Governments New T.V. Condom Ads **Upsetting Both** Sides of Issue

[Washington, D.C.]- The Clinton Administration has begun using the hype of Madison Avenue, soap stars, rap artists and TV actors to create a series of TV ads promoting both abstinence and the use of condoms. The ads are aimed at young people between the ages of 18 and

According to the Centers for Disease Control, 86% percent of men and 76% of women have had intercourse by the time they are 20.

The ads are quite restrained. None of the condoms is shown out of its package. None of the condoms is shown being used. And none of the ads is aimed specifically at Lesbians or Gay men, although Kristine M. Gebbie, the Clinton AIDS czar, told Light that "Gay leaders had approved them.

One ad shows a man and a woman embracing, kicking off their shoes, pulling off an earring and unbuttoning a

"Did you bring it?" the woman asks barely able to restrain herself.
"I forgot it," the man replies.

"Then forget it," the woman says.

The campaign was unveiled on January 5 by Donna E. Shalala, Secretary of Health and Human Services. Shalala told the press that she saluted the ads "for their vision.'

Not everyone agreed. Msgr. Robert N. Lynch, the General Secretary of the National Conference of Bishops called the campaign "irresponsible" because it did

not promote abstinence.
Steve Michael of ACT UP D.C. in response to Lynch's statement said, "Before any leader of the Catholic Church tells any of us about the virtues of abstinence, they should practice it themselves. One has to wonder how many of our youth have been infected by Catholic priests."

Rep. Lamar Smith (R-TX) condemned the ads saying that taxpayers were being forced to pay for something they found 'personally and morally offensive.'

Lynch and Lamar were joined in their condemnations by Lou Sheldon, Televangelist Pat Robertson and others. Wayne Turner of ACT UP-D.C. also condemned the ads, saying "Clinton's dancing condoms won't save lives.'

ACT UP said that the ads do not explain that condoms should be used only with water-based lubricants and called for more sexually explicit ads such as those being run in Britain.

'We don't tell kids to just drive a car 'correctly' and then throw them the keys,' Michael said. "Yet this President and his Cabinet are doing just that with condoms."

"These ads fall far short of the aggressive leadership promised by the Clinton Administration for this public health emergency," Michael continued, adding, that the ads "can't even say the word 'Gay' and won't play during prime time."

"A half-hearted prevention program omes as no surprise," ACT UP comes as no surprise," spokespersons concluded.

'Light' to Stay On Shelves At Hales Corner's Library

Library Board's Decision Is Unanimous

[Milwaukee]- In a compromise move that seems to satisfy both sides, the Hales Corners Public Library will continue to distribute copies of the Wisconsin Light — but from the top of a much taller newspaper rack in a location where the library staff can keep an eye on

A Hales Corners resident, Jeff Baas,

had filed a complaint about the newspaper in July. He said some of the newspaper's advertisements were pornographic" and the newspaper was too available to children by being distributed from a low brochure rack in the library lobby.

Now, the Light will be distributed from a rack for free newspapers mounted on a column inside the library near the

see it out of the brochure rack.' Terry Boughner, Ph.D., editor of the Light, said he was satisfied with the Library Board's decision. "As long as they put all their other free publications to give away are there, then I see no discrimination and I have no problem with it. I think if they had taken Wisconsin Light in particular and hid it behind a desk or put it in some special place, I would have had trouble," he said.
"If they had decided to exclude the

paper they would have had a suit on their hands," Boughner said. "I hope this is the end of it.'

The change came after months of meetings and two heated public hearings. Most Hales Corners residents who spoke against the newspaper at the hearings expressed concern about telephone sex ads and nudity in ads that might be seen by children. Others spoke angrily against Gays and Lesbians in general.

Opponents of the paper outnumbered supporters two to one. Supporters said the library should not limit what people may read and said the newspaper serves some Hales Corners residents.

The Library Board delayed a decision about the newspaper in December to rewrite its policies for the brochure rack and the selection of library materials. The new policies, 11 pages long plus supporting documents, replace four pages of policies that had been drafted in the 1970s.

Library Director Patricia A. Laughlin said she modeled the new policies in part after the policies at the public library in Fairfax, Virginia, which recently dealt with a complaint about another Gay and Lesbian newspaper, the Washington

The new policy on materials selection lists several objectives, including: "To provide a place where inquiring minds may encounter the original, sometimes unorthodox and critical ideas so necessary as correctives and stimulants in a society that depends for its survival on free competition in ideas.'

Some materials may offend some clients, the policy says, and clients may ask for reconsideration of particular materials, but they "cannot exercise censorship to restrict access to materials by others.

The policy also says "selection decisions are not influenced by the possibility that material may be accessible to use by children.'

The Library Board unanimously approved both the new policies and keeping the Wisconsin Light - in the new location. As recommended by a library committee that had studied the newspaper complaint, the Board also voted to post a copy of the Library Bill of Rights in a prominent place.

The Board approved another committee recommendation to ask the Milwaukee County Federated Library System to change the forms for children's library cards to remind parents they are responsible for what their children read.

Krestine Gebbie, Federal AIDS 'Czar' Visits Milwaukee

[Milwaukee]- "If you're thinking sexual thoughts, you ought to also think condoms," said Kristine Gebbie, citing a condom ad being used in Portland, Oregon and aimed at young people. They are also looking to things like putting condom vending machines in the Berger King bathrooms, Gebbie said, because that's one of the places where the kids

Gebbie, President Clinton's AIDS czar, was in Milwaukee on January 12 at the invitation of the Wisconsin AIDS Resource Center, a part of the Milwaukee Foundation. Her office had contacted the Milwaukee AIDS Project (MAP) to ask if she could speak to people there.

Gebbie came to MAP for a 7:00 a.m. meeting and was joined by some 50 people: MAP Directors, members of the Board, staff, representatives of the Madison AIDS Support Network, other representatives of Wisconsin AIDS service agencies and the press.

