House Subcommittee Postpones Hearing Sought by Anti-Gay Extremist

Washington, D.C.—After the public response to press reports that a congressional panel would hold a hearing sought by anti-Gay extremist Lou Sheldon, staff members from the U.S. House of Representatives have told the Human Rights Campaign Fund (HRCF) that the hearing will be postponed.

The reason given HRCF for the postponement was so that efforts could be made to ensure fairness and balance in the selection of

At the end of August, staffers for Rep. Peter Hoekstra (R-MI), chair of the Oversight and Investigations Subcommittee of the House Economic and Educational Opportunities Committee, had confirmed claims that Shldon made in an August fundraising letter that the subcommittee would hold a hearing on Sep-

In the direct mail letter for his Traditional Values Coalition, Sheldon communicated his intentions to use the taxpayer-funded forum to attack local school efforts to prevent AIDS, violence and suicide, and sought donations to mount a \$25,000 media campaign to publicize the event.

Put People with AIDS in Camps

In an interview with the Los Angeles Times published November 26, 1989, Sheldon called for men, women and children with HIV/AIDS to be confimed to concentration camps he called "cities of refuge."


In 1986 and 1988, he backed discriminatory anti-Gay initiatives sponsored by Right Wing extremist Lyndon LaRouche.

Public Outcry
"I don't think Lou Sheldon realized what an outcry there would be when the public got wind of his extreme agenda," said HRCF Political Director Daniel Zingale. "Sheldon has made it his mission to single out Lesbian and Gay Americans for discrimination. Lesbian and Gay youth are at high risk of biasmotivated violence and suicide, and it is in-

motivated violence and suicide, and it is incredibly mean-spirited that Sheldon wants the Federal Government to forbid local communities from dealing with these vulnerable young people in a fair and compassionate manner. Targeting at-risk youth for discrimination in school is about as low as you can get."

Some communities have adopted modest programs to address the epidemic of violence and discrimination against Lesbian and Gay youth in schools. Sheldon claims that such local efforts can either make straight kids Gay or prevent Gay kids from turning straight.

Fallout Continues Over Dole's Return of Log Cabin Campaign Contribution

Washington, D.C.-A Gay Republican congressman who has endorsed Senate Majority Leader Bob Dole for president started out being critical of Dole for returning a contribution from the Log Cabin Club, a Gay GOP group.

"Are you rejecting the support of anyone who happens to be Gay?" Wisconsin Rep. Steve Gunderson said in a letter to Dole made public Wednesday, September 6.. "If this is so, do you intend to now reject my support and request those on your staff who happen to be Gay to resign?"

Dole's campaign recently said it was returning a \$1,000 contribution from the Log Cabin Club, an organization of gay Republicans.

Dole spokesman Nelson Warfield said returning the contribution was `not about supporting discrimination but about rejecting the support of an organization' that supports same-sex marriages and allowing Gay men and Lesbians to serve openly in the military.

Log Cabin officials produced a letter showing that the Dole campaign had solicited the contribution, and said the campaign decided to return it only after media inquiries. Dole aides then said campaign finance chairman John Moran should not have sent the letter.

"The Log Cabin Club is Republican because they don't believe in the big-government policies of the Democrats," Gunderson wrote Dole. "They agree with you in balancing the budget, returning power to states and local government, and yes, even in promoting the

are pro-family. I know of no Gay Republican (and frankly few Gay Democrats) who seek any special class or privileges. All we seek is the end to blatant discrimination in America."

Gunderson supported Dole's 1988 presidential campaign and was among the earliest members of Congress to endorse Dole's 1996 effort.

The Wisconsin congressman said Dole had a better opportunity than any other candidate to unite all elements of the Republican Party.

Gunderson quoted Dole as saying, "I don't want people discriminating against me because of my disability and I don't want people discriminating against anyone else in America."

He wil! be appearing on Wednesday, October 25 as the keynote speaker for the Second Annual International Workshop on Trade and Business between Africa and the United States. The two day conference takes place at the Ramada Airport Convention Center. Mugabe's speech is scheduled to begin at 7:30 p.m.

As reported in the last two issues of Light, Mugabe lashed out at Gay people, calling them "sodomists and sexual perverts," who should be rounded up and put in jail.

In a speech reported by the Associated Press, Mugabe likened Gay people to "beasts" and called on his people "to hound them."

"If dogs and pigs don't do it," Mugabe said, "why should human beings?"

At an international book fair being held in Zimbabwe, Mugabe banned an exhibit of Gaythemed books, shocking some participants and sparking a boycott.

In response, 70 U.S. Congressmen sent Mugabe a letter of protest, accusing him of bigotry.

To that, Mugabe responded, "Let the Americans keep their sodomy, bestiality, stupid, foolish ways to themselves."

In an August 22nd visit to South Africa, Mugabe was greeted by pro-Gay demonstrators, one of whom said that Mugabe "must come to this country and learn from the human rights culture here."

Chinese Befuddled by Lesbian Protests

Huairou, China-AP- Since the meeting of non-governmental groups began in China outside Beijing, activists have marched, sung and chanted daily for a variety of causes including civil rights for Lesbians and Gay men. At first the Chinese authorities tried to put a stop to all of it, but they've given up. While police remain vigilant, the demonstrations go on. Chinese plainclothes police have taken pictures of about 300 Lesbians who have been beating drums and chanting slogans. The only thing the police have done is to try and keep the Lesbians separated from the Muslim women who have been protesting the Lesbians. Now the two groups march on opposite sides of the street, while the Chinese look on.

Britain to Review Ban on Gays in Military

London-AP- Britain is to review its ban on Gays and Lesbians in the armed forces. A team of civil servants has been appointed by the Ministry of Defense to review the situation and its report is due in January, 1996.

In June, Britain's second highest court upheld the right of the ministry to dismiss four Gay men from the armed forces. But Sir Simon Brown, one of the four judges, urged a review of the policy, saying "the tide of history" was turning against the ban. Britain and Turkey are the only two NATO alliance countries that ban Gays and Lesbians from the military

The Ministry of Defense is terrified that the ban will eventually be overturned, whether by the House of Lords or by the European Court of Human Rights, and that it will face multi-million pound lawsuits from dismissed Gay and Lesbian personnel," said Gay activist Peter

Changes Needed in Values to Combat Asian AIDS

Bangkok-AP- Asia and Pacific countries need to change social structures and values to suppress the spread of AIDS, experts preparing for an international conference have said. The conference, with 2,000 participants from more than 50 countries, starts September 17 in Chiang Mai, Thailand, one of the country's most heavily affected areas. About 800,000 Thais are infected with the HIV virus and a total of about 3 million in the Asia and Pacific region. Social structures that most need to be changed, experts say, is the strengthening of families, both Gay and straight, a dedication to commitment and monogamy on the part of both orientations.

Federal Judge Blocks Discharge of Gay Man

Omaha, NE-AP- A federal judge has blocked the Air Force from discharging a Gay captain while his lawyers develop their case challenging the constitutionality of the military's don't ask, don't tell policy. The Air Force was to discharge Capt. Rich Richenberg because he told his commander in a letter that he is Gay. Richenberg says he has not engaged in sexual activity and that discharging him therefore violated his free speech. Arguments in the case are scheduled for

Black LesBiGays Attending D.C. Conference

Washington, D.C.- Self-empowerment and strategies for political involvement are at the core of the D.C. Coalition of Black Lesbians, Gay Men and Bisexuals' Fifth Annual Conference which will take place in D.C. on September 16. The Coalition was established in 1978 to address issues affecting Black Gays, Lesbians and Bisexuals. It will present its 1995 Achievement Awards at a reception. This year's theme, "Discover the Power Within," encourages African-Americans who are Gay, Lesbian or Bisexual, to rely on themselves and each other more and by doing so, improve society.

