

### President Clinton Signs Ryan White CARE Act Renewing Funding for Crucial Care.

Washington, DC—President Clinton, on May 20th, signed a bill renewing the Ryan White CARE Act for five more years. The legislation authorizes the federal government's leading effort to provide vital medical care to the hundreds of thousands of Americans with HIV and AIDS.

Present at the signing in the FDR Room of the White House were Doug Nelson, Executive Director of the AIDS Resource Center of Wisconsin (ARCW), along with 30 other heads of AIDS agencies and members of Congress.

"The Ryan White CARE Act has been a big part of America's progress" on AIDS, said the President. "But even as we celebrate our progress, we shouldn't forget that the fight is not over. We have to do more to stop the rising tide of infection among women, communities of color and young people—especially young Gay men. Until there is a cure, we cannot and must not rest."

"The president followed through on his commitment to America's men, women and children with AIDS," said Winnie Stachelberg, the Human Rights Campaign's (HRC), senior health policy advocate. "This money is desperately needed as health-care providers have been struggling to manage ever-increasing caseloads at least year's funding levels."

The long-overdue measure provides \$738 million in fiscal year 1996 for the care and

treatment of people with HIV and AIDS—an increase of more than 16% over last year.

The bill also provides \$52 million specifically designated for new AIDS drugs. The Ryan White CARE Act originally

The Ryan White CARE Act originally passed in 1990. It expired on September 30, 1995. After a House-Senate conference committee hammered out a final version of the renewal bill, it passed the House on May 1<sup>st</sup> by a vote of 402-4. A day later, it passed the Senate unanimously.

The bill's passage was due to a number of reasons, observers say. One was the intense lobbying effort put in by the AIDS Action Council, HRC and other AIDS activist groups.

HRC played a key role in nullifying an amendment to the bill, proposed by anti-Gay Sen. Jesse Helms (R-NC), which would have excluded organizations that serve the Gay community from receiving federal funds under the law.

Had this happened, observers say, much of AIDS prevention and education would have fallen back to all volunteer groups who would not have been prepared to handle the load.

"This was a vindictive, discriminatory measure, considering that a large number of organizations providing care to people with HIV and AIDS are based in the Gay and Lesbian community," said Stachelberg, who also serves for HRC as co-chair of National Organizations Responding to AIDS.

The Helms amendment was replaced by language proposed by Sen. Nancy Kassebaum (R-KS), that prohibits the use of CARE funds to directly promote intravenous drug use or sexual activity, either hetero or homosexual.

Last year, as part of the drive to bolster congressional support for AIDS funding, HRC commissioned an unprecedented bipartisan poll demonstrating that voters of all political stripes favor maintaining or increasing federal efforts to care for people with AIDS.

HRC and other AIDS activist organizations vigorously opposed a provision of the bill that directs states to institute mandatory HIV testing of newborns if states cannot demonstrate by the year 2000 that they have significantly reduced mother-to-child HIV transmission.

However, that provision is mitigated somewhat by a provision of the bill promoting voluntary HIV counseling and testing for pregnant women as part of their prenatal care.

Milwaukee—By a vote of 6 to 3 the United States Supreme Court wiped away the hopes of those who tried to put Gay and Lesbian civil rights up for a vote. The ruling handed Gay and Lesbian activists what legal experts are calling their biggest legal victory ever.

The High Court rejected the State of Colorado's appeal of a Colorado Supreme Court decision that invalidated a controversial amendment to the State Constitution.

The Amendment, popularly known as Amendment 2. prohibited the passage of any laws that would prevent discrimination against Gays and Lesbians. There can be no appeal of the Court's decision.

The Majority Rules
Justices O'Connor, Kennedy, Stevens, Gizenberg, Breyer, and Souter shattered the hopes of Gay civil rights opponents with a sharply worded opinion written by Justice Kennedy.

Kennedy's majority opinion can and will now be cited in dozens of Gay and Lesbian civil rights cases winding their way through the Federal and State Court systems.

"We must conclude," Kennedy wrote, "that Amendment 2 classifies homosexuals not to further a proper legislative end but to make them second class citizens. This Colorado can not do. A State can not so deem a class of persons a stranger to its laws. Amendment 2 violates the Equal Protection Clause."

Precedent Set

The immediate effect of the ruling is to put an end to referendum campaigns that would limit or abolish Gay and Lesbian civil rights through voter approved amendments to State Constitutions. But the Court's ruling is likely to have an even bigger long range impact.

to have an even bigger long range impact.

It marks the first time that the U.S. Supreme Court has ruled that discrimination against Gays and Lesbians is unconstitutional.

Furthermore the Court cited the same judicial principles it had used to ban segregation and discrimination against African-Americans in the 1950's and 1960's.

Suzanne Goldberg, a staff attorney with the Lambda Legal Defense and Education Fund said "We believe the ruling should have ramifications for other attempts to treat Gay people as second class citizens-including the military's ban on openly Gay service members and proposals to prohibit legal recognition of same-sex couples' marriages."

Clinton, Others Praise Court

President Bill Clinton praised the decision, issuing a statement calling Amendment 2 "bad policy that is inconsistent with American values." Clinton had weighed into the controversy earlier.

During the heated 1994 Congressional Election campaign, he issued a public letter condemning attempts to pass state wide referendums that banned the passage of Gay civil rights laws.

Doug Nelson, Executive Director of the AIDS Resource Center of Wisconsin was in the White House with Clinton when the news broke. Along with 30 other AIDS Activists and AIDS service providers, Congressmen and Senators, Nelson was invited to watch as Clinton signed the renewal of the Ryan White CARE Act in the FDR Room adjacent to the Oval Office.

In an exclusive interview with Light Nelson said, "Everyone screamed and started applauding. Then the President came in with a broad smile and joined in the celebration. It was glorious."

In a statement provided to Wisconsin Light, the Wisconsin Civil Liberties Union said the decision "marks a sea change in the



### **Gunderson Fires Volley Against Bigotry and Hate From the Floor of Congress**

Washington, DC—Rep. Steve Gunderson of Wisconsin, the only openly Gay Republican in Congress, assailed a fellow Republican for publishing material suggesting he had helped sponsor a wild, Gay party in a federal building.

"The gentleman from California has every right to dislike me if he so chooses," Gunderson said Tuesday of California Rep. Bob Dornan, a zealous an unabashed homophobe.

"But he has no right to misrepresent the facts, nor the motives of others in this, his latest attempt to smear the Gay community."

Dornan published in the May 9<sup>th</sup> issue of the Congressional Record an article by freelance reporter Marc Morano stating that Gunderson was a sponsor of Gay events in two federal office buildings that were pervaded by illegal drugs and illicit sexual activities.

Gunderson, visibly upset, invoked a "point of personal privilege," a rarely used parliamentary procedure for speaking on the House floor when a lawmaker feels that his or her dignity or integrity has been harmed.

The Wisconsin Perublican said the

The Wisconsin Republican said the "Cherry Jubilee," held in Washington the weekend of April 12-14, was "a gift of love, not a weekend of illegal activity," that raised up to \$60,000 for two AIDS service organizations.

According to Gunderson, the main event, a Saturday night dance at the Mellon Auditorium in the Department of Commerce attended by 2,000, and a Sunday brunch in the courtyard of the Rayburn House Office Building, were held without incident.

"There is no evidence by anyone, including all security personnel and authorities at the Department of Commerce, of any illegal activity."

Gunderson said he was a host for the Sunday brunch, which he attended, but was not a

sponsor of the weekend.

Morano, a self-confessed Right Wing
Christian, said he conducted an "undercover

investigation" at the Saturday night party, and his article details lewd dancing, nudity, illicit sex and evidence of illegal drugs. He produced a videotape for the conservative Family Research Council and the article was the basis of a column by ultra conservative Black radio host Armstrong Williams.

"Hate and prejudice are the motives by which Mr. Morano and Mr. Williams sought

which Mr. Morano and Mr. Williams sought to totally misrepresent the fund-raising events," Gunderson said. Morano said he stood by everything in the

report and said, "I don't appreciate him referring to me as a bigot. It is a very straightforward account."

Dornan, who on Tuesday, May 7<sup>th</sup>, was leading an attempt to expel from the military anyone with the HIV virus and reinstate the ban on Gays in the military, had no comment on Gunderson's statement, his office said.

### The High Court's Decision on Amendment 2 is a Victory for All Americans

The President of the United States came out of the Oval Office and heard the cheering and the applause. He didn't have to ask why the 30 or so AIDS leaders gathered in a nearby room should be reacting this way. He knew. He'd been informed that the Supreme Court had struck down Colorado's Amendment 2. He was smiling broadly as he entered the room.

