HIDE/SEEK: DIFFERENCE AND DESIRE IN AMERICAN PORTRAITURE

A Discussion on Current Issues in Museum Censorship and Government at Milwaukee Art Museum, May 26

Hide/Seek: Difference and Desire in American Portraiture opened in October 2010 at the Smithsonian Institute's National Portrait Gallery. What quietly began as the first major museum exhibition to explore sexual differences in modern American portraiture soon became yet another battleground of the nation's current culture war.

As reported in QUEST in January 2011, David Wojnarowicz's video, A Fire in My Belly was removed from the exhibit when the Catholic League and certain Republican members of Congress raised objections to 12 seconds of footage that depicted a crucifix overrun with ants. That reflection on societal indifference to the suffering of AIDS victims was deemed anti-Christian hate speech.

According to Smithsonian Secretary G. Wayne Clough, he ordered the video pulled because it distracted from the exhibition. The art world, the international LGBT community as well as the show's co-curators saw it differently. They believe it was an act of censorship.

Infrastructure Fund with support from the Fine Arts Society of the Milwaukee Art Musuem, a discussion on current issues in museum censorship and government will take place Thursday, May 26 at 7:30pm in the Milwaukee Art Museum's Lubar Auditorium.

One of Hide/Seek's co-curators, Jonathan Katz, Chair of the Visual Studies Doctoral Program at SUNY Buffalo, will present an introductory lecture. A screening of Wojnarowicz' video will follow. A panel discussion will then be held. Panel participants include Jonathan Katz; Reverend Dr. Steven Peay, Associate Professor of Church History at the Nashotah House Theological Seminary; Kali Murray, Assitant Professor of Law at Marquette University Law School; William Rudolph, Curator of American Art and Decorative Arts at the Milwaukee Art Museum; and Laurie Winters, Director of Exhibitions at the Milwaukee Art Museum.

The event is free with museum admission and open to the public.

"It Gets Better", edited by Dan Savage and Terry Miller c.2011, Dutton \$21.95 / \$27.50 Canada 339 pages



High school, it seems, was built for drama. Maybe it's because of hormones or because everybody's searching for who they are or the person they'll become, but one thing's certain: Mean Girls, jocks and cheerleaders, nerdy kids, geeks, and bullies generally cannot co-exist in peace.

And therein lies a problem, particularly if you're on the receiving end of brutality, teasing, or ostracism. Not only does that stuff hurt, but it makes life so unpleasant that you can sometimes see only one way to stop it...

Columnist **Dan Savage**, with his husband **Terry Miller** and a friend, decided to do something about that. In "**It Gets Better**", they explain what happened and how their un-splashy video became a tidal wave of support.

Just a hundred videos.

That's the response that Dan Savage and Terry Miller hoped they'd get from a YouTube post they

made in the aftermath of several suicides by LGBT teens. In an AHA! moment, Savage had realized that those kids had no vision of a future and no idea that things get better – hence, the video.

But one video begat two, then a hundred, then

a computer crash, a presidential message, and a movement. In this book, they gather notable messages to LGBTQ teens; some poignant, and some surprises.

Like teens who see only "one way out" of the torment, many It Gets Better posters tell of trying to take their own lives at fifteen, twelve, even ten years old. But, as one pointed out, there are many things she would have missed, were she successful. Another poster begs teens not to make him miss the chance to know them.

The respondents came from around the world: the U.S. and Canada, England, Aus-

tralia, Iraq. Politicians weighed in, as did ministers, doctors, dancers, soldiers, and teachers. The posters were gay and straight, parents and friends. One offered to send readers a letter of support. One gave the website for an alternative school. Some saw being gay as a gift. One man said he was his own bully.


The posters are varied, but the message is the same: find your people. Hang in there - it will be over soon. Don't suffer in silence.

We need you to live.

"It Gets Better" is one of those books that slams you from emotion to emotion in six pages or less. Readers will get teary, they'll laugh, nod their heads, gasp, and want to scream. And this book isn't just for teens: adults who need it and read it will find comfort here, too.

The only caveat is that this book is (somewhat) targeted to middle-schoolers, but it may be too

much for them to handle. What's written here is often profane, in-your-face, and generally pretty grown-up, so caution should be used before giving this to a kid who isn't ready for it yet.