Court Challenge to Gays in the Military Gets To Federal Appeals Level for First Time

Washington, D.C .- Lt. Paul Thomasson fired off a letter to his boss--the admiral enforcing the Navy's policy against Gays in the military days after President Clinton's ask, don't tell'' policy went into effect.
"I am Gay," he wrote.

Despite Thomasson's stellar 10-year record and the support of his commanding officer, the

Navy moved to discharge him. Thomasson fought back in court, challenging the policy as unconstitutional. His case goes before the 4th U.S. Circuit Court of Appeals in Alexandria this second week in Septemberthe first challenge of the Clinton policy to

reach the federal appeals court level. A second challenge to the policy--Able vs. Perry--is slated to be argued before the 2nd Circuit Court of Appeals later this year.

The two cases illustrate how different judges can hear similar arguments on the same issue and reach opposite conclusions.

They also cast doubt on the Clinton administration's claim that people would no longer be discharged from the military merely for being Gay or Lesbian.

At the crux of the new policy is the presumption that someone who says he or she is Gay or Lesbian would engage in sexual activity, which is prohibited. To remain in uniform, openly Gay members must prove they

So far, four people have `rebutted the presumption' that because they are Gay they would engage in same-sex activity, according to court papers. But "two effectively recanted and said they were confused and not Gay," said C. Dixon Osburn, co-executive director of the Servicemembers Legal Defense Network, which advises Gay and Lesbian service members and helps them find lawyers.

Pentagon officials were unable to say how many service members have attempted to challenge the theory. But the discharge rate under the new policy has not changed significantly from the rate under the old policy, according to figures provided by the Defense Department.

Lawrence Korb, assistant defense secretary for manpower under President Reagan, now a scholar at the conservative Brookings Institution, called the new policy only "marginally different" from the old.

'In some cases, it may even be worse because you get into the whole question of freedom of speech," he said.

It may ultimately be up to the justices on the Supreme Court to decide if the policy is unconstitutional.

I think what you've got now is three for, three against and three in the middle," Korb said, identifying the swing votes as Justices David Souter, Sandra Day O'Connor and Anthony Kennedy.

Korb, who used to enforce the old policy on

Gays, has appeared as an expert witness on behalf of Gay service members in several high-profile court challenges.

Neither Thomasson nor the six Able plaintiffs tried to prove that they would not engage in Gay sex. Rather, they attacked the policy on constitutional grounds.

In Thomasson's case, he came armed with glowing performance evaluations-- even a recommendation from his admiral that Thomasson be retained and promoted, almost a year after revealing his sexual orientation.

In the Able case, the six plaintiffs presented expert testimony from a psychiatrist who said Gays in the military were no better and no worse at their jobs than heterosexuals, and from a military analyst who said the presence of Gays and Lesbians does not affect a unit's ability to function.

Thomasson lost his case and has been discharged from the Navy. The six Able plaintiffs won theirs, and the right to remain in uniform while the government appeals.

Ruling in the Thomasson case, U.S. District Judge Claude M. Hilton said the Clinton administration policy does not violate service members' free speech or equal protection guarantees

While it is true that some service members may view themselves as homosexuals but nonetheless remain celibate, it would not be rational to develop military personnel policies on the basis that all homosexuals will remain celibate or that they will not be sexually attracted to others," Hilton wrote.

In Able, U.S. District Judge Eugene Nickerson said the policy is "nothing short of Orwellian" because it equates sexual orientation with misconduct.

To presume from a person's status that he or she will commit undesirable acts is an extreme measure," he wrote. "Hitler taught the world what could happen when the government began to target people not for what they had done but because of their status."

Recent CBS Special Gives Insight into Far Right's Issues in the Election of '96

New York, NY-CBS special, Thursday evening, September 7, on the so-called Christian right tried to put a human face on a politically activist sector that believes the Republic has strayed to far into diversity and inclusion and therefore, seeks to impose its own view of morality on the country.

With "Evening News" anchor Dan Rather at the helm, CBS Reports: Faith & Politics The Christian Right, focused on this tightly organized, very well financed group's burgeoning and sometimes overwhelming power, influence and political agenda.

Viewers were introduced to Fundamentalist preacher Larry Vance of Hardin Country, Kentucky, a lifelong Democrat who joined the Republican Party after he became convinced the United States was hell-bent on its own de-

"It's not the liberal philosophy per se destroying America," Vance explained. "It's the people allowing the liberal philosophy to control their lives that's destroying America.

'I don't have to become liberal. I don't have to be the type of individual that's going to say, 'If it feels good, do it.'

Vance said that President Clinton personifies the evils that have befallen us: "What he is standing for, as president, is exactly what I stand against as a minister of the gospel of Je-

At the same time as he blasted that perceived moral erosion from the pulpit, Vance worked for the election of his friend, Ron Lewis, one of at least 30 conservative Republicans elected to Congress-with help from the Christian

CBS Reports tried to portray Vance as a man of personable warmth in a face-to-face conversation, a man of passionate intensity in the pulpit when he declaims: "Whatever became of Christian America and the family? We're back!"

It's that rhetoric, that sincerity and righteousness that made this CBS Reports so

The special also visited local politics, where most Americans encounter at firsthand the emergence of religious conservatives as they try to force their agenda on others.

In Merrimack, New Hampshire, the school board's 3-2 conservative Christian majority began to impose its agenda for the schools, including the teaching of the religious myth of creationism and banning classroom discussion of Gay people, who Christian Fundamentalists believe are worthy only of death.

The uproar, the debate and the clash of competing grass-roots interests made for pure politics, and the good people of Merrimack learned that pure politics is anything but fun. As conducted by the Christian Right, it is taken in deadly earnest.

If nothing else, CBS Reports: Faith & Politics--The Christian Right was probably an advance look at the issues that the Christian Coalition and their allies will be hammering home in the elections of 1996.

Gary Bauer, president of the Family Research Council, an influential Christian conservative group, told Rather that the '96 contests will revolve around cultural and social is-

Any Republican presidential candidate who steps forward will have to embody conservative values, Bauer said.

"If the Republicans nominated moderate' Republican,' "Bauer said, nominated--a think millions of voters who care about these issues would stay home. And, in fact, what would end up happening is the Republican Party would lose both the high ground on these issues (and) the election.

CBS Reports also covered Ralph Reed, the boyish, 34-year-old executive director of televangelist Pat Robertson's Christian Coalition, a Washington, D.C., Far Right lobby that worked hard to elect congressmen who shared its values and concerns.

For the mild-spoken Reed, conservative Christians must fight to take away power from the "radical left" and those who have held power for the past 50 years.


They still control the bureaucracy. They still control the media. They still control many of the institutions of cultural power, they still control the universities and academia," Reed told the crowd at a conference called 'Reclaiming America for Christ.'

'This battle is not over," Reed says. 'It has just begun.

While the Christian Coalition have been soft peddling Gays lately, especially in the mainstream media, there is no doubt in anyone's mind, observers say that Gays will be the primary scapegoat in the elections of 1996.

While Reed and other Coalition spokesmen talk a great deal about abortion, it is not that and other conservative issues that brings in the money as several reports have pointed out.

Robertson himself has admitted that with out the anti-Gay rhetoric that is his stock and trade, he would not be nearly so rich.

