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QUEST TALKS WITH MAGGI CAGE

An Interview with the Executive Director for the Milwaukee LGBT Center, Dr. Maggi Cage

The term LGBT community center (or pride center) refers to both buildings which host services for non-heterosexual youth, seniors, adult men and women, and trans individuals, as well as the organizations which own and maintain such buildings on a non-profit, non-political basis. At least that's how it is described on Wikipedia.

From humble beginnings in 1998, Milwaukee's LGBT Center has been in several locations over it's short life and has the purpose of providing culturally sensitive and competent educational, social, and health and wellness services that meet the needs of LGBT youth, adults and their allies. Milwaukee's LGBT Community Center is a 501(c)(3) nonprofit organization.

Recently they moved into a new location in Downtown Milwaukee. Quest and Dr. Cage thought it was about time we got together and discussed what all the excitement is about.


Mark: Congratulations on your move to the Blatz Building downtown Milwaukee. I have read about this move and even enjoyed a Dear Ruthie "youtube" video promoting it and today it is a reality. What do you feel is the most exciting opportunity the new diggs provide people who use the center.

Maggi: While the new Center is located in a 104 year old building, it is very modern space. I have given many tours of the building and everyone has the same response "Wow!". The Center is 22,000 square feet over four floors, right in the center of downtown. I like the fact that metaphorically, the LGBT community has arrived at the center of the community. The new space features a large community room (1500 square feet) with an

adjacent kitchen, which can be used for meetings, concerts, art exhibits, and one day for same sex wedding ceremonies. Every floor has bathrooms and a kitchen, and the building is accessible by elevator to all four floors. Our Cyber Center, located on the first floor, has expanded and features all new computers, a scanDr. Cage at the White House **Sheldon Walker**

tions, an area for art projects, couches and large screen TV, library, and an office for Project Q staff

ner and new printer. Project Q, our youth program, has expanded from 525 square feet to over 2,000 square feet and houses four computer sta-



Mark: The center offers not only space to organizations, but also many programs for the community. I am told there is a new grant from the Johnson Family foundation to help establish a mental health clinic at the center. Can you give us more information about that?

Maggi: The Johnson Family Foundation makes grants available for LGBT Mental Health Clinics across the country. Each recipient must be a member of CenterLink, our national association of LGBT Community Centers, and the grant provides funding for development and technical assistance over a three year period. We are one of six community centers to receive the grant and we are very excited about the clinic. We are partnering with Jewish Family Services to establish the clinic because JFS has an excellent mental health program and a commitment to LGBT mental health services. We anticipate our first services will be support groups. When the Counseling Center of Milwaukee was operating, many LGBT related support groups were provided. We want to

> bring back those support groups and the facilitators. Currently, we are developing a timeline for expanding mental health services over the next year and we estimate taking therapy appointments by spring. This project is also supported by a New York based Lead Trust and we are exploring local funding to support the project.





Mark: Please tell us about your recent holiday reception at the White House. Did you make any new important contacts at the gala?

Maggi: I was invited to a Holiday Party at the White House on December 15, 2010. I took Sheldon Walker, Board Co-Chair, with me. The event was held in the East Wing of the White House, which was beautifully decorated. The reception was to honor community leaders from around the country. Needless to say the food was spectacular and I could see the influence of the First Lady. Selections included fresh carrots and hummus, and many other healthy choices. The most important contact I made was with a woman who works at the Boston Science Museum. She is working with a science museum in London to develop information about LGBT scientists that can be included in their museums. When I was working at the Medical College of Wisconsin I was the Director of the Center for Science Education, a program for elementary and high school students, so this contact was exciting and I plan to follow up with a trip to Boston in the spring or summer.

Mark: I read in the official newsletter for the Milwaukee LGBT Center you have been elected treasurer for Centerlink which I understand to be an organization made up of people representing other LGBT centers around the country with a goal of helping LGBT centers nationwide stay strong and grow. During your four years working on Centerlink's board you have a unique insight into the working of many other centers around the country. How do you think Milwaukee LGBT Center compares with centers in larger cities such as nearby Chicago or New York?

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Personal Effectiveness Plus! www.gainingtime.com 414-460-3253 Maggi: The Milwaukee LGBT Community Center is considered one of the leaders in the LGBT Community Center movement. We are hosting the 2011 CenterLink Executive Directors Summit here in Milwaukee, which brings Executive Directors and their Board Members together each year. I have served on the CenterLink Board of Directors for 4 years providing leadership on the Finance Committee, Strategic Planning Committee, and 2010 Executive Director Summit planning. The large Centers like New York and LA are in a class of their own, however I think the Milwaukee Center is on par with Chicago, Portland, Philadelphia and others.