Still, if you know someone that needs this book, you'll feel compelled to act. After you've read it yourself, you'll know that "It Gets Better" gives him or her a better chance of surviving.



MILWAUKEE LGBT COMMUNITY CENTER RECEIVES GRANT FROM KOMEN SOUTHEAST WISCONSIN TO INCREASE ACCESS TO LIFESAVING BREAST CANCER SCREENINGS FOR HARD TO REACH LESBIAN, GAY, BISEXUAL AND TRANSGENDER PEOPLE

Milwaukee - The Southeast Wisconsin Affiliate of Susan G. Komen for the Cure® has awarded a \$104,467 grant to the Milwaukee LGBT Community center to support their LGBT Breast Health Program.

The program targets lesbian, gay, bisexual and transgender people who are at-risk for breast cancer in SE Wisconsin with education, outreach and referrals for breast health screenings. The goal is to increase knowledge and awareness of breast cancer risks as experienced in the LGBT community and to increase access to breast cancer screenings. This is important as an increasing number of research studies in recent years suggest that lesbian, gay, bisexual and transgender individuals are at greater risk than the general population to suffer adverse health outcomes and may face significant barriers to health care, including breast health screenings.

This year the LGBT Breast Health Program plans to provide outreach to approximately 3,000 people and refer more than 200 for breast cancer screening. People that are uninsured or underinsured will be referred for free screenings. Upon

completion of the screening a \$50 gift card to Pick N Save may be provided. LGBT identified people from 8 southeastern Wisconsin counties are eligible – including Ozaukee, Washington, Milwaukee, Waukesha, Kenosha, Racine, Walworth and Jefferson. THEATRE REVIEW Thrill Me, In Tandem Theatre by Glenn Bishop

Back in March, following the passing of 1940s Hollywood fan favorite Farley Granger, Glenn thought to organize an impromptu cinema evening. Two of Mr. Granger's best films, Rope and Strangers on a Train would be featured. Suitable period cocktails were called for, so out came the Manhattans, the Gibsons, Glenn's favorite, Sidecars as well as the always ubiquitous Pink Lady.

Particularly intriguing is legendary director Alfred Hitchcock's cinematic adaptation of English playwright Patrick Hamilton's 1929 play **Rope**, one of his most notorious screen successes. In it Farley Granger and John Dall play two Nietzsche obsessed young men, perhaps lovers, who devise the perfect murder of a fellow classmate. The crowning touch is that the two lads toss the body into a convenient chest, drape over it a fabulous tablecloth and serve a smart buffet to friends and family of the recently deceased.

The film's rampant homoeroticism is extraordinary for its 1948 release.

Hamilton based **Rope** upon the extraordinary exploits of Nathan Leopold and Richard Loeb, whose murder of fourteen-year-old Bobbie Franks would forever tag them as "the thrill killers." Never mind that their crimes took place in a small, affluent Chicago suburb back in 1924, their story continues to resonate, providing the basis of numerous works of fiction and non-fiction, films (think Tom Kalin's debut feature, **Swoon**) and of course Stephen Dolginoff's fascinating chamber musical, **Thrill Me**, which wraps up InTandem's 2010-2011 season.

Last September Glenn was delighted to be welcomed at the opening of Theatrical Tendencies' inaugural production, **Thrill Me**, mounted within the jewel-like playing space at the fabulous Milwaukee Gay Arts Center.


Just how would In Tandem's offering compare?

The year is 1958, as **Thrill Me** begins. Nathan Leopold (Adam Estes) is facing another parole panel; his partner in crime, Richard Loeb (Joe Fransee), having been brutally murdered in the shower room of the Joliet Prison many years prior. Yet before they are willing to release Leopold, the panel of three want to understand why the pair committed the murder; want to know that Leopold exhibits proper remorse for the long ago crime.

In flashbacks, then, Leopold tells his story; or rather their stories. Leopold's is a story of obsession, plain and simple. He so craves Richard's attentions that he is willing to suffer any humiliation, any indignity that Richard devises. As to Richard, well, he is quite simply bored. And while he'd be loathe admitting it, his need for Nathan's devotion is just as great as Nathan's obsession with him.

