals and demeanor certainly set a bar for any future Lotties, should there ever be any. Flieller's energetic glee as Charlie and the various roles he plays is palpable. Of course, Kearns, whose character plays the incongruous role of Scrooge, among others, rounds out the cast with equal enthusiasm. They've all mastered their Anglo accents from posh to cockney. In all, they deliver a show that will banish the most stalwart bah-humbug - at least for this season.

The 2010 Milwaukee LGBT Film/Video Festival opened back in October with its traditional gala at the Oriental Theatre followed by the ritual reception at Beans & Barley. The opening presentation of The Topp Twins was wonderful although between the heavy New Zealand accents and the theater's rickety sound system; I felt a little left out at times. Could be my hearing, too. It launched the new, abbreviated festival that ran through the weekend. It came and went. If you had anything else to do, as I did, you probably missed some or all of it. I managed to attend three films. However, to compensate, the festival continues as a monthly night at the movies. It makes the festival a yearlong event and at \$5 admission, it's the best ticket in town.

I went to the first of the monthly films on November 4 – a pair of wonderful trans-relevant documentaries. The feature Forever's gonna start Tonight showcased Vicki Marlane, America's oldest professional transgender entertainer. The 1965 short, Queens at Heart, accompanied the feature. I enjoyed them both. Then, the extravagant Orlando, ran on December 2. The next one

Besides, a night out at the lgbt movies is a perfect excuse to tear oneself away from the computer for an evening for some real social-networking. 
The festival put out a survey and asked for suggestions. Here are some of mine...


Now that the festival has been spread out over the year, perhaps we might look back at our lgbt cinematic roots and have a night or two of frivolous undemanding nostalgia. Bring in those films from back in the day when gays were gay and not trying to assimilate, imitate and hallucinate themselves into believing that the grass was greener on the other side - when oppression was just another word for doing it our way.

For example, a double feature with James Whale's 1935 gay parable, The Bride of Frankenstein matched up with Gods and Monsters. A marathon of Divine comedies could be fun, too.

# CHRIS WILLIS TALKS ABOUT HIS PASSION FOR DANCE MUSIC, HIS EVOLUTION AS A GAY MAN, AND HIS CONCERN FOR GAY TEENS

#### BILLBOARD GIVES RAVES TO NEW SINGLE "LOUDER (PUT YOUR HANDS UP)"

The power of his voice can shake the rafters. The power of his performances has moved clubgoers in every way possible—physically, emotionally, spiritually. Of course, we're talking about the awesome power of Chris Willis, the artist, who, as singer, songwriter and producer, is now manifesting love and joy to audiences around the world with his new solo single, the Billboard club smash, "Louder (Put Your Hands Up)." The video for the song, which has held the distinction of being the #1 most viewed video on YouTube in 19 countries, has Willis center stage, soaking up the light and beaming it straight to his fans.

Much has been said of the musical collaborations between Willis and worldrenown producer and DJ David Guetta. Together, the two have created some of the most memorable club hits of the last several years, including "Love is Gone," Love Don't Let Me Go," and their most recent global hit "Gettin' Over You," featuring Willis on vocals along with Fergie and LMFAO. Much has also been said about Willis as an in-demand session singer, songwriter and backing vocalist, who's worked with such talent as Quincy Jones, Kelly Clarkson, Ricky Martin, Kelly Rowland, Dusty Springfield, Dolly Parton, and Brooks & Dunn.

But now, on the cusp of a larger, muchdeserved notoriety—and on the eve of the release of his new solo album—it is time for Willis to tell us more about himself in his own words. Here, the singer talks about his exciting musical journey as a solo artist, his devotion to the art form known as dance music, and the impact of his sexuality on his personal and professional life. Q: You're putting out your own album after being part of other people's recordings for many years. How do you lit's another stream a ning of the many years.

A: Well, I've put out

It's another one of my dreams to reach a mainstream audience, and I feel like this is the beginning of that dream.

# Q: How much creative input did you have in the making of the album?

A: Basically, I've was involved in all of the writing, which I had already been doing with David [Guetta] for many years. I wrote all the lyrics and the melodies. Most of the other work I've done was part of collaboration with other artists, mostly for their projects. It's really about me this time. It's a chance to put a really cohesive theme together. I've been living with a lot of these tracks that I've collected over the years during the process

of working with various DJs around the world. Some of the songs were written just for fun. Some were written off the top of my head, as a way to express the feelings I was having right at that moment. There are songs from both the past and the present.

# Q: What inspirations do you draw from in your songwriting?

A: The thing that inspires me most is love—having love, losing love, dreaming of love, praying for love. Another one of my muses is the dance floor. I always like to imagine what it would be like if I was on the dance floor, and I saw someone that I liked. I'd start out feeling afraid and insecure—what would I say to them? Then all of the sudden, with

the help of the music, I'd develop this confidence in myself, and I'd know what to say. Or what if I was in a relationship that was on the verge of ending—what would I say to save it? I like expressing these kinds of feelings when I'm onstage because I

know there are people on the dance floor who feel the same way.

