Valentine's Day Sees Gay Marriage Caught Up in a Firestorm of Debate

Honolulu--The state House Judiciary Committee on Tuesday night, January 23rd virtually closed the door to any action by the Legislature this election year on the thorny issue of same-sex marriage.

The committee supported Chairman Terrance Tom's recommendation to kill bills variously calling to establish same-sex marriage, provide for domestic partnerships or allow certain benefits for domestic partners.

Tom then deferred action on three bills that would put the issue of same-sex marriages to the voters in the form of amendments to the state Constitution.

"These matters will be deferred until the committee and myself believe there has been adequate discussion to make a decision on this issue," Tom said following a six-hour hearing in the Capitol auditorium. He said he hasn't decided whether he would arrange for any further discussion on the issue in the current session.

One reason, Tom said, was that the Commission on Sexual Orientation and the Law established by the Legislature last year failed to address the question of whether the voters who approved the 1978 constitutional amendment barring sex discrimination should be asked if they intended it to apply to same-sex marriages.

It was the gender discrimination amendment that the state Supreme Court cited in its May 1993 ruling that the state could not deny three same-sex couples marriage licenses unless it could show a compelling public interest in such discrimination.

Tom noted that the 1994 Legislature voted to reject the high court's interpretation of the constitution and the voters intent when they voted to approve a ban on discrimination based on sexual orientation.

The commission majority's proposal to legalize same-sex marriages "glosses over the fact that the majority of the people of this state do not support such a proposal at this time and that such marriages are unlikely to be recognized either by the federal government or other states," Tom said, noting some states are already acting to bar same-sex

Milwaukee—1:30 p.m., January 26, 1996. Cold, overcast and damp. It matches our mood. Room 146, the Criminal Justice Building. Mandi's friends-We are all here. We talk. We want revenge-not simply justice for Mandi. We hope horrible things will happen to Joseph Flinchbaugh in prison. Wisconsin does not have the death penalty. We want Mandi back. We know that is not possible. We want closure. We must wait for that.

2:25 p.m. Joseph Flinchbaugh is brought into the courtroom. He is wearing prison orange. He appears cocky. He sneers when he sees us sitting there. His attorney is with him. Mr. Flinchbaugh is asked if he wants to waive his rights to this preliminary hearing. He says no. Commissioner Audry Brooks reads the charges against him-Intentional Homicide in the first degree. No plea is entered—this is a

The state will call two witnesses to reinforce

the charges.

The first is Dr. John Teggatz, Milwaukee County Medical Examiner and forensic pathologist who is brief and to the point. Mandi suffered multiple stab wounds to the upper left

side of his body. The deepest being about 3 inches missing his heart. He also suffered from multiple blows with a blunt object. It is believed the object was a heavy shoe or bootpossible still being worn. No single one of these would have caused death.

The primary cause of death was strangulation by use of a necktie, and it was still around his neck. According to the medical examiner-Mandi's throat was also cut. It is believed this occurred after death or at least after loss of

Three Openly Gay Candidates for Dane County Board, Face Tough Primary

Madison-Dane County could be without openly Lesbian or Gay representation on the Dane County Board for the first time in recent history if the LGB community is not mobilized behind three openly Gay candidates. This would be especially ironic, observers say, given that by next April, Dane County could very well make history by electing the nation's first openly Gay or Lesbian County Executive.

The plot thickens-read on. More than almost any primary in recent history, this Tuesday's elections represent a

time when literally every vote will count. These elections may seem to come out of the blue because they are being held earlier than usual this year. (The state's new, earlier March 19th presidential primary date is the

Given that the only non-local race on the ballot is the primary race for the Wisconsin State Supreme Court, that could mean a frightfully low turn-out-which either represents a great danger or a great opportunity for Dane County's current crop of openly Gay candi-

With three-term supervisor Mark Pocan's impending retirement, Sup. Scott McCormick is the only openly Gay incumbent seeking reelection, and he faces a tight, three-way race in his notoriously low turn-out UW-Madison campus district.

Openly Gay newcomers Alan Furnas in the non-city of Madison) southside and Darren Kittleson on Madison's far southwest side, are underdogs in tough races, although both seem to be fielding well-organized campaigns.

Scott McCormick

McCormick, a close confidante and friend of Dane County Executive Rick Phelps (who recently announced he will not seek re-election in 1997), is unabashedly progressive in his politics, but is seen as a bridge-builder between the progressive and conservative fac-tions around AIDS issues and issues of concern to the LGB community.

Alan Furnas


What he lacks in name recognition, Alan Furnas, a manager of housing for people with developmental disabilities, is making up for in solid organizing. He is coordinating closely with other progressive county board candidates, and is working particularly closely with African-American community leaders, Sup. Regina Rhyne and former Sup. Eyvonne Crawford-Gray, who are running to represent adjacent southside districts.

Based on high standards of viability and his stance on issues of importance to the LGB community, Furnas has received the endorsement of the Gay and Lesbian Victory Fund.

Darren Kittleson

Enmeshed in a four-way race for the far west side First District seat currently held by progressive leader Carol Brooks, is Darren

face, Louganis announced to the world that several months prior to the 1988 Olympics, he had tested positive for HIV

Resort Manager Apologizes: Servers Wore Gloves

Alexandria, MN-AP-A resort official has apologized after some employees wore latex gloves while serving food to participants in a Gay and Lesbian conference. The glove incident happened Saturday night, January 27th, at the Radisson Arrowwood Resort during the second annual Out Front Activist Conference, attended by Gay, Lesbian, Bisexual and Transgender ac-

The 175 participants applauded the resort's general manager, Greg Parsons, when he apologized for some servers' actions and accepted conference organizers' offer to help train staff members about the AIDS virus. "It wasn't a protest. I think it was just naïveté, and some lack of sensitivity," Parsons said later about the servers' actions. Parsons said only a few of the resort's food servers put on latex gloves and removed them as soon as conference participants objected.

Speaking with reporters later, Parsons said the hotel could not "afford to discriminate against anyone. This is a very bad thing that happened.

The incident was a potentially embarrassing one for the Radisson because it happened in front of Melinda Paras, the executive director of the National Gay and Lesbian Task Force, one of the most influential gay and lesbian rights organizations in the country.

The Out Front Conference is designed to give activists from across Minnesota, Wisconsin and the Dakotas an opportunity to develop policies and plans of action on issues ranging from fundraising, to antiviolence and harassment measures.

Results Awaited on Baboon Marrow Transplant

San Francisco-AP-Jeff Getty, a person living with AIDS, who received a Baboon marrow transplant to bolster his immune system on December 14th, waits at his Oakland home to find out if it was successful. Although it will be six months or more before all the results are in, the first indication of the battle's outcome is expected in a week or so.

"If something goes wrong, if I come down with a Baboon virus, if it proves not to work, at least I got off my ass and did something," Getty said. "I didn't just lie down and die." As reported in Light, Baboons are not infected by the AIDS virus. Researchers hope that immunity

There are no signs that the transplanted immune cells attacked their host. And Getty's immune system apparently has not rejected the Baboon cells.

Dutch To Offer Help to Third World Gays

Amsterdam, Holland-AP-Believing that Gay rights are human rights, Dutch government officials said on January 24th that they plan to offer financial support to Gay and Lesbian organizations in developing countries. The Ministry of Development Cooperation will instruct Dutch embassies in Africa, Asia, Latin America and the Caribbean to keep an eye out for local groups needing financial or other assistance, a spokesman said. The plan was decided on after a meeting with Dutch Gay and Lesbian organizations.

Madison's United Begins Director Hire; Elects Richard Kilmer as Board President

Madison- The United, Madison's social service agency for the LGB community in south central Wisconsin, has announced that it is now hiring a new director, says Richard Kilmer, the organization's newly elected board president.

Hiring for the position, which has been occupied by former United treasurer Sande Janagold since the resignation of long-time director Jane VanderBosch last Spring, had been on hold while the organization completed a strategic planning process, Kilmer said. Through a lot of hard work during a difficult time, Kilmer believes the organization is now moving back onto a significantly more solid footing.

The position is being advertised as 30 hours a week at a compensation level of \$22,000 per year (or a full-time "rate" of approximately \$30,000 per year).

Given that the agency could not afford more competitive salary right away, this arrangement (which allows the director to pursue school or other outside consulting work) makes the position much more competitive than it might have been.

Kilmer also points out that the word "executive" has been dropped from the former title of "executive director" in part to symbolize a period of more realistic expectations for the person assuming the job.

"Because we're the only show in town doing what we do, very often The United's director has been expected to be all things to all people. And those expectations are neither realistic nor fair to the person, the organization, or to the community," Kilmer said.

The responsibilities of the new director are succinctly described in the job description as "administration, supervision, and community relations," which encompasses such duties as oversight of operations and contract compliance, grant writing, major donor solicitations, public speaking, and supervision of staff.

Kilmer says that he is gratified that his predecessor as president, Greg Hines, will remain on the board, lending his wealth of experience to the new board members.

Kilmer, who works as a pharmacist at Community Pharmacy, is a long-time community leader. He was a principal organizer of GALVAnize's massively successful 1989 march for Gay and Lesbian rights, which drew almost 8,000 people from all over Wisconsin and the Midwest to Madison.

Kilmer is a veteran of some of the more bruising political feuds in Madison, including the often divisive chaos that descended on GALVAnize following the 1989 march that almost resulted in the dissolution of what only a few months before had been a highly successful organization.