For years Richard had orchestrated a series of youthful petty crimes, both for the thrill

of it and to test Nathan's devotion. Yet these petty crimes have increasingly lost their novelty. Upping the ante, Richard begins plotting the ultimate crime: he wants to commit murder. Indeed, he wants to kill his own younger brother John. Having read Nietzsche, Richard has deemed the two of them as "Supermen;" therefore such a crime would rest beyond society's rules. Nathan manages to talk him out of killing his brother, suggesting instead that they should find some random boy




that they would kidnap and then murder (song: The Plan). In exchange for Nathan's cooperation, Richard will in turn satisfy any (sexual) request (song: A Written Contract). Since such crimes clearly arouse Richard, Richard might appear to have gotten the better deal but Nathan nevertheless seems satisfied.

Richard manages to lure little Bobbie Franks, both a neighbor as well as a distant cousin of Loeb's into his car. The song, Roadster, in Joe Fransee's capable hands, emerges as something of a chilling, pedophile anthem. Yet despite seeing themselves as two of Nietzsche's Supermen; the pair don't seem to get much else right. The evil deed has barely been done and already the body of Bobby Franks is discovered. Next, Nathan realizes that he has somehow dropped his eye-glasses at the crime scene (song: My Glasses). It turns out that Nathan's eyeglasses were ridiculously unique; his pair one of only three sold in all of Chicago. In the end, their capture proves absurdly simple and straightforward. Dubbed the "crime of the century." Leopold and Loeb would surely have hung if not for their attorney, the legendary Clarence Darrow.

In a scant 80 minutes, **Thrill Me** emerges as wonderfully dark, relentless and entertaining. The show's seventeen songs effectively propel the narrative and are so seamlessly done so as to give "**Thrill Me**" a sung-through feel.

As the cool, manipulative Richard, Joe Fransee does well in capturing sufficient charisma and charm. Glenn found Adam Estes' Nathan too calculating,



not entirely believable as one held in Richard's thrall.

Perhaps grown to familiar with the show, Glenn became increasingly aware of problems with both the book and songs. A few songs stand out, particularly The Plan and Joe Fransee's wonderfully woeful Afraid as well as the above mentioned Roadster. Yet too many of the songs have a samey feel about them, inevitable perhaps with just two voices and a single piano to draw upon. Still there's no excuse for some of the truly dire rhymes which plague A Written Contract and I'm Trying to Think.

Nor does Stephen Dolginoff's book offer any new insight the infamous pair. Richard's fascination for Nietzsche is duly trotted out only to be quickly forgotten. Nathan's (sexual?) obsession for the charismatic Richard must bear the brunt of his subsequent involvement.

Nathan's 1958 parole panel might have finally found satisfaction in Nathan's declaration of remorse; Glenn was rather less convinced.

In Tandem Theatre's production of *Thrill Me: The Leopold and Loeb Story* runs through May 15th at the 10th Street Theatre on 628 North Tenth Street. Tickets are \$20 and \$25 and can be purchased in advance by calling the box office at 414-271-1371.

INTERVIEW with Chez Bouche's Director, Randy Bouche' by Paul Masterson

You may have noticed the ads for *Chez Bouche'An Exotic Dance-Comedy* in QUEST and other media. The current ones are for the troupe's Milwaukee Gay Arts Center appearance on Saturday May 23. The ad's photos depict Adam and Eve, a burlesque dancer and devil. But what exactly is Chez Bouche'?

QUEST interviewed Randy Bouche', aka CC Rae, the creator of Chez Bouche' to find out.

QUEST: Before we talk about the show, let's talk about you. Tell us a little about your background.

Randy Bouche': I'm an entertainer. I've been doing various types of shows all my life. I did standup, puppetry, major celebrity impersonations, physical stage humor and dance. I created a comedy drag show, *The CC Rae Comedy Show*, in the 90's and traveled the country with it for five years. I worked in 43 states and over 275 cities.

QUEST: And now you're on the road again with a new show.

RB: Yes, I planned the show in spring 2010. We launched it in November. Now we're booked throughout the Midwest. Chez Bouche' is a mix of burlesque, Vaudeville and a combination of so many things. It's like modern-day pop videos with high-energy choreography, comedy and erotic interpretive dance.