Milwaukee—In an attempt to provide services for underserved populations, the Milwaukee County Commission on Aging has formed a work group to study the needs of Gay and

Milwaukee County Supervisor Dorothy Dean To Seek Re-election

Milwaukee—Dorothy K. Dean has confirmed that she is seeking re-election to the Milwaukee County Board of Supervisors. Citing the support and encouragement she is receiving from residents of the 13th District, Dean says she will seek another term on the County Board.

"The future of our children is extremely important to me," Dean said. "We are now facing a crossroads in the way we treat children in trouble. There are efforts to 'write off' children in trouble, locking them up at younger and younger ages. We cannot abandon our children."

Dean cited her successful efforts to increase prevention and early intervention services—the kinds of efforts that work before a youth gets into serious trouble.

The Community Youth Intervention Program, which she helped start in Milwaukee County, is an example of a successful way to involve adult volunteers from the neighborhood and parents in turning youth away from criminal activity.

Dean has successfully increased the County's commitment to cost-effective programs designed to divert youth from secure detention.

"The racial bias in the decision to lock up a youth is a serious problem, not just in Milwaukee, but nation-wide," Dean said. "I am working with experts nationally on ways we can reduce the racial bias in children's detention. I would like to see Milwaukee County be a national model in this effort."

Dean cited her many years of volunteer activity with Hillside Boys and Girls Club, Girl Scouts, Inner City Arts Council and United Way as examples of her strong, personal commitment to improving the lives of children in Milwaukee County.

When it Comes to Giving, Help Your Community by Giving to ACHOICE

Lesbian older adults. This work group, which is comprised of representatives from the Gay and Lesbian community, is attempting to determine the need for services within this specific population of older adults.

The work group, which is called the Work Group to Increase Access to Services for Gay and Lesbian Elderly, has been asked by the Commission to determine what services Gay and Lesbian older adults are currently receiving and what needs are not being met.

"Reaching frail, Gay and Lesbian elderly for their input will be our most difficult task," according to Erv Uecker of the Brady Street Clinic, who is a member of the group.

Whether these services are reaching the Gay and Lesbian elderly population is a question that the work group will attempt to answer.

Therefore, a confidential questionnaire will be distributed throughout the Gay and Lesbian community over the next month to answer this question. The success of this survey is dependent upon the involvement of Gay and Lesbian older adults and participation is encouraged in this first formal attempt by the Commission on Aging to contact Gay and Lesbian elderly to determine how to better provide the support they need to remain independent.

Questionnaires will be available at several locations commonly frequented by the Gay and Lesbian community. Additional questionnaires may be obtained by persons 60 years of age and older or their caregivers by calling Mary Kennedy of the Milwaukee County Department on Aging at (414) 289-6633.

Now the BestD Clinic is distributing a glossy magazine called Eros. On its pages are some of the hottest stars in the adult film industry showing the use of condoms.

There are stories too, good ones, the kind I hope I can write on occasion. The safer sex message is there, but it comes to you with a wallop that mere admonition and rational language cannot hope to pack.

The BestD Clinic is to be praised for this, for taking the double-pronged approach to AIDS prevention. They have done what is needed, flying in the face of the "We do it, but we can't talk about it," mentality, saying, in effect, that AIDS has to do with sex and so we must get sensual. Right on!

Eros is a little magazine, but one well worth having (Phil Bradley alone is worth it). You can pick up a copy at the Brady Street Clinic, 1240 E. Brady Street in Milwaukee, or at any of the Clinic's outreaches.

Dole Controversy

The controversy over the \$1,000 donation from the Log Cabin Republican's PAC to Senator Bob Dole's campaign for President broke on the weekend of our convention, ironically, and resulted in fantastic media coverage for our organization.

In addition to a significant article in the New York Times, (only part of which was reprinted in the Milwaukee Journal Sentinel) which also covered our convention, a full two minutes of ABC World News Tonight featured Rich Tafel, executive director of Long Cabin Republicans (LCR), proving that the Dole campaign and Senator Dole did indeed know that LCR is a Gay Republican organization, and then featured Senator Dole saying that he

When Rich approached Senator Dole at a fundraiser and told him he was from LCR, Dole right away said that he knew what Rich wanted to talk to him about, that he was working to get Ryan White to the floor, and he just had to get around one person (Helms) and he was working on it. He obviously knew what Log Cabin is about.

While we are all disappointed in Dole's action, we can take heart in the fact that the action clearly backfired. It made his campaign look idiotic and deceitful and gave Log Cabin incredible publicity, but did nothing to gain support for him from the Fundamentalist Christian movement, whose members will no doubt say his actions were too little, too late.

We hope that Dole will learn a valuable lesson from this, and will realize that he cannot win unless he stops alienating the mainstream Republicans who dominate the electorate in the Midwestern and Northeastern states which are his power base.

In addition, it should be noted that our \$1,000 contribution, along with the grassroots pressure we put on Senator Dole with letters and calls to his office, caused him to override Senator Helms' hold on Ryan White and bring it to the floor for a vote.

Thus, we got what we wanted and got our money back as well. And we got incredible publicity-we were even mentioned on the Jay Leno Show in a joke he made about Senator Dole returning contributions to the Gay Republicans and how the two of them were upset (or something to that effect).

It was good to see Congressman Gunderson take Senator Dole to task for his return of the money. It was equally pleasing to see that Senator Dole responded with a personal phone call to Congressman Gunderson.

I do not fault Congressman Gunderson for continuing his support of Dole for President (and it is helpful to continue to have an inside supporter who can elicit personal calls from Dole and can push our point of view), but at this point, we at Log Cabin are taking a "wait and see" attitude, choosing not to support any of the candidates in the GOP Presidential race. We have a lot of other uses for our money and

The most important event at the Log Cabin national convention held August 25-27 in Cincinnati, was the overwhelming vote, despite some controversy, in favor of a merger of Log Cabin Federation and Log Cabin Republicans under a compromise merger plan.

By way of background, the Log Cabin Federation (LCF) was the national membership organization for the various clubs, while the Log Cabin Republicans (LCR) was the Washington lobbying organization which has been so successful in pushing Ryan White through

LCR was created by then-LCF president Rich Tafel, who is now the executive director of LCR, and the separate organization was created at the insistence of a few major seed money donors who lived in areas with clubs which were run by "loose cannon" and thus did not want to be associated with those clubs.

Since then, LCF has shed most of those "loose cannon," and the major donors have seen the value of having one, united organiza-

The importance of this is that no longer will there be confusion in the media about the two organizations. Previously, it was possible for the media to talk to Rich Tafel, spokesman for LCR, and to Abner Mason, President of LCF, and potentially obtain two different answers.

Fortunately, Abner and Rich are good friends and generally agree on issues, so no conflict occurred. But a different LCF president may not have agreed with Rich so much. Now there will be only one spokesperson for the merged LCR.

The merger of the two organizations creates one organization with both a strong, wellfunded Washington presence and a strong grassroots presence with over 10,000 members nationwide, both vitally important to our efforts to influence the Republican Congress.

LCR will be controlled by a 20 member board of directors consisting of the executive director, 10 members who will be elected by mail ballot of all members, and nine members who will be elected at each national convention, including a vice president, a director for club development, a director for membership, and six regional directors.

Abner Mason of Boston, Massachusetts was elected Vice President, Greg Curtis of New Orleans, was elected Director of Club Development, Alex Wentzel of Laguna Beach, California, was elected Director of Membership Development, and Sam Collins, President of the Cincinnati club, was elected Regional Director for our region. The board will now elect a chairman, who will be the spokesman

All of us who attended the convention came away from it with new, excellent ideas for reinvigorating this club, as well as the enthusiasm to push on to new heights.

We also met a number of excellent people who will be a good resource.