Gebbie said that she did not think that cost was a reason that young people do not use condoms. "My perception," she said, "from talking to a lot of people, is

that a lot of the barrier (to getting condoms) is they're too embarrassed to do it; I don't want to go into that section of the store, I don't want to have to face a clerk, I really don't know what kind to buy, how do I talk to my partner about it.

AIDS PSAs

Gebbie was asked by Light if she foresaw the time when any of the PSAs on condom use coming out of Washington would be directed toward the Gay community?

Gebbie replied that she didn't know "if we'll see it in the PSAs." She added however, that "we're very aware of the need to talk to Gay men."

The current PSAs (all seemingly hetrosexually oriented), she said, "were targeted at an age group and they were tested with both Gay and straight populations. They were tested with Hispanic, African American and white populations and they tested well with all of them. Gay men viewed them and got the message from them." The radio PSAs, she said, are much less specific as to sexual orientation.

Gebbie said she had "no opposition" to targeting a PSA directly at Gay men. The question, she said, should it be done on the national level or should it be done on a local level.

Gebbie was asked how she reacted to the position of conservative religious groups that there should be mandatory testing for HIV? Gebbie responded, "Hold my temper."

She went on to say that anyone who has been at risk for contracting HIV should seriously consider testing. She said she 'strongly supported' early treatment and planning out approaches.

However, to do testing as a 'preventive device and to talk about it as a mandatory thing, really does drive me

Gay Bar Fires Straight Bartenders

[New Port Richey, FL]- According to the New York Times, when the Late Show Night Club in New Port Richey, Florida, went Gay, out went four barmaids who were not.
"It's the twist of all twists, a Gay bar firing straight women," said Todd Simmons,

spokesman for a statewide Gay rights group that has taken up their cause, the Tampa-based Human Rights Task Force of Florida.

"Sexual orientation has no bearing on your capacity to mix drinks or serve them. Discrimination is wrong whether it's directed against Gays or straights," Simmons said.

The women have taken their case to lawyer Kay Morgan. Morgan plans to file a complaint with the Florida Human Rights Commission and eventually take the case to

Such a case would be reminiscent of the strategy used by U.S. Supreme Court Associate Justice Ruth Bader Ginsberg when she won many of her women's rights victories before the high court in the '70's by using male plaintiffs to attack gender-based

Florida has no state law banning discrimination based on sexual orientation.

Convention Boycotts Cincinnati

[San Francisco, CA]- The Associated Press reports that the American Historical Association (AHA), America's premiere professional association for historians, will move its 1995 conference out of Cincinnati because that city's charter forbids laws to protect Lesbians and Gay men.

Cincinnati voters amended the city's charter in November to bar the City Council from enacting laws that give equal protection to Lesbians and Gay men in housing, employment or public accommodations. A federal judge has blocked implementation of the amendment pending a trial of a lawsuit filed by Gay rights activists.

The AHA has 16,000 individual members and 5,000 institutional members. Its annual conference draws between 3,000 and 4,000 people.

The American Library Association also canceled plans to hold its 1995 convention in

Chicago Archdiocese Offers to Pay

[Chicago]- The Chicago Sun-Times reports that the Archdiocese of Cincinnati offered to pay therapy bills for the man who accused Joseph Cardinal Bernardin of Chicago and another priest of sexually abusing him.

Documents filed January 14 in U.S. District Court in Cincinnati said the Archdiocese offered three months ago to pay for some of Steven J. Cook's therapy but denied his allegations. The documents also said the Archdiocese removed the Rev. Ellis N Harsham, the other accused priest, from the school in the 1970's "because of an incident of sexual behavior with an adult seminarian" other than Cook.

Archdiocesan Chancellor, the Rev. R. Daniel Conion said Harsham admitted he had a close friendship with Cook, but denied having sexual contact with him.

Cook, 34, of Philadelphia, sued Bernardin, Harsham, the Archdiocese and Archdiocesan officials November 12. He claims Harsham sexually abused him in the mid 1970's. Cook alleges that it was Harsham who introduced him to Bernardin, which Conion

Country Music Helps Fight AIDS

[Washington, D.C.]- Reuters news service reports that 46 top country music singing stars have unveiled a sweeping advertising campaign designed to prevent the spread of AIDS and targeting rural areas, where the disease is rapidly growing.

Mary Chapin Carpenter, Mark Chesnutt, Garth Brooks, Clint Black, Willie Nelson and others will appear in the "Break the Silence" campaign, which urges AIDS education and prevention, including condom use and even abstinence.

The ad is less explicit than government ads, in which a packaged condom leaps from a drawer, moves across a room and wriggles under the covers with an amorous couple.

Texas Keeps Sodomy Law

[Austin, TX]- The New York Times reports that a divided Texas Supreme Court has let stand the state's law against homosexual sex, ruling that a lower court exceeded its jurisdiction when it declared the law unconstitutional.

The 5-4 decision dismissed a civil lawsuit by opponents of the sodomy law, who had

prevailed in the 3rd Court of Appeals, a state civil court.

Since they are not appealing a particular prosecution, the Texas Court of Criminal Appeals, the court of last resort in criminal matters, had declined jurisdiction over the

But the Supreme Court, being a civil court, has limited power to overturn a criminal

The statute, which is rarely, if ever, enforced, drew national attention in 1990, when Dallas city officials cited the law in refusing to hire police officers who are homosexual. A Lesbian successfully challenged the law in that case, and the Supreme Court has let stand that victory for the sodomy law's opponents.

PBS Film Critic Is Anti-Gay

[San Francisco]- And speaking of ignorant film critics... The Gay and Lesbian Alliance Against Defamation (GLAAD) reports that Michael Medved was a guest on the January 2 broadcast of Politically Incorrect, a talk show that airs on the Comedy Central cable channel. Medved, who GLAAD describes as "about as witty and interesting as a Chia

Pet,'' hosts his own TV show, the PBS film review series Sneak Previews.

