GAY RIGHTS LAW MAKER COMES TO APPLETON

Appleton, WI –Bradley Lambie, a board member for Positive Voice, has organized a panel discussion with OutReach LGBT Community Center Executive Director, Steve Starkey, to honor and celebrate those that were pioneers in the gay rights movement in Wisconsin.

The panel will include Lloyd Schaefer, Mike Fitzpatrick, Steve Starkey, Fay Ferington, Wayne Gathright, and none other than history maker himself, David Clarenbach.

David Clarenbach was the State of Wisconsin Representative that wrote the gay rights law, the first in U.S. history. With the help from other politicians, organizations, and Republican Governor Lee Dreyfus, it was passed in 1982.

The panel will be discussing their struggles and achievements over the past several decades in LGBT History, showing us what it means to have pride in our community and what our goals should be for the future.

"It is important for young LGBT people to know what society was like for LGBT people before the Stonewall rebellion and during the early days of the gay rights movement," says Steve. "A lot of struggle and sacrifice was made so that this important civil rights issue could progress, and we could begin to make progress on the long march to equality."

"The legal and political protections and acceptance that LGBT people had to face, are now taken for granted," Steve continues. "The result of the driving force of previous activists took a lot of blood, sweat and tears that were shed by many LGBT leaders over the past 40 years to advance this cause. We want to show the younger generation what it took to be able to give them a voice today."

Jesse, facilitator at harmony Café and also Positive Voice board member, says, "Hopefully our Trail Blazer Event will have just as much impact as the Transgender panel that took place at the Positive Voice Annual Board meeting."

"It was very powerful and inspiring," Jesse continues, "The panelists presented challenges for PV to be more Trans inclusive in our outreach, programming and planning, while affirming that we are making an impact through our monthly Transgender Transformation programs. Our intention is that through these events and just our presence alone in North East WI will continue to be one of inclusiveness for everyone."

"I'm just glad that I am able to make a difference in my community," says Bradley. "Through this discussion, I will be happy to learn about the panelist's history. This will give me more pride in myself and also in the Fox Valley."

THE MILWAUKEE PRIDE PARADE & CREAM CITY FOUNDATION HOST STONEWALL REBELLION VETERANS AS HONORARY GRAND MARSHALS FOR PARADE.

Milwaukee, WI – The Milwaukee Pride Parade has announced a partnership with Cream City Foundation (creamcityfoundation.org) to bring two veterans of the stonewall rebellion to Milwaukee as honorary grand marshals of the 2013 Milwaukee Pride Parade. The guests of honor are Williamson Lee Henderson and AnDre M. Christie.

Williamson Lee Henderson is a unique, educated, talented, energetic, innovative, effective and unsinkable GLBT leader. When he receives an acknowledgment or an award, it is earned and deserved and not from a pretentious bureaucratic position or palery. For determination, who else do you know who could keep a car -- and in great condition -- for four decades? That reality is motivated mostly by the car's historical Stonewall significance. Williamson can accurately boast that he has been a Gay, Bisexual and Transgender leader and innovator for an intense, diverse and extensive threeplus decades, giving him the pragmatic experience rarely found in the Gay community. There is much more to Williamson than his daring 1969 Stonewall Rebellion history on the very first night of the spontaneous uprising. Anyone who knows Williamson Henderson is not surprised at his courage, outspokenness and leadership. Personally, he does not regard his successful efforts at the rebellion as "heroic", though many others do. Some, queerly enough, are even envious! Williamson regards that watershed event as "...destined happenstance but reacting in a right, just and forceful way. Look, with as much as I was at The Stonewall -my favorite Gay club then, and now -- if anyone was gonna get caught up in that invasion, the odds were that it would be me! That was my meeting place. It was my second home. When my friends from all five New York City boroughs, Long Island and New Jersey were going out any given night and we had to decide where to meet, I always said: We'll meet at The Stonewall Club -- analogous to "We'll meet at the Yellow Brick Road". If you want to see me, that's where I'll be. And, trust me, the straight ones went, too!"

AnDre M. Christie("AMC"), originally from Hellshire Beach, Jamaica, came to America as a young child. Some of his immediate family moved to Philadelphia, Pennsylvania. Some moved to The Bronx, New York City. He lived in both! AnDre was a Youth-4-SVA Coordinator from June of 2003 to July of 2008. Since then, he has been the S.V.A. Office Manager. AnDre, in collaboration with S.V.A. officials, regularly represents the STONEWALL Veterans' Association ("S.V.A.") at various events, meetings, symposiums, tributes, seminars, dinners, forums, parades, street fairs, luncheons, interviews, conferences, bruncheons, celebrations, fund-raisers, rallies, commemorations, parties, memorials, etc.

Williamson and AnDre will be honored in the parade for their spirit and dedication during the stonewall riots as well as in their advocacy in the years since. The Milwaukee Pride Parade is elated to have these two leaders of the LGBT movement with us for 2013, and we would like to thank Cream City Foundation for making this idea a reality.

Williamson and AnDre will also be Honorary Grand Marshals of the 2013 Milwaukee Pride Parade. Which will take place on Sunday June 9th, 2013 with step off happening at 2:00pm Sharp The Stonewall rebellion were a series of spontaneous, violent demonstra-

tions by members of the gay community against a police raid that took place in the early morning hours of June 28, 1969, at the Stonewall Inn, in the Greenwich Village neighborhood of New York City. They are widely considered to constitute the single most important event leading to the gay liberation movement and the modern fight for gay and lesbian rights in the United States.