There are times in America's history when the country lives up to the promise that so bedazzled and beguiled the world in 1776: that all are equal, and free before the law. This is one of

While the national Gay organizations have called for celebrations across the land-and those are certainly justified-perhaps what serves us equally well-if not better-at this junction of events is a sigh of relief, and a few moments of reflective contemplation about what has just

In the opinion of some, this decision is our Emancipation Proclamation. If that is so, then it is well to remember that there was a long and terrible road between that and Brown v. the Board of Education. There were further trials between that and the Civil Rights Act of 1967. Still, for African-Americans, after all these years, the job of reaching full equality is not complete, nowhere near it, as a matter of fact.

The same will be true for us. We have a great victory, but our struggle goes on. Despite the court's decision, our youth still kill themselves, lost in bleak despair. We still lose jobs and homes because of who we are. There are still those among us who hate themselves

We must work for and continue to demand for ourselves, this country's highest ideal: equality. We want no more, but we can have no less.

We must pause and then go on, buoyed by the confidence that anyone who fights for human dignity as do we, will win-in the end.

Back in the days when a lot of us were growing up in small towns, it was said that nothing brought people closer together than some project in which everyone could have fun and work together for a good cause. Such is the Possum Queen Contest.

There's no real organization to it. That might disrupt the spontaneity of it. There are just very decent, fun-loving people having a wonderful time for themselves and, in the process, raising money to help those less fortunate than themselves.

We have been told that those involved with it, Max and the rest, don't want any thanks. Maybe not. But let us go on record here as saying that they honestly deserve it. What they do in having fun is to give people the opportunity to help out, to give, to fight back against something much bigger than ourselves.

Without trying to put too fine a point on it, the Contest and the Possum Queen are reigning symbols of all that is good and kind and compassionate in this community.

Now who this Joe is, I haven't a clue, but apparently it occurred to him to list all the summer's event here, including the various

Guess what? Joe's got everything from the Grape Lakes Festival to Indian Summer and just so you won't get all confused, he's conveniently divided them into "family festivals" and "ethnic festivals."

Su-prise, su-prise! PrideFest isn't listed.

Now to give Joe the benefit of the doubt he probably should be forgiven if he doesn't think of us in the ethnic category. Certainly we've got a culture of our own, one that is drawn from all cultures-plus the considerable amount we've created ourselves-but since Joe doesn't know us very well, he might have overlooked that.

But family? That's a different story alto-

And that brings me to what I want to talk about. Why I go to PrideFest-and why I think all of us should go.

I don't go because I'm proud of being Gay. Eliason aside (far aside), any more than the color of my hair or skin, I didn't have any choice in that. I am Gay. That's all that needs to be said about that.

I will go to show by my physical presence that I am a human being; that I will be treated as one, having dignity and deserving of re-

And I will go to show that I have a family. Yes, Joe, despite what you have been told or may think, we who are Gay, Lesbian, Bisexual or Transgendered, form families, honest, loving, caring families just like anybody else.

Joe, if you doubt that, then I invite you come to my house sometime. Come meet the sweetest, kindest, human being on earth who I am privileged to call my spouse. I love him, Joe, love him dearly.

Take a look at us, Joe, Jerry and me. See our "lifestyle," so derided by the Right Wing extremists.

"Lifestyle?" Jerry's and my "lifestyle, comes down to who's going to take out the garbage and who's going to wash the dishes.

The fact is, we're not any different from other same-sex couples we know. We, as they do, work to build a home for each other. We struggle. We compromise. We learn and grow. 



### Thoughts on Graduating From High School

Well, the time has finally come upon us. It is the time that only a few months ago I thought I might never see. It is nearly graduation time. Yes, it is time to finally kiss high school good-bye. It is a moment that is long awaited and a moment that has come all too fast.

I suppose I should be excited, and I suppose I am excited. I have fought hard for this moment and there are very few people who are not aware of that fact.

This final year of high school has been such a rush. It was more exciting than anyone can imagine to be the very first openly Gay student at my school. It was exhausting to fight a six month onslaught with the administration of my high school and it was very moving to wake up an entire synod of people to reality.

The reality, as they and I learned, is that we exist — and we are not about to roll over and die anymore in the hypocritical face of their "religion"

However, waking people up to the reality of our existence required many sacrifices as all Coming Out experiences do. At the very beginning of this venture it became clear that I would have to play my cards right if I was to stay in this school — and it was imperative that I stay in this school.

With all of our personal interests vested in ourselves and at grave risk, we often lose sight of the service that we are providing for other people. It is imperative to remember that our Coming Out is indeed providing an immense service for other people.

The road of the future is paved by the work of today. This fight has only taken about 6 months of my time. I don't regret it. However, think about how small my donation is in comparison to what many other people have given of themselves.

I have not fought a twenty year battle for inalienable rights that are past due like Lesbian activist Miriam Ben-Shalom.

I did not have to sacrifice my life as Harvey Milk did.

I never had to become an unwitting martyr as did many of my late peers who fought tirelessly for what they believed in, only to hand over their lives 15 years ago to that apocalyptic, genocidal disease that adorns itself with a red ribbon, the faces of our innocent young people, and the face of religious hypocrisy.

In lieu of the contribution of these people and surely hundreds of thousands more, my contribution seems dwarfed and as quiet as a white pearl flowing in a beach of white sand. However, no self-sacrifice of this sort can ever be fully in vain. The contribution that we have given is important. The contribution that a great many of you will give is important.

Every fantasy that has ever existed in my dreams is coming to life now. I am entering a new time in my life and, I imagine, so are you. The contributions that my generation will give

of themselves shall indeed be the white pearls flowing in a beach of white sand.

Thousands of people may walk over the seemingly silent contributions of the past every day. However, there will always be that one individual who will, as if it were by chance, stumble and discover the contributions of their predecessors. Another one of life's magical journeys begins.





### Bill Meunier to Receive PrideFest's Top Honor, the Lifetime Achievement Award

Bill Meunier works hard. Everyone who knows him knows that. He had a dream to make Wisconsin PrideFest into a respected national Pride celebration, and he was part of a core group that made it happen.

For that accomplishment and other successes, Bill Meunier will receive a Lifetime Achievement Award at PrideFest this year at the Hess Stage after the parade Sunday.

The story starts in June of 1987, in Chicago, where a contingent of Milwaukeeans joined Chicago's Gay Pride Parade, as they had for the past several years. Milwaukee had hosted small Gay Pride Parades of its own in the early 1980s. Despite the warm welcome in Illinois, some people started asking why Milwaukee couldn't do its own celebration again.

One of those persons asking was Bill. He had already been active in groups like the Gay People's Union, one of Milwaukee's first Gay and Lesbian organizations. He had worked as a tireless organizer for neighborhood groups and for his church festival. He had participated in political campaigns nurturing allies of the LesBiGay community and bringing in new allies.

He did all that and many other things in the Gay community. His direct personal style could sometimes startle people, but as one long-time friend puts it, "No one can ever say Bill's not always thinking of the community.

In September of 1988, a variety of LesBiGay organizations held events as part of "Rightfully Proud," the Milwaukee Lesbian and Gay Celebration. On June 17, 1989, the Milwaukee Lesbian and Gay Pride Committee held its first Gay/Lesbian Pride Parade and Rally at Cathedral Square downtown. The event was repeated the next year as "The Gay '90s, Look to the Future."

It was nice, but it wasn't nice enough for the Bill and his ambitious cohorts. In 1991, with the theme "Together in Pride," the Pride celebration moved to Juneau Park. It stayed there for the next year, "PrideFest '92," and for the "Forward in Pride '93 PrideFest."


But that wasn't good enough. There wasn't enough room for all the participants, performers, and vendors. So PrideFest, as it was officially known by then, moved down the hill to an area just north of the War Memorial Art Center along

The year 1994 was the 25th anniversary of the Stonewall Rebellion in New York City, the pivotal event in LesBiGay history that Pride celebrations commemorate. In that year, Milwaukee's PrideFest celebration called itself "Our Time To Shine." The next year, 1995, with fireworks added to the lineup, PrideFest celebrated "Live the Dream.

But already the limitations of the lakefront site were clear. It was too small and crowded. Renting stages, electrical generators, portable toilets and a million other things made the site expensive. The financially prudent step was to join Milwaukee's other festivals in their use of Summerfest grounds. Logically, it was the right thing to do. As a measure of pride, it was a sweet vic-

No festival runs easily. Behind the scenes you'll find countless hours of work and gallons of blood, sweat and tears. Bill has given more than his share. Along the way, he arranged for the first LesBiGay fundraiser in the City Hall Rotunda, Because of him, rainbow flags flew along Milwaukee's downtown streets. Bill became the most frequent guest on Milwaukee's cable access television's "Queer Bgram."

For all that and more, Bill will receive PrideFest's top honor.



### Jeff Krassner, A Sincere Sizzler in the Music World to Perform at PrideFest

With his first album, "Strong for You," Jeff Krassner has impressed critics with his sincerity and for the sizzle he put into a same-sex version of Dusty Springfield's "Son of a Preacher Man." Jeff will appear as part of the Saturday night Gayla on the Hess Stage.

