



THE QUEER PROGRAM RECEIVES TWO WISCONSIN COMMUNITY MEDIA'S BEST OF THE MIDWEST VIDEO FESTIVAL AWARDS

Milwaukee - The Queer Program, celebrating 20 years as Milwaukee's longest running community interest weekly live public access cable television series, has won two Merit Awards from the Wisconsin Community Media's 15th Annual Best of the Midwest Video Festival. The awards are the equivalent of a 'Bronze' medal in the Fest.

The Queer Program submitted two entries from 2012. 'Weed Dating: The Victory Garden Initiative' aired July 16th and featured guests Gretchen Mead, Director of the Victory Garden Initiative, Paul Fairchild, Executive Director of the Cream City Foundation, and Paul Williams, Co-President of the Milwaukee LGBT Community Center's Board of Directors. The program discussed the collaborative effort of the three organizations in hosting this unique 'Weed Dating' event held the following Saturday, July 21st. The program also focused on the Victory Garden Initiative's mission to empower communities to grow food and establish the relationship of human and food ecology from soil to seed to plate.

The second winning entry, The National Association of Black and white Men Together', aired October 22nd. The program featured guests Mark Behar, National Co-Chair of the NABWMT (and Milwaukee gay community activist) and Darryl Fore, National Co-Chair of the NABWMT from Cleveland, OH. The program focused on the history of the NABWMT since its founding in San Francisco in 1980 and its mission to foster supportive environments wherein cultural and racial barriers can be overcome among its approximately 20 chapters nationwide.

The two live programs were submitted for the Amateur/Student Entry LIVE Category. The mission of Wisconsin Community Media is to recognize outstanding video productions produced by public, education, and government access television staff and community producers and to encourage excellence in community television. The awards will be handed out at the Video Fest Banquet on April 26th.

The mission of The Queer Program is to heighten the visibility of Milwaukee & Wisconsin's LGBT communities through live public access cable television. The Queer Program is produced by Michael Lisowski and sponsored by Gay People's Union, The G/L Community Fund and Cream City Foundation. The Queer Program airs live Mondays through Milwaukee Community Media on Time Warner Cable Channel 96 and AT&T Uverse 99. The Queer Program replays Saturdays Midnight and 10PM. 

Milwaukee Pride Parade seeks \$\$\$ to keep the flags flying this year.

No stranger to budget crunches, and hard times The Milwaukee Pride Parade has had to deal with fiscal woes, denial of areas to be used on parade day without notice, and many other issues. Today, the woes are simply fiscal.

Although attendance and parade entries have been growing every year, revenue does not always keep up with the progress. Last year's parade (Fiscal 2012) lost money. Even with that loss, the board had planned to install the flags for the parade this year as they have been for the past several years. During the year the board looked at ways to trim the budget and still keep a great parade.

Unfortunately, however well a plan is laid, things can always change. This year the Milwaukee Pride Parade lost one of its major corporate sponsors and due to this loss had to make some difficult decisions on where the funds would be cut and if they would have to be cut from this year's parade or risk future years.

After reviewing all "optional" expenses of the parade the Board of Directors agreed that cutting the 2nd Street Pride Flags was the right call

to make to ensure fiscal stability for both this year (2013) and next year (2014).

The Milwaukee Pride Parade pays to have over 100 Pride Flags hung from the light poles on S. 2nd Street for 2 weeks each year. The costs to complete this project are approximately \$4,500 (\$1,000 for the permit and \$3,500 to install/remove them).

Although the Flags have been officially removed from our 2013 Operating budget the Board of Directors began to look for ways to possibly save the flags this year. What they came up with is a 2 "pronged" assault.

The board itself is doubling its efforts to find a replacement sponsor before the deadline to pay for and obtain the Permit for the Flag installations.

A more innovative second approach is a brand new fundraising campaign on Fundrazr.com https://fundrazr.com/campaigns/fUfA9.

The goal for the campaign is to raise \$4,500.00 Before May 17,2013, because that is the last day to reasonably acquire the permit and contract a licensed and bonded installer required by the permit.

