#### Researchers May Have Found the Way HIV Turns Into AIDS

(Philadelphia, PA)- The discovery of a protein that may trigger the AIDS virus into developing into the fatal disease may lead to new treatments, researchers said.

But a leading AIDS expert warned against giving false hope to people who are HIV-positive.

HIV-infected people can be healthy and live for years before the virus begins reproducing and attacks the body's immune system.

University of Pennsylvania scientists now say that they have found a protein in a gene, unique to HIV carriers, that appears to tell infected cells when to start reproducing the virus. Their research was published in early November in the Proceedings of the National Academy of Sciences.

"We understand a new pathway the virus uses," said study chief David Weiner, an assistant professor of pathology and medicine at Penn. "We now have an opportunity to design drugs to inhibit it

Dr. Nava Sarver, one of the chief scientists in the AIDS division of the National Institutes of Health cautioned that the study, while interesting, is very preliminary. Usually, studies such as Weiner's that are conducted in the laboratory do not hold up when tested in bodies, she

"Many questions need to be asked to confirm these findings," Sarver said. "I feel it is not right to give hope to patients who are desperate for any type of therapy.

But Dr. Alfred Saah, an associate professor in the School of Public Health at Johns Hopkins University, said, "It's a hopeful sign and I think it's worthy of pursuit and if it pans out, it will be quite an advance.

The study centered on one of nine known HIV genes, "vpr." The gene produces a protein, known by the capitalized abbreviation "Vpr," that apparently must be present before infected cells can produce new, infected viral particles that in turn infect other cells., Weiner

Scientists need to know how the virus multiplies before they can design drugs to inhibit it, Weiner said.


Weiner's research team found in laboratory tests that the stage of infected people's disease corresponds with the level of Vpr protein in

People in the early stages of infection had low levels of the protein; those with fully developed AIDS had high levels.

By exposing cells to the protein in the laboratory, the researchers turned latent infection into active infection.

Weiner's team also found that it could block the production of new virus by exposing the cells to Vpr antibodies. Weiner said his team is now trying to develop a vaccine that would create Vpr antibodies.

#### December 1 is World AIDS Day

(Madison)- Wisconsin's Governor Tommy Thompson has issued a proclamation declaring November 28 through December 4, AIDS Awareness Week in the state and December 1 as World AIDS Day.

The theme for the 7th Annual observance of World AIDS Day is "AIDS and Families: Protect and Care for the Ones We Love.

Dr. Micahel H. Merson, Executive Director of the World Health Organization's Global Program on AIDS, stated that "If we all do our utmost within our families of choice-whether they are the people who share our home or those who share our planet--we shall help immeasurably to defeat AIDS in every

More than 189 countries, including the U.S., will observe World AIDS Day as a way to

draw public attention to the AIDS pandemic.

Locally, World AIDS Day will provide a unique opportunity for groups and organizations to sponsor activities. Memorial and memory observances are being conducted in communities throughout the state

Communities in southwestern Wisconsin will sponsor lectures, staff information tables and distribute red ribbons. An interfaith vigil, "Naming Our Family, Healing Our Wounds," will be held on the eve of World AIDS Day in Madison, while several local art institutions will be observing a "Day Without Art."

For those unable to attend such observances, it is being asked by AIDS activists around the country that you put one blue light in your

(Washington, D.C.)- Nationwide, 60 percent of candidates aligned with or supported by Religious Right political groups were victorious in November 8th's elections. This, according to a report issued on November 11 by People For The American Way, a nonpartisan organization fighting for progressive

The percentage of wins gives the Religious Right access to all levels of government and increases their power dramatically, the report says.

"Religious Right leaders provided the core support for officials taking seats in Congress, state capitols, school boards and other local offices around the country," said Arthur J. Kropp, President of People For.

Now it's payback time as more politicians than ever owe their jobs to the organizing and financial sup-port supplied by Religious Right groups," Kropp said. "That support came with a price. Anyone familiar with the movement knows that its leaders will not be content to be background music. Their expectation is that the Right-Wing agenda will receive top priority in the next two years.

People For's state-by-state report includes nearly 600 candidates for national, state and local offices.

In Wisconsin, Mark Neumann who won election to Congress in the 1st District is identified in the report as being "tied to the Christian Coa-He received support from the ultra-right Eagle Forum.

Toby Roth (R-8th District) was featured as a "political friend" in a Christian Coalition promo video.

In the State Legislature, the report lists Scott Walker (R-14th Assembly District) and Sheryl Albers (R-50 Assembly District) as being supported by and supporting the Christian Coalition.

"The Religious Right's election day victories reflect several years of hard work on their part at the grassroots," said Kropp. "Their investment in organizing has paid off. Now it's time for the rest of us to play the game. In other words, the time for complaining is over. Opponents of the Right have to organize and take part in the tough job of door-to-door campaigning while making the case for an alternative vision for America.

But, as the People For report notes, the Religious Right didn't win everything.

Notable among their defeats were the downing of the anti-Gay initiatives in Oregon

"The Oregon Citizens Alliance has twice tried to convince the people of Oregon that discrimination should be enshrined in law said Kropp. "Oregon voters have twice said no. This year Idaho voters also rejected institutionalized discrimination.

'Religious Right leaders and their allies in Congress should get the message--confirmed in every poll-that most Americans are opposed to discrimination based on sexual orientation. Kropp said

#### **New Brain Study Gives Evidence that Biology Influences Sexual Orientation**

(New York)- A study of brains in Gay and heterosexual men gives new evidence that biology may help determine a person's sexual orientation, researchers say.

Scientists found an anatomical difference between the two groups. In Gay men, a communication conduit connecting two parts of the brain was thicker on average than in heterosexual men.

The parts of the brain connected by the conduit are used for understanding spoken language and perceiving objects.

The finding suggests that sexual orientation may be part of a larger package of brain characteristics, so that Gay men as a group may have a different pattern of mental skills than straight men, said researcher Sandra Witelson.

Witelson is a professor of psychiatry at

McMaster University in Hamilton, Ontario. She discussed the work before presenting it on November 17 in Miami Beach, Florida, at the annual meeting of the Society for Neurosci-

Studies in 1991 and 1992 reported size differences elsewhere in the brain that were related to sexual orientation.

"Witelson's study is an important addition to the growing body of evidence indicating a biological basis for homosexuality," said Peri Jude Radecic, Executive Director of the National Gay and Lesbian Task Force (NGLTF). "And it shows that homosexuality is a naturally occurring and common variation among humans--a fact that Gay and Lesbian people

#### Post-Election Poll Finds GOP, Democrats and Independents Support Equal Rights

(Washington, D.C.)- An election-night poll of people who voted in the 1994 midterm elections showed that voters who changed the face of Congress continue to support ending discrimination against Lesbian and Gay

In the first-ever post-election poll that measured voter attitudes toward Gay people, majorities of Republican, Democratic and Independent voters supported equal rights for Lesbian and Gay people, who face widespread and legal discrimination with no protection from federal law

Voters also strongly supported increased efforts against HIV/AIDS and expressed worry about a "religious right wing agenda."

The poll, conducted November 8 and 9 by the independent firm of Mellman Lazarus Lake, Inc., surveyed a random sample of 800 people who had voted in the midterm election. The margin of error is +/- 3.5%.

Among the findings:

70% of those surveyed said Gay people should not face unfair job discrimination, but rather have "equal rights in hiring and firing"--with 77% of Democrats, 71% of Independents and 64% of Republicans supporting the

57% supported the Employment Non-Discrimination Act that would "extend current civil rights laws in the workplace to cover Gays and Lesbians"

78% favored "increasing efforts for AIDS research, prevention and care";

#### Angelou Postpones Speech After Phelps Encounter

(Emporia, KS)- Poet Maya Angelou postponed a sold-out speech at Emporia State University on November 14, in reaction to a weekend encounter with anti-Gay extremist, Rev. Fred Phelps in Topeka. Angelou was visibly shaken by Phelps and fellow picketers near the entrance to the Topeka Performing Arts Center. Phelps and a small group of his family showed up, they said, to protest the poet's support for Lesbians and Gay men. He also said he was protesting Angelou's reading of poetry at President Clinton's inaugural, calling Angelou a part of the "left-wing liberal fringe.

A spokeswoman for Angelou said she was shaken by the virulence of such hate and would need time to process what she'd seen. She will return to Emporia University for the Spring semester.

#### Co-Op Settlement Sends Powerful Signal to Gays

New York, NY-AP- Harry Kirkpatrick died last year, but a legal settlement allowing him to posthumously inherit his lover's apartment carries a strong message about the civil rights of Gays, officials said. In the agreement, the late 56-year-old investor, who was Gay, was granted possession of a studio apartment on upscale Sutton Place on Manhattan's East Side. He had shared the home with Martin Weiner, who died in 1989. Since Kirkpatrick died last year, the settlement will benefit his lover, Marc Tosca, who received rights to the apartment. Human Rights Commission officials and the Lambda Legal Defense and Education Fund said that the decision reinforced the city's anti-discrimination law against Lesbians and Gay men.

Arthur Weinstein, a lawyer and vice president of the Co-op's Council, said the is drafting an article for the council's quarterly publication, advising members of the settlement and recommending that they treat Gay life partners in the same way they treat straight married couples.

#### Officials to Release Data on AIDS on Internet

Tokyo-AP- Top patent officials from Japan, the U.S. and Europe have agreed to release information on AIDS-related patents on the Internet. The agreement came at an annual meeting of top patent officials. The officials also agreed to cooperate in implementing a treaty to protect intellectual property rights reached last year.

A Japanese patent official, briefing reporters on condition of anonymity, said the U.S. Patent Office has already begun releasing information on patents for AIDS-treatment products through the Internet. He said it would probably take six months for AIDS data from Japanese patent files to be translated and released.

#### **New AIDS Figures Show Epidemic is Slowing**

Atlanta-AP- The AIDS epidemic is growing at a slower pace, though a revised definition of the illness initially caused a huge jump in the number of new cases being reported, federal health officials have said. The Centers for Disease Control (CDC) said that 105,990 AIDS cases were reported in the U.S. in 1993, more than double the 49,016 reported in 1992. But the expanded definition "dumped into the system" many people who did not truly qualify as new cases, said Dr. John Ward, chief of the Atlanta-based CDC's AIDS surveillance branch. The old definition diagnosed HIV patients with AIDS when they got any of 23 indicator diseases. The new definition lists three additional diseases: tuberculosis, recurrent pneumonia and invasive cervical cancer.