Next year, the convention will be in San Diego immediately preceding the Republican National Convention (also in San Diego). Only time will tell whether the GOP convention will be a pleasant and therefore successful convention which avoids Gay bashing, or if it will be a repeat of Houston in 1992 and therefore a disaster for the Republican Party.

think, perhaps because I was raised to think this way, that my parents' attempt to deal with this in general, is admirable.

After all, it is true that many parents don't make an attempt to deal with this side of their children's lives because of their own insecurities. However, I have come to realize that many more parents do care about their children and, I honestly think, that they will attempt to exceed their personal boundaries if they honestly love their kids.

While my parents are trying to be supportive, I don't think they understand. I anticipated that, but still I find it difficult to deal with. It's hard to come so far and have to slow down to virtual zero every time I come home.

In some ways I wish that I could have told them earlier in my life so that we could have worked through these issues together. Although I know that that wouldn't have been right for me, I still find myself wishing it could have been possible.

I guess the reason is that in waiting until now, I feel that I have missed my goal.

I know that this may be somewhat difficult to understand, but one of the reasons I told my parents that I am Gay is because I wanted to share a wonderful part of my life with them. It's not working out that way.

When I come home, although I am still treated the same, which is, indeed, a luxury, I am met with judgmental eyes that have, for the time being, immediate authority over my life. It's very difficult to deal with certain decisions that come from people who don't understand.

It is even more difficult, however, to know that things are just not going to work out in the long term.

It's true that things are going well, but the timing is just not there.

I am a Senior in high school-and an old one at that. I will be almost 19 when I graduate. I will be out of the house by this time next year. Time is running somewhat thin to reestablish a close relationship with my parents.

Although I love my parents, as I stated before, I am getting older. Distance is inevitable. It will not be long before I am out of the house and even though it is true that our relationship can and will grow with time and understanding on with both parties, I will never have the opportunity to have what I think I could have

Don't get me wrong. That doesn't cause in me a particular sense of sadness. I wasn't

It does, however, present me with an opportunity and an understanding to help other young people who may read this.

I will close this article by simply stating that if you are my age or younger, and if you are ready, don't waste valuable life time and experience. As many have said, "It is often the fear of coming out that is worse than the experience of coming out."

My recent experiences have reaffirmed my understanding of that.

If you are ready, come out.

Most of us have loving parents who will, at the very least, try to support and understand you. It's better for you, it's better for me, it's better for them, if you come out.

Make your world and ours a better place. Be honest in love. You may surprise yourself.

Fond Du Lac Episcopal Bishop Jacobus **Blasts Ordination of Gavs**

Fond Du Lac, WI--Episcopal Bishop Russell Jacobus of Fond du Lac, Wisconsin, said sexual orientation was not the issue when he joined other clergymen in censuring a bishop for ordaining a Gay person as a deacon.

The complaint involves church authority and compliance with its policies, he said.

The general convention (of the Episcopal Church) said ... it is not appropriate at this time to ordain practicing homosexuals, or ordain heterosexuals in (sexual) relationships outside the marriage bond," Jacobus said.

Therefore, the bishop who decides on his own that he is not going to abide by resolutions of the general convention ... is not being accountable to the church at large.

Jacobus, of the Episcopal Cathedral of St. Paul, said he was one of 76 bishops nationwide who voted recently for charges that retired Bishop Walter Righter violated church law for ordaining Barry Stopfel as a deacon in

Righter was then assistant bishop of Newark, New Jersey. He retired in 1988 as bishop of Iowa and now lives in the small town of Alstead on the New Hampshire-Vermont border. Righter's case will go before a Court for the

Trial of a Bishop, consisting of nine other bishops who will act on a majority vote. Possible penalties include admonishing Righter. No sentence could be imposed unless

the findings were approved by a two-thirds vote of all the church's bishops.

Ten bishops brought the charge against Righter in January, saying he was `teaching a

Malcolm "Mal" Loch

Green Bay, WI-Well-known Green Bay area Gay bar owner and businessman, Malcolm "Mal" Loch, died unexpectedly at his home on Thursday, August 31, 1995. He was born January 6, 1921 in Green Bay to the late Joseph and Mary (nee Runk) Loch.

In addition to owning the popular Napalese Lounge, Loch also owned and operated the Bay Motel and the Bay Family Restaurants. But Stanton said conservative bishops are alarmed also.

Many of us fear it will divide the church,"

Stanton said. 'What we are trying to do is bring the house back to order.'

Four Lane Highways Can Be Roads to Spread of Syphilis and HIV

Tupelo, MS--A substantial increase in the number of syphilis cases has health officials concerned a rise in HIV cases will follow.

Based on past experiences, trailing on the heels of a high syphilis rate is usually a corresponding increase in HIV infection, the virus which leads to AIDS, health officials say.

"As syphilis goes, so does HIV,"

Craig Thompson, director of the Mississippi Department of Health's Division of Sexually Transmitted Diseases/HIV.

Mississippi, deep in the heart of the Bible Belt, has the highest incidence of syphilis in

Between January and June, Mississippi reported 2,387 cases of syphilis. Lee County, home of Don Wildmon's Family Values organization, reported 164 syphilis cases, the third highest number in the state behind Hinds County, with 282 cases, and Washington County's 182 cases.

Lee County, by far, had the highest number of cases among the 15 counties in northeast Mississippi. Calhoun County reported the second highest number with 45 cases.

But why the high number in Lee County? That's the question a lot of people have asked," said Earl Mahaffey, district health officer for the state Department of Health.

About a couple of years ago, Washington County saw a tremendous outbreak of syphilis cases, said Mahaffey, who is based in Tupelo. The outbreak in the Delta then worked its way up into northwest Mississippi and moved across the northern region and now is drifting down the east side of the state.

Lee County, with more than 72,000 residents, is the most populated county in the region. It also has a larger population of disadvantaged residents, the socioeconomic group largely affected by the syphilis outbreak.

Health officials believe drugs are related to the growing number of syphilis cases as well as an increase in other sexually transmitted diseases, including gonorrhea and chlamydia.

Cases of chancroid, an ulcer forming sexually transmitted disease already being seen in Jackson. This disease has been associated with increased risk for HIV infection.

Not only adults but even teens are trading sex for drugs, say health officials and counselors. And they are spreading the diseases through unprotected sex.

'The 'sex for drugs and drugs for sex' has just blossomed," Thompson said.

What some adults may find surprising is that some of the teen-agers exchanging sex for drugs are clean cut, attractive and from middle-class backgrounds, counselors said.

Some officials believe a four-lane highway to Memphis has made drugs more prevalent. Not to mention drugs, promiscuity and violence, which are acceptable behavior in movies and television shows, and teens, in particular, tend to believe it's a suitable lifestyle in real life,

too.

"What is disturbing is that the same behavior that results in unwanted pregnancies, syphilis and other (sexually transmitted diseases) also leads to HIV," said Thompson, which is why health officials are so concerned.

We can fix syphilis. We can fix all of the rest of the (sexually transmitted diseases). But we cannot fix HIV," he said.

Since 1988, 3,163 cases of human immunodeficiency virus, or HIV, have been recorded by the Mississippi state health department. Another 2,107 cases of AIDS have been

In Lee County and 10 surrounding counties, 108 cases of HIV and 101 cases of AIDS have been reported since 1988. Nearly half of the HIV and AIDS cases have been reported in Lee County.

When the virus becomes more prevalent in Lee County, it could mean larger numbers of people will be terminally ill without the resources to pay for medical care, Thompson

Behind sex, sharing needles is the most common way to transmit the deadly AIDS vi-

Intravenous drug use is rarely reported among teens in Mississippi and local law enforcement officials and counselors say they are unaware of local teens injecting drugs.