QUEST: There's been a burlesque revival for some time. Is your show following the trend?

RB: I'd say it's coincidental. The neo-burlesque movement is more traditional. One major difference is that my show encompasses both sexes and all sexualities. When I designed the show, I wanted to appeal to all walks of life – gay, straight, bisexual and everything in between. I like to think the sexuality in my show is done in a classy way unlike stripper club style shows you might see elsewhere.

Plus, we do a lot of humor so the sexy stuff has a comic edge at times.

QUEST: Is there a theme?

RB: Yes, FUN...with a sexy overtone. There's no story line but rather a series of sketches and production numbers. There are comedy bits and the entire cast perform as the dancers throughout the show. It's a cross between Saturday Night Live, In Living Color and VH1.

QUEST: So, what about the cast?

RB: We currently have myself; "Redd Hott," a 26 year old professional model, Tyler Falco-Schott, is a 22 year old college theatre major. He brings fantastic acting and comedic skills along with a playful sexiness to the show. Then

QUEST: How has the show been received?

RB: Phenomenally! The audience mobs the cast for autographs and wants photos with them. The show gets stronger with each performance. I'm neurotic about constantly evaluating the show and improving it. We use videos to critique ourselves. It the most valuable tool we have.

QUEST: Your next date is the MGAC on Saturday, May 21. What can the audience expect?

RB: A high energy show with lots of dance numbers, original comedy and sketches, clever puppetry, a little bit of magic, some sexual intrigue, and, of course...A WHOLE LOT OF FUN!

HOLE DRUMMER HITS HARD'THEN RISES

Raised in a farm town outside of Seattle, openly lesbian drummer Patty Schemel never dreamed her right foot would pedal the band *Hole* toward international stardom, defining the 90's grunge era with such hits as 'Doll Parts' and "Miss World'. One minute, she was swimming in accolades from critics and fans alike, resulting in a cover shoot for *Rolling Stone*. Then, fame hit like a wave, drowning the angst-rock heroine in a sea of drug addiction, where she hit rock-bottom the day she realized that she was homeless, sleeping in an LA parking lot.

Detailing her triumphant tale, the P. David Ebersole-directed rockumentary Hit So Hard mashes up family and colleague interviews, along with never-before-seen tour footage shot on Schemel's Hi-8 camera, to provide viewers with a glimpse into the life of the lit-

tle drummer girl who once resided with *Hole's* Courtney Love and her partner Kurt Cobain.

Along with Ebersole and producer Todd Hughes, Schemel chatted with Edge about the film, which premiered at the 2011 SXSW Festival.

Quest: Patty, tell us, what made you decide to release this footage now, 20 years after the release of Hole's first album?

Schemel: It sort of happened by accident. Christina Soletti saw the concert footage and said you should preserve this. So Christina, who is my wife and a producer of the film, got a dubbing deck and we started digitizing it. She spoke with P. David and Todd, and they thought 'there's a great story here', and it just unraveled.

Quest: Was there any footage too personal to release to the public?

Schemel: Yeah, there were some private moments that people in the shots might have not want aired. Personally, for me, everything was up for grabs. As P. David explained, that's what makes a great story.

Ebersole: (Laughs) There was only one scene she wouldn't let me use. It was where she was wearing a dress.

Quest: P. David, as a political filmmaker, what made you decide to work in a completely different film genre?



Ebersole: I think it was the ability of Patty to be so honest about the story. I thought the story could help people, telling the tale about what it's like to be a young musician with temptations. It showed what it's like to make it to the other side. There are other things as well, such as the fact that Patty was early on, openly gay. Also, she's a rare woman drummer. I come from a strong feminist background, so putting together a story where a woman can hit hard like the 'big dude' rock musicians – that was attractive to me.

Quest: In the early 90's, what kind of obstacles in the industry did you face as an openly-gay musician?

Schemel: You know, I felt really protected within my band. There were the typical issues, like not getting enough respect as a female drummer, but I felt really safe doing press with my gays, with my people.

Quest: On the film's website, you asked fans for 15,000 to help complete the project. What was the most expensive aspect of the filming process?

Ebersole: Ultimately, it was post-production. We edited it at home. We digitized it ourselves. Once you take what's on your computer and go to the post-facility, that's when it gets expensive. Obtaining the interviews was cheap.