The CDC now says there were 61,800 AIDS cases diagnosed last year, up 3% from 60,000 in 1992. In 1992, diagnosed cases were counted separately from reported cases.

"The epidemic continued to grow in 1993, but not at the extent that has been observed in ear-

lier years," Ward said.

#### Police Arrest Three Teens in Hate Crime Probe

New Orleans-AP- Three teens have been arrested for allegedly harassing and making threatening phone calls to students living on campus at the University of New Orleans, police said. The phone conversations included threats of violence against persons thought to be Gay, Sgt. Barry Fletcher said. The two youths, aged 15 and 16, were booked with making obscene calls. "These types of crimes leave permanent scarring on persons within our community," Fletcher said. "Even those who are not direct targets suffer from these incidents."

#### Gays and Lesbians Still Don't Feel Safe in Oregon

Portland, OR-AP- Supporters of a failed statewide anti-Gay measure were mostly middle-income people who did not attend college, according to exit poll data. Supporters also tended to be Republicans who felt that Sen. Bob Packwood did nothing wrong in harassing women and to be members of the Religious Right. The exit poll was based on 1,000 interviews.

Francis Drake, an openly Gay man, said that while the anti-Gay measure was defeated, "that still doesn't mean there are not going to be kooks such as skinheads who will take it upon them-

selves to try and make your life as miserable as theirs is."

"I think there will probably be a temporary swell of feeling that we were supported by the electorate," said Kathy Burkey, chair of the Josephine County Human Rights Alliance. "Then the reality will hit. Lon Mabon and the Christians say they will be back. When you live in a community with a 60-40 kind of split, you know the majority of your neighbors have a strong feeling about you. They got to vote on who I am and on my rights as a human being. We don't vote on Black rights. We don't vote on Jewish rights. With Gays and Lesbians, it's different."

#### Shoney's Business Down Since Lesbians Bought It

Laurel, MS-AP- Business isn't that great at the Shoney's Restaurant in Laurel since a rumor surfaced that it had been sold to members of the Ovett Lesbian retreat, Camp Sister Spirit, restaurant officials said. Shoney's manager, Terry Breland, said even though the restaurant has not been sold, there has been a "substantial" drop in customers over the past two months. Residents at Camp Sister Spirit said that not only hadn't they bought the restaurant, they had never eaten

#### Johnson & Johnson Accused of Illegally Pushing **Home AIDS Test**

Washington, D.C.-AP- AIDS activists content that Johnson & Johnson is illegally promoting its experimental home test for the HIV virus in an attempt to influence government approval of the kit. Three AIDS organizations are asking the Food and Drug Administration (FDA) to postpone action on Johnson & Johnson's Confide AIDS test pending an investigation of the promotions. The move drew furious reaction from a home test proponent. "People are dying now because of these idiotic concerns," said Sean Strub, publisher of the AIDS magazine, POZ.

AIDS activists charge Johnson & Johnson with intensive lobbying, touting its Confide test on TV, paying doctors to push the kit and funding direct mail campaigns to generate public sup-

White House Chief of Staff, Leon Panetta, asked about the test at the request of Rep. Newt Gingrich (R-GA), who quoted Johnson & Johnson's paid consultant--former Surgeon General C. Everett Koop--in pushing home tests. Johnson & Johnson have denied any illegal promotions, but would not comment specifically on the charges. But Strub said he personally funded some of the direct mail campaigns attributed to Johnson & Johnson, and his company-funded work was vital to generate public debate about home tests.

#### Paramount Extends Benefits to Domestic Partners

Los Angeles-AP- Paramount Pictures have said that it will extend medical and dental benefits to same-sex partners of company employees, beginning on January 1, 1995. The decision places Paramount among a growing number of entertainment companies that offer such benefits to Gay and Lesbian employees. Paramount was acquired this year by Viacom Inc., parent company of MTV, Nickelodeon and Showtime networks. Viacom already had a policy offering benefits to same-sex partners.

Universal was the first studio to extend health coverage to same-sex partners of employees, followed by Warner Bros., and just two months ago, Sony Pictures which includes Columbia and Tristar. Fox and Disney are expected to follow suit shortly.

#### Lawsuit Challenges Legality of Commission

Honolulu-AP- The rules governing the formation of a state commission to decide what-if any-benefits should be extended to same-sex couples has been challenged in court. A Catholic businessman and a Protestant minister have filed a lawsuit claiming the commission violates the U.S. Constitution by discriminating against certain religious groups. "We don't believe the suit has merit and it's not going to derail the commission's important work," said Deputy Attorney General Steve Michael, adding, "these religions feel perfectly free to discriminate against others, but they don't want to feel it themselves.'

#### Pedro Zamora, Gay AIDS Activist is **Mourned by Thousands**

(Miami)- Pedro Zamora, 22, who spent the last years of his life trying to educate Congress and the public about living as a Gay man with AIDS, died on Friday, November 11, 1994, in Miami, Florida. In his passing, he was remembered by thousands.

As of press time, the AIDS Action Council of which Pedro was a member, had received over 10,000 calls offering sympathy and condolences.

At the same time, his life and passing were given coverage by all the major TV networks.

In a message issued from the White House by President and Mrs. Clinton, the President said, "In his short life, Pedro educated and enlightened our nation. He taught all of us that AIDS is a disease with a human face and one that affects every American, indeed every citizen of the world. And he taught people living with AIDS how to fight for their rights and live in dignity.

Jay Coburn, AIDS Action Council legislative representative and Pedro's long-time friend, said "In his abbreviated lifetime, Pedro did more for HIV and adolescents than anyone or any organization I know.

Doug Nelson, executive director of the Milwaukee AIDS Project (MAP) spoke movingly of having met and of working with Pedro on the AIDS Action Council.

"There was something so warm about him," Nelson said, "something magical that you don't see often in anyone. He was a genuinely decent, good, compassionate young man."

Pedro was sick, but still active in June when he filmed the closing episode of MTV's "Real World.

"That's where the real tragedy, the real mystery of the disease lies," said Doug Herzog, MTV executive vice president of programming and production in New York. "He leaves the program a seemingly healthy man. Four short months later, we're saying our good-by to him.

Pedro learned that he had the HIV virus when he was 17. Handsome, trim, dark-eyed and a gifted speaker, he went on lecture tours, telling audiences in high schools and other organizations that he was Gay and had been infected through unprotected sex.

On July 12, Pedro spoke before a Congressional hearing telling the Congressmen that "If you want to reach me as a young Gay man, especially a young Gay man of color, then you need to give me information in a language and vocabulary I can understand and relate to.

"I needed positive messages about my sexuality. I needed skills to negotiate relation-



ships. I needed to know how to say, 'I don't want to have intercourse, I just want to be held.

One of Pedro's last wishes was that the family he had left so long ago in Cuba, could be allowed to see him one more time. That wish was granted, but, in a coma, he never even knew they were there.

#### Iowa University Holds National Gay Studies Conference, a First for the Midwest

(Iowa City)- Five national Gay study conferences have been held at such institutions as Harvard, Princeton and Rutgers, but this year, the sixth gathering at the University of Iowa promises to be different, organizers say.

"What we're saying is it's going to be more diverse. We made a significant effort to diversify it around not only topics, but also in terms of race and gender. We feel it is the most diverse in terms of topics, the kinds of presenters," Rusty Barcelo, an assistant dean of the Office of the Provost and the University's liaison to the conference said.

"It's important to underscore that this event is for everyone, not just Gays," said Kevin Kopelson, an assistant Iowa English professor who helped organize the event.

The Conference, called "InQueery-InTheory-InDeed," has attracted more than 1,000 participants since it began on November 17. It runs through November 20.

"It's a new title. It's an affirmation of the term Queer, a positive affirmation as well as the need to do the theoretical kinds of work that needs to be done in the area of Lesbian-Gay studies," Barcelo said.

Barcelo said the number of Gays and Lesbians who populate the Midwest "is as reflective as it is anywhere else."

"I don't think we're any more or any less than the rest of the country. It's hard to say because you don't know who's out," she said. Some 300 academic papers and 40 workshops on Lesbian, Gay and Bisexual studies are being presented at the Iowa Memorial Union. Topics include: Lesbian and Gay art, writing, scholarship and history as well as current issues such as sexual harassment and the campus climate for Lesbians, Gays and Bisexuals.

Cultural activities are being held both on and off campus, including a film and video festival at the Union.

Performance artist Tim Miller, one of four artists who lost financing from the National Endowment for the Arts after an outcry from Jesse Helms and others of the Far Right, performed "My Queer Body" at Hancher Auditorium on November 17 and delivered the keynote address.

Another keynote speaker was Gloria Anzaldua, a Chicana theorist, activist and author "considered on the cutting edge of Chicana Feminist Lesbian theory," Barcelo said.

The conference was held at Iowa U because it was one of the first schools in the nation to have a Gay student organization. It also was one of the first to offer health insurance for same-sex couples.

"One of the reasons the East Coast and the nations, actually, was interested in hosting it at Iowa was because of our rich tradition in the area of Gay and Lesbian rights on campus," Barcelo said. "Everyone decided this was a natural place."

#### National Gay Leaders Meet In Dallas to Decide on Strategy in the Republican Era

(Dallas, TX)- Coming from all over the country just two days after national elections that changed the face of politics in America, leading Gay, Lesbian and Bisexual activists gathered in Dallas, November 11-13, to plan for a future that many of them say portends dramatic challenges for the Gay community.

More than 1000 people from 47 states, plus the District of Columbia, Puerto Rico, Bermuda and Canada arrived in the Lone Star State for the 7th Annual Creating Change conference, sponsored by the National Gay and Lesbian Task Force (NGLTF).

The Conference featured more than 80 workshops, plenaries and caucuses and attracted a virtual "who's who" of the LesBiGay community. The Conference included four Fight the Right organizing intensives, a People of Color organizing institute as well as workshops on a variety of topics ranging from bi-

sexuality to workplace organizing.

Facing the Conference participants was the news of a conservative Republican take-over of the U.S. Congress, something that hasn't happened before in the time of the modern Gay movement.

Activists feared hostile AIDS and other measures from the Senate and House and voiced concern about the prospects of passing favorable legislation. Still, conferees expressed optimism that key victories in the last elections marked a turn in public opinion on anti-Gay initiatives.