"I wanted a cover song I could be real out on,"
Jeff said, "something where me using the original pronouns would be a little controversial."
When he began his singing career in the early 1980s, Jeff wondered about coming out. He did, and decided, "if I'm honest and the work is good, people will espond."

He eventually became executive co-director of Outmusic, an organization that provides opportunities for up-and-coming Gay and Lesbian songwriters, musicians, and sigers.

"If I'm strong enough to be out, maybe it will help someone else," he said. "I didn't have that when I was a kid."

He began his career as a featured performer at Catch-A-Rising-Star and The Improv, opening for Robin Williams, Rodney Dangerfield, and Jerry Seinfeld. In addition to the many clubs and industry showcases in which he's performed, Jeff has worked on five Grammy shows and preshows, and fronted for two bands.

Jeff has toured western Europe for a year in 1988-1989 in the 20th anniversary production of "Hair," eventually playing the lead role of Berger. He headlined an outdoor concert for the participants in the Boston/New York AIDS Ride and sang for crowds at Pride events in Philadelphia, Boston, and New York. He rocked the crowd of 55,000 people with his original music at Yankee Stadium's closing ceremonies of Gay Games IV on a bill with Patti LaBelle and Cyndi Lauper.

In May, he performed in his home town of Philadelphia for its PrideFest '96. This July, Jeff will perform at the closing concert of the opening weekend for the 1996 Summer Olympic Games in Atlanta

Meanwhile, his first album has won critical

praise for its energy and depth.
"I sing it the way I feel it," Jeff said. "And I do have a real soulful white-boy voice. Black music has been a big influence one me. Even as a kid, it resonated for me. Maybe it's the freedom in it, the freedom within the oppression that I identified with. Music has been my refuge for as long as I can remember."

He said he wanted an album that would be true to himself at this point in his life. "I wasn't worried about what's charting right or not. If so, I would have given the album more of an alternative edge," he said. "I wanted more of a soulful, honest album, not R&B as it is now with a lot of techno and drum machines."

Except for "Son of a Preacher Man," Jeff wrote all the songs on "Strong for You." The songs vary from rock to soul to gospel to hot

He will appear at PrideFest on the Harvey Milk Stage at 1:30 p.m. Sunday, June 9, to kick of an afternoon of country music.

### Jason Stuart, Finds Humor in Just Being Truthfully Himself

"There's nothing funnier than the truth," said Jason Stuart, a comic who will appear in the Saturday night Gayla on the Hess Stage.

He came out in 1993 on the television show "Geraldo," which proved to be smart career move. "Since coming out, my shows have been selling out," Jason said. "The more I tell the truth, the more successful I become."

Coming out was a smart move personally, of course. "It's very, very tiring, being in the closet," he said. He has taken his comedy performance, "I'm Out . . . Jealous?" to clubs around the country and to comedy shows across the television dial.

"The show is about me," he said. "I don't know what else it could be about. I could pretend to be Tom Cruise and do his life. It'd be a lot more interesting. But I can only talk about me."

Because Jason is an openly Gay comic, his shows have been picketed by conservative Christians carrying signs like "Fags Should Die!" in Kansas City, Tallahassee, and Walt Disney World, which scared him at first and shocked his own religious sensibilities. He has also received support he never would have gotten as a closeted Gay man.

He's performed at a lot of AIDS fundraisers, something he says he's proud to do. But he can joke, sardonically, at the toll the disease has taken on the Gay community. "We deserve something free. Like a car."

Jason is also pursuing an acting career. He has appeared in "seaQuest DSV," "The John Larroquette Show," "Murder, She Wrote," "Kindergarten Cop," and as the lead in "Gay TV: The Movie." He's also developing a sitcom pilot with Paragon Entertainment.

Recently, Jeff performed as the country headliner for RSVP Cruises, hosted the International Mr. Leather Contest, and profiled in the monthly Gay video magazine, Nework Q.

Dance drives his show with a solid mix of twosteps, line dances including the obscure but popular "Wild Wild West," waltzes, shuffles, swing, and even a polka—the "Condom Polka," sung to the tune of "Beer Barrel Polka": "Roll on a condom / Show who you're with that you care / Roll on a condom / Before my legs hit the air . .

Jeff adapts songs for his audiences. Sometimes it's flipped pronouns or other subtle changes. Other times it's a total rewrite, as with his most requested song, "Something in Black," a leather fantasy and a rewrite of "Something in Red." Jeff admits his version is "absolutely filthy," but it has made him a legend in the leather community and led to his invitations to host the Mr. Leather Contest and Pantheon. Jeff followed up that parody with a leather version of "Trashy Women."

Jeff's performance has been heavily influenced by dance. He learned ballet in rehab for a basketball injury. After discovering a fondness for dance, he switched his college major from marketing to musical theater. That background gives him "stage presence to spare," some say.

Speaking of basketball, Jeff won a gold medal in basketball at the 1986 Gay Games II with Team San Diego and performed his music at the 1990 Gay Games III.

This February, Jeff was called on to headline the Australian Line Dance Ltd. Harbour City Hoe Down at the Sydney, Australia, Mardi Gras festival. It was the first time that an American, Gay or Straight, was invited to appear.

Jeff has sung professionally for more than 15 years in everything from '50s groups to gospel quartets to Broadway touring companies. The hat is no act—Jeff has been competing on the Gay rodeo circuit for more than seven years.

dance tunes. He writes from personal experience, and the title song, "Strong for You," is about "everyone living with HIV or AIDS, about anyone who feels it's not safe to say who they really are," Jeff said.

"Strength, I think that's what we need. I want to inspire people."

The Irrepressible Romanovsky & Phillips Will be Flaunting It at PrideFest

By their own estimate, Paul Phillips and Ron Romanovsky have performed for more than 3 million people since their songs about the foibles of romance, politics and lifestyles first hit the stage in San Francisco in 1982.

They've played in more than 200 cities plus at two LesBiGay national marches in Washington and at more than 100 Gay Pride events. They'll also perform at the 1996 Wisconsin PrideFest on the Hess Stage Friday night.

The cabaret duo has sometimes been compared to the Smothers Brothers, although they insist the Smothers Brothers should be compared to them. Romanovsky and Phillips have sold more than 70,000 albums and won awards from a variety of groups, including the Christopher Street West Association and the American Society of Composers, Artists and Publishers.

Their most recent album, "Let's Flaunt It," ran into trouble getting produced because the lyrics of one song suggested that God must be a queen because parts of the world are just too well-decorated. Cover photos of Ron and Paul wearing nothing but well-placed musical instruments didn't help, either. They concluded that not everyone can take a joke.

Paul, at age 9, won first place in the New Jersey state baton twirling championship. He had made his stage debut as a singer at age 7, and in high school showed "great promise" as a cheerleader. As a teenager, he once cooked dinner for Ted Koppel.

Later, at Wheaton College in Illinois (Billy Graham's alma mater), Paul was barred from participation in the Men's Glee Club European tour because he wasn't "manly enough." In Bloomington, Indiana., he was thrown out of a bar for dancing with another man and filed the first U.S. test case to ever go to a hearing of a local human rights ordinance protecting Gays and Lesbians.

Ron describes his childhood in suburban Pittsburgh as miserable. He ran away from home, flunked gym class, and wrote novels to cope with harassment from homophobic classmates. As soon as he could, he moved to San Francisco, began writing songs, and met Paul in Golden Gate Park in 1981.

Ron is now an active member of the Friends of the Accordion and the Closet Accordion Players of America, and has combined accordion playing and Rollerblading to create the sport "Squeezeblading," something that might catch on at McKinley Park in Milwaukee.

Catch their show - and be prepared to laugh.

### The Yell Leaders Bring a Unique Sound to PrideFest '96

When a Milwaukee band, The Yell Leaders, released a song three years ago called "I'm Troubled," critics called it "twisted and brooding," "quirky," and "heartbreaking." The song won a song of the year nomination from the Wisconsin Area Music Industry and the band earned a best new band nomination.

When The Yell Leaders released an album, "Thursday," critics became more confused by the range of songs: "a friendly, pensive sound that feels great as the weather gets warmer," said one reviewer. "The songs' intelligent lyrics express many different personal feelings that most of us can relate to very well."

The members of The Yell Leaders may be familiar to Milwaukeeans: Mary Schmid, vocals; Julie Straszewski, vocals; Bobby Tanzillo, drums; Brian Wooldridge, bass and vocals (yes, one of the Wooldridge brothers); and Joe Vent, guitar and vocals.

Band members also donated a song, "What Life Brings," to the Large Thumb Club's annual fundraising compact disc, which will benefit the Camp Heartland Project summer camp for children with HIV/AIDS.



### The Rainbow Flag Continues the Link Between Our Community and Color

Color has long been associated with Lesbians and Gays. In Victorian England, the color was green. Lavender became the color of choice for the Gay and Lesbian movement in the late 1960s.

A frequently heard chant in the early post-Stonewall Pride Parades was "Purple Power." The pink triangle, although first used by the Nazis to identify Gay men in concentration camps, became a popular symbol of liberation in the 1980s.

