# **Swedish Parliament** Gives Gays Right to Marry Beginning in January, 1995

(Stockholm, Sweden)- Sweden followed Denmark and Norway on June 7, 1994, and passed a bill allowing same-sex couples to marry-a measure on supporter said was a "contribution to love."

After lengthy debate, the Riksdag, or par-liament, voted 171-141, with five abstentions, to accept the Registered Partnership Law

Elisabeth Persson of the small Leftist Party, a supporter of marriage between samesex couples, said the law "protects a personal relation. It is a small, but important contribution to love.

The vote makes Scandinavia a leader in civil rights for Gays. In 1989, Denmark became the first country in the world to allow same-sex marriages. Norway adopted similar legislation last year.

Sweden's Partnership Law gives Gay couples the same inheritance, tax and other benefits and obligations as married heterosexuals. But it stops short of allowing samesex couples to adopt or have children by artificial insemination.

Under the new law, which takes effect in January, 1995, Gay couples can marry in civil ceremonies. Churches may continue to marry whoever they want.

Social Democrat Maj-Lis Loow, who chaired the judicial committee that prepared the bill, said no further Gay reforms are being

During debate, little opposition was voiced against homosexuality. Opponents focused on legal term, saying the matter ought to be investigated further.

# Madison's Club 3054 Gets 60-Day Suspension; Wings to Close For Good

(Madison)- As we go to press, word has been received that on Wednesday, June 8, the City of Madison reached a tentative agreement with Cheri Becker owner of Club 3054.

The agreement specifies that Club 3054 will close for a period of 60 days. When the 60 days begins is not known at this time. The club will then reopen pending approval by the Madison Common Council.

At that time, only the upstairs bar and patio will reopen. The bar known as Wings, where alleged illegal and unprotected sexual activities are said to have occurred will not be reopening under any circumstances.

Both the tentative agreement and opening will need to be voted on by the Common Council.

Mary Lou Simms, of Tampa, said that the only people who would find the event offensive were "Christian bigots. Who listens to them anyhow," she asked.

About 2,000 people marched in the parade

# Wisconsin High Court Adoption Decision A Setback for Gay and Lesbian Families

Baldwin (D-Madison) on June 8, joined attorney Judith Newton and Gay and Lesbian parents to express their disappointment with the State Supreme Court decision in the Green Bay "Angel Lace M." adoption case. Baldwin announced that she will introduce legislation reversing the decision.

This case, as reported in Light, originally heard by a Brown County Circuit Court Judge, raised the issue of the rights of a Lesbian coparent to adopt her partner's child and the rights of the child to have a legally recognized

Georgina Grinkey and her former husband, Terry Moede, adopted Angel during their marriage in 1988. Following the breakup of the marriage, Georgina and Angel started living with Annette Grinkey in 1990. Annette sought to petition for Angel's adoption

Although the adoption study concluded that

(Madison)- State Representative Tammy the adoption would be in the best interests of the child, the state's high court affirmed the Circuit Court order and ruled that Wisconsin statutes do not permit the adoption.

"Families like Angel Lace's exist all over the state of Wisconsin," Baldwin said. "This is a major setback for parents who have made a commitment to love, care for, and take financial responsibility for their partners and

These loving parents do not receive the legal recognition for the role they play in the family. Children like Angel Lace won't have the legal and economic stability that other children in Wisconsin take for granted," Baldwin added.

The Supreme Court decision also denied the constitutional argument presented by the couple's attorney, Judith Newton. Newton argued that barring the adoption would deprive Angel of her right to due process guaranteed by the Fourteenth Amendment.

(Milwaukee)(AP)- A resolution calling for AIDS to be acknowledged as a communicable disease subject to public health control was endorsed by the Republican State Convention on Sunday, June 5, 1994, despite claims it

could lead to Gay-bashing.

Debate over the AIDS proposal and a strongly worded anti-Choice resolution triggered sharp debate at the closing session of the GOP's weekend convention in Milwaukee.

"Until the stigma of being tested for AIDS is removed, we should not require disclosure" of people who are tested, delegate Robert Jones of Cayour said.

"This could lead to Gay-bashing, absolutely," Jones said.

Delegate Joyce Waldrop, a nurse from Dane County, said she thought the spirit of the resolution was good, but that "it could lead to discrimination" against people tested for

AIDS.

The resolution, introduced from the floor by delegate Don Brill, a retired Eau Claire teacher, seemed to catch many delegates by surprise. Debate was delayed while copies were printed and distributed.

The resolution was approved 1,527 to 1,285 on a special vote system based on delegate representation by counties. An estimated 1,100 delegates attended the convention.

Brill, who is challenging U.S. Rep. Steve Gunderson for the Republican nomination in western Wisconsin's 3rd Congressional District, told delegates there "must be a rationalized plan for controlling our AIDS epidemic.'

"No one will be tested for HIV if they think they will lose their job, be denied medical care, or be left alone to die."

**Baldwin Condemns Resolution** 

State Rep. Tammy Baldwin (D-Madison) attacked the Wisconsin GOP's resolution on AIDS. "If Wisconsin were to follow the call of the GOP convention delegates we would foolishly reverse landmark legal protections that have served us well in the battle to combat this devastating disease. Twelve years into the epidemic, experience tells us that this is quite simply a wrongheaded move," Baldwin said. She pledged to fight such an effort in the legis-

"The State Republican Party Convention showed that AIDS is two epidemics," Baldwin continued. "The epidemic of the disease and an epidemic of fear of the disease.

Baldwin called for a continuation of an "all-out crusade" against both epidemics and urged that Wisconsin's "progressive public policy effort" in stopping the spread of HIV continue

"That will require vigorous enforcement and implementation of the legal safeguards that provide a secure environment for people with AIDS and a commitment on the part of the Legislature and the Governor to fund programs that will keep the infected population as healthy as possible," Baldwin said.

Baldwin was referring to Republican Governor Tommy Thompson who has announced that he is seeking an unprecedented third term

"Wisconsin has responded to the AIDS crisis in a unique fashion," Baldwin said, "with a series of landmark legal protections and state funded programs. By looking at the experience of the larger states with much

# U.S. Judge Orders Military to Re-instate **Lesbian Nurse to National Guard**

(Seattle, WA)(AP)- A Lesbian colonel Veterans Administration hospital near Tawhose discharge from the Washington State National Guard has been ruled unconstitutional says she hopes to be back in uniform soon, preferably without waiting for expected appeals to be resolved.

'These things take a long time and I don't particularly want to be reinstated posthumously," Col. Margarethe Cammermeyer, 52, said on June 2, 1994, from her nurse's job at a

# **Tests of AIDS Vaccine Begin**

(Bangkok, Thailand)(AP)- Testing of an American-made AIDS vaccine on human subjects in Thailand began June 6, 1994, A Thai Red Cross nurse said. Thirty volunteers came to the Red Cross Clinic to be injected with the vaccine, a protein resembling HIV, said the nurse, Somsong Teeratakulpisarn. The vaccine is designed to encourage the body's immune system to produce antibodies against AIDS. The vaccine, called UBI-1, is manufactured by United Biomedical Inc of the U.S.

The World Health Organization (WHO) chose Thailand, Brazil, Uganda and Rwanda as locations to test the vaccine. It has been tested experimentally in China, Australia and the U.S. with encouraging results. WHO estimated that Thailand will have between 2 million

# and 4 million cases of HIV infection within the next six years. Court Strikes Down Benefits Plan

(Minneapolis)(AP)- The city of Minneapolis can't offer health care benefits to partners of its Gay and Lesbian employees, a judge has ruled. Minnesota state law does not recognize same-sex partners as dependents or spouses, and City Council acted beyond its authority when it adopted the domestic partners ordinance in August, Hennepin County District Judge Deborah Hedlund said on June 3.

Hedlund ruled in a lawsuit brought by James A. Lilly who argued that city-funded health benefits for partners of Gays and Lesbians was "bad social policy.

Jane Anglin, one of three women who intervened in the lawsuit to leave the ordinance in place, has given notice that she will appeal the decision.