Hughes: Yes, Patty helped with access to people. For instance, here's Gina Schock's (The Go-Go's) phone number.

Quest: Patty, tell us about the 'rock-bottom' event that made you bounce back?

Schemel: It was living in the parking lot. I had gotten arrested. It was a moment where I thought 'I could die if I keep doing this' or 'die if I *don't* keeping doing this'.

Quest: What made you want to live?

Schemel: Consuming more and more drugs, the search for the next 'hit' that could bring me back to the feeling of the first one.

Quest: As a close friend of Kurt Cobain, how did his death influence your drug use at the time?

Schemel: It increased a lot. Then, our bass player Kristen (Pfaff) overdosed. And then everyone decided to get clean and focus on the music. I didn't want to talk about Kurt. I didn't want to talk about (his daughter) Frances.

Ebersole: That's what I think is interesting about the story. Kurt was Patty's friend. Kristen was Patty's friend. Whereas others were looking at these people as mythical figures, Patty had to deal with the pain of a personal loss.

Hughes: These kids went from playing in little bands to being huge superstars. And the industry didn't care about them. It was all about what they could do to sell more records.

Quest: Did you agree with the more radio-friendly sound of Hole's third album, *Celebrity Skin*?

Schemel: Not so much. There were great songs. It's really hard to listen to it, because of the story beneath it. I wrote some of the songs, but I'll just leave it open.

Hughes: A lot about this question is the crux of the movie. It's what makes it interesting.

Quest: Patty, with that said, have you and Courtney entertained the thought of collaborating again?

Schemel: No...but...it could happen.

A NEW COMEDY BY NEIL HAVEN OPENS MAY 19

The Milwaukee Gay Arts Center (MGAC) and Uprooted Theatre, the city's new African American stage company join forces to present local playwright Neil Haven's new comedy, *Pink Champagne*. The play runs at the 10th Street Theatre, 628 North 10th Street (corner of Wisconsin Avenue) in Milwaukee from May 19 – June 5, 2011.

With the generous support of the Washington Heights Rainbow Association, MGAC commissioned the playwright in 2007. The intent was to create an LGBT positive theatre work addressing the contemporary social issues.

Four years later, the MGAC project has come to fruition with funding through the Greater Milwaukee Foundation Johnson & Pabst LGBT Humanity Fund, PrideFest Milwaukee, the Milwaukee Arts Board, the Wisconsin Arts Board, and Cream City Foundation's Joseph R. Pabst LGBT Infrastructure Fund and Quest Magazine.

A dramatic reading took place in February 2010. Members of Uprooted Theatre and Joe Pabst were in the audience. Uprooted wanted to put on the play and Pabst wanted to fund it. That paved the way for a Milwaukee Arts Board grant application that was submitted shortly thereafter. Of the approximately 40 grant applications, 28 were funded. MGAC's *Pink Champagne* ranked in the top ten.

The comedy was again performed as a dramatic reading on the PrideFest MGAC stage in June 2010. Then progress continued toward the fully staged version.

Uprooted Theatre's Artistic Director/Co-founder Dennis F. Johnson directs this artistic collaboration. *Pink Champagn's* cast features Uprooted's Managing Director/Co-Founder Marti Gobel, T. Stacy Hicks, John Kishline, John Maclay, and Ari Shapiro.

In Pink Champagne, playwright Neil Haven takes a unique new approach to the "coming out" genre. His comedy addresses not only the coming out process of an adolescent but also that of an older married person. The intergenerational angle explores how contemporary families deal with the new phenomenon of accepted identity – recognized later in life for the older generation and as a natural process for the younger one. An additional twist is an interracial component. Haven's splurge of diversity concludes that family values, whether traditional or in a same-sex relationship, are universal.

The Plot

Donald's relationship with his conservative son Gene never recovered after Donald came out and split with Gene's mother twenty-five

years ago. Now in his sixties, Donald and his husband Patrick are surprised by a visit from Donald's rarely seen seventeen-year-old grandson, Joey, who happens to be a sporting a black eye. Joey announces he also is gay and will be heretofore living with "grandpa and grandpa." Gene and his wife Corrine must now chase down their son to Donald's house for an impromptu family reunion. Both couples are in dire straits for various reasons. Corrine and Patrick become allies as the two inlaws, and Donald and Gene each have strong feelings about the other's parenting abilities.

