AIDS Conference Reports

Among the more significant reports presented to the International AIDS Conference

- Dr. Dani Bolognesi of Duke University predicted that an AIDS vaccine will not be available for widespread testing for at least one to three years.
- Dr. Anthony Fauci, head of the U.S. National Institute of Allergy and Infectious Diseases, said new evidence suggests that an overactive immune system may hasten the damage caused by HIV. Immune-suppressing drugs that weaken this revved-up response may play a role in treating AIDS
- AZT and other approved drugs for AIDS fail to significantly prolong life because the virus evolves quickly to elude them. Dr. Stefano Vella of the Laboratory of Virology in Rome said preliminary data suggest that a new class of medicines called "protease inhibitors" slow the development of viral resistance when combined with AZT and similar drugs
- A variation of HIV called "Subtype O" is seen only in parts of West Central Africa. Because it is so genetically different, officials in the U.S. Centers for Disease Control and Prevention said some, but not all, of the tests used to screen for HIV in the U.S. fail to detect

From the War on **AIDS: No Treatment** Cure, or Vaccine

(Yokohama, Japan)- The gist of 3,500 reports from the war on AIDS is simple enough: There is no cure for AIDS, no effective treatment, no vaccine.

Nor will there be anytime soon.

'Anyone with HIV won't find much solace at this meeting," said Dr. Mervyn Silverman, president of the American Foundation for AIDS Research.

ence on AIDS, which concluded Thursday, August 11, was restrained from the start. Organizers warned the 12,000 participants not to expect anything big. They were right.

After four days of nonstop discussion, the goal of controlling HIV seems as distant as

"Breakthrough findings don't time themselves to coincide with international meet-" said Dr. Anthony Fauci, director of the U.S. National Institute of Allergy and Infectious Diseases.

But in the field of AIDS, breakthroughs are rare in the months between international meetings too. The only one that surfaced since last year's big meeting in Berlin was the discovery that AIDS-infected women can avoid passing the virus to their babies during birth if they take the drug AZT.

Even this is a limited victory. Because the medicine is so expensive, it will not help those living in poor countries, where the disease is most common. And it may be worthless to even those who can afford it if AZT-resistant strains of the virus grow dominant.

If any theme emerged from the conference, it was the need to go back to basics. Rather than a scatter-shot scramble for new drugs, many scientists seemed to agree that

ARCW's National Campaign Gets a Victory for Increased AIDS Funding in Wisconsin

(Milwaukee)- In a breaking news story, Light has learned that the AIDS Resource Center of Wisconsin, Inc. (ARCW) has achieved a major victory in its controversial campaign for equitable national AIDS funding.

In contentious negotiations that concluded on Wednesday, August 17, an agreement has been reached by AIDS advocates from throughout the country that will mean a 60% increase in national AIDS funding for Wis-

The negotiations which have been intense for at least three months, were forced by the ARCW-led national Campaign for Fairness in Ryan White CARE Act funding. ARCW Executive Director Doug Nelson has been the country's loudest voice against major inequities in the CARE Act, citing funding dispari-ties greater than \$5,000 per AIDS case.

Nelson, who is the only member of the National AIDS Action Council Board from the Midwest, emerged in national AIDS politics as a leader of a growing national movement for equity in AIDS funding. Through an intensive effort, ARCW organized more than 100 AIDS from 47 states to support the national campaign.

In pressing the equity issue on Capitol Hill in Washington, Nelson and the ARCW-led Campaign for Fairness secured significant political support which made the recent negotiations among AIDS leaders happen.

The final agreement creates a supplemental grant system for 32 states like Wisconsin which do not receive emergency Title I funding from the CARE Act.

A minimum \$250,000 allotment will be given to all states regardless of AIDS case load. In addition to current formula funding, a supplemental grant of \$250,000 will be given to states with case loads up to 1,500 individuals. For those states like Wisconsin with AIDS case loads above 1,500, a \$500,000 supplemental grant will be provided in addition to current formula funding.

Nelson explained that this \$500,000 supplemental grant combines with other formula improvements to assure at least \$600,000 of new funding for Wisconsin.

Gary Ray Bowles, Sought by FBI

(Milwaukee)- As we go to press, the best available information indicates that Gary Ray Bowles, 32, has arrived in Milwaukee. Bowles, a Chicago native, is being sought by police and the FBI in connection with outstanding warrants concerning a series of murders of Gay men in three states.

According to the Associated Press, Bowles, a transient, frequents Gay bars where he befriends patrons and often obtains lodging from them in return for sex and/or household repairs. The FBI says that he will then kill his victims, steal what he can and take their cars.

As reported in the last issue of the paper, Bowles was in Illinois, in the Springfield area. There was a possibility then that he was coming north.

On August 15, sources told Light that Bowles had been spotted in Kenosha.

On August 16, those same sources said that Bowles was in Milwaukee. Reportedly, he sought lodging on the evening of August 16 in a local homeless shelter using his own name.

The following day, August 17, he was reported as being sighted at 12th and Wisconsin

The Milwaukee FBI office would not confirm this information. However, Light was told that the hunt was on for him in Milwau-

Bowles is a white male, 5'9"-5'11" in height and weighs 145-165 pounds. He has brown hair and hazel eyes. He gives his occupation as "Laborer."

Bowles has a recessed chin and a pronounced Adam's apple. He has a tattoo on his upper right arm, a tattoo of a heart and ribbon the left arm, and a cross on his left wrist.

He has a scar on his right finger and a cancerous scab on his right wrist.

He is wanted by Savannah, Georgia police warrant for homicide dated June 10,

NGLTF says that it expects the Helms attacks to continue through further anti-Gay amendments to pending legislation. The purpose of all this, according to NGLTF, is to divert LesBiGay energies and funds from the Employment Non-Discrimination Act (ENDA) and health care reform.

Sen. Kohl has not returned calls.

AIDS Will Kill More Black Men than Homicide

Detroit-AP- AIDS will kill more African American Michigan men than homicide by 1997, the Michigan Department of Public Health says. "The number of AIDS cases among African American males has gone up each year," James Kent, a health department AIDS surveillance official told The Detroit News. "At the current rate, it will pass homicides as the leading cause of death" by 1997.

Homicide now tops the list as the leading killer of African American men ages 15-34 in Michigan, but AIDS is number two and gaining ground. In the 35-49 age group, heart disease is

first, cancer is second and AIDS is third.

Nationally, AIDS already ranks as the leading killer of African American men ages 25-44, according to a report by the Centers for Disease Control (CDC). The CDC report also found African American men are three times more likely than white men to die from AIDS.

There are still many African American men who believe AIDS is a Gay, white male disease," said Harry Simpson, executive director of the Community Health Center in Detroit. "They think, 'I'm not white, I'm not Gay, so I don't have anything to worry about."

Colorado to Host Gay Workplace Issues Confab

(Washington, D.C.)- The National Gay and Lesbian Task Force (NGLTF) has announced that Colorado will host the fourth annual "Out & Equal in the '90's," a conference on work-place issues impacting the LesBiGay community. The conference, "Working It Out in the Rockies," will be held October 15 and 16 in Denver. The conference is the first national Gayrelated conference to be held in the state following the end of the national boycott, which was lifted last December, according to NGLTF.

Ohio Group Appeals Decision on Anti-Gay Ban

Cincinnati-AP- The group that backed a city charter amendment the would prohibit civil rights protections of Lesbians and Gay men has appealed a judge's decision overturning the voter-approved measure. Equal Rights, Not Special Rights, a Right Wing organization, filed its appeal on Monday, August 15 and asked the 6th U.S. Circuit Court of Appeals to act quickly to hear oral arguments. The process usually takes eight to nine months. The Right Wing religious group said quick action is warranted because U.S. District Judge S. Arthur Spiegel's ruling created a nonexistent constitutional right to protect Cincinnati's Gay community.

Christian Group Condemns the Rainbow

Manitou Springs, CO-AP- A spokesman for the Right Wing Colorado for Family Values (CFV) founded in 1991 to fight for discrimination against Gay people, is questioning the use of the word "rainbow" in the name of a city planning project, called "The Manitou Rainbow Vision Plan." CFV executive director Kevin Tebedo said the word is "an allusion to the homosexual rights movement." Tebedo told city officials that "Using the word 'rainbow' to describe your plan is not wise if you do not have an intentional pro-homosexual slant.

The Vision Plan is Manitou's five-year guide for things such as sidewalks, water systems and zoning. Tebedo's group has demanded the names of all individuals and organizations using

rainbows in Manitou Springs.

Tebedo said that the plan also contained words like "diversity," which, he said, is a "code word for homosexuals.

Gay GOP Convention May Be in Salt Lake City

Salt Lake City-AP- Utah's capital is in the running to play host to a convention for Gay Republicans, but the city is considered an underdog to competitors with a more active night life. Still, Chris Ryan, president of the Utah Log Cabin Club, said that Salt Lake could challenge five other cities "if we get some really good support from the Convention and Visitors Bureau. "I don't know how we'll compete with New Orleans and Las Vegas when they have so much Gay night life," he said.

In addition to Salt Lake City, New Orleans, Las Vegas, Dallas, Minneapolis and Cincinnati are being considered. The site will be picked by year's end.

Lesbian Wins Custody Fight

Lincoln, NE-AP- A woman who was afraid that being a Lesbian might work against her in a legal fight over custody of her son has won a court fight with the boy's father. Lancaster County District Judge Jeffre Cheuvront granted custody of the 6-year-old boy to Brenda Manning after hearing two days of testimony. Larry Killin, the boy's father, was awarded visitation rights and ordered to pay child support. In his decision, Cheuvront wrote that while both parents are "fit and proper," it was in the best interests of the boy that he remain with his mother.

