As a photographer I have attended and shot many weddings. Only one had been of a lesbian couple and we featured them on the cover of Quest; a first for the magazine also the first full color cover for the "little bar rag". This was back in the day when gay marriage was only a distant dream for all LGBT people around the world.

Several states have accepted gay marriage or domestic partnerships and DOMA is now past us so it saddens me to know I live in a state that still discriminates against gays and lesbians getting married. Quest has followed the marriage debate since it's early days when we all had great hope that Wisconsin would be one of those progressive states like it was when we were the first state to pass a hate crimes bill.

For much of my adult life I have been politically active, trying to move our rights forward in every aspect. This has not always made me the popular one in my family or in my group of friends. I dreamed of the day when we would begin to be treated as equal in the eyes of the rest of the world.

I did not know at the time these very rights and freedoms I fought so hard for would one day appear before me on such a personal level as it has this month.

I have been single for most of my gay life and doubted I would ever be in a position to take advantage of getting married. Im my mind gay marriage came to symbolize all aspects of equality for LGBT people. In other words, it was somewhat of an abstract concept. It caught me a little off guard

as I was thinking about the August cover. What could I do to follow up with from July when I featured a gay couple that hopes to be married next year. I knew I would be attending a wedding later this August in Green Bay for my niece and although I know she is a lesbian and she would be getting married to her partner, this was family and I hadn't stopped to consider how surreal this all was for me.

Suddenly I became keenly aware, that all this hard work has now made it possible for someone in my own family to enjoy the rights and freedoms the heterosexual community has always enjoyed. Laura Szeszko will be marrying my niece, Lauren Mariucci in an official ceremony in Illinois where they live and



will enjoy all the freedoms afforded by them from both the state of Illinois and the federal government. They will also have a more symbolic ceremony for the rest of us here in Green Bay at Heritage Hill shortly after.

Heritage Hill is the same place one of my nephews got married. His wife has a brother who is gay and partnered to one of my best friends. Such a small world but I completely missed how at some point this whole "gay" thing stopped being any issue in my own family and has been accepted as normal. I know I am largely responsible for that, but it happened slowly and only now am I standing back and seeing how different it is today from just a decade ago.

It was never more apparent to me as I sat with my niece, her sister and husband and the rest of the bridal shower party as I waited for Laura to show up from a separate party to do the cover photo. Everything was about the same as it always is for these things except this time it is a bride and bride being married. In some sense I felt very old as these younger people carried on like it has never been something society feared and loathed.

For this reason alone I now know it is only a matter of time when gay marriage will be allowed in all 50 states. No matter how hard the religious right attempts to stop this from happening, it WILL happen and it will be because families have accepted those who are gay or lesbian as just as normal as everyone else. That day is already here in my own family and I know in my heart it is around the corner for many, many others.

Al Culbreath was born in 1924 to sharecropper parents in Covington Tennessee. At a very young age he knew he did not want to pick any more cotton and left Tennessee. He went on to form his own modeling school. One of the few black models in Milwaukee at the time, he was featured in ads

for Miller, Schlitz and Pabst, the Boston Store, Macy's, Gimbels and Nunn Bush.

"We always celebrated his birthday, St. Patricks's Day. Al said he was 'black Irish'" states Larry Krueger a long time friend.

He volunteered for the old Milwaukee Aids Project (MAP) and was on the volunteer board of directors of Charles Allis Art Museum for many years.

Krueger met Al in 1964 when he worked full time at Johnnie Walkers Men's clothing store on 3rd and Wisconsin in Milwaukee. "After he finished his shift at the clothing store, he was kind enough to come over to my restaurant/nightclub Café Melange and work the door, Krueger says. "We'd be there till one in the morning. Still with a spring in his step we would go out for a drink. He would

get up for work in the morning to do it all over again. For 10 years, till Café Melange closed, I had the pleasure of working with him."

For his 90th birthday there was a party at Jim's Time Out Bar on 7th and Wells in Milwaukee. Al said "If I'm dying, I'm going with beer in my belly."

Al fought the cancer 3 years driving himself to the doctor for chemo treatment. Larry went to see Al's cancer doctor when they first realized it wasn't his heart that made Al sick. The cancer doctor spoke about age, and comfort, and side effects of chemo. Al said "give it to me. I want this cancer out of me." When the chemo eventually stopped working, he drove himself to the radiation. He had the most amazing level of energy. But it wasn't a selfish energy. His charm was charismatic. He could make any place a more gracious, fun, and easy place to be.