Mark: I have a long personal history with the gay community as a former bar owner. From my perspective it seems there are two worlds out there in the LGBT community. One is focused on going out having fun, drinking, etc, another is more political, educational and social, but outside the gay bar scene. Sadly there seems to be very little each has to do with the other. How do you think the center can reach out to this part of the community, and conversely how can bar owners and their customers engage with the center more in the future?

Maggi: The Milwaukee LGBT Community Center has reached out to area bar owners and patrons regarding our quit smoking project. We have offered help to bar owners who are interested in helping patrons to quit, now that Wisconsin is a smoke free state. We have volunteer health promoters who have gone to the bars and conducted outreach activities. On an annual basis, Stephanie Hume and I bring together bar owners and area police to discuss concerns and to strategize how owners and the police can best work together. Generally, we have convened this group just before PrideFest each year. The feedback I have received from area bar owners has been positive, and we will continue to convene this group. I like your question about how can the Center and bar owners engage more effectively. Perhaps area owners will contact me with their ideas, which I am open to hearing.

Mark: any parting thoughts for our Quest readers?

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LOCAL DOCUMENTARY ILLUMINATES ISSUES FOR MILWAUKEE'S GAY YOUTH

Milwaukee - In effort to increase awareness and resources on behalf of Lesbian, Gay, Bisexual, Transgender and Queer (LGBTQ) homeless youth, Tess Gallun of Reel Life Films is releasing Out of Respect: A Story of Five. The feature-length documentary follows five homeless LGBTQ young adults in their search for jobs, shelter and support on the streets of Milwaukee. First person video diaries and emotional setbacks reveal the courage and humor it takes to overcome abandonment by family, the system and society. The premiere will take place at 6 p.m., Feb. 24, 2011 in the Lubar Auditorium at the Milwaukee Art Museum. Coast restaurant will host a VIP reception at 4:30 p.m. prior to the screening.

Out of Respect provides an intimate, first person perspective to the "State of Youth Homeless-

ness" study, released by Cream City Foundation in 2010. The report revealed that displaced LGBTQ youth have less housing options, and are more susceptible to substance abuse, mental illness, and sexual exploitation. Gallun recognized an urgency to bring these stories to the screen after spending a year watching five such individuals struggle to survive. She explains, "The statistics illustrate sexual discrimination at home, in schools and the child welfare system jeopardizes the chances for LGBTQ young people to lead productive lives. If society continues to remain unaware or silent, hatred and fear will destroy one of our most precious resources the next generation."

TRANSGENDER TRIAL JUDGE MAKES HISTORY

On January 4, 2011, moments before making history at a special en banc session of the Superior Court of California by taking an oath of office to be the first openly transgender trial judge in the country, Victoria Kolakowski (who underwent gender reassignment surgery in 1991) spoke exclusively with dot429 in her dressing room at the Oakland Asian Cultural Center. Kolakowski expressed her excitement and humility: "It's been very hard as a transgender person. We're a community that's chronically under- and unemployed and I've encountered that sort of discrimination in the past, but we're making so much more progress now. In terms of my career, I think part of it is hard work and perseverance, and part of it is good luck."

Kolakowski's parents and wife Cynthia Laird were her primary guests of honor at the ceremony. California State Senator Ellen Corbett introduced Victoria as "a friend, a colleague, a trailblazer," commenting on the social impact of her enrobe-



ment, "as we celebrate this new decade we mark our own start and our own first....We all know the tremendous hurdles that [Victoria] and the transgender community have overcome."

Equality California's Geoff Kors' remarks com-

pared Kolakowski's running and winning to Harvey Milk's 1977 victory when he ran for the Board of Supervisors in San Francisco. "It's that shattering of the glass ceiling...I think about Harvey Milk and the things he really stood for—those are qualities that are so evident in Vickv."

While Kolakowski's primary purpose is to serve the County of Alameda as a trial judge, she made a point to acknowledge the history she is creating and even expressed that tonight served as her version of "It Gets Better." Underneath her newly acquired judge's robe, Kolakowski wore a butterfly pin that was given to her by Sylvia Guerrero, mother of transgender teen Gwen Araujo murdered in Alameda County eight years ago.