But Thompson said the state Health Department is receiving anecdotal reports from substance abuse counselors that drug injections by affluent white adolescents in Tupelo are on the rise. And if they are sharing needles, then these teens are putting themselves at risk of catching HIV, he said.

In an age when the public is constantly reminded by health educators and through the media, it's unlikely adults and teens are not aware of the risks of contacting HIV. Many people, particularly teen-agers, do not take precautions because they believe themselves immune, health officials say.

Teens have a sense of immortality, that (AIDS) won't touch them," said one coun-

The state Health Department is making a concerted effort to quickly track down residents who have syphilis or another sexually transmitted disease or who may have had sex with a carrier and to get them evaluated and treated, said Dr. Mary Currier, a state epidemiologist.

But, she said, it is sometimes difficult to track people down and get them in for treat-

Health departments and public health nurses also are trying to make residents more aware of the syphilis outbreak, to educate them about sexually transmitted diseases and to get those who may have put themselves at risk to be checked out by a physician.

The best precaution is a long-term monogamous relationship, Mahaffey said. If not, then males and females both should use protection when having sex.

All sexually transmitted diseases are curable, Mahaffey said, except for HIV.

"If you are HIV positive, you will die of an AIDS-related disease," he said. "It may take two years or it may take 10 years. But you are going to die.

ing updates on national legislation and public policy trends affecting LesBiGay youth in the first two days of the NACYSO meeting.

Jellison, Nelson and Lisowski are scheduled to meet with staff from the offices of Herb Kohl and Russ Feingold. They will also be meeting with staff members from the offices of Representatives Tom Barrett, Jim Senssenbrenner and Gerald Kleczka.

These meetings come at a crucial time. Public hearings, pushed by Right Wing Extremist Lou Sheldon, have been postponed-for now. GYM hopes that by meeting with Congressmen, they will be able to educate the solons about Gay issues.

Earlier this year, Rea Carey, NACYSO coordinator, requested life stories from LesBi-Gay youth nationwide telling of their experiences as Gay youth. Both Nelson and Jellison have submitted their accounts which, most likely, will be submitted to Congressional Representatives to offset negative Right Wing testimony expected at the hearings.

NACYSO, sponsored by the Hetrick-Martin Institute of New York, was formed in October, 1992 and is based in Washington. Its mission is to be an advocate for LesBiGay youth. The Coalition seeks to end discrimination against LesBiGay youth and to ensure their physical and emotional well-being.

NACYSO is committed to educating policy makers, youth-serving organizations and government agencies about these young people and the issues confronting them.

Man Shows No Remorse as He Receives **Death Sentence in Murder of Gay Man**

Tyler, TX-Henry Earl Dunn Jr. has become the second of three defendants to be sentenced to death in the 1993 robbery-slaying of a Tyler-area Gay medical records clerk

A jury of seven women and five men deliberated more than six hours before deciding Thursday night, September 7, that Dunn should die. The same jury convicted Dunn the previous week of capital murder in the November 30, 1993, slaying.

Dunn and Donald Aldrich, who was sentenced to death last year after he also was convicted of murdering Nicolas West, both said the crime resulted, at least partly, from their hatred of Gay people. West, 23, was Gay.

Dunn and Aldrich confessed to abducting West from a Tyler city park and driving him to a clay pit in a rural area outside the East Texas city. There, he where he was robbed of his vehicle and shot at least nine times.

Dunn and Aldrich both recounted how they forced him to kneel and that West was so scared that he defecated in his pants. They also reported that he cried, begging for his life, even as he was being shot.

His pleas made no difference, they were reported to have told police. He was a "fag" and he "deserved to die.

Criminal District Attorney Jack Skeen Jr. said he has yet to decide whether he will seek the death penalty against a third suspect, David Ray McMillan.

Dunn, 21, of Tyler, showed no emotion as the verdict was read. He later told reporters,

'The case isn't over yet.''

During his three-week trial, defense attorneys attempted to shift most of the blame on Aldrich. They described him as a "seasoned criminal" who led vulnerable young men into a life of crime.

Prosecutors, however, contended Dunn should share in the responsibility, especially since evidence clearly showed he fired the fatal shot to the back of West's head.

The state also emphasized the "hate crime" factor in prosecuting Dunn _ more so than it did in Aldrich's trial.

We felt like we needed to put more evidence on the hate aspect of the crime because in the video interview that the defendant did, he made it clear the plan was to go out and attack Gay individuals. That was the initial driving force behind it," Skeen said.

Defense attorney Melvin Thompson said he was surprised by the state's strategy.

'We believed the state was not going to approach it from that angle. I think the need for them to conjure up primal instincts of the jurors-those instincts that make us attracted to the hanging tree-dictated that they had to make this a hate crime," Thompson said.

The West slaying was one in a series of murders of Gay men in Texas. It attracted national attention when Gay groups, in Texas and throughout the country, staged protests, and Aldrich's trial was moved to Kerrville because of extensive publicity in Tyler, about 90 miles east of Dallas.

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
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

'Clockers' Is a Bleak, Yet Wonderfully Moving Film that Should Not be Missed

On the heals of Larry Clark's over-hyped, aptly controversial Kids, comes Spike Lee's unflinching portrayal of inner city life, Clockers. Based upon a Richard Price novel, Clockers is a modern day morality play, a parable of two African-American brothers caught up in a world a drugs and violence.

One brother, Strike (Mekhi Pheifer) is a "clocker", a slang term for the lowest level of drug-dealer who is at it around the clock. Plagued with stomach ulcers, hence his addiction to "chocolate moos", Strike is discontented with his life "on the benches.

The leader and probably the smartest of his little gang, Strike becomes the protégée of drug kingpin Rodney Little(Delroy Lindo). Despite an income of \$1500 a week, Strike dreams of trains, both toy and real and of es-

Strike's brother Victor(Isaiah Washington) is his antithesis: hardworking, honest and above all, working within the system. Only the system isn't working for Victor.

Despite being honest and hardworking and well-like by his employers, Victor has little to show for it, bringing home to his wife and two kids less than \$625 a week before taxes.

Sick and tired of being sick and tired, Victor leaves work early one night and seeks relief in a bottle. Later that night a rival drug dealer is killed. Strike is initially suspected but it is the upstanding and unlikely brother Victor who

While Rocco Klein's murder investigation forms the narrative framework of Clockers, Lee is far more concerned with an examination of the harsh realities of life faced by an entire generation of young African-American males, realities like the desperation, the drugs and the violence, and above all, the absence of options or opportunities or hope.

The sure to be controversial opening credits sequence, with a horrifying, virtually stomachchurning series of images that re-create crime scenes of drug-related murder victims serve to immediately set the stage for Lee and Price's

And Clockers is indeed a very bleak film yet nonetheless eloquently compelling. Assisted by an impressive cast, Lee has created a collection of characters that transcend simple

For Lee there are no true villains nor entirely innocent victims. Rodney Little is a drug dealer but on some curious level does seem to actually care about the young kids that hang around his store front, wanting them to get an education.

Rocco Klein (Scorsese favorite Harvey Keitel) is basically a good, hardworking albeit disillusioned cop willing to bend the rules if necessary. Rocco is unwilling to accept Victor's illogical confession, believing that he is playing innocent dupe of brother Strike.

Rocco's street-wise and far more cynical partner Larry Mazilli is happy to accept this confession handed to them virtually on a silver platter. Mazilli cannot understand why Rocco even cares which brother is the real killer.