American gays and lesbians in the 1950s and 1960s faced a legal system more anti-homosexual than those of some Warsaw Pact countries. Early homophile groups in the U.S. sought to prove that gay people could be assimilated into society, and they favored non-confrontational education for homosexuals and heterosexuals alike. The last years of the 1960s, however, were very contentious, as many social movements were active, including the African American Civil Rights Movement, the Counterculture of the 1960s, and anti-war demonstrations. These influences, along with the liberal environment of Greenwich Village, served as catalysts for the Stonewall rebellion.

Very few establishments welcomed openly gay people in the 1950s and 1960s. Those that did were often bars, although bar owners and managers were rarely gay. The Stonewall Inn, at the time, was owned by the Mafia. It catered to an assortment of patrons, but it was known to be popular with the poorest and most marginalized people in the gay community: drag gueens, representatives of a newly self-aware transgender community, effeminate young men, male prostitutes, and homeless youth. Police raids on gay bars were routine in the 1960s, but officers quickly lost control of the situation at the Stonewall Inn, and attracted a crowd that was incited to riot. Tensions between New York City police and gay residents of Greenwich Village erupted into more protests the next evening, and again several nights later. Within weeks, Village residents quickly organized into activist groups to concentrate efforts on establishing places

for gays and lesbians to be open about their sexual orientation without fear of being arrested.

After the Stonewall rebellion, gays and lesbians in New York City faced gender, class, and generational obstacles to becoming a cohesive community. Within six months, two gay activist organizations were formed in New York, concentrating on confrontational tactics, and three newspapers were established to promote rights for gays and lesbians. Within a few years, gay rights organizations were founded across the U.S. and the world. On June 28, 1970, the first Gay Pride marches took place in Los Angeles, Chicago, and New York commemorating the anniversary of the rebellion. Similar marches were organized in other cities. Today, Gay Pride events are held annually throughout the world toward the end of June to mark the Stonewall rebellion.

On Second Thought... Diversity is in the Mind of the Beholder

News of the progress of LGBT equality has gotten to be an almost daily affair. Minnesota and Delaware now endorse same-sex marriage (making a total of 12 plus the District of Columbia). Other States are in the offing, poised to do the same. A gay NBA player comes out. The Boy Scouts of America allow gay scouts and there are more happy gay characters on TV, even in cartoons, than ever before. Then it shouldn't be a surprise, when, in my interview with a curator of the Milwaukee Art Museum's next exhibition, 30 Americans, he dismisses the relevance of the fact that over half of the artists in the show identify as LGBT. It's 2013 after all and our society is by nature diverse. It's no surprise or even newsworthy that there are gay people in the arts. Scoff... tut tut...

There's an argument to be made that, yes, we, the LGBT community, have moved beyond past oppression. Just like Irish Catholics, the Jews and African Americans, we no longer have to be concerned about discrimination or equality. We can vote, keep a job, live where we want, and love whomever we choose in a blissful state of that constitutionally guaranteed pursuit of happiness we've read about. Given our universal state of diversity, why even celebrate PrideFest or have an exhibit of black artists, let alone gay ones?

But consider this...although a dozen States offer marriage equality, we live in one that has an anti-gay constitutional amendment. Nationwide, only does a handful of Republican politicians embrace LGBT rights and there's but a single out gay NBA jock. If we are one big melting pot of unencumbered diversity then why does Comprehensive Immigration Reform teeter on the brink of failure when a Democratic senator wants to extend partnership rights to LGBT people? Why do the Boy Scouts of America accept gay scouts but not gay leaders? Why does a Milwaukee billboard campaign to combat the alarming rate of new HIV infection among young African Americans use a euphemistic and avoidant abbreviation, MSM, for "men having sex with men" and not the word "gay"? I can answer the last question by quoting a chorus of black LGBT personalities who admit "our community isn't ready for it."

In fact, despite those dozen States with marriage equality, an out professional athlete and, *perhaps*, the end of DOMA, the reality is our hard fought snippets of equal rights are tentative at best. A gay man's murder in the heart of New York City's Greenwich Village, a recently published anti-gay children's book, and the rabidly anti-gay Republican political platform that seeks to amend the federal constitution to ban same-sex marriage, restore Don't Ask Don't Tell, and defend DOMA all serve as reminders of reality. It wouldn't take much to reverse that warm and fuzzy sense of diversity some seem to enjoy.

Some strata of the greater American demographic may blithely enjoy the fruits of diversity. But others, under the duress of real life, grapple with lesser privilege. Artists deliberately express their LGBT orientation in their art. We celebrate it at PrideFest. We value and defend our particular difference, all too aware, that, even in 2013, equality is not a given.

Milwaukee, WI – Tuesday, May 14, 2013 – Proud Theater, a Lesbian, Gay, Bisexual, Transgender, Queer/Questioning, Intersexed and Allied youth theater organization in Wisconsin, announced today that all three current Proud Theater chapters in the state will be performing together for the first time at the Milwaukee Pride Festival being held in June on the Summerfest grounds in Milwaukee.

The groups will be doing three joint performances on Saturday, June 8, 2013 on the Milwaukee LGBT Community Center' Community Room Stage at 1PM, 2PM and 4PM. Each performance will be 45 minutes long and will showcase original skits, poetry, and music developed by the youth involved with each chapter.

"We are incredibly excited to be invited to showcase our youth this year", said Proud Theater Executive Director Brian Wild in a recent interview. "It has long been a dream of mine to see LGBTQIA youth from all over the state tell their stories in a public forum, and this is the perfect opportunity to introduce our work to the Milwaukee community at large."