# **American Airlines Joins Gay Travel Association**

(Washington, D.C.)- American Airlines has announced that it will join the International Gay Travel Association (IGTA), which represents more than 800 Gay and Lesbian travel agents, tour operators and wholesalers, accommodations and other Gay travel professionals in the U.S. and overseas. American is one of the first major U.S. airlines to participate in the 11-year-old IGTA.

Tim Kincaid, senior representative for corporate communications for the airline noted that American was the first major carrier to adopt an employment policy that explicitly bars discrimination based on sexual orientation. Kincaid said American is supporting Stonewall 25 with travel grants for domestic and international participants who otherwise would not be able to attend the event.

# Gays and Lesbians Invisible on McNeil/Lehrer

(New York, NY)-The Gay and Lesbian Alliance Against Defamation-New York (GLAAD) points out that public television's squeamishness on Lesbian and Gay issues extends to news: Two recent segments highlight the typical invisibility of our community on PBS's McNeil/Lehrer Report: an interview with William Perry, the Secretary of Defense, skirted any discussion of Gays in the military.

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In another segment, Charlayne Hunter-Gault treated former education secretary William Bennett with kid gloves, allowing him to promote his new book, which champions so-called "family values," yet never challenged his high-profile anti-Gay stance.

# 'Time' Drops Plan to Publish Gay-Themed Mag

(New York)(Agence France Presse)- Time, Inc confirmed Friday, June 3, that it has dropped plans to publish a new magazine targeted at Gays, but denied the decision was in response to pressure from radical Christian groups. A Time Inc staffer speaking on condition of anonymity, told AFP the publishing giant had received "a lot of letters" from Christian groups protesting the plans for a Gay-themed magazine. The publisher had worked for eight months and invested \$100,000 in the project to launch "Tribe" magazine. Time Inc maintained that "business considerations" forced it to drop the idea.

The Village Voice said, however, that Time dropped the plan because of pressure from Don Wildmon, a militant Christian preacher. Wildmon denied the report, saying he was unaware of the project. But had he known about it, he would have fought it, he said.

# Girl Scouts Say They Don't Bar Lesbians

(Washington, D.C.)(AP)- The Girl Scouts say they do not discriminate against Lesbians. "The Girl Scouts have never discriminated in any way," said Bonnie McEwan, national director of communications for the Girl Scouts of the USA. The statement came in response to a statement by Surgeon General Joycelyn Elders: "I also think girls who are Lesbians should be allowed to join the Girl Scouts."

The 3.5 million-member organization has no policy on individual sexual orientation, but "respects the beliefs of each of its members and does not investigate or intrude into personal matters," according to its guidelines.

# More Than 1,000 New Yorkers Come Out

(New York, NY)(AP)-More than 1,000 Gay New Yorkers are came out in a full-page ad in the June 2, 1994 editions of The New York Times that calls on the New York state senate to pass a sexual orientation non-discrimination bill. The ad read in part, "In New York State we can be fired just for signing this ad. Who are we? We are your relatives, your coworkers and your neighbors, who happen to be Lesbians and Gay men. We've put our names in this newspaper to ask the members of the New York state senate to do what they know is right: Hold a public debate. Have a fair vote," the ad says.

The campaign was thought up by Jeff Baron, a screenwriter, who worked with the Empire State Pride Agenda and the Gay and Lesbian Alliance Against Defamation in coordinating it.

# **Black Gays Celebrate Culture with Pride Day**

(Washington, D.C.)- The Washington Post reports that in four years, Washington's Black Lesbian and Gay Pride Day has become a Springtime ritual. "It's been a long-time tradition for Black Gays and Lesbians to come to D.C. on Memorial Day weekend; we took advantage of that," said Joseph Peete, a Pride Day official. The combination works. This year some 10,000 people attended, many from small towns and little cities where prejudice has kept them in the closet. Events include workshops, a festival, dances, a prayer breakfast and films. "It's a time for Gay and Lesbian African Americans to express and enjoy our culture... We get a sense of not being alone," said Peete.

The highlight of the weekend is the Unity Ball, part competition, part performance, part ritual. A new addition this year was the warehouse parties, given not just so partygoers can dance, but so money can be raised. "First and foremost, the weekend is to raise money for community-based AIDS service organizations," said Riley Campbell, event coordinator for this year's Pride Day.

Campbell said people leave Pride events "proud of their culture, not ashamed of their sexuality. It gives everybody a new hope, and the money we raise makes you feel good."

# Gays Gaining Ground in the GOP as Log Cabin Groups Take the Lead

(Houston)- Rich Tafel looks like the prototypical Republican lobbyist--neatly cropped hair, dark suit, boy-next-door looks.

'It's Homosexuality 101," says the presi-

Tafel spends much of his time meeting with Republican members of Congress, educating them about Gays and Gay issues. He says he often runs into lawmakers who are

seen a Gay Republican before. Many of those who have encountered Gay Republicans--a small, but increasingly vocal segment of the GOP--are uncomfortable with what they see. Several Republican candidates

Tafel was in Houston recently to help the reorganized local chapter of the Log Cabin

The group has its work cut out for it. The GOP, in Texas and elsewhere, has become increasingly socially conservative, with the Christian Right in firm control of the party apparatus in Texas and in a growing number of other states.

Many wonder why Gays or Lesbians would want to be Republicans. This is the party, many of whose state platforms oppose the repeal of sodomy laws, define family as "persons related by blood, heterosexual marriage or adoption," and "believes homosexuality is a perversion of natural law and is biologically, morally and medically unsound.

"If you're under attack, you can either leave or you can fight," said Tafel, who has at least some understanding of the enemy--he's an ordained Baptist minister. "Basically, we've decided to fight for the party.

Bill Whiting, a member of Houston's Log Cabin Club, has been active in Gay political movements for years. In earlier days he, like most Gays, worked within the Democratic Party because he believed that was the only way to succeed in politics.

But Whiting said he's always identified with the Republicans' conservative fiscal philosophy and always believed in maintaining a strong military. So he found it increasingly difficult to identify with Democratic candidates even though they often were more supportive of Gay issues.

And he came to believe that the Gay community makes a mistake if it ignores one of this country's two major political parties.

We have all our eggs in one basket," Whiting said. "If the Democrats choose to help us, they will. If they don't--like with Gays in the military--there's nowhere else we can go.

Tafel's national office has been open for less than a year. Its member clubs--a looseknit federation, many of whom predated the national office--include about 8,000 members,

Though small, the movement is experiencing its fastest growth in the South and Midwest, Tafel said.

Nationally, the organization has found more acceptance in the Northeast and on the West Coast, where some Republican governors and mayors won office with the help of Log Cabin groups.

John Melton, vice president of the Houston Log Cabin Club, says he knows the movement faces an uphill battle, but Gay Republicans can't afford to wait.

"We spent 25 years in the Democratic Party," Melton said. "We're not going to change the Republican Party overnight, but you've got to start somewhere.

# Concerns About the Relationship Between Social Norms and Government Actions Should Not be Written off Automatically as **Obsessions of Bigots**

Commentary By Earl J. Dionne, Jr. Two events within a few days of each other in early May, underscored the perplexing quality of the debate over the civil rights of Gays in the United States.

The first was a celebration of tolerance and a memorial to the awful things that happen when antipathy consumes people. At a home in suburban Maryland on Thursday, May 5, a group that crossed party and ideological lines came together to honor the decision of a groups of Gay leaders to raise \$1.5 million for Washington's Holocaust Museum. The gesture, said David Mixner, a key organizer of the effort, was to demonstrate appreciation for a museum that teaches the consequences of "unchecked hatred, unchecked bigotry, unchecked intolerance.

Mixner's initiative was warmly welcomed by the museum and by a range of figures inside and outside the Jewish community, some of whom might have been surprised a few years ago to find common ground at such an

"It was a lovely event," said Leonard Garment, who represented Richard Nixon's White House 25 years ago in discussions with Mixner, a prime mover in the 1969 Moratorium against the Vietnam War.

Then, on Saturday, May 7, the voters of Austin, Texas, overwhelmingly backed a repeal of a law that offered insurance benefits to the unmarried partners of city employees, including both straight and Gay couples. The vote in one of the country's liberal citadels was another setback for Gays and a victory for conservative churches that pressed the referendum against the ordinance. A Baptist Church in Austin celebrated with a sign proclaiming, "God Voted for Proposition 22!"

