#### **QUEST TURNS 21** WISCONSIN'S LONGEST RUNNING CONTINUOUSLY PUBLISHED LGBT MAGAZINE HAS A BIRTHDAY

We are excited to bring you issue number one of Quest's 21st year of publishing news and entertainment for Wisconsin's LGBT community. As I reflect back on this and my choice for our January cover, I remember the reasons **Quest** came about. You can probably blame it all on my childhood.

As a toddler I became enthralled with playing music on record. I am not sure how my mother managed to stay sane with all those hours of tinny screeching "music" from those little yellow and orange 78 rpm records she would give me to play on my phonograph.

As a teenager, I played around with a home-run radio station being a DJ for the kids on my block. As I turned an adult and came to terms with being a young gay man, it was again music that lured me in. The Roxy Lounge in Green Bay had a juke box on a small second floor. We would run upstairs to dance when a favorite song came on. Someone thought it would be great to set up some turntables and play the records like a DJ would. I guess I volunteered to set up my own equipment and then later discovered I was in this alone now and would also be the DJ.

Years later after DJing in Madison, Green Bay and Rochester New York while attending RIT for a career in photography, the chance to become a bar owner presented itself when a bar I had worked at for many years, **Who's** was going to close. The thought of running a bar AND being the DJ where I could have full control was too much temptation and **Za's** was born.

21 years ago, frustrated that smaller cities did not get the needed attention in the existing gay press I decided my bar along with others across the state could use something new. We called it Quest.

**Quest** was a first in many ways for LGBT publishing in Wisconsin. We were the first to publish outside of the two bigger cities of Madison and Milwaukee. We were the first to offer an 800 number and faxing. We also were the first to offer email and a website. Most importantly we were the first to publish using the new desktop publishing equipment which made all this possible at a much lower cost to our advertisers. I had previously done paste-up for newspapers and made darkroom halftones and negatives, so I was well aware the revolution the Macintosh, **Quark Xpress** and **Adobe Photoshop** was.

**Quest** today is a group of writers based in Milwaukee and photographers based in Milwaukee, Madison and Green Bay. We continue to try and bring a voice to all corners of Wisconsin. We deliberately include lesbians, female impersonators, leather daddies and bears who a part of our diverse community even though I sometimes get flack for not trying to make the magazine more mainstream.

Our format these days is concentrated on the "gay lifestyle", but we are mostly about entertainment including movies, music and theatre. I get a little thrill therefore to be able to feature a new, young DJ talent on our cover this month known as DJ Chomper. He reminds me of how and why I started down this long journey and met so many wonderful gay brothers and sisters along the way. It is young persons like him that is our future and I think that future is bright.

# AN INTERVIEW WITH DERIC SCHWARTZ AKA CHOMPER

If you make the rounds in Wisconsin club scene you may have danced and sung along to Chomper aka Deric Schwartz. An up-ancoming young DJ originally from Hartford, WI, Chomper has been living in Milwaukee over 4 years. For this energetic 22 year old his DJ career has already taken him to most the of the regions leading clubs and major Pride events. The list includes Boom & the Room, La Cage, Studio 200, Shelter Club and Napalese Lounge in Green Bay, Woof's in Madison, Madison Pride and Milwaukee PrideFest's main stage, He currently has residency at Filibusters in Sheboygan.

Chomper's career began as a member of a progressive metal band playing electronic music. A self-taught musician, he plays bass, basic guitar, piano and drums. His taste moved from metal to electronic when he began writing electronic music for fun. He then moved into DJing. He soon found his genre niche. "I do progressive house, electro-house, top 40, or a recognizable mix...something

people can sing along to. I usually have a pre-made play list based on what I think the audience will work with the energy of the crowd & improvise like. But I can if I think they want something different. For example, Milwaukee has a really typical top 40 taste. People like to sing along. I do my own mashups so I go from older to new stuff. I go for a big sound, make sure people know the words and throw in surprises. I have a Beatles mashup. I build it up and then throw in random music. It keeps people's attention. Some DJs create a typical mix and people don't even notice what they're playing. My style is designed to make people notice. It's my personal touch," Chomper said.