"The Milwaukee Pride Parade Board would like to say thank you in advance to all those who can help the parade keep the flags down 2nd Street, and also say Thank you" to the Community of South East Wisconsin, for even though the Campaign literally launched a little over a week ago, the out-pouring of support from fellow organizations has been touching to say the least, stated Parade Coordinator Brent Holmes.

The Milwaukee Pride Parade will be held on Sunday June 9th, 2013 @ 2:00pm from 2nd & Greenfield to 2nd & Oregon St. Applications can be found at www.prideparademke.org.

ARGONAUTS OF WISCONSIN

ONE OF THE OLDEST LGBT ORGANIZATIONS IN WISCONSIN

The club's by-laws state its mission "to bring together persons with a common purpose and inclination for fellowship and advancement of their individual and collective needs." Headquartered on a farm in Hilbert, Wisconsin, a town nearly 30 miles south of Green Bay, is the state's oldest gay organization, the Argonauts of Wisconsin. Founded nearly 40 years ago in 1974 as a Milwaukee leather and Levi motorcycle club, the Argonauts' history reflects the everchanging face of local LGBT life. While today's organization preserves the traditions of its earliest membership, it has become ever more integrated into the community-atlarge.

Originally called the Argonauts of Milwaukee-Green Bay, the founders started the organization on January 18, 1974 in a meeting at the Wreck Room, one of the city's first leather-Levi bars. But, since the membership was largely from Green Bay, the head-quarters was moved there and the name changed to Argonauts of Wisconsin. Bar nights were held in Milwaukee and still are. More recently, the club has expanded its bar night tradition to Madison, Wausau, Oshkosh and Appleton. Future sites include Eau Claire and La Crosse. Beyond Wisconsin the Argonauts are closely engaged with similar groups in Chicago and Minneapolis.

As one of the founding members of the Mid-America Conference of Motorcycle Clubs (MACC), the region's gay leather organization for men and women, the Argonauts have helped form similar organizations in Florida (Key West Wreckers) and in Minneapolis (the Black Guard). They have always been close with the Castaways, the Milwaukee club founded five years after the Argonauts.

Their history tent at Pride Alive, Green Bay's annual Pride celebration, is a treasure trove of Wisconsin leather-Levi history. The club has accumulated so much material over its four decades that some has been donated to the Chicago Leather Archive.

QUEST spoke with current members Steve Jones and Bradley Borresen about Argonaut history, organizational changes and its current status in the state's LGBT community.

Jones has held various offices including

several terms as president over his decades long involvement. "The Argonauts, membership is at its highest ever with 19. The number may seem small but add to that the associate members and the figure swells to nearly 100. Many of the associates are in Wisconsin but others hail from all over the country from Cal-

ifornia to Florida. Membership is more open and younger. Our membership fee is \$30 for associates. It allows the member to wear the Argonaut emblem. Club events are welcoming to everyone," Jones said. "We have also taken on the role of a charitable organization." continues

The Argonauts' community engagement began with its initial response to the AIDS crisis. When first organized the group's public profile was at best restrained. Perhaps as a reaction to the world as it was in 1974, motorcycle clubs in general were insular and almost covert. Membership was highly restricted. Prospective applicants went through a six month pledge period. To those outside the leather-Levi realm, the vision of a leather clad biker on a Harley was intimidating. The 1980 film Cruising starring Al Pacino and set in the gay S&M milieu reinforced the image of leathermen as sexually compulsive outsiders. Homophobia aside, even other segments of the LGBT community, particularly those trying to present gay people as just like straights, marginalized the leather clad bikers.

But, as gay activism helped change the political landscape and the intolerance of LGBT lifestyle began to recede, the Argonauts also became more visible. But it was a national calamity that catapulted the club into prominence. When AIDS first broke out in the early 1980's, the Argonauts took on a leading role in creating a community response. At great expense to its membership, the club sent a contingent to San Francisco, one of the pandemic's epicenters, to




be trained in HIV prevention. They returned and created the Center Project, Inc (CPI), the first HIV clinic in Green Bay. It was located next to the Napalese Lounge, the club's home bar. Later, as the crisis grew and outside funding became available, CPI became part of ARCW (Aids Resource Center of Wisconsin), eventually moving to a much larger, new location.