There's an easy way to try to explain the difference between the two events. As a rule, the well-to-do--such as those gathered in Maryland--are more liberal than others on social questions such as Gay civil rights. The vote in Austin, on the other hand, can be seen as more typical of popular feelings about Lesbians and Gay men.

But this explanation is not satisfactory because it doesn't take into account the difference between what was being affirmed in each

The Maryland event was unifying because it's impossible for reasonable and humane people not to agree on the horror of the Holocaust. It was also natural to join with Gay leaders in honoring the Holocaust Museum for its care in showing the enormity of Hitler's genocidal crimes against the Jewish people while also memorializing the suffering of others including Gays, Gypsies, and Poles--at the hands of the Nazi killing machine.

David Ifshin, a Washington lawyer whose strong pro-family sentiments don't justify discrimination, was host to the event. He argues correctly that one need not "approve of a lifestyle" to oppose bigotry against Gays and Lesbians--or against anyone else.

The issue in Austin was more complicated, involving the use of public money to provide insurance for unmarried partners of city employees. The civil rights issue alone did not explain the margin of defeat, according to Tim Weltin, Executive Director of the Travis County Democratic Party. He said that many voters supported repeal not because of anti-Gay sentiment, but because they disapproved of unmarried heterosexuals living together and didn't think the city should help support that

The difficulty with the issue of civil rights for Gays is that while it's easy to draw such fine distinctions in the abstract, the debate itself is rarely abstract for those in the midst of it. It is perfectly understandable that Gays and Lesbians might see the Austin vote as a vote against them, a rejection of who they are, and ultimately as a form of bigotry The movement for civil rights for Gays,

after all, is first and foremost an effort by a group of people who feel excluded, abused and ridiculed. Previously excluded groups, such as African Americans, have sought legitimacy and protection through government--including civil rights laws and other formal steps such as the Austin domestic partnership law. Gays are hardly alone in this.

The Gay movement's most vociferous opponents often feed its fears with malicious forms of Gay bating and arguments suggesting that the country's Gay minority is behind all manner of moral decay

It is entirely true that the country faces grave problems because of family breakdown and in particular because of fathers who walk away for their paternal responsibilities. But it's quite a reach to blame all this on Gay

Still, it would be a large mistake for Gay activists to see all who take issue with them as bigots. David Keene, the President of the American Conservative Union, attended the Holocaust Museum event because he opposes anti-Gay bigotry. Yet he, too, would have voted to repeal the Austin measure because it represented to him an unreasonable extension of government benefits.

Other cultural conservatives worry that if government gives any formal sanction to lifestyles other than heterosexual marriage, it will gradually erode the norms needed to keep families together.

This is a dangerously all-inclusive argument, since society allows all sorts of freedoms (to divorce, for example) which could be said to undermine the family. Where would those who oppose equality for Gays on "profamily" grounds draw the limits for heterosexuals? Or are they simply using this rhetoric to justify a particular feeling against Gays?

Opponents of civil rights for Gays need to answer such questions, but their concerns about the relationship between social norms and government actions should not be written off automatically as the obsessions of bigots.


Mixner, for one, is sensitive to the fears of cultural conservatives. He sees the central battles for his movement in terms that ought to appeal to majorities: more action on the AIDS crisis, opposition to discrimination in employment and housing, an end to anti-Gay violence.

Above all, Mixner is fighting for a spirit represented by his movement's gesture on behalf of the Holocaust Museum. Arguments about values and culture are inevitable in a democracy. So are arguments about what government's role should be in safeguarding mi-

But Mixner is right when he says that there shouldn't be any doubt about "basic equality, basic protection" for Gays and Lesbians, and no justification for "hatred and

Down that road lies the calamity that the Holocaust Museum warns'us against.

# In History, Myth Is Often More Important, **Powerful and Decisive Than Reality**

In history, myth is often far more important, powerful and decisive than reality. Take for example, the Battles of Lexington and Concord, where was fired the "Shot Heard Round

Most of us have a picture of it in our minds. Here were the valiant Minute Men, roused to action by the "Midnight Ride of Paul Revere," steadfastly holding off British Redcoats at Lexington's village green and at the "rude bridge."

That's the myth. In the cold, cruel light of day, it actually went something like this.

It was a chilly Sunday evening when word came through to Lexington that the British were on the march. The farmers assembled on the green. But when hours passed and there were no Redcoats, someone persuaded the local tavern owner to open up his shop. When the British did arrive toward dawn, the Minute Men weren't in too great condition to fire at

While no one knows who actually fired the first shot, there is certain evidence to indicate that Sam Adams, who was there hiding in some bushes, got all hot and bothered that the British were going to be able to dispose of the patriot forces with mere words. So, he fired

off a shot just to get things going.

The shots fired at Lexington and Concord (whoever fired them first), were not the first, not by any means. There had been numerous other altercations between the Americans and the British. But by that time, the Americans were prepared to take advantage of the situation. After Lexington and Concord, things got rolling.

The point of all this is that as with events in the American Revolution, so the myth of the Stonewall Inn may be just as important as what really happened there. That's good and that's

The good part is that we need to mythologize events and people in order to gain inspiration from them

The bad part is that sometimes it's difficult to see through the myth to the truth at the heart; to its actual significance.

The myth of Stonewall says that it was a pivotal event. It was pivotal alright, but not because it was the end of something or the culmination of anything. Stonewall, like Lexington and Concord, was crucial as the beginning of the beginning. As with Lexington and Concord, it hasn't been and won't be "all easy going, a sure thing," from there. In all our cele-

brating, we should keep that in mind. After Lexington and Concord, the Americans had nearly six long years of war to face. Yorktown and victory did not come until October, 1781.

The LesBiGay community is not at "Yorktown" yet and many would say we're not

Stonewall was not victory. It was the beginning of the fight. We have yet to see victory. We must struggle to get to Yorktown for that.

# The 'Light' is Here to Serve its Reader; Learn How to Use Your Media Effectively

A day or so ago (well after deadline, naturally), I got a call from the head of an organization asking if there was going to be an article in the upcoming issue about their event. The tone of voice said that since this event was the single most important event that had happened since the expulsion from Eden, of course it would get front page treatment.

I hated to tell the person that everyone thinks their event is front page, top drawer. If the paper had a front page 50' sq., it would be nice. (No other pages, just a front page.)

I wanted to tell the person that the way organizations handle things like this (in the real world), is to take some of the initiative them-

They try and remember that theirs might not be the only thing going on in Wisconsin and the world. They think to themselves, 'Well, maybe there won't be this big white hole in the paper where my event was to have gone, so maybe I'd better do something ourselves to make sure we get coverage.

For example, not too long ago, I wanted to try and get something in the Journal. I sat down and wrote it myself. So far, it hasn't gotten in, but that's life. Editors make choices, but at least I tried.

Call up (ahead of time, before deadline), find out if the event is going to be covered. Is there going to be a reporter there? Sometimes we can do that, sometimes not. Remember, there just might be something else happening at the same time.

Offer to appoint someone from your organization to write about it. This has the great advantage of getting the news out from your point of view

Not too long ago, I got a call from someone who complained heartily (I'm being nice when I use the word "complained." Heaven forbid I should use "whine.") that they didn't know how to write for a paper.

I ran down the who, what, when, where and how. The response was, "You're just as

bad as Ron down at In Step!' "No," I replied. "I try to be worse." And hung up.

The point is, you don't have to be in the running for the Nobel in literature to write an

A couple of years ago, Light and In Step sponsored a workshop called "Getting the Word Out" to which we invited the heads and representatives of organizations and anyone else who wanted to attend. The purpose was to "show and tell" how to make use of the me-

There were the usual talks, the usual handouts. Everyone said the usual things, like new analysis, things like that, can be gotten in ahead of deadline day. Breaking news is the only exception.

o'clock. The paper was in the process of being laid out.

"Is it too late?" the caller began. I cut them off. "Has New York been obliterated by aliens? Did 50' tall drag queens eat Tokyo? Has war been declared? Has Jerry Falwell just confessed he's Gay and gone to live on Christopher Street for the rest of his life?"

