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THE KING (QUEEN) OF THE MISFIT TOYS TIMOTHY WESTBROOK INTERVIEWED BY MICHAEL JOHNSTON

Now here is a man who at the mere age of 25 has a degree in fiber arts and material studies from Syracuse University, he was selected from a battery of artists to be the fourth Artist in Residence at The Pfister Hotel, yet first out-of-state, youngest, and first non-painting artist. He spoke at Green-Biz's NYC Conference in February of 2013, and then went on to "compete" on a major reality show (Project Runway) leaving a positive lasting impression. His name still opens doors and has made artistic contributions to the Cream City he is Timothy Westbrook.

Who inspires you in your creative process?

Who isn't? I love making something look high end, a luxury item - not to appear to be student work. The key to luxury is my having small intricate processes. I mimic McQueen's process however I use only discarded items. I love Dior's structured silhouettes and the work of Colleen Atwood she does all the costumes for the Tim Burton films. I love the fantasy worlds she creates through the use of costume.

What truly inspires me is less of whom and more of a what. Preserving the natural world is the biggest source of my inspiration. Avoiding throwing anything away, identifying the expiration date of "stuff" and redefining what we do with it after we're "done" with it.

Of all the famous and infamous out there - - whom would you like to dress the most?

When I cared about the famous it was Kate Winslett, she is beautiful and womanly. Her role in Titanic inspired me to make clothing and more specifically period inspired clothing. I've had a shift in my work; I'm more interested in fabricating, I achieve full happiness in making the material something it's made from, rather than actually making the finished product. Anyone can be a star, as long as they believe they are a star. I have great fulfillment with people in my show(s) getting recognition for their input. Case in point, the three figure skaters from my last show, Legacy presented at The Pfister Hotel, appeared on The Morning Blend to celebrate their passions. In another case a model that I work with often has been on the covers of magazines yet has never been paid. Working on one of my shows was one of her first paid modeling gigs. Alexis Rose a first rate stylist I work with who puts all the pieces of the puzzle together to create a palette of my work is very committed to child abuse, whereas I'm into sustainability. We worked together on a fashion show on the west coast that was made up of survivors of abuse - who were our models. They were so excited to work with us - - due to the whole Project Runway identification. These teens were so low and suffering no self-worth - - but by participating in the show they were validated, raised up, raised back to where they once were or should be. By being a part of this event I could help them make an aspiration. What a great feeling. It's bigger than all of us.

Who is more fun to dress men or women? And why do women always seem to have more fashion choices?

My preference is androgynous, masculine woman/feminine man - men in heels with make-up, women barefoot, sans make-up infusing that into a daily experience. It's difficult to dress anyone – the social perimeters, to dare to go beyond the structures of society.

What's it like to be a fashion designer, a Couturier?

I wish I knew, being a couturier means having an official license. I do love the experience of creating work by hand and having an intimate relationship with the construction process of creating clothing. I also identify as a fiber artist over a fashion designer as I'm not interested in creating clothing for mass consumption, pass production, and mass waist. I like to create pieces that tell individual stories

What would be your favorite fashion period?

The 1880's because even with all of those layers of fabric there was still a very provocative social climate. It was also the last great hurrah before the beginning of the end; it was the dawn of the industrial revolution. Dress Reform (at the turn of the century) began to update dress styles due to health issues and the dangers they were causing. Dress trains were extinct, all the material at the back of a dress picking up dirt off the street and bringing disease into the home. Not to mention all of the issues with corsetry.

I also love the ideologies of Art Nuevo. It was a rebellion of the industrial revolution at the turn of the 20th century while my work is a rebellion of the technological revolution at the turn of the 21st century.

What is your favorite material to work with?

Anything deemed expired, discarded, again finding another use for something that society may consider useless.

Do your talents and interest travel into the world of décor and decorate i.e. Ralph Lauren?

I think doing window display could be fun! Because I create costumes and wearable art, it is fun to image the world and the environment they would live in. So while I'm not interested in commercial design, I love the idea of set dressing and window displays.

Where do you see yourself in 20 years?

Perhaps a duplex with my parents, sitting outside at a campfire with my dad, I'll be 45 years old, hopefully happy! My dream is to own a Yak farm in Montana.

Do you have any siblings?