With federal funding in place for HIV/AIDS, and now well-versed in organizing, the Argonauts dedicated its fund raising to other needy groups. "Over the decades our community support role and charitable giving has grown. We help area individuals, agencies and groups like Rainbow

Over Wisconsin and Pride Alive (Green Bay's Pride event) among many others. The club still supports ARCW with two annual food drives to stock the food pantry. We also have our annual nine-day Easter Egg fundraiser. But we're not alone. We've always had wonderful support from drag queens, lesbians, and everyone. We're a tight knit community," Jones said.

Runs and Events

The Argonauts/Castaways Joint Run is its annual, 3-day (and nights!) summer gathering. Back in the days when most members owned a motorcycle, the Run was a traditional, club-exclusive summer meeting. For the Argonauts, the destination is a farm outside of Green Bay. "It has always been quite the party. Over the years it has grown. Nowadays fewer members have bikes so some come in cars and RV's. It's a family reunion with well over 100 people from other clubs. The public is now invited as well. One group that attends is the Tennessee Leather Tribe from Memphis. They provide a barbecue!" Jones said. The site has changed over the years as well. Currently, the club's 2story barn can accommodate a 250 seat banquet replete with a bar and kitchen. It also provides bunk space and a patio deck



with a bonfire pit.

Some of the many activities include Argonaut Club Nights at local bars, joint events held in collaboration with other regional leather/ Levi clubs. The regular Club Night is the second Friday of each month at their home bar, Napalese Lounge in Green Bay. Winter Quest, an anniversary dinner, is held the 3rd Saturday of every January

Titles

The leather-Levi community has always held contests. The Argonauts own three state and regional titles: Wisconsin Leather/Levi Daddy, Wisconsin Leather/Levi Daddy's boy and Mr. Northwoods. Holding a local title qualifies the Wisconsin winner for the International Mr. Leather or International Leather Sir boy contests. Beyond the competitive qualifications, the contests and awards, the titles come with certain obligations to the community.

Bradley Borresen currently holds the Wisconsin Leather/Levi Daddy title. An Argonaut for just two years he is also the clubs corresponding secretary. He joined to connect with people in the leather community. "I find them more open minded than others. In Green Bay people regard leather as a fetish. But everyone has a fetish...drag queens, straight people," Borresen said.

When asked why he competed for a title, his answer was immediate. "I ran for the title to call attention to the fact that Green Bay has a leather crowd. I always get on-line questions about the lifestyle. Nobody wants to be judged and up here it's more difficult to meet people, especially if you have an interest outside the mainstream. Today with the internet it's actually more difficult. Before people went to the bars and interacted, now they stay home at the computer. Leather groups are folding for lack of membership. So the idea is to let people know there's a leather group and it's okay. We don't need 100 members and you don't have to be a member to attend events. Like drag gueens we do what we do for the benefit of the community."


Borresen's role as Mr. Wisconsin Leather Levi Daddy title holder also gives him a voice. His service as a title holder focuses on bullying and he is creating his own anti-bullying campaign. "I grew up in a very small community and was the victim of bullying. It's tough growing up gay in that sort of environment. All the way

through school people in that position are bullied. Teasing, poking, jokes...it brings you down so far. It's something that affects everyone's adult life. Whether the bully or the bullied you grow up with a false sense of how life works. It's hard on the bullied, of course, but there are consequences for the bully as well. People don't realize it stays with you your whole life. Facebook has provided me with people from my past and I communicate with someone who bullied me. His life now isn't so great." His campaign strategy is still in the planning stage. "I'm connecting with bars to plan

events, talking to people at Pride. As a bartender and through my Facebook page I talk to a lot of people. We're always involved with fundraisers but I think raising awareness through direct communication is just as important. But it's hard to get people to listen," Borresen said.

PRIDEFEST MILWAUKEE IN THE HOME STRETCH

Organizers Tidy up Details in Final Month before Gates Open – even launch a New Stage

Milwaukee - With just over one month to go, the production team at PrideFest Milwaukee is making their final push to the opening of the gates. (June 7-8-9) Contracts are still being worked out, menus planned, speakers booked, and volunteers contacted for available openings.

