Woman of the Year: Tara Ayers

Tara Ayres has been an activist throughout the U.S. since the 1960s, working for racial justice, women's rights, peace, LGBT rights and many more causes. Locally, Tara has been the artistic director at StageQ Theater for the past 6 years. She is deeply committed to the organization, and the company has grown during her leadership. She has also volunteered at WORT Radio since 1981, where she has worked on 4 different shows. In addition to many other contributions too numerous to mention here, Tara is a regular contributor to Our Lives magazine and a former OutReach board member.

Man of the Year: Dennis Bergren

Dennis Bergren has been active in the LGBT community in Madison for many years. He was instrumental in setting up the library at OutReach and has volunteered in other capacities as well. Dennis founded the LGBT chapter of the Wisconsin Books to Prisoners project, which provides free


books to LGBT prisoners in Wisconsin and throughout the U.S. This project has distributed thousands of books in the past few years to prisoners. Dennis is also an active member of the Madison Area Gay/Bi Father's Group, serving as its president and secretary for many years since its founding in 1984. He has also been an activist for peace and social justice, serving on the board of Wisconsin Network for Peace and Justice.

Organization of the Year: Our Lives

Founded in 2005 by Patrick Farabaugh, Our Lives magazine is one of the best LGBTQA media pieces in Wisconsin. It has recently branched out into television. Its mission is to clearly, candidly, and openly reflect the diversity and optimism in the LGBT community – and to improve readers quality of life by celebrating people, establishments and events that encourage us to embrace our identities as an LGBTQA community.

Volunteer of the Year: JJ Menting

JJ has volunteered at OutReach for many years. During the past year, JJ has facilitated two very popular groups at OutReach: Salon Q and Q-Cinema International. For Q-Cinema he researches, reviews, and plans the movie viewings. JJ is a great moderator and is good at bringing new people to OutReach. His has made a substantial contribution to OutReach over the past year.



Ally of the Year: Katie Belanger

As the Executive Director of Fair Wisconsin, Katie Belanger has fought tirelessly for the rights of same-sex couples to marry. She originally came to Fair Wisconsin as its Legislative Director, using her extensive political, non-profit fundraising, and grassroots organizing experiences to spearhead efforts to protect domestic partnerships. As a result, Wisconsin became the first state in the Midwest to protect same-sex couples via legislation – and the first state with an existing constitutional amendment banning both marriage equality and civil unions to enact domestic partnerships. In 2009, Katie became Fair Wisconsin's Executive Director. She remains committed to building coalitions with both progressive allies and other LGBT partner organizations as a way of sustaining Fair Wisconsin's mission to educate the general public about the negative impact of discrimination towards LGBT individuals and to build more inclusive communities and workplaces for LGBT Wisconsinites.

Courage Award: Harry Straetz and Nikki Baumblatt

Former OutReach staff members Harry Straetz and Nikki Baumblatt will

receive Courage Awards this year for their efforts both with this agency and the LGBT community as a whole.

Starting out as Community Relations Director and then as Development Director, Nikki Baumblatt devoted her considerable energies toward growing OutReach into a viable presence in the Madison community. During her tenure at OutReach, Nikki's major accomplishments included greatly expanding The Directory publication, in addition to a larger Annual OutReach Awards Her hard work and Banquet. fundraising efforts for this organization are her legacy.

Harry Straetz began his career at OutReach as a volunteer and was later hired on as program director, a position he nurtured and developed for almost ten years. Harry was largely responsible for the expansion of programming offered by Out-Reach. Today, due to Harry's dedication and persistence, OutReach offers over 25 different groups on topics including: Smoking Cessation; BI-intentions (support group bi-sexuals); Women4Women (lesbian social group); AlAnon; Rainbow Connection (LGBT persons living with mental health challenges); OutThere (18-24 year old social group); Madison Transgender Social Support Group; and, "All God's Children,"

(Catholic parents of LGBT children). Harry's fabulous sense of humor, his love of people and of dance, his kindness, and most of all his presence, are greatly missed.

ABC AND THE CW WILL FEATURE GAY AND TRANSGENDER CONTESTANTS ON FALL REALITY SHOWS

New York City - ABC Television Network announced transgender advocate Chaz Bono and gay stylist Carson Kressley will be featured on the upcoming season of Dancing with the Stars. Earlier this month, the CW announced that transgender model Isis King and openly lesbian Kayla Ferrel would return for the all-star cycle of America's Next Top Model.