When Politically Incorrect regular Bill Maher asked his guests if children "should be taught about alternative lifestyles in school," Medved answered, "Until they start doing courses in heterosexuality, they should just leave the issue alone. Medved also attacked AIDS education, lambasted the children's book Heather Has Two Mommies, and argued that "the (Lesbian and Gay) agenda is to create more homosexuals.

Vermont is 'Gay-Friendly' Getaway

[Montpeller, VT]- A Gay ski weekend at on major Vermont mountain - and Vermont's distinction as the only major ski state with a Gay rights law - are combining to make the state a "Gay-friendly" Winter vacation spot. Annual Gay weekends have been offered for the last four years at Mt. Snow in West Dover, and following last Winter's Gay boycott of Colorado, Vermont's popularity among Gays is on the rise.

"If you were to choose a ski destination based solely on its politics, Vermont would win with ski poles down," said the December issue of Out and About, a travel publication for Gays and Lesbians.

Stop Gay-Bashing Says Right Winger

[Virginia Beach]- Ralph Reed, head of Pat Robertson's Christian Coalition, is urging the evangelists to stop spending so much time on homosexuality as an issue. Reed says that the "pro-family" movement must broaden its scope.

The problem is, as has been widely reported, that Right-wing Fundies need Gays in order to raise money. Direct mail pleas focused on a "Gay scare" tactic bring in the

A 'Heretic' Takes Freedom With A Quick Exit from Church

It was after the priest invited the congregation to stand for the Prayers of the Faithful that I timidly stood, then shook my head and turned to my partner and said, "I have to get out of here.

After Bill appeared to be confused, I repeated my initial statement and added, 'Let's go. I can't do this anymore." that moment I abruptly stepped into the aisle and hurried out of the chapel with Bill close behind.

On that Saturday evening, almost two years ago, I knew that "I had just had enough" and that I would not again

'practice my faith.'

Was it something Father Ray had said in his homily that caused me to lose my faith? Or was it something more encompassing that made me feel that the "faith of our fathers" had abandoned me, not the other way around. My leaving the church was caused by a feeling of total abandonment by the church of my youth.

My departure from Rome to follow my conscience was a reasoned response to the emotional and spiritual molestation that was visited on me by those who were entrusted with my spiritual formation. Such a molestation was no less severe than that suffered by Steven Cook, allegedly at the "chaste" hands of Joseph Cardinal Bernardin.

As I served Father Ed in his sanctuary in the 1980's, listening to his sermons on the family that derided "homosexuals, freaks of nature," the Vatican, likewise statements saying non-celibate Gays were "intrinsically evil" and that Gay-bashing, although "sinful," were the "logical" result of AIDS-era activism by Gays.

Even in my tender years, I knew that such utterances were not only offensive, they were evil. Did not Adolf Hitler say

And what was equally outrageous was that during the 1980's, as America was losing the war against AIDS and I lost my first lover to the plague, the Church crusaded for the "right to life" of unborn fetuses. At the same time, they would not allow condom distribution in the schools nor would the Church allow teens to receive the information that they needed to protect and preserve their "right to life.

Those who leave the Church, for whatever reason, are often derisively referred to as "fallen away Catholics." However, in my situation, it is clear that it was the Church who never really embraced me; it was in discovering this abandonment that I ultimately discovered the path to wholeness in my taking leave.

And it was in leaving, that I met a God "who so loved me that She gave me the Son of God," Her son, so that in my belief, I shall not die.

France Extends Benefits to Gay Couples

[Paris, France]- A new law, which took effect August 3 in France, extends domestic partnership benefits to Gay couples. The new law allows Gays who receive state health benefits to claim coverage for their unemployed domestic partners. To qualify, couples must have been living together for at least one year.


French Gay activists say the law marks an important victory in the drive toward official recognition of same-sex marriage.

Gay Couples Wed in Norway

[Oslo]- Five Gay couples were wed in a joint ceremony on August 6, 1993, less than a week after Norway's domestic partnership law went into effect.

The law, adopted by the Norwegian parliament on April 1, is very similar to the one that has been in place in neighboring Denmark since 1989. It gives registered Gay couples the same legal rights as married couples, except for the right to marry in church, and the right to adopt children.

EDITORIAL

As Assaults Against Us Grow, We Must Get Better Organized

We have said it before, but we think it is worth repeating: the LesBiGay community has got to get organized. There isn't one of us, be they victims of entrapment, bashings, discrimination or people living with HIV/AIDS who shouldn't realize that.

There isn't one among the LesBiGay community who shouldn't be tired of our ad hoc reactions to things and letting others define us.

There isn't one among us who shouldn't be tired of politicians who think they can ignore us because "we're expendable" and "have no real power anyway."

There isn't one among us who shouldn't realize that in the face of the Right Wing, how fragmented we are, here in Wisconsin and across the country.

Look at the facts. According to **The Washington Blade**, from 1974 to the present (Nov., 1993) there have been 57 ballot assaults by the Religious Right on Gay rights laws throughout the country. Of these, we've won 13 of them. That's all. And next year, we

For anyone who thinks Wisconsin is exempt, that we've got a Gay rights law, forget it. That kind of complacency doesn't wash and can be fatal.

In our present condition, we're just as vulnerable here as anywhere else because all we have now are some relatively small local groups. They do what they can, but they are limited in scope.

We need an organization, a state-wide organization, that, as we see it, must be prepared to be all-inclusive. It must include those able to pay dues and those who cannot. It must include both street activists like ACT UP, Queer Nation and the Lesbian Avengers, as well as those whose forte is in negotiations. As David Mixner says, "It's important to know when to express outrage in the streets and when to sit down and talk."

We must have an organization that knows how to raise money, lots of it. And part of that money should go to a paid staff. That is, we think extremely important.

We must have an organization that has its media in place and knows how to use it.

We must have an organization that can and will encourage and then back open
members of the LesBiGay community to seek public office on all levels. We've got to quit

relying on others to do what we should do for ourselves.