While The United is doing well on many levels, including a year just passed that in-cluded four highly successful fundraisers, Kilmer realizes that this is a daunting time for

Volunteer recruitment has slipped significantly, there were bad feelings following VanderBosch's resignation, and critics of the group point to a lack of direction in the organization's mission.

"I believe from my experiences with MASN and GALVAnize that I can make The United a strong organization," Kilmer said. "I want to see The United be more visible in the community and reach out and be a strong voice.

One of Kilmer's dreams, shared by many in the community, is that The United can be a catalyst for an LGB community center in Madison.

Researchers Wrong About Suspected AIDS Case


London, England-AP-Two British researchers say they were mistaken in claiming that AIDS was present in Britain as early as 1959. In a letter published in The Lancet, in the last week in January, Andrew Bailey and Gerald Corbitt of Manchester Royal Infirmary said the tissue samples had been contaminated in the laboratory. The original research, published in The Lancet in July, 1990, reported the AIDS virus was detected in tissues from a British sailor in 1959, 20 years earlier than the disease was thought to have reached the country. "We must conclude that we find no evidence to suggest that the 1959 Manchester patient carried the HIV genome," they


HRC Joins Minnesota Gays to Fight the Right

Alexandria, MN- The Human Rights Campaign (HRC) has joined forces with Minnesota's Gay and Lesbian Community Action Council in a partnership aimed at fighting anti-Gay state legislation. HRC calls this partnership "the first of many" such envisioned between HRC and state Lesbian and Gay organizations.

As part of the partnership, HRC will contribute \$5,000 to the Action Council to hire a lobbyist for the upcoming legislative session. There are serious threats from religious zealots and others of the Far Right to remove sexual orientation from the statewide civil rights law and to cut off funds to state programs that serve Lesbian and Gay youth.

In return, the Action Council will help HRC identify key contacts in each Minnesota congressional district who might be willing to serve as coordinators for HRC's federal legislative efforts. The Action Council with also work with HRC to persuade members of the Minnesota congressional delegation to become sponsors of the Employment Non-Discrimination Act.

Wagner a Candidate for County Executive in 1997? Is Baldwin Heading For Congress?

Madison-Dane County Executive Rick Phelps' unexpected announcement on January 24th that he will not run for re-election in 1997, resulted in a flurry of speculation about who might succeed him—and several openly Gay and Lesbian politicians have been prominently mentioned.

State Rep. Tammy Baldwin's office was deluged by reporter's calls-given her expertise in county issues, and the likelihood that the County Executive's office might be a stepping stone to her all-but stated goal of a run for Congress.

After the speculation simmered for a few days, Baldwin declared herself to be a noncandidate for County Exec. However, insiders say that initial strategy sessions with the goal of developing a game plan for a Congressional race may begin soon.

Also mentioned as a candidate for County Exec., was Sup. Mark Pocan who opted out as well for the time being. Speaking on WTSO's radio show for the LesBiGay community, "Inside Out," Pocan said he plans to remain political, but not in the context of an elected official anytime soon.

However, political insiders say that it is likely that former County Board Chair Dick Wagner, the long-time dean of Dane County's openly Lesbian and Gay delegation, is actively exploring the possibility of a run for the County Exec's seat, a position for which he is eminently qualified.

Since leaving the board two years ago, Wagner has been lauded for his role as a conciliator in urging the contentious board to return to a time of relatively civil discourse. Wagner, who works as a budget analyst for the state, is also uniquely qualified in his understandings of county budgetary issues

If elected, he would be the first openly Lesbian or Gay official to head a county government in the country. Dane County, with almost 400,000 people, is Wisconsin's second

AIDS Workers See Time Running Out for Meaningful State Health Insurance Reform

Milwaukee—On Wednesday, January 24th, the Wisconsin State Senate Committee on Insurance voted 5-1 in favor of AB416, this session's health insurance reform legislation, sending the bill to the floor for further action. AIDS workers believe that action needs to include amendments to the bill to provide greater access to the private health insurance market.

"Access to health care is the highest priority on the AIDS agenda this year," said Mike Gifford, Director of Public Policy for the AIDS Resource Center of Wisconsin (ARCW). "This bill retreats on important reforms designed to create greater access that were introduced by the Governor and supported by a bipartisan majority of legislators last session."

Gifford was referring to two amendments that ARCW and the Wisconsin AIDS Response Network (WARN) are working to have amended to the bill.

They include biennial open enrollment which establishes a 30 day period every other year during which people can purchase insurance and receive coverage for all of their medical conditions. This concept is based on sound health policy that in cases of chronic and terminal illness, the State needs to ensure that people can access coverage for early medical care and can efficiently utilize the health care system, thus remaining independent of State

ARCW and WARN also support modified community rating which affirms the historic

basis of health insurance by spreading the risk of costly health conditions among the largest number of individuals. It ends the current practice of charging significantly more for those who are ill and significantly less for those who are well and helps to make health insurance accessible to all.

"For too long, people with HIV/AIDS have been denied health insurance," Gifford said. "These two provisions go a long way in opening up the private insurance market to people living with HIV and AIDS while having a nominal impact on the insurance industry."

AB416 as reported out of Committee, includes two minimal health insurance reforms. Portability will provide for continuous coverage in the event a policyholder changes jobs and guarantee issue will end the practice of denying health insurance to members of group policies.

"The bill also includes an important new funding mechanism for the State's Health Insurance Risk Sharing Pool (HIRSP) which assures this program remains a viable option for our clients," said Gifford.

"Final action on this bill will be in the next several weeks. Our time to act is now," Gifford said.

ARCW encourages everyone to call their State Senator—1-800-362-9472—and tell them to support biennial open enrollment and modified community rating in health insurance reform.

Wisconsin Research Consortium Changes its Name to Provide Clarity on its Mission

Milwaukee—In order to provide greater name recognition and community clarity on the agency's mission, the Wisconsin Community-Based Research Consortium (WCRC) has changed its name to the Wisconsin AIDS Research Consortium (WARC) effective February, 1996.

ary, 1996.
WARC, the clinical research division of the AIDS Resource Center of Wisconsin (ARCW), was established in 1993 in order to provide access to experimental drug trials through local physicians' offices.

Clinical or experimental drug trials are conducted by pharmaceutical companies as part of the process to receive FDA approval. If approved, the new drugs are then available on the open market.

Since the start of the organization, WARC has secured clinical trials from large pharmaceutical organizations, including Upjohn Pharmacia, Glaxo-Wellcome, Bristol Myers Squibb, and Abbott Laboratories. Without the efforts of WARC, many individuals with HIV who access medical care through physicians who are not affiliated with universities or other academic settings, would otherwise not be able to access experimental drug trials.

WARC currently provides patient access to drug trials in Milwaukee, Racine and Kenosha, Madison, and Green Bay and plans for future expansion.

Currently, WARC is enrolling in two drug trials. The first, an Upjohn trial, involves a new class o anti-HIV drugs called nonnucleoside reverse transcriptase inhibitors.

The second, a Pharmaceutical Products De-



"Passages of Pride" is a Must-Read Book for Anyone Interested in Gay Youth

Passages of Pride By Kurt Chandler Random House, HC, 300pp

Their journey begins early.

For as long as they can remember, from five, six, seven years-old, they have felt "different," say Gay and Lesbian youth, nothing that they could fix a label to at such an early age, yet something that set them apart and deepened as they grew into their teenage

By early adolescence, say Gay teens, they were aware of an affection for people of the same gender. Sometimes it came as an attraction or a sexual fantasy, a crush on a teacher, a lingering glance in the locker room. Whatever it was, they kept it to themselves .

Adolescence is tough enough. But to suddenly put a word to their lifelong "difference," a word used so contemptuously in society-Lesbian or Gay-can be a wounding experience for teens. On top of all their fear and confusion, they become vulnerable targets of harassment, prejudice, and hatred.

So begins Kurt Chandler's landmark book, Passages of Pride: Lesbian and Gay Youth Come of Age. This is a book that should be required reading for school board members from coast to coast-and everyone charged with the care and nurturing of our nation's

Any one of us who remembers the fear and isolation that we felt growing up as we realized we might be profoundly "different" wishes we could help make a world where kids wouldn't have to live through that experience again. However, the whole idea that a teenager might actually be able to be "out" in high school is mind boggling to me.

Chandler charts the voyage of six Gay and Lesbian teens through the difficult waters of adolescence. He evokes an intimate, and often heart-wrenching, portrayal of their pain. But this is not a story about living on the fringes, or about hopelessness and discouragement.

The book is a powerfully universal "Coming of Age" story that gets to the core of our strengths as Lesbian, Gay and Bisexual people. For in coming to terms with their own Gayness, Derek, Amy, Dan, Troy, Michele, and Tara reach deep into themselves to discover the essence of who they are in a way that goes beyond the consequences of their sexual orientation. These are stories of courage, integrity and conviction-and these are young people who seem to possess a depth of maturity that belies their youth.

Chandler's book began as a remarkable award-winning 20 page supplement to the Minneapolis Star Tribune, first published in December, 1992.

Rita Reed, an openly Lesbian photographer for the paper, initiated the project as an extension of her own work in the community with Gay and Lesbian youth. Her evocative photos showed both her subjects' extreme isolation and their joy.


Due to an editor's decision to limit the book to a prose-only format, Reed's photos did not become part of the book. However, Chandler's powerful word pictures call forth so much about these kids that readers won't notice that the photos are missing.