'No."

"Then it's too late." Hang up time.

In this struggle for our liberation, the media is one of the most important weapons in our arsenal. But like any weapon, you've got to learn how to use it.

1) If you've got an event you want covered, send in a press release. Don't assume that we've "just heard about it," as someone told me. I know how famous and important you are, and I realize that everybody is talking about you and your event, but occasionally things do slip by

2) In addition to the who, what, etc., put on it when you would like it in the paper.

Last November I got a press release for an event that was to be held in April. We ran it in March. The person who sent it was all irate because it was supposed to run in February.

Response? I don't read minds.

3) Another thing, for pity's sake, think ahead. If an event is to happen, say on June 3rd, don't get it in just in time for the issue that comes out June 2nd.
4) Every article, every press release

should include the name and phone number of a contact person.

One time, a person expressed disappointment that the press release as it was published about their event wasn't longer, "fleshed out, as they said. I gave them "a look" and asked if they'd ever heard of providing a contact person for further information.

But I can't afford to have anyone know who I am," came the reply.

"You need have no worry about that," I told them. And that was the end of that.

5) Finally, both publications, like any publications, have deadlines. Please, please find out what they are and observe them.

For example, from this time hence and even forevermore, Light's deadline for the two upcoming issues, will be on the editorial page, boxed and shaded. (I've learned how to do that now. My cat taught me).

# **Tolerance**

# TO THE EDITOR:

You may already have read the series on Gay Orthodox Jews that appeared recently in The For-Recently, I got a call from someone on ward written by James Brudner. Two incidents in Wednesday evening, along about seven the article so touched me, that I felt I should not risk

that they be overlooked. They could almost have been written by Chiam Potok. They show how even the strictest religious beliefs need not get in the way of tolerance and acceptance.

For Gay Orthodox Jews, the price of hiding their homosexuality is high: a life without intimacy, and a sex life comprised of only the most fleeting and impersonal encounters. Some Gay Orthodox Jews become celibate.

The Orthodox community is not completely hostile. Some Gay Orthodox Jews say that they have managed to achieve a measure of acceptance

Benjamin Hersch did not grow up Orthodox, but attended an Orthodox religious school in Brooklyn. Exploring his sexual and religious identities in his teens and 20's, Hersch discovered that not only was he Gay, but that he felt most at home religiously in the Orthodox community.

Today, at the age of 50, Hersch has been a "fully observant" Orthodox Jew for more than 15 years. He serves as an officer of his Orthodox shul in Manhattan. Many of his fellow congregants know he is Gay. Though some find it upsetting, he says, most people "either don't think about it or choose to ignore it" or else "have no problem."

This was not always true. In the early 1980's, officers of his Orthodox congregation threw him out after finding out about his sexuality. The incident sent him to a Conservative synagogue for a while, but he eventually found his present Orthodox synagogue, where he says he is comfortable.

David Belzer had a similar experience. In the mid-1980's, after appearing on a TV talk show in which he discussed being Gay and Orthodox, he was banned from his shul. Outrage from liberal congregants prompted his readmission, but he was denied an aliya for nearly eight years. Only several months ago was he finally called to the Torah, prompting cheers from supporters throughout the sanctuary

Hersch, too, has received some surprising expressions of support. Attending a celebration dinner held after a wedding, where it is traditional to pass around a cup of wine from which each unmarried person sips, Hersch's hosts treated him and his lover as if they were married. "I was startled," he says. "And they just smiled and passed us by and nobody said, 'Oh wait a second, you forgot those two,' and I was very touched."

Today, Hersch says, "I am very at peace with my sexuality." He still wrestles with how Jewish law applies to homosexuality, noting that Orthodox Jews "who are normally the most caring, the most gentle, somehow tend to be dogmatic when it comes to halacha around Gay people." He hopes that in the future, Jewish law may be reinterpreted with respect to committed Gay relationships.

# Giant Mile-Long Rainbow Flag to be **Unfurled in New York for Stonewall 25**

(New York)- Those of you going to New York for Gay Games IV and Stonewall 25 will get a chance to see what is being billed as the largest flag ever made; 80,000 square feet larger than any flag ever made or flown, according to the Guinness Book of World Rec-

The huge rainbow flag, weighing 7,000 lbs, using 17,000 yards of fabric, in six vibrant colors, is nearing completion in a Chelsea workshop. The work is being directed by Gilbert Baker, creator of the Rainbow Flag.

The familiar Rainbow Flag, according to the San Francisco Sentinel, was first made by Baker in 1978 for the Lesbian and Gay Pride Day in San Francisco. The Rainbow flag is now recognized nearly universally as the symbol of the LesBiGay civil rights movement.

When completed, the flag, measuring one mile long by 30 feet wide, will be carried through Manhattan in the Stonewall 25 March.

Statistics about the flag are staggering. It will be three times the height of the Empire State Building, or the size of 52.8 football fields. There are over 10,000,000 stitches in it

totaling 60 miles of thread. To cover it with dollar bills would take over \$1,250,000.

By the time of its completion, the flag will have taken approximately 121 days to make.

The mile-long flag will be unfurled and seen in its entirety only once. That will be on June 25, 1994 at the head of the Stonewall 25 March on the U.N.

The flag is being sponsored by Stadt-landers Foundation of Pittsburgh, and its National AIDS Community Advisory Board, chaired by Cleve Jones, founder of the NAMES Project AIDS Memorial Quilt.

The Stadtlanders Foundation was established in 1993 to offer direct support to charitable endeavors which improve the quality of life for persons living with AIDS and other chronic conditions.

Additional sponsors are: Next magazine-the Gay companion to New York, Genre and the Advocate.

To carry the flag will require a minimum of 10,000 people. Each person registering to carry the flag will be asked for a taxdeductible \$50 contribution. All funds will be distributed to AIDS service agencies nation-

Included among these is the AIDS Rescource Center of Wisconsin, parent organization of the Milwaukee AIDS Project. A Raise the Rainbow Designation form is available when you register. Just fill it out.

Flag carriers will receive a 30 ft wide piece of the flag and a free T-shirt.

Between June 18-25, 1994, more than 10,000 people of all ages, colors, abilities, sexual orientations, and HIV statuses, will travel to New York City from at least 40 foreign countries to participate in Gay Games IV & Cultural Festival. Coinciding with this Summer's Stonewall 25 festivities, "the Games"--billed as the largest athletic and cultural event in the world--are expected to attract an unprecedented 500,000 spectators.

And yet, detractors of the quadrennial happening continue to dismiss it as frivolous and apolitical. But for thousands of enthusiasts, the Gay Games--founded in 1982 on the principles of participation, personal best, and inclusion by the late Dr. Tom Waddell--are realitical.

Case in point: In addition to successfully petitioning the U.S. government to permit the admission of HIV-positive individuals to the United States for up to 10 days to attend the Games this year, Gay Games officials also facilitated awareness and sensitivity training for key individuals in the U.S. Immigration and Naturalization Service.

"I think it's probably pretty safe to say that that was a first," states Susan Kennedy, co-president of the Federation of Gay Games. When Kennedy speaks about the Gay Games-a celebration of the human spirit which has changed her life and the lives of countless others around the world--it's from the heart.

Daniel Vaillancourt: What is the difference between the Federation of Gay Games and Unity '94?

Susan Kennedy: The Federation of Gay Games is the parent organization, or the international governing body. It is to the Gay Games what the International Olympic Committee is to the Olympics. Our job is to make sure that the Games continue within the three original founding principles. It's our job to select the site for each of the quadrennial events. The Federation is a direct outgrowth of San Francisco Arts and Athletics, the organization that Dr. Tom Waddell created to produce Gay Games I and II.

Unity '94 is the organizing committee. It is to the Gay Games what Lillehammer was, and what Atlanta will be, to the Olympics. Unity '94 is basically responsible for producing the event.

DV: Why are the Gay Games important?

SK: I think first of all that they are about making a difference. There are a lot of people who have maybe played sports all their lives, but have never had the opportunity to participate in an environment where they could really, truly, completely be themselves.