Police Investigate Computer Death Threats Against Cobb County Demonstrators

Marietta, GA-AP- Echos of the argument over Cobb County's anti-Gay resolution continue to reverberate. Police are investigating threats, issued via computer bulletin board, that snipers might attack a rally against the resolution scheduled for late August.

'Are there any nice hills nearby with a clear shot at the demonstrators," a Marietta man

wrote on Internet. "These cute little pink triangles make such good targets.

About 175 police officers will be on duty during the demonstration on the city square. It could draw as many as 5,000 participants, making it the largest protest to date against the reso-

Openly Gay Missouri Candidate Wins State House Seat with 80% of Vote

Washington, D.C.- The Gay and Lesbian Victory Fund recommended candidate, Tim Van Zandt, is Missouri's first openly Gay elected official. Van Zandt won the August 2 Democratic primary for the 38th District seat (Kansas City) in the Missouri House of Representatives, and will be unopposed in the November 8 general elections.

A Missouri native, Van Zandt is business manager of Kansas City's largest AIDS service organization and has an extensive history of political and neighborhood activism. Van Zandt's opponent resorted to Gay-baiting in an attempt to sway the voters. In a letter to voters entitled Straight Talk," James Wilson called Van Zandt "a single issue candidate" and claimed that Van Zandt's "sole purpose for running is to promote the Gay rights agenda."

Despite Wilson's Gay-baiting and the fact that Missouri was targeted by the Radical Right for an anti-Gay initiative, Van Zandt received more than 80% of the vote.

CARE Act formulas," Nelson said.

"I am thrilled that the 32 states that have been on the raw end of funding inequity will be helped by this new supplemental grant system," Nelson explained.

"There were a lot of skeptics about the political wisdom of our campaign, but in the face of the injustice we confronted, we had no alternative but to press forward with the demand for reform," Nelson said.

'We took a lot of hits from my AIDS colleagues around the country," Nelson com-. mented. "But sometimes in the heat of battle for a good cause, that's necessary

Ultimately, Nelson said that he felt that ARCW and the Campaign for Fairness gained respect at the negotiating table.

"We were determined, but flexible and we were dedicated to getting an agreement that would reduce the inequities and allow us to go forward with a fast-track reauthorization of the CARE Act," Nelson said.

'That approach gained us credibility and won us support," Nelson said.

Nelson reported that there was complete agreement on the urgency for immediate reauthorization of the CARE Act before the adjournment of the current session of Congress.

'There is great concern with elections coming up about the composition of the next Congress and its disposition on AIDS issues," Nelson explained.

"We believe that political prospects for reauthorizing the Act are the best with the current Congress even though the Congressional delays on health care reform are very trou-

bling," Nelson said.
"We are committing all of our energies towards Congressional approval of the new CARE Act within the next two months, and that's why achieving this agreement now is so important," Nelson added.

Nelson said that ARCW and its public policy coordinator Mike Gifford, would be working over the next several weeks with AIDS leaders from the San Francisco AIDS Foundation, AIDS Project Los Angeles, Minnesota AIDS Project, and the Gay Men's Health Crisis in New York to push hard for quick Congressional approval of the CARE

We're going to have the best stuff and the best volunteers to meet, greet and help shoppers," said Lisa Sommers-Walter, ARCW director of development. "People will know the dollars are going to support an important cause.

Props that ARCW has secured from the Dillinger movie, which was shot in Milwaukee, will fill the space, and counters and a built-in vault will hold jewels in the vintagestyle store. Great displays alone will not be the key to

That's what we see as a niche," Sommers-Walter said. "We need items that are in good condition, repaired, cleaned, so they

Life is Bleak for PWA's with Cryptosporidium, AIDS Conference Told

(Milwaukee)- Statistics from last year's Milwaukee water crisis demonstrate the danger facing those living with AIDS when bacteria contaminate municipal water supplies conferees at the International Conference on AIDS were told.

The Milwaukee AIDS Project (MAP) reported earlier this year that scores of AIDS patients have died because of the city's problem in April, 1993, with cryptosporidium, a microbe ordinarily found in the intestines of

The bacteria cause cryptosporidiosis. The flu-like disease can be lethal to someone whose resistance is already weak because of another disease, weakened immune system, surgery or

report to the International Conference on AIDS held in Japan said research by Milwaukee physicians concluded that AIDS patients who contract cryptosporidiosis are 40% more likely to die than whose who are not infected by tainted water.


"They get this and they live by a thread. This is a sad story and I hope it never happens again," said internal medicine specialist Ian Gilson, who led the study.

The parasite was blamed for temporary illness among thousands of people in the Milwaukee area.

The Gilson-led study involved 73 AIDS patients. Cryptosporidiosis was responsible for 68% of deaths in one test group, researchers said, more than half of them dead or terminally ill within six months.

Medications used to combat cryptosporidiosis in AIDS patients, azithromycin and paromomycin, had limited success, they said.

The cryptosporidiosis group incurred \$795,000 more in health costs than a group of AIDS patients who did not get cryptosporidiosis, Gilson said.






Democratic Congressional Candidate Tom Hecht, a Man With a Vision

On a bright Saturday afternoon in August, Tom Hecht, 32, walks down the street with a runner's pace. Why not? Hecht, an assistant state Secretary of State (now on leave), is making his first run for Congress, seeking to oust two-term Republican Scott Klug in the 2nd Congressional District that includes Madi-

Sitting at an outdoor table at the Cafe Europa, Hecht exudes energy, a scarcely restrained determination that this is his year.

He has lived in Wisconsin most of his life, "about as native as you come" to Madison, having spent his undergraduate years at UW-M, where he majored in political science. In addition, he has a Masters from the London School of Economics and has taught English in Mexico City. After that, he spent two and a half years in Washington where he worked for former Wisconsin Senator Bill Proxmire and a short time for Congressman Jim Moody.



Tom Hecht Wisconsin Light: Tell me, why are you running?

Tom Hecht: I grew up with Bob Kastenmaier doing a pretty effective job being my Congressman. I understand the progressive history and values of this district which my opponent does not represent. And that's why I'm running because I want to bring that (progressive values) back and I want to do a better job of representing the people of this community and he's not representing them. It's just that simple.

If he was doing the job we elected him to do, I wouldn't run against him. But he's not.

A whole variety of people, the LesBiGay community, dairy farmers, small business people, teachers, working class people who are just trying to make ends meet, are not getting represented by Scott Klug.

WL: What do you see as the crucial issues that confront this district in this campaign?

TH: One of the things I love about this district is that it is really in many ways, a magnifying glass for the whole country. It's an even balance between urban and suburban and rural. There's about a third of us who are liberal, a third who lean toward the Republicans and a large chunk in the middle.

The issues that face this district are the same issue that face the country. National health care at the top of the agenda covering everybody, crime prevention is very important. There's a growing fear of crime in this community.

In education. Obviously we have a very fine public school system and a university that's great and people are concerned about improving it as well as maintaining what we have.

WL: In office, would you be one of the co-signers to the federal "Gay Civil Rights" bill?"

TH: Yes.

WL: How do you stand on maintaining and increasing AIDS funding?

TH: Absolutely we need to have more equitable funding. I am very much committed to it. I have done a lot of work over the years at MASN (Madison AIDS Support Network) here in town and I'm very concerned that we as a nation have not focused enough attention on the problem of AIDS.

To my mind, AIDS is a public health crisis. We shouldn't have to rely on groups like MAP (Milwaukee AIDS Project) to meet the critical needs of the community. AIDS is an issue that touches all of us. It's unfortunate that the private sector, the non-profit sector, has to fill so many of the holes. If ever there was a national responsibility, it would seem to me to be this one (AIDS).

We need a whole re-ordering of priorities in this country. We need to re-focus on education and infrastructure and address the root problems of crime in this country.

I would have no problem supporting legislation protecting equal rights for Lesbians and Gay men, but to my mind, it goes beyond that. I'm against discrimination against anyone. We need to protect the rights of everyone in this

I have personally been impacted by AIDS. I have had friends who have and are suffering with HIV and so it is personal to me. That's one of the reasons I've been so active in MASN. We must treat AIDS like any other

WL: What is your stand on choice?

TH: Absolutely, down the line, prochoice. It should be a private decision between a patient and her doctor. The Supreme Court has spoken, that's that.

WL: How's the campaign going?

TH: It's going very well. No question, we've got an up hill battle. I'm the underdog, and I'm very happy about that. I'm following in Russ Feingold's footsteps. No one thought he could win in the beginning. We are very determined to surprise a lot of people.

What I see working in our favor is that a: this a very progressive district. That has not changed. It's still a Democratic-leaning dis-Russ Feingold won 63% of the vote here. Bill Clinton was elected here by more than 50%. I know the people are out there. I've got a really good shot at this. One election day, people are going to have a clear choice.

WL: You went running with President Clinton, didn't you?

TH: Yes. We went running at 7:00 in the morning. I was very, very proud to go running with the President. I'm the only Democratic challenger who's been running with him. In many ways, it's a big confirmation of how far this campaign has come.

He was very encouraging about my chances. Nationally, Democrats might lose a few seats, but the bright spots are here in the Midwest. The Democratic Party is really focusing a lot of energy here.

The man himself, I am tremendously proud of. I've disagreed with him on a number of things: the ban against Gays in the military, NAFTA, yet at the same time, he's compassionate, he's personable, he's intelligent.

Think about what else we could have. We had a very clear choice in '92 and I'm glad people made the right choice. We have a lot to be proud of in this President. He's a real human being. It's been so long since we've had that in a president. He's a President for our

In an attempt to foster debate and discussion, the Sentinel has printed dozens of opinion articles about NAMBLA, including opinion articles that defend the organization.