For Chandler himself, writing the book has involved a journey that still continues. A middle-aged father and husband, he recently left daily journalism to work as an author and freelancer, returning to the Milwaukee area where he had spent his youth.

Given his background as a journalist, Chandler covers his subject with a thoroughness and descriptive crispness that provides a solid factual framework for a narrative that evokes intimacy and emotional intensity. He gets inside the hearts and heads of these kids and their families in an incredible way.

He's chosen an innovative format for his book that weaves the young people's lives together with information about resources and the greater Lesbian and Gay movement, in the process, he provides a well-grounded context for readers for whom this is also unexplored

He devotes three chapters to each of his six subjects, weaving their stories together throughout the book into a rich tapestry of a shared voyage of discovery.

Although Chandler traveled to both coast in writing this book, there's a distinctly Midwestern flavor to his work. It conveys a Midwestern common sense about the Lesbian and Gay struggle that defies the Radical Right's notion that we are somehow anti-family.

As a so-called "outsider," Chandler's view of our movement is a cornucopia of valuable insights. More than any other book I've read this year with the exception of Urvashi Vaid's Virtual Equality, Chandler's Passages of Pride succeeds in providing a comprehensive overview of both our movement's strengths and weaknesses.

Youth vs. Age

One of the most difficult chapters to read is his discussion of the barriers that older Gay men and Lesbians face in reaching out to Gay youth. He does so without judgment, but the

As Gay men and Lesbians, we have far too often let "molestation myths" and the public's general homophobia-based wariness around issues involving Gay youth prevent us from reaching out to these kids.


The kids aren't as alone as they used to be, but things still have a long way to go. Chandler thoroughly documents encouraging signs of change symbolized by the Lesbian and Gay youth centers that are taking hold in places like Seattle, Indianapolis, New York and in the Twin Cities.

Madison's teen support group is one example of the beginnings of essential support.

Passages of Pride is a story of hope and courage, but for all too many Gay and Lesbian youth, the realization of self involves being booted out of their home, rejection by their peers, or, in frighteningly high numbers,

Kurt Chandler, Author of "Passages of Pride," Talks About His Book

While slugging coffee at the local Comet coffee shop here in Milwaukee, I happened to run into Kurt Chandler, author of Passages of Pride: Lesbian and Gay Youth Come of Age. He was gracious enough to give me an interview so that I could better understand what went into his book.

Jason Alan Medard: Tell me a little about "Passages of Pride." Where did it start? How did it start?

Kurt Chandler: The book grew out of a newspaper project I was working on back in 1992. I was asked by a colleague of mine (Rita Reed), who is a Lesbian, if I was interested in working on a project that would document the lives of Gay and Lesbian teenagers

I was skeptical at first. I thought there was no way we were going to find any teenagers to talk to us, much less allow us to use their names in a newspaper and be photographed.

But, after about 2 or 3 months of knocking on doors, contacting leaders of support groups and school officials, months of hanging around coffee houses, we did find a number of teenagers who were courageous enough to work with us on this project.

The result was a special newspaper supplement that was published in a special section of the Minneapolis Star Tribune in December, 1992. From there, I went on to work on my own on this book.

(Chandler added that in writing Passages of Pride, he went on to interview Gay and Lesbian teens from around the country. In addition, he also interviewed sociologists, geneticists, teachers and others familiar with Gay people, and especially Lesbian and Gay teens.) JAM: How difficult was it to find these

young people? KC: It took a lot of hours to find young people who were brave enough to come out in

print. However, it was mostly word of mouth. You talk to one person and they refer you to someone else. You talk to teachers and coun-

selors and they refer you to a group of kids. Eventually, I found quite a few young people who were okay with the idea of going public.

Sometimes, I met them in person, sometimes interviewed them over the phone, sometimes I interviewed them on-line.

(Chandler added that most of the young people he interviewed used their own names. He found that most courageous, he said, and ap-

plauded those young people for their efforts.)

JAM: Do you think "Passages of Pride" is the best way to approach young people wrestling with their sexuality?

KC: I was trying to reach young people in the midst of coming out who needed someone to relate to. A lot of the stories, a lot of the anecdotes, are very personal and very descriptive of the lives of Gay and Lesbian teenagers in their childhood through adolescence.

On a fundamental level, the book gives readers an idea of what Gay teens go through as they come to terms with their sexual orienta-

That was the first goal I had.


Secondly, I wanted to reach the parents and their siblings and anyone who works with adolescents to give those people an idea of who these young people are and some of the things they are going through. I hope I to reach everyone.


JAM: All too often, many heterosexuals choose to separate themselves from Gay issues. How did you, as a straight male, get so heavily involved in Gay matters? Did working on this project change you at all?

KC: As a journalist, I'd been reporting on a number of social issues-Gay issues, abortion issues, etc. That was my area of expertise in my 14 years of being a reporter.

Along the way, I realized that there really wasn't much written about Gay teens in the mainstream press. I became much more of an advocate for Gay teens and much less of an

Do you know that . . .?

For the Spanish, a hot guy is a "bonbon." Brazilian condoms are "little shirts," while in France they're "hooded coats."

Say you're vacationing in Madrid, Rio or Prague and you'd like to conduct a foreign affair. You see Mr., or Ms. Right, but your broken down Spanish you learned in high school didn't prepare you for situations like this—and you never knew any Portuguese or Czech. What do you do?

Trying to meet someone across a language barrier is a common problem for tourists—and not unknown to somebody here in the U.S. as English becomes more and more of a second language in various parts of the country.

Not to worry.

There's a handy little phrase book just out called Hot! International! Gay! That covers every situation, everything you need to know—and then some—in seven languages: German, Spanish, French, Italian, Portuguese,

Czech and, of course, English.

Bist du aktiv oder passiv? You ask a sweet fraulein in old Berlin. The pronunciation is easy with the universal phonetics key supplied with each language.

Or a particular situation in Madrid or Mexico City or wherever is getting a bit rough? Simply say, "Quitame las esposas!" (Take the handcuffs off) and hope limits are respected.

I know several languages and I know too that phrase books can be a real chore. But this one has a couple of things going for it:

It's easy to use. The zebra stripe format make it easy to use;

And, there are words and phrases in it that unless you really have been around in the country's Gay life, you probably don't know. If for no other reason, the book is worth buying to commit these to memory.

Hey, you never know when you'll meet that sultry someone from a distant land at your next party. Oh yeah, sure, the chances are very good that they'll know English, but there is nothing, absolutely nothing that is more flattering and more of a compliment than trying to speak someone's language.

'Happily Ever After' Gives a Valentine's View of Matters of the Heart

Happily Ever After Stacy Chandler Speculators, 207pp

If you have just met Ms. Wonderful, or if you're getting to know here even more intimately that you ever thought possible when you first kissed her 30 years ago—or even if you thought you'd met Ms. Wonderful and she turned out to be Ms. Wicked—you'll enjoy Stacy Chandler's Happily Ever After, a self-published, laugh-out-loud, insightful book that Chandler wrote in celebration of her and her lover Pootie's 16th anniversary.

You can read Chandler's anecdotal account from cover to cover by chapter—you can start with "Meeting Ms. Wonderful" and end with "Interlacing," or you can sample at random from "Bill of Faire" (aka table of contents) chapters dealing with "Phobic Body Parts," "Answers to Stupid Questions," and "Holiday

You can, in other words make it through topics covered in Happily Ever After like you might make it through a relationship itself: At once or in pieces.

But whatever your style or romantic status, Chandler is a consistently entertaining and perceptive guide, a comedian and counselor as adept at humor as she is at learning from hindsight.

She helps you find your way, and, very usefully, lets you know how you can stay our of the way, such as when you and your lover need to negotiate each other's "crunchy" times of day, those few hours, perhaps in the morning or afternoon, when you are by nature incommunicable and snarl easily, despite your

love for your sweet heart and her good cheer.

Although not everyone may relate to the particulars of Stacy and Pootie's relationship, most Lesbians can appreciate the insights Chandler draws from them and the wit with which she shares them—deadpan, and deadon, an engaging approach Chandler maintains by using lots of imperatives and declaratives (this is an advice book, after all), often marked by uppercase text and quotes, making for an effective visual voice.

Sometimes, Chandler's prose isn't as tight as it could be, but the loose construction keeps things conversational, confessional, so we learn readily of—and from—their relationship, smiling easily when we recognize ourselves, our friends, or human nature in general, and Lesbian human nature in particular.

As Chandler's stories and observations about her relationship show, lovers can be very different from each other, even opposites. What binds them together (and keeps them happy) is their ability to be aware (and sometimes beware); to be patient, honest, and willing; and to have perspective and heart, even (or especially) in the midst of their worst fight ever.

In other words, lovers have to be committed to each other, and an important part of such dedication is the ability to let your lover be herself. Trying to change your lover, no matter how righteous and certain you may feel in your mission, is probably a mistake (if not futile), as Chandler explains in "Adjusting to One Another."

Happily Ever After is one truly great read and should be on every couple's shelves—or on anyone's shelf who wants to be part of a couple.

'Divine Victim' is Engrossing and Beguiling Winter-Time Reading for Lesbians

If you're looking for some reading material to curl up with by the fire during those often long Winter evenings, I'd like to recommend a new novel I came across recently.

Though it's not your typical "road" story a la Boys on the Side or Thelma and Louise, it has in common with these tales the facts that:

1) the main characters take to the pavement for destinations where the main body of each story takes place; 2) it involves a murder; and 3) the main characters are dykes.