I have an older sister whom I'm very fond of. She was my protector growing up. Maria, she is a social worker, also gay and will be getting married next year. She resides in upstate New York near my parents. It was a non-issue for my parents; each of them has a gay brother







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who opened that closet up. Maria was the star athlete, and she would always defend me against bullies. I would be bringing Barbie Dolls to school and the area I grew up in was not tolerant.

Why are unicorns so important to you – you use them as almost a trademark.

I'm from the middle of the woods. Unicorns may very well have been in my back yard growing up. I believe that my generation equates nature to mythology with so many fairy tales and fantasy stories taking place in nature. My conclusion is that fairytales are equated to nature and if fairytales are not real then nature is not real and therefore it isn't something tangible to protect. Now imagine walking into a classroom of five-year-olds and saying "Unicorns will die if you don't protect the forest!" or "Mermaids can't survive in polluted water!" You will have INSTANT environmentalists. Fashion, sustainability, and art are far too abstract and complex to digest. Unicorns, dinosaurs, and mythology are fun and approachable and most people have a connection to them. They are a light way of approaching the topic of sustainability.

Please finish this statement - - Timothy Westbrook is...

Crazy! Young. Passionate. Before I came to Milwaukee I was Tim Westbrook, but when I came to be the Artist in Residence at The Pfister, I became Timothy Westbrook. I often wonder if the name is bigger than I can control. I think of Timothy Westbrook as my father's younger brother. I'm on a journey to figure out who or what Timothy Westbrook is. I know that right now he is a figure skater, a biker, "an artist," and a devotee to his family and Mother Earth.

Currently Timothy Westbrook is working with performing arts groups – fascinated with their costumes and sets. He's made priceless contributions to The Milwaukee Ballet's production of "Mirror, Mirror" and at Dance Works he can practice his skills, crafts and his vision is greatly appreciated. It's important to Timothy to make a positive impact. Is Milwaukee the setting for this, who knows? It's been two years already, how long will all of this last? He has to figure out his personal goals and form a game plan, or the game plan to lead to his desired goals. While he is here, let's just enjoy his vision... and clap if you believe!

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
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WILLIAM RADLER RECEIVES PRIDEFEST MEDAL AT CREAM CITY FOUNDATION FETE

William Radler, internationally recognized creator of the Knock Out rose series, will receive the Pride-Fest Medal for Community Achievement at Cream City Foundation's (CCF), My Best Friend is Straight, annual fund raiser. This year's event will be held at Radler's home (The Rosarium) in Hales Corners, WI. The award is being made in recognition of Radler's long term philanthropic support of the LGBT community.

Designed by PrideFest board member, Paul Masterson and executed by PrideFest's Offical Jeweler, Chris Jansen of C-3 Designs in Oak Creek, the medal is traditionally bestowed on its recipients during the PrideFest Opening Ceremony. "Due to Radler's absence over PrideFest weekend, he was unable to receive his

award. Given the extreme generosity his philanthropy represents, we felt CCF's event, *My Best Friend is Straight*, offered the perfect opportunity for a public presentation." PrideFest President Scott Gunkel said.

Instituted in 2007, the PrideFest Medal for Community Achievement is conferred on individuals organizations, and corporations that, through their extraordinary efforts, have positively impacted the LGBT community in its struggle for equality or have forwarded those efforts through their generous philan-



thropy. "PrideFest is more than entertainment and a party. It celebrates our LGBT community in all its many facets from spirituality, arts, and history, to athletics, family, and health. PrideFest represents all of our culture, our complete community. PrideFest also honors those who contribute so much to our struggle for equality. The PrideFest Medal's purpose is not only to recognize achievements that truly warrant an award, but also to remind us of just who we are, and our history. We hope the recipients understand they are part of that extraordinary narrative. William Radler certainly epitomizes that ultimate dedication to the LGBT cause and the virtue of giving back to the community. PrideFest is proud to present William Radler with our small

token of esteem and gratitude," Gunkel said.

Radler made a \$1,000,000 gift to the AIDS Resource Center of Wisconsin (ARCW) through the Greater Milwaukee Foundation in November of 2013. The largest gift given to ARCW by an individual, the funds are earmarked for expanded psychiatric services over the next three years. In addition to his \$1,000,000 to ARCW, Radler recently announced his gift of \$65,000 to the UWM Golda Meier Library's LGBT Archive during a CCF special event held June 19. In his remarks,

Radler cited his mentor in philanthropy, Joseph Pabst, who inspired him to support the LGBT Archive. Pabst, a recipient of the PrideFest Medal in 2008, has long been recognized as one of Milwaukee's leading philanthropists. "It was completely Joe's idea for the money to be used for the archive. I made my gift to honor Joe Pabst and make the community aware of his philanthropic efforts." Radler said.