Excellent performances abound. Newcomer Mekhi Phifer gives depth to Strike, both dreamer and drug dealer but a drug dealer with a conscious, a young man who, one wonders, might not have grown up very differently under other circumstances.

The always reliable Harvey Keitel invests Rocco with an appealing weariness, a man struggling to make sense of a world that increasingly has few easy answers.

John Turturro does a nice, quirky turn as Mazilli and Isaiah Washington effectively conveys the poignancy of a man struggling to do good in a world that sees fit to thwart any such

Writer-Producer-Director Lee is a unique, a filmmaker with an uncompromising vision and the rare ability to reach a crossover audience of white, middle America. In Clockers, Lee has created a memorable if bleak cautionary tale. It is difficult to image anyone leaving Clockers unmoved.

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'Jeffrey' Is Too Glib, Too Whimsical, Too Broadly Drawn to be a Good Gay Movie

GLENN BISHOP DOES NOT HATE ALL GAY MOVIES. Really. I simply think that this needs to be said before I approach the ea-gerly awaited film version of Paul Rudnick's off-Broadway smash Jeffrey.

Gay and Lesbian movies seem to be just about everywhere these days, but gosh darn it, none of them seem to be very good. Denys Arcand's Love and Human Remains served to perpetuate the myth that all Gay men are serial killers waiting to happen.

The delightful Wigstock showed middle America that Gay men all have a desire to don a wig and a frock. We all don't, trust me. Heaven only knows what I would look like in drag. And speaking of drag, don't get me started on To Wong Foo, Thanks for Everything, Julie Newmar.


It's too bad that I'm not a Lesbian because I just loved The Incredible True Adventure of Two Girls in Love and I liked Go Fish a lot more than a lot of Lesbians that I know. I wasn't wild about Claire of the Moon, but then again, who was?

But back to Jeffrey. Paul Rudnick's play consisted of a series of humorous and touching scenes and sketches about Gay life in the age of AIDS, following the adventures and misadventures of Jeffrey, actor/cater waiter, formerly promiscuous and now in denial.

As best friend Sterling, an interior designer tells Jeffrey, "You're Gay. You're Single. It isn't pretty.

At the gym Jeffrey meets super hunk-throb Steve (Michael T. Wiess). In one of the film's best scenes Jeffrey and Steve engage in a little hot, bench-pressing foreplay. They fall in love and live happily ever after? Wrong. Steve is HIV-positive. Jeffrey is a coward.

In his feature film directorial debut, Christopher Ashley (also the director the of the off-Broadway production), perhaps is too influenced by co-producer screenwriter Rudnick and attempts to almost literally transpose Rudnick's highly theatrical comedy to the entirely too realistic cinematic medium.

Despite a hugely entertaining, big name cast, some wonderful lines and a puppy-like likability, Jeffrey simply doesn't work as a whole.

Perhaps Ashley has attempted to utilize too many cinematic gimmicks that attempt to be smart and clever but merely come off as

The Woody Allen-like title cards through the movie are bland, adding little insight or irony. Maybe the use of the Mother Teresa figure is just plain stupid, not "whimsical" as the production notes would suggest. Perhaps it's just me (Wisconsinite through and through and proud off it), but I found the "escape to Wisconsin" melodrama curious.

Can Rudnick really be suggesting there is no Gay life or AIDS crisis outside of New York? Doesn't he read the Wisconsin Light? I'll have to forward this review to Rudnick's close personal friend and movie reviewer for Premiere magazine, Libby Gelman-Waxner.

Jeffrey's high-profile cast generally acquit themselves quite nicely. In the pivotal part of Jeffrey, Steven Weber is both attractive and likable. Rarely has a Gay character in a mainstream movie been drawn as positively and as sympathetically . Isn't that enough? Well, yes and no.

As if written with heterosexual America in mind, Jeffrey is so average and so ordinary as to be down right dull. You might well ask yourself, as I did, "What does Steve see in him? He's cute but Steve is downright hot!"

That Jeffrey is constantly whining about his fear of sex to Sterling would appear to be particularly out of place given that Sterling's boyfriend Darius has AIDS. Why doesn't Sterling just slap Jeffrey and tell him to grow up!

Michael T. Weiss's Steve is certainly a hunk with a heart. Weiss is particularly effective in portraying Steve's struggle as an HIV-positive Gay man looking for love and life. If anything, Weiss's Steve is too perfect: too handsome, too butch, too built. And too infatuated with Jeffrey. A positive HIV status seems hardly reason for Jeffrey to repeatedly turn him down.

Patrick Stewart is particularly effective in elevating Sterling into a compelling, fullyfleshed out character, well beyond the stereotypical caricature Rudnick created.

Kathy Najimy and Christine Baranski are hilarious in brief bits but Sigourney Weaver, Robert Klein and Nathan Lane seem to have wondered in by mistake during a break from filming another movie.

Bottom line, Jeffrey has some wonderful moments and some very funny lines but is ultimately rather disappointing. The real shame is that there is a story here and a compelling one. Life for Gay men in the '90's has become, as Jeffrey tells Steve, "radioactive".

Sadly first-time director Ashley lets just too many gimmicks and way too much glibness get in the way. Despite it's potential, Rudnick's Jeffrey merely seeks to entertain us, neither offering any solutions, nor providing any real insights. Still, Jeffrey does offer the Gay viewer one great kissing scene, some very cute guys and a happy ending.

Arthur Miller's Play 'The Crucible' Being Filmed as a Protest Against the Right Wing

Ipswich, MA-- On a clear summer's day, the demons that possessed Salem during the witch trials three centuries ago seem far from the make-believe village where The Crucible is being filmed.

But look past the peaked roofs, the grazing goats and sheep, beyond the fields of corn and wheat. Look into the woods, and the demons that supposedly are still about, become a little easier to imagine.

Producer Robert Miller can see them.

Through those woods is the great unknown, perched here on the edge of the continent, Miller said, his eyes on the thickets, ' sorts of horrors in one direction, and the ocean

It had a lot to do with the way the events transpired: the siege mentality of having to protect yourself against the unknowns of the world," he said. "It sets up a predisposition for the kind of hysteria that developed.

Miller is the son of Arthur Miller, on whose play the movie about the 1692 trials is based. As a result of the trials, 20 people were executed and 150 imprisoned for supposedly practicing witchcraft.

Though Miller's play dramatizes the events in long ago Salem, the play was written to show what can happen when a society is taken by hysteria, a hysteria as with the paranoia of the Right as shown in the McCarthy era of the

Though the play has always been popular, the reason for bringing it to the big screen now is that Miller Jr., fears a resurgence of a similar religious and patriotic hysteria in the rantings of the Religious Right.

Now, Miller said, "it's not witches or Communists that are objects of the hysteria, it's women and Gays and immigrants of all kinds, anyone who's different.

Miller led a tour of the nearly completed replica of Salem village. It will be up to Winona Ryder, Daniel Day-Lewis and the rest of the cast to bring it to life when they begin shooting the 20th Century Fox film.

The set was built on Hog Island, a short barge ride away from Castle Hill near Crane Beach. It took a crew of mostly local carpenters two months to re-create the village. The state mobilized the national guard to move house trailers, trees, animals and hay with

The homes feature period roofs and huge brick fireplaces, chicken coops, corrals and pig sties. Day-Lewis was on the set for weeks and helped to build one of the barns.

A local farmer planted a corn field, which sprouted despite the dry earth and salt water surrounding it. A 100-year-old Zecova tree was planted outside the meeting house to add more greenery.