Well, okay—the last part is wishful thinking: Thelma and Louise were dykes only in our minds (or at least not till they launched themselves off the cliff together).

Nevertheless, the story is both a fast read and is pretty entertaining, so give it a look:

Farm Boys Grew Up Close to Families But Far From Everything Else

Growing up on a Midwest farm during the first two-thirds of this century afforded special entanglements and protections to Gay men. The insular life of a farm family could stifle the men, or it could shelter them from the homophobic expectations and ridicule of their

Farm life did even more than that, according to research by Milwaukeean Will Fellows. His work, the result of more than 74 interviews, will appear this Spring in a book, Farm Boys: Lives of Gay Men from the Rural Midwest, to be published by the University of Wisconsin

Fellows, now a nutritionist, grew up on a dairy farm in Rock County, Wisconsin After searching for information on Gay men like himself and not finding any, he decided to write his own book. He sent press releases in the spring of 1992 to Gay publications inviting men to participate in interviews.

The result is what Fellows calls an "autobiographical anthology" narrating the lives of 26 of the men, aged 25 to 84,

with interviews of the remaining 48 excerpted for other chapters of the book. He finished the final draft of the book in the Summer of 1995 and in early 1996 began a 4,000-mile, fivemonth tour around the Midwest to promote the

He uses photos supplied by the men in his slide-illustrated talk. Often, Fellows says in his talk, Midwest farm families came from German stock and brought their culture to America, with social life centered around the Lutheran church. In rural areas, where everyone knew everyone else's business, gossip and criticism fostered conformity.

Most farms also divided work strictly along gender roles. Men and boys tended livestock and fields, and maintained farm machinery and vehicles. Women and girls kept the house and garden, and on smaller farms also raised chickens and milk cows.

The Gay men Fellows interviewed usually hated field work and machinery repair and often would have preferred to perform "women's work." One man said, "I felt like a damn bumbling idiot around farm machinery.'

"Where I grew up," said a man named Dennis from southwestern Wisconsin, "men were men and women were women, and there really wasn't anything in between. Steered toward being strong, silent and tough, I accumulated lots of layers as I went along.

Dennis said the layers became a wall, and now at age 49, after "insane" drinking and relationships, "I'm finally growing up and finding myself.

Farm life also lacked the access to information about homosexuality that urban boys might have found. In fact, farm life lacked information about sexuality generally, which Fellows suspects made it harder for some men to come out.

"If I had stayed on the farm," one man told Fellows, "I would have never dealt with being Gay. I would have probably gotten married and had sex with men on the side. I think a lot home to die.'

of Gays don't leave the farm. There's probably a lot of people out there who are doing that. So many people there are alcoholics, and I think that's what a lot of Gays gravitate toward to kind of deaden their feelings.

But the strong-willed nature of farm folk also rubbed off on these Gay men.

"I was free to be who I was," said a man from Sleepy Eye, Minnesota. "We were raised to be independent, to think for ourselves. That came really strong from my mom. Who cares what the neighbors think? They don't have to live your life. You have to do what you feel is right for yourself.

Being isolated from other people also allowed these boys to develop a stronger attachment for the animals and plants both on the farm and in nature, and to value the freedom of wide spaces and solitude. A man named Everett remembered that when he got too much teasing about being a sissy at school, he would escape to walk through the woods or

"It was almost a gift to be able to get away and think my own thoughts, to ride free and unrestrained," he said.

As adults, most of these men now live in or near cities, a life they can't quite connect to. Fellows himself feels like an "outsider" in the

Some have become activists while others try to lead good and self-reliant lives, but most hope social change and acceptance of Gay lives will eventually reach the farms.

Fellows limited his research to Midwest farms because that's "the farming part of the country." He suspects Gay farm boys from other parts of the country had different experiences depending on their region's culture, ethnic makeup and type of farming

He also suspects the experience of Lesbian farm girls differed from Gay boys, probably because girls got more latitude in their gender roles, and he hopes some former farm girl might investigate the topic.

However, the lives he chronicled were of a time and culture that has disappeared. A man in southeastern Nebraska said: "The patterns of rural life have disintegrated into a cheap imitation of suburban life. Small communities such as the one I come from don't have much of a sense of community anymore. They lose their grocery store. They become just a collection of old people living off what years they have left and wondering what their kids are up to 1,000 miles away. There is a center of life that has disappeared, and I'm not sure what anybody can do about it any more.

One thing has sent Gay farm boys back home: AIDS. Since the 1980s, Fellows says, men with AIDS have moved back to their families for care, which has forced rural communities to acknowledge the existence of Gay men in their midst.

But that news hasn't changed things, he says. Many of these men have found attitudes toward homosexuality remain grounded in silence, ignorance and a notion of "taking care of our own wayward souls who have come

"Geography of Perversion" Charts Views of Gay Sexuality in East and West

By Barbara Jester The Geography of Perversion Rudi C. Bleys New York University Press, 320pp

Recent years have seen enormous attention

devoted to the history of sexuality in the Western World. But how has the West conceived of non-Western patterns of same-sex desire? And how, in turn, have Western societies been influenced by these other traditions.

The Geography of Perversion, 1750-1918, is the first historical study to demonstrate convincingly that the representation of cultural "otherness," as found in European thought from the Enlightenment through modern times is closely interrelated with modern constructions of Gay and Lesbian identity

The author, Rudi C. Bleys, holds a Ph.D. in European intellectual history from the University of Leuven.

Travel reports and early ethnographic accounts o cross-gender roles in the Americas, Africa, and Asia corroborated the 18th Century construction of "sodomite" identity, Bleys

Similarly, the late 19th Century construction of the "third sex" provoked much anthropological speculation on the congenital versus circumstantial nature of same-sex sexual rela-

In The Geography of Perversion, Bleys seeks to unravel how the categories of the modern "sodomite" and later "homosexual" were inextricably intertwined with essentialist definitions of racial identity.

In encyclopedic detail, Bleys traces how

cross-cultural record were collected, created, structured, manipulated, excerpted, reformulated and omitted in interaction with changing beliefs about same-sex sexuality.

Chapters focus on such topics as tropicaliza-

tion of "abominable sin"; Puritanism, sodomy and ethnicity in colonial North America; cross-gender behavior and hermaphroditism; the semiotics of genitalia; the gender revolution and changing profiles of Gay cultures in the West; and the parameters of sexual sci-

The book is not for the faint of heart. The prose is scholarly and, at times, laborious. The footnotes are ample and there is a comprehensive index.

It is not a "good" read, not for the average reader, but it is a necessary read for all those having some degree of background in history and philosophy and an interest in the development of the concepts of same-sex sexuality.

impartial, unbiased journalist. I realized that this was a group that needed some attention.

JAM: How did this affect your family life? Does it ever present any interesting situations?

KC: No, not really. Along the way I used to talk with my wife about the project and my son used to listen to those conversations every time. I think it, in many ways, sensitized him to Gay issues. It made him more aware of homosexuality and some of the challenges that Gay teens face.

JAM: Do you think books like yours are effective in providing a path for parents to understand issues facing our community? Do you think your being a parent helps other parents get something out of your

KC: I hope it reaches that audience. However, this isn't a book written by the parent of a Gay teen. My son is 13 and I don't know

what his orientation is yet, and my daughter is 5. So, this is written as a piece of journalism.

JAM: As an author, and also as a person familiar with Gay youth issues, what do you anticipate as the future of Gay young peo-

KC: I still think that there is a lot of ignorance and apathy out there towards Gay teens. Unfortunately, many people, from ALL walks of life, just don't give a damn about Gay teens. I still think that holds true today.

Although there are books, magazines, online services specifically designed for Gay teenagers, there is still a lack of support for

Although I am optimistic and hopeful that things will get better, I am cautiously optimistic because I see things like debates in Congress to cut back on funding that supports Gay port. That is the focus of this book.

teens in the schools. I see things like school boards passing resolutions to again limit educational material on human sexuality in the schools.

There is a backlash going on right now and that's unfortunate. I see a lot of progress being made, but I do see a backlash.

'Better Angel' is a 1933 Classic About the Martyrdom of Silence in a Rigid Age

Better Angel Richard Meeker Alyson, \$5.95

Last Spring an elderly man entered A Different Light Bookstore in West Hollywood and requested a copy of Better Angel, an underground classic that was first published in 1933.

The book, written under the pseudonym of Richard Meeker, was one of the few novels of the time to portray Gays in a positive light, although Meeker himself was never interviewed or heard from again. After the book went out of print, rare copies were circulated for decades until Alyson Publications published the present edition in paperback.

The manager of A Different Light gave the man a copy of the book and commented in passing that it was "a wonderful novel."

'I'm so glad to hear that," said the 87-yearold customer, "because I'm Richard Meeker.

Thus it happened that 55 years after its publication, the pseudonymous author of Better Angel was identified as Forman Brown, 1988 recipient of the Los Angeles Drama Critics' Circle Lifetime Achievement Award for his work as founder of Hollywood's Turnabout

Better Angel is an autobiographical novel based on Brown's youth in Michigan, early travels in Europe and his hopes for a career in music and the theater.

As the novel opens, Kurt Gray is a 13-yearold boy "of unusual seriousness, unusual loneliness, and unusual innocence" with a 'love of beauty and. . .sensitiveness that set him apart from his companions.'