"The history of the LesBiGay civil rights movement is one of many victories and, unfortunately, many defeats," said Peri Jude Radecic, NGLTF's executive director. "The 1994 elections are no exception,"

Radecic challenged Conference attendees to strengthen rural and suburban Gay groups and redouble efforts to end discrimination based on sexual orientation. "Closing the gap between the appearance of democracy and the presence of justice will be daunting," she said.

of justice will be daunting," she said.

Speaker after speaker echoed the sentiment of conference director Sue Hyde, whose postelection rallying cry became "Don't Agonize,"

"We've got to stop moaning about Newt and Bob and the other boys" and get on with the Gay movement, said Glen Maxey, the first openly Gay elected in the State of Texas. Maxey won by 69% of the vote.

Valerie Wagner of the Black Gay and Lesbian Leadership Forum said a coalition with

other groups is essential.

"If the oppressor's foot is on my neck, my concern is not whether it's there because I'm Black or because I'm a woman or because I'm a Lesbian," she said. "My concern is to re-

move the foot from my neck.

40% were more worried about a "religious right wing agenda" than a "Gay agenda" (21%);

54% opposed efforts to exclude "homosexuals from teaching in elementary and

high schools"; and 54% opposed "eliminating from public schools and libraries any books or course materials that teach about homosexuality."

A study released prior to the election by the respected Times Mirror Center for The People & The Press reported that the most important swing voters in the electorate--representing 20% of registered voters--are "highly tolerant"

of homosexuality."

Among the general population, Times Mirror said, "We found at least one important change in public tolerance in the last four years--a sharp decline in homophobia."

#### Some Thoughts on the Death of Pedro Zamora, ACT UP and the Lesbian Avengers

When we ran an article on Pedro Zamora along with a request for contributions to his health care fund, one young man complained heartily.

Why were we doing this, he asked angrily? Pedro was not from Wisconsin. Money should stay right here at home.

And besides, Pedro was famous (hence rich), why waste sympathy on someone like that when there were so many others, the vast majority of them unknown, who never get noticed at all.

The view is short-sighted, but understandable. Why indeed care about someone who is not from here and who few of us have ever

First of all, Pedro was not rich. You don't live very well on MTV's \$1,000 a month. But that's almost beside the point.

What is the case is that throughout history, people have needed symbols to embody what is too vast, too wonderful--or too terrible, as with AIDS, for us to understand.

There is also the fact too that people have always been powerfully drawn to the idea of a beautiful youth of either gender offering themselves up, standing in our place as it were, for some high and noble cause. That's been true, at least since Roman times.

For many, from the President on down, Pedro was that. He was the handsome young man who spent his waning strength to tell an AIDSphobic Congress and the world around him what they did not and do not want to hear. In many ways, he was a one-man ACT UP, flying in the face of popular opinion to say what needs said--and, hopefully, save some lives.

But Pedro took one step more.

He went before that Congressional committee full of glowering white men, and as a man of color, he told them he was Gay, proudly Gay, quietly, but defiantly Gay; that despite all the hatred, bigotry and o\ppression that straight society heaped on him and all of us who are like him, he felt no shame, no guilt.

The world that had fed him, that feeds us all, would not, in the end, eat him. He would go to his grave beaten, but unbowed.

In doing what he did, saying what had to be said, he shot his arrow into the dark, miasmic sky and, yes, it came down in flames, but oh, what a glorious light.

This, I think, took courage, great courage, as much courage as I see in the members of ACT UP, Queer Nation or the Lesbian Aven-

The Lesbian Avengers aren't from Wisconsin either (although one day, as I told one of them, I hope to see a chapter here). But no matter where they're from, it takes a lot of guts to go off to the most conservative parts of Idaho and fight, openly and honestly, for what

Pedro Zamora could have spent his draining health resting in the arms of his lover, taking what pleasure he could from life. He did not. Instead, he choose to speak out, to do what he

Certainly there are others like him, many others, here in Wisconsin and throughout the world, but unlike most of us. Pedro had the stage on which to stand and get noticed. He could have stayed in the wings or left the theater altogether, but he played his chosen role out to the end for the good it would do.

Pedro is dead now. His funeral is being held as I write. But, I think, he left this world victorious.

The Lesbian Avengers fought the good fight in Idaho and they too won.

Pedro's fight will continue in memory and by example.

The Lesbian Avengers, ACT UP and Queer Nation and the rest, go on to fight another day, in another place. They too shine, not only by deeds, but by example.

As one comes closer to one's personal end, it is to be hoped that they and Pedro can show us what should be done if lives are to be saved, the right prevail and evil overcome.

To those in the Gay and Lesbian community who supported my opponent, I understand. Your loyalty is admirable and an important part of the political

To my close friends and family who were always willing to listen even at my bitchiest moments, sorry and thank you.

Finally, to Barry, my partner, best friend and the most important person in my life, thanks for being there and providing stability in my life. I love you.

I've been asked by many what my political future holds for me. To be perfectly honest, I don't know at this point. I do intend to remain active in the Log Cabin Club, working with the new leaders in the Assembly to ensure our rights are protected and

I intend to continue my involvement in Action Wisconsin, having recently volunteered to serve on a subcommittee examining ways to ensure the organization is culturally diverse.

And I will continue to speak out wherever necessary and do my part to make the world just a little better place for my Lesbian sisters and Gay broth-

Thanks again for all your help.

Evertz is over, there are some aspects of that campaign about which I feel the Lesbian and Gay community has a right to know. 

#### 'Angels' to Close its **Gates Sooner than** was Expected

(New York)- With the box office registering no new strength from "final weeks" ads, Angels in America will be closing its gates on December 4--six weeks earlier than had been previously announced--bringing to an end the Broadway run of one of the most acclaimed plays of recent years and the most expensive non-musical production in the history of the Great White Way.

The announcement didn't surprise anyone paying close attention to the show's receipts, which had fallen in recent weeks to the \$150,000 mark--\$40,000 shy of its break-

"We couldn't sustain the loss," said Paul Libin, producing director of Jujamcyn Theaters, which co-produced the play at its Walter Kerr Theater.

The run will end up deep in the red, though a national tour and other productions may eventually provide a payoff for the pro-

After repaying the overcall, the play has so far returned 65%--\$1.4 million--of its original \$2.2 million capitalization, and may get to 70%, according to Libin.

23, 1993, and has played in repertory with Millennium. Perestroika will have played 241 performances (including 26 previews) at

"It was great marketing on both these pictures. With this lead we should finish the year ahead of last year's record," John Krier of Exhibitor Relations Co., Inc., which tracks box office performance, said. That record was \$5.2 billion in receipts.

Others say that it wasn't only great marketing which brought people in to see Vampire. It was the star power of Tom Cruise and Brad Pitt plus word of mouth. Aside from a few minor critics, the public loves it.





#### Mabel Maney's 'The Case of the Good-For-Nothing Girlfriend' is the Best One Yet

The Case of the Good-For-Nothing Girl Friend Mabel Maney Cleis, \$9.95

Nancy Clue and Cherry Aimless return for more hair-mussing Gay adventure and their toughest and best case yet in Mabel Maney's second full-length girl sleuth parody, The Case of the Good-For-Nothing Girlfriend.

Like Maney's wildly popular and best-selling The Case of the Not-So-Nice Nurse, this hilarious new Nancy Clue mystery is for everyone who knew all along that Nancy and her chums had secrets of their own...Lesbian

The story begins in San Francisco where the merry entourage has just foiled the deliciously wicked Father Helms and solved the dark mystery of the disappearing nuns. But their celebrations are cut short by news of the arrest of the Clues' wonderful, most faithful, hardworking housekeeper, Hannah Gruel, who has been accused of murdering Nancy's father, the famous attorney Carson Clue.

With the faithful Hannah's trial looming in the background, the girls rush off to the Clues' historic homestead, River Depths, Illinois, to search for evidence that poor, long-suffering

Hannah didn't do it after all.

But America's shining highways prove to be an obstacle course, filled with devious jewel thieves, flat tires and sexy female mechanics. Naturally, the girls are never too hurried for exciting social events, nutritious meals or proper accessorizing. When it comes to the really important things in life, dear old Hannah can wait.

The gang's real challenges begin in River Depths, where small town adversaries and romantic troubles conspire to thwart all plans of quick exoneration--or sensual bliss.

Though no amount of misfortune can deflate

the spirits of the bubbly and resourceful Nurse Aimless, even the indefatigable Cherry finds this case exhausting and perhaps even unhealthy. "Thinking can be very wearisome," she says, adding, "Several times a day, for as long as you can, try to think of nothing at all.

It works wonders!"

As with Maney's first novel, in The Case of the Good-For-Nothing Girlfriend, she delights us with a tongue-in-cheek hilarity that's simultaneously fun, nostalgic and completely contemporary. Maney flawlessly, in my opinion, lampoons the torpid style of children's books and Lesbian mysteries where nothing happens at all without at least three changes of clothing and a good hot meal.

To put it another way, Maney skewers white-bread suburban 1950s girl, Lesbian romance fiction, coming out stories and detective novels. Her style is a wonderfully funny parody of the original Nancy Drew and Cherry

Maney's affection for detective novels has been brewing since she was young. "Because so little was communicated about Gay and Lesbian lives when I was a kid, I was constantly forced to play the sleuth.'

Her graduate thesis on girl detective characters and her long-time appreciation for the genre have given her a very strong background for her own fiction as well as an unerring fashion sense.

'Never mix stripes with plaids," she says. Maney is living testimony to the fact that a girl can do anything using only her wits and the contents of her purse.

#### For Those Long Winter Nights, Here's the Very Latest in Gay and Lesbian Fiction

**Gay Fiction** 

This late Autumn finds a surprisingly wide range of new Gay fiction from which to choose, ranging from cross-generational epics like Paul Russell's Sea of Tranquillity, Alan Hollinghurst's dark and mesmerizing erotic thriller, The Folding Star, to Eric Shaw Quinn's "Uncle Mame" of the '90s, Say Un-cle. Truly, this Fall, there is something for everyone.

Perhaps the most eagerly awaited Gay fiction title this Fall is from Alan Hollinghurst, best known for Swimming Pool Library. In The Folding Star (Knopf, HC \$24.00), Hollinghurst again focuses on sexual obsession, as Edward Manners, 33, and disaffected, finds himself impossibly drawn to a beautiful young male student to whom he is teaching the Eng-

Melancholy and loneliness are also characteristics of Joseph Olshan's mesmerizing Nightswimmer (Simon & Schuster, HC \$20.00). Olshan's protagonist, Will Kaplan, had fallen deeply and permanently in love with Sean Paris. Then, one night, Sean disappeared during a night swim in the Pacific. Now, two years later, Will must confront Sean's ghost-and his own.