A historical consultant supervised the selection of farm animals, finding breeds indigenous to that period of history. Gardens are filled with flax and hops, mint and lavender and other herbs and vegetables common in the



Religious Right Prepares for Election '96 in New Hampshire, Iowa and Wisconsin

Merrimack, NH-Observers say a vote by the School Board last week in this small New Hampshire town to ban references to homosexuality is another example of "the Radical Right" flexing its political muscle in a key presidential selection state in preparation for the election primary in 1996.

On August 14, Merrimack once again drew national attention as the school board became the first in New England to ban books, discussions or counseling that presents Gay people in a positive light.

In the past year, Merrimack has been in the media spotlight for debates about whether to require a moment of silence before classes and whether to teach the mythology of creation science alongside the theory of evolution.

Critics argue these battles and similar ones in Iowa and elsewhere around the country, including the school choice battle in Wisconsin, are being used to gauge the growing clout of the religious right.

"I don't think its any accident that all this is happening in Iowa, Wisconsin and New Hampshire," said Mary Jean Collins, national field director for People For The American Way, which monitors the political activity of the Christian Right nationwide.

I think its the Christian Coalition and other conservative groups getting ready for the '96 elections," she said.

That kind of talk is just "liberal paranoia," said Paul Nagy, the Christian Coalition's Northeast regional coordinator.

We are not meeting in any kind of war room or anything and dividing up New Hampshire and Wisconsin and Iowa to become the religious political battleground of the country," Nagy said. "No we are not doing that."

In either case, GOP presidential candidates are watching the fight in New Hampshire and other states with interest because religious groups such as the Christian Coalition can make a big difference in February's caucuses and primary elections throughout the country.

Merrimack's July 4th parade attracted Republican presidential hopefuls Pat Buchanan, Sens. Bob Dole and Phil Gramm and conservative radio talk show host Alan Keyes, as well as Gov. Steve Merrill and Rep. Bill Zeliff, (R-NH) It was an impressive lineup for the southern New Hampshire town of 22,000

Buchanan has named school board member Shelley Uscinski, a Christian Coalition member who spoke at the coalition's National School Board Training Seminar in Atlanta in May, to help run his New Hampshire presidential campaign.

Informed sources say that if the homophobic Buchanan carries the state, she will bilk large in his campaign strategy.

And in May, Ralph Reed, national leader of the 400,000-member coalition, addressed the state Senate, a privilege usually reserved for state and national leaders. He also spoke at a private breakfast meeting that attracted Merrill, at least seven state senators and more than a dozen state representatives.

Reed denied that his group will place no special emphasis on New Hampshire because of the presidential primary, and will not endorse a candidate, but said it will distribute voter education material and urge its members to vote.

But what the Christian Coalition proclaims publicly and does privately are two different things, Coleman says, referring to Reed's now-famous "stealth" comment where he said he engaged in "guerilla warfare ... you don't know it's over until you're in a body

With New Hampshire's first-in-the-nation presidential primary seven months away, the Christian right is using "hot-button" issues such as a moment of silence, creationism and anti-Gay rhetoric, to pilot political debate towards its own agenda, said Ken Coleman, Merrimack School Board member and president of the New Hampshire Coalition for Edu-

Because New Hampshire is a small state and the campaign is high profile, it's the perfect place for the Christian Coalition to get the most bang for its buck," Coleman said.

"Presidential politics and the Christian Coalition's national agenda have converged in Merrimack," he said. "By forcing these issues in Merrimack, they've forced them into the national political debate."

The Christian Coalition has no special interest in Merrimack, Nagy countered.

"Merrimack New Hampshire is not a testing ground for our national agenda," he said. Our national agenda is the Contract With the American Family and that is what we are promoting and we are promoting it across the country.

The actions of the Merrimack School Board and a bitter battle in Des Moines, Iowa, to block re-election of gay school board candidate Jonathan Wilson have been high-profile battles backed by the Christian right, according to Kevin Jennings, executive director of Gay, Lesbian and Straight Teachers Network, a New York organization that tracks homosexual discrimination in schools nationwide.

Less obvious is the Right's push in Wiscon-

sin to try and get court approval for public money for its schools.



Of course, when a natural flow, be it the sex drive or the Colorado River, is tampered with, or damned as it is in many cases, especially and most predominantly among Gay males, the force of all that pent up energy must go somewhere. If not, as the principles of the atom bomb seem to suggest, an explosion, large and powerful, will result.

Though pumping up at the gym, eating out in restaurants, the proliferation of coffee outlets and the spread of bookstore chains certainly allows for some energy runoff, sooner or later, the arts, the ultimate receptacle of all our dreams, both thwarted and realized, is bound to house our unused spendings.

Although I'm not one to dwell, at least overtly, on my own diminished sex life, Murray Schisgal's recent off-Broadway play, Circus Life, set me thinking and led me to write this piece. Oddly, I needed a push from this 70 year-old heterosexual mainstream playwright and I thank him for that.

It all started when 40-something Howard, one of the main characters in Schisgal's play, having jut reluctantly ended his first extramarital affair with a female client, turns to his law partner and quite unexpectedly says; "We've reached a point in time, buddy, when

Since seeing Circus Life, I have been obsessed with the thought of what it is that gets me through the day. I have come to the conclusion that sex, even the mere promise of it, is the carrot dangling before my eyes, the lubricant that assuages my pain.

Sex certainly does get me through the day and judging from many of the movies and plays, not to mention the headlines, I am not alone in my thinking.

More than ever, since enjoyable sex on a regular basis, in or out of a relationship, sex that lasts more than fifteen minutes, seems to be in total eclipse.

The subject of sex, whether searching for it, talking about it, thinking about it, doing it, or just plain watching it, seems to be on everybody's mind; on every stage, screen and in every newspaper headline.

Voyeurism has become de rigueur. Fetishism, a way of life.

It's as if suddenly, some rocket scientist discovered that what people were no longer able to get on the streets freely, meet at a party or take home from a bar, they would be more than willing to pay for at the box office.

The promise of sex is the basic selling proposition. We are offered a panoply of prolonged striptease, post and pre-coital conversations and coitus interruptus of varying kinds.

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
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For us, imagination and fastasy have replaced the reality of doing the dirty. Other people are living our lives and, what's more, getting paid for it.

I don't mind letting Tom Cruise to the acting, but I want to do my own fucking, don't

The arts, not at all unlike recent Calvin Klein advertising, which had blatantly switched its focus from the exposed tops of underwear directly to the genital area of the young models (before Right Wing pressure forced their removal), are increasingly parading beautiful bodies, in many cases with full frontal nudity and simulated sex, across stage and screen and into our faces.

On screen and stage, everybody is making love to everybody. It is this "basic instinct" that got Sharon Stone to spread her legs and Richard Gere, Tom Cruise and even Michael Douglas to flash their butts. Make no mistake, the waters are being tested. We are inching ever closer to seeing the sex act itself. I can practically taste it. Hello Cable.

If you think the thrust of this piece somewhat exaggerated, consider the opening scene from **Jeffrey** and the closing scene of **Kids**' and listen to the words of the main characters themselves as they speak plaintively, with little apology, directly to the audience.

Thirty-something Jeffrey, after cavorting across the screen, through several unsuccessful sexcapades, one in which his condom breaks, turns to the audience and says, "I'm not promiscuous. That's such an ugly word. I'm cheap. I love sex. I don't know how to say it. I always have. I always thought sex was the reason to grow up.

"But I want to be politically correct about this. I know it's wrong to say that Gay men are obsessed with sex. Because that's not true. All human beings are."

The young actors in **Kids** echo similar sentiments.