We must have an organization that is able to engage in education; one that will reach out to other minorities because against the Right Wing, all our liberties are at stake.

The Young Can Learn Much From Older Generation Experience

Gay men and Lesbians too, are caught up in the cult of "cute." Without exception, all of our "cute" ones are young. This focus on youth and physical attraction in our community narrows our outlook and diminishes our ability to mature. It also does a great disservice to older (and, like me, just plain old) Gay men and Lesbians, the no-longer cute. By the same token, this attitude deprives the young men and women of our community of a wealth of experience, knowledge and love.

My friend and younger mentor, Betty Berzon (Ph.D., author of Permanent Partners and editor of Positively Gay] wrote in The Advocate: "... older Gays don't get invited to the party. I wish it made more of them angry. By passively accepting a segregated status, the elders give permission to the youngers to continue stereotyping and segregating them. It is the same dynamic that keeps so many Gays and Lesbians in the closet. The heterosexual society has conspired for years to keep us invisible, and you know what? We Gay and Lesbian people are co-conspirators."

Vanishing Elders

Many of our elders just return to the lonely closet from which they came out when they were younger. They are the disappeared, the invisible men and women of our community. Then there are the unhappy few who still dream of taking part in the oft-heralded "lifestyle," the old Gay men and Lesbians, always outside, looking in at the party to which they were not invited.

Finally, there are the lucky ones like me, who still find love and respect in spite of, or maybe because of, all the years. I've found some of the young men and women of a new generation, those who are truly accepting of the diversity of our community, who are anxious to learn from the past of shared experiences and pain.

Most all of us were "cute" in our day. Many of us, like me, were in the closet, especially in those dark ages before we had a real community. We thus kept ourselves outside the joys of Gay life, even then. But, all of us, each and every one of us, was young like you.

Let Us In

Young Gay men and Lesbians, let us in. Invite us to the party. Most of us are pretty good cooks by now, so there'll be plenty to eat. We're really not as boring as you may think. Love us as we love you. Go out of your way, make the effort, to find some of the senior Gays and Lesbians in your community. Remember, you will be us someday.

And to my peers, I ask that you open

And to my peers, I ask that you open your hearts and homes to the young Gays and Lesbians in your community. It's worked for me, and I am truly enriched by my young friends.

Call your local Gay and Lesbian campus and youth organizations. Ask some friends to join with you in inviting the young people over for coffee and beer. Prepare a spread. Get involved. There is so much you can do.

accessed when needed.



'Tales of the City' **TV Series** Attacked by Right

[Washington, D.C.]- Even before the three part television production of Armistead Maupin's Tales of the City completed airing on public television stations in Milwaukee, Madison and elsewhere around the country, representatives of national Right Wing organizations began to attack the program and threaten to pressure Congress to restrict Gay and Lesbian content in programs shown on public TV.

At a public hearing held by the Corporation for Public Broadcasting (CPB) in Washington on January 12, 1994, Robert H. Knight of the Family Research Council, an anti-Gay organization headed by former Reagan Administration official Gary Bauer, and Reid Irvine and Joseph Goulden of the Right Wing organization Accuracy in Media, sharply criticized the series, based on the novel set in San Francisco in

Tales of the City is "a slick piece of propaganda," Knight told a panel which included Sheila Tate, CPB Chair. He objected that "taxpayers are hit up to pay for a national propaganda exercise glorifying homosexual promiscuity."
Goulden, in his testimony, showed clips from the film showing a male character attempting to pick up a woman in a heterosexual bathhouse. Goulden objected that the bathhouse scene did not focus on homosexual sex clubs. He called for CPB to air The Gay Agenda, an anti-Gay film produced by a West Coast hate group which has been widely distributed to churches throughout the

Two openly Gay representatives testified before the panel, Cathy Renna of the Washington, D.C. chapter of the Gay and Lesbian Alliance Against Defamation (GLAAD), and Gregory King of the Human Rights Campaign Fund (HRCF). Renna called on CPB to continue its commitment to Lesbian and Gay programming and urged greater funding for the production of programs. She noted that the majority of programs with Gay and Lesbian themes and characters are funded independently or overseas, including In the Life, the monthly Gay series which is entirely funded through private contributions.

King charged that the Right Wing attacks on Tales of the City are part of a larger anti-Gay campaign of hate and distortion, "designed to de-humanize us, to suggest that we threaten America, the and America's American family traditional values.'

"The real threat to America," King said, "comes from those who argue that some Americans are not members of the general population, that some Americans should be silenced, and that some Americans are sub- human and are undeserving of human rights simply because they are different."

HRCF is encouraging individuals throughout the country to contact their local public TV stations in support of such programs as Tales of the City, and is urging phone calls and letters to Capitol Hill to counter an expected flood of mail from the religious Far Right. "We need to let Congress know that small numbers of Gay and Lesbian films shown on public TV should not be blown out of proportion by the extreme Right."

OBITUARIES

Michael Callen

Michael Callen, a composer, singer, author and prominent AIDS activist who was among those to survive the longest with the disease, died of AIDS complications. He was 38.

Callen, who died Monday, December 27, was diagnosed in 1982 as having the disease that later was called AIDS.

Callen never took the commonly prescribed AZT and received alternative chemotherapy for AIDS-related cancer. "He tried to keep in motion to present a moving target for the disease," said Richard Dworkin his companion.

Callen, known as "The Diva," was one of the original Flirtations, the nationally known, openly Gay singing group. Aurilio Font, a member of the Flirts, told Light that the group had started with Callen, singing one evening on a corner in the West Village in New York. They "raked in" \$40 that night, Font said, enough so that Callen suggested that "We all go out for



Religious Right Now Attacking Families of Lesbian/Gay Parents

[Seattle, WA]- On Monday, January 10, two anti-Gay initiatives were filed with the Washington State Secretary of State, setting off petition drives to get the measures on the November, 1994, ballot.

