Hinckle says that when Kemp played professional football, "people called him 'the Gay quarterback."

That Kemp was Gay "was such a widespread assumption that it was taken as a matter of fact," Hinckle writes, adding, "That, of course, doesn't make it true; some people

The Republican Big Tent Leaves Gays, Bisexuals and Lesbians Out in the Cold

San Diego — The 1996 platform for the Republican Party is a marriage between supply-side ("trickle down") economic theory, Washington downsizing and hard-line social conservatism which includes staunchly prolife and vehemently anti-Gay language.

As some pundits were saying last Tuesday, after the platform was passed, "This is the party of Ralph Reed and Pat Buchanan."

At the heart of the problem with the platform for Gays and Lesbians is its dichotomous approach to discrimination.

The section on individual rights calls for a rejection of hatred and bigotry, and calls for an end to attempts, "by the EEOC (Equal Employment Opportunity Commission) or any other arm of government to regulate or ban religious symbols from the work place." The document defends the tax-exempt status of religious groups.

Opposition to any form of discrimination is stated in this section, but the party will "reject the distortion of those laws to cover sexual preference." The Republican platform endorses the Defense of Marriage Act (DOMA), specifically as a means of preventing "judicial recognition of same-sex unions"

The platform states objection to Affirmative Action, and supports a constitutional amendment and any legislation which would "make clear that the Fourteenth Amendment's protections apply to unborn children."

Republicans officially defend the right to bear arms responsibly and support "right-towork" laws.

The party is committed to tighten border enforcement and speed up deportation. There is support for a law or Constitutional amendment to declare that children born in this country of illegal immigrant parents do not automatically become citizens.

There would be harsh penalties against smugglers of people and for those who make illegal documentation. There is no call for penalties on those who hire them. There are "protect the flag" and "English as the official

San Diego— Gay Republicans say they don't understand why they cause such hand-wringing among social conservatives.

Teenage pregnancies?

"Hardly a problem in the Gay and Lesbian community," said Rich Tafel of the Log Cabin Republicans, which speaks for Gay supporters of the GOP and backs candidates with a political action committee.

Abortion? "A heterosexual problem," he

School choice? Sure, Tafel said. Whatever.
Just don't leave the inner-city kids behind,
he added.

The Log Cabin group is a small presence in San Diego, sort of a pop-and-pop shop.
"We have to mitigate," Tafel said. "We'll

never have the numbers."

But the group's leaders won a hearing with

Indeed, Tafel spoke encouragingly of Dole

Indeed, Tafel spoke encouragingly of Dole despite the GOP's adoption of a strictly conservative platform that declares homosexuality incompatible with military service and supports legislation against same-sex marriage.

"The platform ... is ignored by everybody," Tafel said.

Teachers Network Holds Fall Meeting

Madison—The Gay, Lesbian, and Straight Teachers network invites interested parties from the Madison area to participate in a discussion -presentation on how everyone can help end homophobia in education.

The meeting will take place at 7:30 on Wednesday September 4 at First Unitarian Society Church, 900 University Bay Drive. It will be lead by Kevin Jennings, National Executive Director of GLSTN.

In 1990, Jennings founded the Gay, Lesbian and Straight Teachers Network which brings together concerned educators, parents, students and co-mmunity members to fight homophobia in their schools.

GLSTN is the largest organization of its kind in the United States with chapters in over 40 cities.

In addition to his work with the Network, Jennings is the Co-Chair of the Education Committee of the Governor's Commission on Gay and Lesbian Youth in Massachusetts.

His book One Teach in Ten: Gay and Lesbian Educators Tell Their Stories was a finalist for the 1995 Lambda Literary Award for best anthology.

language" provisions.

The party platform calls for getting tough on crime by ending "frivolous and costly death row appeals;" requiring adult trials for juveniles accused of "adult" crimes; ending the "exclusionary search" rule; and imposing curfews on juveniles.