So it is natural that LesBiGays today have

adopted a flag of many colors.


In 1978, Gilbert Baker of San Francisco made the first Rainbow Flag. Using a sports flag, "The Flag of the Race," as his model, Baker dyed and sewed the material himself.

The original Rainbow Flag had eight stripes. The colors were pink, red, orange, yellow, green, blue, indigo, and violet. According to Baker, those colors represented sexuality, life, healing, the colors represented sexuality, life, healing, the colors represented sexuality.

In response to this tragedy, the 1979 San Francisco Pride Committee decided to use the Rainbow Flag as a symbol to show their community's strength and unity.

The committee eliminated the indigo stripe so it could divide the colors evenly along its parade route, three colors on each side of the street. The six color version soon became popular, but its popularity was largely limited to San Francisco.

Then in 1989, the flag received national attention. John Stout sued his West Hollywood landlords when they prohibited him from flying the flag from his apartment balcony. Stout won, and the attention his suit garnered brought the Rainbow Flag to the forefront of Lesbian and Gay symbols.

Partly as a result of that suit, the International Congress of Flag Makers recognized the Rainbow Flag in 1989.

Today untold millions of rainbow bumper stickers, pins, shirts, and flags are displayed and worn by Gays and Lesbians throughout the country. Gilbert Baker's flag may have lost two of its stripes, but the idea remains the same.

The Rainbow Flag symbolizes our unity and our diversity. Whenever and wherever someone raises a rainbow flag for the first time, they are doing more than just displaying a flag. They are writing a new chapter in the proud history of the movement it repesents.

### PrideFest to Host Wedding for Couples to Vow their Love

Marriages mean a lot, said the Rev. Lew Broyles, pastor of Milwaukee's Metropolitan Community Church. They mean a lot politically these days, but they are more than an imitation of Straight customs.

"They show we are sincere and genuine in our promises to one another and in our promises to the Divine,"Broyles said.

This year as in previous years, PrideFest will host a wedding at 6:30 p.m. Sunday, June 9, at the Hess Stage. Last year, 77 couples made vows, in addition to couples renewing their vows.

Clergy from three denominations will officiate. A wedding cake similar in size but not design to last year's, which served 620 people generously, will be provided to participants and their wedding guests. Special music will again be performed.

To participate, couples must register for \$10 at the MCC/Wedding Booth in the Market Place, which will be marked with a banner reading "PrideFest Wedding Registration." Each couple will receive boutonnicres, a certificate, and a wedding photo. They will also receive a copy of the vows for the ceremony.

It also allows teams that are more recreational in a nature, a good shot at taking home a trophy.



# OUT on Film

### 'It's My Party' Is a Difficult Film to See, But One that Should be On Your List

Cinematic representations of AIDS have long been, shall we say, problematic. At least for Gay men and Lesbians. With typical Hollywood morality, PWAs are invariably portrayed as innocent victims of a virus which they most certainly did not deserve, that is to say "heterosexual."

The faces of AIDS, once sinisterly referred to as "the Gay cancer", for mainstream America are, for the most part, small children, pregnant women and the like, is not an irony missed by Glenn.

When in those rare occasions Gay men are depicted as protagonists in AIDS (melo)dramas, the results have ranged from idealized (Longtime Companion) to the sanitized (Philadelphia).

Randal Kleiser's recent It's My Party boasts the best of intentions in seeking to place AIDS within a Gay sensibility and, refreshingly enough, with an intended Gay audience. Unfortunately, as Glenn knows all too well, even the best of intentions in this world are rarely enough.

Best of intentions notwithstanding, moviegoers are likely to find It's My Party a strained, difficult affair.

The affair in question is a farewell party for Nick (Eric Roberts). Nick, a Los Angeles architect, has been fending off AIDSrelated illnesses. Time and circumstance do indeed catch up with Nick: he has untreatable brain lesions and is likely to, in the matter of a few short days, degenerate into a state similar to that of a root vegetable. Before bidding this oh-so mortal world

adieu, Nick wants to go out with a bang.

With the able assistance of loyal friends Charlene (Margaret Cho) and Tony (Paul Regina), Nick impulsively, chaotically plans a farewell soiree and swansong.

Over the course of not one, but two agonizing days, the many and varied disparate friends and family members of Nick group together. To laugh. To cry. To fight. To love. To see if Nick and ex-lover Brandon (Gregory Harrison) will get together before it's too late.

Brandon was the love of Nick's life. They had seemed, to one and all, to be living a fairy tale existence

Here are two attractive, successful Gay men who were in a long-term loving relationship. A fairy tale perhaps until the arrival of the AIDS.

Cut to reality: Brandon finds himself unable to handle Nick's illness and the two go through a bitter break up. Nick is literally kicked out of the home he himself de-

Cut to the present. The Party. All seems to be going well. At least as well as such a ghoulish affair is like to go. Guests are clearly uncomfortable. Only Nick seems to be enjoying himself but it is his party after all. (Does Glenn dare mention that Nick is the most attractive man present.)

Against his wishes. Charlene has invited Brandon to the party. With Brandon's arrival, a dark cloud descends upon this otherwise charmed event.

### 'Horseman on the Roof' is a Delight for the Eye and a Feast for the Mind

Occasionally Glenn goes to the cinema, with no Gay political agenda clutched desperately in his clammy little fist. Rather, Glenn can be seen balancing a "family-sized" popcorn and a "biggie" Diet Pepsi. Only entertainment is on Glenn's

The enjoyment is amplified by the guilty pleasures offered by the opportunity to see a movie for free on a damp and drizzly afternoon while playing hooky from work. No review deadline looms on Glenn's immediate horizon.

Treading amidst the treacherous terrain of Gay films seeking to sneak into to multiplexes far and wide dominated by big summer blockbusters, Glenn happens upon a film every so often that demands an audience by virtue of its sheer cinematic joy. Horseman on the Roof is such a film.

Director Jean-Paul Rappeneau has turned to Jean Giono's literary masterpiece, Horseman on the Roof to create his splendidly romantic tale of courage and gallantry, of honor and betrayal, of love and of death.

Far away removed from the pessimism of our so cynical age, Rappeneau transports us back to a picaresque era, a dangerous time filled with violence and disease yet where real value is placed on such simple virtues as honesty and integ-

rity.
The year is 1832. Following the fall of Napoleon, the vast and omnipotent Austrian Empire controls much of the continent. In Italy, a brave band of freedom fighters, the Carbonari continued the fight for the freedom of their homeland from exile in France.

Angelo Pardi (Olivier Martinez) is such a Carbonari. Set against a carnival celebrations taking place through the streets of Aix-en-Provence, Austrian spies are

Equal measure of circumstance and fate delivers Angelo to Manosque, a city experiencing the full devastation of a cholera epidemic. Hysterical citizens denounce Angelo as a poisoner of their water supply

Again, Angelo is forced to flee. Angelo seeking and ultimately finds refuge on the city's rooftops. There, unseen, Angelo can gaze upon the madness that has enveloped the city.

Under the cover of nightfall, Angelo quietly drops into the attic of a seemingly deserted building. Despite his stealth, Angelo is discover by the beautiful, if curiously unflappable Pauline de Theus (Juliette Binoche).

Thus begins an extraordinary journey as Angelo and Pauline transverse the magnificent French countryside, death and destruction surrounding them at every turn. Together they will battle the epidemic, a crazed populace, and their own increasingly impassioned emotions.

Here is indeed a simple story. Rappeneau presents in Pauline a beautiful and virtuous heroine. Angelo is truly a protagonist of heroic proportions: fearless, courageous yet honorable.

Blazing with wealth of glorious passions, Horseman is set thrillingly against the exciting backdrop of a European continent facing great political and sociological upheavals.

With extraordinary performances from both Martinez and Binoche, a lush musical score by Jean-Claude Petit and a glorious tapestry of the beautiful French countryside, Horseman on the Roof is a feast for the eye and for the mind. Most highly recommended!

Mermaids Singing. In When Night is Falling we meet

Camille (Pascale Bussieres), a theology professor at a small religious college somewhere in Canada. She's engaged to a follow professor, Martin (Henry Czerny). They are urged to marry and become cochaplins of the college by the Rev. De-Boer (David Fox).

When her dog dies suddenly, Camille finds herself crying in the laundromat where she meets Petra (Rachel Craw-

Petra is a circus performer in a poorman's Cirque du Soleil-ish, the Kircus of Petra flirts with Camille, who would rather be friends. "Like Thelma and Louise, without the guns," says Camille. The two do become friends, and

Hounded by creditors, the circus must leave town, and Petra will have to leave, too. Camille, who still feels affection for Martin, must make a choice between the

woman she wants and the man she once

The nice thing about When Night Is Falling is that the characters are attractive and complicated people. Martin is not a lout, someone easy to leave. He's a very sympathetic person, yet not a vic-

The element of religion brings another dimension to the film, and adds another layer to Camille. Rozema's direction was at times, clever. A particularly nice touch was a scene in which Camille and Martin are in the office talking while Petra can been seen frolicking through the window. The sex scenes are hot and steamy.