Founded in Madison Wisconsin in 1999, Proud Theater is an award-winning, exciting and innovative youth theater program whose mission is 'to change the world through the power of theater and the theater arts, and to make a positive difference in the lives of LGBTQ and allied youth through the tenets of art, heart, and activism' and is open to youth ages 13 to 19 that identify as lesbian, gay, bisexual, transgender, queer/questioning, Intersexed or who are allied with the queer community (LGBTQIA). The organization encourages youth to share their stories through original theatrical works which they then present to the community at large throughout the year.

The organization opened its first satellite chapter in Wausau, Wisconsin back in October of 2011 and recently expanded into the Milwaukee area with the assistance and support of the Milwaukee LGBT Community Center, 1110 North Market Street in Milwaukee, Wisconsin. This will be Proud Theater Milwaukee's first public appearance since its initial soft launch in April of 2013.

The Proud Theater Madison troupe is about to open its new show 'Proud Theater: Fearless Hearts' which runs May 30 31, and June 1, 2013 - 7:30 PM in the Black Box Theatre of the Stream Building at Edgewood College, 1000 Edgewood College Drive in Madison, Wisconsin. They also have a special matinee on June 1 at 2:30 PM. Proud Theater – Wausau will hold its 2nd show July 12 and 13, 2013 in Wausau.

PRIDE IN MUSIC: NewNowNext Favorites Sir Ari Gold & Garek

Fans of cutting-edge pop culture, music and videos who want know about the "next big thing" regularly turn their screens to the gay-friendly LOGO cable TV network's NewNowNext programming for the latest news and celebrity gossip. For this year's Pride issue, *Quest's* Mike Fitzpatrick had the opportunity to speak with two talented gay musicians living in New York City who are at markedly different points of their careers. The one thing they hold in common: the buzz created by NewNowNext.

First up is Sir Ari Gold, the 36 year-old New York native who holds the distinction of having more #1 videos on LOGO than any other artist — including such notables as Lady Gaga, Cher, George Michael or Madonna. Gold has released five albums since 2001. 2011's "Between the Spirit & the Flesh" spawned the controversial video "My Favorite Religion" and yielded two of Sir Ari's LOGO number ones.

The "Religion" video was certainly one of factors that led to Gold receiving the "Visionary Award" recognizing both his musical career and his ongoing activism in support of full gay equality at the LGBT Academy of Recording Arts (LARA) OUTMusic Awards in August 2012. Another factor may have been Gold's "Rosa Parks" moment in June 2011 where he refused to comply with a bigoted bus driver's demands to stop holding hands with his partner while on a trip to visit family in upstate New York. The story of the driver stopping the bus, calling the police, and fellow passengers' supporting the couple made the national news in publications such as the Village Voice and The Advocate. Gold also has been a tireless supporter of those living with HIV/AIDS.

Sir Ari's latest album "Play My F**kn Remix" hit the streets June 4 and in part honors his Visionary Award. The 14-track album includes twelve remixes of his Billboard Top 10 singles including "Where The Music Takes You" as well as two previously unreleased new songs, "Details Of My Life" and "Love Goddess (Tribute to Marilyn)."

The album also features photographic art by celebrity photographer Mike Ruiz, who LOGO fans should remember from his two seasons on gay reality series "The A-List: New York." Additional shots from Gold's steamy photo session can be seen on Ruiz' new Android smart phone and tablet app,

Pretty Masculine, just released on Google Play. Of course, *Quest* readers can enjoy the shots that accompany this article.

A new 3D music video of the lead single from the album, "Play My F**kn Record (Country Club Martini Radio Mix)," offers fans a glimpse at Gold's more "cheeky" side. The video will feature, among other things, Gold going *au naturale* and showing – some might say – the singer's more feminine side. Six versions of the song are available as a maxi-single, sold separately on iTunes and Amazon.

Sir Ari explained his decision for the project noting, "I like the idea of a retrospective remix album because it at once pays respect to my past but keeps an ear toward the future. It's kind of shocking to realize that 20 years had passed between the first wave of superstar acts like George Michael, Boy George and Elton John came out, and current acts like Adam Lambert and Ricky Martin. I feel so honored to have been a proud voice in pop music during a time when we didn't have enough."

After a bit of "email tag," Quest caught up with Sir Ari who was in Vienna for the 21st edition of Life Ball, the biggest annual charity event held in Europe benefiting AIDS service organizations across the continent that support people living with HIV. Europe is also where promotion for Gold's new album will begin.



Quest: First of all, congratulations on your latest single, "Play My F**kn Record." It is truly ear candy! I have been listening to the Country Club Martini Mix over and over. It deserves mainstream airplay! If Lily Allen and Cee Lo Green can hit the pop charts so should you! Are you hoping for wider airplay?

Gold: Thank you! Cee Lo recorded a version of "Fuck You" for radio that didn't have the "F" word in it ("Forget You") so maybe if I want mainstream airplay I may have to record a version called "Play My Funky Record" or maybe "Play My Funky Record White Boy!"

Quest: You have a 3-D video of "Play My F**kn Record" coming out as Quest hits the streets in June. Tell me a little about and what will people need to get the full effect?


Gold: My director Francis Legge tells me that depending on the setting, you can watch the 3D version with the old school red and blue 3D glasses, the new fangled ones, or if you have a 3D TV. They all should work.