"We always find ourselves in between this feeling over being overwhelmed, and of being totally energized and ready to bring it home!" says Festival Director Pete Minns about the final weeks leading up to the festivals start. "We do have an incredible team. Every year, these folks come back and dedicate hours and hours of volunteer time to organize, and run this three day festival. And every year, it's a great time."

Last year, organizers set some pretty high personal festival bests, even after publically acknowledging that things have been difficult at times. Board President Scott Gunkel has praised the Board and the team this year for making "smart and responsible cost reductions." Having done so has allowed the organizers to not only bring in top entertainment, but also launch a new stage.

Pop icon Andy Bell of Erasure will be the Miller Lite Main stage headliner on Friday, June 7, in an opening night show that also stars Sophie B. Hawkins and ABBA Salute. Saturday, June 8, the legendary Indigo Girls hit the stage, and Sunday June 9, outspoken supporter of LGBT and women's rights, Amanda Palmer closes out the festival after Dangerous Muse opens with electropop dance sounds and sexy stage theatrics never before seen on the Miller Lite Main stage. Other artists performing over the weekend include God-Des & She. Beverly McCellan, Big Bad Gina, DJ Grind, Bag Romance show, Something to Do, and Wisconsin's own first lady of Rock - Ronnie Nyles and Tallulah Who. among others. A full lineup can be found on pridefest.com.

Following last year's success with the new stage area Wom!nz Spot Lounge and Café, organizers are again branching out and this year will launch The Riviera Maya Stage. Sponsored by La Nueva Ritmo, the stage focus will be to highlight the multicultural dimension of the LGBT and Straight community. "This multicultural stage is dedicated to presenting musical groups from diverse backgrounds," says Board Member Francisco Araiza. "We wanted a place to showcase different nationalities, ethnicities, languages, and religions, and by showcasing our diversity, we hope to find the commonalities that make the fabric that forms one worldwide LGBT and Straight community." The stage will be open each night and will feature Latin and hip hop artists, as well as DJs.

Festival tickets are already on sale, and for an extra close up experience, headliner shows are also available for reserved seating. The reserved ticket price also includes the gate ticket fee. Festivalgoers also will have the option of adding \$1 to their ticket purchases to support the Milwaukee LGBT Community Center's greatest needs fund. "We may not always have the best budgets to work with from year to year," says Gunkel, but we do have a great opportunity here to reach out to as many people as possible." The Milwaukee LGBT Community Center has battled back from financial woes over the last year with a strong and dedicated board and staff, and the option to add a \$1 charge to tickets purchased on pridefest.com was a way for PrideFest to help raise funds for the center. "The Festival itself is always in need of donors, and sponsors to help open the gates, but we also want to support our community while we have the chance."

You can support them both by logging onto pridefest.com and purchasing your tickets to this year's festival. By doing so in advance, you save \$3 off the admission price at the gate (\$13 online/\$16 gate) or you can purchase a three day weekend pass and save big at only \$30. Single-day VIP passes, which includes access to the exclusive Potawatomi Bingo Casino VIP Deck, will be \$100 advance, or \$225 or the three-day weekend. Opportunities also exist for both individuals to sponsor, as well as business who wish to sponsor. Sponsor levels include anything from VIP tickets to business logo placements online.





NEW ON DVD Yossi & Jagger (2002) also Yossi (2012) Reviewe

How do you go on living after you lose the love of your life? Ten years have passed, yet that's the dilemma continuing to plague Yossi Guttman (Ohad Knoller) in Eytan Fox's new film **Yossi**, a sequel to his 2002 cinematic breakthrough, **Yossi & Jagger**.

Gay love stories do not get much better than Yossi & Jagger. The place is the snowy, barren landscape of the Israeli-Lebanese border. Yossi (Ohad Knoller) is the quintessentially tough-asnails army commander whose gruff exterior belies his deep concern for all those under his command. Lior a.k.a. Jagger (Yehuda Levi) is his second in command, a sweet, fun loving kid whose good looks, easy smile and outgoing personality have made him a favorite with everyone in camp.