The Republican Party in its platform, opposes "Bill Clinton's assault on the culture and traditions of the armed forces, especially his attempt to lift the ban on Homosexuals in the military. We affirm that Homosexuality is incompatible with military service."

The initial section deals with the Dole economic plan. This involves cutting taxes, reducing the size of the federal government, balancing the budget, improving competitiveness in the global economy and increasing the number of people who own their own home. In this general area are some of Dole's most popular intentions, namely to cut taxes and substantially reduce the size and scope of the Internal Revenue Service.

The next section calls for "Changing Washington From the Ground Up." This is the section dealing with "re-establishing the Tenth Amendment to the Constitution," calling for greater state sovereignty and ability of self-rule. More powers will be reserved for the states to solve their own problems.

In making the federal government smaller, the Republican platform calls for returning power to the states. There is a provision for requiring that if "official Washington promises benefits, official Washington must pay for them."

Several Cabinet departments would also be scrapped, including Commerce, Housing and Urban Development, Education, and Energy.

In addition, the National Endowment for the Arts would be "de-funded," or turned over to the private sector.

The same fate awaits the National Endowment for the Humanities, Corporation for Public Broadcasting and the Legal Service Corporation.

On the other hand, several provisions seem to be aimed at improvement.

Congress would have to apply to itself all laws that it passes, it is currently exempt from that requirement. The platform also commends the already achieved internal improvements in the House of Representatives, including a limit to the term of a committee chairperson.

The platform calls for a term limits Constitutional amendment and denies groups the right to make grants and be involved in lobbying at the same time.

There is a provision for a constitutional amendment to balance the budget. There is also provision to eliminate automatic renewal of most program funding.

Regulatory reform is also proposed, and the method proposed to accomplish this is a system of risk analysis that will factor the cost of regulations into the decision on what regulation is needed.

The Courts would be overhauled by appointing, as best as can be done, conservative judges and prosecutors. These same individuals would be litmused on whether they favored judicial review of legislation. A favorite quote heard about this is "Abortion wasn't the concern of the U.S. Constitution until 1963. What made the Constitution so different that year?"

The platform calls for reform in the area of lawsuits, including limiting the Rico (Racketeering) Act to criminal cases. It is currently used in some civil cases, including several decisions against Operation Rescue, the radical anti-abortion group. There is a provision in the platform to physically rehabilitate Washington, D.C., while rejecting any notion of statehood for the district. It also calls for tax reduction, both in the federal and D.C. taxes. V

National Gay Leaders Held Chicago Convention, But Did it Matter?

Chicago—It was a different kind of convention. The Gay and Lesbian activists who came to OutVote '96 this past weekend (Aug. 16-18) wasn't trying to avoid a floor fight or making any roll calls. But like their counterparts in the other political conventions, they were learning what it takes to motivate a campaign.

The Human Rights Campaign (HRC), host of the national convention, said it was a vital event, a way to get people focused on how to discuss Gay and Lesbian issues in an election year and how to elect supportive officials at all levels of government.

But some political analysts and others in the Gay community say that while the groups' intentions are worthwhile, it may not be able to achieve its goals simply because Gay and Lesbian issues won't be in the spotlight this year.

"This presidential election is not going to

Silver Space receives financial assistance from the Cream City Foundation, an Achoice Agency. be determined by social issues," said Alan Gitelson, a political science professor at Loyola University in Chicago. "I don't think it's going to matter."

"People will vote on economic issues, not justice ones," said Rick Garcia, director of the Illinois Federation for Human Rights, a state Gay and Lesbian advocacy group. "They'll ask, 'Are my taxes going to increase?" and 'Am I more comfortable than I was at the last election?"

Convention organizers are counting on that not being the case.

"It is critically important that Gay Americans, along with our friends and families, play active roles this election season because we will be literally voting for our lives," said Elizabeth Birch, executive director of the Human Rights Campaign in a prepared statement.

"OutVote '96 gave our community the skills necessary to help elect fair-minded officials at every level of government."