Apparently Al left a small sum of money in order that friends and family could have a party and remember him. That party will be on Saturday, August 3 at 4 pm at *This Is It*, a popular bar in Milwaukee.



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FORMER MILWAUKEE CONTESTANT, MISTER HARBOR ROOM 2012 JASON PULS SHARES EXPERIENCES COMPETING AT INTERNATIONAL MISTER LEATHER

Contestant number 25, Jason Puls, wore strategically placed black leather straps. The white of his nude figure looked as though it were a canvas, concealed by a dark spiderweb. He swept the royal blue of Wisconsin's state flag overhead as he paraded down a spotlit stage at the opening ceremony of the 35th Annual International Mr. Leather (IML) Weekend.

An estimated 18,000-20,000 people (mostly gay and bisexual men) gathered in Chicago Memorial Day weekend to celebrate leather and kink. The leather fest also hosted a contest, where 51 men who won regional feeder competitions throughout the world sought the title of International Mr. Leather. Ultimately, Andy Cross from San Francisco bested them all.

Competitors from Wisconsin traveled to IML in past years after they won regional contests. In 2011, the Argonauts Leather Club1} of Green Bay awarded Jeff Gruenberger the title of Mr. Northwoods. That year, the Harbor Room bar in Milwaukee named Eddie Candeleria Mister1} Harbor Room. Both men went on to compete at IML, and

Gruenberger finished in the top 20. Gruenberger is also organizing the inaugural Mr. Wisconsin Leather contest this October in Milwaukee.

Puls became involved with the leather community by chance. He worked as a tour guide on the Milwaukee Pedal Tavern – a 16-person powered bicycle – and of his stops included the Harbor Room gay bar. He developed friendships with bartenders and regular customers, who encouraged him to compete in the bar's annual Mister Harbor Room contest. Puls won in July 2012, earning a ticket to compete in Chicago.

A musician himself, Puls strove to portray Milwaukee as an ambitious and progressive art community. He also competed as the only openly straight contestant, which he says shifted more attention to his sexuality than he wanted.

"People told me to play the bi[sexual] card, or people told me to lie and say I was gay, but that's not what I am," he says. "I am here to represent myself honestly."

Puls describes the contest as a bonding experience. As he became acquainted with fellow contestants, he learned of their hardships. Some

contestants found familial support within gay and leather communities, which they were unable to receive from their families of origin.

"Sometimes your chosen family brings you a lot of strength that you may not have found earlier in life." Puls adds.

Puls says IML was also an education about kink. "A lot of people have told me what to expect and how to prepare for it, but that only goes so far," he says. "Once you get there that's a whole other experience."

During the second round of the contest, IML emcee Lenny Broberg evaluated contestants' stage presence by asking them to construct hypothetical sex scenes using people or objects.

Broberg asked Puls, "Since you're from Milwaukee ... please choose a character from *Happy Days* to have a hot sex scene with ... Who would you choose, and why, and what would you do?"

Puls quipped, "There's no 'all of the above'?" Another contestant, Alexandru Sonoc of Ontario, Canada, suggested a "circle of fisting" when Broberg asked him to create a sex scene involving all 51 contestants.


"There were things I'd never even heard of, like electrolysis butt plugs, flogging to the point of bleeding, or urination," Puls says. "I'm more of a vanilla guy when it comes to sex. It doesn't mean I'm not a sexual person. It's just that I just don't really have that many fetishes or kinks."

Puls wonders whether he was penalized for not having enough sexual fetishes when the judges tallied his final score. Although he did not win the contest, Puls says he succeeded in other ways.

"I am now a part of something and it has nothing to do with my orientation. It has everything to do with the bond and openness that everyone shared together that weekend," he says. "It's so profound for me. I'm in this fraternity for life now and no one can ever take this from me."

On July 20, Michael Jones won the 2013 Mister Harbor Room contest. He will compete at IML in May 2014.





THE MILWAUKEE LGBT CENTER SEEKS LEADERSHIP

You may have noticed the call for applications for the LGBT Center's position of executive director. It appears in social and print media. It's part of the center's Renaissance.