In Mark Merlis' American Studies (Houghton Mifflin, HC \$21.95), the lives of Gay men before Stonewall are explored. Following a beating at the hands of a hustler, Reeve finds himself reflecting on the curious mix of richness and emptiness in the wake of the suicide of his teacher and friend. Tom

In a surprisingly bittersweet and compassionate examination of the failed American dream is Paul Russell's Sea of Tranquillity (Dutton, HC \$21.95). All-American hero astronaut, Allen Cloud, must confront a less than picture-perfect life, including Gay son Jona-

Despite appearances to the contrary, some of this Fall's new Gay fiction is actually humorous and lighthearted. A perfect case in point is Christian McLauglin's hot new novel, Glamourpuss (Dutton, HC \$19.95). This Gay farce features the soap opera-like life of Gay soap star Alex Young. Filled with outrageous situations, romance, unrequited love and a nice dash of eroticism, Glamourpuss is a must

Eric Shaw Quinn's Say Uncle (Dutton, HC \$20.95) is an "Uncle Mame" for the 1990's. As in the Patrick Dennis original, Quinn's outrageous, irresponsible hero, Michael Reily, finds himself the guardian of a very straightlaced nephew.

Another delightful, lighthearted read is Grant Michael's latest Stan Kraychik mystery, Mask for a Diva (St. Martin's Press, HC \$20.95). Here, Stan seeks out a murderer in the midst of an opera opening.

In addition to these new Gay fiction releases, there are a couple of notable paperback releases, including The Penguin Book of Gay Short Stories (Penguin, Pb \$13.95), Men on Men 5, edited by David Bergman (Plume, Pb \$11.95) and Dead on Your Feet by Grant Michaels (St. Martin's Press, Pb \$8.95)

Lesbian Fiction Finally, after many announcements, followed again and again by postponements, Jean Stewart's most eagerly awaited continuation of her wildly popular Isis series, Warriors of Isis (Rising Tide Press, Pb \$10.99) has at last arrived. In Warriors of Isis, Stewart again weaves a rich tapestry of an all-woman, 21st

Century society.

ticello (Bantam, HC \$19.95). In her third collaboration with Sneaky Pie Brown, Rita Mae's feline heroine, Mrs. Murphy seeks the solution to a 200-year-old murder.

Two popular Naiad writers have brought out new novels this Fall. In Triple Exposure (Naiad, Pb \$9.95), Jackie Calhoun again explores love and family issues set, as before, against a small Wisconsin town.

Following the success of Car Pool and Paperback Romance, Karin Kallmaker has created a touching love story set during a mountain snow storm over a Thanksgiving weekend in Painted Moon (Naiad, Pb \$9.95). Also from Naiad, is the third entry in their successful short story series of anthologies. The Mysterious Naiad (Naiad, Pb \$14.95).

Nisa Donnelly's Bar Stories has been a sta-

ple title in most Lesbian fiction collections. After a long absence, Donnelly returns this Fall with **The Love Songs of Phoenix Bay** (St. Martin's Press, HC \$21.95). This compelling novel features the love affair between Phoenix and the sister of her best friend, Ronnie, a Gay man fighting AIDS.

A change of pace for Lesbian fiction is a new name to the scene, Lorrie Sprecher. In her first novel, Sister Safety Pin (Firebrand, Pb \$9.95), Sprecher has created a marvelously outrageous punk Lesbian novel that captures the in-your-face attitude of the 1980's punk scene. From macrobiotics to food coloring, self-affirmation to activism, brown to blue hair, Sprecher's heroine, Melody, zeros in on an outlaw identity that she can call her own.

Also new in paperback are: Denise Ohip's lusty Western, End of the Empire (St. Martin's Press, Pb \$8.95); Margaret Reynold's mammoth collection, The Penguin Book of Lesbian Short Stories (Penguin, Pb \$13.95); Randye Lordon's Brotherly Love (St. Martin's Press, Pb \$9.95); and Michelle Cliff's eloquent and ambitious Free Enterprise (Plume, Pb \$9.95).

Of Gay and Lesbian Appeal
A positive trend in Gay and Lesbian publishing has been the increased numbers of titles of equal interest to both genders. Of special note in this regard is Sister and Brother: Lesbians and Gay Men Write About Their Lives Together, edited by Joan Nestle and the late John Preston (Harper San Francisco, HC \$22.00). Following a format that Preston used successfully in Hometowns and A Member of the Family, Sister and Brother features noted Gay and Lesbian writers exploring the bonds that hold these two diverse communities together. A highly recommended title.

Equally recommended is one from Michael Goff and the Out Magazine staff is Out in America (Viking Studio, HC \$34.95). Subtitled, "A Portrait of Gay and Lesbian Life," Out in America takes an impressive crosssection of the Gay community and shows it at work and at play, at home and on the job. It is the perfect book for anyone's coffee table.

Not surprising in a year that featured the 25th Anniversary of the Stonewall Riots, is the arrival of several outstanding picture books celebrating Gay and Lesbian Pride.

In Long Road to Freedom (St. Martin's Press, HC \$40.00), editor Mark Thompson has documented the post-Stonewall years with pictures and articles culled from the Advocate.

In Uncommon Heroes (Fletcher Press, Pb \$25.00), editor Philip Sherman has sought out those Gay and Lesbian individuals who have made a lasting contribution to both the Gay community as well as to society at large.

Nancy Andrews has created a moving and loving portrait of Gay and Lesbian America in Family (Harper San Francisco, Pb \$25,00).

In Gay Pride: Photographs from Stonewall to Today, Fred and Timothy McDarrah have produced an impressive chronicle of the various stages in Gay liberation in the past 25


As per usual, there are new coffee table books featuring artistic images of male nudes. Foremost among this special category is Rod & Bob by Tom Bianchi (St. Martin's Press, HC \$60.00).

Rod and Bob Jackson-Paris have turned their relationship into a national spectacle. If you want a beautifully photographed book made up entirely of pictures of the two of them naked in various settings, this is the book for you.

On a slightly smaller scale is Embracing Men by Klaus Gerhart (Pohlmann Press, Pb \$30.00). Although perhaps not as widely known as the Jackson-Paris duo, Gerhart's romantic images of the male nude have been gracing greeting cards for some of the leading Gay companies for quite some time.

Two books of particular interest to Lesbian readers this Autumn include Boze Hadleigh's gossipy and fascinating Hollywood Lesbians (Barricade Books, HC \$21.95), which features exposes of such personalities as Barbara Stanwyck, Agnes Moorehead and filmmaker Dorothy Arzner.

Also of special note is Renate Stendhal's engrossing Gertrude Stein: In Words and Pictures (Algonquin Books, Pb \$19.95). With over 360 photographs, Stendhal captures the essence of Stein through her own words and in pictures, taken with some of the 20th Century's most notable figures.



#### 'Mask for a Diva' is a Pleasant Mix of Murder, Mix-ups and General Mayhem

Grant Michaels has been gaining increasing numbers of friends with each new Stan Kraychik mystery and none should be disappointed with his latest, Mask for a Diva.

For the uninitiated, Stan Kraychik is a sharp-tongued, Gay, Boston hairdresser who gave up on a successful career in psychology to "shrink 'em at the sink." In his debut appearance in A Body to Dye For, Stan turned detective to clear his name when he was impli-cated in the killing of a vacationing National Park ranger.

Bolstered by his loyal friend and boss at Snips Salon, Nicole, and his ever irrepressible cat, Sugar Baby, Stan has been solving murders ever since, invariably tangling with the hunky Lieutenant Vito Branco.

In Mask for a Diva, Stan finds himself engaged for the Summer in Abigail-by-the-Sea as the assistant to the Wig Master for the inaugural season of the New England Summer Opera

Lonely for his absent lover, Rafik, and never one to mind his own business when others are around, Stan finds himself as a house guest of the Opera Festival's patroness, Daphne Davenport, and smack dab in the middle of things as Verde's Un Ballo in Maschera lurches its way toward opening night.

When an accidental death begins to look less and less accidental to Stan, he begins to ask questions. When another, even more ghastly death occurs, the entire festival is threatened.

Stan finds himself enlisted with his sometime cohort, but more often nemesis, Lt. Branco, a man with a surprising knowledge of and love for the opera.

Although Michaels writes an engaging and capable mystery, the real joy of his books comes in the portrayal of Stan's on-again-offagain romances and the fascinating sexual tension that Michaels has developed between Stan and the macho, super straight-acting Lt.

In addition, Michaels has increasingly placed special attention on atmospheric detail. In Dead on Your Feet, for example, Michaels featured a delightful expose of the world of professional ballet.

The treacherous, melodramatically overheated world of opera is convincingly and entertainingly portrayed in his latest book.

In the ever emerging world of Gay mysteries, Grant Michaels' Stan Kraychik series is refreshing, a pleasant mix of murder, mix-ups and mayhem. That the one-liners cloud the air to a far greater degree than do bullets is more than off-set by Michaels' engaging, quirky casts of suspects and plot twists. The book is perfect for those long nights ahead.

#### Steven Saylor's Novels of Ancient Rome are Reminiscent of Mary Renault

Roman Blood Arms of Nemesis Catalina's Riddle David Saylor Maridian, \$9.95

There are three books published to date in Steven Saylor's "Roma Sub Rosa" series: Roman Blood, Arms of Nemesis, and Catalina's Riddle. All make absorbing reading. All are somewhat reminiscent of one of my favorite authors, Mary Renault.

Like Renault, Saylor's -- a.k.a. Aaron Travis--historical fiction is set in ancient times, deals with epic events and addresses humanity's ba-

sic instincts.

Unlike Renault (generally), Saylor's main characters are not the movers and shakers of their times. His characters are the little people, the ones uniquely positioned to operate on the

fringes of the lordly and prominent set and report on their doings, both good and evil.

What sets the "Sub Rosa Series" apart from Renault as well, is the fact that there are detective novels. Like my other favorites of the genre, they not only present and solve a knotty mystery, but they give us glimpses into another world and time.

As Agatha Christy introduced us to the British aristocracy and Tony Hillerman took us into the world of the modern Navajo, Saylor's books give us entree into the lives of noble Romans as they were in the last days of the Republic. Then, all was upheaval as a new social order with new values was about to burst upon the scene.

The protagonist of all three novels is Gordianus, "The Finder." His work brings him into contact with Sulla, Cicero, Crassus, Caesar and other giants of that time.