But DJing is more than just a play list. It's about psychology and a touch of musical science. It's knowing your audience and knowing what they want to hear. "When you play that big sound and people sing along with their hangs up, it means they're happy and having a good time. DJing is half the battle. A lot has to do with the light and sound as well and I do that as well," Chomper explains.

"Some Djs play what *they* want. They don't don't don't take requests. That makes them look conceited.

You hope your audience will trust you but I try not to be rude. If someone asks for a request that doesn't fit the pattern, I try to fit it in when it works. I interact with my audience. I talk to them. Some DJs hide behind their booth. I'm on the mic, making sure people are listening and making them part of the show."

As for the science, Chomper reveals his secret. "I use a method called *Mixed in Key*. It's software for harmonic mixing. It identifies the key a song is written in. The scale it uses is like a clock. It's complicated but the idea is to raise the energy according to harmonic steps. When I do a pre-made set list, I control the harmonic mix. You get a better flow by using this system of harmonic steps. Some DJs just play songs. They

can be successful but they can also lose the energy that way. You have to have the pattern of what's hot but keep in the scale. Let's say I have an older song that is in the same harmony scale as a new song. When you move from one to the other it keeps the energy flow going. I didn't know about this when I began. A friend asked if I used *Mixed in Key* and I said 'tell me

more.' I taught myself how to use it. Since then my sets are a lot smoother. There's a lot more energy levels and conscious manipulation of the audience response. Now when I listen to radio shows or live sets I know the music. I can tell tell if someone is using the same system. There's a key sequence that is recognizable. If something is out of sync it's noticeable."

Chomper's gigs are, for the moment, mainly in Wisconsin but he plans to head out of the region in 2014 and develop some other career goals. "I'm traveling a lot. I want to play other clubs and festivals in Chicago. I have some connections in Fort Lauderdale as well.

> I'm also involved in the Bear and Leather community. T.C. Hammond won Wisconsin Leather and I'm doing the circuit with him as part of his title holders community service. Career goals ...right now realistically it's a hobby. I'd like it turn into something real, like a studio set up. I'd like to help other DJs in any genre like rock, pop, and hip-hop."

Chomper offers advice to future DJs, "be dedicated and be ready to travel and drop anything for a gig. Know your audience and your equipment and get to know your venue. Get a residency if possible. When I first did Filibusters, I got referred by someone. I just did my thing with no expectations. Everybody was super nice. After I played the owner offered me a full time gig. It's basically

getting into a place and working well with the other staff. So it's a whole experience. Whatever will draw people. But, as I said before, make your audience part of the show. And, keep the crowd jacked."

# **RENT HIKE FORCES MGAC TO LEAVE WALKER'S POINT LOCATION**

After 8 ½ years, Milwaukee Gay Arts Center (MGAC) closed its doors at its Walker's Point location. The unique LGBT, non-profit, all volunteer arts organization received notification in late October that a new tenant willing to pay 50% more rent had been found. MGAC was out November 30. QUEST's Julia Kind spoke to one of its founders and current executive director Paul Masterson about this unexpected turn, MGAC's past, and its future.

#### QUEST: Before we get into the crux of the matter, can you give us some MGAC's background and history?

Paul Masterson: Sure. In spring of 2005 the Milwaukee Gay Arts Center opened with a musical variety show, Gay Broadway. That was followed by its first art exhibition, Tapestries. The exhibit featured Wisconsin related AIDS guilts from the DC based Names Project as well as works by local artists. To my knowledge it was the first time the AIDS guilts had been brought to Milwaukee. I should also mention the matter of our name. When we first conceived the center, we debated the name. We wanted to be high profile and not hide behind an acronym. We also felt calling it "LGBT" would lead to confusion with the LGBT Community Center. So we went with the Milwaukee "GAY" Arts Center. That didn't please the Ls, Bs, and Ts. But, the reality is that's the one word everyone understands. In the historic coming-out episode of "Ellen", she declares "I'm GAY." So we declared it. Cream City Foundation had a "GAY Neighbors" campaign five vears later. They got the same push-back from certain community leaders. But, like I said, their studies came to the same conclusion: GAY is a universally understood word. So they went with it.