# Q: Has being out front and on your own as a solo artist brought a whole new set of pressures to your career?

A: There is definitely an intimidation factor, but I've had a lot of successes and failures in my career, so I draw on all of that to help me. I've been in the business many years, and there are always pressures and deadlines. I'm kind of accustomed to that kind of stress, having had to pull it together to perform after flying 8 hours over the water. I like that pressure—it's my job, it's my lifestyle. But I'm not doing this in a bubble either—I've got an incredible team behind me.

# Q: How was it working with Fergie and David Guetta on the "Gettin' Over You" video?

A: The thing about videos is they are one of the most grueling elements of working in the business. And Fergie and David made it seem so effortless. I realized in that situation, I was the rookie. But I was just glad to have some face time alongside them and get a chance to watch them do what they do. I really learned a lot from being there.

### Q: What's it like for you to perform live in front of club audiences all over the world?

**A:** I really love performing. I call myself a show off. I love being onstage, love being in the light, love having all of those eyes on me. I feed a lot on the audience. They give me energy, which makes me want to give more. Each song is an opportunity to give from my soul. To have the opportunity to do that all over the world gives me a feeling I can't really put into words.

## Q: Do you have a favorite city that you like to perform in?

**A**: I really love everywhere I get to play. But Russia and Brazil are probably my favorite places to go. The Russians and the Brazilians really respond to my music. I feel like Michael Jackson when I go to those countries.

### Q: How does your sexuality as a gay man impact your music, if at all?

A: It's definitely a part of my personality that's very real. But it's not something I focus on. I

don't think it has as big an effect on me as it did when I was younger. In the past, I focused on it so much that I felt I could be crippled by it. I spent most of those years doing what I could to disarm the fears, doubts, and self-hatred that can come with being gay. I had to come to terms with myself so when I step out on stage, I can be honest, open, compassionate, and vulnerable. I don't focus on it so much now. I focus on the band, on the enthusiasm of the audience, on just trying to make it a great night. For the people that come to see me, it doesn't matter what my sexuality is. It's all about the party.



Q: For many years, to be a dance artist was to sing in a kind of pop ghetto. But now, dance music is providing the basis for many of the biggest hits on the charts. With that in mind, would you call yourself a dance artist or a pop artist?

A: I'm of the persuasion that dance music and pop music are the same things. I started out as a gospel artist, and that was what I was most passionate about at the time. In many ways, I was singing gospel as a way to release fear. I felt if I wasn't singing gospel, I was going to hell—literally. But I had all this other music in my soul, and I thought it would be shame not to pay homage to all the other kinds of music that I loved. I like pop,

country, soul, rock. But then dance music came out of nowhere. I found dance, and it found me. It was a window of opportunity that I leaped through. Dance music has allowed me to be so many things. I intend to explore this art form as long as there's a taste for it. I love it.

# Q: Being a solo artist means you are styling yourself in a certain way. You don't have to compromise to someone else's view of what you should look like or dress like. Is that fun?

**A:** I love fashioning my own image. One of my original ambitions was to be a fashion designer

because I absolutely love fashion. I really keep up with what's going on and always have my face buried in the latest fashion magazine. Being my own artist and creating my own brand has given me the chance to focus on fashion even more. When I was doing gospel, that was harder to do. In gospel music, the image that you're creating is one that reflects Christ. With the music I'm doing now, I get to be different characters, tell stories, and create all kinds of fantasies with both my music and my image. Mainstream music has given me the permission to really push the envelope and be who I am.

# Q: Your struggle to be who you are makes me think about all of the gay kids who are trying to transcend the bullying that's going on right now so they too can be who they are without fear of violence or persecution.

A: I'm very passionate about the struggle to put an end to the bullying of gay teens and have sent out many messages on Twitter and Facebook in support of these kids. All of this bullying makes me think of a Dr. Seuss quote that's had particular resonance for me over the years:

"Be who you are and say what you feel because those who mind don't matter and those who matter don't mind."

They say you'll never work a day If that's the case, then Tracy Young hasn't worked in 20 years. What the electronic music dynamo has done over the last two decades is taken her irresistible passion for dance music from the underground to the mainstream, going from clubland cause célèbre to mainstream celebrity in the process.

It's been a long, winding road to the top for the spunky Young, who launched her career in 1991 as hiphop radio DJ. "I love all kinds of music," the Washington, D.C.-born spinstress states. "Growing up in a divorced household, I always took comfort in it."

At the time, Young had no idea of the heights to which she would rise. "If you told me 10 years later I'd be DJ-ing Madonna's wedding, I'd say you were crazy!" she laughs. But even from its earliest stages, Young's musical prowess made people take notice, and it wasn't long before she translated her work at Interscope Records to a thriving career in the DJ booth that allowed her to bring her oneof-a-kind funk, hip-hop and oldschool blend of beats to the masses on eastern corridor airwaves and cable television.

But soon the sun-drenched shores of Miami came calling, and with her move came a shift in sound that saw Young injecting her hip-hop roots with the house music thump that emanated from the steamy, celebrity-filled nightclubs that comprised the South Beach scene.