Just over a year and a half ago, the Milwaukee LGBT Community Center convulsed and nearly imploded. Established in 1995, the center has gone through sometimes inexplicable changes. It morphed from an engaged and growing grass roots LGBT organization located in the Walker's Point gay-borhood to an insular entity in a deserted corner of Brewer's Hill. From there, under its third executive director (ED), Magi Cage, it moved into the heart of the very un-gay MSOE campus, a block away from very ungay Water Street entertainment district. With Cage, a non-LGBT person, the center's board had an optimistic notion – a straight leader of a gay organization would help integrate the community into the population at large. Among other perks, the otherwise ironic hire, it was hoped, would serve to bring LGBT Milwaukeans into mainstream acceptance. Success, and funding, would follow. They didn't. Excessive rent and salaries, a lack of real LGBT-focused programming, stagnant fund raising and, perhaps most of all. the toxic personality clash between Cage and employees, membership as well as funders brought the center to near extinction. Only the center's youth program, Project Q, managed to flourish. With a projected \$250,000 deficit, the executive director resigned and bowed out with an undisclosed severance package. It seemed the LGBT Community Center was finished.

Then the cavalry arrived. A contingent of activists came to the rescue. With the conviction the city needs a hub for LGBT services and social programs, they took up the task of picking up the pieces. There were lots of pieces: financial debt, a residual community grudge, among many others.

One by one, they were addressed. The former board and some paid staff, largely seen as culpable members of the old regime, resigned. A new board was formed. Cream City Foundation and other sponsors provided major loans and grants. The center's footprint at its downtown Blatz Brewery location shrank by two-thirds, reducing its \$30000 monthly rent to under \$10000. From all accounts, past debt is now settled. A "Believe in the Center" campaign was launched. Outreach and new programming, directed by new hire in 2012, former MPS administrator, Thomas Hanley set about rebuilding bridges. , Mil-

waukee SAGE returned to the center after its own tumultuous ups and downs. Dismantled as a separate organization, is now considered a part of the Center's programming. The annual community summer picnic, recently held in the shadow of the Blatz Building itself, was reported to be a great success.

Now a major hurdle remains. For over a year, Karen Gotzler, recipient of the PrideFest Medal for Community Achievement, has been the center's ED... as a volunteer. Taking the take the helm of a floundering ship with a quarter million dollar debt is no easy task. As chief operations office of Urban Strategies, a Milwaukee based consulting firm that has assisted many local LGBT organizations, her expertise helped guide the center through its reorganization. With the center more or less on even keel, she is stepping back. And the now the search for a new ED is on.

The Future

Given the failures of past leadership lessons have been hopefully learned to insure the next ED is right for Milwaukee. Originally locally focused, the search had gone national. Prospective candidates are asked to submit a demanding on-line application. The ED has a rather comprehensive role as supervisor. The center the paid staff and volunteer positions includes an operations manager, an accountant, the manager of counseling programs, the youth program manager, a volunteer communications director, a volunteer librarian, and a volunteer art gallery curator. Then there are the six organizations housed at center. According to the website, 100 local groups use the center for events and meetings.

The application provides insights into the board's intent to hire an AD with an extensive well-developed skill set. It's obvious that this time there is a conscious effort being made to hire someone with community sensitivity, scruples, and ethics as well as managerial, fiscal, and administrative ability. After all, the ED is the "face and voice" of the center, and by extension, of the LGBT Community.

It is clear that requirements for the ED of an LGBT entity are different from other non-profits. There is a specific nature to the community itself. For all its diversity, there is a commonality its goals. That goal is equality. Even in a political atmosphere that is generally positive with great advances being made, Wisconsin's situation is not without its challenges. Ultimately, given that reality, the ED's role for the Milwaukee LGBT Center will change with the community itself. The ED has to be aware of that and be emotionally engaged.

A question on the community's mind is the center's location. Ever since the move into the Blatz Building, it's been a major bone of contention. Rumors say the center will be there for at least 5 years, others say a move is imminent. A future ED will make that decision.

The deadline for applications is in the offing. QUEST will continue to follow the process and keep its readers informed. Meanwhile, for more information and to view the ED application, go to the center's website at www.mkelgbt.org

NOW YOU SEE ART, NOW YOU DON'T

There's an Italian expression for moments of exasperation, "ma, dove siamo?" Literally, it translates to "but, where are we?" In other words, given the circumstances, what do you expect?

The phrase occurred to me even before the ink dried on the glossy pages of QUEST's June edition. In it, I had written about Jeremy Novy's queer street art. I made particular mention of Novy's Walker's Point Bela Lugosi mural on a beat up 1st Street cinder block facade. It included his signature Koi and that arc of ants. Then I noticed it had been painted over. Since then, another Dracula further south disappeared under a fresh coat of whitewash.