One of these two measures, filed by the Citizens Alliance of Washington, a Right-Wing religious group, targets Lesbian and Gay parents and their families with unprecedented vigor — prohibiting Gays and Lesbians from becoming foster parents, adopting children, or gaining child custody in a divorce. This measure also bars "minority status based on homosexuality," prohibits schools from presenting homosexuality as positive behavior and bans same-sex marriage.

"The Radical Right has tried before to deny Lesbians and Gays from becoming foster parents and adopting children who need good homes," said Tim Fisher, Executive Director of the Gay and Lesbian Parents Coalition International. "But this is their first attempt to enact legislation which prohibits Lesbians and Gays from retaining custody of their own children in a divorce."

If this initiative passes, thousands of families in Washington State would be placed in jeopardy.

"Parents are scared," said Gloria Stancich of the South Puget Sound Lesbian and Gay Parents Support Group in Tacoma, Washington, "particularly those dealing with custody issues. Washington State is a state that's been very fair to its Gay and Lesbian citizens, but we cannot afford to be complacent."

"The Radical Right perpetuates the myths that Lesbians and Gays are unfit to be parents — unfit to be near children," Fisher said. "The truth is there are over three dozen reputable, scientific studies showing that our kids are no different from kids raised in non-Gay households — except ours are a little more tolerant of human differences."

As the religious Radical Right increasingly targets Lesbians and Gays in general, and parents in particular, parents have increased their activism.

"Having a child puts fire in your belly," said Pat Justis. "This is not a battle where I can sit back, there's too much at stake in my son. I'm writing a letter about this initiative and mailing it to very straight person in my address book."

Public opinion polls show that "coming out" is the most effective and persuasive tactic for Lesbians and Gays. "The more out we are," said Stancich, "the more they know us as human beings — as normal everyday working people and parents."

Currently in the U.S. only Florida and New Hampshire outlaw adoption by Gays and Lesbians. New Hampshire also prohibits foster parenting.

NGLTF, Justice Dept. Meet Over Ovett, Mississippi Case

[Washington, D.C.]- The National Gay and Lesbian Task Force (NGLTF) met with U.S. Department of Justice on January 13 to discuss federal involvement in the on-going volatile situation in Ovett, Mississippi. Two Lesbians in Ovett have been harassed and threatened because of their sexual orientation, and opponents of the women have organized two town meetings to condemn the women and plot ways to force them from town. NGLTF has called on the Department of Justice to intervene by monitoring and mediating the situation in order to insure the safety and civil rights of the women, Brenda and Wanda Henson.

Attending the January 13 meeting on behalf of the Justice Department were Nancy McFadden, Deputy Associate Attorney General; Jim Turner, Acting Assistant Attorney General in charge of Civil Rights Service (CRS).

Attending on behalf of NGLTF were Tanya Domi, Legislative Director; Martin Hiraga, Anti- Violence Project Director; and Robin Kane, Public Information Manager. Robert Raben of Rep. Barney Frank's office and Judith Schaeffer of People for the American Way also participated

participated.

At the January 12 meeting, NGLTF encouraged the Justice to intervene immediately under any authority it could determine to insure the safety of the

In turn, Justice Department officials outlined actions taken thus far by the Department. CRS has contacted the Hensons, the local FBI in Mississippi, the U.S. Attorney's office in Mississippi and the sheriff's department in Jones County to inform them that a federal agency is monitoring the situation.

In addition, the Justice Department has directed the FBI to increase its monitoring of the situation and to stay in close contact with the Jones County sheriff's department.

Because sexual orientation is not included in federal civil rights laws, the Civil Rights Division said the agency could only launch an investigation if there is evidence indicating violations of other generally applicable federal statutes, such as threats by mail or telephone.

NGLTF agreed to forward to the Justice Department details of violent and threatening incidents aimed at the Hensons so that the agency could determine whether any of the incidents violate federal criminal codes and could cause an investigation.

"I don't believe there is an unwillingness on the part of the Justice Department to protect the rights and lives of the Hensons, or anyone targeted because of sexual orientation," said NGLTF's Robin Kane. "But this situation illustrates that federal laws must be expanded to include sexual orientation so that federal agencies can intervene to protect Gay, Lesbian and Bisexual citizens. We plan to work with the Justice Department to make sure that

Our History: Lesbian Couples Formed Daughters of Bilitis in 1955

Del Martin and Phyllis Lyon, along with three other Lesbian couples, formed The Daughters of Bilitis in 1955. The organization was named after the fictional heroine of Songs of Bilitis, who was a contemporary of Sappho. The Daughters of Bilitis was the first Lesbian membership organization in the United States.

Del and Phyllis are also the authors of the recently reissued classic Lesbian/Woman.

Recently I talked with them about the evolution of the Lesbian and Gay movement and the emergence of a consciousness over the past 40 years.

Owen Keehnen: What was the purpose of The Daughters of Bilitis [DOB]?

Del: When we first started in 1955, we began as a very secret Lesbian social group. We had parties at each other's homes and avoided the bars that were frequently raided.

OK: What were the bars like at that time?

Phyllis: Well, the police were such a problem. The bars were very closed in and usually not in the better parts of town. But there was no dancing, and in fact, no touching.

OK: At the beginning in the DOB were you aware that you were part of a Gay and Lesbian movement?

Del: There was no movement. Everybody was very much in the closet and we were having a great deal of difficulty meeting each other. Phyllis and I had been very isolated until somebody called us and asked if we wanted to get in on the beginnings of this private social club.

Phyllis: When we started the DOB, we didn't know there were other organizations. Subsequently we discovered that Mattachine was here and ONE Inc. was down in Los Angeles. ONE Inc. is still there, the oldest, still-functioning Gay organization.

OK: Describe the first DOB meeting.

Phyllis: The first four or five meetings were just the eight of us, four couples. The first meetings were the founders getting together and talking about what we wanted to do and how we wanted to do it. By the fifth meeting, we decided we had to reach out and get more people.

OK: A very frightening thing to do in

Del: There were purges in the government and armed services and frequent raids on Gay bars.