But besides the patricians, we also meet the

plebes, the dwellers of the Subura, the area in the valleys between the seven hills. These are the hangers-on, the beggars, the slaves and the impoverished free citizens who then and later made up the vast majority of Rome's popula-

What was life like on the cobbled streets of Rome? Saylor shows us, not with dry description, but by weaving the data into the action. By this means we see both the insulae (apartment buildings) as well as the imposing villas and the residences on the Palatine.

Saylor tells us about the baths and how they worked. He takes us to sea, into the belly of a trireme and makes us feel what it was like to be a galley slave. He shows us the lines of na-ked slaves trudging along the Empire's fabled

Sex is not the dominant theme here, but it is always present, smoldering under the surface like lava waiting to erupt. Saylor makes it plain that, despite the death penalty for its violation, many Vestal Virgins willingly took

He shows us too that homosexuality was as much a part of everyday life as were sleeping and eating. After all, was it not said of Great Caesar that he was "the husband of half the women in Rome and the wife of all the men?"

Whatever might be said of Caesar or Cicero. who, according to one ancient author, "dotted on young men with flaming thighs," Saylor's Gordianus is emphatically heterosexual-although he does have a penchant for adopting street boys and male slaves. Saylor handles these relationships with beauty and delicacy.

Saylor is a prolific writer. Besides his Roman detective novels, he writes science fiction and some of the best Gay work around under the nom de plume of Aaron Travis, which should be familiar to many readers.

It really is surprising to me that a writer of such hot fiction as Beast of Burden, can also turn out such sophisticated works as he has in the Sub Rosa Series.

#### 'Two Teenagers In Twenty' is a Must Read for Adults as Well as Gay Teens

Two Teenagers In Twenty Ann Heron Alyson, \$9.95

In Two Teenagers In Twenty, as she did twelve years ago, Ann Heron collects writings by Queer youth. She combines these new stories with selections from her earlier book, One Teenager In Ten.

In those twelve years, not much has changed, as the new entries show. While some of the teens found resources, many have not; and even those who do find support, often have to go through hell to get it.

The first essay, by Rachel Corbett of Madison, is a wonderful example of a caring mother who loves her daughter for who she is. Unfortunately, there is no place for Rachel to

go to meet other Gays and Lesbians.

She writes, "I am angry, because I find it hard to meet other Gays my age. But in a year and a half, I will be in college and there will

be more people to meet.

Michael in Georgia didn't have as easy a time of it. He was emotionally tortured by classmates and eventually ended up in a mental hospital for four months after he tried to kill himself. While his mother "is cool with it," his father refuses to acknowledge him and his stepfather remains unconvinced. change," the stepfather says.

And there's Elizabeth of Kansas, who was

tormented, not only by her classmates, but by her parents as well

She wrote, "Coming out didn't feel like a good move. In fact, it felt like the worst thing

I could have done. She finally found some Gay friends, but it wasn't enough. She ended up being hospitalized for six months and, after her release, committed suicide.

In between these stories are teens who are out and proud, teens who are closeted and waiting to get away before they come out, and teens who are just plain terrified of coming out-ever.

This book is a wonderful read for teenagers who think they are alone and need reassurance that there are tens of thousands of Queer youth across the country. Unfortunately, many of them probably won't have access to it.

Possibly more important is for every Queer adult to read this book. It reminds us of the loneliness and fear we rushed to leave behind us when we entered adult life. We can't let current and future Queer generations experience the hatred and pain that we went through and that still is so prevalent today.

Two Teenagers In Twenty is definitely a call to action. We have to find ways to protect and nurture young Gays and Lesbians. We have to find ways to save their lives. A good way to start is to read this book.



Friendship Chronicles: Letters Between a Gay and a Straight Man offers a timely and evocative look at male friendship as experienced by singer and songwriter Chris Hassett and his friend and minister Tom Owen-Towle. The book follows the men's twelve-year friendship as well as earlier aspects of their lives through a series of letters. The book is both personal and universal in its exploration of friendship, sex, love, life, death, art and

There's a certain refreshing atmosphere to the book. Perhaps this is because in an increasingly impersonal, macho and violent culture, friendship between men is no longer a luxury, but a necessity. Fostering male friendships requires all the creativity and integrity two men

The two authors have strengthened their friendship through shared activities like music, discussion groups and running. In fact, as is noted in the introduction, the book grew out of letters that were intended to document their weekly running conversations.

Just as important to their friendship has been their willingness to share their individual passions: Chris's singing, for instance, and Owen-Towle's involvement in a variety of social causes--feminism, racial justice and religious tolerance.

There is what I would call a healthy tension throughout the book between the differing sexual orientations of the two. But that one is Gay and the other straight is seen by the two men

#### **Start Your Anne Rice** Collection With a Story to be Savored

Taltos: Lives of the Mayfair Witches Knopf, \$25.00

If you've never read a novel by Anne Rice and Interview With The Vampire has caught your fancy, Lives of the Mayfair Witches is a good place to start.

Although this hefty, 467 page novel is a continuation of Rice's series is about witches and the supernatural (The Witching Hour, Lasher), the story stands on its own; a highly readable, engrossing tale that will keep readers new and old turning the pages well into the But don't rush. Rice's story should be sa-

vored, slowly

The cast of characters includes Ashlar, an ancient taltos (the result of crossbreeding of two witches who possess an extra chromosome); a 13-year-old witch named Mona and several members of a secret order called the Talamasca.

Taltos uses various locales--including New York, New Orleans, London and Scotlandand various characters, including two witches, Rowan Mayfair and Michael Curry; a gypsy named Yuri, who is part of the Talamasca; and Samuel, a dwarf.

Rice packs a lot into the novel, switching the narration back and forth among the various characters. But each chapter is self-contained, which makes the story manageable.

Central to the story is the birth of Mona's daughter, Morrigan, a taltos. Morrigan is what Granny Mayfair calls "a walking baby," springing full-grown from her mother's

Mona and her 19-year-old second cousin, Mary Jane, bring a certain amount of humor to the story, which is otherwise filled with a persistent sense of foreboding, even to its final paragraphs.

"And the dark car sped out of the multishaded gloom, leaving behind the somber corner and its regal house, the great leafy branches holding darkness like a ripe fruit beneath the violet sky, the car a projectile destined for the green heart of the world."

The end of Taltos is also an introduction to what the reader can only hope will be Rice's next installment of the story.

#### Reading Plays is One of the Great Joys of Life Where the Production is Always Perfect

Michelangelo's Models Robert Patrick Marvel, \$12.95

Reading plays is one of the great joys of life. No hassling for tickets, no quarrels about where to eat, no parking problems, and the production you imagine is always perfect.

Let me suggest Michelangelo's Models. This is a big, romantic play of the kind that is usually called "tragicomedy." One minute it's a stinging bitch-fest of jealous artists dishing each other's lives and work. The next, it's a highly serious conflict of philosophical interests, or a melodramatic love scene. Sometimes, it's a riotous mix of all three

The play is set in Rome in 1508. Michelangelo is bored and restless. He's come back to the Eternal City despite a grudge against Pope Julius II. They don't like each other, but the Pope knows Michelangelo is the greatest sculptor and painter that Italy has to offer and wants him to build him a suitable tomb that will outshine anything of which Hadrian ever

The surly, conceited Gay artist agrees to do it, not only for the money (which he needs badly), but for the fame which he hopes his work will bring.

There is no doubt about it. Michelangelo is a pain, but underneath all that vanity, the playwright, Robert Patrick, conveys the artist's loneliness and longing for his native Florence and for his patron, Lorenzo the Magnificent.

But Michelangelo is not alone. There are a lot of others who miss the Midici prince as well; transplanted Florentines like Leonardo Da Vinci, Sandro Botticelli and others, all feel lost, all feel depressed by their separation from their prince

It is the young artists living in Rome, the rising generation, who have little knowledge of Lorenzo and could care less. These are young men like Raphaelo, Prince Tomasso de Cavalieri, a hustler and model named Tondo and a displaced peasant beauty called Ignudo (Italian for "nude"). It is they who try and shake the older generation out of the past.

Michelangelo's Models is a multiple love story: Ignudo loves Michelangelo; Michelangelo loves Tomasso; Tomasso loves the wellpreserved beauty who posed for Botticelli's "The Birth of Venus," Simonetta. Raphaelo

In the meantime, all the older artists after hot young Tondo, who posed for Michelangelo's statue of "David," but who has stepped off his pedestal to become a whore.

Patrick calls the play a "fantasia," meaning a dramatic invention on historical themes. A fantasia it might be, but it's the playwright's genius to carry me back to Renaissance Rome. The plot is full of surprises, which I will leave up to you. But I will tell you the road of true love is bumpy and rewarding--and true love finally hits a very famous ceiling.

Bread Alone

Patrick's second, recently published play, is Bread Alone and takes place 486 years later. The setting is a tiny trailer home in a "redneck uranium mining town" in Montana called Mammoth Foot. The trailer belongs to Daryl, a thirty-something grade school teacher who has left behind an unhappy love affair in New York to "carry culture" to disadvantaged kids

"like pouring colored syrups on a snowcone."

Into Daryl's survival pod comes passionate young poet Gary, who ultimately tells Daryl, "I want to be in love and there's no one else here for me to be in love with.

But before Gary gets up the courage to say that, he and Daryl go through an evening of conversation about art, cooking, travel and accidents in the uranium mines. However, under every line, the two men's longing for one another pulses and throbs.

The comedy of the play lies in the way the two keep approaching the subject that's really on their minds. Finally, Gary takes charge and, with conversational devices he's learned by listening closely to his clever teacher, turns the tables and wins what he has really be after all the time. It wasn't bread alone.

These paper-bound scripts are published by a firm here in Dallas called Dialogus Press, which looks like it will become the major source for Gay-themed and Gay plays. They already have a catalogue of nearly one hundred titles by well-known authors like Patrick and many brand new ones.

There's an explosion of Gay and Lesbian playwrights in this country right now. Many of the plays are put on in places as obscure as Mammoth Foot where there is no Gay theatre

Dialogus is making a valuable contribution to making available to all of us some of the fruits of this remarkable spate of creativity.





#### 'Public Sex,' Pat Califia's New Book, Is a Romp Through Alternative Sex

Public Sex Pat Califia Cleis, \$12.95

Pat Califia has been "fuming and fussing" about censorship and the right of everyone to have whatever sex they so desire for nearly two decades. She is, by all accounts, the most lucid, the most intelligent, of all the so-called "sex radicals"--and the most plain-spoken and the most controversial as well.