From all accounts, Novy's brief reprise in Milwaukee is over. He's back in the San Francisco Bay area. Based on his on-line postings, he sold half his works featured in an exhibit before the show even opened. Here and there in Milwaukee his Koi remain. But, sadly, other stenciled images are gone. So now a dilapidated eyesore structure on South 1st, once adorned, looks even less appealing. Whoever buys the property and puts in a parking lot or a supermarket (desperately needed in that part of town) will tear down the building anyway. What was the point of destroying the mural? If anything, the Koi et al. called attention to the blight building's "For Sale" sign. The neighborhood, too, had gained some character as an art target. Now, the unaesthetic splashes of gray paint covering the Koi only make it uglier.

Street art, queer or other, might not always be high art or fine art. But, it is often legitimate art, fulfilling the very purpose of art. Art reacts to social conditions. It articulates one side of a dialog that compels the viewer to look, engage, and, hopefully, think.

The lack of street art in Milwaukee speaks to our fair city's pervasive "lack." The metro's mantra seems to be "Better bleak than Beautiful" especially if the beauty is beyond common comprehension.

"A Fitting Tribute to a Faithful Friend"



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
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The **Beat** writers are going through something of a renaissance these days, fueled unquestionably by the success of Rob Epstein and Jeffrey Friedman's acclaimed cinematic poem, Howl with its oh-so charismatic star James Franco bringing poet Allen Ginsberg to life.

Later this autumn the actor formerly known as Harry Potter is set to shock the more delicate sensibilities of some Potter-aficionados with the release of Kill Your Darlings, playing poet Allen Ginsberg. The pre-release hype boasting, as it does, highly controversial man-on-former wizard sex scenes.

Well, that should certainly get the slash-writers back out in force. In the meanwhile, Glenn will have to make do with director Walter Salles' 2012 adaptation of Jack Kerouac's On the Road, that most holy of Beat texts.

Glenn came to Kerouac's novel rather late in the day, as a part of a college lit class celebrating the works of such literary hipsters as John Clellon Holmes, poets Gary Snyder and Gregory Corso in addition to the expected works from Ginsberg, Kerouac and William Burroughs. By then, Glenn had already hit the road and in rather more comfort than by the hitchhiking and boxcars Kerouac sought to ro-

Although published in 1957, On the Road chronicled Kerouac's travels beginning nearly a decade earlier in an America still attempting to shed post-war doldrums, a time before the inception of the interstate highway system President Eisenhower would champion.

Budding novelist Kerouac might have remained just another unknown writer still living at home with his mother when he (and indeed Allen Ginsberg) met the charismatic Neal Cassady. Instead, Kerouac, or rather Sal Paradise as he dutifully names his fictional self, took to the open road in search of life, of new experiences, of sex and drugs and Jazz, ultimately of escape.

and distant.

The rest is literary and now cinematic history. Salles' On the Road begins appropriately enough with Kerouac, sorry Sal Paradise (Sam Riley), already on the road, hitching a ride somewhere out West; Eric Gautier's splendid cinematography evoking an America both vast

Sadly, this wistful opening sequence is as close as Salles' manages in capturing the exhilarating wanderlust of the novel.

Jose Rivera's screenplay necessarily brings moviegoers back to the beginning of the story, as Carlo Marx (Tom Sturridge) brings Sal together with Cassady stand-in Dean Moriarty (Garrett Hedlund). The connection between Dean and Sal is immediate and infectious.

Playing near-mythical characters is no easy task as both Michael Douglas (Behind the Candelabra) and James Preston (Joshua Tree, 1951: A Portrait of James Dean) are sure to admit.

British actor Sam Riley's Kerouac seems content lurk in the background in his role as scribe, dutifully taking copious notes in a small notebook. Boring. Where is that eager adventurer who is willing to crisscross America with little more than ready thumb and a few bucks in his pocket for a bottle of whiskey, all in the search of new experiences; even those of Dean's secondhand if needs be?

And what of Dean Moriarty, the Pied Piper of group, whom all past and future hipsters are meant to follow?

Hedlund's Dean is suitably handsome, a freespirit easily at home in his skin as well as out of his clothes - which is often and especially intoxicating given the staid 1950s context. Yet he is hardly the charismatic figure Kerouac created on the page; bearing little resemblance to to be saved, desirous of everything at the same matic Dean stands out.