Phyllis: People were losing jobs right and left. If they were found to be Gay or Lesbian, they were out.

Del: If you were picked up in a raid, your name and address would be in the newspaper.

Phyllis: Or cops would call your employer and tell them you'd been arrested.

OK: Did the DOB have some sort of secrecy pact or way of checking out new members or something?

Phyllis: We didn't assume there would be spies.

Del: But we learned later we had been infiltrated by the FBI and the CIA.

OK: Tell me some things that the DOB did as a political group and as a social

Del: It started as a social club and the ones who joined were really pretty scared. We were faced with the fact that we were considered illegal, immoral and sick. Before we could have a movement, we had to have some self-esteem. We had to allay their fears. We got professional people to come talk about the different things we needed to know and learn.

We heard many tales of women who came down to the office building, once we had acquired an office, and stood looking up at the windows, afraid to come inside. Some stood across the street for weeks or even months before they came in to see us.

Phyllis: About a year after forming, we began a monthly newsletter called The Ladder. Then, in 1956, we started public discussion meetings. We rented a room downtown and that was when we got people to come and talk to us about our rights. We didn't have to plead guilty to something when we were arrested just because we were Gay, but in those times that was happening because people felt so guilty for being Gay.

OK: How long have you two been together?

Del: Over 40 years now.

OK: What's something exciting that's going on now?

Del: There's a new Lesbian movement among old Lesbians called OLOC (Old Lesbians Organizing for Change). Old Lesbians started having conferences and decided that 60 was the beginning of old. They were going to make old a positive word and educate about ageism. They're getting pretty militant. A lot came out in the 50's and 60's.

OK: What advice do you have for today's activist groups?

Del: We have to be less critical of groups for using tactics that maybe we, personally, wouldn't. No one group has the answer to our needs. We need all these perspectives.

Studies Show That Drug Addicts Are Willing To Exchange Needles

[Washington, D.C.]- The Journal of the American Medical Association (JAMA), in its January, '94 issue reports on two new studies that add to the growing evidence that drug addicts will readily accept programs to trade used syringes for clean ones, thus reducing their risk of catching the AIDS virus.

The studies are important because they were done in New York City and San Francisco, while most others have been done in Europe, said Dr. Don C. Des Jarlais, the lead author of the New York study.

Des Jarlais' team surveyed 141 intravenous drug users at Beth Israel in 1984 and 974 intravenous drug users there from 1990 to 1992. Over the study period, the use of dirty syringes declined from 51% of injections to 7%.

The researchers said the reduction appears to have resulted from needle-exchange programs and a large increase in the sniffing of heroin, rather than injecting it.

The San Francisco study evaluated a needle-exchange program that began in 1988. The exchange program was technically illegal, but had the tacit approval of two mayoral administrations,

researchers said.

"Syringe exchange was readily adopted by intravenous drug users and appears to have replaced the black market as a primary source of injection equipment," said the researchers, led by John K. Watters of the University of California, San Francisco.

By Spring, 1992, 45% of intravenous drug users surveyed reported "usually" obtaining syringes through the needle exchange, and 61% said they had used the program within the past year, researchers said.

Dr. Lawrence S. Brown, a critic of needle-exchange programs, said he had not read the new studies, but that it was unlikely they prove needle exchanges stem the spread of AIDS.

"There's a difference between potential value and actually being able to attribute a particular benefit to participation in a program," he said, speaking in New York.

Almost 40 needle-exchange programs operate in the U.S. About one-third of all U.S. AIDS cases have been diagnosed in intravenous drug users, their sexual partners or their children.

The Light

'Schindler's List' Is Overwhelming, **Gut-Wrenching and Brutally Stark**

Commentary by Terry Boughner

I have no doubt whatsoever that when the Oscars are handed out this year, Schindler's List will get its share. As we've come to expect from Steven Spielberg, it is superbly executed and brilliantly done. The power of the film is nearly overwhelming, gut-wrenching and brutally stark.

Afterward, as the credits rolled, the audience sat silent. No one moved. Each person there, I thought, was caught up in the horror of what they had seen. To be blunt, I think it is the best movie on the Jewish Holocaust that has yet been done and probably ever will be done.

But all that being said, I have a few other thoughts as well. For one thing, when are we going to see a film about the Gay Holocaust? The stories are there, god knows, and if something isn't done, they're going to be lost and forgotten. Like the Jews, we cannot forget. We must not forget or it's going to happen all over

That's another thing. As I sat through the film, watching it drip with prejudice and hate, I knew just as sure as I was sitting there that none of that has vanished. It's all still there.

The Fundamentalists would like to put

us all into camps (Reparative Centers, they're called). In San Francisco, a city official says we're deserving of death. He was finally dismissed, but he's not alone in his thinking. In Colorado, Washington, Oregon and elsewhere, anonymous leaflets circulate saying that the bible condones our deaths.

What I thought of as I sat through that movie was that the Nazi massacre didn't happen in some vacuum. It was no historical aberration. On the contrary, the Holocaust of Gays, Jews, Gypsies and other "subhumans" was a hideously logical consequence of centuries of prejudice built up in European society and sanctioned by the Roman Catholic and Protestant churches. It was that poisonous atmosphere that was the fertile seed bed for the Holocaust. The Nazis didn't invent the thing out of whole cloth.

I think the movie should be seen, but I think too it should be seen with a sense of horror and outrage at the prejudice that produced the terror, at the hatred - and at the fact that Lesbians, Gays and untold numbers of others who got eaten alive in that infernal maw, have been ignored and are well on the road to being forgotten.

When the memory has finally gone,

then it will happen again.

Madison Author Keely Dwyer To Read From Novel On Feb. 3

[Madison]- Local author Kelly Dwyer will read from her first novel, The Tracks of Angels, at 6:30 p.m., Thursday, February 3, at A Room of One's Own Feminist Bookstore, 317 W. Johnson Street in Madison. The event is free and open to the public. Tracks of Angels was recently published by Putnam. Dwyer started writing her novel when she was 21, while living alone in Boston. Dwyer juxtaposes past with present in a moving story of childhood and adolescence.