Quest: Word has it that the new video is pretty racy. You've pushed the envelope before – last year's "My Favorite Religion" video showed off what quite a few You Tube fans called your "killer ass." The cover pic for "Play My F**ken Record" hid the fact that you let it all hang out. Will there be any mystery left after we see the new video?

Gold: I think there's always a mystery. A photograph or even a video does not tell you what being up close and personal does. And even then, some people always hold mystery even if you've been intimate with them. We can never fully know each other or even ourselves. Didn't Madonna once say, "Life is a mystery?"

Quest: Looking at the shots Quest will be including with this interview, you are looking hotter than ever. What's your secret – workouts, diet or ???

Gold: I've been blessed with some good Jewish genes and people seem to be surprised that I don't have any hair on my chest. I think its an Eastern European thing. But I keep it up with rigorous workouts with weights about 3-4 times a week and I've taken to running more lately.

Quest: "Play My F**kn Record" is the lead-off track on your new retrospective album "Play My F**kn Remix," dropping June 4. It's hard to believe you've been making music for over a decade. It's got all your Billboard Hits in new remixed versions. What led to your decision to offer up new versions of some of our old favorites?

Gold: I wanted to pay respect to my past with an ear toward the future. The album has a brand new version of my first song, "Wave Of You" that I re-recorded the vocals for as well. I came out and and came of age in the clubs so this album pays homage to the dance music that helped my own personal liberation. Dance music and house music are really the soundtrack to our freedom.

Quest: Will you be touring to promote the album? If so, will there be any Midwest dates?

Gold: I'm kicking off "Sir Ari's F**kn Tour" in Berlin, Germany, coming back to my hometown in New York City on June 14th and hoping the Midwest will try to get me out to perform for them! Its up to the fans!

Quest: Speaking of old favorites, I checked out the video of your vintage George M Cohan moves on the Joe Franklin Show. I know it used as part of your autobiographical multimedia show in 2011. However, you continue to make that video available to your fans today, so that performance must mean a lot to you. What do you see in that eager six year old kid that lives with you yet today?

Gold: I like the idea that I am this little gay Jewish boy performing this very All-American standard. Its evidence that what we deem as "American" is in fact more layered and complex then we think and a reminder of what this country was truly founded on, which is basically about people coming to this country to have a dream. It also reminds me that I was born to do what I do, but I also always see the shyness at the very end of my performance which reminds me of the humility and gratitude I feel to do what I do.

Quest: You have always made it very clear that you are an openly-gay artist. As more and more of the creative community becomes open about their sexuality, what does it mean to be an openly-gay artist in 2013?

Gold: I wish I could say that I don't feel the responsibility to represent openly gay artists as much in music because now there are so many, but there really aren't. Yes, we do have more than we used to and I love the fact that someone like Adam Lambert can come off the "American Idol" platform and be openly gay, but I still feel like there aren't enough voices out there and there isn't enough music that is exploring what it really means to live life as a gay man at this time.

Quest: Is there anything else you'd like to share with our readers?

Gold: I just feel so thankful to have had this amazing career during such an important time in the history of our fight for equal rights and feel so grateful to all the fans who have felt my message has been been empowering for them.


If Sir Ari Gold's decade-plus retrospective project is one side of the musical career coin, Wisconsin native Garek's certainly would be the other. Garek's debut video "Save The Queen" caught the eye of the Big Apple's gay culture reporter Mark Blankenship who penned a NewNowNext profile about the singer and his music last December.

Blankenship characterized the 25 year-old Garek (an amalgam of his birth name Garrett Kotecki) as "the newest member of the Rock and Roll Freak Show," predicting the singer's "vicious pop-rock music and artfully degenerate style could be blowing up very soon."

"Save The Queen" will be the lead off single of Garek's six-song EP "Take The King," which originally had been planned to drop in January but has been delayed. It's an unfortunate turn of events as Blankenship rhapsodized about the distinctive quality of Garek's music, writing the "the song 'Save The Queen' fuses crunchy rock verses with a shout-along chorus you can sing with your friends. That makes it more accessible than your typical Marilyn Manson track, but the dark, power-hungry lyrics keep it menacing."

Garek's fans can still savor the video available on YouTube, along with clip of another song from the EP ("Cavity") and a live performance of 'Save The Queen.' A week prior to the Gold interview, *Quest* had the opportunity to speak directly with an exhausted and exhilarated Garek, as he wiped runny black and silver make-up and mascara from his face following his triumphant mini-concert to a packed house at Club XS in Green Bay May 19. In between catching up with

friends from his hometown who came for the show and flirting with a heavy-set Harley rider, Garek shared a bit of his experience as he tries to break out the emerging artist pack.

Quest: Is the "Save The Queen" video just a video at this point, or will it be available commercially on venues like iTunes, Google Play and so on?

Garek: The video was something my friends and I made that we thought was cool because we like the song. I guess I could put it up somewhere if people want it.

Quest: Is there a larger album coming out containing the song at some point?

Garek: We're working on an EP right now. We have six songs done. We're also working on some new stuff. But there are some things regarding distribution, how we're going to do it. I want to put it out tomorrow. I want to put it out right now, but the people I'm working with want to do it right. That takes time and patience which I have very little of.

Quest: So how does a boy from Pound, Wisconsin find his way to New York City?

Garek: Boy from Pound gets tired of Pound and wants a scene change. Then he gets one and ends up in New York City. He gets his ass kicked a few times but it works out.

Quest: What is on the horizon? You were at Club 5 in Madison last night, and here at Club XS in Green Bay tonight. Are you going to be doing any more touring at this point?