"Minnery took a single sentence from one of those opinion articles and characterized it as the editorial position of my newspaper. He then used this distortion to imply that a significant part of the Gay and Lesbian community is supportive of child

"As publisher of the Sentinel, let me make our editorial position crystal clear: the San Francisco Sentinel condemns and opposes NAMBLA, its goals, and its claim to be a Gay organization. We condemn and oppose any kind of abuse or exploitation of children.

"Finally, we ask Focus on the Family to stop smearing us and, by implication, the rest of the Gay and Lesbian community.'

The following is a response to the Politically Speaking Commentary by Bill Meunier titled "Baloney, B.S., and Outright Bull" in the 8/4/94

In his first paragraph, he makes what is probably the only accurate statement in his over 600 word diatribe - that Wisconsin does in fact have a rarity in this Fall's elections. Not only is another candidate running for the State Assembly as openly Gay, this one is also running as openly Republican.

Those who have read Meunier's previous commentaries will understand his need to claim that he read the interview with Scott Evertz with an open mind. Perhaps it was so open that what was said left the other side before he shut the door again.

The most egregious example of his claimed open-minded reading was his completely reprehensible misquoting of Mr. Evertz so as to be able to attack his position.

Mr. Meunier quotes the candidate as saying that he has a problem with domestic partnership legislation because it doesn't allow heterosexual couple to participate. He then goes on, through questions, to accuse Mr. Evertz of thinking the voters foolish and of a lack of knowledge and understanding of rights

Mr. Evertz clearly stated that it is the fact that domestic partnership does allow heterosexuals to participate that concerns him. They currently have the right to get married. It is the fact that this right is denied to Gay and Lesbian couples that makes domestic partnership necessary.

Mr.Meunier also derides Mr. Evertz' preference for same sex marriage legislation as an attempt to legislate morality. It is practically a better solution since it provides not the different riight of domestic partnership, but the same right of marriage.

When Lesbian and Gay couples have the right to be legally married, many other issues will also be resolved (e.g. inheritance law, health care decisions, tax policy, etc.) which are not addressed by domestic partnership legislation.

Furthermore, many Gay and Lesbian couples have children and there is a very legitimate argument that it is in the best interests of the children to promote long-term stable family relationships.

Same sex marriage would also give ones partner some rights and responsibilities as regards the children. Same sex marriage is truly an EQUAL Rights position.

Mr. Meunier's derisive references to Republican legislators who would support marriage over domestic partnerships also fails to note his own obvious opposition to marriage which would, in his

words, "legislate morality.

It is important that there be voices for Gay and Lesbian Rights in both parties, and not just the voices of so-called friends, but Lesbian and Gay voices who can speak from experience of the discrimination faced by our community on a daily basis. That is the voice that Mr. Evertz will be in the State Assembly.

We cannot rely on the Democrats to assure our rights. If we could, we would be able to serve in our Country's military without fear of discharge and we wouldn't suffer employment and other discrimination. The Democrats don't have an ability to deliver because many of their own don't support us (e.g. Sam Nunn and Herb Kohl). Strong voices and coalition builders are needed in both parries if we are to obtain equal rights.

Finally, Mr. Meunier's claim to an open minded reading is as much "Baloney, B.S. and Outright Bull" as his article was titled.



The Capitol Times of Madison called Baldwin "the best known Lesbian in Wiscon-



Material for Histories of Milwaukee area Gay Bars and businesses being collected

(Milwaukee)- With the recent demise of the YP (Your Place), some people in the area have begun to reflect upon the past of Milwaukee's Gay and Lesbian community.

There's certainly nothing wrong with the Gay/Lesbian "community" of today, and the future holds promise only of better days as we anticipate better acceptance of Lesbians and Gays as valued and legitimate members of the overall community.

However, many of us have an intense curiosity about our past; we feel the need to ensure that we better understand our roots, and pass that heritage on to future Gay and Lesbian people as they develop.

Quite a few people in the area feel that Milwaukee needs to develop a Gay and Lesbian archive of some type. We can probably not afford, as can some larger cities, to achieve large organized library-type archive.

However, these people think it is conceivable for the Gay and Lesbian people of Milwaukee to share the information each possesses with one ormore people who are willing to collect and organize the information. This modest collection could sometime be used to develop one or more books.

As an initial step in this process, several people are beginning to collect and organize information on all businesses that have ever existed in the greater Milwaukee area that served Gay and/or Lesbian people in some organized fashion.

For each bar, restaurant, bookstore, bath house, retail establishment, etc., they ask that readers send in whatever information they have; specifically:

- any other names under which the business

- photos of the outside and inside of the

Computer Information Superhighways are Easy to Use, Extremely Popular

Much is being written about the so called "Information Super Highway." The explosion of new technology is bringing Americans much closer together as new ways of communication, receiving information and amusement mushroom around them.

Through computer and video technology, Gays and Lesbians are finding new ways to get to know each other, exchange information, meet each other and develop strategies to

advance the cause of equality.

In fact its use of computer technology may the one area where the Gay and Lesbian community is well ahead of the homophobic Religious Right. The Religious Right is so concerned about this that at a recent summit meeting in Colorado, participants were urged to monitor local Gay and Lesbian computer bulletin boards.

Everyday hundreds of thousands of Lesbians and Gays call local and national Computer Bulletin Boards. They shop, exchange messages, make dates, learn about upcoming community events, leave comments on current events and talk to each other without ever leaving their homes or even revealing who they are.

A computer bulletin board, commonly called a BBS, isn't a bulletin board in the literal sense. Its contained within the confines of a computer reached by using a modem.

Access to this technology is easier than

many people might think.

All that is needed is a computer equipped with a modem, which is nothing more than a telephone for computers. Modems are used by one computer to call another computer. Modems are normally included with the purchase of a new computer. If not, prices start in the \$30 range. Modems are easy to install and use. Using a modem, a computer user can send and receive information, play games, send a fax and make copies of files on a BBS to use on their own computer.

Those calling a BBS are identified through A handle is a name the caller assigns to him/herself. This allows Gays and Lesbians to remain anonymous. In fact the ability of Gays and Lesbians to use their computers and reveal their names, address and phone numbers only to those who they feel comfortable with may be one of the biggest reasons BBS's are so popular.

Through what are called Network Message Bases, Lesbians and Gays are able to send and receive messages and information from others throughout the country and around the world for the cost of a local phone call.

Through a local BBS a user can have access to hundreds of these Network Message Bases. These message bases link BBS's from throughout the country (and sometimes from throughout the world) together. Each has its own topic. These range from specialized sexual interests such as "Bears" or "Cross Dressers" to informational topics like "Gay Politics," "Gay Sports" "Recipes" 'Women's Issues.

Computer users can read through messages left on these bases and leave comments that will be read by others when they call their local BBS. Comments can either be public (everyone can read them) or private (the only user who can read it is the one its sent too.) One Milwaukee user told Light that he uses his computer to exchange daily messages with a friend in San Francisco.

Since its always a local call for both of us its cheaper than MCI, AT&T or any other long distance company. Plus you don't have to worry about when he is going to be home or getting a busy signal. We can read and respond to each other when its convenient.

Gays and Lesbians use BBS's for more an messages and getting news. They also use them for recreation.

All of the Boards have files available for downloading. These files can contain pictures of nudes, texts of stories, or even games or computer programs. Callers can use their modems to "download" (make a copy of a file) for use on their own computer.

All of the boards have methods of verifying that only adult users have access to adult files, boards and message areas.

A few Gay and Lesbian BBS's have games that can be played either against the computer or against other callers. These games range from trivia and word games to sexual fantasy and battle games.

Many romances have blossomed over a computer keyboard.

Most Gay and Lesbian BBS's have local personal ad boards. These ads are similar (although sometimes more graphic) to what you might see in a singles magazine. Callers post the ads and those whose interest is sparked send a private message responding to them. Both the person who left the ad and the person who responded remain anonymous.

Most Gay BBS's also have match maker programs. Callers answer a questionnaire about their looks, age, interests etc. Other callers can read their questionnaire and if interested in meeting them they can leave a private message.

The more sophisticated Match Maker programs allow the user to search for certain characteristics, such as various age groupings, common interests or personality traits.

All of the BBS's also offer local message boards where users can "post" information about upcoming events, discuss local issues, and put up items for sale.

Most of them also have a feature known as "Chat." Chat is a feature that allows two or more users who are on line at the same time to talk to each other. This is done by typing messages back and forth.

While many Lesbian and Gay computer owners call big national Computer Bulletin Boards like Prodigy or America on Line, their numbers may be diminishing. With the advent of hundreds of network message bases, it is no longer necessary to call a national board to communicate with people around the country.

Furthermore the local boards are cheaper. The Back Door

Wisconsin has several Gay and Lesbian owned and operated Computer Bulletin Boards. All but one, Madison's Party Line, are Milwaukee based.

The biggest and most diverse of the Gay and Lesbian Boards is Milwaukee's Back Door Operated out of a basement in Bay View, the Back Door has over 1,000 users, 17 phone lines, and tens of thousands of files.

Those who call it at 744-9336, can choose to play one of over 35 games, use three different matchmaker programs, and even call other Computer Boards.

The Back Door has over 230 Network Message Bases and a "Women's Only Area," where only women can log on and exchange The Network Message Bases ranging from "Gay Trek" ranging from "Gay Trek" (for Gay and Lesbian Star Trek fans) "Gay History," "Gay Politics" and "Gay Sports" to "Leather and Levi," "Bi-Sexual" and TV/TS Boards.