On the down side; do we need another film where the characters are so opposite? Camille is richer, whiter, and older than Petra. Do we really need another lesbo flick in which the Lesbian "seduces" the sorta straight woman?

And why must Lesbian films be shot with dramatic symbolism? It gives an otherwise good film a rather Film School

On the whole, When Night Is Falling rates 3 and a half out of 5 ju-ju-bees. And if you go see the film, make sure you sit through the credits.

### 'Mission Impossible' Is Bland Film that Doesn't Live Up to the Name

For a summer blockbuster to emerge as THE SUMMER BLOCKBUSTER, a director must, as if some sort of mediaeval alchemist, spin gold from often the most mundane of ingredients.

Glenn imagines that most everyone will agree that such cinematic ventures require action, lots of action. There should be some spiffy special effects thrown in. And don't forget a star.

Probably someone in the 15 to 20 million dollar category. Still, while the prerequisite ingredients may be no secret, the formula, more often than not, inevitably proves elusive.

Enter Mission Impossible. As a mere youth, Glenn has fond memories of the original 60's television series. Glenn would plead, beseech, beg, implore and generally make such a scene that Glenn's parents would inevitably acquiesce and grudgingly allow him to stay up well past his normal bedtime to watch Jim Phelps and company set forth on their latest adventure.

Just how would Cruise and DePalma bring to life this 60's classic was paramount in their minds as Glenn and dear friend Kiki attended the highly secret and somewhat clandestine press screening last evening.

On paper Mission Impossible looks like a sure thing. Tom Cruise is a star of the highest magnitude in Hollywood (despite those pesky rumors that he is Gay). The success on the big screen of such disparate 60's TV shows as Batman and The Brady Bunch have proved nostalgia a potent ingredient. Throw in plenty of Hi-Tech gimmickry plus some nifty special effects and there you have it. A SUMMER BLOCKBUSTER.

Or then again, maybe not.

Following a promising opening sequence, complete with that absolutely marvelous "Mission Impossible"-theme by Lalo Schrifin and the obligatory "Your mission, Jim, should you choose to accept it...",

Cruise and company radically depart from the formula that proved such a success with in the long-running series. Jim Phelps is back, not played by the suave, if wooden Peter Graves but instead by a puffy, haggard-looking Jon Voight. The rest of Mr. Phelps crack-team will be new to 90's audiences with Tom Cruise ably filling the role as the group's hotshot maverick, Ethan Hunt and a delightful, unbilled cameo by that former stud puppy, Emilio Estevez.

TV audiences in the 60's always knew, deep down, that Graves, Greg Morris, Barbara Bain and Martin Landau, despite whatever adversities thrown their way, would ultimately emerge triumphant. Then again, the 1960's were perhaps a more innocent time, when Americans still felt that the United States ruled the world and our spies could do no wrong.

Not so in the cynical 90's. Within moments of the opening credits, Phelp's mission goes wrong, very, very wrong and all on the team save Hunt and Phelps' wife Claire (Emmanuelle Beart) are systematically butchered.

Hunt is "disavowed" and the rest of the film pits him against spies, both ours and theirs (whoever "theirs" are).

Glenn won't spoil the plot for loyal readers of the Wisconsin Light. Cruise, DePalma and screenwriter David Koepp (Jurassic Park) keep the audience guessing (but conveniently add in scenes where characters re-cap what's been going on, in case anyone is confused).

Vanessa Redgrave has a few winning moments, looking for all the world like a James Bond villainess (and probably wishing she was). Tom Cruise's pumped up biceps are likewise impressive.

Mission Impossible is sure to earn oddles of dollars. But when the last of the popcorn is munched and the last of the soda is slurped, Mission Impossible proves disappointing.

Forget seeing any cameos of the original team. In fact this mission foregoes all of the delightfully cheesy 60's camp that made the series so memorable. Rather, this is a bland mission, a mission without humor and without romance.

Hello, it's the '90's. If you don' t have a computer, now is the time to get one, upgrade or dust off your Pentium. In this and future columns I will take you through what you need and what's available in cyberspace.

Cruising cyberspace, you can bump into everyone from military analysts and academics to computer geeks, hyperactive technopunks, and outdoor enthusiasts seeking the latest ski report, not to mention software company spies charting their competitors' latest moves, but before we can get on-line let's check your hardware. You do this by logging onto the Internet

We're not going to assume that you understand even one piece of Internet jargon or can define the latest cyberbuzzword. Instead, we'd like to walk you through, step by step, everything you need to know to get plugged in, logged on, and up to speed on the information superhighway. Even if you're already on-line, you'll still find plenty of interest in this special, in-depth section.

Most PCs on sale today can handle anything the Internet throws their way with a little help. Here's a rundown of what you'll need for optimal access.

What You Need

Computer—Should be at least a 486/50 megahertz or faster. Most Internet applications run under Windows, so fast Windows performance is a must. It should at at least eight megabytes of memory but some programs will use more if you can allocate it.

Modem—14.4 modems, are pretty much the baseline standard. However, a 28.8 is worth the extra money. You'll get significantly faster Internet cruising and speedier downloading of graphics.

Video Card—Because data can come in only so fast, nearly any card is adequate. If your card handles graphic images well, it'll be fine for most of the stuff you download. However, a Windows-accelerated video card will speed up everything you do if you're in Windows.

Hard Drive—Since you'll be downloading all sorts of goodies, you'll probably want at least a 500 MB hard drive. If you don't have that much space, you can either use disk compression software (available at most computer stores) or buy a new hard drive. Although the latter suggestion may sound expensive, hard-drive memory upgrades are actually quite affordable, around 50 cents megabyte.

Sound Card—Nearly all Internet programs and many files have sound effects. You need a sound card to be able to hear them. Any 16- or 32-bit sound card with Windows drivers should be just fine. Buy one based on how it sounds to you and how well it fits your budget.

Monitor—A 15-inch monitor is certainly sufficient, but you'll save yourself a lot of eye strain with a 17-inch monitor. Don't even think about anything smaller, you'd be amazed at how tiny a 14-inch monitor seems when you're looking at graphics.

Speakers—You can spend anywhere from \$25 to more than \$300 on speakers for your PC. As with the sound card, your choice depends on budget and the level of sound quality you want. You could run your PC straight into a stereo, if one happens to be nearby.



### Out of a Cold Night in February, Came a Softball Tourney that Blooms and Grows

I remember it so very well, as if it were yesterday, as a matter of fact. Isn't it amazing how simple are the beginnings of great things? That certainly was the case with what we now call The Milwaukee Classic, the granddaddy of all the softball tournaments—and, in my opinion, the very best. But I digress.

The Milwaukee Classic began nearly 20 years ago. Three guys on a cold night in February, 1978, were sitting around, having a drink and thinking of spring. What else do you do in Milwaukee on a snowy February evening?

The snow was blowing hard, the wind sounded like a banshee. Someone looked up and suggested brightly, "Why don't we have a softball tournament over the Memorial Day weekend?

To the others, that sounded like a great idea and after batting the idea around for awhile (no pun intended), the three of us asked Wayne Bernhagen, owner of the Wreck Room, if he would sponsor such an event?

Wayne, who had cabin fever as badly as anyone else and who was always ready to promote Milwaukee and the Gay community said "Go for it!"

So then came the next questions. How do we contact people? Who do we invite? How are we going to get anyone to come to Milwaukee in May?

Someone suggested Bob Damron's Gay Guide. After going through that, we came up with over 50 names of organizations and sent invitations out all over the country. Now, would they come?

The Breakthrough

The breakthrough came from New York. Richie Diaz said he would have his Eagles team join us. Then word came from Toronto that they would join us as well. To our surprise and pleasure, The Classic became international in its first year.

We called it The Wreck Room Classic because of Wayne's generosity in sponsoring it. The Eagles won that first Classic after a tough struggle with a women's team from La Crosse.

The following year, in 1979, the Gay Softball World series was held in Milwaukee, so The Classic was not held. However, in 1980, 11 out of town teams joined 8 Milwaukee entries to watch as the M & M Club from Milwaukee took the title.

#### The West Coast Joins In

West Coast teams from Los Angeles and San Francisco joined us in 1981, increasing The Classic's participation to 22 teams. That year, Milwaukee's Wreck Room Chaps defeated the Nu Town Saloon of Los Angeles to take the championship.

In 1982 we again had 22 teams participating. The Pendulum Pirates of San Francisco warmed up for their eventual World Series victory by taking the Classic.

In 1983, the number of teams increased by one as 23 teams participated. The Wreck Room Chaps returned the Classic Cup to Milwaukee in a thrilling nine inning victory over Sidetrack of Chicago.

1984, the final year for the Wreck Room Classic brought 26 teams to Milwaukee. Griff's of Los Angeles took the trophy back to the West Coast.

