



PIRATES AT THE SKYLIGHT By Paul Masterson


The Skylight Music Theatre ends its season dedicated to divas, heroines, and harlots with a performance of Gilbert & Sullivan's The Pirates of Penzance. The English duo's work actually premiered in New York City in 1879 to critical acclaim. For the following near decade and a half it remains a popular mainstay of the American operetta repertoire. The connection to the Skylight theme of powerful women may not be at first apparent. However, for all Pirates' swashbuckling and swagger, it is the women who manage the mayhem of the males.

While the Skylight's audience is well known for its penchant for Gilbert and Sullivan, this is the first work of theirs to be staged at the Skylight since the arrival of its current artistic director, Vishwa Subbaraman in 2013. There's nothing like anticipation. With stage direction by Shawna Lucey, Robert Linder's musical direction and choreography by Ryan Capplemann, it will, no doubt, be well worth the wait.

The run also features the last of the BeOUT LGBT Nights of the season. Supported by various community organizations, these are wonderful evenings of entertainment with a cocktail hour, a light buffet beginning at 6:30 pm. Curtain is at 7:30. Tickets are also offered at a reduced rate. Since its inception a few seasons ago, Milwaukee GAMMA has made the Skylight BeOUT Night a tradition of its monthly GAMMA-OUT events.

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

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ERIC HEINRITZ, MILWAUKEE PRIDE EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR AND PRIDEFEST PRODUCER Story by Paul Masterson, Photography by Mike Hiller

Earlier this year, QUEST reported the hiring of Eric Heinritz as the first Executive Director of Milwaukee Pride. This month QUEST's cover features the new face of the region's greatest LGBT Pride organization celebration, and, at the same time, the producer of its main event, PrideFest.

Heinritz is long familiar with the workings of major festival production. He served for 14 seasons with Milwaukee World Festival, Inc, producer of Summerfest and the various ethnic festivals. Since 2001 Heniritz worked directly with PrideFest (The event has been part of the World Festivals, Inc since moving to Henry W. Meier Festival Park in 1996). In 2010 Heinritz became Director of Food and Beverage for Milwaukee World Festival and assisted PrideFest in its development of food and beverage sales.

Heinritz joined the Milwaukee Pride board of directors in 2014 just in time for its restructuring as a 501(c)3 organization. He was then elected Vice President, serving in that capacity until being hired as its Executive Director in January of 2016.

Heinritz's new role as executive director of Milwaukee Pride and PrideFest producer will certainly rely on his background and extensive experience gained while working for Milwaukee World Festival. There are obvious similarities in the structures of the various ethnic festivals, Summerfest and PrideFest. Of course. there are inherent dif-



ferences as well. For one thing, PrideFest staff is all volunteer. That adds a positive dynamic of enthusiastic individuals with great dedication and a sense of common purpose. Many volunteers return year after year and know their roles. However, the sheer numbers required for the various parts that make up PrideFest - entertainment, grounds management, security, food, beverage, and vendors among others - result in volunteer turnover, training and a degree of staff adjustment. That unto itself is an undertaking.

And because PrideFest represents the greater LGBT community's spectrum of diversity, there are always new challenges. It's not just about bears and drag gueens. Unlike the ethnic festivals that cater to essentially their homogeneous communities, PrideFest needs to be sure everyone has an egual stake in the festival. The ever evolving social and political environment requires that PrideFest respond accordingly. That means expanding the PrideFest programs and services to include once marginalized or otherwise underserved groups, like the transgender community and LGBT families. That takes sensitivity and a conscientious effort. Last year, for example, in deference to the transcommunity, Milwaukee Pride formalized its all-access public bathroom policy.

Heinritz also takes on the duties of fundraising and integrating sponsors, corporations and individuals into the greater family of Pride supporters. In the past, this function was part many obligations of the board of directors. However, as the festival grew and the board implemented a strategy of year-round programming and collaborations with other entities, it became clear that the task required a full-time effort. So, once PrideFest is over and done with for 2016. Heinritz will focus on developing that new aspect of Pride's mission.

