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## AN INTERVIEW WITH GERALD COON PHD, PRESIDENT AND CEO OF DIVERSE AND RESILIENT

Eight months ago, Gerald Coon succeeded founder Gary Hollander as President and CEO of Diverse and Resilient (D&R). Coon holds a Master's Degree in Science in Rehabilitation Counseling, an MBA, and a PhD in Leadership Studies. He has been involved in the LGBT community since 1980 when he came to Milwaukee to go to graduate school. Professionally he has worked with people with disabilities, most recently as the executive director of Saint Francis Children's Center. He has served on the board of the Human Rights League and that of D&R. Coon spoke with QUEST about his new role as Diverse and Resilient's President and CEO as well as that organization's mission.

QUEST: For many in Milwaukee's LGBT community, D&R is known simply by that abbreviation. Some know its mission is "capacity building" but don't know what that means. What exactly is capacity building?

Gerald Coon: Interestingly enough we have a lot of conversation about what that means. Originally, that's what we wanted to do. We wanted to "build capacity" through support for other organizations. The idea was to make connections between smaller locations like Eau Claire, La Crosse, and the Fox Valley, to give them the resources and expertise to do what they do, but better. We would have staff help them do the work they felt was important. We still do that. We work with youth groups around the state, in Appleton and Green Bay, for example. We do training and education related to substance abuse, primarily alcohol, safe dates (helping people make decisions about healthy dating) and interpartner violence. We do very specific work using evidence based interventions. Those are the biggest ways we do capacity building.

#### QUEST: And that remains the mission today?

GC: The world has changed dramatically since the organization started 20 years ago. The impetus of working with young people now has the goal of reducing the exposure to HIV and STIs (sexually transmitted infections). Every other year we hold a summer institute for young people from throughout Wisconsin, male and female, across the gender identity spectrum about HIV. We partner with GSAFE (Gay Straight Alliance for Safe Schools) to put on the Safe Schools Safe Communities Conference to bring students, administration and staff together to make their environments safe for all, particularly LGBTQ kids. Since younger LGBT folks are now more likely to interact with non-LGBTs, one recent development is the broader application of the strategy to include everyone.

#### QUEST: D&R also has a local focus on the African-American community.

GC: Our statewide work is not exclusively African-American (AA) community focused. Our work around substance abuse, safe dates, lesbian and bisexual health is universal. Locally, most of the HIV and STI testing subjects are AAMSM (African-American Men having Sex with Men). We work with SHEBA, a transgender women's group who are all AA. Most of our youth, the community health promoters who do condom distribution, are high school age or just out of high school, happen to be AA. It's all based on the funding sources. Various government grants focus on that target group because that's where the real crisis is. We're good at it based on our staff connections.

QUEST: What about HIV and the Milwaukee AAMSM?



GC: The status is pretty distressing. It's approaching 4 out of 10 AAMSM being HIV positive. The Center for Disease Control (CDC) anticipates it could eventually be 1 in 2 for this demographic. Those are shocking statistics. That's what we're confronted with. There are all kinds of reasons for it. It would be a mistake for people to make a judgement on that. Those statistics are similar for most US urban areas. In some rural areas it's also a problem. Social determinants of health like poverty, education levels, stigma, contribute to it.


#### QUEST: You mentioned funding sources. Where does the money come from?

GC: We received a CDC grant in 2010. It was the first year of a \$300,000 per year, 5-year grant. In 2011 we received a second CDC \$300,000, 5year grant. At the same time, we started to get more from the State Department of Health Services. But then, to address the HIV/STI crisis in southern states, "The Southern Strategy" became a CDC project. Our first grant ended in 2015 and the second ends later in 2016. But resources are moving to the rural south, so we are now receiving less. The city stepped up to the plate in 2016 and supported some testing. We are working closer with the people we are testing who have some significant needs. So we also help them connect to other resources and jobs. The city helps manage some of these needs. As government partners they couldn't be more helpful. The City of Milwaukee Health Department provides us with a free space, the Northwest Health Center at 76<sup>th</sup> Street and Mill Road. The idea is to be closer to our target population on the northwest side where it is becoming increasingly AA. We do both HIV and STI testing. If someone comes in with symptoms of an STI and wants to be tested, we can also reach them for HIV testing. The city also has a WIC (Women, Infants and Children) program and otherwise serves the population that's in that community.