On November 2, Kolakowski beat out prosecutor John Creighton 51 to 48, making her the first openly transgender trial judge in the United States. "I ran a campaign based on my qualifications and experience. The people elected me. It's an extraordinary moment for the transgender and LGBT community."

MIDWEST LAGS BEHIND REST OF THE COUNTRY IN GAY GRANT DOLLARS

Milwaukee - In the past 5 years, the Midwest has been the least funded of the four regions in the United States for Lesbian, Gay, Bisexual, and Transgender (LGBT) work. According to a report issued by Funders for LGBTQ Issues, in 2009 alone the Midwest received only 9% of available LGBT foundation dollars for the United States.

"Unfortunately, it takes money to create a respectful community," said Maria Cadenas, executive director of Cream City Foundation. "With the majority of LGBT grant dollars going to national organizations and to the coasts, our local and regional efforts to fund equality are more important than ever before."

Nine out of the top ten LGBTQ Grantmakers, are all east- or west-coast based, with Denver being the one exception. In fact, 67% of all U.S. grant dollars went to the West and Northeast Regions, with another 24% going to the South.

"Our local efforts are the bedrock of a movement," said Cadenas."Not only is the Midwest underfunded, but the economy has also deeply impact the overall philanthropic sector. Investing in LGBT work has never been so important."

"It is local work and leaders that change the hearts and minds of our neighbors, expand the definition of family, and create the workplaces and neighborhoods we all want," said Stacey Herzing, president of the Board of Cream City Foundation. "What Cream City Foundation does is promote, encourage, and provide philanthropy that leverages money already on the table to ensure it has its greatest impact."

Cream City Foundation is the country's second oldest LGBT community foundation and the largest in Wisconsin. In 2009, CCF granted \$150,000 dollars with 27 grants. Among the organizations receiving funding were Pathfinders Q-Blok program, the LGBT Film/Video Festival at the University of Wisconsin-Milwaukee, the LGBT Center of Southeastern Wisconsin, and PrideFest.

Vagina Monologues @ MGAC

The Milwaukee Gay Arts Center continues its tradition of presenting Eve Ensler's *The Vagina Monologues* with a new 2011 production. It opens Friday, February 11 at 7:30pm. Additional performances take place Saturday, February 12 at 7:30pm and on Sunday, February 13 at 2pm.

First performed in 1998 Off Broadway, *The Vagina Monologues* has become an international clarion for women's empowerment. It has also become a vehicle to raise funds for the cause of anti-violence – specifically to create awareness and to fight violence against women. The project has raised over \$75 million through local performances throughout the world.

The Milwaukee Gay Arts Center's annual production of Ensler's work first took place in spring 2008. It has all the makings of an annual tradition for this non-profit arts organization. Now preparing its third production, MGAC strives to make the presentation fresh with each new staging. Traditionally, *Vagina Monologues* is a simple rendering of the series of monologues read or recited by cast members. MGAC's versions have relied more on acting than readings as a means to engage the audience. Each year, a new concept evolves that reflects the nuances brought to it by the current cast.

This year's production also features a new director, Casey Harding. Harding is a Marquette University theatre arts graduate. Her directing background includes work with Renaissance Theatreworks where she participated in a young directors program. She is currently an education assistant with the Florentine Opera.

This year's cast consists of twelve performers. Its diversity spans an age range from 19 to 50. There's a broad spectrum of ethnicities including African-American, Asian and South Asian, Caucasian and Hispanic. Cast members' sexual identity is equally mixed. "Whether lesbian, straight or transgender, or Pakistani, American or of any hue, each individual actor puts a universal reality into each monologue. At the same time, the reality is very personal. This staging creates an ensemble feel that delivers Ensler's message in an accessible way. The cast represents a community that addresses the issue through mutual support, much like a family," Harding said.

Logically enough, the monologues all focus on the vagina. They traverse the touchy terrain from the sublimely funny "The Woman Who Loved to Make Vaginas Happy" to the seditious "Reclaiming Cunt." For the most part they delve into the subject with a certain sense of humor. But they also confront and despite the awkwardness of true confessions, *The Vagina Monologues* take the audience out of the silent confines of otherwise rarely spoken truths.

Performances take place Friday and Saturday, February 11 and 12 at 7:30 pm. A Sunday matinee

is scheduled on February 13 at 2pm. An opening night party takes place at Walker's Pint following the performance. It will include refreshments and fund raising raffle.