Responding to the news, UWM head archivist, Michael Doylen, who also established the LGBT archive, expressed both surprise and gratitude. "We're stunned by Will Radler's generosity and are deeply appreciative. The gift enables the library's archive and special collections to do significantly more with the LGBT history collection than our existing resources currently allow." Doylen said.

Radler also made a \$25,000 challenge to raise funds for CCF's operational costs.


Asked about his decades long history of philanthropic giving, Radler reflected. "I think one of the great things of giving is calling attention to philanthropy. I have money. I can do things like that. Everybody else, no matter what their means, can make a small gesture. Those small gestures can amount to more than I can ever give. Few people are independent of everyone else. It takes team work to get any job done. That's why I encourage team work."

The 2014 PrideFest Medal recipients also include the American Civil Liberties Union, Pathfinders – Q Blok, and PrideFest volunteers Pete Minns and Tim Talsky.

Five Dances Getting Go: The Go Doc Project

Whatever possessed Glenn to pair for a midsummer madness movie night two such disparate films as Alan Brown's Five Dances and Getting Go: The Go Doc Project by Cory Krueckeberg? Whatever indeed?

It is difficult to imagine a story as familiar as that offered in Five Dances. Young Chip (Ryan Steele) has fled the nightmares of small town American replete with a suitably dysfunctional family to head to the big city, to New York and the opportunity offered by a Joffrey Ballet scholarship.

Such a scenario has been used in countless gay films and novels. In 1995's seminal Stonewall, one of Glenn's personal faves, one very timely greyhound bus delivers hunky Matty Dean (Frederick Weller) to The Big Apple just in time for him to join the rioters outside the Stonewall Inn one starry June evening all these many years ago.

Yet for others, Doc (Tanner Cohen) in Cory Krueckeberg's Getting Go for instance, escape to the big city and with it the promised anonymity doesn't in fact always provide the much sought-after answers.

Having previewed both films in advance of the cinema night, Glenn decided to lead off with the quiet joys of Five Dances.

Five Dances, after a brief seductive dance solo by Ryan Steele, opens as Chip (Steele) joins a small modern dance troupe about to begin rehearsals for a piece choreographed by Anthony (Luke Murphy). The small dance troop also numbers Cynthia (Kimiye Corwin), Katie (Catherine Miller) and Theo (Reed Luplau).

Was Glenn the only one to think that Theo seemed to take an inordinate interest in watching Chip as the newcomer stripped down to his rehearsal attire?

Anthony, with suitable gravitas, explains why his 10-minute dance piece is so important. Indeed, it is scheduled on the opening night of the festival as well as being the first piece of the program. With that little bit of backstory now out of the way, the dancers can take the floor. In fact, from this point on, Five **Dances** rarely leaves the Soho dance studio.

Gradually Alan Brown's Spartan screenplay





fills in a few of the characters' personal bits. Katie has recently broken up with her boyfriend. Cynthia is married but is having an affair with Anthony.

Center stage is Chip, who proves to be such a fascinating character largely because it seems extraordinary to grow to care so much about someone we learn so little about. Okay, he's broke, initially sleeping rough before ending up sleeping at the dance studio. Yet, Chip is such an impressive a dancer, he is quickly given a key solo, one originally offered to Theo. Katie, a genuinely kind soul, befriends Chip, welcoming him with her friendship and with her comfy sofa. He in turn beguiles her with his comical/creepy gift for ventriloquism. And that's about it other than Chip is given a drunken, psychotic mother who phones the poor lad constantly demanding he come home. This last detail being perhaps Brown's only narrative misstep.

But for the most part, Alan Brown seeks to develop his characters, their relationships and the drama through dance.

Getting Go: The Go Doc Project challenges moviegoers by paying homage to Queer Cinema pioneers as Gregg Araki and Bruce LaBruce by embracing their guerrilla filmmaking techniques in the chronicling the story of one soon-to-be college graduate and a young go-go boy; said go-go boy's epic, corn-fed ass almost emerging as its own, admitted supporting, character.