There are other people who, for whatever reason, never played sports. Maybe they were the last kid picked in gym class, or maybe they just never had any desire to get dirty or sweaty. The Games have given them an opportunity to develop a whole other side of themselves. It's an event that covers the whole gamut of the community.

A lot of emphasis is placed on the athletic aspect of it, but there's also a very broad cultural aspect. It's an opportunity for the entire cross section of the community to participate in an event that I think is very empowering. The Games have had a profound impact on a lot of people's lives.

DV: Why was it important to obtain an HIV

waiver from the INS?

SK: We wanted to make sure that participants outside the U.S. who are HIV-positive or living with AIDS wouldn't be in a position where

they felt their participation was deterred because of the law. I don't know how many people will take advantage of it, but the important thing is that for anybody who needs it, it's there.

DV: How do you feel about sharing the spotlight with Stonewall 25 in New York?

SK: I think that both events are very significant to the Gay and Lesbian community at large. Having both events in New York City is going to expose different elements of the community to two different sets of people at the same time. They are two highly empowering, major events. This is perhaps a once in a lifetime situation.

DV: Any thoughts about Gay Games V to be held in Amsterdam in 1998?

SK: The Games were awarded to Amsterdam contingent upon the successful negotiation of a contract. We have every expectation of having it signed, sealed and delivered so that we can present the flag to Amsterdam at Closing Ceremonies. I think that the great thing about the possibility of the Games going off the North American continent for the first time is the full realization that this is truly an international event.

DV: How would you respond to those who dismiss the Gay Games as apolitical?

**SK:** There are multiple ways to look at "political." There are people who have the opinion that any event in the Gay and Lesbian community is political simply by virtue of the fact that it is taking place.

The Games aren't "political" in the sense

that we use them as a vehicle to support a particular political agenda, because that's not really why they were created. They were created to educate people through positive action. If by virtue of coming and participating in the Gay Games, somebody can see the importance

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d ta particular political issue attached to it doesn't make it apolitical.

# **'Documenting Discrimination' Project Has** Uncovered Cases Nationwide

(Washington, D.C.)- An unprecedented effort to document anti-Gay job discrimination has uncovered cases in every region of the country, adding critical ammunition to the fight for anti-discrimination legislation in Congress.

The Human Rights Campaign Fund (HRCF), which has hired a full-time staff member to coordinate the "Documenting Discrimination" Program, called for anyone who has suffered job discrimination because of his or her sexual orientation to contact HRCF. Those who come forward can remain anonymous.

"Anti-discrimination legislation is moving quickly on Capitol Hill, and we need personal stories to illustrate the painful impact of discrimination on hard-working people and their families," said HRCF Executive Director Tim McFeeley.

"Polls show that the general public supports anti-discrimination laws when they realize that Gay people suffer job discrimination," McFeeley said. "But most Americans simply don't know that people are fired, refused jobs or harassed at work because of their sexual orientation.

"Telling our stories can help change minds in Congress and in states facing anti-Gay ballot initiatives by showing that we seek equal rights, not special rights," McFeeley said.

Since the project began in mid-April, cases have surfaced in every region of the country. HRCF is compiling the stories for presentation to Congress to highlight the urgency of a federal law to prohibit job discrimination on the basis of sexual orientation. Only eight states and some localities prohibit such discrimination, which is legal under federal law.

HRCF is working with the National Gay and Lesbian Task Force and a broad coalition of legal and civil rights groups to gain passage of the federal bill.



# **Fest City Singers Take Risks to Dramatize** the Three-Day Stonewall Riots on Stage

(Milwaukee)- The Fest City Singers provided the ideal prologue to PrideFest with three performances of History, Herstory, Ourstory during the weekend of Friday-Sunday, June 3-5. Their Musical Review of Gay Life put audiences in the mood to cele-brate the 25th anniversary of Stonewall.

During PrideFest, they will present two more performances of this cabaret revue on Friday, June 10 and Sunday, June 12 at the Studio Theatre at the Broadway Theatre Centre, 158 N. Broadway, so there is still time to catch this original cabaret revue, and the Friday show is a benefit for PrideFest.

Act I begins in those Age of Aquarius years and there is a buoyancy to this time even though Gays and Lesbians were largely confined to the bar scene and were otherwise closeted.

The Singers spoof themselves in such numbers as "He's a Faggot," "How Nice," and "Ode to a Gym Teacher," the latter athletically performed by the women's ensemble.

But a serious note enters with guest soloist James Sampson's appealing singing of "The Altarboy and the Thief."

Then, at 2:00 a.m., June 29, 1969, Gays, Transvestites, straights and hustlers asserted their freedom at the Stonewall Inn.

The Fest City Singers have always been risk-takers, and the prospect of dramatizing a three-day riot would be daunting to any group and its director. Peter Mortensen, director/author/choreographer, creates a chilling, neart-stopping first act finale with just 19 people on stage using group movements, stage lighting (no, not strobe lights) and musical effects that are almost operatic in tone.

Matt Brown's singing of "Flesh Failures" becomes an overwhelming cry of defiance as the chorus surrounds "the fuzz" and raise their voices to "Let the Sun Shine In."

Ensemble singing characterizes much of the Singers way of telling a story in music. The women's ensemble, Vanessa Benning, Diane Bloom, Kristie Coryell, Kris Kananbie and Sandy Lewis are right on with their "Ode to a Gym Teacher" and joining guest soloist Leslie Fitzwater, their singing of "I Am Your Sister" brings audiences to their feet every evening.

Kevin Rock, Mike Westerhausen and Kelly Cauffman as the scene-stealing Su-premes, Duane Lettow, Kevin, Ricardo Reed and Tom Welcenbach in the not always P.C. rendition of "Black Boys/White Boys" and the "Dancing Queen" divas, Erico Ortiz, Matt Brown and Kelly all create vignettes that jog the memory and tickle the Gay sensibility.

With trained voices, professional singers and even music teachers in their midst, the Fest City Singers shine in meeting the choral demands of "Candles in the Rain," "Stout-Hearted Men" (a new interpretation) and "I Dreamed a Dream.'

Much of this vocal unity is the result of the painstaking, loving efforts of Music Director Peggy Lozier. The piano accompaniment of Raymond Roberts and percussionist Dennis Dykster help to create a seamless musical tap-



It was the second consecutive year that Kushner won the top prize from the group of theatre critics, editors and reporters. Last year, he won for the first half of the drama, Angels in America: Millennium Approaches.

Stephen Spinella, who plays a man living with AIDS in Perestroika, won for best actor. He also won the featured-actor prize last year for playing the role in Millennium Approaches.

# 'One Nation Under God'--Does Reparative Therapy Do Irreparable Damage?

One Nation Under God does what it does so well that it's open to charges of irresponsibility for not trying to do something else.

What it does is present a historical overview of psychiatric and religious attitudes toward homosexuality in the latter half of this century, with the emphasis on those from both fields who have attempted to "change" other people's sexual orientation.

It's not organized as a simple debate, but speakers pro and con are given a chance to state their case. You might think you were watching a balanced documentary if you weren't aware of the bias of filmmakers Francine Rzeznik and Teodoro Maniaci, or if you saw it at a Fundy Christian convention.

But view it in a Gay/Lesbian-positive setting, it will be obvious that the case for change is a weak one and we've got them outargued at every turn-at least in this film.

That's where the danger comes in. One Nation Under God allows us to feel complacent, even to laugh at the absurd things said about us, especially in the past. It's healthy that we can keep a sense of humor, as long as it doesn't blind us to the real dangers.

Most of the people we're watching are relatively moderate members of the Christian Right Wing; they say they want to "cure" us, not kill us.

We can cheer when Michael Bussee and the late Gary Cooper, who founded Exodus International in 1976, announce that they realized in 1979 they were in love with each other and weren't "ex-Gays" at all.

But despite their defection, the organization has continued to grow and is now huge and world-wide.

Apparently interviewed in 1990, thenpresident Sky Rogers--I should say "Mr" Sky Rogers because you can't tell his gender otherwise, with his clothes on-gets a lot of screen time to boast of Exodus' "high rate of recovery for people who are motivated and have support.'

Others testify that relatively few of their converts stay converted, and those who do, have only changed behavior, not orientation.