Tickets are \$15 general admission and \$10 for seniors and students. Funds raised will benefit the International V-Day Campaign and Milwaukee's Sojourner Family Peace Center. ages. Shipe casts herself and her friends from the Milwaukee theatre scene in the roles of such characters as the Mad Hatter and Cinderella. Heideman's




photography masters a surreal storybook effect with an almost 3-D depth, a touch of erotic sensuality, and a mischievous glow to the work.

FIRST US GLBT HISTORY MUSEUM OPENS IN SAN FRANCISCO

Internationally renowned as a center for lesbian, gay, bisexual and transgender culture, San Francisco soon will welcome yet another groundbreaking queer institution: The GLBT History Museum. A project of the GLBT Historical Society, an archives and research center established in 1985, the new museum will be the first of its kind in the United States—and only the second in the world. The grand opening is set for the evening of Jan. 13, 2011.

"The GLBT History Museum is in the heart of the Castro, a neighborhood visited not only by locals, but also by tens of thousands of tourists every year who come in search of queer culture," said Paul Boneberg, executive director of the Historical Society. "At our museum, they'll discover treasures from our archives that reflect fascinating stories spanning nearly a century of GLBT life. We have gone all out to create a museum as rich, diverse and surprising as the GLBT community itself."

Located at 4127 18th St., just a few doors from Castro Street, the space includes two galleries, a reception area and a museum store. With assistance from Bevan Dufty, who was then the member of the San Francisco Board of Supervisors for the district, the Historical Society negotiated an agreement under which the master tenant for the storefront, Walgreen Company, constructed the 1,600-square-foot space to the society's specifications. Funding from Levi's, the City of San Francisco, Castro district merchants, and numerous other sponsors and donors covered the cost of custom fixtures and display cases, lighting and multimedia installations.

According to, Scott Wiener, the newly elected supervisor for the district once represented by Harvey Milk, "The opening of the GLBT History Museum marks a milestone for the Castro, for the city of San Francisco and for the country as a whole. This innovative new institution will bring the history of LGBT people alive in the very neighborhood where so much of that history has happened.... I'm

proud to welcome this vital addition to the neighborhood and look forward to helping ensure its ongoing success."

The museum will offer two debut exhibitions. In the smaller front gallery, "Great Collections of the GLBT Historical Society Archives" provides an overview of the range and depth of collections the society has gathered during its 25-year history. The sections focus on periodicals, ephemera, photographs, tex-



tiles, film and video, oral histories and other types of material in the collection, with each represented by a few examples. The show gives visitors a snapshot of how the archives work, why they're important for GLBT people and what's distinctive about the Historical Society. Exhibitions in this gallery will change approximately once a quarter.

In the main gallery, "Our Vast Queer Past: Celebrating GLBT History" traces nearly a century of San Francisco GLBT life through more than 20 key themes. The show brings together some 450 objects, photographs and documents, along with historic film and video shown on vintage televisions sets and a large overhead screen. All of the materials come from the collections of the Historical Society—and most have never before been displayed publicly.

I served as one of the lead curators for the exhibition, along with Don Romesburg, who is an assistant professor of women's and gender studies at Sonoma State University, Sonoma, Calif., and Amy Sueyoshi,

an associate professor of race and resistance studies and sexuality studies at San Francisco State University. Seven associate curators provided crucial assistance in researching the themes and identifying the objects we included in the show.

As we note in the introduction posted at the gallery entrance, we set out to honor the GLBT Historical Society's 25th anniversary by burrowing "into every corner of the society's extraordinary archives. To spark the topics for the show, we picked an inspirational object from virtually every year the society has been acquiring collections. Our objectives: raising new questions about familiar gay, lesbian, bisexual and transgender stories and evoking largely untold stories that speak eloquently about our diversity."

Curator Amy Sueyoshi adds that visitors to the exhibition "will witness how the most private parts of our lives can create public change. Items preserved and collected from the GLBT community tell a vibrant story of struggle, strength and self-determination in our new museum. 'Our Vast Queer Past' inspires hope for a world free of judgment and persecution for all." The show will remain on display through 2011.

The GLBT History Museum joins the Schwules Museum, the queer museum founded 25 years ago in Berlin, as one of only two stand-alone, full-scale museums devoted to lesbian, gay, bisexual and transgender history. A number of other LGBT archives and libraries also offer periodic exhibitions in the same location as their research collections or in space borrowed from other organizations.