As if all of the above weren't enough, the Back Door also has 24 CD rooms on line, and an electronic "Shopping Mall.

System operators Paul and Will have even offered to set up special message areas for any Gay or Lesbian group that wants one. One group, PrideFest, has two such boards. One PrideFest Board is for posting public announcements about PrideFest and its activities. The other Board is a private board with access limited to PrideFest officers and Pride Council members. The private board can

be used to post minutes, meeting notices, and

Subscribers pay \$35.00 a year to the Back Door and receive three hours of on line time a day. Non-Subscribers get 30 minutes and can not post messages or download files.

The Back Door has emphasized network message bases over local message boards, but that is changing. New local boards for personal ads, want ads, general topics, and politics have recently been added.

GLINN

The only other Gay operated Wisconsin BBS with games, and chat is GLINN (Gay Lesbian Information News Network). GLINN can be reached by calling 289-0145.

GLINN has over 1,000 users. It offers several special features. GLINN's users can read USA Today, Gay Community News or wire service reports from the International Television News Network. They can even see National Weather Service forecasts from around the country. These forecasts are updated every 6 hours.

GLINN is actually four Bulletin Boards in one. BBS One is for computer support and contains the news features. BBS Two is for the GLINN network. BBS Three is a Gay and Lesbian Adults only bulletin board, and BBS Four is for networks and custom forums.

Although it doesn't currently have any Network Message Boards, system operator Dan Schramm has recently purchased a satellite dish that will allow his system to choose from over 8,000 Network Message

"We plan to add 200 to 300 Message bases by the end of August. We also plan to add more phone lines at the same time," Schramm

Like the Back Door, GLINN offers free access to callers. Subscribers who pay \$25.00 a year receive more daily on line time and access to adult files.

Cross Roads

The longest running Gay BBS in Wisconsin is Cross Roads. Cross Roads began in 1986. Since that time it has gone through a number of owners, but has retained a loyal cadre of users.

Cross Roads can be reached by calling (414)282-0494. As of August 1st Cross Roads has gone to a pay system that requires callers to pay \$30.00 per year for access. New users will be given 300 minutes of free access time and limited access to the various message boards so they can decide whether or not they wish to become a subscriber.

Cross Roads's main emphasis is on local message boards. It has 36 such boards some of which such as "Leather and Levi" and "The Women's Board" are specialized and not available to all users.

Cross Roads has 16 network message bases, but these are linked only to other systems around the country with Oracomm software.

Cross Roads Tech, Mark, points out that software is very user friendly and was written by a Gay man. According to Mark, Cross Roads has about 100 subscribers.

Dr. Pervertis

The Dr. Pervertis BBS in Milwaukee, is not like any of the others written about here. This BBS can be best be described as a "put the token in the slot and look through the glory

hole," BBS. Pervitis whose real name is Larry, offers 350 users, a variety of sexual fantasy and message boards. Those calling 873-1680 can link up with one of three phone

Users can exchange messages on 19 message boards including AC/DC personals, S and M, Gay Fantasies, The Glory Hole, Places to Go or Hot Gay Personal Ad Boards.

Pervitis also has three CD Rooms with over 21,000 adult XXX files on line. When asked why he doesn't offer more in the line of politics or other informational message bases, Pervertis told Light "My BBS is kind of an electronic Gay singles bar. People use my system to meet others with similar interests. You wouldn't expect to see a political speaker in a Gay Bar on a Saturday night, and you won't see political messages on my system.

Starcom

Starcom is a cross between Dr. Pervertis and the other local Gay BBSs. While not exactly an electronic singles bar, its emphasis is not on informational exchanges either.

System operator Rick, says while many of Starcom's users engage in "electronic cruising," he started his system because none of the other boards at that time had any network message bases.

Through forty-three network message bases, Starcom is linked to over 100 other systems in the U.S., Europe and Australia. These bases include: several sexually explicit boards as well as boards devoted to topics like Women's Issues, Sci Fi, Current Events, and AIDS. They are augmented by four local message bases.

Starcom has over 30,000 files available for downloading. Like the other Gay BBS' adult file access is limited to verified adult users. Starcom has 340 users. The system is free, but there is a one time \$10.00 registration processing fee. Subscriptions of \$45.00 a year gains unlimited access to thousands of adult pictures and text files.

As more Gays and Lesbians purchase computers (estimates are that one in four households now has a computer), the community can expect to see more Computer BBS' springing up. They can also expect to see existing boards continue to expand.

What shape that expansion will take is anyone's guess. One thing is clear, however, thousands of Gays and Lesbians are already using their computers and speeding down America's Information Super Highway

Nearly Half Polled in Recent Survey Say Gays Can Be Christians

(Louisville, KY)- A sociologist says the results of a new poll show a view of homosexuality that extends beyond religion and into society as a whole.

The Bluegrass State Poll found that while a majority of Kentuckians surveyed oppose Gay people holding religious leadership positions, nearly half say Lesbians and Gay men can be "true" Christians.

"They are afraid homosexuals will influence them," sociologist Patricia Gagne said. "'You can sit next to me in church, but you can't have power over me.'

The poll, published on July 31 in the Louisville Courier-Journal, found that 69% of those surveyed were opposed to having Lesbians or Gay men as pastors, ministers, priests or rabbis. The poll found only 18% support

having Gays in those roles. But 49% of those surveyed said they believe Gays can be "genuine" Christians; 37% said Gays can't. "I don't know," made up the rest of the responses.

The poll is based on interviews with 901 Kentucky adults, including 831 who said that they have a religious preference.

Gagne, an assistant professor at the University of Louisville who has extensively studied sexuality and social movement, said society has become more open and civil rights for Gays have become an issue. As a result, she said, churches have no choice except to take on the same issues, and she thinks many of them are opening their doors to change.


A majority of Catholics and mainline Protestants, but only 42% of Southern Baptists, said their churches should formally accept Lesbians and Gay men as members.

A majority of Catholics--71%--and mainline Protestants--54%--thought one could be Gay and not in conflict with the faith.

Gagne thinks attitudes are changing rapidly. "People are not as willing to have their sexuality controlled by the church like be-

The fact that church members also have Gay relatives makes it difficult for people to believe Gays are not Christian or Jewish or one of the other faiths, Gagne said.

Gay Softball World Series in the 'Buckle of the Bible Belt' Raises Religious Ire

(Nashville, TN)- Thousands of indignant citizens signed the petitions of several church groups who wanted to stop, of all things, a softball tournament.

It's a big tournament, with up to 100 teams that have come to Nashville from around the country and begun competition on August 16. Tourism officials are elated about the potential boost to this southern city's econ-

But what offended and continues to offend the petitioners is just who's come to Nashville to play in the Gay and Lesbian Softball World Series

One city councilman is unabashedly more concerned about what might be going on in hotel and motel rooms than on the ballfield. The competitors will be violating state sodomy laws, reasons Councilman Charles French.

French contends that all over Nashville, Lesbians and Gay men will be having sex, lots of sex, sex in the rooms, sex everywhere, so that there'll be little time to play softball at all.

Nashville is unique in mounting this challenge to the Gay Softball World Series. The petitioners, organizers say, have presented the first objections they've encountered since the event began in 1977

"The only resistance we've ever gotten was when Nashville received the bid, Jim Marks, assistant commissioner of the North American Gay Amateur Athletic Association (NAGAAA). The tournament was held in the South once before, in Atlanta in 1988, without incident, he said.

But then Nashville does not idly boast of being "the buckle of the bible belt." It is the home of the Southern Baptist Convention, the Gospel Music Association, the National Baptist Convention USA, and Thomas Nelson Publishing, which puts out bibles.

"Nashville will never be the same," complained Ken Massey, minister of McFerrin Missionary Baptist Church in Madison, the

neighborhood where the five-day tournament is taking place.

Massey's church is one of those that circulated petitions against the tournament. Some of the petitions, urging that the tournament not be hosted, were delivered to Nashville Parks Director Jim Fyke in November, 1993.
Up to 3,000 people signed the petitions.

They did not sway city officials.

"We're a public facility," said Barbara
Jones, sports supervisor for the Parks Board. Anybody has the right to reserve long as they obey the rules and don't make trouble.

That line doesn't pass muster with French and the Right Wing Christians from whom he draws support.

"I think most of our society, certainly Nashville, sees homosexual activity as something that's wrong, whether at the law level or the moral level," French said.

Jones said the local finals leading up to the Gay World Series each year have become a favorite of umpires and park employees.

"They have a committee to pick up trash after the tournament and make sure the place is left clean," Jones said. "You can bet none of the other ones do that. They clean the bathrooms--just everything.

It is estimated the tournament will pump about \$5 million into middle Tennessee's economy. Considering that, city officials have ignored the Far Right and welcomed the Gay tournament with open arms.

Mike Smith, who was part of the Nashville softball team that successfully lobbied NA-GAAA to hold the Gay World Series here, said residents are coming out to watch the

"They don't see the stereotype of running around bases in high heels and dressing in dresses," he said with a chuckle. "It's just people getting together to play softball and they happen to be Gay.

He took part in the New Pacific Academy for young Queer activists. Jay was arrested in numerous AIDS demonstrations where he was often subjected to police brutality and serious

Zamora Verite: An Interview with MTV's Gay, HIV+ Heartthrob

Pedro Zamora makes a bewitching first impression. It's the eyes, the smile, that accent. But delve beneath the charisma and you'll uncover the true treasure: a bright, eloquent and passionate young man whose story succeeds in inspiring at virtually every turn.

succeeds in inspiring at virtually every turn.