Early on he discovers masturbation and with it church-endorsed guilt; "The 'secret vice' was responsible, he learned to his horror, for insanity, feeble-mindedness, loss of memory and all sorts of disease." Kurt feels his only hope "on earth lay in Rejuvo Elixir, a quack

College broadens Kurt, helps him shed his youthful and irrational fears, but he still realizes that he is different and that "no matter how many friends we make, we're lonely just the same . . . It's a strange thing inside us that sets us down in a lonely place, walls us up and leaves us there." Walls, both emotional and literal, are a recurring motif in Better Angel. Meeker makes it clear that these walls were necessary in his era, a "martyrdom of silence" brought about by a rigidly homophobic soci-


Kurt is introspective and bookish, an "invert" who seeks "the perfection of lovefor the unfolding and consummate love that makes of each lover both master and slave." It is the stuff of poets dreams.

It is this search for love that comprises much of Better Angel. At times Kurt is bitter at having to conceal his inner feelings. He realizes that "Each kind of passion-man and woman, man and man, woman and womanhas all degrees of love; from love that is pure and high and fine, down the scale to lust that is

ugle and despicable. The only difference isthe only damned difference is that for us there's no way of getting social sanction-so we go around the world like a lot of sorry ghosts, being forever ashamed of a thing we've no reason to be ashamed of.'

Better Angel is more than a period piece. It's an affirmation that despite society's religious-based bigotry and oppression, tenderness and love can prevail. Despite Christianity and all the rest, there is love.


Near the book's end, after counseling a young Gay student, Kurt reflects on "the destiny of all such boys everywhere-their heritage of desire and shame, of uncertainty, of deception, of hypocrisy and of tumultuous joy and burning regret—of concealing the truth and revealing the lie." Thanks to such groundbreaking works as Better Angel, there is much less deception and hypocrisy now than in

'Man of the Year' is a Fun, Smart Film **Showcasing Stud-Muffin Dirk Shafer**

Back more years than Glenn would like to admit (even under oath), Glenn would sur-reptitiously sneak copies of Playgirl magazine up to the counter at the local drug store. Not for himself, mind you. Oh, no. Glenn had a deal with his shy friend (and biology partner)

Nancy would do all of the dissection projections: frogs, lamb eyes, pig hearts, worms, ad nauseam and Glenn would buy her issues of Playgirl magazine.

Ok, fine. It's all a lie. Glenn bought Playgirl for himself.

Well, surely Glenn wasn't the only teenage boy in America who used his allowance and Summer job moneys on such visual stimulation as Playgirl magazine. Surely not!

Glenn had always thought that all of those ever-so luscious Playgirl models (like those fabulous Chippendale dancers) were 100% heterosexual. Well, at least Glenn thought so until a few of the Playgirl models began appearing in Gay Porn. Not necessarily under the same name but Glenn never forgets a ..

For one full year, Playgirl publicity had poor Dirk on an itinerary that had him schleping from coast to coast, leaving out no cheesy TV talk-show nor any Supermarket opening.

Shafer cleverly mixes the real and the recreated in Man of the Year to offer a decidedly pointed, often candidly self-depreciating portrait of a unique opportunity that goes somewhat array. On one hand Shafer incorporates clips of many of Dirk's talk show appearances: Donahue (in which Dirk came in last in a "Best Buns" contest), Sally Jesse and Joan Rivers to name a few.

Adding an uncanny touch of reality are 'real" little sis Deidra and best buddy Vivian Paxton on hand playing themselves, as are fellow Playgirl centerfold Thom Collins and the legendary (!?) Fabio.

Dirk Shafer is certainly a pleasant, engaging fellow. Whether it is during the recreation of the dream date in which one lucky Playgirl reader (female, naturally) wins with Playgirl's Man of the Year (and in which Dirk naively brings new boyfriend Michael along and hides in the bathroom) or while fielding increasingly frequent and frighteningly obsessive correspondences from self-proclaimed "No. 1 fan" Lady La Flame, a bleached out small-town stripper, Dirk emerges as an innocent if rather hunky Peter Pan sentenced to a year in a mystifying, perplexing heterosexual neverneverland.

Man of the Year is a smart and fun film and definitely one to please those many fans of Dirk Shafer, a Playgirl stud-muffin with a brain. Highly enjoyable and highly recom-

Forget the Rest, 'Mr. Holland's Opus' is Without a Doubt, THE Best!

Forget Apollo 13-Sense and Sensibility is senseless-Get Shorty gets the short end of the stick-don't bet on Leaving Las Vegasand Seven, this time, is not a lucky number. Mr. Holland's Opus is the Best Picture of the

A wonderful, sensitive and warm story is superbly brought to life by a brilliant cast. One of the Best Films this reviewer has seen in

Richard Dreyfuss' performance is worthy of another Academy Award as Best Actor.

(Yes, he did win in 1977 for The Goodbye Girl—at the time, the youngest actor ever to win Best Actor. But . . . his competition was so weak . . . Richard Burton in Equus, one of his worst films . . . Woody Allen, just being himself in Annie Hall . . . Marcello Mastroianni in A Special Day and John Travolta in Saturday Night Fever, which we know does not hold up.)

But here, Dreyfuss turns in probably the finest performance of his career. A performance so finely tuned in to his character-that he makes you feel you actually have known or know Mr. Holland.

With great makeup, created by Ken Chase, Dreyfuss ages from a young musician (who only takes the teaching job to help himself out financially while he composes and arranges his own music), to an older, mature man who has spent most of his life teaching.

He is being phased out by budget cuts, and his only concern is that future students will not be exposed to music-whatever type it may

especially Joseph Anderson (age 15) and Anthony Natale (age 28) because you never know if they are actually hearing impaired or just actors pretending.

Oscar-winning Olympia Dukakis and TV star ("Love and War"), Jay Thomas are also at the top of their form-though their roles are relatively small. A little scene in which Dukakis tells Mr. Holland what she thinks of him is one of the highlights of the film.

You might want to brush up on your current events or recent history, for no time titles are used in this film. Love of Music-After a career of teaching music rather than composing, Glenn Holland (Richard Dreyfuss) comes to realize that by inspiring his students, he's made a greater contribution to the arts than he ever could have imagined in "Mr. Holland's Opus."

Mr. Chase has done wonders by adding hair to Dreyfuss's head when he is younger and then gradually thinning it. The usual mustache is added to add a few years and lines and wrinkles gradually appear. But you are never aware that it is makeup. You become so involved with the character that he actually ages before your eyes.

And, Dreyfuss has added his own talent at changing his voice, ever so slightly, and slowing his body movements as he ages.

But, as she ages, she uses her natural voice and the two make a very good match.

In complete contrast to Slater's also-new film, **Broken Arrow**, he portrays probably the most charming and likable character he ever has on the screen. You begin to wonder what takes Mary Stuart Masterson so long to admit that she loves him.

The initial premise may seem weak. He sees her crying in the window one night, feels sorry for her and sends her an enormous floral bouquet. But, once the story gets under way, both stars fall into their roles with great believability and sensitivity. You just know these two people will fall in love and that they really want to kiss each other.

Comedy relief, from what some may consider too much sweetness, is deftly handled by Pamela Segal as Masterson's best friend. Her lines often reflect what the general audience is thinking about what is happening at the time. Her scene and dialogue as the "Christmas Elf" is a joy to behold.

Boy meets girl, boy loses girl, boy gets girl plots have been around since movies began. The ones that work and the ones we remember are those with a different twist or the boy and girl are believable together. This plot works on both levels.

When Masterson's past is revealed and her reluctance to love Slater and accept his family (in a wonderfully warm Christmas sequence) is finally understood, the film moves to its inevitable conclusion.

But, don't think you've got it figured out! It doesn't work that way. And, Slater's under-acting the whole sequence, gives the warm ending an added meaning.

New York City fans will love the lush cinematography of the city at night, in the rain and Central Park. I can't remember a film since The Eddy Duchin Story that used New York City as such a romantic background. So it isn't real? If you want violence, raw sex, brutal characters and dysfunctional families, this film is not for you.

But, if you can dispense with reality—let your emotions take over and lap up some love and laughter—you'll have a lucrative night at the movies.

For Gender Queers, Men in Drag are Neither Entertaining or Funny

As a gender queer, I have been bombarded with images of drag from the Gay and straight communities for most of my life. Almost all of these images are based on the perceived humor of a man dressed non-stereotypically. The humor is not unlike that of the old minstrel shows of Al Jolson that portrayed humor in unfair stereotypical images of Blacks.

From the straight community, drag humor has appeared in shows such as Benny Hill, Milton Berle, Flip Wilson, Bosom Buddies, John Laroquette, Martin, etc. Most recently, drag has become the fodder of the talk show circuit with drag marriages, drag makeovers, drag beauty contests, etc. Throughout, is the assumed inherent humor of the male in drag. Most recently, drag has come to epitomize the sleaze of talk shows.

The Gay community is not that different. There are drag bars, drag entertainment at Gay bars, female impersonators at Gay events and even at PrideFest. There are always flamboyant Gays in drag on the Pride grounds and in the Pride Parade. This year, I read that PrideFest organizers plan to bring in professional female impersonators for entertainment.

Again is the perceived inherent entertainment value of men in drag.

I have no basic objection to Gays who are transgendered earning a living from their transgendered status. I do object to nontransgendered Gays or straights using drag as humor

If drag images were balanced with a broader picture of the gender queer community this would be different. But drag has become the stereotypical image of gender queers. The continued use of drag perpetuates the public image of gender queers as flamboyant, humorous individuals. The general public feels free to openly ridicule, embarrass and mistreat gender queers.