Pink Champagne begins with a preview performance May 19th The official opening is May 20 with a Pink Champagne reception hosted by PFLAG following the show. A panel discussion follows the 2pm matinee show on Sunday, May 29. Panelists representing community organizations will discuss Pink Champagne's themes. Talk backs with the playwright and cast members will take place after the Thursday shows on May 26 and June 2.

Pink Champagne runs through June 5th and all performance will be at the Tenth Street Theatre, 628 N. 10th Street, Milwaukee.

"Please, dad. You're not that big. I've seen it."

"When did you see it?"

"Well, bring over some of those girls. I'll blind them too."

Hence, why I don't invite my friends over often. It's just too risky. My dad has a way of bringing out the 'crazy' in everyone. Living with him, I find myself talking in circles about sex and women more than any gay man would care to admit. The other night, we were actually debating on whether or not Hillary Clinton would be good in bed. My vote was no, which started an argument, because he found that unpatriotic. Hence, this is why I go out a lot. I need to fend off the crazy gene. But lo and behold, I have discovered being unstable can be attractive to some people.

For example, my friend Doug's new thing is to only date people with mental illness. It's a defense mechanism, ensuring the relationship will never go anywhere. This is how he keeps himself guarded from falling in love. He's been hurt too much. Therefore, bi-polar guys are white hot, particularly when they're not on their meds. "It's exciting," he informs me at the pub. "I met one the other night, and he's been so unpredictable."

"Is that a good thing?" I ask.

"Well, it beats being in a boring relationship. Last night, I went to his house for dinner, and he had a mannequin coming out of the ceiling in his room. It was just hanging there. There was one in the kitchen too. Isn't that awe-some?"

"Um, that depends. What does he do with the mannequins?"

"Oh, they're not for him. They're for his mother. She lives with him. She likes to brush their hair. He only plays with them...sometimes."

Maybe I won't go crazy if I don't talk back.

Either way, if you enjoy films with an uplifting, humorous storyline, hitch a UFO ride over to your local film festival to see Madeleine Olnek's new sci-fi flick, Codependent Lesbian Space Alien Seeks Same.

Praised by critics and audiences alike, the film's tongue-in-cheek premise plays homage to the campy directorial-style of Ed Wood, while melting the cheese factor with the stellar performances and witty dialogue. With a cast consisting of a seasoned comedian (Jackie Monahan) and a festival-fave thespian (Lisa Haas), the film follows the love life of a lonely earthling named Jane who attempts to see beyond gender, species, and hair-line to find a life-partner to call her own.

Writer/director Madeleine Olnek took a few mo-

nightmare. We did a very ambitious movie set in New York City. I wanted to do a movie following a lesbian storyline that did not deal with the acceptance of sexuality. I wanted to write a film that is *not* about how horrible it is to be gay, but how horrible it is to be in love (laughs), which is a universal thing that everyone can relate to.

There seems to be a number of lonely characters in your films, such as the lead in the short *Countertransference*. What do you find compelling about these characters?

Madeleine: For me, there's nothing funnier than loneliness and rejection. Anything that a person takes too seriously is fodder for good comedy, and people take their own loneliness very seriously. And it is serious. Personally, I am against dramas from a moral point of view. I don't think artists should be allowed to make them. Life is already dramatic, so I think making something like that is just regurgitating life as it is. Comedy provides re-

Shot entirely in black-and-white, the film takes on an Ed Wood quality. What techniques did you utilize to set your film apart in the comedic, sci-fi genre?

Madeleine: The main thing is I required an emotional commitment from the actors. I wanted the audience to go on a journey, which they could relate to emotionally. Whereas a lot of comedic scifi is silly, I feel there is something more here.

Yes, there are deeper themes, such as feeling like an alien on one's home planet. What do you want viewers to take away from the film?

Madeleine: That the search for love can be exciting despite the pitfalls. I enjoy the scientifically-proven idea that when you laugh it changes the way neurons fire in your brain. Ultimately, what I want is for people to forget about their miserable lives for 76 minutes, and if I do that, I will have accomplished a great deal.