In 1985 we "Captured the Spirit" and hosted another World Series so there was no Classic.

The Classic Changes Hands

For health reasons Wayne Bernhagen had to yield up his sponsorship. He asked the Saturday Softball Beer League (SSBL) to take over sponsorship of The Classic in 1986. The League accepted and 20 teams played in the tournament that was now called the Milwaukee Classic.

The Cloud Nine Americans of Minneapolis avenged an earlier loss to Redoubt of Chicago beating them twice in the final to win the championship.

The Americans repeated their success in 1987 and Club 1270 of Boston became the first Recreational Division champion as a new division is added to the tournament.

Chicago and New York came through in 1988 as Side Track captured the Competitive and Ty's/Chelsea Transfer won the Recreational crown. The 10<sup>th</sup> Classic, held in 1989, brought

The 10" Classic, held in 1989, brought 33 teams to Milwaukee as the women joined in. Burkhardt's of Atlanta took the Competitive Division, while Venture Inn of Philadelphia captured the Recreational championship and Club 1270 of Boston won the Women's division.

The Classic In the 90's

In 1990 the Classic was mostly—how do I say it?— "bad."

Blake's Bad Boys of Atlanta won the Recreational and the M & M Bad Girls of Milwaukee took the women's cup. Not so bad were the Saloon Americans of the Twin cities who recaptured the Competitive Division.

1991 saw the Classic's first no-hitter as Ray led Spike's Black Sox of New York to the Competitive title. At the same time, the Brass Rail edged out the Wreck Room Spurs of Milwaukee for the Recreational crown.

Big Field, Big Move, Cold Weather

The largest Classic field ever came in 1992 with 46 teams participating. Unfortunately, that was a cold spring as wind chill temperatures dropped down into the teens. Nothing daunted and because of the record number of teams, the tournament was moved to Wick Field. Chicago Sidetrack and the Twin Cities Brass Rail Bandits took the championships that

In 1994 28 teams participated. The Cincinnati Cats, Chicago's Granville Station and Your Place (the YP) of Milwaukee won their divisions and took home trophies.


Last year twenty one teams played in

So that's how it was. As they say, big things from tiny concepts grow. From a cold and snowy night in the Wreck Room, and three guys longing for spring, came one of the best—if not the best—softball tournaments in the country. We in Milwaukee can be proud of that.







### Interview with Superior's Main Club Owner, Bob Jansen

Bob Jansen is the owner of the Main Club in Superior. A recognized leader of the Superior WI/Duluth, Minnesota community. Jansen has been honored by PrideFest, which gave him a Stonewall award in 1994. In addition, this year he has been named an honorary Grand Marshal of the Minneapolis Pride Parade.

Wisconsin Light: You own the Main Club, you've been an activist and a leader. What's it like to be a leader in the Twin Ports Area.

Bob Jansen: It's kinda like being a senator's wife, youre not elected to the position, but you have to act a different way. You have to be nice.

WL: Why did you decide to own a Gay bar in a remote portion of the state?

BJ: I was a faculty member of the College of St. Scholastica. They fired me, because I was Gay. I filed a greviance with them. The final settlement was a year's salary and that's what I used for the down payment on the Main Club. So my background to teach helped me be a capitalist.

When you sue the school you work for, you're not going to get another job in edu-

WL: Was this the first Queer bar in Superior?

BJ: It was the first open bar, other bars were there but they weren't openly Gay. WL: Did that mean you got a lot of heat?

BJ: Yes. Customers were afraid to walk in. They had never dealt with an openly Gay owner of a openly Gay bar.

WL: Did you have problems with the local police?

BJ: I'd rather talk about the present with the Police. Now we have a liaison police officer for the community. And the police have had homophobia workshops led by Lesbian and Gay officers from the Madison to help them understand. I'm glad that happened people need to speak their own language an activist would just be perceived as having an ax to grind.

WL: What are your hobbies? BJ: I like to play with leather.

WL: What do you do with leather?

BJ: Anything I can. WL: Is there a leather community up

BJ: The four of us get together when we can. We have one of everything in our

community, which is healthy because we learn from each other that way. One of the great things about Supe-

rior/Duluth is that young people talk with old people. Drag queens talk with nondrag queens.

WL: Where does the Main Club draw people from.


BJ: We attract people from Duluth and Superior. There are about 100,000 between the two of them and then people come from up to 150 miles away because there isn't anything else up here.

WL: What's different about a crowd in a town like Superior versus Milwaukee?

BJ: What you see is what you get. Most of the people have a special Saturday night outfit. Its pretty much a working class environment. When it gets 40 below everyone dresses like a Lesbian. They put their Syrells. (the boots you wear to ice fish) to stay warm. No one worries about how they're dressed at that point.

WL: How do you get people to come out when its 40 below?

BJ: I think its important to establish rituals in any community. So we have a Blue Moon Ball, which is a formal occasion where people can celebrate together. We also have our Christmas Sing Along, a Toys for Tots drive and our "Tacky Gift Exchange." You have to bring something you want to throw out, but it can't be

something live like an animal or an exlover. We also have a Bob night. You come as a bob, wear a bob or be a bob. We have a bob a que and serve fish ka

WL: How do you view the Twin Ports Area?

BJ: With rosy sun glasses. The state ends at Highway 8 which cuts across the top fourth of the state. That's about Wausau's level. I think that our Superior and Duluth community is in its adolesence and growing.

WL: So what would say to people from say Milwaukee or Madison or Green Bay, for why they should come on up and visit the Main Club.

BJ: We love fresh meat. Plus we're putting in a horse shoe pit next to the patio behind the bar. Horse shoes are a non-

sexist form of entertainment.

We are very PC, it is haven for women (or men) who like to wear plaid shirts, keep a dog, drive a four wheel drive vehicle, camp out and read poetry. Its kinda rustic in a way,

WL: You are kind of the leader up in the Twin Ports Area. How does that impact on you and why?

BJ: Not every agrees with my politics. I believe that people should be comfortable with where they are at. I don't believe in outting anyone. I should point out that there are other good leaders around, but the fact is that they don't always be quoted in the paper.

WL: What does Pride mean to Bob Jansen?

BJ: Pink triangles, rainbows hoopteeha



### BestD Clinic Has a Long History of Serving Milwaukee's Gay Community

Milwaukee--Throughout its 22 year history, the BestD Clinic has been in the forefront of fighting sexually transmitted diseases (STD's).

Originally an arm of the Gay People's Union (GPU), the GPU-VD Clinic was founded in 1974. The idea was to provide confidential VD exams, treatment and information to Gays and Lesbians.

In 1982, GPU spun off the Clinic and it moved to its current site at 1240 E. Brady Street in Milwaukee's lower East Side. Originally the Clinic used just the first floor of the historic 1885 building purchased by Dr. Roger Gremminger, a Clinic volunteer.

After the move, the Clinic's name changed from the Brady East STD Clinic, evolving into the BestD acronym now popularly used for the Clinic.

The name isn't all that changed though. In 1990, Gremminger gifted his equity in the Clinic's building. This insured the Clinic a permanent home.

The Clinic remodeled its space in 1994. Amazingly, while the remodeling was proceeding, the Clinic continued to operate with no interruption in its services.

In 1995 BestD used a grant from the Faye MacBeath foundation to remodel the second floor. The renovation has provided two comfortable meeting rooms, a room for the BestD resource center and a small office which was donated to PrideFest.

Because it is totally volunteer, the Clinic has been able to be flexible in its approach to fighting STD's through education, prevention and detection. The onset of the AIDS crisis in Milwaukee showed the value of that approach.

BestD clinic volunteers have been heavily involved in the initial response to the AIDS crisis. In fact the first response to AIDS in Milwaukee came from a small dedicated group of BestD volunteers.

The Milwaukee AIDS Project Committee worked with the City of Milwaukee and other funders to underwrite a new program moving into uncharted and relatively unknown areas.

By 1985, HIV testing was a major program at BestD. BESTD does only anonymous testing. Even the volunteers conducting the tests do not the names of the people they are testing.

BestD volunteers also played a key role in the founding of what is now known as the Milwaukee AIDS Project (MAP) and in 1986, the Clinic's MAP Committee transferred its assets to the AIDS Resource Center of Wisconsin.

In 1987, the Clinic began satellite testing at the M & M Club and the Wreck Room. These traveling clinics have expanded and regular stops are now made at most of Milwaukee's Gay and Lesbian bars and clubs.

BestD Clinic also provided a venue for the first HIV+ support groups, which began meeting at the Clinic in 1985. The group has met continuously ever since.

The Clinic continues its work against HIV infection through testing Monday, Tuesday and Wednesday and with its outreach work at various bars and clubs.

With a volunteer force of over 100 committed and dedicated volunteers, the BestD clinic conducts over 250 HIV tests per month in addition to testing and treating around 40 people per week for other STD's.