Kim Mills, deputy communications director, said the goal was to send participants away ready to work in campaigns.

"We wanted them to know the nuts and bolts, and be ready to make a difference," Mills said.

The three-day convention opened Friday night with a speech from Sen. Carol Moseley-Braun, followed by an awards banquet. Saturday and Sunday featured speeches from campaign members, political strategists, politicians like Gay Republican Rep. Steve Gunderson from Wisconsin and Clinton administration officials like HUD Secretary Henry Cisneros as well as workshop sessions.

Despite the recent furor over same-sex marriages, convention planners said they wanted to concentrate on topics such as job discrimination, since it's legal in most states to fire someone based on sexual orientation.

"We would definitely have not picked Gay marriage as an issue for 1996, because the American public is still too divided on it," said David Zingale, HRC's political director.

But not everyone is as hopeful as the convention planners that Gay and Lesbian issues will be used as anything other than a dividing tool on the campaign trail.


"We will be used as a wedge issue by religious and political extremists," said Jonathan Wilson, executive director of the Gay and Lesbian Victory Fund.


Others said that this election year doesn't have a prominent issue, such as gays in the military, for the public to be concerned about.

"Things just aren't as controversial right now," said Garcia. "Sure, most people support job equality. They just assume that we already have it, that our basic civil rights are protected even though they're not."

Convention planners said thinking Gay and Lesbian issues won't matter in this election is ridiculous.

"Just look at the Republican platform," Mills said. "Gay issues are front and center. What do we have to do to prove homophobia is rampant in this country?"





ACLU to Investigate Stopping of "Wisconsin Light" Editor And Scheel House Residents

Milwaukee-Wisconsin Light SpotLight Editor and Political columnist, Bill Meunier and two Madison Gay men, Tim Corcoran and Tom Kotenberg, have asked the Wisconsin Chapter of the ACLU to examine possible courses of legal action against the Dane County Drug Interdiction Task Force.

The men made the request after they were stopped and questioned by Task Force members at Madison's Badger Bus Depot on Friday August 16 at 11:15 AM. Meunier was told that he and the others were stopped because he had no luggage when he arrived via a Greyhound bus.

Meunier was in Madison as an invited guest to share in and report on the First Anniversary celebration of the Rodney Scheel House. Corcoran and Kotenberg are Scheel House residents who volunteered to pick him up at the Depot.

The three were stopped by a Dane County Sheriff Deputy as they tried to drive out of the Depot's parking lot in Corcoran's VW Bus. The Deputy who was wearing a name tag with the word "Enoli" on it ordered the men out of the bus

Enoli told Meunier the three were stopped because Meunier had no luggage with him when he left the bus. The Deputy called this "suspicious behavior."

When Meunier was unable to work the latch and open his door, Deputy Enoli threatened to break the window.

As the three left the bus, they were quickly surrounded by around 8 to 10 other uniformed and plain clothes officers.

Enoli told Meunier the three were stopped because he had no luggage with him when he left the bus. The Deputy called this "suspicious behavior."

Meunier told the Deputy that he was on assignment for the Light and was only going to be in Madison for a few hours. He also showed the Deputy his picture ID press pass issued to him by The Wisconsin Light, and the camera he had taken along with him.

Enoli was not satisfied and called in a check on Meunier for outstanding warrants, parole holds or anything else that might allow him to make an arrest. Finding none he simply walked away and concentrated his attention on Kotenberg who was protesting being stopped.

Other officers ran the same checks on Corcoran and Kotenberg while the Bus was searched for drugs.

The incident didn't end when the three were told they could leave. As he entered the bus, Kotenberg told the officers that if they really wanted to stop drugs they should "stop some of the Cadillacs riding around town. At that point

Milwaukee-Wisconsin Light SpotLight Enoli charged into the van and threatened to ditor and Political columnist, Bill Meunier arrest Kotenberg.