As the movie ends, a voice-over, perhaps that of Everyboy, announces, "Fucking is what I love. Take it away from me and I really got nothing."

Yes, even kids know that sex makes the world go round. AIDS or no AIDS, we've got to get it somehow and the arts, it seems, however secondhand the experience may be, is increasingly supplying that need.

So let it come as no surprise that while our beds are empty, our theatre and movie seats are full. We're getting it any way we can.



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





Interview With Bill Hart, Milwaukee Aldermanic Candidate in 3rd District

Bill Hart, the Executive Director of ACHOICE, community volunteer and political consultant, is running for Milwaukee Alderman in the 3rd District.

The following is a transcription of a conversation that he had with "Light" when he stopped by the office the other day.

Wisconsin Light: To get right to the point, what has motivated you to run?

Bill Hart: I have lived in Milwaukee all my life. I love this city and the 3rd District where my wife and I live. I am concerned for it. I want to help make it continue, as it has been, the best possible place to live in and work in, a place to raise a family.

I grew up on the South Side, but I have lived on the East Side since 1987. There was Bradford Beach as a boy and the Brady Street Festivals as a young adult. These are memories that I cherish.

I enjoy campaigning. I enjoy meeting the people. For every one person who doesn't want to talk, there are 20 who do. We have some great conversations and I've made friends, so many new friends. I think that's

Whether its along Lake Shore Drive or on Brady Street, I consider every contact I have with a voter to be a job interview. When I'm elected. I will continue to see it that way

WL: What do you think of as the themes

of your campaign?

BH: Customer Service, Teamwork and Quality of Life. But those are more to me than just campaign themes. They are the way I live

By Customer Service I mean that my constituents deserve the best from me that I can possibly give. I will be an elected servant, after all. Property taxes pay for city government. People deserve the best for their money.

Therefore, I will keep in very close contact with the voters. I will respond to all calls promptly and politely.

By Teamwork I mean that, in my mind, being an Alderman is a cooperative venture between the people and the Alderperson. I see it as part of my job to forge partnerships, build coalitions and solve problems, like graffiti for example.

There are many high rise apartment buildings in the 3rd District. They add to the District's diversity, but sometimes it makes it difficult for people to meet their elected officials.

I will actively seek to be invited to meetings and community forums, where I can listen, learn, and answer what questions I can. And if I don't know the answer, you can bet I'll find out and get back to whoever asked it.

By Quality of Life I mean, as I've said, to work as hard as I can to keep the 3rd District the most attractive place to live in in Milwaukee. That's why I'm concerned with the graffiti problem-and the problem we face with crime.

But by Quality of Life I mean too that we must strive to create opportunities for those less fortunate than ourselves. Our city needs strong neighborhoods, not only in the 3rd District, but in the entire city as well. I will do everything humanly possible to foster those.

WL: If you're elected, would you sign a proclamation on Gay Pride?

BH: (without hesitation) Yes. I would also introduce a bill to provide for domestic partner benefits in Milwaukee.

WL: Can you tell us a little about your

background?

BH: Well, currently, I am the Executive Director of ACHOICE, where I'm responsible for the management of Milwaukee's fastest growing workplace giving federation. Currently there are 32 community-based organization in our federation-including the Cream City Foundation.

I'm proud of the fact that since I've headed it up, ACHOICE has tripled its revenues and doubled its member agencies. I really am proud of that.

(Pat McFarland, Board President of ACHOICE, said, "Bill Hart energetically works to create a world that works for everyone. My only hesitation in recommending him for Alderman is my concern in losing a sincere and talented Executive Director at ACHOICE."

I was part of the Wisconsin Action Coalition where I organized citizens and constituent groups on health care reform.

I have recently started my own business, Direct Impact, that specializes in creative voter contact and fundraising. My clients include Milwaukee County Supervisors Karen Ordinans and Dorothy Dean and State Representatives Antonio Riley and Sheldon Wasserman.

(Wasserman said of Hart, "He was an integral part of my upset win in November. Bill Hart is one of Milwaukee's rising stars. His dedication to making Milwaukee a better place to live is unquestioned.)

Dykes To Watch Out For



John Boswell's Death Should Remind Us to Take LesBiGay Relationships Seriously

Census folk tally a generation as twenty-five years. But in the Gay world-even before the temporal compressions worked by AIDS-a generation logs about every seven years, sometimes quicker. This feature of Gay time was driven home to me anew by John Boswell's obituary in Christmas Sunday's New York Times.

I rubbed my eyes: he was only three years older than me. Though in both person and photo he always appeared an agelessly angelic youth, his career had been so accomplished and he had done so much personally for me, so much (how to say) paternally for me, that it was hard to imagine that but three New Years separated our births.

Boswell's 1980 book, Christianity, Social Tolerance, and Homosexuality, dashed the taboo covering Gay subjects in academe. It cleared the space in which Gay studies began to grow exponentially and initiated Gayaffirming discourses in the wider public

Especially since it now appears that Gay progress for a long time will have to take the form of cultural, rather than political change, the value of Boswell's work for Gays is ines-

Published just five months before his death, oswell's final book is a history and prizing or Gay marriage., Its main cultural import and challenge is for Gays-and others-to take Gay relationships more seriously. It invites us to view Gayness, not as something that, like eye color or an earring, one might have in splendid isolation, but as something, like loving and caring, which is a relational property, a connection between persons, a human bonding, one in need of tendance and social con-

Think about it.

For me, Boswell performed that thankless ivory tower chore whose real world counterpart is helping friends move. He wrote letters of recommendation-ones that got me years off to write Gays/Justice (1988) and Gay Ideas (1992) and one that got me promoted to full professor. I think about these good deeds

But Boswell was no saint. He could be quite a grouch and his obit gave cause for moral puzzlement.

Boswell's writings possessed the real world virtues of candor, boldness and courage that are usually the first things to go in an institution as bureaucratic as the academy. So, I was surprised to see that, apparently at his behest, his obit did not take advantage of the Times' concession to the emerging institutionalization of Gay marriage.

Further, for years Boswell had told people, including me, that his long illness was "just"

Lyme Disease, not AIDS. Perhaps these events have innocent explanations, but a fair cultural read of them suggests that in our actual lived experience (whatever our ideals may be), we Gay folk, even at our best, have made little moral progress beyond Rock Hudson and

It is, of course, unreasonable to expect heroism in every dimension of a person's life. We should be glad that it occurs at all. And Boswell's heroism is already having real world effects on our Gay generations

Christmas Eve, the day of Boswell's death, the post brought me a card of greetings from a Gay graduate student with whom I'd been corresponding a bit, but about whose personal circumstances I knew nothing. The photocard's classic format of family snapshot plus Xmas messge is the sort of thing that has made Olin Mills the Cambells Soup of the photo in-

Well, the student and his lover had just adopted an infant. And there they all are, without the slightest hint of irony or camp, posed against a brick wall with a piece of couch art at head level; the dads, in matching rented tuxedos, beam with pride as they jointly hold up baby Joshua swaddled only in a dia-

The photograph is at once a rune and an icon of Gay family, an imploding yet radiant fusion of American gothic and Gay Bethlehem. Admittedly, at first the photo struck me as a little bit silly6, even as it was a great deal wonderful. Silly because my feelings weren't usually up there where my mind tells me my pride is.

As I sorted out my feelings, I was taken back half a dozen years to remember another Gay family event, the one and only Gay wedding I've attended. I didn't bother to take a present, not because I was a skinflint, but because—shamefully—I clearly wasn't taking Gay relationships seriously enough, even though by that time I'd already been in one for

We have learned much from Boswell's writings, but I suspect we-and our future generations too-still have much to learn.