The Gay & Lesbian Alliance Against Defamation (GLAAD), the nation's lesbian, gay, bisexual and transgender (LGBT) media advocacy and anti-defamation organization, responded to ABC's announcement with these quotes:

"With both gay and transgender contestants represented, ABC and the CW have created primetime firsts that reflect the growing acceptance of gay and transgender people in America today." "At a time when transgender representation in the media is sorely lacking, Chaz Bono joining the cast of a series like Dancing With the Stars is a tremendous step forward for the public to recognize that transgender people are an important part

of the fabric of American culture," said Herndon Graddick, Senior Director of Programs at GLAAD. "His documentary, 'Becoming Chaz,' was a great chance for viewers to meet the man behind the headlines. Appearing on such a high profile show will allow millions of Americans to get to know him in a whole new light."

Meanwhile the Chicago Sun-Times reported staff at "Dancing With the Stars" say the producers have been very surprised by an swell of negative reaction to the casting of Chaz Bono as a contestant on the new season.

"Of course, they knew there would be some anti-Bono calls and emails," said a longtime "DWTS" insider. "But this has been more vicious and in larger volume than was anticipated. ... Some of the comments are downright scary," quoted the Chicago Sun-Times.

The negative backlash is most likely from



viewers in the Bible Belt who have been riled up by denunciations of Bono in sermons delivered by unhappy preachers.

Reuters reporter Tim Kenneally states "The viewing public might be split on Chaz Bono's participation on the upcoming season of "Dancing With the Stars," but the way he sees it, his inclusion on the show is just what the doctor ordered for this country."

Bono in an ABC Newscast said, "It's made me realize I'm really glad I'm doing this, because America really needs to see this." "You know, it just kind of shows why for me it's important to be on the show, because so little still is known about what it means to be transgender. And there's so many just completely inaccurate stereotypes and thoughts that people have."

A child of Cher and Sonny Bono born Chastity Bono, underwent gender-reassignment surgery last year. He is 42 year old.

Tim Kenneally reports one online group.

OneMillionMoms.com, has even called for a boycott of the series, with its director Monica Cole, telling Inside Edition on Wednesday, "We will not be able to watch the show with Chaz on there. This is going to be very confusing for children, and should not be included in their cast."

Cher, who has been supportive of her offspring's decision blasted his critics as "bigots" via Twitter and asked her followers to come to his defense online.

Fox News Cable channel not to be left out of the party featured an on-air tirade by Fox News psychiatrist Dr. Keith Ablow including this quote, "Millions of young people who do watch Dancing with the Stars will have to ponder this question,' Ablow wrote, 'Maybe my problems really stem from the fact that I'm a girl inside a boy's body (or a boy inside a girls body). Maybe I'm not a tomboy; I'm just a boy! Maybe I'm not just being bullied because I'm a sensitive, reflective young man interested in flowers, not football, Maybe I'm not just uncertain about my sexuality.

Maybe I'm a girl!"

Howard Bragman who has been advising Bono told Good Morning America: "Watching Chaz Bono dance is not going to make your kid transgender. But what it can do is possibly save your kids life because young transgender kids, kids with gender identity issues, have a huge suicide rate and if they see one positive influence, one positive role model, this can save lives and that's why Chaz is here."

At press time Quest did not find news stories of angry viewers concerning CW's America's Next Top Model which may either mean viewers are not as upset when it is a lesbian being featured, or the show has such low ratings it is not on the radar.

America's Next Top Model - All Stars premieres on September 14, while the new season of Dancing With the Stars premieres on September 19.

Milwaukee SSBL's Dairyland Classic 2011

The Dairyland Classic (DLC) softball tournament returned to Milwaukee on Labor Day weekend. The city's gay softball tradition dates back to the late 1970's, when it began as the Wreck Room Clas-

sic. The tournament has since evolved over the past three decades. It has, however, always showcased Milwaukee's historic participation in national LGBT athletics. A founding city of the North American Gay Amateur Athletic Alliance

(NAGAAA), Milwaukee hosted NA-GAAAFest, the gay softball world series in 2009.

NAGAAAFest's spectacular success, based on the many year's of organizing the Dairyland Classic, provided the groundwork for yet another world-class softball experience. The new DLC Director Sean DeFelice lead this year's Dairyland Classic Committee.

SSBL assistant commissioner Pete Nys noted this year's participants, a total of 27 teams, came from Chicago, Madison and Minneapolis/St. Paul. According to Nys, a dozen local teams from Milwaukee registered to participate as well. They represented both recreational and competitive levels. The D recreational division played at Wick Field located on Vliet and 51 th Streets. The C competitive division played at Wilson Park, one of field complexes used during NAGAAAFest 2009.

Madison Madd Dawgs catcher and State Representative Tim Carpenter, a DLC veteran player from the early days, said "it's amazing to see how far we've come. This event has grown so much over the years. Milwaukee's community has a lot to be proud of."