Then as the three prepared to leave, an unidentified plain clothes female officer asked Meunier "Are you really a journalist?" When he replied "Yes", the officer stated "Then why are you hanging around people like these?"

"It was everything I could do to keep from responding to her" said Meunier. "I just wanted to get out of there and not say anything they could use as an excuse for an arrest."

Meunier called the reason for the stop "a pretty flimsy pretext. I suppose if I had a suitcase of heroin I would have been able to just leave without a problem. The deputy had a drug dog with him. I went right by him as I looked for Tim and Tom, he certainly should have known that I didn't have any drugs on me," said Meunier. "Furthermore I can not believe that taking a bus to Madison without luggage is sufficient reason to stop and harass someone."

While Meunier stops short of accusing the officers of homophobia, he does question their actions. "Tim told me that before I arrived he had asked the same Deputy if they could park along side of the building explaining that they had a handicap permit and that they were picking up a journalist from Wisconsin Light. There are Rainbow Flag bumper stickers on their bus. And what was that crack about 'hanging around with people like these' all about?"

Meunier called the experience frightening. "I was really shaken up by it. I didn't know what was happening or why. Plus I had never met Tim and Tom before and didn't know what a search of their bus might turn up."

Although Meunier's lack of luggage was the stated reason for the stop he was not searched. Corcoran said he was searched after being told by the female officer that if he didn't allow a search on the spot he would be taken into custody.

A statement Corcoran provided to the ACLU and to the Wisconsin Light points out that the Deputy Enoli was only a few feet away when Meunier introduced himself to them as "Bill from The Wisconsin Light."

Corcoran also accused the officers of trying to entrap him. "The female officer asked me about my pepper spray which I carry on a chain outside of my pocket. After examining it she told me to put it in my front pocket and go to the other side of the bus. I refused because then they could have busted me for carrying a concealed weapon. When I mentioned this to her, the officer had no comment."

Corcoran who was a Hotel Washington employee said he believes the three may have been stopped because they are Gay. "My bus was in the Madison Pride Parade just a few weeks ago, it used to be parked in the Hotel Washington Parking lot all of the time. The back is covered with bumper stickers, it's a vehicle that's easy to recognize. I think they knew who they were stop-ping."

No apologies were offered to any of the men.

After arriving at the Scheel House, Meunier contacted The Wisconsin Light. Editor Dr.

Terry Boughner called the Dane County Sheriff's office and registered a complaint. Boughner also sent a strongly worded letter of protect.

In addition to their complaint to the ACLU, Kotenberg, Corcoran and Meunier are contemplating filing a law suit against Dane County and the officers. A Madison area attorney has offered to pursue the case if the men want her to.

Chris Ahmuty, Director of the Wisconsin Civil Liberties Union, promised Meunier that his office and its attorneys would look into the incident.

Ahmuty told Meunier that he couldn't be sure if what the officers were justified without looking at everything that happened. He did point out that he, himself, has often traveled by bus to Madison without any luggage. Ahmuty added that he often observed State Legislators doing the same

Local observers say that the Drug Task Force regularly stakes out the Badger Bus Depot in the hope of snagging a dealer.

Meunier says that people shouldn't hold the actions of these officers against Madison. "I have been to the Mad City plenty of times. This isn't the Madison that I know. While I am sure they have their share of overzealous and homophobic officers. I am also sure they are the exception and not the rule."

Openly Gay Madison Alderman, Mike Verveer represents the district that includes the bus depot. Verveer will be meeting with Meunier during the Democratic Convention in Chicago to hear his complaint and advise him on a course of action. In a brief conversation Verveer indicated that others have complained in the past.

As of press time, The Wisconsin Light had received no response to its letter of protest. However, several of the dignitaries at the Scheel Party took it upon themselves to apologize for what one called "The shame brought on Madison today."