QUEST: What has the impact been? Have we seen a decrease in HIV infection rate among the target group?

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GC: Interestingly enough, what the funding sources want us to do is to find the HIV positives. But the point is to get them linked to care and get viral loads to undetectable. That makes them less likely to infect someone else. We are not a big enough player to say our programs account for an impact. We are a resource people will come to because we are culturally competent. Our testers have been where they are. The HIV rate is still frighteningly high.

QUEST: The church is a powerful, influential force in the black community. What strategy is currently in place to engage major black churches and their leaders to collaborate?

GC: There's not any current particular strategy. Back in 2012 there was a push to engage black churches. It's challenging. Some are more helpful than others. The Wisconsin Black Health Coalition pulls together a number of black churches interested in supporting people who have HIV because their faith calls them to help rather than shun people. Ronny Grace, one of our HIV testing staff, was interviewed for Black Nouveau as an openly gay and openly HIV positive black man. Part of the interview was shown in churches. We've had conversations about how we better connect with black churches. Dr. Cathy Quinn has done studies through the Center for AIDS Intervention Research and we've helped recruit people for her to interview, providing a resource to someone who is really in the field. It is fascinating to see the research about the connection of black men to their churches. Again, the world has changed so much, in part thanks to President Obama and marriage equality, so it impacts the church's response to the current realities. White people leave faith altogether but it's not true for gay AA. The church has been more a part of daily survival. The experience is different in so many ways.

#### QUEST: But there's still a challenge of acceptance if you're black and gay.

GC: We've found an affirming church might accept someone who is LGBT but the focus here is a health condition that requires support and empathy. I think that's an important distinction. They're not speaking to their views on being gay but rather on HIV as a health condition requiring a Christian response of compassion and care.

Last week The Black Church Week of Prayer for the Healing of AIDS kicked off at St Mathews Church on 9th Street and Locust. It was Sunday, March 6th. They've done it for many, many years. There were easily 10 or 12 pastors from various churches.

## QUEST: The relationship with the LGBT Community Center has been sometimes competitive and sometimes collaborative? What is the current status?

GC: I've known Karen Gotzler (LGBT Community Center executive director) and many of its board members for a long time. They are important members of the community. We are talking with each other all the time. Our lease ends in March 2017. The LGBT Center needs a bigger space. So, our staff will talk about both the challenges and benefits of collocating. That means finding a shared space together and making each other stronger by being in the same location. Both sides are going in with an open mind. The lines of communication are open and they should be. More communication will foster more collaboration and that's a good thing.

We're actually going to be working together for a funding proposal. The Center does some things well; we do some things well. If we can get together everyone benefits. Historically we are different agencies. They are a community center but there are overlaps. We need to recognize those things and work well together. The same is true with ARCW. They have a

grant where we are a sub-recipient and we have grant where they are a sub-recipient.

QUEST: One project the community is very familiar with is the Health and Wellness Area at PrideFest. It's quite a success but it moved on the PrideFest grounds to another location. There's seems to be a mixed reaction.

GC: It will be the second year at the new location. I know there's been conversation about that. Last year we did see a significant decrease in HIV testing due to the placement of the testing site there.

#### QUEST: Can you offer an assessment of your first 8 months at D&R?

GC: Well, I'm really glad I'm here. I've lived in same house for 29 years with my partner in a very diverse Milwaukee neighborhood. There are poverty issues, urban issues. We are urban people. I couldn't not have pursued this. Had I not I would have regretted it on my deathbed. This was my opportunity to work with the LGBT community. It was a career move from the heart and not a strategic one. I have learned so much from the staff and funding sources about the very real health disparities between LGBTs and our non-LGBT peers. And that is rooted in internalized homophobia and we deserve to be as happy and healthy as everyone else. But now many people understand that who didn't before. There are so many opportunities to do good things and minimalize the disparities. It's why I do this. It's just that important.

Diverse and Resilient's 4th Annual Reviving the Dream Celebration takes place April 7. It includes the presentation of its 2016 LGBT leadership awards, honoring individuals and organizations for their leadership in, and on behalf of, Wisconsin's LGBT community.