#### QUEST: And from there?

PM: From there we took off. We had LGBT relevant art shows, produced theatrical shows, dance and music. The first theatrical production was Jonathan Tolins Twilight of the Golds. Ray Bradford of RSVP Theatre directed. Later we had our own in-house theatre company. We produced a run of great productions including Angels in America. We had a troupe come in from England and did a play entitled Seduction. There were a lot. And Theatrical Tendencies did three shows at MGAC. Art shows went up every 6 weeks. We showcased predominantly local artists but national and international artists as well. Our musical offerings ranged from Barogue to folk. The space has very live acoustics so the experience was wonderful no matter what genre.

#### QUEST: You didn't mention Naked Boys Singing.

PM: Right, how could I forget? That was to be our big opening hit. It was an international success and we thought, as a new arts company, we'd produce it to give us a lot of exposure, so to speak.

#### QUEST: Well, it did.

PM: Exactly. But not quite as we intended. The

city's licensing department called the Milwaukee Police Vice Squad and had us closed down. Someone in that office thought we needed a theater license. We didn't. During the process of depositions and negotiations we also learned that "someone" in the licensing office felt we would incite a riot between Christian zealots and audience members. The police moved in and shut us down. About a week later, however, the city sent us a letter saying we could run the show while they investigated. The show was remounted a couple of months later but by then the financial damage had been done.

#### QUEST: And you sued the city.

PM: Yes, we did. We came to a settlement five years later. The original case went to Federal Court and was thrown out without prejudice. The ACLU then picked it up. It was a grueling experience. By the time it got to the ACLU, the other MGAC founders had moved out of town. I was left to represent us through the entire legal process. I really have to thank the ACLU and the lawyers who represented MGAC. I could not have hung in there without their dedication and perseverance.

#### QUEST: And they settled?

PM: Yes, eventually. They say you can't fight city hall, but we did and we won. The irony was the lack of community support. After the closure, we were criticized by some for having produced the show in the first place. It was a shameful response. They missed the point. Yes, it was a silly show with a gay male focus but it was fun and completely unoffensive. We have an odd political sensibility in local LGBT activism. We feel its necessary to conform to "their" expectations so we can earn our rights. That, for some, means sacrificing our identity so we become acceptable. I don't believe we should. One of my favorite quotes is from the German gay activist, Rosa von Praunheim, who said. "it's not the homosexual who is perverse, but rather the society in which he lives."

# QUEST: So how did the community leaders react to MGAC's victory?

PM: I got an email from one person, a call from another and a couple of congratulatory remarks from others. It was disappointing but not surprising. It's Milwaukee and the LGBT community isn't up for confrontation. There was no real appreciation or support for the effort. The ACLU defended us but the LGBT community looked the other way.

#### QUEST: So tell us more about MGAC.

PM: As far as I know we are one of very few independent LGBT arts organizations worldwide. There are community centers with galleries or that put on plays or show movies. There are other "for profit" galleries and theaters. But, as far as I am aware, we are pretty unique. Last year I heard someone in New York City had launched a similar organization using MGAC as a model. I don't know how successful it is. It's NYC after all and LGBT arts are well represented otherwise.

#### QUEST: MGAC also fields a softball team.

PM: Yes. We were first associated with the SSBL team sponsored by Queer Life News, known as the Queer Life Gnus. When the paper went under I thought it was a good idea to keep the team going. We had a great roster of players ... and still do. It's an amazingly diverse mix of gay, lesbian and straight players, ranging from university professors to baristas. It's all about fun, sportsmanship and, above all, camaraderie. This year we took first place in our SSBL division. We're the only team not sponsored by a bar. Over the years I've tried to get other LGBT groups, like the Community Center, to sponsor a team. I don't understand why they don't. SSBL represents the good of our community. A board member once asked why MGAC has a softball team. I thought the question really exposed the issue. We are part of the community, LGBT and non-LGBT, and it just seems logical to participate in the community. As an arts organization we might appear elitist or somehow disconnected. In fact, art is the expression of who we are. It doesn't set us apart. It's our heart.