The scene of the crime? The parking lot of Madison's Badger Bus Depot were Wisconsin Light SpotLight Editor, Bill Meunier along with Rodney Scheel House residents Tim Corcoran and Tom Kortenberg were detained as drug suspects by the ever vigilant members of the Dane County Drug Interdiction Task Force on Friday August 16. Meunier had committed the "heinous crime" of taking a bus to Madison and not having any luggage, which according to a Deputy Sheriff was "suspicious." Meunier was in Madison to cover the Rodney Scheel House's Anniversary. The men were released without an apology. The ACLU and Openly Gay Madison Alderman Mike Verveer have promised to look into the incident.

The Rodney Scheel House is the Sweet Dream of Love in an Often Nightmarish World

Madison—On Friday August 16, 1996, the Rodney Scheel House, a Madison housing project for those infected with HIV, held a party in celebration of its First Anniversary. There were the usual balloons, nice speeches, dignitaries and of course plenty of food and drink. Residents and neighbors joined by volunteers and staff dug in and shared a common meal.

But that's not the real story.

The facility is governed by a Board of Directors that includes professionals, members of the Scheel family and a resident representative. There is also a resident's council that meets once a month to help the 23 tenants with their problems.

But that's not the real story.

Greg and Sherry Scheel spoke about their brother, Rodney and how much building the Rodney Scheel House meant to them. Sandy, the Project manager talked about how special the day was. Brett Brasher from the Mental Health Center of Dane County spoke about the challenges that both the residents and those in charge of the Scheel House have had to overcome

But that's not the real story either.

Actually it is a story nearly impossible to tell, let alone write about the real story. The real story has to be felt and perhaps

even lived.

There on a sunny Friday afternoon were the

smiles of people who much of society would say have no right to smile. There was a feeling, even a palpable presence of love, pride and accomplishment.

There was Tim and Tom, partners for 19 years, Mike, a 15 year old from Rockford and his mother, there was Bob, Pete, "Queen Mary" with her bright red sash, Stephanie, and all the rest.

You could feel the love that exists between all of these people and those who are providing support for them. You could sense it in the way they talked to each other. You could see it in the way they helped each other and looked at each other.

There was love in the tears streaming down the face of Manager Sandy Holland as she clutched the bouquet of flowers the cheering residents had given her. There was the love in former County Board Chairman, Dick Wagner, as he walked around hugging the residents.

You could see the love in Sherry and Greg Scheel when they spoke of the struggles they went through in building this living memorial to their brother Rodney. You could see the it in the neighbor who admitted that she was very much opposed to putting the Scheel House in her neighborhood. "Now," she said, "I am so happy they are here."

Spend a few minutes at the Scheel House and you will realize that the set of expectations you came with doesn't meet the reality of what you will see and feel. This isn't some building with rooms for people waiting to die. It's a complex of two buildings containing spacious, individual apartments rented by 23 residents on a sliding income scale. Many of the residents live with their partners (and in Mike's case his parents) so they aren't separated from those they love.

For many if not most of the tenants it's the best living situation they have ever had. Far from being bitter and isolated, they are vibrant and full of life.

As I rode the bus back to Milwaukee and since returning I have spent a great deal of time thinking about what I saw at the Scheel House that day. I thought about how the residents, the staff and the volunteers have accomplished so much in such a short period of time.

They correctly recognized that a house is not a home. They knew that putting up a building with walls on the outside is one thing, but knocking down the walls that we all build around ourselves is another. They have worked hard and succeeded at doing both.

If it can be said that there is a good side to AIDS, then this would be it. How tragic it is that it takes a disease to bring people this close together. Even if there was no AIDS there should still be a Rodney Scheel House and tens of thousands like it.

Stephanie one of the residents who entertained after lunch sang "Sweet Dreams." I have thought about how appropriate that song was. That's what I think the Scheel House is, a sweet dream in the middle of a massive nightmare.

Most of all I have thought about what Brett Brasher had said "Many people thought when they came here, they were coming to die, then they realized that they were here to live."

Brett was right, because the real story is that the Rodney Scheel House is not a place where people die from AIDS, its a place where they live with it and with each other.