The grand opening of the GLBT History Museum on Jan. 13, 2011, will include a preview for sponsors, donors and special guests, followed by a ribbon-cutting and free reception open to the public from 7:00 p.m. to 9:00 p.m. Regular hours for the museum will be Wednesday through Saturday, 11:00 a.m. to 7:00 p.m., and Sundays, noon to 5:00 p.m. Admission: \$5.00; free for members.

Buns, Babes and Balls...Milwaukee Gay Sports Network launches February 4

Milwaukee's LGBT community boasts a full range of athletic leagues, clubs and groups. Some, like the Saturday Softball League (SSBL) have been around for decades. Others, like the Milwaukee Gay Volleyball Association and the Brew City Strikers bowling league, are brand new. What they all have in common is a desire to get out and have fun playing a sport. What they didn't have was a centralized umbrella organization to promote LGBT sports and inform the greater community about their athletic options. Now they do.

The city's new organization, The Milwaukee Gay Sports Network (MGSN), provides a platform to share information, coordinate resources and impact the development of LGBT athletics. It will celebrate its official launch with a sports expo at Woody's on February 4 from 7-9pm.

Conceived by Eric Euting, president of the Milwaukee Volley Ball Association, MGSN's formation came as a result of a conversation. Having established the volleyball league, Euting encountered the problems of any start-up organization. These ranged from outreach to finding funds. Euting approached Cream City Foundation's executive director Maria Cadenas.

In the discussion that followed, it became clear that it would be easier to get funding for an organization representing Milwaukee sports than

for an individual team or league. The idea was to develop an organization to cross promote athletics, support existing groups and jump start new ones. The combined effort would reduce



admistrative costs and offer experienced help to to assist sponsoring and equipping fledgling groups, especially to those not able to access resources.

"We wanted to fill a void in the LGBT community. There was no means to communicate between the various sports organizations or share information. Anyone interested in forming a league, finding a team to join or even to figure out if a team existed for a particular sport was basically left to his own devices," Euting said.

On Cadenas' advice, Euting approached representatives of local LGBT sports groups. They immediately embraced the idea and met to sort out the details. SSBL's Brian Reinkober Peter Nys along with Jason Adams, Eric Van Egeren, Maurice Perry and Jerry Gratz from

other sports associations and GAMMA formed the Milwaukee Gay Sports Network as a coalition of the LGBT oriented sports leagues in the Milwaukee area. Meanwhile, Cream City Foundation established a special fund to support local LGBT sports.

Currently, MGSN represents bowling, darts, running, soccer, softball, tennis and volleyball. A basketball, kick ball and swimming club (in the manner of Atlanta's Rainbow Trouts) may be in the offing as well. Meanwhile, MGSN founders designed a logo, developed a dedicated website www.milwaukeegaysportsnetwork.org and a facebook presence. Interested individuals and organizations should sign up on both for updates.

The website allows people to register and indicate their interest areas. In the future, the website will provide game and event schedules, contact information and updates on the participating teams and associations. It will provide a true sports community center.

The MGSN official, *Buns*, *Babes and Balls – Come meet your Milwaukee Gay Sports Network!* kick-off expo takes place February 4 at Woody's, 1579 South 2nd Street from 7-9pm. The launch comes at a timely moment. Milwaukee's LGBT community needs a viable center for healthy social interaction. The event scheduled at Woody's offers a sports expo for interested individuals and groups to learn about the Milwaukee varied athletic opportunities. Players, their fans, friends and families are invited and encouraged to attend.

Site Includes Largest Global Directory of Gay-Centric Places & Events

New York - There is no shrtage of social netorking on the web. But what if you could combine Facebook, TripAdvisor, Yelp, Eventful and Foursquare then tailor it to the gay community? What do you get? Fab.com, a new social network designed to help gay men discover people, places and activities wherever they live

or travel anywhere on the globe.

Launched as Fabulis.com seven months ago, the renamed and newly expanded Fab.com:

- Now has more than 110,000 members with 40% logging in at least 10 times per month, 25% visiting more than 50 times per month, and upwards of 5,000 new users joining on a weekly basis.
- Just introduced the largest worldwide directory of gay-friendly places with accompanying rankings, reviews, tips and photo uploads, complementing the site's interactive profiles and extensive database of gayrelevant events.
- Offers a full-featured iPhone app including the ability to check in, identify your current location, name the people you're with, upload images, rate places, provide tips, and perform all other functions available.
- Just closed the first \$1.75 million Series A financing with investors including First Round Capital,

The Washington Post Company, Baroda Ventures, and Zelkova Ventures.