#### QUEST: Alright, so what happened?

PM: Funding has always been a dilemma. Years ago, I had a conversation with Maria Cadenas, the former executive director of Cream City Foundation (CCF). As usual, I was begging for money. Her response was "my funders are business people not artists." The message was, it's about the bottom line and unless a business can reconcile a positive financial impact, in other words, a potential profit for its investment, the arts are not a priority. We've struggled as a result. Some years were better than others. Joe Pabst, through his CCF fund was a regular donor and we received a Milwaukee Arts Board Grant, the first awarded to an LGBT organization. Other years have been quite lean. Keeping up with the rent and costs was always difficult. The gentrification of Walker's Point raised the property values and the landlord, logically, took advantage of that. We had a month to month lease and he found another renter, a bicycle shop, willing to pay 50% more rent.

#### QUEST: What's in the offing?

PM: For the moment we are headquartered in the PrideFest office at the LGBT Community Center. We're looking for a new space but in the meantime we're planning various events at other venues and, of course, at PrideFest, where we have our own MGAC stage and manage the Art and Culture Building. We'll be playing softball with SSBL next season as well. We're carrying on regardless.


# LADIES OUT

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### NEW ON DVD - Naked As We Came Reviewed by Glenn Bishop



For those loyal **Quest** readers who have grown weary of their cinematic entertainment this holiday season rather too filled with Tidings of Good Cheer, look no further than director/screenwriter Richard LeMay's latest feature, **Naked as We Came**, a dysfunctional family drama rendered with a decidedly melancholic palette.

The film opens with a voice-over referencing a woman who has lost everything following a long hidden political scandal; this presumably designed to offer moviegoers an explanation for the familial rift which is to follow.

Our tragic heroine is Lilly (Lue McWilliams) now in the final stages of terminal cancer. Having checked herself out of the hospital, she has come home to die. Lilly's only companion is Ted (Benjamin Weaver), a hunky, bestselling novelist whose presence and purpose in the household proves rather vague to both Glenn as well as to Lilly's two long-estranged children whom Ted, inexplicably, has summoned.

Whatever their fears for their mother's condition, what they find upon arrival is a gorgeous well-ordered home boasting light, loads of well tended plants and some truly kickass classical music. Poor Lilly can only look the worse for wear within these luxurious surroundings.

Once they've arrived it becomes strikingly clear why Lilly isn't all that thrilled to see her children much less sanctioned their summons.

The eldest is Laura (Karmine Alers). If Glenn was tasked with describing her character only one word would be necessary:



angry. Laura is constantly angry. She's angry because her brother is 15 minutes late in picking her up. She is angry to receive Ted's summons, treating it as little more than an inconvenience, one which needs to be resolved with all due haste. She might be dying but much to Laura's chagrin, Lilly still knows how to piss her off. Laura is angry at Ted's presence in the family home and in response she tells Lilly she looks like shit and later rails against Ted, first demanding to know if Lilly was sleeping with the young man before insisting Ted was nothing but an opportunist.

Then Laura tells Lilly that she wants Lilly to come home with her...

Compared to angry Laura, how could Ryan Vigilant's cute as a button Elliot not emerge as the nice one? Much younger than his sister, Elliot is portrayed as someone who has found it much easier to fall into step with his sister than by taking responsibility for his own choices.

Giving the narrative a bit of a nudge, Ted urges Lilly to take advantage of the opportunity she been given with her children of a second chance to become the mother, if only briefly, she now wishes she could have been. Sadly LeMay's screenplay only rarely manages to scratch beneath the surface to explore the causes for Laura's anger, Eliot's resentment.

Wishing to impart some hard-earned wisdom to Eliot, Lilly reflects on signing up him for swimming lessons but how having seen swimmers better than himself, Eliot gave up; that if he couldn't win, he didn't want to play. Yet Eliot remembers it all rather differently



#### Buy it, rent it, or forget it...

Where **Naked as We Came** succeeds best is crafting an atmosphere of familiar tension and disappointment, although like so many indie films these days, cinematographer Vitaly Bokser finds it necessary to pan the landscape again and again. "So many trees, so many clouds," mused Glenn. Still, the rambling house is a perfect setting: stunningly spacious yet cold and barren.