More of us gender queers are coming out of the closet and are demanding equal access to employment, housing, family and medical rights. In seeking these God-given societal rights, gender freaks must not only overcome the prejudice that accompanies anyone who does not live according to societal norms, we must also overcome the societal impression that gender freaks are not to be taken seriously.

Society has formed this impression in part, based on the public display of drag by Gays and straights.

If PrideFest organizers are serious about utilizing female impersonators for entertainment, I hope they can be convinced of the harm that they may do to the small, but growing out and politically active transgender community.

If PrideFest organizers insist on using drag entertainment, I wonder if they plan to balance the drag image with positive images of the gender queer community?

I also wonder if this year, gender queers will be included in the mission statement of PrideFest along with Gays, Bi's and Lesbians?

PrideFest should be an event of Pride for the entire queer community, Gays, Bi's, Lesbians and Tran's. It should not be an event that perpetuates false stereotypical images of gender queers for entertainment value.

'Restoration' Makes of Charles II's England a Pure Cinematic Delight

Glenn approached Michael Hoffman's film adaptation of Rose Tremain's novel with a great deal of caution, if not down right trepidation.

After all, Glenn absolutely adored Tremain's gloriously rich historical tapestry of the grandeur, decadence and general over all excesses ushered in with the restoration of the English monarchy in 1660. Still, Michael Hoffman's cinematic adaptation featured in the leading role of Robert Merivel one invariably annoying actor: Robert Downey, Jr.

Glenn nevertheless maintained, as per usual, an open mind and was justly and quite amply rewarded. **Restoration** is an absolute feast for the eyes and for the mind!

Robert Downey, Jr. might be in some minds a rather surprising choice to play Merivel in this oh so British drama (as does Meg Ryan, for that matter). The central role of Robert Merivel may not quite rightly be perceived as an "Everyman."

Still, as played by Downey, Merivel is anything but ordinary. While quite bright, Robert is primarily concerned with his own pleasures, a bit naive and more than a little bit foolish. A poor medical student, he is dazzled by the pomp and circumstance that accompanies the restoration of the English monarchy in the larger than life personage of Charles II (Sam Neill)

Twists of fate will lead our intrepid hero to court but it is his gullibility which will lead him to be married to the King's favorite mistress. The world is his oyster so long as he does not fall in love with his wife.

Suspense! Tension? Drama?! Well, not really. That he will fall in love with the beautiful and alluring Celia Clemence (Polly Walker) is at all times certain and somewhat besides the point. What follows: his fall from grace, his expulsion from Eden and the beginning of the road to real growth and maturity form the true heart of the film.

In Michael Hoffman's vision, England in the 1660's is brought vividly to life. The seductiveness and allure of court life are dazzling, so much so that Merivel's Quaker friend John Pearce (David Thewlis) continually, if with great futility, heeds caution.

Yet we are as likely as Merivel to disregard such absurd warnings in the wake of such splendor. Not only content with the magnificence of the era, film's depictions of The Great Plague and The Great Fire are just as extraordinary.

The ordinary, the great and the impoverished all come to life against the panoramic backdrop of the 1660's.

With full measures of farce, melodrama and drama, Restoration has all the makings of a fascinating, surprisingly effective morality play.

The success of Restoraton is greatly dependent upon Downey's Merivel and lacking the actor's usual mannerism, Merivel emerges as much a hero for the 1990's as the 1660's. We may laugh at him as he foolishly becomes the court jester, but learn to cheer for him as he returns to his true profession.

The always fine David Thewlis is particularly moving in the change of pace role as the good Quaker, Dr. Pearce.

And Hugh Grant, mustering up every exaggerated mannerism in his own considerable bag of tricks makes for a endearingly villainous portrait painter, Finn.





Milwaukee—When you attend the Milwaukee Symphony Orchestra's April 4th concert, be prepared for a dramatic study in contrasts. Nearly 300 musicians will be on stage to present a 20th Century setting of five Psalms. paired with a requiem mass, setting the stage for an evening of intense and uplifting vocal expression. These works represent two dynamic musical personalities—Leonard Bernstein and Wolfgang Amadeus Mozart.

The loss in 1990 of a true 20th Century Renaissance man, Leonard Bernstein, left the world without one of its innovative musical geniuses



Leonard Bernstein

Born in Lawrence, Massachusetts in 1918, Bernstein was trained as a pianist in the early years of his musical education. Conducting became his major interest during 1940 and 1941, when he was a Summer student at Tangle-

His talent led him to a position as assistant conductor with the New York Philharmonic. His duties were to serve as an understudy for the principal conductor and the guest conductors, ready and waiting should someone fall ill

or be unable to perform.

Prior to his appointment, many assistants had come and gone, frustrated because they never had a chance to conduct. However, the unfortunate illness of Bruno Walter for a November 13, 1944, performance led to Bernstein's triumphant conducting debut at age 26. The concert review made the front page of the New York Times. Overnight, he became a world-wide sensation.

From his early years as a conductor and pianist, Bernstein also pursued a parallel career as a composer for the concert hall and musical theatre. Some of his most famous works include Fancy Free, Candide and the energetic West Side Story.

However, most of Bernstein's non-theatrical works deal with religious themes, many of them involving biblical or liturgical texts. He said these themes reflected his personal spiritual concerns, and they were about "the crisis

A particularly striking and dramatic nontheatrical work was composed during a sabbatical that he took from the Philharmonic in 1964-'65. Chichester Psalms, composed in 1965, was commissioned by the Very Reverend Walter Hussey, Dean of Chichester Cathedral, to be performed for a choral festival. It had its premiere on July 15, 1965, by the New York Philharmonic with Bernstein con-

Mozart

Surely most people who have seen the movie Amadeus have a picture of Mozart as a flamboyant man who was both passionate and naïve about music. This image is largely a misrepre-

sentation of Mozart who was born in Salzburg, Austria in 1756.

He was a child prodigy, performing throughout Europe from the time he was 5 years-old with his sister Nannerl and his father, Leopold. In order to exploit Mozart's youth, Leopold was constantly showing him off to the royal families of the day.

Unlike many prominent composers, Mozart did not have any formal schooling. His compositions encompass all genres of music-he wrote operas, symphonies, chamber music, solo works and choral pieces. His mature works represent writing that has melodic beauty, formal perfection and richness in both harmony and texture.

It is his final work that occupies a major portion of the Milwaukee Symphony Orchestra's performance.

During the Summer of 1791, a mysterious stranger visited Mozart in his home in Vienna and commissioned him to compose a requiem. Sorely in need of money, Mozart accepted the offer, even though he was in the middle of writing Die Zauberflote at the time. Working obsessively on the requiem, he began to believe that he was actually writing the death mass for himself.

Mozart died on December 1, 1791. The Requiem was completed by his assistant Franz Sussmayr. The break between what Mozart wrote and the Sussmayr completion comes at the eighth bar of the Lacrimosa.

This performance by the Milwaukee Symphony will feature the Milwaukee Symphony Chorus and four highly acclaimed soloists: Marvis Martin, soprano; Catherine Robbin,

mezzo-soprano; Jon Garrison, tenor; and John Cheek, bass-baritone.

The solo boy soprano for Chichester Psalms will be Justin Leath, a 13-year-old Middle School student from Appleton, Wisconsin. The performance will be led by Artistic Advisor Stanislaw Skrowaczewski.







Tribute to Rick Beaudoin

It was just over a year ago that my friend Rick Beaudoin passed on, and I felt it was time to pen a posthumous tribute of sorts to

Several years ago, a distinguished sounding fellow with a rich, articulate, slightly east coast voice, answered a personal ad of mine in the Milwaukee Journal. Intrigued, I rang him up and introduced myself. This was to be the first of many far-ranging, thought provoking and laugh-filled conversations I had with Rick, who, as it turned out, had moved her from the Boston area.

His smarts and playful wit were immediately apparent. We discovered that we shared common passions for Billie Holiday, classic films, Gay studies and such topics as spirituality. Despite a profound sense of the sacred, we both enjoyed lampooning all manner of sacred cows and shared as well, a deep appreciation for irony and for the absurd, which had probably carried each of us through various dark and difficult times in our lives.

We finally decided to meet. I invited Rick over for dinner on a weeknight and served a standby creation called Highbrow Tuna Salad, which previous guests had almost always commented favorably on.

As he dished up a leafy spoonful, Rick casually inquired about the salad's ingredients. When I told him that (among other inspirations) it contained black olives, he quietly gasped.

After probing, he confessed, "I've never eaten olives. They've always struck me as something other than food. I'm not sure exactly what, but I've always been afraid to try

Finally, after some reassurance and sly salesmanship on my part, he seemed resolved to make the best of it and ate freely of the salad, which I believe, he actually liked.

Several days later I received a thank you letter, dated 11 Nov. 1992. Regarding his brush with olives he wrote, "I remain proud of myself for having conquered my irrational fear of olives. I'm not a total convert yet as I still suspect olives are a great cosmic joke. Or maybe they serve as a displacement for some childhood trauma I suffered and don't remember. I used to feel the same way about mushrooms and peas, but have since made peace with these vegetables . . . Perhaps I should start a new 12-Step prog;ram—Vegetable Phobics Anonymous. 'My name is Rick and I'm afraid of olives, leeks, wax beans and tur-

At that time, I was living in Hartland, a good half hour's drive from Milwaukee, and I didn't see Rick much, but we continued our

my bearings." The three months that I lived there quickly proved to be a difficult test of our friendship; our mutual patience, tolerance and sanity.