Under Heinritz's direction we can expect Milwaukee Pride's role in the city's profile both as an unifying LGBT organization and as an integral part of our larger community to continue to grow exponentially.

MAM FEATURES COLLECTION OF GAY

It was 1962. Like many artists, playwright Lanford Wilson arrived in New York City with great expectations and little money. He lived in fleabag motels among the city's riffraff...prostitutes, their johns, drug addicts, and the extended coterie of those living on the seamy edge of society. His own creative beat was the Off-Off Broadway scene. It should really be of no surprise that a gay man gravitated to the outside periphery of the social order of the times. It would be another seven years until Stonewall, and even after the fact, gay life would still be challenging.

Wilson's career would, however, move from those humble beginnings to greater fame. It would take off with his 1964 production of *The Madness of Lady Bright*. In the 1969, he co-founded the Circle Repertory Company. In 1978 his *Fifth of July* would be nominated for a Tony Award and, in 1980, he won a Pulitzer Prize for *Talley's Follies*. Along the way, he would study art history, hang with the notable artists of his time and collect their art.

Perhaps his affinity and personal connection to outsiders like himself attracted Wilson to visual artists of a similar ilk. He began collecting quite inadvertently while in Louisiana during the filming of friend Robert Harling's *Steel Magnolias*. There, he happened to notice a painting by Clementine Hunter, *Zinnias*, and bought it as a souvenir of his trip. The 18x14" canvas shows a red jug with nine large blossoms. Perhaps he was attracted to its simplicity or its bright, natural clutter of colors. Either way or another, the purchase ignited a passion. He would assemble hundreds of works, sometimes selling some to acquire others. He would collect not by artist but by aesthetic. But, of those artists he chose, he selected the best. The resulting collection would reside in his home, where he would curate the array of drawings, paintings and scuptures , moving pieces and rearranging them as the mood struck him.

Wilson died in 2011 and, a year later, his estate donated the collection to the Milwaukee Art Museum. Already renowned for its holdings of outsider, self-taught and folk art, it was yet another natural fit for Wilson's continuing legacy.

PHOTOGRAPHER MAGNUS HASTINGS' NEW COLLECTION OF BRILLIANTLY VIBRANT IMAGES POSES THE QUESTION: "WHY DRAG?"

Magnus Hastings' new coffee-table book, Why Drag?, offers readers a rare glimpse at a generation in drag. Inspired by the photographer's renowned New York art exhibition, Why Drag? began in the summer of 2014, when Hastings set out to travel through North America to shoot some of drag's brightest talents and biggest names. With his camera in tow, Hastings made his way across the country for two years, snapping hundreds of intimate portraits while posing models the question: Why drag? The book offers answers from the industry's top talent, in the form of gorgeous photos by Hastings accompanied by short stories that are marked by their humor and, oftentimes, sincerity. Queens featured in the book include Bianca Del Rio, Courtney Act, Jackie Beat, Adore Delano, Jinkx Monsoon, Lady Bunny, Detox, and Sharon Needles. The legendary Boy George writes the book's foreword. Magnus Hastings' "Why Drag?" is available everywhere books are sold on May 17 via Chronicle Books.

Magnus Hastings' affection for his subject runs deep, and if only in his meticulous attention to detail, it shows in earnest from cover to cover. "I think

a big part of Why Drag? is rooted in that little effeminate boy who was shamed out of doing what made him happy," says Hastings. "I grew up resenting that childhood version of myself until one day, I had such a wave of love for him. I realized how extraordinary and beautiful he was, how fearless. Somehow I think this honors him." Hastings' reputation precedes him as the eminent man behind the lens when it comes to all things drag, so it only makes sense that his volume of drag portraits would push boundaries, provoke thought. and put the unapologetic on parade. Prevalent cityscapes include New York City, Los Angeles, and the artist's drag city of choice, San Francisco. "I have such a soft spot for San Francisco drag," says Hastings. "And the incredible way they create something for just one night. That's kind of been skipped by the mainstream, but it's a huge part of my book."