Garek: Well this kind of happened by accident. My brother graduated from UW-Madison yesterday. I came home for that. I decided that I should do some shows while I'm here. I have some friends who come to XS all the time who told me that they play my video which I think is fucking cool. I emailed the owner and asked if I could do a show here. He said "yes."

Quest: I know the show was promoted on Facebook. Was there any other promotion besides that because you filled the house tonight.

Garek: I don't think so, not that I know of. I think *Quest* is the only one really. Exclusive, right? (*laughs*)

Quest: Well, until everybody else finds out about you. Wasn't that the goal for tonight's show?

Garek: Baby steps, right?

Quest: One of the songs you sang tonight dealt with being gay in the past. Do you want to say a little more about that song?

Garek: That song is called "Leper." It's about the idea that being gay is a disease, that it's contagious and you should hide your children, board your windows - everything that some idiots actually believe.

and you should hide your children, board your windows - everything that some idiots actually believe. So I thought that instead of being sad and frustrated about it, I would make a dry, sarcastic song about it. I'm glad you liked it. I feel it got the point across.


Garek: Doing this! Same thing - keep traveling, making music and playing it for people.

30 AMERICANS + 30 WISCONSINITES AT MILWAUKE ART MUSEUM

in recent years."



This year, the Milwaukee Art Museum celebrates its 125th anniversary. And, in that context, it's celebrating the American artist. We just saw the magnificent exhibit, Color Rush, 75 years of American Color Photography. On June 14, MAM opens 30 Americans, a showcase of painters, sculptors, and photographers. Actually there are 31 and all but a few are currently living. But, wait, there's more. Complimenting this show, is Wisconsin 30, a special homegrown installation. What makes this rare assembly of dozens of contemporary artists even more compelling is that fact that they are all African American.

The exhibition represents but a part of a huge inventory of work assembled in the Miami based Rubell Family Collection. This selection serves as an exploration of a new movement propelled by African American artists. "The art in 30 Americans is provocative and challenging, and will explore how our identities and histories are varied, yet we are all still Americans," said Milwaukee Art Museum Director Daniel Keegan. "This is a vastly different exhibition from anything that the Museum has done

Indeed. Some, like iona rozeal brown and Kehinde Wiley, are familiar to Milwaukee Art Museum goers. Their works are currently on view. Brown, inspired by Japanese hip-hop fans styling black urban fashion, appropriates the style of classic Japanese woodblock print. She depicts black women in the role and setting of geisha. Similarly, Wiley takes on cultural transposition substituting handsome black jocks as subjects in familiar masterworks of Western art. He sets them against complex floral patterns referencing Persian and Asian designs. Although not in MAM's permanent collection, we saw recently Jean-Michel Basquiat's Andy Warhol collaborations in the museum's Warhol exhibit.

But that's just scratching the surface. This comprehensive narrative presents the America experience through a very particular prism. The catalog addresses race, religion, gender, sexuality, and cultural identity. Being a black artist within a white environment, or in the case of many of the 30 Americans, a gay or lesbian in a culturally unreceptive one, offers more than enough inspiration. Often the response is explosive. The works range from Carrol Mae Weems text enhanced slave photo images and Leonardo Drew's cotton bales to Lorna Simpson's Wigs and Kalup Linzy's drag video Sweetberry Sonnet. .

Much as 30 Americans integrates many of the current artists with their mentors, Wisconsin 30 also includes emerging artists and established ones. Located in the museum's Schroeder Galleria, it includes artists Marlon Banks. Reginald Baylor. Tyanna Buie, Evelyn Patricia Terry, and Della Wells among many others. This companion installation was organized Museum's African American Art Alliance support group and the Haggerty Museum of Art, Marquette University.

Exhibit coordinator, MAM curator William Rudolph spoke of the museum's opportunity in presenting by Paul Masterson for QUEST

the combined show. "It's a great survey of artists dealing with the issues of today and in particular, the African American experience. It's contemporary, poignant, funny, disturbing, and aesthetically beautiful...all reflected in different views. We had complete autonomy in hanging the show. MAM's Quadracci pavilion with its 11,000 of raw space allows for complete flexibility. The exhibit will have the breathing space it needs. Admittedly, Wisconsin is fairly homogenous. So it's great to be able to remind people that society changes, becoming more welcoming to diversity." Rudolph said.

30 Americans, its companion exhibit, Wisconsin 30, and the five-channel video installation Question Bridge: Black Males run concurrently June 14 through September 8, 2013 and is coordinated at the Milwaukee Art Museum by William Keyse Rudolph, Dudley J. Godfrey Jr. Curator of American Art and Decorative Arts.





THE PRIDEFEST MEDAL

PrideFest is many things to many people. It's entertainment, a time to gather by the lake with lovers, friends and family. It's that Milwaukee tradition of its varied peoples celebrating their identity. In 2007 PrideFest celebrated its 20 th anniversary. To acknowledge those two decades of LGBT community growth and those responsible for it, PrideFest instituted the PrideFest Medal for Community Achievement. QUEST spoke with board member Paul Masterson about its history, award criteria and this year's recipients.

QUEST: How did the PrideFest Medal come about? Paul Masterson: PrideFest had always given awards, traditionally a certificate, to volunteers, groups and supporters. For our 20th anniversary PrideFest 2007, we decided to recognize the other dozen and a half LGBT organizations with at least 20 years longevity In addition to those awards, I suggested instituting a special medal to honor individuals, businesses and organizations whose contributions significantly advanced LGBT equality in Wisconsin. The board agreed. Since then we have presented the PrideFest Medal as part of our opening ceremony.