Diagnosed HIV+ five years ago at the age of 17, Zamora has emerged as an incessant HIV/AIDS educator and activist. Having devoted his entire adult life to HIV prevention and education, and to the creation and improvement of substantial services for young people living with HIV and AIDS, the Cubanborn 22-year-old has enlightened some 20,000 students in his home state of Florida alone.

In addition, he has trained countless educators and health service professionals, served on numerous national boards and committees, testified before Congress about the needs of HIV + and runaway youth, and appeared on CBS, NBC, "Oprah," and "Geraldo."

However it is Zamora's latest role--as a featured cast member on MTV's "The Real World," the critically acclaimed reality-based soap opera--which may prove his most potent

soap opera-which may prove his most potent.
In cinema verite style, "The Real World"
(Thursdays from 9:00 to 9:30 p.m. CT)
chronicles the saga of seven young adults living together in a house in San Francisco. Impromptu action and dialogue are recorded while the men and women discuss their careers, politics, backgrounds, hopes, loves and fears. Alliances and hostilities transpire naturally as cast members speak to the camera and bare intimate aspects about their lives and those of their roommates.

Daniel Vaillancourt: How did finding out you were HIV positive at 17 change your life?

Pedro Zamora: The question should be, "How did it not change my life?" It changed everything. It's really hard to express, but it basically changed my whole perspective. Here I was, getting ready to go to college, deciding whether to move away from my family or attend a college near home. I had all these dreams, expectations, and thought I had 50 or 60 years to accomplish those goals. All of a sudden, I realized I didn't--that my life would not be that long. It changed everything for me.

DV: Had you come out yet?
PZ: Yes. I came out at the age of 14.

DV: Who does an HIV positive teenager

PZ: In Miami, that was one thing that I had a lot of difficulty with. Most of the agencies that were there to help people with AIDS could deal with me going to them and saying, "I'm a person with AIDS and I need help." What they had problems with was the fact that I was 17-years-old. There weren't many young

people coming out and saying, "I'm HIV positive. I have AIDS."

DV: How did you decide to devote your life to teaching others about HIV/AIDS?

PZ: I didn't decide it. I think it just happened. There was a chain of events, and I just went with the flow. I thought of what was going on, and didn't resist it. But I didn't decide to do it. It just happened.

DV: What are some of the high points of your work in the past five years?

PZ: Oh, I'm not sure. . . . Certainly, speaking before Congress. That was pretty exciting. Or when I made the front page of the Wall Street Journal.

DV: What are the burning issues for Gay, HIV positive youth at the moment?

PZ: Access. There's 10,000 other issues, but access is one. If we don't have access to the system--if we're not part of the system-then any other thing is unimportant. For most HIV positive young people, just getting through the door is the biggest issue. We pretty much do not exist in the eyes of the system. We, as young people, are marginalized. We, as Gay young people are maginalized. But as young people who are HIV positive and have AIDS, we are totally written off the page. We don't exist.

DV: You're talking about the established system of AIDS service organizations (ASOs) in America?

PZ: Oh, yes. Definitely. I think if you go across the country, most agencies can deal with people with AIDS. Most agencies can deal with Gay and Lesbian people. They can deal with people of color.

But when presented with young people, they really have a hard time dealing. I think things are changing. Certainly, here in California, new programs such as the one I'm working with—Youth Empowerment Servicesare dealing solely with HIV positive young people and their issues. They are educating them, rather than just educating the young people who are HIV negative. I'm very exited about that.

DV: What do you think is the root cause of ASOs' inability to deal with young positives?

PZ: Well, I think it's just a matter of experience. My experience as a young person is very different. They system is based on an adult system. The system is built on the premise that the person who is going to receive the services is strong enough, or articulate enough, to say, "This is what I need. This is what I want."

Well, in the case of a lot of young people, that is not the case. So, unless you have a group of people who are sensitive, who are educated about the issues of young people, it's going to be very hard for young people to get help. Most young people do not have what it

Pedro Zamora: An Abused Child

Editor's Note: The following excerpt was taken from the August/September issue of POZ, from an interview by Hal Rubenstein. Zamora tells about the sex he had when he was 14-years-old.

Pedro Zamora: When I was 14, there was a 40-year-old man who had sex with me, and I see that as abuse, even if I consented, even if I enjoyed it. It was about power he had and the power I didn't.

When I had sex with another 14-yearold, I didn't consider that sexual abuse. That was experimentation. The power structure was the same. I had the power to say no. With a 40-year-old, there were plenty of times I wanted to say no, but I didn't think I had the power

Hal Rubenstein: Do you think it still has a lingering effect on you?

PZ: Yes. In the way I pushed people away and didn't know why. In my failure to connect with other Gay men because of my lack of trust. It was hard for me sexually beyond the physical level. Emotionally, it was just not there. I'm still dealing with it. Sean is the first person who I've been able to break through with. When I look at him, I feel an equal level of power.

takes to say, "This is what's going on in my life and this is what I want."

DV: How are you personally addressing this problem?

PZ: One of the benefits that I hope has come out of my going public with the fact that I am HIV positive is that I've tried to give a voice to those young people who do not have a voice. I feel that every time I come out—every time I tell either one person or a thousand people that I am HIV positive—I am changing the system. I am forcing the system to deal with us as young people.

DV: What would you say to HIV positive youth in cities and towns far from either coast, in the Midwest, for example?

PZ: I would say, "You're not alone. . . Unfortunately, you're not alone." There are many other young people across the country who are going through the same thing. You always feel like you're the only one-that there's nobody else like you out there. But that's not true.

DV: Tell me about your family.

PZ: My family . . . My family is just a bunch of crazy Cubans. My family is my biggest support system. They have been consistently, and I feel very lucky to have them be-







It's August 9, a warmish day, when Steve Beyers and Janet Mueller come to the office for an interview. They have that bright, expectant look of people about to embark on a grand, new project, something they have both dreamed about for years.

And so it turns out to be.

Their "project", their dream, is a new bar for the community and they are eager to talk

Wisconsin Light: I guess the first question is, what's the new bar going to be called?

Steve Beyers: The new bar's going to be called "Just Us" and it'll be located at 807 S. 5th Street in Milwaukee. Lori will be the man-

WL: When will it open?

SB: Well, the Common Council votes on our license on September 27 (they don't meet in August) and if we get the license on that date, the doors will fling wide open as soon as we walk back with that license

WL: How do I phrase this?--What possessed you to open a bar?

Janet Mueller: (chuckles) My Quaker friends ask the same thing. We wanted to have light-based place, entertainment, good fun. Also, Steve and I get along very well. We wanted a place where we could all go, Lesbians and Gays, where we could all fit in together. That was a big motivation.

The other thing is we want to build community. Nobody's going to open their pocket and say "Here. Here's money for a community center." So, the idea is to have a bar, a place where we all come and be a community.

SB: The space that we've got is nice because one of the things we want to do with it is the main bar area which is very large . . .

JM: A 45' long bar.

SB: Plus there's a back area. We'd like to be the Queer Cheers" with a dance floor, where you walk in the door and people will know your name. Then there's a second room which is going to be a totally non-smoking area which will have music pumped into it, and TV monitors and then there's a patio.

JM: And we're having a very costly water

filtration system put on the building right at the point of entry into the building so that all the water, every drop, will be crypto-free.

WL: Will there be a restaurant?

JM: We've got a kitchen that we can use for hors d'oeurves for the bar and catering events. If you want your bowling league to have its thing there, we have the space and the facilities and the expertise to do that. But, at this point, we don't have a full-time wait staff so you can come in and order off a menu. That'll be our next step.

The floor above the bar is incredible. It's a 110' long and a little over 20' wide and can be converted into a great dance hall and show lounge. We can go through three different projects right in the same building.

SB: According to a friend of mine, and back in the '40's and '50's, the second floor was a big dance hall and Liberace played

JM: It was a singles meeting bar.

WL: What kind of place will it be?

SB: A place for all our people, a place to build community. It'll be a place where you can go and sit and talk.

We'll really have a nice cocktail hour, with some hot and cold hors d'oeurves for people to have when they come after work.

JM: It'll be a "no attitude" bar. You don't

have to dress a certain look or be a certain thing. You can just be yourself. There'll be a super dance floor in the back, but quiet enough to you can sit up at the bar in the front and talk. There'll be a pinball machine and a dart board. Whoever you are, you'll be comfortable at "Just Us.

SB: We'll have a stage, so we'll have live performances and that kind of thing that'll appeal to a wide cross section.

JM: On Sundays and Monday nights there'll be Lesbians watching football.

SB: We've had the support of our neighbors in the area. They've just been great. They're really happy we're moving in.

SB: We've had a lot of help from a lot of tremendous people--Pat Prudlow. It couldn't have been done without him. We'll all worked together in a very high stress atmosphere and gotten it together.

JM: (Nods and smiles warmly in agree-

Candidates Dean and Evertz Address Action Wisconsin Meeting

(Milwaukee)- Action Wisconsin, the statewide network of Gay and Lesbian organizations and individuals, met this past weekend in Stevens Point. Many people attended, some from as far away as Milwaukee, Madison, and Green Bay. There were also a number of local residents that came to share their thoughts and experiences on organizing Lesbian and Gay people in the area. The meeting began with remarks by two candidates for state office.

Dorothy Dean

Dorothy Dean, currently a Milwaukee County Supervisor, is a candidate for Lieutenant Governor in the Democrat primary. She explained that, after the primary, she and the gubernatorial candidate would run as a team or 'ticket'

She is unopposed in the primary. Dean, an economist by training, has been a Milwaukee County Supervisor for 15 years. She cited her experience as Vice Chair of the Board's Finance Committee and her role in forming mental health policy for the county among her qualifications.