"Before Fab.com, people thought of gay social networks as dating sites. Fab has a completely different mission," said founder and CEO Jason Goldberg. "We help gay men meet new

friends anywhere in the world, find places to go and things to do that suit gay tastes, share their experiences through reviews and rankings, and in general expand their social circle in a way that fits the gay social graph."

Goldberg, a serial entrepreneur who previously founded the social news site Socialmedian that was sold to XING AG in 2009 as well as the employment website Jobster, was inspired to create Fab after encountering difficulty in finding gay-centric online recommendations while working in Europe. He set out to fill the void with a new platform that would serve as a central clearinghouse of gay-oriented activities and destinations as well as providing a safe forum for gay conversation removed from Facebook communications with family and co-workers.

In a unique approach to promoting member interaction, Fab builds user profiles by adding content based on the member's check-ins and answers to questions posed by other users – whether they know each other or not. The site currently handles more than 15,000

user-answers to questions every day, essentially hosting dozens of freeform conversations that help "Fabbits" get to know each other as well as exchange advice on navigating the gay environment.

Users can check in directly on Fab or import their Facebook check-ins, search for gay-oriented events by city and date, filter those searches by Fab followers if desired, and view lists of top-ranked Fab people, cities and tags (e.g. writer, activist, gamer, foodie, musician, blogger, etc.) to quickly zero in on people with common interests.

With the new Fab Places feature, members can also browse a database of more than 50,000 gay-rated locations in categories ranging from travel, food, nightlife and bed and breakfasts to arts, shopping, buildings and outdoors – complete with comments that meet gay needs in a way that reviews like those on TripAdvisor and Yelp cannot.

"If you're going to Boston next week and you post that on your Facebook wall, it's not going to help you when you get there. With Fab, you can find out what events are going on in Boston, who's going to be there, arrange to meet, and research gay-friendly hotels and restaurants – all in one place," said Bradford Shellhammer, co-founder and chief creative officer. "Facebook still helps you communicate with your current friends, but Fab gives you a whole new channel for expanding your horizons and connecting with the gay community wherever you go."

What could be more fab than that?



'Shake, Rattle & 'Role/Play

Filmmakers are notorious for using movies as vehicles to comment on current affairs.

Writer-director Rob Williams, whose latest movie "Role/Play" releases on DVD Feb. 8, is no exception.

In a recent interview, Williams – along with the film's lead actors, Matthew Montgomery and Steve Callahan – talks about the importance of openly gay actors playing gay roles; why gay media needs to get off its high horse; the underrated Jim J. Bullock, who has a cameo in the film; our society's addiction to desperate fame seeking; and why gratuitous nudity on set made for a seriously sexy shoot. —Score!

MIKEY ROX: Why did you choose to cast Steve and Matthew? I've seen Steve in at least one of your other films – "Make the Yuletide Gay," which I love by the way! – so I know there's some history there, but more specifically, why choose leads who are a couple in real life?

ROB WILLIAMS: I have wanted to work more with Steve Callahan for years – he's a terrific actor and a great person. When I started writing "Role/Play," he seemed like the perfect choice to play a soap opera actor, so there was no question that I wanted him for the role. As the script progressed, it seemed natural to have Matthew play the other lead. Not only have I worked with Matthew before and know his talents, I knew that casting Matthew and Steve together would be fantastic, and I knew that they


would work well together. While it's not always the case with real-life couples playing opposite each other, Matthew and Steve really have great chemistry on-screen, and their comfort level with each other let us make the intimate scenes in the movie feel very real.

MATTHEW MONTGOMERY: Rob just cast me cause he wanted to see me naked. Again.

MR: Is it important for you to cast openly gay actors? You have a pretty good track record for doing so.

MM: It's because Rob is heterophobic.

RW: I always try to find the best actor for each part, but I think that casting openly gay actors helps bring a level of authenticity to the roles that you don't always get with straight actors, so that's a huge benefit for the film. And I



do think it's important for those of us in the film-making community to support actors who are out and living their lives openly and honestly. It's similar to what one of the characters says in the movie – it's important for us to support our own, because no one else will.

MR: In the movie, there are a few thinly veiled digs at people like Perez Hilton and Chad Allen, but there's a generous amount of time spent laying



into gay media, especially the blogs, in one scene. Tell me how you really feel – and do you think perhaps you're biting the hand that feeds you?