Whether she's writing about Lesbian relationships, S&M and leather sex, eroticizing latex and safer sex, role-playing and gender bending, sex with youth, prostitution or sex in public. Califia's essays set the standard for the most provocative and eminently reasonable discussion of sex going.

Her book, Public Sex, is no exception to the

Public Sex collects the very best of her work, essays she's written over the years as well as new work addressing the recent developments in sexual culture. Providing both a chronicle of the sex radical movement in this country as well as the definitive positions of America's most consistent and trenchant sexual critic, Public Sex is a must read for anyone interested in sexual practices, feminism, censorship or simply the art of the political es-

Califia is, of course, a pro-sex feminist, but her engagement with sexual culture in the U.S., Canada and Great Britain--and its reciprocal relationships with economics, foreign policy, family structure and even aesthetics-carries her analysis way beyond the superficialities of "do-me feminism" and the politics of Queer liberation.

In her introduction, Califia writes, "By 'radical sex.' I do not simply mean sex which differs from the 'norm' of heterosexual, vanilla, male-dominant intercourse. People whose erotic practices are different do tend to acquire an outsider's critical perspective on marriage, the family, heterosexuality, gender roles and vanilla sex.

"But being a sex radical means being defiant as well as different. It means being aware that there is something unsatisfying and dishonest about the way sex is talked about (or hidden) in daily life. It also means questioning the way our society assigns privilege based on adherence to moral codes.

"If you believe that inequities can only be addressed through extreme social change, then you qualify as a sex radical, even if you prefer to get off in a missionary position and still believe there are only two genders."


Since the broad consequences of sexual repression in general are never far from Califia's mind, she sees sexuality where we didn't think it mattered and provides a wealth of information for concerned people addressing seemingly non-sexual issues.

Writing of the Internet regulations she ob-The U.S. government has used the pretext of looking for kiddy porn to institute a wide-ranging campaign of on-line surveillance and entrapment. "These groups include discussions of kinky sex, but they also include medical information, rock 'n roll fandom, sci-fi readers, and a bunch of other interesting conversations.

#### Interview with Tom Shaw, Author of 'That Day at the Quarry'

Tom Shaw is the author of one of the hottest new books of Gay male autobiographical fiction to come along in a long time. Titled "That Day At The Quarry," we ran a review of it in the last book review section of the paper. Shortly afterward, Shaw, a Wisconsin native, agreed to meet with us and discuss his

Wisconsin Light: You've got what looks like a best-seller on your hands. When did you start to write it?

Tom Shaw: I started writing this book (That Day At The Quarry) last Summer (1993) and it took me about two months

WL: What are you trying to say in the book?

TS: There are three themes I've tried to explore. One is understanding that initial point where your clothes are being taken off and you're standing there naked under their gaze. Then, when somebody reaches out and touches you for the first time. It really shakes you up.

The second thing is to explore the point in your captivity when you realize that it's going to be terrible and it's not going to stop. That's devastating. I really wanted to capture that on

The third thing is why, when all these terrible things are happening to you, why are you getting an erection.

It's terribly hard to describe that moment of sensual abandonment, that point of sacrifice, that moment of yielding.

WL: Describe a little of the creative proc-

TS: There really is no creative process here because this is a reminiscence. These are things that actually happened. I just sat downone day and decided I wanted to put this story on paper and did so. And it just flowed right out. I've written fiction also. Fiction you have to work at. This--there was no work. The story was there and it just came out. It probably took longer to edit it than it did to write it in the first place.

In a way, how it happened is a kind of strange story. My father was sick and to give my mother a night out, I would sit with him. He was asleep most of the time, so one night I pulled out a legal pad and began to jot down things about initiation. That's how it hap-

WL: Have you ever been back to where "That Day" was laid?

TS: Two years ago, but I just couldn't. Everything's changed so much. Besides, I wasn't paying too much attention to where we were going that day. I had other things on my mind. WL: Do you ever see any of the characters

who you wrote about in "That Day"? TS: Not for 35 or 40 years, since a few years after we all graduated from high school. The school itself has ceased to exist long ago.

WL: I wonder if they remember ... ?"

TS: They have to remember. It was a pretty big day for all of us. It was easily the most exciting thing that ever happened to any of us. The next day we were all still bubbling about it, and even though we never did anything like it again, we had a lot of sex. We went at it like bunnies. We were very excited about having discovered cocksucking.

I was a good looking kid back then, heavy, King Must Die.

but with the way we had to work on the farm, I had muscles. In fact, all of them (the characters in the book) were well-muscled, real

When we played cowboys and Indians back then and you were caught, you were stripped went to jail naked.

WL: Did you know you were Gay when all that happened; when they put you in bondage and through your paces?

TS: No. It was many years--I mean, in those days, you had to think you were 100% heterosexual, so no, I didn't think I was Gay. Despite all that happened, all we did, we never thought of ourselves as Gay

WL: What's your second book about?

TS: The one I'm trying to sell is about a pair of neighboring families who make a bet, the loser of which become the slaves of the other. It's another S&M story.

WL: Have you ever written for "Drummer" or any of the others like it?

TS: That Day was written for Bound and Gagged, since it's based on readers' contributions. I thought the editor would simply pick out the sections he liked and publish them. I took a trip to New York and went down to the office and introduced myself. About ten days later, I got a letter from Bob Wingate, the editor, telling me that the story was 'wonderful" and he was going to devote an entire issue of the magazine to it.

A couple of days later, he called me up and said, "You know, this is so good, I'm going to make a book out of it." He sent a contract and an advance, so that's how I got a book.

I wasn't trying to write a porn novel. I was simply pouring out something that had happened to me a long time ago and something I'd done a lot of thinking about.

WL: Are you thinking about becoming a full-time writer?

TS: I would certainly like to be a full-time writer. I'm about a half-time writer now. I don't work five days a week anymore. I'm about ready, yeah.

I've started a story now that isn't about S&M. I'm tired of S&M. It has no S&M in it, but I think it's a good story

WL: Does it have a Gay theme?

TS: Yes, definitely. It's my life as I wished I had lived it. When I graduated from high school, I went to New York City and lived there for five years. The new book is about what I wished had happened to me

WL: I used to go up to New York when I was in grad school, places like the Ramrod and the Mineshaft, wonderful places.

TS: I don't think those places were around in my time. I missed all of that. You know what I often reflect on? You and I, those out age, lived through the last period in history when sex wouldn't kill you.

WL: Who are your favorite Gay writers?

Who do you enjoy reading.

TS: Certainly one of them is Larry Townsend's One Little Leather Boy that I picked up off a rack. I had no idea what it was all about. Other than that, John Barton, obviously. Right now, I'm reading David Saylor's, (a.k.a. Aaron Travis) Roman series. I love Mary Renault's Fire From Heaven and The

#### 'Serving In Silence' is a Book Margarethe Cammermeyer Never Wanted to Write

On April 28, 1989, Col. Margarethe Cammermeyer said four words--"I am a Lesbian"-that changed her life.

The disclosure would eventually cause Cammermeyer to be discharged from the military after an acclaimed nursing career, despite numerous awards and promotions. It also launched what Cammermeyer would call "the most important mission" of her life: fighting the military ban on Gays and Lesbians and eventually winning reinstatement last June.

But Cammermeyer--nurse, Lesbian, mother--can add another accomplishment to her already lengthy list. She's now an author as well.

Her new book, Serving In Silence, is an engaging account of a battle Cammermeyer never expected to face, told in a book she never wanted to write. Co-authored with Whidbey Island writer Chris Fisher, the book will undoubtedly further the rise to national prominence that Cammermeyer attained in her fight. Plans are being made for an NBC-TV movie to air early in 1995, starring Glenn Close and produced by Barbra Streisand.

Serving In Silence tells more than a story of discrimination in the military. Granted, it is a moving account of a girl from Norway, born in 1942 under Nazi occupation, who developed a strong belief in American opportunity and realized, upon coming out, just how selective that opportunity can be.

But it is also the story of a woman who got married out of a sense of duty, raised a family, went through a painful divorce, and only later fell in love with Diane, a woman who provided "the last, connecting piece to the puz-

In 1965, she married fellow soldier Harvey Hawken, whom she had met during a tour of duty in Germany. She writes that they had what appeared to be a perfect marriage, but as Cammermeyer's success in the military grew, Hawken became resentful. The tensions between them grew apace until Cammermeyer knew that something had to break--either she, or her marriage.

"On my way home...to our perfect home, I veered my car toward a telephone pole, thinking: I could hit this pole and end the pain. With a mental jolt, I jerked the car off the shoulder and back onto the road again.


She divorced Hawken in 1980 and moved to San Francisco where she worked as a VA nurse. From a field of 34,000 VA nurses, she was picked as the organization's Nurse of the Year in 1985.

In 1988, she moved to Seattle to work as Chief Nurse for the Washington State National Guard. A year later, she writes, she applied for an upgraded security clearance. It was then that she came out as a Lesbian.

"I did not realize that...I would lose my career in a country that espoused equality for all," she writes. "And I didn't know that by being forced to speak out, first privately, then publicly. I would find the most important mission of my life.

Cammermeyer is currently serving while the decision to reinstate her is under appeal.

The book is an extraordinary account of a valiant woman fighting a battle against all odds--and winning, not only her fight, but herself as well.



#### Lillian Faderman: A Storyteller in Her Own Right, Brings Out New Book

Lillian Faderman, author of "Odd Girls and Twilight Hours" among other books, has just published through Viking Press, an 800page anthology of Lesbian literature since the

17th Century called "Chloe Plus Olivia." She has been a professor of English at California State University at Fresno since 1967, where she now also teaches Lesbian Studies. She has been in a relationship with the same woman for many years. She is also one of the most important intellectual figures in contemporary literature.

Lillian Faderman: I started publishing in 1969, and the first things I did were multiethnic college textbooks. Then in the mid-'70s, I started getting brave enough to think about doing Lesbian Studies. I was encouraged by what was happening in various places around the country like the Lesbian and Gay Caucus and the Modern Language Association. So, I began with Emily Dickinson. I really wanted to explain her letters written to Sue Gilbert, which were really passionate love letters.

We don't have, extant anyway, anything that we know for sure she wrote to the Reverend Charles Wadsworth, who's usually explained as her elusive lover and the reason for her becoming a recluse. But we have dozens of letters to Sue Gilbert, and to other women, that are clearly love letters, and in fact, I have a number of them in Chloe Plus Olivia.