When asked about her positions on human rights issues, she stated that she is involved with a coalition of groups working to fight what she termed "the radical right"

She also noted Wisconsin's traditional leadership role in rights issues and pointed to her activities in support of women's rights as well as Lesbian/Gay rights. She also said that she would support Domestic Partnership legislation and is currently discussing such within Milwaukee County.

Dean explained that she would also support an HIV waiver within the Community Options Program (COP) that would allow people with HIV and AIDS to be treated and monitored in the community, rather than being forced into nursing home situations and that she had worked to obtain funding for HIV related services in Milwaukee County. She also pointed to the Fair Housing Law adopted by Milwaukee County as one of her achieve-

This ordinance bans housing discrimination based on, among other things, sexual orientation.

Scott Evertz

The second candidate to address the group was Scott Evertz. Evertz is running for the State Assembly in the 19th Assembly District.

He said that he is running as an openly Gay and openly Republican candidate because wants to represent the district in Madison.

He stated that voices for Gay and Lesbian rights need to be heard in both parties in the

Evertz asserted that Republican control of the Legislature, which many observers see as probable after the November elections, would not mean the repeal of AB 70 and otherprotections for our community.

He pointed out that it was a Republican Governor who signed AB70 into law.

Evertz is one of three openly Gay Republicans running for state positions in the country.

Evertz said that in the Legislature he would work for the passage of legislation allowing for same sex marriage or for domestic partnership legislation. He also cited his activities with the Log Cabin Club in working with legislators and candidates to elect "decent" Republicans to office.

When asked, he defined "decent" as thosse that would support same sex marriage or domestic partnership legislation as well as increased funding for HIV related services. He also noted the need to retain protections for the confidentiality of ones HIV status.

The meeting continued with a discussion of the coalition building function of Action Wisconsin and the importance of identifying oups to work with and support the netwo

with a goal of creating regional boards to work locally on issues

There was also a discussion of a situation in Brown County where several same sex couples were denied applications for marriage licenses. There was significant news coverage of the event, which occurred just a few days before the meeting in Stevens Point.

People were asked to help in whatever way they could, specifically to contribute towards potential legal action to challenge Brown County's actions.

The recent amendments to the proposed Elementary and Secondary Education Act were also discussed. One amendment, offered by Sen. Jesse Helms (R-NC) and supported by Sen. Herb Kohl (D-WI), would prohibit federal funding to schools that present homosexuality as an acceptable lifestyle. amendment would also have prohibited referrals by schools to supportive organizations.

The second amendment, offered by Sen. Edward Kennedy (D-MA), would prohibit federal funding only to those schools where

sexual conduct is promoted.

These amendments, which clearly conflict, will be worked out in conference committee. People were encouraged to contact their Senators and Representatives to oppose the Helms amendment and support the Kennedy

Senators can be reached by dialing the Senate switchboard at (202)224-3121. The House switchboard is (202)225-3121.

Calls are also needed to support the Employment Non Discrimination Act which would prohibit discrimination in employment based on sexual orientation. Calls should be placed to the above numbers. Senators and Representatives should be asked to support and co-sponsor ENDA.

Following these action items, participants discussed Gay & Lesbian issues in the Stevens Point area of the state. It was agreed that an organization was necessary to promote the

visibility of and action in the Lesbian and Gay community.

As the meeting closed, it was announced that Action Wisconsin would be holding a full membership meeting in Madison on October 15th at 1:00pm. At this meeting, the membership will be asked to approve the by-laws of the organization and to elect an interim Board of Directors. More information on this event will be forthcoming.

cause I realize that not everybody has that kind of support system.

DV: I don't imagine that coming out to your family at 14 was an easy thing to do.

PZ: No, it wasn't. It was very hard. Again, partly because I didn't have anybody around me. I didn't have anybody who could understand me. So, I told my father, and he was great. He really had a hard time with it, and we spoke for hours. But he basically told me that I was his son and that he loved me and that nothing was going to change that. His response was the same when I told him I was HIV positive. I have to give a lot of credit to my father.

DV: You've been in San Francisco for five months now, taping the show. What was the experience like?

PZ: It was one of the most intense experiences I've ever been through. At times it was a lot of fun. At other times, it was very, very tough. But it was always very intense. Just because of the nature of everything that was going on around us. I mean, we had, at any given time, two or three cameras following us. And about 10 people. The director, the cameraman, the soundman. If it was at night, someone had to hold the lights. It was just

DV: Did MTV have access to you 24 hours a day?

PZ: Yes. Every morning, we would call the assistant producer and say, "This is what I'm doing today; this is where I'll be tomorrow, next week . . . And they basically decided who they wanted to follow. We could do whatever we wanted. Sometimes we would do things knowing they couldn't follow. We would go to a certain restaurant, and the restaurant wouldn't allow the cameras in. We would just do it anyway. None of us led our life thinking about them taping it.

DV: Did you ever wish you could say, "Leave me alone. Stop taping. I want my

PZ: The moments I was with my boyfriend. That's usually when I got that kind of

DV: What have been some of your roommates' reactions to you?

PZ: It's was very hard. Every time I tell somebody that I'm HIV positive, it's as hard as the first time. Every time, I'm running the risk of all kinds of things happening. There I was, coming into a situation where I had to tell six people. So, I was very concerned about how they would react. But they were very good. And now, I'm telling the whole nation.

DV: Was falling in love in San Francisco

the last thing you expected?

PZ: Yes, it was. When I came here, I expected to go out and date different people. I wanted to show that a person with HIV can date all kinds of different people, including people who are negative. And four days later, I went out on a date with Sean, and I've been going out with him ever since.

DV: How real is the Pedro Zamora we

see on "The Real World?" PZ: I would say he's as real as anybody can get. I am extremely honest all the time about how I speak, about those images you see. But it's very, very hard because at any one given moment, there's 10,000 thoughts going through my mind at once. Those the camera could never capture. But it's as real as

Red Ribbon Ceremony Opens Housing Facility for People Living with AIDS

(Milwaukee)- A new housing facility for homeless people living with AIDS was dedicated on August 16 at a special "red ribbon" ceremony. The nine efficiency apartment units, located at 711 W. Capitol Drive, were developed by a partnership involving Health Care for the Homeless of Milwaukee, a nonprofit agency; the Milwaukee Department of City Development (DCD); and the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development

The transitional housing facility provides apartments for homeless people who are HIV positive until they move into permanent housing or long-term medical care facilities. The amount of rent charged to residents will be based on income.

'The AIDS epidemic is a crisis in our midst, and few among us are unaffected by the death of a friend or loved one," said Karen Higgins, president of Health Care for the Homeless. "This facility is a small, but critical part in Milwaukee's response to the crisis.

The devastation of HIV and AIDS is multiplied by homelessness," said Paul Nannis, Commissioner of Health in Milwaukee. "The problems involved with being homeless, including poor nutrition, high risk of infection stress, and lack of rest, can accelerate the course of AIDS symptoms. Stable housing is an important element in the care of AIDS pa-

The City of Milwaukee is one of 10 cities nationwide that received funds through HUD's Housing Opportunities for People with AIDS grant program. Milwaukee's \$500,000 grant was used to help Health Care for the Homeless buy the building on Capitol Drive and convert the first floor from offices to nine apartments and common living space.

A portion of the funds will be used to provide support services to the residents of the building, such as case management and arranging for appropriate medical care.

Department of City Development staff oversaw the renovation of the building. "DCD has long been involved in providing decent, affordable housing to low income people," said DCD Commissioner Michael L. Morgan. "We are pleased to lend our expertise to this project, which will provide stable housing to a very vulnerable group of people.

Also supporting the project are the Helen Bader Foundation, Wisconsin Electric Power Co., the Wisconsin Housing and Economic Development Authority Foundation, Michael Lord Galleries, Milwaukee Foundation, Wisconsin Gas Co., Bedtime Super Stores, Am-Rock Corp., Chris Thompson and Ameritech, and Foley & Lardner.

The Wisconsin Division of Health projects that by 1995, more than 12,000 people in the Milwaukee area will be infected with HIV.

Insurer Decides Against Insuring Unwed Campus Couples at UW-Madison

(Madison)- An insurance company that provides medical coverage for University of Wisconsin students has rejected a request to provide special policies for young people living together as domestic partners.

Physicians Plus Insurance Corporation had agreed in May to offer the coverage to the Madison campus under the Student Health Insurance Plan, which has about 3,800 custom-

But the offer was halted because of a difference of opinion with the state about whether an insurer has to provide "continuation and conversion coverage" for unwed participants, company spokesman William Salvin said.

The provision allows people to continue on a policy 18 months after it expires. That makes it difficult to assess risk, the company

says.

"There is so little data on domestic partners," Salvin said.
"We're disappointed by this outcome," said Dean of Students Mary Rouse.

Rep. Tammy Baldwin (D-Madison), a strong advocate of domestic partner coverage, blamed political pressure for halting the offer.

"That wall was the Office of the Commissioner of Insurance," Baldwin said.

Fred Nepple, attorney for the commissioner, denied there was political pressure. "At no point did we indicate that the policy could not be offered," Nepple said.

Physicians Plus originally proposed that domestic partners have no special rights to continuation or conversion of policies. The commissioner's office said the insurer has to provide the extended coverage. The company will wait for the Legislature

to settle the question, Salvin said.

Baldwin said a change in the law could be several years away.

Profile of Neil Albrecht, Deputy Director of **Programs at MAP**

On a sultry July day, Neil Albrecht looks as fresh as crisp linen. I'm late for our interview, but he welcomes me to his office at the Milwaukee AIDS Project (MAP) with a shy, kind of boyish smile that puts me at my ease. Over coffee, we talk.