The apartment was simply too small for added inhabitants. Rick and I were on very different personal paths. We began to clashrepeatedly. Headstrong bull versus stubborn goat (Taurus vs. Capricorn).

Our cats vocally disliked each other. Secretly, we didn't like each other's cats, I didn't like his opera arias and his problem with my bringing a handsome young carpenter home one night. He didn't like my snooty aversion to his smoking or my playing the piano when he was trying to study, which seemed never ending.

I was really not very pleasant to live with during that time, though to his credit, Rick went to great lengths to be both civil and gra-

Ultimately, the entire experience became a minor nightmare, leaving us both feeling emo-tionally bruised, with all manner of bristlingly negative feelings toward each other. It was decided that I should find my own place-soonwhich I did.

After a suitable cooling off period, I gave him a call. I felt a need to apologize to Rick for my less than saintly behavior, which I did in person one sunny Winter afternoon. He graciously accepted my apology, and it did help heal some of the bad feelings. Our friendship was never really the same, though I'd ring him up from time to time to see how he was doing and to tell him what was going on in my new city life.

Rick was a remarkable man. His ethical sense was very highly developed, and it informed his sense of compassion as well as his strong sense of outrage. He constantly and vocally championed the rights of Gay people publicly and privately, and steadfastly

ant, understanding world we all seek.

Rick was quite possibly the finest Gay therapist ever to practice in Milwaukee. He cared deeply and passionately about Gay people and about life at large; his contributions here were immense. Rick lived with gusto and flair and tremendous integrity and a bright and playful

He taught many of us a great deal by his unique personal example, and I shall always be grateful for having had the pleasure of knowing him.

It is possible that his exceptional abilities were required somewhere in the beyond, and so the Great Spirit took him elsewhere, albeit much too young by our standards.

He is much missed and fondly remembered. Carry on Rick.







Insurance Company Sued Over HIV

Los Angeles-Lambda Legal Defense and Education Fund filed a lawsuit on January 23red challenging Paul Revere Life Insurance Company's practice of selling disability income insurance policies to individuals, collecting premiums from them, a;nd then, years later, if they become disabled, denying them the policy's benefits if Paul Revere learns they were HIV positive when it sold them the insurance.

The insurance company argues that its policies do not protect people living with HIV from disabilities related to AIDS because it contends HIV is a "manifestation" of AIDS and its policies only cover disabilities that first "manifest" themselves after the policy goes into effect.


'HIV infection is no more a manifestation of AIDS than elevated blood pressure is a manifestation of a heart attack," said Jon W. Davidson, Supervising Attorney for Lambda. "In addition, we now know that not everyone infected with HIV necessarily will get AIDS.


Anti-Gay Congressmen Attempt Anti-HIV Bill

Washington, D.C.-The Human Rights Campaign says that anti-Gay extremists in Congress are responsible for a discriminatory HIV measure in the defense spending bill. The extremists were identified as presidential candidate Bob Dornan (R-CA), and Senator Trent Lott (R-MS). Dornan wrote the measure which would force the Pentagon to discharge all service members found to be infected with HIV. The provision would also deny these people many of the valuable benefits available to service members discharged for other medical reasons.

A total of 1,149 service members would be affected by the measure, which received bipartisan opposition. However, it passed the Senate on January 26th and the House two days earlier. White House spokesman, Mike McCurry, said that President Clinton has reservations about

the HIV provision, but plans to sign the measure. The provisions will take effect in June, 1996. The AIDS Action Council has condemned the measure as "shameful" and have issued a statement saying that they are "deeply troubled" by Clinton's action.

Commission Chairman Fom Gill, who defended the recommendation for same-sex marriages, likened the issue to the civil rights struggle in the 1960s.

"I was in Congress when we passed the (1964) Civil Rights Bill. You should have heard the things that were being said about African-Americans, although they didn't use the words African-American or Black. The things they said were terrible, that you can't give them equal rights, that they were lazy, inferior and so forth," Gill said.

He said he's hearing a similar argument for denying Lesbians and Gay people a right to get married.

There was no middle ground as more than 200 people crowded into the state Capitol auditorium to testify for and against same-sex marriages. They were either strongly for it or strongly against it.

A minority member of the commission who opposed the majority's finding was James Hochberg.

Societies throughout history 'have given unique and special preference to heterosexual marriage because of the benefits that those relationships provides for society in general,' Hochberg said.

"The overwhelming bulk of the evidence indicates that homosexual relationships threaten the core of society--the family," he said.

When asked, Hochberg could cite no evidence, but said it was "out there."

Lesbian Susan Reardon said as an Irish Catholic, she is intimately aware of the commitment marriage entails, and she said she is ready to assume that responsibility.

"I look forward to the day I can partake in this holiest of sacraments," she said.

The Hawaiian court has now scheduled arguments in the same-sex marriage case for July 15th.

The Mormons

The Hawaii Supreme Court has denied a request by the Mormon Church to get involved in the original case between the state and three Gay couples who were denied marriage licenses.

The Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints wanted to join with the state Attorney General's office to fight the granting of marriage licenses to same-sex couples.

The church argued it had a stake in the issue because legalizing same-sex marriage would force its ministers to perform ceremonies that are against their religious beliefs.

The high court disagreed, saying the state simply authorizes marriages and does not require the performing of any marriage cere-

In California

The fact that Hawaii may soon legalize same-sex marriages, has sent Religious and other Far Right groups into a frenzy of activity.

A bill to preclude California from recognizing Gay or Lesbian marriages performed in other states is on its way to the Assembly floor.

The Assembly Judiciary Committee voted 8-4 Wednesday, January 24th for the bill, which was promoted by a court case in Hawaii. Only Republicans voted for the measure.

"Preventing the legalization of same-sex marriages in California is turning out to be a strong Republican caucus issue," said the author, Assemblyman Pete Knight, (R-Palmdale).

The bill is expected to be easily approved in the next week in the Assembly, which is controlled by Republicans. But it could have more trouble in the Senate, which has a Democratic majority.

"If other states want to trash the foundation of civilization," said Art Croney of the Committee on Moral Concerns, `...we don't think that should be allowed in California."

But Gay and Lesbian groups called the bill "Gay bashing" and argued that thousands of same-gender couples are in stable, committed relationships and are already raising children successfully.

Forbidding marriage 'has always been a very powerful tool for dehumanizing the disfavored populations,' said Assemblywoman Sheila Kuehl, (D-Santa Monica), the Legislature's only openly Lesbian member.

Knight said his bill is necessary because that case could be decided this year, and Gay and Lesbian couples would then flock to the island state to be married.

California law currently recognizes marriages performed in all other states.

However, John Davidson of the Lambda Legal Defense Fund of Los Angeles, one of the attorneys in the Hawaii case, said the long trial and appeals process means it won't be settled for at least two years.

The bill would add this sentence to state law: "A marriage contracted outside this state between individuals of the same gender is not valid in this state."

"The ramifications of recognizing same-sex marriages in California would be significant," said Knight. He said Gays and Lesbians would be allowed to adopt children together, samesex marriage would have to be taught in high school family living classes and couples would share in health and other job benefits.

Laurie McBride of the LIFE Lobby said Knight was `engaging in gratuitous Gay bashing.''

"The author believes Gays and Lesbians should not be citizens of this state, at least not visible citizens," she said.

She said Lesbian couples, in particular, have fewer sexually transmitted diseases and longer relationships than any other demographic group.

Francisco Lobaco of the American Civil Liberties Union said the bill was similar to old laws that prohibited interracial marriages. He read from a 1948 court decision in Virginia that said God created races and placed them on separate continents for a reason.

"Hopefully, many of us would view this as shameful," he said. "Let's not make the same mistake."

Kuehl also noted that California in the past prohibited marriages by Chinese, Japanese and Filipino immigrants.

"There are thousands of people in this state who would be married if you will not deny them," she said. "It is a very convenient way if you bar marriage between Gays and Lesbians to enforce discrimination and characterize relationships as unstable because you require them to be unstable."

In South Dakota

A bill that would have banned marriages between same-sex couples in South Dakota was rejected Wednesday, January 24th by a state House committee.

The State Affairs Committee voted 8-5 to kill the bill, but the measure's sponsors may try to persuade the full House to debate the bill anyway.

The bill would have changed the legal definition of marriage to require that the relationship be between a man and a woman.

The leader of a group that promotes the civil rights of Gay and Lesbian people said it would make no sense to outlaw any relationship between people who love each other.

Times are changing, and Gays and Lesbians do not threaten society, said Barry Wick of Rapid City, executive director of Free Americans Creating Equal Status of South Dakota.

"It is time to join the 20th century in South Dakota," Wick said.

But the bill's main sponsor, Rep. Roger Hunt, (R-Brandon), said the bill is needed to clarify South Dakotan's traditional views on marriage.

"I think we all agree the traditional definition of marriage has been that of a union of a man and a woman," Hunt said.

Hunt sponsored a similar bill last year. That

measure was approved by the House but died in the Senate.

Hunt said South Dakota might be forced to recognize Gay marriages from other states unless it passes such a bill.

If same-sex marriages were recognized in South Dakota, businesses might be forced to provide health insurance to partners of Gay employees, Hunt said.

The bill does not discriminate against Gay people because discrimination only applies when a group is poor, Hunt said, adding that Gays are rich and therefore can't be discriminated.

nated against.

Other supporters of the measure said if the state recognizes same-sex marriages, it might also have to condone polygamy and other unacceptable practices.