Buy it, rent it, or forget it...

Glenn would like to report that On the Road is a hedonistic yet glorious mess but sadly the film somehow manages to fall short, taking on a numbing, reverential feel.

The expected cross-country trips are all present and accounted for, tantalizing glimpses of small-town American are, well, glimpsed yet otherwise ignored except by cinematographer Eric Gautier. Sal leaves, returns home, suffers writers block then leaves again when Dean comes a-calling. And repeat.

There is, of course, plenty more Jazz, drugs and sex. Along the way Sal and Dean meet up with a colorful cast of wannabe hipsters and hangers-on in brief snapshot encounters. In addition to Tom Sturridge's youthful Ginsberg, there's also Viggo Mortensen convincing as William S. Burroughs stand-in Old Bull Lee. Danny Morgan's Ed Dunkle emerges as little more than a young man with bad table-manners.

Only in the final moments does Jose Rivera's screenplay finally scratch beneath the surface, capturing a moment of pure irony, as a gussied-up and now successful Sal shuns an all but unrecognizable Dean, now spent and down on his luck; an encounter eerily foreshadowing Kerouac's own dissolute end.

RUTHIE'S BITCHIN' KITCHEN

It's August and that means we still have several weeks of warm-weather fun ahead of us. That said, I've been holding on to a few simple salad recipes, just waiting to share them with you when the time is right. Turns out that the time is now, so let's toss each other's salad, shall we? These three recipes are fast, yummy and great for summer gettogethers. Now eat good and shut up!

RED, WHITE AND BLUE SALAD

Hail to the chief...of the friggin' kitchen. This nofuss salad serves four, but you can easily double it when friends stop by. It's easy, refreshing and a tasty change of pace for summer. Thanks to Lynn of Bay View for sending me the recipe!

4 cups spinach leaves, washed 1 cup seedless red grapes, halved 1/4 cup blueberries 1/4 cup blue cheese crumbles 1/2 cup slivered almonds 1 small bottle raspberry vinaigrette

Toss the first five ingredients together in a large bowl. Dress with vinaigrette to taste.

Add some cooked chicken strips to turn this into a main dish salad. Hate blue cheese? Try it with feta instead. Love blue cheese? Swap out the raspberry vinaigrette for a creamy blue cheese dressing. If you have a little extra time, toast the almonds in a skillet with a touch of butter. Let them cool before adding them to the salad.

EASY-DOES-IT PASTA SALAD

Pasta salad is great for summer because it holds up in the heat, travels well and goes with hot dogs, burgers or whatever your grilling up outside. Shared by Tom of St. Francis, this nofuss version offers crunchy veggies, artichokes and lots of Parmesan flavor. The marinated oil from the artichoke hearts makes a dressing!

1 pound penne pasta 1 head broccoli, cut into florets 1 jar (6.5 ounces) marinated artichoke hearts

1 medium red pepper, julienned 1/4 cup grated Parmesan cheese

Boil the pasta in a large kettle or Dutch oven for 8 minutes. Add the broccoli and cook 2 minutes longer. Drain pasta and broccoli and rinse with cold water until cool.

Pour the entire contents of the artichoke jar into a large bowl. Add red pepper, pasta and broccoli. Toss with Parmesan cheese.

Rinsing the pasta and broccoli in cold water does a few things: First, it slows/ends the cooking process so the pasta doesn't get mushy; Secondly, it will help the broccoli keep a bright green color; And third, it makes this a cool salad instead of a warm side dish! You may want to add some pepper (freshly cracked, if you're fancy) and/or salt. Toss in a few black olives if you'd like. If the artichoke hearts are too large, use a kitchen scissors to cut them up without removing them from the jar.

WHITE TRASH SALAD MEXICALI

1 pound lean ground beef, cooked & drained 1 head iceberg lettuce, chopped

1-1/2 cups diced tomatoes

1 large onion, diced

2 cups shredded Mexican cheese blend 2 cans (15 ounces each) kidney beans, rinsed and drained

8 ounces Thousand Island salad dressing 1 bag (16 ounces) corn chips

Combine the cooked ground beef, lettuce, tomatoes, onion, cheese and beans. Cover and chill for at least an hour. Immediately before serving, stir in the dressing and corn chips until evenly coated.



And So I sign off, see you next month, enjoy August and the State fair. And don't forget to get pierced and show off those hot piercings!





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
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