The book opens as Laura arrives at a Greyhound station in Boston, the city farthest away from her home in southern California and the painful memories of her parents: her mother, who wanted to cure her own cancer, but died from it when Laura was 12; and her father, who soon after married the woman with whom he'd been having a long affair. Then, after a car accident left him almost completely paralyzed, he involved Laura in a plan to

Laura struggles with her memories and her new existence in Boston. A spellbinding mood is set as Laura reflects on death and moving on:

"It's only now, with everything behind me, that I understand that Boston was the best place for me to go, that it was the right setting in which to learn that we bury the dead by carrying them with us."

Kelly Dwyer attended Oberlin College and the University of Iowa Writers' Workshop, where she was awarded the James Michener/Paul Engle Fellowship.

She grew up in southern California and now lives in Madison. She will be teaching creative writing at Oberlin this Spring and is currently working on her second novel.



Lesbian Comic, Westenhoefer, To Get Last Laugh In Milwaukee

[Milwaukee]- This comedy has a message: Lesbians are fun.

A little over three years ago, Suzanne Westenhoefer walked on stage in a straight comedy club and started telling Lesbian jokes.

She tells the same jokes to Lesbian and Gay audiences. Everybody laughs. She tells how one comedy producer told her there will never be any Lesbians on television. Her reply: "What about Wimbledon?"

She can go on like that for an hour, but to repeat any more might ruin the fun for the audience when she appears in Milwaukee on February 19.

A big-eyed, big-haired blonde, Westenhoefer once won Miss Runner-Up in a beauty pageant in Lancaster County, Pennsylvania, where she grew up. (By coincidence, she came out the next year.)

Recently, she won the New York City Outstanding Achievement in the Arts Award for comedy. She has appeared on Caroline's Comedy Hour, Evening at the Improv and Comedy Central.

She never intended to be a comic and had to be pushed into attending a comedy class. "I knew that if I were a comic, I would want to be out, and I knew that there was no such thing as an out comic. This was 3-1/2 years ago," Westenhoefer said.

She attended a comedy class because "my ex-lover, she just sort of signed me up — the little shit — and said "Go." It was pretty funny now that I think of it. Then it wasn't pretty funny. It was very scary."

She made it through the class, though, and won a comedy contest the first time she went on stage. Now she uses comedy to try to show straights something.

"I just want them to see what they're missing by not having Gays and Lesbians in their lives, that we're fun, that we're OK, 'she said, "that we're not particularly scary. To educate, to open the discussion up, to change the world! It's got to be done," she insisted.

"Straight people have been really cool about it. They've been pretty fairly accepting and even fairly into it — which

Westenhoefer met her worst audience not at a straight club but at a party attended by wealthy middle- aged Gays and Lesbians. "They got drunk and they crucified me. I think they just had be there to make fun of me. It was so awful I cried the whole way home and I told my lover I

She wanted to quit after a performance in front of 800 Lesbians in Phoenix, Arizona, too, but for a different reason. "I did an hour and they just totally loved everything, which was so special. I got three encores" and a standing ovation. Westenhoefer thought, "I want to quit right now so that's my last memory.

Besides stand-up comedy, Westenhoefer finds additional avenues to spread the word about Lesbians.

Sometimes she acts as a "display Lesbian" for high school sex education classes, urging young people to treat Gays and Lesbians fairly. But only a few schools let her do that, so she goes on talk shows: Sally Jessy Raphael, Joan Rivers and Jane Whitney. On Geraldo, she and other guests discussed "Lesbian chic."

"Is it chic to be Lesbian?" an interviewer innocently asked.

"Where are you calling from?"
Westenhoefer demanded with mock indignation. The singer k.d. lang appeared on the cover of New York Magazine, she pointed out. Cosmopolitan magazine carried an article about Lesbians. Newsweek showed Lesbians embracing on its cover.

"You must have seen Newsweek. That was such a big deal, wasn't it. That was


Westenhoefer also appeared live on CNN as an emcee in the April 25, 1993, March on Washington.

In some places, she said, she has become "sort of famous." She likes that. She wants to be an "out Gay person for all Gay people to see and to feel like they're getting some representation, not like they're being ignored. I like to be on TV as much as possible. I like to be out!"

Gay Character 'Steals' Show In 'Six Degrees of Separation'

A series of bizarre incidents furnished the basis for Six Degrees of Separation, the play and the movie, as well as providing fascinating television fare for several talk shows.

The real life story concerns a young man who conned some supposedly sophisticated New Yorkers into believing that he was the son of Sidney Poitier, first gaining their confidence by claiming to be a college friend of their children away at Ivy League schools. Impressed by the young man and thrilled by his promise that he would convince his father to give them fun roles in his next film, probably and rather improbably, the musical Cats, they took him in and lent him money and credit cards.

The impostor was found out when the families compared notes. At present, the con artist is being prosecuted for fraud, but his story is making money for those who have turned it into a brilliant satire for stage and screen. The play has been a surprise hit on Broadway and in London, and now with Director Fred Schepsi, the playwright John Guare, has beautifully transferred his play into a movie that sparkles with wit and irony. The dialogue is clever, fast-paced and great fun.

Stockard Channing, who I have always thought has been underrated as an actress, has found her ideal role here as Ouisa, the wife of art dealer Flan Kittredge (Donald Sutherland), two of the three main characters in Six Degrees.

The third member of this star ensemble is Will Smith, best known as Grammy-winning rap artist and The Fresh Prince of Bel-Air in his first dramatic role as Paul, the intriguing con

Smith is likable and convincing with all the dash and audacity needed to charm the pair and their friends. Paul's scheme ends when he is caught bringing a male hustler into the Kittredge's posh Fifth Avenue apartment. A wild scene follows in which the completely nude hustler runs around the apartment retrieving his clothes before he and Paul are thrown

'Why, we could have had our throats breathlessly telling and retelling the story to others in their well-heeled social circle. In this way, they discover that they

weren't the only ones to be taken in.