Unabashedly gay, Jagger is truly, madly, deeply in love with Yossi, planning for the time they are out of the army and won't have to hide their relationship. Yossi is decidedly less certain. A career soldier, he has had to hide his sexuality for too long. Only on those rare occasions he and Jagger are away from the rest of their battalion, can he actually remember what it is to smile, have fun, to be happy.

After one such occasion, tragedy strikes when a night mission goes terribly wrong; Jagger dying in Yossi's arms.

In the years since leaving the army, Yossi has trained to be a cardiologist.

Yet the intervening ten years have not been kind to Yossi. Although still played by Ohad Knoller, he is barely recognizable; he's moonfaced, decidedly pudgy and decked out with a scraggly beard.

At the hospital he's well-liked but a total worka-

holic, often sleeping in spare hospital rooms between his shifts; refusing to take vacations. Intensely private, he rebuffs the advances of a sweet nurse (Ola Schur-Selektar) harboring for him an unrequited love Yossi is far too clueless to recognize. Yossi also rebuffs the best efforts of a colleague who seems to think Yossi will be right as rain if only he can get Yossi to let his hair down, knock back a couple of cocktails and bed some suitable female.

Nor does Yossi's home offer much of a refuge. In the hands of director Eytan Fox and cinematographer Guy Raz, Yossi's apartment is spartan, deeply claustrophobic and shrouded in gloom. For dinner he fixes himself a mountain of pasta, and later, in the dark, he impassively watches (really boring) gay porn.

"That's some life you carved out for yourself," one of Glenn's acquaintances was heard to utter.

One night Yossi musters up the courage to take a stab at online dating; he remains closeted so of course his profile is sans photo. Yet even an internet novice such as Glenn knows that a glimpse of the goods is required for a successful hookup. Innocently perhaps, Yossi chooses a favorite if not a particularly recent photo; a choice which leads to an encounter both awkward and embarrassing.

Thankfully at this point Itay Segal's screenplay has a surprise up its proverbial sleeve. Yossi's somnolent existence is shattered when he comes face-to-face with Jagger's mother (Orly Silbersatz Banai) at the hospital as a patient.

She, however, doesn't recognize Yossi as her son's commander. And really, how could she?

Yet this reacquaintance with Jagger's family

Can this gorgeous leads Yossi to hit the road, to go to Eilat, the rea a way to love again?

Buy it, rent it, or forget it ...

Yossi & Jagger has long been one of Glenn's favorite films, truly a Gay Film Essential and certainly a must for any collection. Director Eytan Fox has gotten fine performances from his exceptionally attractive cast whilst taking a simple narrative and turning it into a truly memorable gay love story. Of Yossi, Glenn remains less convinced.

If his love for Jagger proved to be something of an awaking for Yossi, the ten years without him has left Yossi mired in grief and perhaps guilt; the extent of Yossi's physical transformation and joyless existence is, in a word, startling.

Not that Yossi isn't a sympathetic figure. Perhaps sensing the all-persuasive sadness that surrounds him, his hospital colleagues walk around him as if on eggshells. Indeed, when focusing the minutiae of Yossi's daily existence, Itay Segal's episodic screenplay is on firm ground.

All bets are off once Yossi hits the road. Allusions to **Death in Venice** feel at best clumsy and at worst, overly melodramatic.

The introduction of Tom (Oz Zehavi) and his army buddies does breathe some much needed life into the film. Yet Glenn is at a loss to understand just what attracts the young and impossibly beautiful Tom to the depressed, humorless Yossi. Could it be that hot, hunky Israeli soldiers have a thing for pudgy, middle-aged gay men?

If so, Glenn wants to know where to sign up!

JEFF'S SLOW-COOKED FRENCH ONION SOUP

Jeff is a regular at my HamBingo show at Hamburger Mary's in Bay View. It's always great to see him, but you can't imagine how thrilled I was when he brought me a cup of this fantastic slow-cooked soup! He created the recipe himself, and it's actually better than some I've tried at restaurants! Thanks Jeff. Your free Bitchin' Kitchen T-shirt is on the way!