Hunt's measure could eventually mean Gay people legally married in other states would be considered unmarried if they traveled in South Dakota, Wick said. Gay and lesbian couples might decide to avoid South Dakota, which would reduce tourism in the state, he said.


More than 400 U.S. companies, already offer health insurance and other benefits to partners of gay employees, Wick said, and the number is growing fast. Allowing the practice in South Dakota would have little effect because many companies do not provide group insurance for workers anyway, he said.


Former state Rep. Pat Kane, a Sioux Falls lawyer, said the measure really involves some people's fear and hatred of Gay people. "I got over homophobia when I discovered I had a Gay child."

Some people refer to the Bible when condemning homosexuality, but if state law were to follow all passages in the Bible, it would have to institute slavery, forbid the eating of pork, and allow the killing of a woman who is not a virgin when she gets married, he said.

Gay people should be allowed to form stable, legal relationships, Kane said. `It will benefit society.''

Mr. Flinchbaugh's attorney asks a series of questions of Dr. Teggatz, all of which are objected to and sustained by Commissioner Brooks. The attorney is told repeatedly that the questions are inappropriate for a hearing. They are meant for a trial motion. In total exasperation, Commissioner Brooks invokes Wisconsin Statutes and stops the cross examination.

The next witness is Detective Thomas Meyer, a 22-year veteran of the Police Force. He reads from the statement taken from Mr. Flinchbaugh after he was arrested:

Joseph Flinchbaugh has a long history of violence, alcohol and drug abuse. He admits to having a bad temper and has been involved in fights where he has used a knife and has stomped and kicked his opponents with his boots, possibly rendering them unconscious. He believes he has calmed down since getting married and having two children. He remembers fighting with Mandi over money. He knows Mandi was dead when he left the apartment on North Meineke.

Mine, Happy Endings Are All Alike, says, "This mystery has it all: suspense, surprise, and wonderful writing."

I agree, even with the admission that I'm no fan of murder mysteries. This tale of an aspiring art historian and her lover's entanglement in an old woman's tragic past pulls the reader in from the first sentence of the Prologue.

Wings can write, and her characters are real. Kind and jealous, heroic and cowardly, interesting and infuriating, fascinating and flawed--just like real life. With believability like this, you can even get over the one or two spots where the plot stretches a little thin or there's something of a reach to accept a character motivation.

Though all murder mysteries are overwhelmingly plot-driven, this one succeeds as just plain good fiction because of the complexity (and often downright bizarreness) of the characters. If I were to describe even one of them, I would give too many clues to the ending, which is a surprise right to the last chapter.

Suffice it to say that the author has sufficient observational powers and the skill to communicate what she has seen to convincingly describe the kind of people that inhabit a small town in the Montana wastelands to those found in a sequestered convent in San Diego to the participants in a drunken revel in Italy.

The plot is as sprawling as it sounds, but without the attendant confusion one sometimes finds in such ambitious works.

There are many characters, most of whom are well fleshed out, but they are introduced clearly enough and carried through the plot for sufficient time not to lose the reader.

Even such seasoned writers as Fannie Flagg and Marge Piercy seem to have trouble with this kind of thoroughness; I found myself fumbling back to previous pages in Flagg's 157-character Fried Green Tomatoes at the Whistle Stop Cafe to ascertain who was who, and completely befuddled by the middle of Piercy's Gone To Soldiers, with its intricately intertwined cast.

That Wings can pull off this kind of involved treatment is a tribute to her skill as a writer.

Although references to nuns and frustrated straight women, recovering Catholics and jealous lovers are legion in Lesbian fiction, nothing in this novel is predictable. Pack this one in your duffel bag for those nights when you need to escape the demands of whatever is getting you down and you need to take comfort in the good company this original and creative story will provide.

"The Tribe" Joins to Help Others While **Bonding Among Themselves**

Some people call them "The Thursday Night Group," but they call themselves "The Tribe." That's a more exact description for, in truth, that's precisely what they are. A group of people closely joined together by strong bonds of shared experiences and compassionate concern.

"So many people," J.C. Pratt, one of The Tribe, says in wonder. "So many walks of life, brought together to do a job and in the

process, becoming a family.'

There are some 35 of them in all, women and men, old and young, all ethnic, racial and economic backgrounds, Lesbians, Gay men, Bisexuals and straights, drawn together to work as volunteers at the Milwaukee AIDS Project (MAP).

There are teachers among them, bankers, too. There are lawyers, ministers, students, business people, professionals of all kinds. people who in everyday life would be separated by those artificial barriers, economic as those between Gays and non-Gays, that soci-

But here, among themselves, the barriers are down as they exchange quips and laugh easily among themselves.

Most of them are native to Metro Milwaukee, but there are others, too. For example, Stephanie has recently moved here from

And there is Shingo.

Shingo came to Milwaukee as a student from Japan. A shy, beautiful young man, he joined The Tribe last Summer. In December, he had to return and has been assigned by his government to work in Australia, but he did not forget his family here.

When Lil and Lori, two members of the Tribe, had their commitment ceremony at Just Us, Shingo called from Australia to wish them

Nor has The Tribe forgotten him. Sit around with them for awhile and you will hear his name, over and over again, spoken lovingly, as a family would the name of a brother who is far from home.

'Wouldn't Shingo like this?" someone asks with a fond chuckle and the others nod and

"Wonder what Shingo's doing now?" another asks at another time.

Since it's near 7:00 p.m. here, someone says, "He's probably just getting up." General chuckles.

There are those among The Tribe, like Lil and Lori who are saving their money to go and visit him. There are those and others, too who are trying to find a way to bring him "home."


That is just the point.

These people care about each other, they genuinely do.

Larry and Kreg are a father-son team. Kreg wants to make sure his name gets spelled right-with a K.

That's not the name I gave you," Larry says in mock exasperation.

And since The Tribe members do care about each other, that caring can be and is spread out to those less fortunate than themselves. That's what being a volunteer at MAP is all about, someone says

According to MAP's Director of Volunteers, Cheryl Lucas—who has a smile that would light up ten city blocks-The Tribe has been in existence for almost three years now. They come together to do whatever has to be done; stuffing mailings (a mind-deadening task), sticking labels on envelops, whatever.

Most often, Cheryl says, there are multiple tasks for these volunteers to do. "But they get them all done," she said. "It's really amazing how much they can do.

This night, as the wind blows the heavily falling snow about, some 20 Tribe members are at MAP to stuff envelops, get a mailing ready, make red ribbon pins, and make condom roses-all at once.

Guy Clough teaches how to make the roses, not the simplest thing to do.

The first time I tried making one of these, Cheryl says to no one in particular, "it took me an hour to make one rose.

David is having his problems with a rose. Finally, he gets a semblance of one con-structed and holds it up for all around the ta-

"It's supposed to be a rose," Lori tells him. "It is," he replies. "It's a variegated vari-

ety." He gets a couple of skeptical looks.
"How'd you get so good with condoms?"
Robb asks, with a shy little smile sparkling in

Between 5:30 and 7:30 p.m., when The Tribe meets, they get 7 dozen roses done. In future gatherings of the clan, they will make dozens-and dozens more.

Someone remarks that maybe the best way to make a rose, is to hold your tongue be-

Doug Nelson, MAP's Executive Director, sits at the table struggling valiantly with a rose. He tries the suggestion and with intense concentration, sucks on his tongue. His success with the rose is not evident.

The red ribbons are not all that much easier to do. They must be of a precise length and cut before being pinned to a card.

Kaaren, one of the newest members of the family, has her problems with getting them just right. Someone is quick to help her, gently showing her how.

Once finished, the ribbon cards will sell for \$5. "Why not just stick a ribbon on the card and sell it for \$2.50," someone says, his frustration evident.

That night, nearly 700 of those ribbon cards will get done.

What got them to volunteer at MAP?

Kaaron, a recent graduate of Beloit College said she wanted to help and "MAP was the obvious choice.'

Craig, who as returned to Milwaukee after 18 years in L.A., works in memory of a brother who died of AIDS. "Maybe I can prevent someone going through what my brother did," he says.

Debbie, a teacher, says she became a volunteer to "help raise awareness" about the disease.

Others who are asked, give similar reasons. There are those out there who are suffering and dying. Like all the 950 volunteers at MAP and the 1100 total throughout the AIDS Resource Center of Wisconsin (ARCW), these people work to ease the way.

In this observer's view, there is nothing at all unusual about The Tribe, nothing to separate them out from the general run of human kind. They're just people, but people with a mission to help, give comfort as they can, do "the drudge work" that needs to be done.

Working as volunteers on Thursday nights, is not all they do. For example, Lil and Lori perform as clowns at MAP childrens' parties

This, as I am told, and as I know, is a weekly ritual. What The Tribe call The Club House, is This Is It. Joe Brehm, the owner of the bar, greets them warmly. He is, along with John, Randy and the rest of the staff, a Tribe member in good standing. With a decided catch in his voice, before the whole bar, he thanks them for the work they do.

Of course I must go along. The story has to be followed out to its "bitter end," doesn't it? Come February 9th and 10th, members of The Tribe will be out bar hopping, distributing condoms and dental dams. Lil shows off a dental dam holder. On its cover it says, "She licks me, she licks me not." The words are

Once upon a time, in the little Pennsylvania town where I grew up, all the ladies of the church would get together and put on a dinner. My mother told me that nothing, absolutely nothing could knit people together more than working at a common task.

The Tribe-and all the volunteers at MAP and throughout ARCW have discovered that little secret.