An open letter from the Milwaukee LGBT Pride Parade Board

The Milwaukee Pride Parade was founded in 2005 by the former owners of Outbound Magazine best known as Jim and James. In 2006 Jim and James needed to move out of the area for personal reasons. At this point the parade was taken over by a board of directors which included local LGBT business owners as well as Quest Magazine; the result of a purchase of Outbound Magazine from James that same year.

The new board took the parade on with a renewed vigor and vowed to make the parade the best and most reliable organization they could. The parade has enjoyed growth each year increasing the number of units as well as the number of people watching the parade.

Today the Milwaukee LGBT Pride Parade is run by an all volunteer, self appointing board of directors made up primarily of LGBT business owners in the 5th ward area of Milwaukee. With so much business experience at the helm of the organization, we have been able to keep not only sponsorship levels low and affordable for potential sponsors but have also never raised the entry fee to the parade. In an effort to make it even more affordable to enter a marching unit in the parade for 2011, the board of directors voted unanimously to lower the early entry fee for early entries. Entering prior to 5-15-11, was reduced to \$40.00, down from \$50.00. And the board authorized, for the first time ever in the history of this organization, free entry for non-profit organizations wishing to be in the parade.

As you can imagine, putting on a parade is an expensive if not daunting task. Like most organizations, the parade has a budget reviewed every year. Our budget for the last few years has been around \$10,000 for one parade. We have been fortunate to accumulate an emergency reserve fund that could keep the parade in operation in the event we experienced unusually high costs due to insurance, permitting changes or other unforseen events. This safety net insures the stablility of the parade for the future even in a year where entry fees or donations were less than needed.

There are many costs involved in putting on the parade including insurance, city permits for

both the parade and for hanging pride banners on the light poles along the route, radio rentals, advertising, printing costs, trophy purchases, and office supplies. We mail out over 1,000 pieces of mail in the months of February and March alone.

The parade works off of a business model more than a non-profit model. Some community organizations don't truly know what their operating budget will be for a given year until the donations begin to roll in. The board of directors saw this as something which could really hurt the parade in lean years. To counteract that the parade, initially, took a very reserved stance towards spending of funds above and beyond required expenditures (Permits, insurance, office supplies, etc).

The Pride Parade works off of previous years fund raising to pay for current year expenses. (i.e. all money raised in 2009 paid for the 2010 Parade expenses). This allows us to budget more effectively and truly be able to utilize all funds at our disposal to put on a great parade every year. As the parade goes on we have gotten more and more liberal with budgeting and being able to effectively spend more on sustainable policies as well as sustainable "luxury" expenditures for the parade.

The parade board qualifes "luxury" expenses as things we have to pay for to make the parade better. These are things like renting professional radios for parade day communication instead of borrowing or using consumer grade radios and/or using cell phones. And things like actually paying for units to be in the parade like marching bands and musical talent. Did you know that for each marching band in a parade it cost the parade on average \$2000.00 to bring them in? We are still striving to get to a point where we can actually pay for unit to be in the parade every year but unfortunately the funding each year just is not there to keep it going.

In other efforts the Pride Parade has tried to increase sponsorship donations by teaming up with an integral part of the LGBT community in south east Wisconsin in the G/L Community Center Trust Fund. Through the partnership with the G/L Community Center we are able to

offer people or businesses a way to make their donations to the Pride Parade tax deductible.

Looking to the future, the Pride Parade board is working to make sure that we are a 100% viable and stable organization for decades to come. We hope to accomplish this in part by becoming our own 501(c)3 entity. This change affords us more opportunity for self direction and can allow the organization to be even more transparent with the community.

We are also looking into setting up some form of charitable arm to help give back to the community which has supported us so well for so long.

Past discussions about ways to give back have included outright donations to nonprofit organizations, hosting fundraisers for other organizations, doing food drives, and so many other ideas that it would be impossible to list them all.

In the past building up the stability of the Parade finances have precluded putting any of these ideas into play.


With our steps to fiscally reorganize the parade we will be able to create sustainable charitable actions of the parade for decades to come. The community has continued to support the efforts of the Parade and that contributes to our strong feelings about branching out to do more to give back to the community that has helped us.