We become introduced to Doc (Tanner Cohen, Were the World Mine) as he masturbates for his online blog followers. To his followers, and ultimately to we moviegoers, Doc confesses his obsession with a go-go boy with the unlike moniker, Go (Matthew Camp). If only he weren't such a pussy, thinks/says Doc, he would just talk to the cute go-go boy in question. Instead, Doc devises an elaborate ruse to meet Go, claiming to be a documentary filmmaker interested in New York City nightlife scene. Who better than an epicassed go-go boy to act as a subject for such a project?

If there is anything "epic" about Doc's first meeting with Go, it is with regard to the amount of embarrassment that Doc should be registering (and later retelling his blog follow-

Watch it, DVR it, or forget it...

It is difficult to imagine two films more effectively challenging traditional cinematic narrative than both Getting Go: The Go Doc Project and Five Dances.

Although framed as a back stage drama, with requisite love story, Five Dances is far more concerned with the nature of dance, as if Brown and cinematographer Derek McKane are seeking to find where the lives of dancers intersect with their art. Regardless their goal, the results are nothing short of stunning.

An extraordinarily gifted dancer, Ryan Steele's Chip seems such a beguiling lost soul at the beginning of the film. He's guiet, self-contained but also determined and hard working. Clearly the only place he's ever been able to really be himself is the dance studio and once he begins rehearsal, the more confidence he gains. So determined is he to succeed, Chip is initially oblivious to Theo's advances. What a joy it is to watch Chip finally on his way to love and perhaps happiness.

Moviegoers who are dance enthusiasts, particularly those who enjoy watching attractive, well fit young men dance intimately, will love Five Dances.

If Five Dances leaves moviegoers with the possibility of a happily-ever-after, Getting Go ends decidedly more enigmatically, with Doc resolutely remaining hidden behind his computer screen only now having relocated to the joys of lowa; Doc has come home, if not actually his home, but alone as he is likely to remain.

Rarely if ever does one's fantasy come to life as happens here for Doc; if only he can put the camera down long enough to see beyond Go's epic-ass.

Here, you'll find a pasta salad with a Greek twist (gotta love those Greeks), two simply impressive appetizers and a frosty dessert you've got to try to believe. These dishes are perfect for summer parties or for pigging out on your own. I don't care what you do with them. Just make them! Then, eat good and shut up!



GREEK TORTELLINI SALAD

Looking for an easy, change-of-pace pasta salad to bring to a summer shindig? No? Well, screw you. Here's one anyway! This recipe makes a lot, so it's ideal for large get-togethers.

1 package (20 oz) refrigerated cheese tortellini
1 cup cubed, cooked ham
1 small onion, chopped
1 package (8 oz) sliced Portobello mushrooms
1 can (15 oz) cannellini beans, drained and rinsed
1 can (2.25 oz) sliced black olives, drained
2 cups baby spinach, chopped
3/4 to 1 cup prepared pesto
1 cup crumbled feta cheese

Prepare tortellini as directed. Drain and rinse in cool water. Set tortellini in a large bowl. Add ham, onion, mushrooms, beans, olives and spinach. Toss with pesto. Top with cheese. Refrigerate leftovers.

Ruthie's Culinary Clues

Leave out the ham for a great vegetarian dish or replace it with last night's cooked chicken. This is not a creamy salad. If you like your pasta salads with more dressing, simply add more pesto or stir in a few tablespoons of olive oil. Cannellini beans, by the way, are sometimes labeled as white kidney beans.

TOASTY PIZZA ROLL-UPS

Some people are intimidated by using puff pastry sheets, but they couldn't be easier to use or more impressive to serve! These casual appetizers are super easy and super tasty. Damn it...try them!

1 sheet puff pastry, thawed (from a 17.3 oz box)
1/4 cup pizza sauce
1/4 teaspoon dried oregano
1 cup shredded mozzarella cheese
1/4 cup diced pepperoni
1 tablespoon grated Parmesan cheese

Line a baking sheet with parchment paper and carefully unfold puff pastry onto paper. (Freeze the other pastry sheet for a later use, double the recipe and use both sheets or use it in the following recipe.) Spread sauce over puff pastry, leaving a 1- inch border along one of the longer edges. This should be the edge furthest from you. Top sauce with oregano, mozzarella, pepperoni and Parmesan.

Starting with a long end, roll up pastry sheet as tightly as possible, working toward the end with the 1-inch border. Wrap roll in cling wrap and aluminum foil and store in freezer for 1 hour.