Charlie's, a new D divison team sponsored by Club Charlie, made its DLC debut. The Milwaukee Gay Arts Center fields Scream, the only SSBL league team not sponsored by a bar boasts a fully diverse roster of men and women ranges from university professors to a chef. Asked about Scream's third Dairyland Classic, co-manager Will Pelfrey said, "we have a great recreational team and had a wonderful weekend of softball. People join Scream because we're all about having fun."

Players awoke on Saturday morning to a thunderous welcome as a major storm swept through the area. The rain drenched the fields but, helped by pounds of kitty litter, games began with only a slight delay. However, a second storm front hit Milwau-





kee early in the afternoon. At around 1:30pm, with lightning and heavy rain, officials cancelled play in deference to player safety. Sunday morning looked promising, as the storms had passed. But, the Saturday cancellation forced C division teams to start their games at 7am! In order to catch up on Saturday's scheduled play, games were also limited to 45 minutes. Despite windy and cloudy conditions later in the day, the Dairyland Classic continued to its finish.

Fluid Force won the 1st Place Trophy in the C Division, followed by Chicago Master Batters, La Cage DT and Minneapolis Pheonix. The D Division 1st Place went to Milwaukee Inch by Inch. The Madison Meat Locker, Boom Bulldogs and Club Charlie picked up second, third and fourth place trophies respectively.

After the Last Out

The Dairyland Classic concluded with a street party. "A highlight of NAGAAAFest was the *Street Bash* so we decided to bring it back for the last DLC in 2010 when it was held on National Avenue. It's all made possible by our generous sponsors and volunteers." Nys said. The 2011 *DLC Party in the Park* took place Sunday evening at Catalano Square, a wedge-shaped green across from Charlie's Bar in the Historic Third Ward.

Milwaukee icon Ruthie hosted the al

fresco festivities. Included were the DLC awards ceremony and live entertainment featuring *Almost ABBA*, a Las Vegas style Abba tribute band.

In all, despite the early onset of fallish weather, the Dairyland Classic marks another successful SSBL softball experience, representing Milwaukee's vibrant LGBT community.

Cream City Foundation's Chuck Grosz attended Sunday's games at Wick Field

and the Party in the Park. "Cream City Foundation recognizes the importance of SSBL in Milwaukee's very active LGBT sports scene. We hope to further enhance and encourage this sort of athletic activity through the CCF Sports Fund. SSBL and the Dairyland Classic are major contributions to our city's LGBT culture and its future," Grosz said.

Changing Suits

IN BETWEEN MEN is a Change in The Right Direction

"New York passing gay marriage is just one small step," says Jennifer Gelfer, director of the hot gay web series, *In Between Men*. "We aim to take the next giant leap."

At first glance, In Between Men doesn't appear to be groundbreaking television. It's often compared to Queer as Folk. But that's a mistake. The impor-

tant difference is that the *Queer as Folk* boys lived in an insular gay world where they ate and breathed the LGBT community. In *In Between Men*, the guys integrate in the mainstream world

the 'straight' world. They're gay and yes, extremely attractive, but they're everyday guys living real lives with people from all walks of life. They're how most gay men truly live - and the normalness portrayed on *In between Men* may just change

the way the mainstream world views the gay community.

Dalton is the lead character of In Between Men. Played by Nick Mathews. Dalton is a young man at the top of his game who finds little in common with the superficiality of most guys in the city. He struggles with a lonely love life, wondering if he should settle for Mr. Almost-Right or hold out for someone better.

Benjamin Reed,

played by the Adonis actor Ben Pamies, is the iconic male figure. He is what gay men want to be and be with. Oversexed and promiscuous but also intelligent and successful, Benjamin is a lov-

ing friend and family man whose looks outshine everything except his career ambition.

The character of Dane, played by Chase Coleman, is the mirror opposite of Reed. He is naïve in love and his pension for chasing after bad boys gets him in trouble.

"So often, gay men look outside themselves for affirmation of worth," says Gelfer. "Gay men are not taught to love themselves. They're told they should be something else, namely 'straight'. Dane is a product of that. He is the American dream – blonde, handsome, and a doctor – but he doesn't allow himself to realize what a catch he really is."

The show points to the one thing people, gay and straight, have in common. We all live in a perpetual state of in-between: in between jobs, in between relationships, friends, family, lovers...

"Everyone is looking for a place to belong, someone to love and a fulfilling career," continues Gelfer. "The world needs to see that gay men are more than the stereotypical camp characters media has portrayed them to be."

"They need to see that gay men are no different than everyone else."