"Adore Delano is a fantastic representation of an important side of drag," says Hastings. "That punk rock, I-don't-give-a-shit edge that gets watered down the more mainstream it gets. Drag is meant to be challenging and dangerous as far as I'm con-



cerned, not safe and sponsored by Disney."

"Drag doesn't make much sense."
So writes Alaska Thunderfuck, pictured off of Melrose Avenue. "It takes up all of your time, consumes most of your money, and may subject you to

some of the most extreme ridicule on the planet."

"But I imagine it is like being a nun or priest," she continues. "Once you get the divine calling, you have no choice in the matter and you belong to drag for life."

A testimony to the photographer's talents as a portraitist, Why Drag? also serves as a timely reiteration that in a drag culture - where pushing boundaries is the exception rather than the rule - there will always be a need to stand up for grit.

"I want people who don't know drag to be opened up to its beauty and its comedy," says Hastings. "It's a wonderland, and I want people to go there."

As both films prominently feature a 17 year-olds' birthday, the pairing reflects impeccable logic. Still, any success in this cinematic stroll down memory lane would surely rest upon how amply stocked the bar proved to be, of that Glenn was quite certain.


For those loyal **Quest** readers unfamiliar with the term "Helicopter Mom," as indeed Glenn must concede ignorance, let's take a moment and look to those lovely folks at Wikipedia for guidance, "Helicopter parents are so named because, like helicopters, they hover overhead, overseeing their child's life."

The 'copter in question is Maggie Cooper who is played by Nia Vardalos, familiar to many amongst the cinema circle as Toula in My Big Fat Greek Wedding and again in the unimaginatively titled, My Big Fat Greek Wedding 2, currently playing in various local cinemas.

The object of her obsession is her long-suffering son Lloyd (Jason Dolley), whose 17th birthday celebration opens the film.

Initially Glenn was intrigued as their relationship seemed somewhat reminiscent of the mother/son relationship in Josh Thomas' fabulous Australian comedy, Please Like Me, which definitely puts the "fun" back in dysfunctional families.

In Duke Tran's stereotype riddled screenplay, early scenes are of the "wouldn't it be funny is Maggie did..." variety. For example, wouldn't it be funny if for Lloyd's birthday Maggie takes her blindfolded son to Venice Beach, accessorize him nearly to death and then deliberately



freedom.

Buy it, Rent it, or forget it...

Often quite entertaining and boasting plenty of cute shirtless lads, upon further review Glenn found himself to have warmed to Henry Gamble's Birthday Party.

Now, **Helicopter Mom** is different kettle of fish altogether.

A film or a television show centered on a pompous or overbearing character is tricky business. Glenn can think of several successful examples, certainly Carroll O'Conner's iconic Archie Bunker (All in the Family) comes quickly to mind. Keeping Up Appearances' Hyacinth (Patricia Routledge) is a particular favorite of many in the monthly cinema circle.

Perhaps delightful in her signature role in My Big Fat Greek Wedding, Nia Vardalos' Maggie guickly becomes unsympathetic because her antics aren't cute and, in some cases, like papering Lloyd's school with the embarrassing flyers, she's in on the joke; she too is laughing at, not with her son.

For his part, Jason Dolley's Lloyd possesses a winning sanguine acceptance surely down to long years of Maggie's misbehavior. Lloyd might love his mother but the clock is ticking down until time when he too will leave her.

Normally Glenn would jettison **Helicopter Mom** right to the bin but many in the group found much more to enjoy than did Glenn, again suggesting that perhaps Glenn is somewhat lacking in the sense of humor department. -- Then again, perhaps not.

shove him into a group of rough and tumble bikers conveniently passing by? Or, wouldn't it be hilarious for Lloyd to go to school after Maggie has taped up dozens of really embarrassing flyers.