Miami was where Young carved a niche for herself, both as a female in the traditionally male-dominated stomping grounds of the DJ booth, and as a darling of the thriving gay circuit party scene. But it wasn't just the gay community that was drawn by Young's magnetic musical pull; celebrities from Cher

to Sean Combs fell under her spell, inviting the disc jockess to spin their exclusive private parties to exclusive A-List invitees. Once Madonna coroneted her as her go-to DJ in 2000, Young became a global electronic music celebrity in demand at nightclubs around the world and a breakout name on the Billboard charts racking up over 40 #1 Club Play hits with remixes for Christina Aguilera, Shakira, and Enrique Iglesias. 13 of the #1s were Madonna tracks including "Music" and "Hung Up". Living Theater, Young's 2003 release of unique while showing that Young's talent in the studio went beyond last-call of nightclub dance floors.

"I like doing different types of events and music," Young says. "Fashion, television, radio-and, of course, clubs. I never limit myself to just one type of party; I like doing different types of events. It keeps my career fresh." Through it all, Young has always been humble, focusing on her career and the ever-growing roster of releases on her Ferosh record label rather than her own burgeoning celebrity. So when the mainstream media took notice of Young's working relationship with Real Housewives of Atlanta star Kim Zolciak and insinuated it wasn't limited to the confines of the recording studio, Young found herself in an unexpected spotlight, bandied about in gossip magazines and even during the morning coffee klatch of The View.

"Music has always been the foundation of my work," she say with a shrug to the drama. "I'm really proud of the work I did on Kim's single 'Tardy for the Party,' and I wish her well in the future."

The housewife's life isn't for Young—it never has been.

With a book in the works about

her 20 year-career in the DJ booth, a Mad Men-style makeover by famed Hollywood photographer to the stars Mike Ruiz and longstanding working relationships with Macy Gray, Maya, and the Kardashians, Young is now a celebrity in her own right. "I will always be a music person," she states. "But there are so many mediums for me to express myself, and I want to take advantage of them all."

Tardy for the party? Not Tracy Young. She's been the party for the past 20 years—and she's just getting started.




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# DON'T BE SCROOGE! HELP CREAM CITY FOUNDATION REACH THEIR GOALS

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# bookworm sez

#### "Unbearable Lightness: A Story of Loss and Gain"

by Portia de Rossi c.2010, Atria Books \$25.99 / \$29.99 Canada 308 pages

There's a fine line between "want" and "need". You didn't need another cookie, chocolate-dipped goodie, or brownie hiding beneath powdered sugar. You didn't

need that creamy glass with holiday garnish. And definitely, you didn't need the calories. But oh, you wanted them. So imagine denying yourself those and almost all other foods. Imagine living on 300 calories a day, then read "Unbearable Lightness" by Portia de Rossi.

Young Amanda Rogers always wanted to be "special". She was a smart kid and aspired to become a lawyer in her native Australia, until the modeling bug bit her and she quickly decided that the runway was the way to run.

She convinced her mother to drive her to an interview, and she convinced executives that, at age 12, she could handle the world of high fashion. Though she felt uncomfortable and self-conscious about perceived body flaws as compared with other models, she persevered. She changed her name to Portia de Rossi and worked part-time while attending school.

Later, when given the chance to be in a movie, de Rossi was surprised that she loved acting but wasn't confident about her beauty. She thought her face was too round, her cheeks too fat, her thighs too chubby. Her weight yo-yoed. Wardrobe tailors on the *Ally McBeal* set were kept busy with alterations.

De Rossi was mortified. But that wasn't her only source of personal loathing. Portia de Rossi had always known that she was gay, but it wasn't discussed. She married, but the union ended when he learned the truth at couple's therapy. Co-workers weren't told because de Rossi feared for her job. She denied her feelings and lived in terror of being outed.

Embarking on a nutritionist-recommended lowcalorie diet didn't quell the diet demon in de Rossi's mind, so she went on a program all her own. She meticulously weighed each ounce of food, fretted over "hidden calories", and obsessively avoided anything that might add one single calorie to her daily intake.

Of the day she hit 82 pounds, she said that celebration was in order but, "...first I had to silence the drill sergeant that reminded me of that extra inch of fat. First I had to get rid of that."

As with many memoirs like "Unbearable Lightness", I had two very dissimilar feelings while reading it.

First, this book reeks with pain. Author Portia de




Rossi is very clear about the bruising thoughts and negativity that she felt in hiding so many personal aspects of her life, and though this book has a make-you-grin, wonderfully happy ending, getting there hurts. Which leads me to the second issue...

This book hurts to read not just because of the pain de Rossi relays, but because it can be slow. In the end, de Rossi's pantry

held a paltry handful of items, for instance, and that fact was hammered home in many ways, many times.

Still, if you've ever lived too long with a secret that ate you alive, read this. You won't just want "Unbearable Lightness", you need it.

#### 8. "Christmas in Connecticut"



#### 3. "The Judy Garland Holiday Special"





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
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