Bussee touches on the larger problem when he suggests that Queers have replaced Communists as a target of Right Wing hatred. Such enemies as Lou Sheldon, William Dannemeyer and Pat Buchanan are seen spreading their hate.

The first "ex-Gay" ministry, Love in Action, started in 1973, the year before the American Psychiatric Association deleted homosexuality from its list of mental disorders. Twenty years later, there are still dissident shrinks who do the same old thing under the euphemism of "reparative therapy."

Fascinating and horrifying flashbacks show the therapies (e.g. "orgasmic reorientation")

and police tactics used against us in the '50's and '60's. Joan Nestle, co-founder of Lesbian Herstory Archives, recalls a New York law that required butch women to wear three pieces of female clothing or risk arrest for transvestitism, and says they were sometimes taken outside and strip-searched during bar

Martin Duberman, at one point flogging his book Cures, talks about his own efforts to change through therapy before he came to accept himself. To a clip from an early TV program dealing with the then-taboo subject of homosexuality, he asks, "What kind of role models are people who can only be seen in sil-

Gay Christians are also heard from, notably Rev. Rembert Truluck of the Metropolitan Community Church, who refutes some of the traditional biblical arguments used against us; and Jack Pantaleo, who talks of ex-Gay groups finding a new calling in the '80's as "the big condom" that would protect Gays from AIDS.

Perhaps the biggest hoot in the film is an Exodus "makeover workshop that attempts "gender reinforcement" by making Lesbianser, ex-Lesbians--look more feminine. They also encourage ex-Gay men to play softball.

The argument comes from several sources that instead of trying to change the orientation of unhappy homosexuals, caring individuals should be changing the things that make them unhappy--i.e., societal pressures that make them hate themselves.

Trimmed to 75 minutes after seeming slightly flabby in theatrical and festival showings last year, One Nation Under God is one fine documentary. It's showing on PBS as part of the POV series.


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# The Lesbian/Gay Market: Its Big Business, It's Good Business--And It's Growing Fast

(New York)- Major corporations around the country and internationally, are expending more and more advertising dollars in an effort to reach the Lesbian/Gay market. It's just good business and it's growing all the time. So says a special report section in the most recent edition of Advertising Age magazine, the trade journal of the Madison Avenue world.

The list includes such companies as AT&T, Dewar's scotch, Levi Strauss, Continental Airlines, Campari USA, American Express, Hiram Walker, Banana Republic, Miller Brewing, Sony Music, St. Martin's Press and a host of others who are scrambling to get a piece of the lucrative Gay market estimated to be worth in the hundreds of billions of dollars.

"Capitalist America is not dumb," said Tori Osborn, former Executive Director of the National Gay and Lesbian Task Force. "There's a market out here; there's a buck to be made.'

Miller Leads The Way

Nowhere, says an article in the special section, is the push for the Gay dollar more apparent than in the upcoming Gay Games and Stonewall 25 celebrations to be held this

New York officials expect anywhere from 500,000 to a million people to come to the Big Apple for the week-long events. And they are expected to spend \$111 million plus. To corporations, that's the biggest Lesbian/Gay marketing opportunity of the year.

That fact wasn't wasted on Miller Brewing. The company, headquartered in Milwaukee, Wisconsin, has been targeting the Gay market since 1989, according to Advertising

Miller signed on early. In fact, it was the first major corporate sponsor. Gay Games IV organizers are grateful. They say that prior to Miller's coming on last Fall, getting sponsors had been "extremely difficult." Since then. others have joined in.

Miller has also signed on as the first national sponsor of the International Gay Rodeo Association's 15 events scheduled in various

"We market to Gays and Lesbians for business reasons because we want to sell our product to consumers. It doesn't get any more complicated than that," a Miller spokesperson, Sophia Nieves, was quoted as saying.

Where Miller has led, others are following simply because it's good business.

Corporations are finding that not only do Lesbian and Gay consumers have money to spend, they are loyal to those who court them.

"I have never before in my life seen the response," said Julian Acosta, general manager-cultural markets for Hiram Walker. Acosta is reported as saying that he had a pile of letters "an inch thick" from Gay consumers thanking the company and vowing their loy-

Harold Levine, director of marketing for Gay Games IV notes that "Marketers who support these events (Gay Games and others like them) earn an immense amount of loyalty.

As a result, corporations are not confining their sponsorship to the Gay Games and Stonewall. They are putting their money into other and associated New York events as well. For example, Miller and Schieffelin &

Somerset's Dewar's scotch are among the sponsors of "Liberty and Justice for All," The HX Ball" and other parties going on throughout the city during the third week in June.

Newsprint Vs. The Glossies

Corporate advertisers are also expanding into the arena of Gay publications. According to Mulryan/Nash, a New York advertising agency specializing in the Gay market, there are "about 64" Gay news and lifestyle publications in the U.S. with a total circulation of 1.1 million, which translates into a readership of 2.9 million.

Of these, the top ten are: The Washington Blade, Frontiers (Los Angeles), San Fran-

cisco Bay Times, Bay Area Reporter, The San Francisco Sentinel, Gazette (Tampa, FL), Edge (Los Angeles), The Weekly News (Miami, FL), HX and Next (both of New York City), with a combined circulation of 356,000 according to Rivendell Marketing, an advertising agency specializing in the Gay

While these bigger publications are seeing some of the advertising largess, the same is not always true for the smaller publications. The reasons, Advertising Age's special section says are two.

One is the fact that the larger advertisers and those who handle their ad accounts, like glossy magazine pages.

There is a distinct turning-up-the-nose at small, free newsprint publications. They like to go with the slick glossy stuff," said Don Michaels, publisher of the Washington Blade.

Michael Kazan, vice president-account supervisor at Franklin Spier ad agency in New York, agrees. Ad agencies, he says, like the 'slicker" publications, the ones that look more sophisticated.

But others say that it has less to do with the type of paper than with the phone sex ads. Major advertisers don't like to be seen in the same publications that carry them. For this reason, publications like the Washington Blade and others, if they carry the 900 number ads at all, run them in special pull-out sec-

Still, as an on-going examination of some of the various LesBiGay publications shows, 900 numbers, other ads of a sensual nature, and the major advertisers can and do exist happily side by side. Yet, it is also apparent that increasingly, there is a greater "mainstreaming" of the LesBiGay press in looks, in format, and in writing style.

Increasingly too, publications are taking advantage of major news services, and seeking out the talents of major writers

Our industry is at its infancy," said Mark Segal, publisher of The Philadelphia Gay News, a publication that has a circulation of 15,000 according to Segal.

Right Wing Backlash?

To day, according to Advertising Age, the Radical Right has made a largely unsuccessful attack on national advertisers and media seeking out the Gay market.

For example, last year, Don Wildmon's American Family Association, a group of Right Wing Christians, mounted a boycott of Levi Strauss & Co because of that company's withdrawal of support from the Boy Scouts of American due to their discriminatory policy against Gays.

The boycott included more than 100,000 complaints on preprinted postcards. All that did no good at all.

In that same year, Levi Strauss enjoyed record corporate earnings.

Other companies dismiss the Far Right as well. John Mellor, AT&T spokesman of quoted as saying, "Anyone who has that kind of attitude (fear of the Religious Right) has to loose it because this (Gays) is an important Call, Free Ads. GLINN Voice Mail (414-Milw.) 289-8780.

Other companies agree.

Mark DeMoss is a long-time aide to Jerry Falwell and president of a PR firm in Atlanta bearing his name that works for a variety of reactionary Christian groups.

DeMoss is quoted as saying that the recent market trends are bad news for anybody who wants Gays back in the closet.

"There's a pretty apparent trend in media and in entertainment and even in government towards acknowledgment of Gays and Lesbians as a legitimate minority, and I think the tide has certainly gone in that direction."

DeMoss add ls a little lamely, marketers are missing the mark by selling to the Gay minority and ignoring the Christians who he says number from 40 to 60 million people.

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
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

higher incidents of AIDS, we have been able to anticipate the impact of the AIDS epidemic on our health care institutions and public treasuries, and have a comprehensive public health strategy to combat the further transmission of HIV that we in Wisconsin can be proud of," she said.