Why, again, has Lilly chosen to come home to die?

The characters, too, seem perfectly suited to the surroundings: attractive yet lacking substance since LeMay eschews proper back stories for the characters in favor of awkward, drawn out family dinners, much shouting and a curious marijuana-infused picnic. Sadly, the political scandal which serves as a narrative framework proves a nonstarter.

Lilly, glamorously turbaned a la Norma Desmond, has already made her peace with her condition; no follower of Dylan Thomas is she. Yet acceptance of her fate hardly makes for compelling drama, nor does it help that she is hindered with dialogue like "we all leave the same way we came in ... naked and alone."

Speaking of naked – or rather shirtless – both Ryan Vigilant and Benjamin Weaver acquit themselves nicely. A photo of the shirtless Vigilant proves a prominent feature of the film's marketing campaign and is likely to accompany this review.

Beautifully filmed and boasting a dynamic score, **Naked as We Came** struck much more of a chord with Glenn's friends than indeed with Glenn yet is surely well worth a rental, if not a must-have DVD purchase.

and for just a moment their relationship gains clarity.

Glenn wished for more scenes like this, scenes which would have brought much needed depth to the four characters, scenes which would have enabled Glenn to actually become involved with their individual stories, to care about these four characters.

Instead, LeMay's screenplay veers off in another direction entirely.

After a particularly difficult dysfunctional dinner, poor Lilly is whisked off to bed whilst Ted, Eliot and Laura all head off to the pool. To her credit, Laura senses she's the odd girl out and makes a hasty retreat, allowing the two toothsome lads a chance to get to know each other better – at least biblically. Following a hot tub confessional, Ted and Elliot hit the sheets; well of course they do. The resulting lovemaking is astonishingly artistic, absurdly restrained and worst of all, in the very best taste.

Still, the light of day brings with it more shouting (Laura), more hand-gnashing and recriminations (Eliot) even if Lilly gives her tacit approval.



#### **JASON DOTTLEY'S RETURN TO LOVE STORY** Star of TV's Sordid Lives On Life and Love After Divorce

When Sordid Lives star Jason Dottley married his long-term partner, playwright-filmmaker Del Shores, in 2003, the pair imagined theirs would be a love to last a lifetime.

Together, the 'first couple of West Hollywood' (as they were often dubbed by fans of the show) fought hard for marriage equality, becoming posterboys of the movement. That was, until last year, when Del Shores announced via Facebook that they were splitting. In his post, Shores wrote, "This was not what I wanted, but I must now accept what Jason wants."

Disappointed fans waited to hear Dottley's reason for leaving, however, their wait would be a long one. The early 30s Mississippi native chose to remain silent. Even Shores admitted in an interview with the Dallas Voice that he didn't know why Dottley departed. "Let me put it this way," he explained to reporter Rich Lopez, "I come up with reasons I don't cast certain (actors), but the bottom line is, I don't want (them) to play the role. The bottom line was Jason said, 'I don't want to be married to you anymore.' And there was no negotiation on any level."

After a year of personal contemplation, Dottley says he is ready to break his silence. More than that, he is eager to experience love again. He sings about it in "Love Story", a song he wrote that releases next month.

The slice of 80's pop, layered with emotionally compelling lyrics, is the first of a three-part experience Dottley is calling *The Love Story Project* that will also include a music video and a Love-U-Mentary film.

#### You made your marriage with Del Shores public. Why did you choose to keep your divorce private for so long?

I chose to keep my pain and my journey to myself, to write about it, to learn from it. Discussing it with total strangers while I was lost in the trek myself was not on the agenda for me.

#### How long has it been since the divorce became final?

April, 2013.

You were married nine years. Walking down the aisle, did you intend for it to be forever? Of course I did.

# When did the blooms first start falling from the rose?

That sounds so pretty. About two years before we separated.