There's laughter from his classmates but as Lloyd ruefully points out, his classmates were laughing at him, not with him.

Surprisingly enough, Maggie's been rather oblivious over Lloyd's sexuality until her new friend Norma (Kate Flannery) mentions the existence of gay student scholarships. Sadly, Norma's son is not gay - he doesn't like Pesto.

Maggie warms to the notion, insisting that she'd be thrilled if Lloyd were gay, "He'd be the only man in my life who never left me for another woman. He'd be with me all the time. Oh, my God. My gay son and me going purse shopping."

Deciding that her sensitive, poetry-writing son must be gay. Maggie completes the gay student scholarship application, creates an online profile and even sets Lloyd up with Parker (David Lewis), just the sort of stereotypical gay character moviegoers are far likelier to laugh at, not with.

Amidst 'copter Mom Maggie's increasingly embarrassing antics, her scenes at the prom proving especially inappropriate, it is the quieter, more genuine narrative of Lloyd's own questioning of his sexuality that is very nearly lost.

Like Lloyd in Helicopter Mom, Henry Gamble (Cole Doman) is turning 17. Unlike Lloyd, Henry is not questioning his sexuality; this is made abundantly clear from the film's opening sequence in which Henry deftly maneuvers Gabe (Joe Keery) his best friend and the object of his affection, into a jerk-off session.

Come the next afternoon, even God seems to have cooperated, bestowing a picture-perfect day for Henry Gamble's birthday party, a poolside gathering peopled with a curious hodgepodge of Henry's teen friends and assorted oldsters including Henry's parents plus church staff resulting in an intoxicating suburban Christian microcosm for director Stephen Cone, who here doubles as screenwriter.

Nominally the title character, Henry's narrative is just one of many, even within the Gamble family. Henry's mother Kat (Elizabeth Laidlaw) is clearly quite unhappy, giving her son's party scant attention while his sister Autumn (Nina Ganet) finds her brother's party the perfect time to have a meltdown with her once and then once-again boyfriend.

Indeed a myriad of other, supporting characters vie for attention over



the course of the afternoon, some more effectively drawn than others. Glenn was particularly smitten with Christine (Melanie Neilan), openly lesbian and delightfully mischievous when guizzing Henry's sister Autumn about having biology as a major at a Christian College. Less successful is shrewish Bonnie (Hanna Dworkin), a self-righteous old prude, obsessed with the evils of sex trafficking and who reminded Glenn of the Dementors from the Harry Potter films, creatures who drain all of the joy, hope, and happiness out of all around them. A perfect example of one of Bonnie's victims is her deeply forlorn daughter Grace, wistfully played by newcomer Darci Nalepa.

Neither invited, nor made to feel welcome is Ricky (Patrick Andrews), an emotional train wreck of a character who might be gay and more disturbingly, may have tried to commit suicide. Director Stephen Cone makes no more effective an indictment of the hypocrisy of these Christians who are content to allow unsubstantiated rumors about Ricky to be spread. Even Pastor Bob, outwardly a warm and genial family man, tragically fails Ricky.

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

THE TOOL SHED ... not your grand daddy's sex shop

For most, the term "sex shop" conjures those seedy video arcades off the highway on the outskirts of the city. Those familiar sticky floors, racks of cellophane wrapped porn magazines and the intermittent jingling chime of quarters being exchanged for dollar bills remain vestiges of less tolerant days.

But, Milwaukee can boast *The Tool Shed: An Erotic Boutique*, a progressive and user friendly outlet for all things sexual. Established in 2003 by two women on a mission, it offered a sex-positive, gender-positive, healthy and comfortable environment to not only supply customers' needs but also to educate and empower them. They wanted to break taboos and bring honesty to the conversation about sex and sexuality.