I was going to write a book on Dickenson, but I really thought I wanted to place her romantic friendship with Gilbert in some kind of historical context, so I kept going further and further back in history That that was finally published in 1981, Surpassing the Love of Men.

Frederick Kahler: In Chloe Plus Olivia there's a story written by Pat Califia called "The Finishing School" from Califia's book, Macho Sluts, about the sexual, ritually sadomasochistic relationship between a mother and daughter. You don't hear often about Lesbian incest; it's more known that Gay men have fantasies of father and son together. I think it's called "Swiss Love.

LF: I don't think Califia can be read or does she mean to be read on a literal level. This is pornography. She's appealing to fantasy. What I love about this story--and it's easily the most controversial story in the book--is that Califia takes so much of these staples of male pornography. It's always fascinated me that heterosexual male pornography has so much Lesbianism in it, but it's Lesbianism for male delectation. She takes so many of these staples of male pornography from the 17th, 18th and 19th Centuries and she sort of turns it around to Lesbian delectation by making just enough

I'm thinking of some soft-core by Denis Diderot, from his novel The Nun, in which the nasty Mother Superior takes advantage of this poor, innocent girl and victimizers her. Califia uses the same kind of material, but she makes it clear there that the girl is not this poor, innocent girl, but it's really sort of play and pleasure for her.

She's as much a participant in the whole thing as the older woman is, and it seems to me, that there is something of a charm there of repossessing images that heterosexual men used for their own titillation in the past.

Obviously, Califia's story is not for everyone, but what I wanted to do in including it in Chloe Plus Olivia is number one: to show something of contemporary, in-your-face writing and number two: show how that sort of writing frequently took those historical instances of pornography and twisted them so that it's no longer men writing for other heterosexual men.

FK: Have you come across any contemporary Lesbian literature or writing of a Lesbian sensibility that turns out was not written by a Lesbian?

LF: Yes, not contemporary, but certainly in the 1950s. There were a number of pulp novels published under women's names, many of them sort of confessionals, supposedly autobiographies, there were certainly written by

FK: And something always happened to the woman.

LF: Always (laughs). Most of these stories had to end with the woman in torture.

FK: What do you see as the future for Lesbian literature?

LF: I worry! I worry for the written word (long pause). I think even very bright, very literate people, that is, literate in terms of their with the language, are much to now not interested in the written word.

I think films will be "it" in the 21st Century and that being the case, we have to get more good Lesbian films out there. The number is woefully small--I think the closest to "it" was actually by a man--but he's good--I really like John Sayles' Lianna (1983). Wonderful film, really attractive characters.

FK: In Chloe Plus Olivia you say you were seeking examples of a Lesbian sensibility. But in and editorial in the New York Newsday criticizing the Gay gene theory, you write, "Why must Gays and Lesbians have an 'excuse' for our sexuality?"

LF: What I'm saying is that we're just like everyone else. That's why I like the historical work I've done on romantic friendship. I that that what that work shows is that everyone is capable of what we would call Lesbians experiences. And society recognized it. Not the genital potential, not in a specifically sexual potential, but society seemed to recognize the emotional and sensual potentials.

I look to a future when everyone will just be able to fall in love with another person for whatever reasons they have and it won't necessarily be dependent on gender.

In the eras before we became ghettoized, everyone was capable of homosexual feelings and, along with it, heterosexual feelings, and that seems to me to be truest of mammalian

potential, that we as mammals are capable of any kind of feeling.

What I try to do in the early sections of Chloe Plus Olivia is include literature by women who would have called themselves romantic friends, but who would not have known the word Lesbian. The sensibility I'm tracing in the book is this terrific passion.

And I have another fairly early section called "A Man Trapped in a Woman's Body: The Literature of Sexual Inversion." I begin with a couple of pieces by 17th and 18th Century women who also probably wouldn't have called themselves Lesbians, but they wore men's clothes, sometimes they passed for men. That's another aspect of the Lesbian sensibil-

FK: Are you tickled by the idea of the "carnivorous flower?"

LF: I love it! I have in Chloe Plus Olivia what I think is the first Lesbian vampire fiction, Sheridan Le Fanu's Camilla (1871-72). It was a very influential image that a lot of Lesbians picked up on in their own literature,

for example, Clemence Dane's novel Regiment of Women. Dane was a Lesbian whose real name was Winifred Ashton. She presents this horrific Lesbian character who just wants to suck the blood of young women and destroy

A iot of Renee Vivian's poetry picks up on that kind of image. Anais Nin--certainly a Bisexual-picks up on it too.

FK: Obviously, there were some works you debated.

LF: The original manuscript to Chloe Plus Olivia was about four feet high. I had a lot of material I had to get rid of and, I guess, everything had to be thought about twice.

FK: Okay, say someone has 30 minutes and sees your book. Is there one story you'd recommend?

LF: I think I would want everyone to be buzzing about Amy Lowell's poetry and the reason for that is because she got a bad rap. She's best known for "Patterns", a poem about a straight woman mourning the loss of her male lover.

Only later on did I discover she was a Lesbian, and after that, I discovered the most incredible, beautiful, erotic, I mean really specifically sexual love poems that Amy Lowell wrote especially to the woman that she was with for the last 12 years of her life, a beautiful actress by the name of Ada Russell. These are the poems that-I always read at least one of them in my presentations in bookstores and I can see the women in my audience just drooling over them.



#### 'Images In The Dark' is a Book of Wit, Gay Cinema History and Pure Entertainment

Images In The Dark Raymond Murray TLA Publications, \$19.95

Although the list of books that have focused on Gay and Lesbian films, that is, the newly exploding "Queer Cinema," is numerous and growing, non match the scope, the wit, the comprehensiveness and the pure entertainment value of Raymond Murray's eagerly awaited Images In The Dark. Anyone with an interest in Gay and Lesbian film, ranging from the mere passing interest in renting an occasional video, to the extreme of academic study, will find much contained in these pages.

The history of books on Queer cinema has been characterized as one being as spotty in its nature as the Gay films themselves. There have been occasional gems, particularly Vito Russo's classic and definitive Celluloid Closet, but nothing much in between.

Recent years have seen the release of a number of books with a deliberate, limited focus. Boze Hadleigh's delightful Lavender Screen tackles only big budget Hollywood films put out since the 1950s.

Steve Stewart's recently revised Gay Hollywood Film and Video Guide has thoughtfully added Lesbian film listings that were missing from the early edition. But now comes Mur-

Murray has divided Images In The Dark into several distinct sections. In the first section, he focuses on Gay and Gay-friendly directors and independent filmmakers. Those included in this category range from Dorothy Arzner, an openly Lesbian director during Hollywood's "old boys club" era of the 1940s and controversial Rainer Werner Fassbinder to such prolific if lesser known people like Rosa Von Praunheim and Lizzie Bordon.

It is fascinating to follow an individual filmmaker's work and career. For example,

there are those like Wolfgang Petersen who have gone from early, positive Gay-themed films (The Consequence) to major Hollywood releases (Shattered, In the Line of Fire).

Other sections in Images In The Dark include film listings that are divided into Queer, Lesbian, Gay, camp and Transgender respectively.

Of greater interest to the general reader will be a section on Favorite Stars/Gay Icons. These are actors and actresses who are Gay or Lesbian themselves or whose films have been particularly embraced by the community.

Under Gay Icons are, of course, Judy, Bette, Madonna and Marilyn.

Also included are short bios and film listings for such Gay and Lesbian actors as Ramon Novarro, Sal Mineo, Rupert Everett and Rock

Hudson.

Perhaps not too surprisingly, with the exception of current Lesbian personalities Amanda Bearse and Sandra Bernhard, few Lesbians are included. For those with special interest in Lesbian actresses, turn to Boze Hadleigh's recently released Hollywood Les-

bians, which includes profiles of Barbara Stanwyck, Agnes Moorehead and Nancy Kulp,

among others.

Images In The Dark features over 3,000 reviews of films, shorts and TV programs of particular note; more than 200 biographies; hundreds of photos and detailed indexes.

With the inclusion of such films as Three-some, Philadelphia, For A Lost Soldier and TV's exceptional drama Prime Suspect 3, Murray has insured that his book is amazingly up-to-date. At well over 500 pages, there is truly something for everyone here, from the serious film scholar to those looking for juicy, gossip tidbits. It is a perfect book to read and

# 'Sex With Strangers' is Sex Without Emotions and Emotions Without Sex

Sex With Strangers Geoffrey Rees Maridian, \$12.95

Sex With Strangers, Geoffrey Rees' first book, seeks to portray love and sex in these uncertain and turbulent times. The book opens with the narrator, Thomas Hobart, boarding a train headed for Chicago, where he is to start college. On board, he meets a conductor named Dennis, who invites Thomas to stop and see him on his Thursday night layovers. Their assignation continues religiously for the next year, once a week they meet and have sex in a downtown hotel. No relationship flowers, however, and the only contact the two have is their weekly tryst.

In the meantime, Thomas falls in with a motley, rag-tag group made up of Michael, a mysterious figure who obviously wants Thomas, yet refuses his chances for seduction; Jane, a self-described Lesbian, who nevertheless, sleeps with men; Mark, an acid-head, who must be baby-sat when his trips go bad; and assorted other, less fleshed-out personages. It is Thomas, Michael and Jane who make up the trio which dominates the first half of the book.

Michael is hot for Thomas and expresses it in coy double entendres and sly comments, yet never makes any serious attempts to go past friendship.

Thomas, although having sex with Dennis and self-identified as Gay, is drawn to Jane, while Jane clearly wants Thomas to be with Michael.

An unhappy triangle you say? Well, yes, but not because of the sexual tension. Thomas hides his sexual antics with Dennis from Michael and Jane, although the three become tight friends. Their discussions revolve around sex and love and they come up with a motto "Love without lust, lust without love." It is a motto which they not only practice, it is one of which they are incredibly proud.

Thomas' practice of their motto is tested,

however, when he moves to New York City and falls in love--and lust--with Stuart, a painter. Stuart is extremely mercurial and the relationship is hardly the fabric from which songs are made.

While their relationship unravels, Thomas has a surprise run-in with Michael and his new lover, Lucas, at New York City's Gay Pride Parade. As Thomas, Stuart, Michael and Lucas uneasily interact in the last chapters, a secret is revealed. Thomas prepares himself to leave Stuart.