BestD is a 501(c)3 organization. It offers completely confidential HIV testing by appointment on Monday, Tuesday and Wednesday. A walk in General STD Clinic is held every Tuesday from 6 p.m. to 9:00 p.m. A Women's walk in STD Clinic is offered on the first and third Thursdays of the month.



The film, which will be shown in its entirety, tells the story of a Muslim living with AIDS, his acceptance of the disease, and his giving back to the Gay community. Also honored and shown is Shaving the Castro directed by Johnny Symons, about a barbershop in San Francisco's Castro area that has changed with the times.

Stonewall on the Screen
In the Life talks to producer Christine

Vachon and actors Guillermo Diaz and Frederick Weller about the long-awaited film, Stonewall. The movie, by the late director Nigel Finch (The Lost Language of Cranes), explores the zeitgeist of New York's Greenwich Village during the summer of 1969 and the events leading up to the watershed riots that gave birth to the Gay rights movement.

Pride without Borders

In the Life honors "Pride Without Borders", the international theme of Gay Pride '96, with a tour of the many cultures and countries In the Life has visited over the past two years. 

### Jeff Krassner's New CD is Old **Fashioned Soul With a Gay Twist**

This is an old fashioned soul album. In fact this is exactly the kind of album that Aretha Franklin used to make. Krassner's cover of Dusty Springfield's "Son of a Preacher Man" will probably get the most attention and deservedly so. Why did no one think of this before?

The gimmick of having a man sing about being initiated by the "son of a preacher man" would probably stand on its own but it certainly helps that Krassner has a strong voice and an able back up band.

As good as "Son of a Preacher Man" is, the track that stuck in my head was "I Hear the Angels Sing" which is just a hauntingly beautiful Gay love song.

Elsewhere Krassner tends to be more gender neutral in his love songs. Strong For You opens and closes with "The Powers that Be". In its first appearance it is a gospel style raver with excellent backing vocals and top notch saxophone work from Crispin Cioe.

The second time around Guido Osorio remixes it into a house track with definite club potential. The opening drum beats sound like they were sampled from Soul Solution's "Find a Way" but overall the feel is closer to Clivelles and Coles' production of Aretha Franklin on "A Deeper Love".

3 B's used to be known as a Country Western bar, but now offers a regular DJ on Friday and Saturday nights from 9 until Close.. 3 B's is located at 1579 S. 2nd St.

3 B's is open from 3 to Close Monday thru Friday and Noon to Close Saturday and Sunday. There is no cover except for special events.


In It's My Party, Kleiser has made a brave attempt at portraying the extended, surrogate family many Gay men develop in their lives as well as the multitude of often conflicting emotions present in the face of losing a loved one.

Eschewing plot, Kleiser relies upon characters to compel us, the dialogue to engage us. Sadly, Kleiser is saddled with uneven writing and some mighty wooden performance which prove to diminish the film's message and effectiveness.

It's My Party is saved by a surprisingly effective performance by Eric Roberts as Nick. No ideal "victim", Robert's Nick is irritating and arrogant but brave and very human. Also effective are Bronson Pinchot as Nick's acerbic friend Monty and George Segal as Nick's befuddled alcoholic father. As for Gregory Harrison, well... he still looks good without his shirt on.

It's My Party isn't going to be the most fun social event on anyone's schedule, but still is a worthy film deserving an audience. Recommended.







### Man Living With AIDS Seeks State Senate Seat

Montpelier, VT-AP-Former Defender General David Curtis, who has been diagnosed with AIDS, has said Thursday he may run for the state Senate from Chittenden County. Curtis, a Burlington Democrat, said he feels good physically and is anxious to run. But, he added, "The bottom line for me is whether I can physically serve.

'I think I'm doing reasonably well. I'm pleased, frankly," he said. 'Certainly any campaign that I would wage would have to take into consideration some of the limitations that I have.'

Curtis is being urged to run by 22 Chittenden County politicians who

signed a petition of support.

Curtis served in the Vermont House as a Republican in 1974. Two years later, he ran unsuccessfully as both a Democrat and Republican for attorney general. He now considers himself a

He said his interest in the Senate was sparked by concern for what he sees as a growing lack of civility.

I'm concerned over the past few years about the deterioration of the collegial atmosphere that used to be present in the Legislature," he said. "It bothers me ... It seems to me that the Senate is becoming more and more partisan and fails to look at what we need to do for the betterment of the people of Vermont.

### Gay Fair Canceled Over Religionists' Protests

Holly, MI-AP-A Gay commitment fair scheduled for the third weekend in May was canceled after more than 100 people called organizers to voice their opposition.

If this isn't an example of extreme hate-mongering, I don't know what is," said Jeff Montgomery, president of the Detroit-based Triangle Foundation, which monitors crimes against Gay men and Lesbians

Ninety couples registered for the May 19 event. The fair, organized by First Choice Travel, was to include the staples of bridal fairs, from jewelers to photographers to florists, and a drawing for one couple to be joined in union. Montgomery said people called the travel agency, which is in Holly and specializes in arranging travel for Gay men and Lesbians, and said they would picket the fair. At least two calls were death

threats, he said.

Jeff Maxwell, minister at Calvary United Methodist Church in Holly, said he encouraged about 270 parishioners at Sunday's services to call the travel agency in opposition. "What somebody does in their bedroom is their business," he said. "What happens in the public domain is everyone's business. We had the responsibility to respond and share our opinion. Such a ceremony is inappropriate."

### Doctors Say Thai Hospitals Not Ready for AIDS

Bangkok, Thailand-AP- Provincial doctors are warning that there are not enough hospital beds in Thailand to care for the number of HIV-positive people who will develop the AIDS vi-

Because of the high number of patients, sometimes each of our beds is used to accommodate three patients in one day," Dr. Varavudh Suraphruk, director of Sansai

District Hospital in Chiang Mai, told the Bangkok Post.

Health officials estimate there are between 700,000 and 800,000 people in Thailand infected with HIV. It can take anywhere from two to 10 years for HIV carriers to develop AIDS.

The country has about 100,000 hospital beds and 15,000 doctors.

The Post also quoted AIDS activist and former deputy prime minister, Mechai Viravaidya, as criticizing the government for its "seasonal" anti-AIDS prevention campaigns. "It comes and goes with the rains," Mechai said, while calling for a

### HIV+ Soldier Convicted of Having Unsafe Sex

Fort Drum, NY-AP-A soldier who had unprotected sex without warning his partners that he was HIV-positive will serve two years in military prison. Spc. Kevin Barrows of the 10th

Mountain Division did not wear a condom and failed to tell the women about his condition, according to a statement from the U.S. Army's Fort Drum in northern New York. Barrows was found guilty of aggravated assault and disobedience. He was sentenced the same day. Barrows, who was assigned to the 41st Engineer Battalion, was given a bad conduct discharge, had his rank reduced to private and will have to forfeit all pay and allowances. According to Defense De-

partment rules, military members with human immunodeficiency virus, which causes AIDS, are ordered to refrain from sex without use of a condom and to first notify sexual partners of their medical status.





Russia Warns of AIDS Epidemic

Moscow, Russia-AP-The number of people in Russia testing positive for HIV doubled last year and the country will soon be facing an AIDS epidemic, health officials said Tuesday. Russia has 1,157 people registered as HIV positive and expects as many as 4,000 by the end of the

year, said the Health Ministry's chief AIDS specialist Alexander Goli-usov. Estimates of the real numbers, however, are several times higher. Many people are reluctant to undergo testing.

We have enough cases now to begin talking of it as an epidemic."

he told the Interfax news agency.

Peter Piot, an infectious disease specialist from Belgium, also said Russia was close to an epidemic, despite the relatively low number of AIDS cases so far. Piot, the director of UNAIDS, a new United Nations program, told a news conference at the Health Ministry that a sharp rise in sexually transmitted diseases in Russia foreshadows a rise in AIDS cases. The number of syphilis cases rose by 2 1/2 times last year, the report said.

The sectors of the population with AIDS also are growing, Piot said. Initially, the disease was largely confined to the homosexual population but has now spread to intravenous drug us-

ers, he said

Since the first cases of the disease appeared in Russia in 1987, 205 people, 95 of them children, have developed AIDS, Goliusov said. Of these, 137 have died, 64 of them children.

### The Archbishop Cries Foul

Denver, CO-AP- Gov. Roy Romer's veto of a bill that would have banned same-sex marriages in Colorado and two other recent decisions "represent a conspiracy against life at every level," Archbishop J. Francis Stafford said in a six-page statement. In his pastoral reflection,

entitled "April is the Cruelest Month," Stafford criticized Romer's veto of the same-sex marriage bill, President Clinton's veto of a partial-birth abortion ban, and the 9th U.S. Circuit Court of Appeals' invalidation of a law against assisted suicide.

'The direction of the modern state is against the dignity of life," Stafford wrote. "These spring decisions harbinger a dramatic intensifying of the conflict between the Catholic Church and governing civil

authorities.'