In 2008, Laura Anne Haave, an LGBTQ activist and sexual educator, took over the business. She shared the founders' con-

cern that people make informed decisions regarding their sexual health and pleasure. She moved business to a new, more accessible location on Murray Street just two blocks north of the bustling North and Farwell Avenue intersection where it still stands today. In the meantime, the Tool Shed has been voted Milwaukee's Best Adult Retail Store 2010-2015 and the received the Best Adult Boutique in the Nation Award by Adult Video News (AVN) in 2014.

LGBT owned with a largely LGBT staff, the *Tool Shed*'s affiliation with other community groups and resources comes naturally. It has been present at PrideFest for years and is a community presenter at the LGBT Film/Video Festival.

Tool Shed spokesperson Matt Button explains, "The original owners wanted a shop that didn't have that typical male-centricity and would appeal to all genders. They also wanted to have a sexual health aspect as well as a comfortable and safe environment. That's also reflected in their inventory of non-toxic products. That was new and few stores cared about that. In the meantime, the industry is responding accordingly. People never realized the level of toxins in their sex toys. That became a point of the owners' vision to carry body safe toys. Today people come in and look at dildos and ask why are they are so expensive. We explain the difference between an \$18 giant jelly dong and a body safe silicon dildo in the \$40-100 range. The choice of materials makes the difference. The toxic ones



are often made of cheap PVC and other mystery materials. The chemical softeners that make the toys feel squishy are part of the manufacturing process and those are the hazardous ingredients." He cites phthalates, an ingredient banned in some countries for children's toys. But, since adult sex toys aren't regulated, the toxic material is used in their manufacture. "You might see a warning 'Do not use internally' on a sex toy box. There is no law or regulation about what you can be put on a label. The result is toys often being mislabeled as to what they are made of. Stores like ours advocate for quality products and demand well designed and safe toys. That did not exist a decade or 15 years ago," Button adds.

"We really curate our selection of toys. They come from companies that focus on body safe products. We select based on the craftsmanship of the product customer demand. That's too much trouble for big stores.. For the most part there are enough little companies doing quality pieces that we can fulfill most people's needs. One, Oxballs is gay owned. They love their work. They started by hand-pouring silicon toys for gay men. Some are unusual and incredibly large. We like working with companies like that," Button said.

Besides the tools of trade, education is another *Tool Shed* mission. Button explains, "We hold classes on various topics around sexual pleasure and health. Depending on the class, some are free; some cost money. All are by reservation.

Topics range from "How to give a good BJ" to "How to talk to your kids about sex." Some focus on "how-to" pleasure tips. Those are super popular. Others are more on communication within relationships. For example we have a polyamory discussion group that meets here. That's the kind of community stuff we like to support." And, understandably, the clientele ranges from soccer moms to transpeople. According to Button, their only thing consistent about the audience is its unpredictability. "We have a wide range of ages, backgrounds, singles, and couples. We just held a "Sex and Aging" class that was sold out and did an entire week of educational events in April we call Milwaukee Share. Staff members also present at local public and private universities. Our role is often making up for the fact that people have gotten terrible education over the years like abstinence only education. They

know very little about their bodies and how not to get pregnant. They are told merely not to have sex. Some get good education but it is such a patchwork of information we cannot count on someone knowing even the basics of anatomy or pleasure," Button said.

Another unique aspect of the shop's mission is its trans community focus. "We've worked with FORGE because we have a strong product selection for trans people. That's one of our areas of expertise. We have the largest selection of gender expression products of any store of our kind. Those are things that allow people to live and express the gender with which they identify. That would include "soft packers", flaccid penis prosthetics for use by transmen and breast forms for transwomen," Button explains.

The shop also provides an extended service for doctors and clinicians who send their patients there for more in depth services. But, in general, Tool Shed staff provides support for all. "People come in and have never been able to talk about sex with anyone. It's super important to them and they can finally get non-judgmental answers or at least a sympathetic ear. We can't solve every problem but we have some answers and can point people to other resources. They may feel alone and afraid to tell friends or a partner. The answer is 'you are not the only one' pretty much most of the time," Button said.

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