The subject of sex without emotions and emotions without sex is intriguing and could easily be the basis for a mind provoking novel. Sex With Strangers, however, is not that book. The characters invoke no emotions-negative or positive. They are leaves stuck on a bank of the flowing river of life.

If they took more interest in their ineptness or realized how self-absorbed they are, there could at least be pity or disgust. Instead, when Thomas periodically looses control over his emotions and breaks into hysterical sobs, it can only be met with disbelief.

One of my biggest complaints is how Rees constructs characters and then doesn't fill them out. Even the people in life I've known who resemble these characters have more than two sides; none of the people in this book do.

His prose is often over-drawn and too highly and obviously symbolic. Thomas' first major encounter with Jane and Michael is a prime example:

"...I tore into the sandwich. The hot sauce, which had looked so innocuous streaming from the red squirt bottles full of the stuff, exploded in my mouth. I had had no idea what to expect and was not prepared for this scorching sacrament."

Sex With Strangers wasn't a horrible read, just an uninspiring one. I often read at night and I had a hard time keeping my eyes open to finish a chapter. When I did get to the end, it was all I could do not to shrug my shoulders.

#### 'Amerasia Journal' Brings Together Creative Works on Asian Pacific Lesbians and Gays

By David Chan

The emergence of Asian and Pacific American Gay. Lesbian and Bisexual individuals and groups is documented in this first collection of writings that brings together critical essays and creative literature in Amerasia Journal published by the University of California-Los Angeles' Asian American Studies Center. Eighteen articles, essays and creative works are highlighted in this special double issue edited by Russell C. Leong and subtitled "Dimensions of Desire."

"Dimensions of Desire" seeks to forge linkages between questions and issues of sexual and racial identity among Asian and Pacific Americans. "Dimensions" refers to a range and variation of sexual practice or sexual desire, including celibacy.

Contrary to popular belief that homosexuality originated in the West and that it only affects assimilated Asians and Pacific Islanders in the U.S., the articles in fact reveal that homosexuality has existed in Asian countries-China, Japan, Vietnam, Thailand and the Philippines--and in the indigenous Pacific Islands even prior to the colonization and/or immigration of their peoples.

Prof. Dan Y. Takagi, who teaches sociology at UC-Santa Cruz, in her article "Maiden Voyage: Excursion into Sexuality and Identity Politics in Asian America," states that:

"We are relatively uninformed about Asian American subcultures organized around sexuality. There are Asian American Gay and Lesbian social organizations, Gay bars that are known for Asian clientele, conferences that have focused on Asian American Lesbian and Gay experiences and electronic bulletin boards catering primarily to Gay Asians, their friends and their lovers."

Because Asian Americans have often been analyzed within a family context, Alice Y. Hom of the Claremont Graduate School pres-

ents a study of Lesbian daughters and Gay sons based on interviews with their first and second generation parents-Korean, Chinese, Japanese, Filipino and Vietnamese.

Most books on the topic of parents of Gay and Lesbian children report mainly on white middle class families; Hom finds that parents report their own observations of Gay and Lesbian behavior in their Asian home countries prior to immigration.

Took Took Thongthiraj, a UCLA women's studies major graduate, continues the discussion of homosexuality in the Asian diaspora in her article "Toward a Struggle Against Invisibility: Love Between Women in Thailand."

She states that while "Lesbian-like relationships and lifestyles exist in Thailand, yet many Western (often male) analysts of Thai sexuality and homosexuality have focused solely on the Gay male subculture of Thailand. Unwillingness to uncover information on same-sex relationships between Thai women on the part of such analysis, reinforces the multiple invisibility of these women--as women."

Infusing sexuality and sexual formation with modern technology, U.C.-Irvine instructor Daniel C. Tsang investigates the "sexual underground" of cyberspace--a Gay bulletin board system utilized by thousands of mainly Asian males in Los Angeles and Orange Counties. Tsang sees computer bulletin boards as a vehicle for crossing class, gender, generational and ethnic lines and as challenges to prevailing notions of Asian males as asexual.

#### Patricia Nell Warren's 'Front Runner', Has Led to Founding of Scores of Groups

New York-AP- Patricia Nell Warren's The Front Runner, not only helped thousands of young Gays come to terms with their sexuality, it also launched an athletic movement.

Since the late 1970's, some 75 "Front Runners" groups of Lesbian and Gay amateur runners have sprung up around the country.

Warren had nothing to do with the founding of the groups and avoided them for years, out of shyness and a reluctance to be labeled, said Tyler St. Mark, her business partner.

But she had an emotional meeting with them at Gay Games IV in June, just after the sequel, Harlan's Race, was published.

"She just simply walked over casually, and it wasn't until she raised her arms (for a photographic pose) that people noticed her," said St. Mark, who was present at the event in Central Park. "It was a ripple effect. It was like a wave." Ultimately, it was a great round of applausejust like that for her character, Harlan Brown, in his first meeting with the Front Runners, which occurs at the climax of Harlan's Race.

If the second novel leads to the founding of any group, it might be the Gay Panthers. Several characters in the book, despondent over the assassination of Harlan's lover, Billy Sive, flirt with forming a mythical terrorist group modeled on the Black Panthers.

Warren says the idea was not hers.

"Before I ever wrote this book, I heard 'Gay Panthers' talked about and theorized about," she said.

But no such group exists, and Warren noted, "I point out in the book that, of all the major movements, the Gay movement alone has not had its share of violent activists."

She said she did not know why.

# B-Boy Blues: A Fiercely Funny BlackOn-Black Love Story B-Boy Blues

Mitchell Crawford's fantasy has always been to have a B-boy. B-boys stand on street corners daring anyone to invade their territory, dress to thrill, move to a rhythm all their own and, loud and boisterous, "speak to be heard, not so much to be understood."


Now, you don't think of any tough Black street boy as being Gay, don't often read about very different segments of the African American community in contact with one another and, if you're white, don't often encounter Black narrators who honestly tell how they feel about whites.

You do here.

Mitchell is young, African American, educated and Gay. He works on a magazine, lives in a nice Manhattan apartment and runs around with a group of men like himself.

He has flings with two other B-boys, then meets Raheim, the man of his dreams in this first-rate love story.

Supporting characters--Raheim's son and Mitchell's family and work friends--add to the plot and the realism as Hardy reveals must about what happens when two cultures meet and more about diversity than you get in di-

versity workshops.

B-Boy Blues is the first Gay novel grounded in the Afrocentric experience and the first novel to look at B-boy culture, which is an important component of the image and ideology of many Gay and Bisexual men of African descent.

The book touches on issues of masculinity, sexuality, homophobia and self-love in the Black community. It gives contemporary fiction one of its very first authentic African American Gay romances.

This feels like a masterpiece of both African American and Gay literatures.





The United States has by far the highest reported rate of AIDS in the industrialized world, with the number of diagnosed cases increasing rapidly. As of December 31, 1993, 361,164 people in the U.S. had reportedly been diagnosed with AIDS. Of the 361,164 cases, 314,325 cases were males and 46,838 cases were females.

It is estimated that some 1 million Americans are infected with HIV--or 1 in every 250

Everyday, nearly 6,000 people are newly infected with HIV.

AIDS has been the second leading cause of death among men aged 25 to 44 since 1989. In some cities, such as Washington, D.C. and San Francisco, AIDS is the leading killer of adult men aged 25 to 44.

AIDS is the fourth leading cause of death among women aged 25-44. Injection drug use is the most common source of infection (49%) of AIDS cases among women, but an increasing proportion of women contract the virus from sexual partners (35%)

20% to 30% of infants born to HIV-infected women will become infected with the virus. Approximately 30,000 American children have already lost their parents to AIDS and it is estimated that by the year 2000, the overall number of orphaned children and adolescents will exceed 80,000.

AIDS is the sixth leading cause of death among people aged 15 to 24.

19% of adolescents with AIDS aged 13 through 19, and 12% of those aged 20 to 24 have been infected through heterosexual contact, compared with 7% of the adult AIDS

#### Wisconsin Statistics

In September, 1993, the AIDS incidence rate in Wisconsin ranked 35th from the highest

AIDS case surveillance suggests that in Wisconsin, HIV infection has been predominately a sexual transmitted disease.

Nearly two thirds of the cases of HIV infection have been reported from the state's most populous counties: Milwaukee and Dane.

In Wisconsin, most persons who have been reported with HIV infection or AIDS are white. However, the reported HIV infection and AIDS rates have been substantially higher among African Americans and Hispanics compared to whites. For African Americans, 516 cases of HIV infection have been reported per 100,000; for Hispanics the rate is 312 cases per 100,000 and for whites the rate was 61 per 100,000.

have known all along." Radecic warned, however, that "Regardless of the origins of homosexuality, discrimination based on sexual orientation is wrong and must end. This is especially true to avoid potential genetic engineering if science should ever discover a gene responsible for homosexuality.'

Radecic went on to say that "Studies of human sexuality are not conducted in political and social vacuums. The results must therefore be used in the most ethical ways and precautions must be taken to ensure that the studies are not used against any individuals or groups.

Radecic was referring to statements made earlier by Lou Sheldon, leader of the Traditional Values Coalition and a guru of religious extremism.

Sheldon had insinuated that if homosexuality were proven to be biologically based, he believed that medicine and science would seek to genetically alter Gay people.

Roger Gorski, co-author of the 1992 study on brain differences between Gay and straight men, said the discovery of another difference is no surprise. "I'm sure we're going to find others," he said in a phone interview.

But it's not clear whether the brain differences found so far really influence sexual orientation, and they may even be results of it, Gorski said. Nor is it clear whether the brain differences affect mental functioning, he said.

Gorski, a professor of anatomy and cell biology at the medical school of the University of California at Los Angeles, also said the size differences in Witelson's study might have been due simply to chance.

Scientists are debating what produces sexual orientation. Witelson said the idea that biology plays a role "clearly does not mean that environment is irrelevant, but what it means is that environment is not the whole story."

Witelson and colleagues at her university and the University of Toronto's Sunnybrook Health Science Centre scanned brains in 11 Gay men and 10 heterosexual men. The men were matched for age, and all said they were

Researchers focused on a structure called the isthmus of the corpus callosum. The isthmus runs between the right and left sides of the brain, lying roughly between the ears.


Brain scanning showed that on average, the isthmus was 13 percent thicker in Gay men than in straight men. But some of the Gay men had a thinner isthmus than some of the straight men, so an individual's isthmus size cannot reveal his sexual orientation. Witelson said.