Baldwin condemned the GOP delegates for not realizing that "no one is going to get tested if they think they could lose their job, lose their insurance, be denied medical care or be left alone to die," she said.

### **Nelson Condemns GOP Resolution**

Doug Nelson, Executive Director of the Milwaukee AIDS Project (MAP), was equally condemnatory of the Republican resolution

"This resolution by the Republican Convention might make sense, Nelson said, "if the Convention also had passed a couple of companion resolutions that would have prohibited discrimination based on HIV status and sexual orientation."

"What we have learned over 14 years of the AIDS epidemic," Nelson continued, "is that because of the societal prejudice and discrimination that surrounds AIDS and those who have HIV disease, we must construct public police in a way that both protects public health and individual rights."

Nelson continued, "The Republican resolution defies the enlightened public policy that Wisconsin and most other states have implemented on HIV which embraces the principles of voluntary HIV testing and anonymity and confidentiality for those who receive HIV tests. These principles have been enormously successful in both protecting public health and individual rights.

"A much more meaningful contribution to public policy by the Republicans would have been to have passed a resolution endorsing a comprehensive AIDS prevention campaign in Wisconsin with adequate funding to slow down the HIV epidemic.

"Nowhere in Wisconsin have we succeeded in stopping AIDS and we have an enormous amount of work to do in communities throughout the state that require education, training, interventions with people who engage in risk behaviors."

Nelson called Wisconsin's commitment to AIDS prevention "very weak." He said that a Republican endorsement of an aggressive prevention campaign would have sent a meaningful signal to the people of Wisconsin that the Republican Party was committed to confronting AIDS in an enlightened way.

Nelson said that ARCW is currently preparing and will be submitting to the Thompson Administration a \$1 million AIDS Prevention Initiative to be included in the 1995-97 budget.

At the same convention, GOP delegates passed a resolution favoring the declaration of English as the official language of the United States and of Wisconsin.

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# The Politics of Hate and Courage: North vs. Robb in Virginia Senate Race

In recent years, it is a rare event indeed for an American politician--of either party--to take a stand based solely on principle and conviction rather than on whatever expediency is required to keep or win a well-paying government job with all the power and perks of office. Such a rare event occurred last month at a Human Rights Campaign Fund leadership conference in Washington, D.C., when U.S. Senator Charles S. (Chuck) Robb (D-VA) appeared to express his appreciation for a contribution of \$10,000. He went far beyond just

Robb, running a tough and close race for reelection against radical extremists in his own and in the Republican Party, "...gave his strongest endorsement ever to homosexual rights, saying he will speak out on the issue even if it jeopardizes his reelection campaign. (He) condemned the 'fundamental unfairness' of anti-Gay discrimination and called for efforts to end it 'the last front of the true civil rights struggle,'" according to the Washing-

# Oliver North: A Public Liar, Hypocritical Opportunist, **Proudly Bigoted Man**

There was no reason for Chuck Robb to stick his political neck out other than deep personal conviction. Ten thousand dollars is a lot of money, but relatively insignificant in a

campaign costing millions.

His major opposition for the Virginia senate seat will be freshly nominated, Republican challenger Oliver L. North--public liar, hypocritical opportunist, and proudly bigoted against Gays, Lesbians, and most likely every other minority group different from his white bread, phony Norman Rockwell hero image, bought and paid for by direct mail professionals who raise millions of hard-earned dollars from all too many impoverished and frightened

promises to the Gay and Lesbian community and to the nation.

Again, I find myself in the same position. I am a conservative Republican who finds himself supporting Senator Chuck Robb, a libbecause I am a Gay man.

Any politician--Republican or Democrat-who speaks out for us, who stands against bigotry and hatred, is my candidate. Even though we may differ on economic and other issues, we stand together in support of common humanity and the Constitutional civil rights of all Americans. That is the most im-

Our country can survive Democrats in the Senate and even Bill Clinton in the White House. It cannot survive the bigotry, fear and hatred that has become the prime weapon of the radical extremists of the right, whether they be Democrat or Republican.

To the radical right, Gay men and Lesbians have replaced the Jews and African Americans of the past as their targets. We have become the Communists of the '90's, objects of fear and loathing. We are now the corrupters--of the media, the schools, the family, every "value" the professional extremists can think up on which they can raise money. Today, Gay men and Lesbians are the targets, stereotyped fuel for their fundraising machines, all in the name of God.

Any friend of these radical extremists is our enemy. Anyone opposed to their ugly campaigns of hatred and bigotry is our friend. It has become that simple.

The danger posed to our community is that critical. They promote raw hatred of each and every one of us. They proclaim their fundamentalist beliefs as religious gospel.

The penalty for sodomy is death, they say. Do they really want us dead? Probably. We need all the real friends we can get. Those who stand with us against hate are deserving of all the support we can give them. Chuck Robb is one of those courageous few.

# **Religious Protesters Decry Memorial for** Gay Victims of the Nazi Holocaust

(Jerusalem)(AP)- Right wing Jews on May 30, 1994, angrily denounced a remembrance ceremony held at Israel's Holocaust memorial for the Gay and Lesbian victims of

While there is no firm figure on the numbers of Gays and Lesbian who were killed in the camps, reference books in Israel's Yad Vashem library estimate the number at over 1 million. Other sources place the number much

Israeli police dragged away four religious Jews who tried to disrupt the service held by 150 Gay men and Lesbians from 12 North American and European countries. Parts of the ceremony were shown on national television.

Shaul Yahalom, a National Religious Party lawmaker, demanded that a fellow party member, Yosef Burg, resign as chairman of the council responsible for the state-supported Yad Vashem Holocaust Memorial.

This group of homosexuals and Lesbians have done harm to the traditional national consensus over remembering our national Holo-Yahalom wrote Burg. "A loud protest is called for to make up in some small way for this defilement of God's name.

His criticism echoed other statements by Orthodox religious protesters who said the Gay ceremony was not appropriate at the Holocaust site because homosexuality is forbidden under Jewish religious law.

Burg, a former Cabinet minister for the National Religious Party, was quoted by the party's newspaper, Hatsofeh, as saying the Gay organizers of the service staged a deliberate provocation."

But he also defended Yad Vashem's decision to allow the service. He said the Gays would have appealed to Israel's Supreme Court and been permitted to hold the ceremonies if authorities had tried to stop them.

Billie Laniado, a spokeswoman for Yad Vashem, said the organization did not sanction or sponsor the ceremony and that it was permitted simply in keeping with the rule allowing anyone to hold memorials to Holocaust

"We don't prevent people from coming to lay a wreath...we did nothing wrong," she

Shevach Weiss, a Holocaust survivor and speaker of Israel's parliament, criticized those who condemned the ceremony.

Recognizing an individual's right to be different is a supreme right in upholding a human and democratic social system," he said.

Weiss said Holocaust survivors should be sensitive to the suffering of Gays who, he said, were "the first guinea pigs.

He said that Dachau, the first of the concentration camps, set up in 1933, was founded





# **AIDS in Prime Time**

# TO THE EDITOR:

Eight months ago, I wrote to President Bill Clinton to ask him if he had ever considered the idea of devoting a prime time speach solely to the subject of AIDS. I asked him also if he had rejected the idea and, if so, on what basis.

Further, I asked him if he was aware of any plans for a speach of this nature from previous Administrations that had been scrapped.

Finally, I have received an answer. Unfortunately, it is nothing more than the usual political mumbo jumbo. "I greatly value your suggestions and concerns," the President writes in his May 19 letter. Yet, for all of that, he addresses none of the questions that I asked him.

My thought, as I told the President, was that the government could save a fortune on its AIDS education spending simply by announcing a prime time speach on the subject. Bill Clinton would be able to educate the entire nation on the status of the AIDS crisis in one 25 minute speach, which would be broadcast free.

What exactly IS our government doing about AIDS? What have we accomplished so far? What are our plans for the future? These are just some of the basic questions this type of speach could answer. These are also questions that your average American does NOT know the answer to, and is quite interested to know.

The White House answers all kinds of questions. When I was on my high school paper in the early '80's, I wrote to the Reagan Administration to ask: "What would happen if someone anchored a boat in the middle of the ocean and called it a new country?"