Albrecht, 31, is Deputy Director of Programs at MAP, a new position at the agency that was necessitated by its growth. He oversees quality assurance of on-going programs, helps to initiate and develop new programs within the Lifecare Services, the Prévention Services, and the Volunteer Resources Departments and the clinical research branch of the AIDS Resource Center of Wisconsin (ARCW). All this, not only at MAP, but at the other affiliated AIDS Service Agencies in Wisconsin as well.

Basically, he coordinates all these so that all are operating in harmony. It involves a lot of communication, he says, and the evaluation of services. He wants to make sure there's cohesion between the programs so that consumers may access the same services with the same quality, no matter where they go.

Consumers at the agency have frequent contact with him, Albrecht says, because quality assurance is "so much a part of my

In line with this, he travels all over the state, going from agency to agency. In addition, he attends consumer forums and other meetings to see how things are going; to see that the consumer is getting the best that can be provided.

He talks frequently with consumers to find out if their needs are being met. They share with him both the positive and the negative. He likes to hear both. "It's always great to hear something positive," he says, and adds "It's critical that I get feedback" of whatever

Albrecht, who is Milwaukee born and bred, came to MAP as a staff member in January of last year when he was hired as the Director of Volunteer Resources.

But before that, he began as many do, as a volunteer himself, this in 1990, working on the AIDS Walk of that year.

Volunteer work, he says "sort of evolved" into leaving a "very nice" corporate job to come to "a great agency.

MAP Executive Director, Doug Nelson called Albrecht's selection as Deputy Director "natural choice at a critical time for MAP."

Nelson said that, "Neil is a great leader and effective manager who brings sensitivity and passion to his work. With the huge growth in services at ARCW, Neil's leadership is essential to assure high quality services that keep pace with the AIDS epidemic."

Nelson attributed the huge increase in volunteer support at ARCW over the past two years to Albrecht's hard work and persuasiveness in urging the public to get involved with

"Neil has a marvelous presence that makes it easier for people to understand and commit to the AIDS epidemic," Nelson said. "We could not have reached the milestone of 1,000 active volunteers without his leading role. I know that he will be equally successful in directing the vital programs and services of MAP and ARCW in the tough years ahead.'

Albrecht is "out" and has been for 10 years plus, working in various capacities in the Gay community

He speaks movingly, with compassion and understanding about the LesBiGay community. He is enthusiastic about MAP's commitment to the community, the agency's AIDS Prevention Program within the community and the agency's dedication to it.

"We are under a magnifying glass by the Lesbian and Gay community," he says, adding firmly that MAP is dedicated to meeting that

His greatest satisfaction in his job, he says, is knowing that MAP does make a difference for people who are struggling. With deep compassion, he speaks of the people he has known, MAP clients, who have had their lives eased by what the agency has done. That ranges from materialistic things, to levels of support on a spiritual/psychological level.

We have impacted a lot of lives in very positive ways and that makes me feel good,'

He talks of a "buddy" he had as a volunteer of MAP. He's gone now, but Albrecht still misses him very much.

"We're a cutting-edge agency," he says. "Our services are always expanding so that people here in Milwaukee can get the same kinds of services that people in San Francisco can get. We are not behind the times.

It is time to wind this up. But there is one thing more. He praises his partner of 10 years for all the support he gives. That kind of support is as invaluable as it is warm and good.

Three Wisconsin Same-Sex Couples Denied **Marriage License Forms**

(Green Bay, WI)- Three Lesbian couples, including two Suamico women whose adoption case reached the Wisconsin Supreme Court, have been denied permission to fill out marriage license forms.

The couples were refused service at the county clerk's office on August 11 after waiting an hour, said Georgina Grinkey, who sought the license with Annette Grinkey.

Chief Deputy Clerk Jan Matzke said county clerk guidelines from the state Department of Health and Social Services prohibit licenses for same-sex marriages.

The Grinkeys said they want the right to marry because it was a key issue in the State Supreme Court's decision in June to deny Annette's adoption of Angel, Georgina's 8-yearold daughter. The couple had not applied for a marriage license before.

"The Supreme Court gave us no other way to go," Georgina said, adding that nothing in Wisconsin law prohibits same-sex marriages.

"For us, as a couple, this is an extension of our adoption effort," Georgina said. "It's very personal to us. We love our little family and we'll go to all lengths to make it secure and legal.

The court ruled that the adoption violates state law, even though it may be in the best interests of the child.

The Grinkeys have said that they will appeal the case to the U.S. Supreme Court. If the appeal fails, the couple will try to persuade the state legislature to recognize same-sex marriages.

Georgina Grinkey also said that they and their attorney, Judith Newton, would file a class action suit over the state's failure to recognize same-sex marriages.

Whistle Blowing Lesbian Nurse Loses Job at Madison Hospital; Rally/Protest Scheduled

(Madison)- On September 19, noon, a protest/rally is scheduled to be held at St. Mary's Hospital in Madison over the firing of a Lesbian nurse, allegedly for blowing the whistle on certain practices conducted there.

Stacie Neldaughter filed suit in Dane County Circuit Court in April of this year against the hospital claiming that she was wrongfully terminated from her employment as a nurse on the psychiatric ward. The firing followed, Neldaughter says, after she objected to shock treatments being performed on patients without required informed consent.

Shock treatments are performed by placing electrodes on the head and delivering an electrical charge to the brain. Wisconsin law requires that the patient be fully informed of potential side effects and have the capacity to understand such information.

Neldaughter, who worked at the hospital for five years, has said she observed numerous violations. In on instance, she said, a Gay man wanted shock treatments to help him forget about his feelings for men.

In another instance, she cited an elderly patient who signed a consent form thinking, Neldaughter said, that electric shock was an "operation for her urine."

At another time, a sexually abused woman having a sever flashback was given an electric shock and was restrained when trying to get up, Neldaughter said.

St. Mary's Hospital was contacted for this story, but had no comment.







they need new ideas. And they will get them by exploring the innermost workings of the virus and the body's complex and ultimately futile response to it.

The new head of the U.S. Office of AIDS Research said this will be the focus of the federal government's annual \$1.3 billion AIDS budget.

"The engine that will drive the entire AIDS research enterprise forward is basic research, Dr. William E. Paul told the meeting.

Paul took over the AIDS job from Dr. Fauci, who had overseen federal AIDS research while directing the National Institute of Allergy and Infectious Diseases.

Vaccine is a Top Goal

Paul also sought to assure the conference that vaccine development is still a top research goal.

"Our greatest hope for the eradication of HIV lies in the development of effective preventative vaccines," he said, calling this an "essential element" of his agency's research agenda.

Paul said that broad testing of so-called second generation vaccines will begin once there is "a reasonable degree of promise" they will work. He declined to speculate when that might be.

U.S. plans to expand testing of two experimental vaccines were canceled in June because of doubts about whether they would work. During initial testing, some volunteers became infected with the HIV virus after taking the vaccines.

Paul said other priorities include:

 Studying people with natural resistance to infection. Some prostitutes in Africa, for example, have not become infected despite repeated exposure to the virus.

Learning ways to manipulate the body's response to infection. Different forms of interferon, interleukin and other proteins may improve or weaken the body's response to the virus.

But scientists have been gathering this kind of information since the epidemic began. Two of the most talked about subjects at the conference-long-term survivors and gene therapy-build on the encyclopedic store of basic knowledge already assembled about HIV virology and immunology.

Long-Term Survivors

While almost everyone who catches HIV eventually gets sick and dies, about 5% are still perfectly healthy 12 years to 15 years after their infection. Researchers believe that if they figure out how these people's immune systems tame HIV, maybe they could turn it into a treatment for those less fortunate.

"This is obviously a hot topic," said Dr. David Ho, head of the Aaron Diamond AIDS Research Center in New York City.

His preliminary study, presented at the meeting, offers hints of unique immune system responses in people who carry HIV without harm.

Ho's study of nine men and one woman infected for between 12 and 15 years suggests powerful internal defenses that show no sign of losing their punch. Ho's patients shared no identifiable genetic similarities. They caught their infections in a variety of different ways.

All carried extremely low levels of virus in their blood streams, although the virus continued to reproduce.

Unlike most of those with lengthy HIV infections, these people do not gradually lose their CD4 cells. Instead, their CD4 levels remain normal. Some researchers believe the key to this may be another variety of blood cells called CD8 cells.

In one experiment, Ho combined HIV with CD4 cells taken from both volunteers with full-blown AIDS and from long-term survivors. The virus infected the cells and reproduced rapidly.

Then the researchers added the patients' own CD8 cells to the mix. The survivors' cells promptly stopped making virus, but not in those living with AIDS. This suggests that people who live long with the infection are blessed with CD8 cells that are powerful suppressers of HIV.

Several other factors seem to make a difference. One is having a positive attitude toward their infection, Ho told the conference.

Another is that the virus in long-term survivors seems to be "wimpy," said Ho. He indicated that perhaps it was a combination of a strong immune response, a weakened virus and a positive attitude that permitted these people to do so well.

Other researchers said their decade of basic research into HIV's origins, structure and life cycle is about to result in human experiments in gene therapy, the most exotic AIDS treatment yet. The idea is to insert HIV-killing genes into people's blood cells so they will be able to protect themselves from the virus.

No one knows whether this will produce a practical AIDS therapy. Time and again, the virus has proven to be more clever than the scientists. Its principal tactic is to evolve mutant genes that make it impervious to new drugs.

During treatment, HIV quickly becomes resistant to AZT and all the other drugs developed so far. No clearly effective new ones were introduced at the meeting. Doctors still hope that mixing the drugs together will improve their potency.

"We will combine them in as many different ways as we can imagine," said Dr. Paul Volberding of the University of California at San Francisco.