MM: Oh, boy – here we go. We'll be here for hours.

RW: I think the movie pretty much sums up how I really feel. Everything is exaggerated to make it "bigger" for the characters, but I stand behind what the movie says. There are so many blogs that exist solely to tear people down or to bitch about what's wrong with the world. On the gay blogs, it's extremely common to criticize films, TV shows and books for not depicting the gay community in a certain way, or to criticize gay celebrities in every aspect of their lives, without ever praising the people and the entertainment that does work to present positive or at least varied portrayals of our community. And I especially agree with the lines about how gay media supports straight, "gay-friendly" celebrities much more than they support actual gay celebrities, because having a straight diva on the cover of a magazine will sell more copies than a cover of an openly gay artist. I have much more respect for a small, local gay magazine that features openly gay people from their area – even if they're not "famous" – than I do for national gay magazines that contain almost no actual gay content. The movie will probably strike a nerve with a lot of gay bloggers and gav media because it hits close to home, but these are the same people who are already critical of indie gay movies because they're made for a modest budget or because they don't tackle "big issues" like "Milk." But when the film has played at film festivals around the country, it has been received very positively and people have been

very supportive of the messages in the film. That's ultimately what means the most to me.

MR: Jim J. Bullock is in this movie! I totally remember my parents watching "Too Close for Comfort" when I was a kid. Loved that show – especially his character. Anyway, I have to ask this with all due respect: Was he meant to have on all that makeup? I couldn't tell if that was a character decision or if he got a make-up artist with a vendetta. I know the viewers will wonder the same thing.

RW: Jim showed up to film his scenes and had a great idea for his character – to show him as a vain Hollywood agent who is fighting the aging process at every turn. The overdone look was completely intentional, to show his character as



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someone who tans excessively, whitens his teeth excessively, wears a hairpiece, and always tries and fails to make himself look younger. The look was definitely done on purpose to get a laugh, but it's a very real reflection on how a lot of people in Hollywood treat themselves.

MR: This film is about a closeted soap actor who's outed in a sex tape and a marriage equality activist who's getting a divorce. A lot of your characters' circumstances are a result of desperate fame seeking. Do you think that's a real problem in our community?

MM: Yes. And I blame it entirely on "Survivor." I also blame reality television in general for famine, war and disease.

STEVE CALLAHAN: I don't think it's something unique to the gay community. We are living in an era of instant fame, with everyday people suddenly catapulted into the spotlight with reality television. People are becoming famous for having appeared in sex tapes. It's absurd. I recently read that teenagers are trying to get pregnant to get on the MTV show "16 and Pregnant." It's sick what people are doing for fame.

MR: When I watched the film, I couldn't help but think of Dan Choi, whose "activism" seemed rather selfish leading up to the repeal of DADT. Every was a stunt to "advance the cause." Matthew, your character in the film is familiar with that. Do you think these stunts ultimately help or hurt our progress on issues?

MM: Change doesn't happen like the turn of a page. I applaud anyone who has the courage to stand up and say something against lack of ethics that we are currently surrounded by. Stunt or not, I believe it takes a strong and selfless individual to go against the grain of the status quo in order to promote awareness.

MR: Steve, I don't want to give away the entire plot, but your character is in his particular predicament because of his fear of coming out of the closet. There's accuracy in that situation. That is to say, people have done similar things in real life. So why do you think there's still so much homophobia in an entertainment industry that prides itself on being so liberal?

SC: Fear. People are afraid of how actors' coming out will affect the box office. It's called show business for a reason – it's a business. Studios are reluctant to do anything that could potentially, adversely affect a film's bottom line. Thankfully, this attitude is really beginning to change. In the last few years we have had some big actors finally stepping out of the closet.

MR: You guys do a lot of gay films, so I've got to ask, do you pursue mainstream projects? Is it worth your time? Have you been turned down because of your openness with your sexuality?

MM: I pursue any work that comes my way that I feel I'm right for. The truth is that my playing mostly gay characters is rather secondary and where I may have found my niche through previous films I've made, and that's OK with me. I have not, to my knowledge, at least, been turned down for a part because I like dudes. That seems rather silly, although I'm sure it happens on a regular basis. However, I have been turned down from representation before for being an openly gay actor, and interestingly enough, it's usually from agents and managers who are gay themselves. From my experience, the heterosexual representation that I've encountered couldn't care less.