Preheat oven to 400 degrees. Using a sharp, serrated knife, cut roll into 1-inch slices and set on a greased baking sheet. Bake for 20 minutes or until golden.

Ruthie's Culinary Clues

If rolled tight enough, the pastry roll should be only slightly larger than a cardboard paper towel roll. Make the rolls ahead of time, freezing them for up to 2 weeks; simply remove them from the freezer 20 minutes before slicing and baking. Serve the toasty slices with extra pizza sauce for dipping.

TOASTY BUFFALO WING ROLL-UPS

This appetizer comes together like the previous recipe, but it offers a spicy kick and lots of blue cheese flavor. Why not make these roll-ups and the pizza roll-ups at the same time? They're that simple!

1 sheet puff pastry, thawed (from a 17.3 oz box)
1/4 cup buffalo wing sauce
1 cup crumbled blue cheese
1/4 cup finely chopped cooked chicken
1/4 teaspoon celery seed
Ranch salad dressing

Line a baking sheet with parchment paper and carefully unfold puff pastry onto paper. (Freeze the other pastry sheet for a later use, double the recipe and use both sheets or use it in the previous recipe.) Spread sauce over puff pastry, leaving a 1- inch border along one of the longer edges. This should be the edge furthest from you. Top with cheese, chicken, and celery seed. Starting with a long end, roll up pastry sheet as tightly as possible, working toward the end with the 1-inch border. Wrap roll in cling wrap and aluminum foil and store in freezer for 1 hour. Preheat oven to 400 degrees. Using a sharp, serrated knife, cut roll into 1-inch slices and set on a greased baking sheet. Bake for 20 minutes or until golden. Serve with salad dressing for dipping.

Ruthie's Culinary Clues

Don't have celery seed? Leave it out! Make sure to slice the rolls with a sharp serrated knife. This will ensure even slices for an impressive final result. Jazz up your serving platter with carrot and celery sticks for extra color.

CHOCOLATE PEANUT BUTTER PIE

What's better than chocolate and peanut butter? Okay...sailors, construction workers and Gay porn stars. But after that? Not much! Cool off sultry summer nights with this frosty treat! It's a no-bake delight that comes together in moments. Best of all, you can make the damn thing ahead of time and store it in the freezer.

1 block (8 oz) cream cheese, softened
2 cans (5 oz each) sweetened condensed milk
3/4 cup peanut butter
2 tablespoons lemon juice
1 teaspoon vanilla extract
1 cup frozen whipped topping, thawed
1 chocolate cookie pie crust (6 oz)
Chocolate ice cream topping

In a large bowl, beat cream cheese until fluffy. (Yes, I said "fluffy.") Slowly beat in condensed milk. Beat in peanut butter, lemon juice and extract until well combined. Fold in whipped topping.

Spoon into pie crust. (Crust will be Tull.) Drizzle ice cream topping over pie. Cover and freeze for at least 4 hours. Set out 20 minutes before slicing and serving.

Ruthie's Culinary Clues

If you want to be extra fancy, grab some heavy whipping cream and whip it up to use in place of the frozen whipped topping, or garnish the pie with chopped peanut butter cups for extra flair. You can store this honey of a dessert in the freezer for up to 2 months. Have some extra pie filing? Store it in the fridge. It's a great dip for apple wedges, celery sticks or graham crackers.

In 1948, Alfred Hitchkok made a film version of the 1929 controversial thriller "ROPE." The play upon which the film was based was indeed very different from the Jimmy Stewart vehicle. Patrick Hamilton's play concerned two Gay college students who murder a handsome twenty year old fellow student simply to see if they can "pull-off" the perfect crime. But the play was not only controversial for it's Gay sub-text. It also explored the mental state of England and Eu-

explored the mental state of England and Europe between the war, a hedonistic, drug-riddled, experimental culture, determined to forget the past and not give a damn about the future. Hamilton's play questions the very value of human ife itself in both wartime and in peace. The play is sensual, violent, witty, disturbing, and philosophical. It also introduces one of the most interesting and unique criminal investigators in all of literature, Rupert Cadell, an eccentric poet who was horribly disfigured in the trenches of the First World War. Rupert has the decadent ability to conceive of the most lurid and horrifying acts, but he draws the line at actually performing them...unlike our college lovers Brandon and Granillo. Brandon's sadistic control over Granillo leads the tender younger man down

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

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
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