The music video was shot on the morning the Japan earthquake and tsunami hit. We were in


shopping, a matinee; "perhaps a piece of Mahler's."

Much as did Mama Rose, Sheri sees her youngest daughter Tasi (Shannon Lea Smith) as her ticket back into the limelight. To this end, Sheri is tireless in rehearsing Tasi and her gay dance partner Cedric (So You Think You Can Dance winner Benji Schwimmer). Lost in the background is Toni (Laurel Vail), the plain daughter with a heart of gold. Sans even a hint of makeup, Toni's job is to act supportive, keep the peace



and bring home the pizza.

The force of nature that is Sheri is on full display as **Leading Ladies** opens. The cause of her exasperation is a second place finish; for Sheri anything short of winning is totally unacceptable. At stake is the upcoming South-Eastern Midwest Regional Amateur Ballroom Competition. Tasi's nonchalance further taxes her mother's patience but receiving the brunt of her fury is Cedric. "When you finally decide to settle down, no self-respecting young woman is going to want to marry a man who says he's gay."

Tasi, too, has become more and more irritable, directly leading to rehearsal room breakdown of epic, melodramatic proportion. After witnessing one sister slapping the sh*t out of the other, Cedric, in full knight's shining armor, collects poor Toni and delivers her to the ball.

Okay, there might also be just a dash of Cinderella in **Leading Ladies**.

In fact, the ball is actually a hip ballroom dance charged nightclub. Once he's done his duty in delivering Toni, Cedric is off to dance with his very own Prince Charming. Meanwhile, Toni is about to meet her very own Juliet, here

For their debut feature, Teahm Beahm offers an enjoyable rom-com which is both "a feel-good tale" as well as being a "family-friendly film." Boasting an attractive cast and indeed, a very familiar story, **Leading Ladies** really shouldn't have had occasion to put a foot wrong. And nor does it whilst focusing on dance sequences. There's a sensationally sweeping supermarket extravaganza as well as Glenn's favorite moment in the film, when Schwimmer's Cedric gets a moment in the spotlight dancing with his boyfriend.



Say That Again

Dear Uncle Barbie,

I need clarification about your reply to Blue Boy--the guy who wrote you about his confusion regarding his sexual orientation. In your response, you asked him what kind of a person he wanted to become. Are you trying to say that people choose their sexual orientation? **Signed, Need Info.**

Hello N.I.,

Oh, I guess I was not very clear in my last column—sorry. Allow me to clarify. Put simply, I believe people choose their attitude, not their sexual orientation. By that, I mean that although people may choose a positive or negative view of life, they do not choose who turns them on sexually. Nobody can just simply pick and choose who is going to sexually aroused them. You cannot just turn your feelings on and off like that. You cannot wake up one morning and say, "Today, I am going to be attracted to members of the same sex." That would be unreasonable.

However, you do make a choice when it comes to sexual behavior. That should be blazingly obvious because if people did not have any choice regarding their sexual behavior, then they would be having sex as soon as they first felt the urge--in the isle of the supermarket, in restaurants, etc. You would literally be stepping over copulating couples as you walked down the sidewalk. (Hmmm, that makes for an interesting fantasy.)

Anyway, in the earlier letter to which you referred, I was talking about Blue Boy building his character, not picking a sexual orientation. When I asked him what kind of a person he wanted to become, I was addressing what kind of character he wanted to develop. That is a choice.

In fact, it is a culmination of a lifetime of choices. If, for example, everyday you look for the good in people and emphasis the positive qualities in your fellow human beings, then you will, over time, foster an attitude of gratitude.

Of course, the opposite situation is possible as well. We all know of someone who seems to only see the downside to everything. They criticize absolutely everything!—their food, co-workers, friends, government, household products, road conditions, and, of course, the weather. (Don't freak out. I am not talking about you, personally.) These are the people who are never satisfied. Never! That is a negative attitude that they developed over their lifetime, and it can change too. It will take a hell of a lot of work, but it can change.

Basically, if someone wants to change his or her attitude/character, the first and most important thing to tackle is to make personality adjustments. Yes, this can be done. I do not believe that your personality is written in stone forever. Let's look at what actually constitutes personality. I think personality comes down to a marriage of two elements: cognitive patterns and behavioral patterns.

These habits are supposed to serve us—at least they did originally. However, throughout your lifetime, many of them have become dysfunctional and become stumbling blocks. To determine if your behavioral patterns are dysfunctional, ask your self one simple question, "Does this behavior promote personal growth?" If it does not, replace that behavior with something that does serve you. You know how to do this already I'm sure. Most of us have done this time of self-improvement work on the first of each year when we make our New Year's resolutions. The only difference here is that I expect you to follow through.