SC: I just want to work. I pursue all sorts of projects. Right now the gay independent film world is being really good to me. It's an exciting time for gay films. We have so many different stories to tell.

MR: Part of the plot of "Role/Play" is based on Steve's character as a soap star and how everyone around him warns him not to come out of the

closet. As an ex-soap actor, Steve, how much of that did you actually experience in real life? Did that happen to you? Do you know of soap actors who are confronted with that crossroads?

SC: I'm definitely not an ex-soap actor. You probably saw "Days of Our Lives" on my IMDB profile. I only did two episodes of that show, but I know soap opera actors who are afraid to come out. I'm also good friends with Thom Bierdz of "The Young and the Restless" who is on that show as an openly gay actor, so times are changing.

MR: You two are a couple in real life, so of course there's a certain comfort level you have with each other when filming the many nude scenes in "Role/Play," but how did spending all that time together affect your sex life? I mean, you were naked all day. I'm sure the last thing you wanted to do after work was jump right back into bed.

MM: Um, yeah... that was a huge problem. Getting into bed with Steve Callahan after a daylong shoot of lying in bed with Steve Callahan. Yup. Booooring.




SC: Have you seen my boyfriend? Lack of desire to be naked in bed with him has never been a problem.


MR: You must love working with one another. Steve, you were just cast in a film that Matthew wrote, title "Sticke Figures," which starts shooting next year. How do you two make it work?




Fiction:


and how these two souls come together. If you only read one book this winter, make it this one.


books that hurts to read, but it hurts good.


"The Butt Book" by Artie Bennett, illustrated by

But what of I Love You Phillip Morris?

Current spin on the cyber grapevine is that I Love You Phillip Morris is simply too gay. One might say, after seeing the film, that it is too "gay, gay, gay, gay, gay,"

It is not particularly surprising when a film with



an LGBT theme disappears into the black hole that is Hollywood. Better films than I Love You Phillip Morris have oft times been proudly hyped in the likes of Out Magazine or Gay.com only to disappear before our very eyes. Yet even Cher's misconceived Burlesque was bravely allowed the opportunity to succeed, if only to ultimately crash and burn.

Why not I Love You Phillip Morris?

I Love You Phillip Morris is based upon a strange but true story. A husband, a Christian and a father, Steven Russell (Carrey) was a church organist, prosperous businessman, and onetime Boca Raton cop before turning to his life of crime. He might have spied erect male members amongst the clouds as a little boy but it takes a near fatal car crash for middle-aged Russell to experience the needed epiphany to decide to become "a big fag." Says Russell, whilst flashing a big Cheshire grin: "Did I forget to mention that I'm gay? Gay, gay, gay, gay, gay!"

The fabulous gay lifestyle to which he believes himself entitled costs big bucks and thus Russell begins his career as a con artist. Along the way he deserts his sweet, simple but extremely loyal wife Debbie (Leslie Mann), moves in with his first boyfriend Jimmy (Rodrigo Santoro) and after his various scams finally catch up with him, Russell ends up in prison where he falls truly,

On paper looks I Love You Phillip Morris looks absolutely fascinating. Steven Russell, the real life inspiration for Phillip Morris, is an American original; a man who stole from the rich to give to his boyfriend. His exploits, chronicled in Steve McVickers' biography, are indeed stranger than fiction. So much so, in fact, they don't need Carrey's incessant mugging and gleefully executed pratfalls which codirectors and screenwriters Glenn Ficarra and John Requa (Bad Santa) are unable (or unwilling) to reign in. Nor do Ficarra and Requa ever decide if Russell's story is meant to be a dark, slapstick farce or rather less likely, a believable gay love story.

You'll never convince Glenn that the Hollywood "dream machine" is no less a proficient huckster than con man Steven Russell. Even with his career on the wane, Jim Carrey's name above the title, aided and abetted with a trailer chock full of standard issue Jim Carrey comic schtick should have been sufficient fodder to be exploited by a clever distributor. Properly hyped, Jim Carrey's legion of fans alone would have produced at minimum a modest opening weekend box office total.

So, what happened?

In the end perhaps the many of the powers that be in Hollywood, as Glenn did himself, simply found I Love You Phillip Morris to be the biggest traveling minstrel show of mincing gay stereotypes since In & Out and even recalling that cinematic horror from 1969, Staircase.

Will Steven Russell and Phillip Morris be able to ride off together into the sunset, when the final credits are ready to roll?













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

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
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