QUEST: What is the criteria?

PM: The criteria varies according to the recipient. Corporations have received the medal for their continuing financial support of the LGBT community, organizations for long term impact on LGBT life, and individuals for long term volunteerism or philanthropy.

QUEST: So it's a long service medal?

PM: Length of service is a factor. But more so, it's for positive community impact. SSBL, (the Saturday Softball Beer League) was a perfect candidate. It received the PrideFest Medal in 2009 for several reasons. Aside from existing since 1977, it was a founding member of the North American Gay Amateur Athletic Alliance. SSBL had just won its bid to host the 2009 Gay Softball World Series. It would be the third series held in Milwaukee. That event brought nearly 60 teams from all over the USA and Canada to the city. Additionally, it hosts an annual national softball tournament, the Dairyland Classic. This year's takes place over 4

weekend. So the league's positive impact on local and national gay life is immeasurable. SSBL is also one of Wisconsin's few all-LGBTA inclusive organizations. Teams are gender mixed. The Milwaukee Gay Arts Center *Scream* is a prime example. Its players include a married straight couple, a gay couple, two Marines, university professors, a chef, an age range from 20's to 50's, ethnic diversity, and even a Republican.

QUEST: And for individuals?

PM: For individuals it's volunteerism over a longer period or philanthropy. Joe Pabst was one of the first recipients. His Cream City Foundation *Johnson and Pabst LGBT Infrastructure Fund* provided incredible monetary support for a broad spectrum of causes and organizations. Only one

person, Maria Cadenas, Cream City Foundation's former executive director, was a paid employee. In her case we made an exception because her impact went above and beyond the parameters of her job. She really established CCF as a community pillar through her personal engagement. The medal's design consists of pillars and we felt she represented that strength of character and dedication to the entire LGBT community. She made a major difference. QUEST: Speaking of the design, can you tell us about

it? It's a very handsome decoration with a pink triangle and the rainbow colors but what does it signify? PM: I designed the medal myself. It's executed in sterling silver and enamel by PrideFest's official jeweler, Chris Jansen of C-3 Designs. The pillars signify our community. The lower three are spaced apart and support the pink triangle. That's our past-divided, closeted and separated. The pink triangle alludes to past oppression and symbolizes our continuing struggle in the present. The upper three

pillars represent the future. Buttressed by the pink triangle they form a solid structure – our unity and equality. The red ribbon memorializes our martyrs and victims, the nameless and those we know, like Matthew Shepard, and most recently, Mark Carson, the young man who was murdered in New York City.

QUEST: So it's much more than just a medal, isn't it? PM: To make the award meaningful, it had to be more than a trophy out of a catalog. The intent is not only to recognize achievements that truly warrant an award, but also to remind us of just who we are, and our history, particularly since Stonewall, and especially in Wisconsin. We hope the recipients understand they are part of that greater narrative.

QUEST: How do you decide on who receives the award? PM: I recommend a number of possible awardees to the board and production crew. It's tough because there are so many deserving people and organizations but we limit the award to three per year. We make the final decision based those who fulfill criteria I mentioned.

QUEST: Who are this year's recipients?

PM: Our individual is Georgia Henry, president of PFLAG. She's been part of that organization since 1999 and has served as its president for nearly a decade. She's an unassuming, unsung hero as well as a PrideFest icon. Georgia is always outside the main gate with her PFLAG contingent as our welcoming committee.

The organization is the LGBT Community Center of Southeast Wisconsin in Racine. It hasn't been around that long but we felt its achievements in just under five years deserved the honor. It's quite a success story.

Last but certainly not least, PrideFest decided to award a medal to a couple, Glen Fallenbeck and Terrance Raffeet. They've been together since 1997 and have been festival volunteers together for a cumulative 35 years, pretty much the duration of their relationship. They're an integral part of PrideFest, directing our security team for most of that time. It's the first time a couple has been honored.

This year's PrideFest Medals for Community Achievement will be presented during the PrideFest Opening Ceremony on Friday, June 7, at 6:15pm.

QUEER STREET ART HITS MILWAUKEE

If you hang in the artsy-ish areas of the city - Riverwest, Walker's Point, or the

fashionable East side, you may have noticed an arch of ants on the march, schools of Koi, a much bigger than life Bela Lugosi as Dracula among other stenciled street art images. They're all the work of Jeremy Novy, a Wisconsin native who has literally made his mark on the streets and facades of San Francisco, where he is recognized as a leading street artist. He's back.

In 2007 Novy did a solo photo show entitled "Scribble" at the Milwaukee Gay Arts Center. His snaps showed graffiti deconstructed into isolated bits. At the same time, to confront urban blight, he was clandestinely painting the doors

of abandoned inner-city buildings. Then he migrated to the "Bay", dropped his camera and focused on his own public art. San Francisco embraces its outlaw artists. Its street art scene is vibrant, and very competitive. Novy quickly gained recognition and notoriety as a street artist and a queer one at that.

In Milwaukee, the street art scene is not quite what it is in the big city. A *HypeMKE* on-line article on the genre features photos of more extravagant projects around the world where entire 19th century facades serve as canvases for serious art. The accompanying "words" encourage local artists to get consent

first before expressing themselves.

Meanwhile, a Mexican ice cream business in *Historic* Walker's Point commissioned a mural for the side of its block long building. After its completion, a weeks' long endeavor that engaged a dozen artists, the neighbors protested.