#### Were you fighting or simply drifting in different directions?

We evolved into people who didn't compliment and inspire each other any more. We stopped healing, growing. It wasn't like I threw the towel in the first time it got ugly. 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#### On Second Thought... 2013/2014: New Year's Reflections

#### 2013 - It was a very good year...for the most part.

LBGT people throughout the country have a lot to be proud about. 2013 was truly a rainbow banner year marked by major political victories in states and the Supreme Court.. Starting off the New Year, Maryland allowed same-sex marriage as of January 1, 2013. Although the Obama administration had been more diplomatic in dealing with LGBT issues in the first term, in his 2013 state of the union address, the President took the opportunity to directly recognize the LGBT cause. Mentioning the historic civil rights landmarks of Seneca Falls, Selma, and "Stonewall" in an alliterative linking he raised the LGBT struggle for equality to that of woman's suffrage and African-American rights. In June, in a 5-4 decision, the US Supreme Court declared the Defense of Marriage Act unconstitutional. It also struck down California's Proposition 8 that banned same-sex marriage in that state. Meanwhile, in a proverbial domino effect, Delaware, Hawai'i, Illinois, Minnesota, New Jersey, New Mexico, Rhode Island, and Utah followed suit and Michigan edged towards recognition. Granted Utah is under appeal but stays have been rejected by the courts and same-sex marriages continue. Now, according to an NPR report, almost 40% of all Americans live in a state with marriage equality.

Media helped the cause, presenting more LGBT characters, both animated and living. GLAAD lists 31 regulars and 19 reoccurring characters on major network TV. Unlike in days past, when LGBT roles were largely negative stereotypes, today, albeit still somewhat stereotypical, they range from silly to sympathetic like Downton Abbey's Thomas Barrow.

Locally, Milwaukee PrideFest, again, provided local and international visitors one of the nation's top Pride events. The Pride-Parade drew record attendance. The Milwaukee LGBT Community Center hired Colleen Carpenter as its new executive director. Her views, revealed in my December QUEST interview, give further hope and assurance that positive progress for the Center and the community as a whole will continue to be made. It should also be noted that the Center's monthly TGIF event was last held at the Center itself rather than in some sundry straight bar as had previously been its ironic wont. Hopefully, this marks a permanent change or at least one that includes other LGBT establishments. After decades of the Guerilla Gay Bar movement and some odd penchant for gay organizations to hold receptions and TGIFs in trendy straight clubs and eateries, perhaps 2014 will see a return to those groups supporting LGBT owned businesses

Speaking of sad ironies, after eight and a half years, the Milwaukee Gay Arts Center was forced from its gayborhood location on South 2<sup>nd</sup> Street due to a rent hike. It carries on, homeless, for the time being. With an ever lessening LGBT presence, Historic Walker's Point is slowly becoming another Third Ward with gentrification forcing out the very people who launched the area's revitalization decades ago. Meanwhile, Wisconsin's marriage equality status is mired in a constitution challenge against its domestic partnership registry by none other than Wisconsin Family Action's Julianne Appling. Her case has been repeatedly defeated and repeatedly appealed. The next court decision is scheduled for Spring 2014. A firm believer that being gay is a matter of choice, Appling says in a 2012 Huffington Post interview gays have left the lifestyle "in droves" sometimes with "help." That reminds me, this year, gay conversion therapy was banned in New Jersey and California. Also, leading gay conversion therapy group "Exodus International" closed in June with an apology to those they have "hurt."

Internationally, LGBT people faced a mix of challenges, de-

feats. and legalized discrimination. On the positive side, draconian anti-LGBT laws passed in Russia and an anti-LGBT remark by the CEO of an Italian pasta producer resulted in worldwide response. Although the rather pointless dumping of rail quality vodka in a symbolic gesture of just how far angry American gays will go to stand up for the rights of their foreign brothers and sisters, an instantly effective international boycott of Barilla pasta resulted in the company promising to introduce diversity into its advertising. Although there will be no official boycott of the Sochi Winter Games, in solidarity with Russia's LGBT people, President Obama and numerous other Western leaders will not attend. Numerous LGBT athletes will compete for the USA and other nations

Elsewhere, Uganda, with the help of the US Christian right, passed its Anti-Homosexuality Bill. Colloquially, it's called the Kill the Gays Bill. India reinstated criminalization of homosexuality