The archbishop wrote that Romer's veto of legislation that would have banned same-sex marriages in Colorado is a "repudiation of the basic foundation of the state and society as we have known them.

the acceptance and promotion of homosexual activity as a valid moral option are a direct assault on the ancient moral vision which, for more than 15 centuries, has established both the private and public responsibilities indispensable for the achievement of the free order of society," Stafford wrote.

### Hawaiian Churches Protest Gay Marriage

Honolulu, HI-AP-A local citizens group is hailing a statement from the White House that President Clinton is opposed to same sex marriage. Clinton's press secretary, Mike McCurry, said the president's opposition probably would lead him to sign a bill to outlaw same-sex marriage, if it passes. How-

ever, McCurry said Clinton believes the bill, backed by Sen. Bob Dole, is designed to provoke hostility toward Gays and Lesbians. Father Marc Alexander, co-chair of the group Hawaii's Future Today,

said the president's position recognizes that giving same sex couples equal status with the traditional family is a different issue from preventing discrimination against homosexuals. The organization said it supports civil rights for homosexuals but does not support the move to alter the institution of marriage.

### Negligence Caused 1000's of AIDS Deaths

Tokyo, Japan-AP-A former adviser to the Health and Welfare Ministry said that a key ministry official knew in 1983 that blood products treated to remove the AIDS risk could have prevented thousands of infections. Japan put off approval of the safer products for several years, resulting in thousands

of AIDS cases among hemophiliacs and their relatives, hundreds of whom have won settlements for compensation this year. Gunji, now a professor at the University of Tokyo, testified in a 1993 court hearing that he did not know in 1983 that imported blood products not heat-treated to kill the AIDS virus could spread the disease. But the government already has admitted that in 1983 it knew about

Doctors believe domestic blood was safer at the time than products Japan was buying abroad, although neither was heat-treated. At the time, heat-treating was already a normal practice in the United States, the source of most of Japan's imports. But Japan imported only the untreated products because of bureaucratic regulations.

Five pharmaceutical companies are now paying compensation along with the government in the out-of-court compensation settlements.

Dallas, TX-AP- Dallas Bishop James Stanton and the Episcopal church created the hostile environment for homosexuals that led to a rector's arrest for lewd conduct, gay Episcopalians




charge. Stanton has been a leading spokesman for the Episcopal Church in the heresy trial of Bishop Walter Righter of Alstead, N.H. Righter has been charged with "teaching a doctrine contrary to that held by the church" for ordaining a Gay priest.

Police charged the Rev. Rex Perry, of the Church of Incarnation in Dallas, with lewd conduct last December after they said he fondled an undercover police officer in a public restroom in a park at White Rock Lake. Perry's church is in Stanton's Dallas diocese.

Bryant Hudson, of The Gay and Lesbian Justice Ministry in the

Episcopal Diocese of Dallas, said Stanton's opposition to the Gay people has created an environment of fear and repression. "This climate of fear and repression will continue to lead to the type of severe spiritual self-alienation and irresponsible sexual activity that led to Father Perry's arrest," Hudson said.





### New Study Shows Men at Higher Risk for Contracting HIV than IV Drug Users

Milwaukee-Men who have sex with other men continue to be the largest at-risk group for contracting HIV in the Milwaukee area, suggests a report in the May 16th issue of the American Journal of Public Health.

The first-of-its kind study by the national Centers for Disease Control and Prevention estimates the prevalence of HIV in 96 metropolitan areas, including the Milwaukee-Waukesha area, the Milwaukee Journal Sentinel reports.

Because it usually takes 7 to 10 years to develop AIDS after infection with HIV, prevention hinges on information about how new cases are occurring.

'In each city it will be a different group that public health officials will need to focus on and worry about," said the study's author, Scott Holmberg, a physician with the CDC.

In the Milwaukee-Waukesha area, that clearly remains Gay and Bisexual men, Holmberg said. About 116 of them get HIV each year, the report says, out of an estimated 24,500 Gay and Bisexual men in the area.

The report says there are 6,000 injection drug users and 29 new cases a year from


The final category studied was high-risk heterosexuals--people who have multiple sex partners a year, have sex with people who use injection drugs or who are bisexual. There are about 12,700 of them in the Milwaukee-Waukesha area and 62 new cases of HIV infection in that group a year.


Doug Nelson, executive director of the Resource Center of Wisconsin (ARCW), agreed with the basic message but said it "grossly understates the prevalence" of HIV and the number of Gay or Bisexual men. The state estimates HIV infections among

the Gay/Bisexual population in Milwaukee-Waukesha at 4,000 vs. the CDC's 1,230, Nelson noted.

There's no question that to control the epidemic in Milwaukee we need to focus on the safer sex aspect with Gay and Bisexual men," he said.

But he added that the relatively low rate of HIV among injection drug users here is related to prevention efforts such as a needle exchange program.

Rehnquist, Thomas, Scalia Disagree

Chief Justice Rehnquist joined by Justices Thomas and Scalia dissented. Scalia writing the dissenting opinion said that striking down Amendment 2 "has no foundation in American constitution law. The people of Colorado have adopted an entirely reasonable provision... designed to prevent a piece meal deterioration of the sexual morality favored by the majority of Coloradans."

One of the cases cited by Scalia in his opinion was Ben-Shalom v. Marsh.

Miriam Ben-Shalom, a Milwaukee Lesbian activist, sued for the right to remain in the military.

Scalia cited this and other cases in a futile attempt to show that the government can discriminate against Gays and Lesbians.

Reaction from Christian Fundamentalists was universally negative. Vowing to continuing the fight by picketing PrideFest, Wayne Rohde, pastor of the Jubilee Christian Family Church said "We will continue to oppose homosexuality as a civil right."

Controversy Started in 1992

The controversy over Amendment 2 began in 1992. A citizens group Coloradans For Family Values (CFV), gathered enough signatures to place the Amendment on the state wide ballot for the November elections.

Despite the pleadings of nearly every elected state official, voters approved the measure by a 54% to 46% margin.

measure by a 54% to 46% margin.

CFV and similar groups had hoped that they could stop the steady progress of Gay and Lesbian civil rights laws by putting them up for a majority vote.

Shocked by their defeat, Gay advocates mobilized and braced themselves for campaigns in other states.

A national boycott of Colorado cost the state economy an estimated 40 millions of dollars in lost business and tourism revenue.

The boycott's biggest effect, however, was outside of Colorado. It had a chilling effect in other states where similar measures were being proposed.

CFV's electoral success was short lived. Before it could even take effect, a Colorado Circuit Court had already ruled that the Amendment was unconstitutional. That ruling was eventually upheld by the Colorado Supreme Court which issued a unanimous decision and a blistering opinion condemning the Amendment.

Ironically by appealing the Colorado decision, CFV, which intended to use Amendment 2 to stop Gay civil rights may have actually helped Gay and Lesbian activists more than anyone thought possible.

Controversy Spreads

Despite adverse court rulings, CFV mounted a campaign to help conservatives in other states pass similar ballot measures. They thought they had found a potent weapon to stop the advance of Gay civil rights.

Groups like the Oregon Citizen's Alliance along with other conservative anti-Gay civil rights organizations, fought to join Colorado in banning Gay civil rights laws. But the voters in their states refused to go along with them.

In 1994, voters in Maine, Idaho and Oregon rejected ballot initiatives that would have limited Gay civil rights laws in their states.

In other states such as Washington and Michigan, conservative activists failed to get enough signatures to place the measure on the ballot

**Both Sides Organized** 

Both sides of the issue organized support throughout the country. Spurred by their victory in Colorado, Conservative activists garnered millions of dollars to promote their ballot initiatives. Conversely, Gays and Lesbians outraged over seeing hard fought victories to win civil rights protection put up for a vote battled back.

In some states like Idaho and Maine, the Conservatives lost the election but succeeded in moving Gays and Lesbians to become involved and form state wide coalitions that are still in place.

Charges And Counter Charges

Gay rights advocates charged that these state wide campaigns were rooted in homophobia. They pointed to slick campaign literature like that used in Colorado which claimed that the vast majority of Gay men have sex with children and engage in sex with over 500 sex partners a year.

Those promoting the ballot measures denied being anti-Gay. They accused Gay activists of trying to force their lifestyle on the public.

In the midst of the fray many Lesbians and Gay men became victims. Anti-Gay violence rose drastically in every state where the Conservatives waged one of their campaigns.

In Oregon two Lesbians and Gay man were killed when their house was firebombed at the height of a campaign to ban Gay rights by amending that state's constitution. They

weren't alone in paying the ultimate price for their beliefs.

The Battle Continues

Despite the Supreme Court decision, no one expects the battle over Gay and Lesbian rights to end anytime soon. Just as White Segregationists continued to stand in the door even after the Supreme Court's landmark

Brown v. Board of Education decision in 1958, religious conservatives and other political activists will continue to wage war on Lesbians and Gays.

As a statement from the National Gay Lesbian Task Force put it, "Despite this ruling the Radical Right will not stop."

Perhaps the only thing the two sides can