4 tablespoons butter

3 pounds large sweet onions, chopped

1 tablespoon granulated sugar

2-1/2 garlic cloves, minced

1-1/2 tablespoons flour

2 teaspoons salt

2-1/2 teaspoons fresh ground black pepper

1 tablespoon Worcestershire sauce

1-1/2 tablespoons sherry cooking wine

1-3/4 cups Cabernet Sauvignon

10 cups water

1 -1/2 teaspoons dried thyme

4 packets (.35oz ea) Swanson Beef Boost

1/4 cup instant beef bouillon Shredded cheese, croutons for garnish

Melt butter in a large deep skillet. Add onions and sauté over medium-high heat for 10 minutes. Add sugar and stir frequently for an additional 10 minutes. Add garlic; sauté another 5 minutes. Slowly stir in flour and remove from heat.

In a large bowl, combine the salt, black pepper, Worcestershire sauce, wines, water, thyme, Beef Boost and bouillon. Add onion mixture.

Spritz a slow cooker with nonstick cooking spray; add soup. Cook on low, covered, for 7 hours. Top individual servings with garnishes.

Jeff uses light butter when making his recipe. He also recommends garnishing individual servings with shredded Swiss or gruyere cheese. "You may even want to broil individual servings in oven safe bowls," he adds. "Broil the servings until the cheese turns golden brown."

DUNK-A-ROO DIP

Here's a sweet treat from Dan of Racine. "I found the recipe on the Internet, but it's easy, fast and good," he says. The three-ingredient dip is perfect for a dessert or for adding a sweet bite to a savory appetizer buffet.

1 box (18.9 ounces) Funfetti cake mix 2 cups plain yogurt

1 container (8 ounces) Cool Whip, thawed Sliced fruit

In a large bowl combine the first three ingredients. Serve with sliced fruit. Refrigerate leftovers.

Ruthie's Culinary Clues

Do not add the ingredients called for when baking a cake...you only need the actual cake mix. Stir in a drop or two of vanilla extract to the dip if you'd like. You could also serve this dip with animal crackers or graham crackers. You could even add additional sprinkles to the dip for more color!

That's right boys and girls it's May and that means just one short month before pride. While I am on the topic of these organizations I just want to extend my personal thanks to all of the people involved with each organization. Both of these organizations are run 100% by volunteers and require huge time commitments from all of their members. Both Pridefest and the Pride Parade work year round to make sure that everything will be perfect for the coming year. So, next time you see a volunteer for either

Pridefest or the Pride Parade (Or ANY volunteer organization for that matter) let them know how much you appreciate their hard work.

Okay let's get to it. This month I figured we should talk about a new piercing fad which seems to be taking the world by storm. They are called Dermal Anchors. Now I'm not going to call them piercings because in reality they are not the true definition of what they are is a "Trans-dermal Implant." I know that's a big word for a lot of my readers so we will bring it down a level or 10. What that really means is that there is a piece of metal permanently implanted under your skin and then different "Ends" can be screwed on to the base. That's right I said permanent, once these piercings heal they need to be surgically removed by cutting the skin which holds them in. A not so fun and not so painless procedure I might add.

Dermal Anchors have a few additional concerns over a traditional piercing. For starters when they are removed, or if they migrate (reject), they will leave a larger and more noticeable scar than a traditional piercing. Additionally, Dermal Anchors go deeper into the body than a traditional piercing and thus the risk of bleeding and bruising to the site of the piercing is increased dramatically.

The care of Dermal Anchors also varies from that of traditional piercings. First and foremost the body needs time to heal and begin to grow new tissue to hold in the anchor, for this reason you should wear a small band-aid over the anchor to prevent it from falling out for the first 2 weeks. After that you should wear the band-aid for another 2 weeks when you sleep. If you toss

and turn in your sleep you should continue to wear the band-aid every night when you go to bed. As for cleaning it use an anti-bacterial soap and gently clean around, and under the "head" of, the jewelry once to twice daily. The best time to do this is at the end of your shower after you have shampooed and body washed.


I have been reading your column for a long time and there is one thing I have to ask. How do you come up with the ideas for your column and why do you have such an attitude about it? --John