The Vatican's new top man, Pope Francis made eyebrow raising headlines when he shrugged off a question regarding gays with a much quoted "who am I to judge?" Even the respectable Advocate Magazine jumped on the papal bandwagon. Celebrating this seeming turn-about, it named Francis its Person of the Year. Its December cover put his smiling face with a "NO H8" logo photo-shopped on his cheek. The accompanying article noted his "stark change" in rhetoric. Still, actions speak louder than words. So far the pope, who vehemently opposed marriage equality in his native Argentina, has most recently instructed the bishop of Malta to preach against the locally pending recognition of same-sex relationships especially in regards to the adoption of children. In September he excommunicated an Australian priest who supports the ordination of women. Call me a doubting Thomas, but I sense the lamb in ecclesiastical clothing may be a wolf after all.

On a positive note, on Christmas Day, England's Dr. Alan Turing, the Enigma codebreaker whose efforts helped the Allies achieve victory over Nazi Germany, received a royal pardon. Turing, considered the father of modern computer science, had been convicted for homosexual activity in 1952. He faced the choice of imprisonment or chemical castration. He chose the latter. He killed himself two years later.

There were so many more events in 2013 worth mentioning but suffice it say, the positives outweighed the negatives, at least domestically. In 2014 the fight for marriage equality will hopefully maintain its momentum. Surrounded by states with marriage equality, Wisconsin, too, may someday rank among those that have recognized our inalienable right to the pursuit of happiness. Oh, and maybe Aaron Rodgers will come out. Happy New Year~!

Now, let's step into the Bitchin' Kitchen, shall we? I was experimenting in the kitchen the other day and came up with these two baked treats. One is savory and one is sweet, but they both call for only two ingredients. You don't have to be a master baker (I said "baker," people!) to whip up these delights. Serve one with dinner and one for dessert! They're great and so dam easy! Try them and see...then, eat good and shut up!

#### CHEESY-STUFFED CRESCENTS

I thought I'd experiment with two of my favorite things...butter crescents and creamy garden vegetable spreadable cheese. The results were these no-fuss crescents, perfect alongside any meal. They also make yummy snacks when you're craving something on the savory side.

#### 1 tube (8 oz) crescent roll dough 1 container (8 oz) garden-vegetable spreadable cheese

Preheat oven to 350 degrees. Line a baking sheet with parchment paper. Separate dough into triangles. Using the back of a spoon, carefully spread roughly 1/2 tablespoon cheese over each triangle and roll up according to package directions, and set on baking sheet. Bake crescents according to package directions or until golden brown.

(Note: Ruthie tested this recipe with Wisconsin Kaukauna Garden Vegetable Spreadable Cheese.)

#### **Ruthie's Culinary Clues**

Want to get fancy? Brush a little beaten egg or melted butter over the crescents; top with some sesame seeds before popping them in the oven. You can also top them with a little grated Parmesan cheese before or after baking. The leftover spreadable cheese is heavenly on sandwiches!

#### CHOCOLATE-HAZELNUT CRESCENTS

I simply can't get enough of Nutella. I'm not kidding. If they made a Nutella lubricant, I'd buy it. Here's a two-ingredient snack that anyone can bake up, regardless of experience in the kitchen! The first time I made these, I knew they were a keeper. Perfect for brunch, these are so chocolaty and sinful, they'll become an instant classic in your trailer!

#### 1 tube (8 oz) crescent roll dough 1 jar (13 oz) hazelnut spread

Preheat oven to 350 degrees. Line a baking sheet with parchment paper. Separate dough into triangles. Using the back of a spoon, carefully spread roughly 1/2 tablespoon hazelnut spread over each triangle and roll up according to package directions, and set on baking sheet. Bake filled crescents according to package directions or until golden brown.

(Notes: Ruthie tested this recipe with Nutella brand hazelnut spread. Do not use garlic-fla-vored crescent-roll dough for this recipe.)

#### **Ruthie's Culinary Clues**

For extra flair, brush the unbaked crescents with melted butter, and top with a few slivered almonds; bake as directed. You can also sprinkle some chopped pecans over the hazelnut spread before rolling up the crescents. After removing these from the oven, top the indulgent bites with a little powdered sugar.



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
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