#### **Club ICON Celebrates 10 Years!**

ICON's staff have received a variety of accolades and positions in the community including the LGBT Center or SE Wisconsin, the Milwaukee Pride Parade Board of Directors, the Kenosha Pride Board of Directors, and an honorary member of the United States Navy's GLASS Organization.

ICON has hosted events featuring JujuBee, Jackie Beat, Ronnie Nyles, the stars of COLT, Rickey Sins, Furrlesque and my favorite, thier annual Turnabout Fundraising show where the staff take to the stage and perform for a very enthusiastic crowd.

ICON's manager says, "Club ICON is a PROUD LGBTQ establishment and we are committed to the community we represent. We believe in building and maintaining a progressive atmosphere that is both entertaining and safe for everyone to enjoy. We value compassion, responsibility, and respect for all facets of diversity in the customers we serve. Club ICON welcomes the LGBTQ community, their friends, families, and straight allies who support this vision. 

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#### ART IN BLOOM AT MAM

Spring has truly arrived. The Milwaukee Art Museum celebrated its annual Spring tradition, Art in Bloom. The four-day special exhibit presents floral creations inspired by master works from the museum's collection currently on view. This year, the event showcased 41 designers. Each selected a work by drawing from a group of pre-selected pieces. Then it's up to the designer to translate the art into an arrangement of flowers. How this is realized is left up to the talent and imagination of the designer. Some

pieces recreate the art and its composition, making a two-dimensional painting into a threedimensional living sculpture. Others take the work's colors, textures, shapes or its concept and turn that into an entirely personal interpretation. Sometimes that makes realistic images abstract or abstract ones realistic. Others add whimsy and a sense of humor. One year, a painting of a nude on a couch was turned into a floral bathrobe. The seemingly incongruous interpretation was indeed a logical one. After all, the nude model would have to get up and put something on after posing, wouldn't she?

This year's selections were particularly exciting to see. With the museum's recent renovation and reinstallation of its collection, visitors were treated to an entirely new and innovative environment. The 41 floral designs could be found on all levels, offering an Easter egg hunt atmosphere with delightful surprises to be discovered in the various galleries.

#### How Much Weight Can I Lose In One Month?

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
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
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It might come as something of a surprise to many loyal *Quest* readers that Glenn has read all of the delightful novels the lovely Jane Austen, with pen in hand, managed to put to paper. What happened was a 1995 **Pride and Prejudice** mini-series which amped up the sex. The 6-part mini-series teased audiences both here in America and in Britain with playful scenes such as that of Colin Firth's Mr. Darcy stripping down and jumping into a lake or, later emerging from his bath. More controversial was the lip-lock that followed Elizabeth's wedding with Mr. Darcy.

It would seem that Jane Austen's absolute sense of decorum did not allow for even the happily married to be depicted sharing a simple kiss.

Thus Glenn blames Colin Firth for the Jane Austen cottage industry which has spiraled out of control. One could spend nearly a lifetime reading books; some where Jane solves murder mysteries, other where murders are solved by Jane's popular characters. A few years back, even acclaimed gay novelist Michael Thomas Ford began a series of light-hearted novels in which Jane Austen is alive and well (and a

vampire) and running a small bookstore in upstate New York.

Steve Hockensmith's **Pride and Prejudice and Zombies** is surely the most frightening of all, a curious Jane Austen/ zombie mashup. The cinematic adaptation of

Hockensmith's novel recently played in multiplexes across the panoramic American landscape where moviegoers far braver than Glenn could find dear Elizabeth Bennet and her haughty monster-hunter beau Fitzwilliam Darcy battling zombies in an alternative Regency England where the undead freely roam across great swatches of the pastoral English countryside.

The Scandalous Four is neither based on any one specific Jane Austen work nor upon any specific character, as many of the assembled gentlemen of the monthly cinema circle were heard to complain.

"All but," mused Glenn, under his breath.


Indeed Samantha Hills' Penelope would surely hold her own against Jane's cast of plucky protagonists, Anne Elliot from **Persuasion** coming particularly to mind.

Penelope is (shock, horror) four and twenty years old and as yet unmarried. She is also secretly in love with her dashing music teacher, Mr. Richard Reynolds (Jez Hughes) and he with her but poor Mr. Richard Reynolds is penniless and therefore an unsuitable match.