However, researchers showed little of the bravura that reigned early in the epidemic, when may were convinced victory over AIDS was inevitable.

"It has outsmarted us so far, and most of us would predict it will continue to," said Dr. Mark Wainberg of McGill University in Montreal.

For now, many believe that keeping people from catching AIDS, largely through condom use, is the only practical way to control the epidemic, which continues to spread with alarming speed.

According to the World Health Organization (WHO), about 17 million people have been infected with HIV--3 million in the last year alone. Africa is hardest hit, but the virus is starting to spread in Asia, the world's most populous continent.

Clearly AIDS will be a deadly foe for a long time. The International AIDS Society is planning more meetings like this one through the end of the century.

Condom promotion is being taken up with varying degrees of enthusiasm all over the world. Strategies for distributing them and, more importantly, getting people to use them during sex, were a frequent topic of discussion at the Conference.

WHO estimates 525 million condoms were used last year specifically to prevent AIDS and other sexually transmitted diseases. Birth control may also have been a factor in some cases, but the estimate does not count condoms used chiefly to prevent pregnancies.

Some 562 million condoms are sold in the

U.S. alone every year.

Demand will almost certainly grow as governments and private agencies persuade more people to use them, especially in Asia and Africa, where most new AIDS cases are likely to occur.

This is the way of alerting the world about the volume of condoms that will be needed in the near future," said Dr. Faustn Yao of WHO.

The study was based on estimates of the number of men and women now engaging in risky sex and the expected increase in use as a result of condom promotion. The researchers assumed, among other things, that people who need condoms for intercourse outside monogamous relationships would use 20 a year.

Their conclusion: Between 9 billion and 20 billion will be used for disease prevention between 1994 and 2004. If the higher number turns out to be correct, they will cost \$1.3 billion when purchased in bulk by distribution

Condom use, education about sexual transmission and treatment of venereal diseases are considered to be the cornerstones of AIDS prevention. Venereal disease sores make HIV much easier to catch and spread.

Thailand: Will It Cease to Exist? Among Asian countries where HIV is

(Yokohama, Japan)- Stopping AIDS will spreading most rapidly, Thailand is thought to require condoms. A lot of condoms. Perhaps have the most serious problem. Thai government officials have gone so far as to say that if The World Health Organization (WHO) the epidemic continues as it is, the Thai people will cease to exist.

However, the Thai government has mounted a serious effort to promote condom use, especially among sex workers. It's "100% Condom Program" aimed at persuading brothels, bars and clubs to require condoms, appears to be working.

Dr. Wiwat Rojanapithayakorn of the Department of Communicable Disease Control in Bangkok, said venereal disease rates among Thai sex workers has dropped from 30% to near zero since the program began in 1991. Treatment of venereal disease among men has also plunged.

However, Rojanapithayakorn said it is still too soon to know whether this change means the spread of AIDS has also slowed, as experts

Condoms and Religion

Those involved in condom distribution programs say the job is easier in parts of the world where condoms are already widely used for birth control. However, even there, people often resist them for a variety of reasons.

In Uganda, Dr. Moses Kamya of Makerere University said, myths sometimes make people reluctant to use them.

"There is a belief that a condom can disappear in the womb of a woman and have to be removed surgically," he said.

Men in all countries are often reluctant to use them because they cut down on sensation during sex. Religious beliefs can also be a

The Islamic Medical Association of Uganda ran into considerable opposition from Muslim community leaders when it proposed a condom education campaign. Dr. Y. Walkaira said they worried that the availability of condoms would encourage illicit sex.

However, he said, the religious leaders eventually agreed that "we have to accept them to save the lives of our people.'

Similar attitudes can be found among Christians, especially of the Fundamentalist kind, many of whom preach that AIDS is a "punishment from God" on those they don't

Three Million People World-Wide Now Get **Infected with HIV Annually**

(Yokohama, Japan)- A record 3 million people contracted HIV last year around the world, and a looming AIDS explosion in Asia will probably drive the toll far higher in 1994, experts told the International AIDS Conference that ended on August 11.

While the infection rate has leveled off in Western countries, the latest figures portray an epidemic that is raging out of control in much of the world, especially in Africa and Asia.

In all, World Health Organization (WHO) estimates that about 17 million people now are infected with HIV, a number that possibly will grow to 40 million in the next five years.

Sub-Saharan Africa is still the part of the world most devastated by the disease. About 10 million infected people live there. But the virus is spreading fastest in Asia, and many fear a sweeping epidemic there, one that will destabilize governments and, perhaps, even bring some peoples to the verge of extinction.

It is so urgent to act here in Asia before we get an explosion," said Dr. Michael Merson, head of WHO's AIDS Program. "We are running out of time. There is no excuse.'

WHO calculates that setting up basic AIDS prevention programs in Asia would cost between \$750 million and \$1.5 billion. These programs might prevent the millions of new infections expected by the turn of the century.

Merson said the major impediment is the unwillingness of some governments to admit that AIDS is a problem.

July Deaths From AIDS

Madison-AP- Two dozen people died from complications due to AIDS in Wisconsin in July, and there were 44 new confirmed cases of the disease, a state agency said.

Deaths in July brought the state's total to 1,358 since reporting began in 1982, the Department of Health and Social Services said on August 5th.

It compares to 1,048 deaths this time a

New confirmed cases brings the number of AIDS cases to 2,458, compared with 1,980 a year ago.

"Denial is as strong in this region (Asia) as it's been anywhere else in the world," Mer-

So far, HIV in Asia is largely confined to India, Burma and Thailand, although it has started to appear in Vietnam, Cambodia, the Philippines and Japan. In Thailand, it has moved into the general population.

According to WHO figures, 4% of young male military recruits and 1.5% of pregnant women in Thailand now carry the virus. In some parts of northern Thailand, 20% of young men are infected.

Home Access HIV Test Could Provide Vitally Needed Information

A number of French officials were recently convicted for their failure to utilize blood screening techniques and, as a consequence, infecting that nation's blood supply. They were prosecuted on a concept in French law of "failing to come to the aid of persons in danger.

A half a million HIV positive Americans are in danger and someone needs to come to their aid. The introduction of a home access HIV test offers a chance to come to the aid of those HIV positive persons who do not yet know they are in danger. Introduction of this test also could dramatically change the AIDS

A home access HIV test is not prevention. It is not treatment. It is information. And information is power when it comes to surviving AIDS. Statistics from the Centers for Disease Control and a variety of private sector organizations indicate that home testing will dramatically increase the number of people who get tested. In a short period of time, perhaps less than two years, the number of people who know they are HIV positive could double.

For them, this test gives them the chance to survive. "There is so much that can be done" has become a cliché, but it is the truth. For people intent on survival, it should be a mantra that compels them to action.

A huge number--if not a majority--of the people dying of pneumocystis carinii pneumonia (PCP) are doing so needlessly. If they knew they were positive, they could undertake inexpensive and highly effective prophylaxis and avoid getting sick. Instead, they find out they are HIV positive when they show up in an emergency room with an acute episode of

Many of us have demonstrated in the streets, and been arrested, to expedite the release of new treatments. A home access HIV test should be considered with identical urgency. More delays in bringing this test to people who need it is morally reprehensible.

A Howard University study demonstrated that 41% of African American men in the Liaison to the Milwaukee Police Department Washington, D.C. area who died of AIDS for the LesBiGay community.

were diagnosed after death. They never knew they were HIV positive. At least half a million HIV positive Americans are committing a slow suicide of ignorance because they do not know they are HIV positive.

Introduction of home access testing raises issues: the impact on AIDS service organizations and advocacy efforts; its availability to individuals unable to afford the \$30 fee; and potential abuses of the test. But these are not reasons to let those ignorant of their HIV positive status to remain so.

I do not view HIV as a death sentence. I do not believe HIV automatically causes AIDS. And I am not sure if the relationship between HIV and AIDS is more coincidental

But I am certain that if I had not found out I was positive by getting tested, I would have found out by getting sick.

Regardless of which treatment options one chooses--herbal, homeopathic, spiritual, pharmaceutical--knowing one is at-risk for illness is the first step.

Ignorance is not bliss. It is idiotic.

Gay Teens Know About AIDS Risk But Spurn Safer Sex Studies Say

Gay college student, has little idea whether his Gay friends practice safer sex. And he can't imagine anyone bringing it up for a group dis-

Many Gay and Bisexual teens ignore the risk of catching HIV and fail to protect themselves from it, even though they are knowledgeable about how the disease is spread, two new studies indicate.

One of the most infrequently discussed areas of Gay life is often safer sex practices, said Steward of Fairfax County, Virginia, who will be a sophomore this Fall at Columbia University in New York.

Steward said Gay teens have heard plenty of clinical discussions about safer sexual practices, such as using condoms. But such discussions may seem irrelevant in situations where a teen is looking for emotional release, intimacy, love and sexual expression, he said.

"On a logical level, it (safer sex) makes perfect sense. But when you're talking about love, and you have sex intertwined with that, logic doesn't always come first," he said in a telephone interview on August 8.

His observations on the East Coast are mirrored in studies from the Midwest and California.

A survey from Minnesota released on August 8, 1994, shows that Gay and Bisexual teens there were knowledgeable about HIV, but 63% were at "extreme risk" of having been exposed to HIV infection because they'd had unsafe sex or shared needles to use injection drugs.

"The United States cannot afford to be complacent about AIDS prevention for this population of Gay and Bisexual teens," said the survey's author, Dr. Gary Remafedi, director of Youth and AIDS Projects at the University of Minnesota.

His survey of teens and young adults ages 13 to 21 from urban and rural areas was published in the August issue of Pediatrics.