I received a swift response from some desk jockey who ruled it impossible on the grounds that a country must have land. The Reagan Administration also offered a letter concerning pardoning Charles Manson for the amusement of my classmates.

BUT ON AIDS THERE IS NEVER A CLEAR ANSWER!

I wrote similar questions regarding a prime time AIDS speech to the Bush Administration when Bush had a year left in office. A month later I received a four color brochure entitled "History Of the White House" and that was ALL.

President Clinton states in his letter, "We must accelerate our efforts to find effective treatments for those infected and provide education to all Americans." Can anyone think of a better way to "educate" all Americans than a live evening speach from the Oval Office?

The President signs off with: "I stand with you in the fight to protect those with HIV/AIDS from discrimination and to reduce the spread of this disease through education and prevention. We won't quit until we stop AIDS."

Yet, when the President delivered his State of the Union address, he found a few moments to mention a few people who had died in an Amtrak derailment earlier that morning. Why can't he devote 25 minutes to the millions of people who are so drastically affected by AIDS?

The answer can only be that he finds it too politically expensive to get involved because of the nature of the people widely perceived as having AIDS. . . namely Gays, Blacks and drug addicts. That is what I call discrimination.

Defense and Education Fund.

"The judge said, 'Now,'" Cammermeyer said, adding, "The sooner this happens, the better."

U.S. District Judge Thomas Zilly of Seattle ruled on June 1 that the Washington State National Guard violated Cammermeyer's constitutional rights when it discharged her after she acknowledged she was a Lesbian. She had been the state Guard's chief nurse.

In a 51 page ruling, Zilly said the military's ban on Gay service members was based "solely on fear and dislike of homosexuals."

Justice Department attorneys are expected to appeal Zilly's ruling to the 9th Circuit Court of Appeals in San Francisco. The 9th Circuit Court has the reputation of being one of the most liberal courts in the whole federal system.

The government has 60 days to decide whether or not to appeal the case. The appeals court has an unlimited amount of time in which to make its decision.

"We disagree with the judge's conclusions in the Cammermeyer case," said Pentagon spokesman Dennis Boxx. "We need to look very hard, along with the Justice Department, to see how far we want to pursue that disagreement," he said.

Cammermeyer's lawyers said they would fight any government effort to keep her from going back to her Guard job at Camp Murray.

Asked whether she anticipates any hostility when she returns to duty, Cammermeyer noted she had spent 18 months with the Guard after her disclosure and knew there could be some "very uncomfortable moments."

But she said members of her unit had been very supportive. One man called to congratulate her on Zilly's ruling and to tell her "They're waiting for me," Cammermeyer said

Tanya Domi, legislative director of the National Gay and Lesbian Task Force, called the decision "a foreboding signal to the Clinton Administration that the policy that they were forced to accept by Sen. Sam Nunn (D-GA) in last year's session...is, in fact, fundamentally flawed and unconstitutional."

But Elaine Donnelly of the conservative Center for Military Readiness, appearing with Domi on CNN, noted that the Supreme Court has backed Pentagon positions repeatedly. "In seven major Supreme Court decisions

"In seven major Supreme Court decisions in the past, the court has upheld the right of the military to have its own rules. It is not governed by the rules of the civilian world, it is very different," she said.

Domi repeated her assertion that the Zilly decision boded well for Gays in the military and presaged the end of "Don't Ask, Don't Tell."

"Because the new policy (Don't Ask, Don't Tell) is identical to the old in that it serves to accommodate prejudice against Gay people, we believe Judge Zilly's ruling is another nail in the coffin."

# Religious Right Political Activity Surging in 1994; Anti-Gay Efforts Top Priorities

(Washington, D.C.)- Religious Right political organizations are intensifying and effectively expanding their activities at the grassroots level, according to a report released on June 6, 1994, but People For the American Way. The state-by-state study identifies grassroots activity by Religious Right political groups in every region of the country, focused on public education, elections at all levels, legal activism, and anti-Gay efforts.

"These national Religious Right political groups are growing and broadening their outreach. They have helped create the energy and environment that has fostered the proliferation of hundreds of locally based like-minded organizations," said Arthur J. Kropp, President of People For the American Way.

"As this political movement gains strength, its agenda is having a corrosive impact on public education, on civil liberties and on the fundamental principles of tolerance and pluralism," Kropp said.

Religious-Right-based challenges to comprehensive sex education are reported in Arkansas, Colorado, Florida, Illinois, Minnesota, Nebraska, New York, North Carolina, Ohio, Texas, Virginia and Wyoming.

Religious Right organizations promote tuition vouchers as a way to provide public money for private religious schools, and as a mechanism for undermining the legitimacy and solvency of public schools.

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The People For report cites activity in nearly every state, and confirms Texas and California as two of the Religious Right's biggest battleground states, along with Georgia, Ohio and Virginia.

The report also documents significant organizing activity in states with less history as fertile ground for the Religious Right, such as Massachusetts and New York.

States showing major activity in the south include Florida, Georgia and Virginia; in the Midwest, Minnesota, Ohio and Wisconsin; and in the west, California, Colorado, Texas and Washington.

"There is no secret to their success," said Kropp. "Leaders of this political movement energized supporters willing to make a real commitment to doing the nuts and bolts work of politics.'

**U.S.**Congress

Candidates publicly associated with or receiving significant support from the Religious Right are running for U.S. House or Senate seats in Illinois, Indiana, Massachusetts, Minnesota, North Carolina, Ohio, Oregon and Texas.

Governorships

In Minnesota, former state legislator Allen Quist, aided by a Religious Right-led "takeover" of the Independent Republican Party by conservatives, appears to be on the verge of defeating incumbent Governor Arne Carlson for the Party's endorsement.

**Anti-Gay Efforts** 

Anti-Gay groups are actively organizing for initiatives and working on legislation in at least 25 states, including Arizona, Colorado, Florida, Georgia, Hawai'i, Idaho, Indiana, Kansas, Kentucky, Maine, Maryland, Michigan, Minnesota, Missouri, Nebraska, Nevada,

New Hampshire, Ohio, Oklahoma, Oregon, Tennessee, Texas, Virginia, Washington and Wyoming.

Efforts to put anti-Gay initiatives before voters in 1994 or later are planned or underway in Arizona, Idaho, Maine, Michigan, Missouri, Nevada, Ohio, Oregon and Wash-

The American Family Association has launched a new campaign against public broadcasting in the wake of the airing of Tales of the City in April. In at least three states--Georgia, Indiana and Oklahoma--state legislators considered funding cuts for public television. In Tennessee, a campaign of intimidation that included a bomb threat resulted in Tales being pulled an hour before it was scheduled to air.

Education

Religious Right political groups are organizing around public school issues in more than 30 states, targeting sex education, multicultural education, outcome based education religious Right-aligned school board members. In Ripon, residents have formed the Fam-

Coalition to educate the community on "family" issues and to help residents become more politically active. The group plans to address concerns such as outcome-based education, school prayer and public policy issues.

Pam Stenzel of Straight Talk, Inc, a minis-try of Youth For Christ, has been speaking in schools across Wisconsin on subjects of abstinence, AIDS and abortion. Several parents complained to school officials about the inaccuracies presented as well as the religious content of the discussion.

In Waukesha, Wisconsin Christians United (WCU), a group that split from Pat Robertson's Christian Coalition last year because it was too liberal on some issues, sponsored a presentation by homophobe, Lou Sheldon. Sheldon's topic was "Gay and Lesbian Special

Ralph Ovadal, head of WCU, has announced that he is running for the 80th As-

sembly District seat currently held by a moderate Republican who is retiring.

The Christian Coalition of Wisconsin held

its first major statewide organizing session in Madison. Director Ginny Marschman said the group's goals were to inform Christians of candidates' positions on important issues and mobilize Christian voters.

She reminded session participants that "It's God's plan for you to participate in public policy.

Speakers at the meeting included Suan Armozoosi, political director of Wisconsin Right to Life and Guy Rodgers, a national coalition consultant, who stated, "The immediate objective in public policy for Christians is not to save souls. It's to take values we believe in and translate them into constructive public policies.'

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


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