Determined to marry Penelope off, her shrewish mother plans some entertainment for a couple of afternoons, auditioning possible suitors for Penelope from what eligible young men might be found in the neighborhood. And if Glenn is to be honest, the pickings are right slim.

#### Senator Tammy Baldwin Sends Letter of Thanks to *This Is It* Owner Joe Brehm for his Contributions over the years to Milwaukee's LGBT Community.

#### First some history on Joe and his bar, "This Is It"

- "This Is It" bar opened in 1968 by June & Mike Brehm.
- At the time, there were few bars that welcomed the LGBT population; "This Is It" was a pioneer in welcoming gay men and making them feel comfortable, relaxed, and accepted.
- Early advertising called it "The East Side's New Food 'N' Fun Bar", and "Popular downtown lounge busy with reserved gentlemen and then some not so reserved."
- For over 40 years, Joe Brehm continues to to operate the bar as a gay bar in relatively unaltered condition; through June's death in 2010 and to this day.
- Under Joe's management, the bar has the distinction of being not only one of the longest continuously running gay bar in the city, but also being a staunch supporter of the gay community.
- Joe helped the owners of the "Wisconsin Light" newspaper computerize and use new technology for typesetting, layout, email. etc.
- Joe and This Is It! are the first in line to support community causes, hosting fundraising events for the Cream City Foundation, AIDS, and other worthy causes.
- Joe Brehm & This Is It has been an annual sponsor of the annual PrideFest History Exhibit.
- This Is It!'s 40th anniversary was celebrated with a 2008 article in "Q-Life" newspaper.
- In 2012, "This Is It" was highlighted as a major presence in Milwaukee and the State of Wisconsin in the Wisconsin Historical Society Press' book "Bottoms Up- A Toast to Wisconsin's Historic Bars & Breweries" (written by Jim Draeger and Mark Speltz).
- Over the years, Joe (with help from recent partner George Schneider) have together kept the bar exciting, and have maintained a loyal following of old-timers as well as new blood.
- As the only LGBT bar in the immediate downtown area, it is an important social gathering place for visitors staying in downtown hotels.
- And yet, "This Is It" is a comfortable spot for the straight community to patronize as well; it is a favorite spot for all visitors to Jazz in the Park, Bastille Days, and other downtown events.

While I am on the topic of these organizations I just want to extend my personal thanks to all of the people involved with each organization. Both of these organizations are run by volunteers and require huge time commitments from all of their members. Both Pridefest and the Pride Parade work year round to make sure that everything will be perfect for the coming year. So, next time you see a volunteer for either Pridefest or the Pride Parade

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(Or ANY volunteer organization for that matter) let them know how much you appreciate their hard work.

Okay let's get to it. This month I figured we should talk about a new piercing fad which seems to be taking the world by storm. They are called Dermal Anchors. Now I'm not going to call them piercings because in reality they are not the true definition of what they are is a "Trans-dermal Implant." I know that's a big word for a lot of my readers so we will bring it down a level or 10. What that really means is that there is a piece of metal permanently implanted under your skin and then different "Ends" can be screwed on to the base. That's right I said permanent, once these piercings heal they need to be surgically removed by cutting the skin which holds them in. A not so fun and not so painless procedure I might add.

Dermal Anchors have a few additional concerns over a traditional piercing. For starters when they are removed, or if they migrate (reject), they will leave a larger and more noticeable scar than a traditional piercing. Additionally, Dermal Anchors go deeper into the body than a traditional piercing and thus the risk of bleeding and bruising to the site of the piercing is increased dramatically.

The care of Dermal Anchors also varies from that of traditional piercings. First and foremost the body needs time to heal and begin to grow new tissue to hold in the anchor, for this reason you should wear a small band-aid over the anchor to prevent it from falling out for the first 2 weeks. After that you should wear the band-aid for another 2 weeks when you sleep. If you toss and turn in your sleep you should continue to wear the band-aid every night when you go to bed. As for cleaning it use an anti-bacterial soap and gently clean around, and under the "head" of, the jewelry once to twice daily. The best time to do this is at the end of your shower after you have shampooed and body washed.