More complications ensue involving Paul and there is a mystery to be cleared - how did Paul achieve his worldliness and learn so many intimate details of their private lives?

Here playwright Guare has woven a Gay thread that fits neatly into the story. Ironically, all of the children are brats who hate their parents.

Such plot additions deepen this modern comedy of manners. Ironies abound. For example, Ouisa and Flan are part of the Manhattan art world where they induce others to buy into the sale of million dollar paintings then take their whopping commissions without having risked any of their own money. Their scam gives them a precarious hold upon their upper class

social position. The major difference between the stage play and the movie is that the play was performed primarily on a bare stage. Schepsi and Guare, with the help of their production designer and photography director, Patrizia von Brandenstein and Ian Baker can show the high life of Manhattan in all its pretentiousness. Breath-taking interior and exterior shots are a constant feast for the eye.

At one point, Ouisa recalls a study she read which stated that we are all interconnected, each one of us is just six people away from everyone else on Earth. This concept underlies much of Six Degrees of Separation and lends to this romp of a story serious overtones and

"The issue," she said, 'is human sexuality in adolescence and how we deal with it in a country that doesn't like talking about sex. We do not talk well about things sexual."

Gebbie cited her own experience in nursing school where she "learned a whole lot about human plumbing and almost nothing about human sexuality in that entire curriculum." Thus, she concluded, we (people in general) are trying to deal with the AIDS epidemic with "an almost non- existent vocabulary for discussing sexual orientation.

She added that if you can't talk about sexual orientation and sexuality, how then do you prepare a teenager, "someone do you prepare a teenager, whose hormones have started raging," to take responsibility for their actions?

A Real AIDS Czar?

Gebbie has been criticized by some AIDS activists for not being the "czar" they envisioned. She said that if by was meant someone who had absolute power to "do things," she was not a czar. There is, she said, no position in American political life that has that kind of power.

Gebbie said she views her position as a "policy co-ordinating position.

Her job, she said, was two fold: One, to make sure there was "good policy in this country" in the battle against AIDS; and, two, to make sure that policy was coordinated. That meant she was to make sure that the various departments in the federal government "aren't tripping over each other, aren't duplicating crazy stuff, or aren't duplicating useful stuff and wasting resources.'

She said also that part of her job was to go out into the country to publicize the

importance of everyone dealing with the AIDS crisis, not just those affected by the

Gebbie was asked if she felt her office was powerful enough to handle the AIDS crisis?

Gebbie responded by saying that the President knew what she was doing, that she had access to the President and she does give him a weekly report.

She said too, that she had access to the Cabinet Secretaries so that she didn't have to "thread my way through the federal bureaucracy" to get things done. "We go from the top down, not the bottom up," she said. "When you have the Cabinet's attention, it makes a big difference," she said.

A Manhattan Project for AIDS?

Gebbie was asked by Light whether she foresaw the President backing Manhattan-style project to conquer AIDS?

Gebbie said she got the question everywhere, but "Would you know a Manhattan project if you saw it? That term means so many different things,"

She said she got "real nervous" when the term was mentioned. "The legacy of secrecy, of non-peer review, of subsequent unexpected damages that were associated with the (original) Manhattan project make me very concerned."

She added, that there was a "great deal" of energy going on on how to streamline the research process, and to work creatively at management techniques."

She pointed out that if by "Manhattan project," you meant an invigorated, targeted, energetic attempt to solve the AIDS problem, "the President is committed to that and I'm committed to

Gay Movement Forms in Russia

[Moscow]- Three months after homosexuality was decriminalized in Russia, Gays are organizing to fight rampant discrimination, according to the Associated Press.

Organizers announced the formation of their first nationwide advocacy group, Triangle, to promote equality for Gays and Lesbians and combat the spread of AIDS.

Russian lawmakers formally lifted a Soviet-era law in late April that made male homosexuality a crime punishable by up to five years in prison. The decree took effect in

There are estimated to be hundreds of small Gay and Lesbian groups across Russia, but the organized "Gay" movement - Gays here use the English word-since there is no like word in Russian — is still in its infancy.



Commentary: 1993 — A Period Of Failure, Re-assessment and Change

The 1993 March On Washington was more parade than march, more celebration than rally. We believed we had much to celebrate. Clinton's election was sealed by our vote, and he professed his support. Yet, as I look back on last Spring's March, I feel an emptiness of spirit. How did we end up with a codification of the military ban — our first monumental national defeat?

When the military issue came up in January, we didn't get focused quickly enough. As Barney Frank complained, we organized as if we had until July to make our case, when the hard realities of Washington dictated we get Congress members on board within a few weeks. Furthermore, our national organizations and media did an inadequate job of articulating to the community why the military issue was important.

But I fear our loss on this issue is emblematic of a more fundamental problem. We simply haven't organized a real movement.

Many of us focused on trying to get heterosexuals to like us. We attempted to accomplish this through lobbying and encouraging our people to come out. In the meantime, we have been giving our money to heterosexual politicians, trying to buy their support.

ACT UP And Queer Nation

The most explosive new force has been the militant groups, most notably ACT UP and its progeny Queer Nation. The militant approach renounced the apologetic, "please-like-me" tactics to replace it with banshee cries of "We're here, we're Queer, get used to it." the militants' strategy recognized that we had no significant national base and used the couple thousand militant activists around the country to create the

Yet the militants didn't recognize the limitations of their strategy. In the fire test of our first big national fight, Congress discovered that the Emperor had no clothes. The militants could deliver us to the front pages, but did not have the strength to deliver a national political victory.

We could get a million people to the Capitol Mall in April, but we did not influence Congress.

The Christian Right

So how then do we create a broad-based movement? Let's look at the Christian Right for some answers. Despite low poll numbers for their ideology, they have enormous influence on Capitol Hill.