The vivid, story-high, brightly colored faces, bulbous fonts and swirling designs looked much too much like "urban" graffiti. They won. Now the clinical mint hued, cinder block wall is a big blank slate again, inviting frequent tagging by gangs.

Graffiti has been around since Neanderthals took sharp rocks to scratch on cave walls. Today it's a can of spray paint and, in Novy's case, a stencil. For many artists before him who relied on the quick fix like Germany's anti-Hitler White Rose conspirators and New York City's John Fekner. The stencil allows for a speedy application. It creates uniformity as

well, a signature of sorts. For Novy his local stencilings represents a small part of his repertoire. He's also known for queer iconography ranging from the dearly departed Divine to leather guys, singlet clad wrestlers, and rainbow colored Care Bears.

Novy's acts of art generate a lot of discussion. Enthusiasts gush, detractors bash, and the artist himself rationalizes. The dialogue is sometimes thoughtful and often bitchy. Classic Chinese prosperity or fishy phallic imagery, ultimately, slick carp symbolism is in the culture of the beholder.









NEW ON DVD Joshua Tree, 1951: A Portrait of James Dean (2012) Reviewed by Glenn Bishop





With the release of director Matthew Mishory's Joshua Tree, 1951: A Portrait of James **Dean**, Glenn imagined that nothing could be more entertaining than a cinema evening focusing on James Dean, that most iconic of 1950s film stars.

For nibbles, Glenn dutifully brought out his treasured, much thumbed through though seldom sampled, Steinbeck House Cookbook. 50s inspired cocktails have long been a firm cinema night favorite; Classic Champagne Cocktails proving especially popular with the gentlemen of Glenn's acquaintance.

Genius is in the detail.

Dean's legend is all based upon a mere three motion pictures: East of Eden, Giant and Rebel Without a Cause. For the first two films, Dean received posthumous Oscar nominations. But which film to accompany Joshua Tree, 1951? Rebel Without a Cause is a particular favorite of Glenn's; East of Eden offers a natural tie-in to the recipes to be selected from the Steinbeck House Cookbook.

Yet in the end none of these classic (perhaps too familiar) films were screened. Instead two of Dean's early small screen efforts were chosen, only possible thanks to the infinite cinematic universe readily available on YouTube.

Up first, The Dark, Dark Hours finds Jimmy taking on Ronald Reagan, whose Hollywood career was definitely on the wane. Needing a doctor for his buddy PeeWee (Jack Simmons) who has been shot, Dean takes Reagan's household hostage.

The pairing of the young, charismatic Jimmy Dean and aging Ronald Reagan is positively sublime.

I Am a Fool is even more of a revelation. This poignant half-hour episode of General Electric Theater offered an adaptation of Sherwood Anderson's play, recalling as it does Thornton Wilder's Our Town. Dean plays the quintessentially soulful 50s young "Rebel" who leaves the farm for the big city and falls in love with 17 year-old Natalie Wood.

Dean are likely to Joshua Tree, 1951: A Portrait of James Dean one for the collection. Decades after his fiery demise, James Dean re-

mains a potent figure of fascination and conjecture. Especially tantalizing in Matthew Mishory's screenplay, Dean's sexuality is brought out into the foreground. Sexual encounters occur often, are stunningly filmed with take place with both sexes. If some drive the narrative, scenes for example with "The Famous Director" (Robert Gant) others merely prove fodder for fantasy. Dean's seduction of "The Boy on the Beach" (Nick Heyman) springs immediately to mind.

Even those moviegoers not obsessed with James

Does James Preston manage to bring James Dean fully to life? An impossible, rather thankless task Glenn mused initially. Certainly the actor is very handsome, bearing some resemblance to the young James Dean. If James Preston can't quite manage the charisma of the man he plays, he nevertheless acquits himself quite nicely.

Better still, and making Joshua Tree, 1951 an absolute joy from beginning to end is the astonishing B&W cinematography from Michael Marius

Random scenes follow in suitably expressionistic fashion. Writer/director Mishory's screenplay pointedly takes moviegoers along for a lengthy visit the desert which is fabulously shot, as indeed is the entire film, yet which offers little towards the narrative.

There are the requisite "trunks-optional" Hollywood pool parties, as if to acknowledge Scotty Bowers' 2012 bestseller Full Service, a shameless exploration of Hollywood's sordid sexual underbelly.

Indeed, so much time is spent poolside, Glenn momentarily thought he's dozed off and someone as a joke put a vintage AMG film into the DVD player.

At one such party Jimmy meets the jaded would-be starlet, Violet (Dalilah Rain), now reduced to pimping for some of Tinseltown's closeted power-brokers Violet takes a shining to the moody young Jimmy Dean, offering him hard-won pearls of wisdom.

For his part, Dean is shown as an ambitious, extremely determined young man; one willing to do whatever it takes to get a toe-hold in Hollywood.

"I've had to get my cock sucked by every big name in Hollywood."

With Violet's help Dean proves sufficiently adept at navigating the supremely predatory studio system; more importantly Violet offered Dean a constant reminder of the consequences of failure.





Stunningly filmed in breathtaking B&W, Joshua Tree, **1951** offers none of the traditional biopic narrative comforts in exploring the early James Dean, a time before the Golden Age television dramas and the later Hollywood feature film stardom.

Fresh from UCLA, Dean (impossibly beautiful Bruce Weber model James Preston) decides to tackle Hollywood. To save money, he rooms with his unnamed roommate but who is undoubted based on William Bast and with whom

I held on to these dishes just for this issue because they all make great warm-weather bites to share with friends, take to barbecues or contribute to block parties and other get-togethers. So what are you waiting for? Invite some friends over, crack open a few cold beers and eat good and shut up!

SUPER-SIMPLE SPINACH DIP

Who doesn't like a warm artichoke-spinach dip? If you don't - go screw yourself! The rest of us will enjoy this creamy concoction from Sara of South Milwaukee. Thanks for sharing, Sugar! Your free Bitchin' Kitchen T-shirt is on the way!

- 1 box (10 oz) frozen chopped spinach, thawed and squeezed dry
- 1 jar (12 oz) artichoke hearts, drained and chopped
- 1/2 cup whipped cream cheese 3/4 cup sour cream
- 1 cup shredded cheddar cheese
- 1 teaspoon ground cumin
- 1/2 teaspoon salt
- 1/4 teaspoon pepper

Crackers, pita chips or rye crisps

Preheat oven to 400 degrees. Spritz an ovensafe dish with cooking spray. Combine the first eight ingredients in a bowl; transfer mixture to oven-safe dish. Bake, uncovered, for 15 minutes or top is lightly golden and dip is heated through. Serve with crackers, chips or whatever the heck you want to! (Refrigerate leftovers.)

Ruthie's Culinary Clues

Thaw the spinach with help from the microwave. Then, set it in a colander and squeeze the juice out. You want the spinach as "dry" as possible before continuing with the recipe. Add a few dashes of hot sauce or a quick shake of red pepper flakes to the spinach mixture before baking if you like your foods with a little kick.

REDNECK CAVIAR

Texas caviar... cowboy salsa ... white trash dip. Call it whatever the hell you want, it's friggin' awesome! This chunky dip comes from Jeff of Brookfield, and I couldn't be happier he shared the recipe with us. Try it this summer, and it'll become your new party favorite (well...other than me!). It packs a spicy punch, so get ready to heat up the night!

1 can (11 oz) shoepeg corn, drained 1 can (15 oz) black beans, drained & rinsed 1 can (10 ounces) chopped tomatoes & green chilies, drained

1 can (15-7/8 ounces) black olives, drained and chopped

2/3 cup chopped red onion

1 green pepper, diced

1 red pepper, diced

2 cloves garlic, minced

3/4 teaspooon salt

1 teaspoon chili powder

2/3 cup fresh cilantro, chopped

1 bottle (16 ounces) Italian dressing

2 ripe avocados, peeled & diced Tortilla chips

Combine the first 12 ingredients in a large bowl and toss gently. Refrigerate overnight. Gently stir in avocados before serving. Serve with chips. Refrigerate leftovers.

Beans are canned with a lot of sodium to increase the shelf life. That's why it's imperative to rinse them in a colander before using them. This dish is spicy, so leave out the chili powder if you'd like or use plain tomatoes instead of those with the green chilies.

2 cups fresh apricots, chopped 2 cups pineapple chunks 4 oranges, peeled & cut into small pieces 2 pints sour cream


Combine all ingredients in a large bowl, and refrigerate overnight. Refrigerate leftovers.

PORGY AND BESS AT THE SKYLIGHT

a review by Paul Masterson for QUEST

When a friends' parents retired to South Carolina, the one thing they made sure to mention, beyond the pleasant weather and Southern charm, of course, was that "blacks know their place down there." In Milwaukee's Skylight Music Theatre's current production of *The Gershwins' Porgy and Bess* we get a glimpse of that certain social separation that obviously still pervades today.

Set in early-1930's Charleston, SC, the opera opens with the Gershwins' iconic lullaby "Summertime" in a haunting rendition sung by Clara (Cecilia Davis). With that lilting melody we are transported to Catfish Row, a black tenement in Charleston. In the next two and a half hours we witness the love, violence and passion that play out in this impoverished microcosm. Porgy, a crippled beggar, falls in love with Bess, a lost soul who attempts to escape Crown, an abuse lover, and a drug dealer, Sportin' Life, by hiding in Catfish Row.

Originally set as a large scale production with soloists, chorus and orchestra, the Skylight's chamber version conveys incredible power and pathos. The cast of soloists also provide the chorus parts with moving intimacy and honesty. The reduced 8-piece instrument arrangement by musical director Richard Carsey suits the chamber setting well, adding a Kurt Weil-like orchestral texture. Not sur prisingly, Ira Gerschwin collaborated with Kurt Weil some years after *Porgy and Bess*. There's defi-


nitely an edgy tonal quality that compliments both the libretto and the influence of jazz on the score. The work includes famous Gershwin songs "It ain't necessarily so" and "I got plenty of nothing." Over the years these have become part of the American vocal repertoire but seeing and hearing them so masterfully performed in their original context is an extraordinary experience.

Charismatic lead performances by bass-baritone Jason McKinney as Porgy and soprano Kearstin Piper Brown as Bess were buttressed by incredible supporting roles including Anthony P. McGlaun, Nathaniel Stampley, Adrianna Dietrich, Bill McMurray, local talent Shawn Holmes (sadly his role appears only briefly) and T. Stacy Hicks as the white detective.

Ken Goldstein's set design, a jumbled facade of distressed old doors, louvered windows set off by a tall turning staircase to a balcony, offers an appropriately bleak setting for this tragic American tale.

The Skylight Music Theatre's extraordinary chamber production marks a climactic end of both the company's season and Bill Theissen's nine year career as its artistic director. It is a stunning act of departure.