AIDS Ride

TO THE EDITOR:

In response to the editorial entitled, "Corporate Giving" in the July 18-31, 1996 issue of Wisconsin Light, allow me to address some of the issues raised regarding Tanqueray's sponsorship of the AIDS Rides.

First, clearly all corporate donations are made with public relations in mind. The writer states, "It would be nice if it weren't so, if corporations really did care about this cause or that, but the fact of the matter is that giving is good PR." Certainly it is. For-profit corporations like Tanqueray have a choice. They can spend millions of dollars promoting their products. Or they can spend millions of dollars promoting their products and at the same time help to raise many more millions of sorely needed dollars for AIDS service or other charitable organizations. Tanqueray's choice was the one that required vision, commitment and a real concern for the cause.

The writer then suggested that Tanqueray has found a way to cut costs and get more bang for its buck by paying a "middleman", a promoter. The fact is, Tanqueray paid no money to a promoter, or any other type of middleman. Not one cent.

The author then goes on to propose that Tanqueray hive its money — say, a \$100,000 donation — directly to the agency. In fact, Tanqueray does. Had the author checked prior to the printing of this letter, he or she would have found that this is exactly what Tanqueray did. One hundred thousand dollars, cash, directly to the Minneapolis beneficiaries. And another one hundred thousand dollars, cash, directly to the Chicago beneficiaries. And, in fact, a total of \$950,000 — cash — directly to the 28 HIV/AIDS service organizations benefiting from the five Tanqueray's American AIDS Ride to help offset the costs of producing the Rides.

In addition to the cash donations, Tanqueray provides several million dollars more in promotional support that helps to raise the Ride's visibility, and therefore recruit more Riders and generate more donations. Add that to the collective power of the thousands of committed individuals that participate in the AIDS Rides, and one hundred thousand dollars becomes several million.

I challenge the author to attempt to solicit these kinds of funds. It's not easy. Only three years ago, the AIDS Rides started as an idea to produce an event that seemed impossible, but that appeared to have the powerful potential to respond to the AIDS epidemic as never before. And it clearly could not be done without a significant corporate sponsor. Hundreds of corporate sponsorship proposals were sent out. Hundreds. One company responded. One. Tanqueray. It was Tanqueray's original vision and realization that something big could make the difference. How much of a difference? In the past three years, Tanqueray's American AIDS Rides have raised in excess of \$33 million for AIDS service organizations across America. The AIDS Rides are the most successful AIDS fund-raisers in the history of the epidemic.

Yes, there are costs involved in producing an AIDS Ride. Administrative, recruitment and support material costs. Tents, food, medical support, camp sites, maintenance and everything else involved in supporting several thousand people on a three to seven day Ride. Subtract these costs from the gross money raised, and the Rides still enable their beneficiaries to net more money than they would through other means. The author of the article underestimates the enormous impact the Rides have — and the unprecedented amount of money the Rides raise for crucial AIDS services. Without the Rides, the money would go elsewhere — or nowhere at all.

And speaking directly to the author: we invite you to do the Ride. Raise your \$2,300 to do the Ride. Raise an additional \$2,300 and give it directly to the agencies. Your life will never be the same. You'll see that there are no ulterior motives involved with the Ride. You'll experience your potential — your power to make a difference in the world around you,

something your letter to the editor attempts to do, but falls short of. Make the difference. Be involved. Assume that people are inherently good, not evil. The AIDS crisis needs you. It needs all of us. Together we can conquer AIDS. Together we can make a difference.

TO THE EDITOR:

Early this summer, I approached the core of W.O.W. requesting membership. At that time I was told that W.O.W. had never had a request for membership from an openly transsexual woman. As such my request would have to go before the full core for discussion and vote.

About one week ago, I received in the mail a package containing information about upcoming events and a survey of interests. I was at first elated, thinking that I had finally after a two month wait, been accepted for full membership. After many unanswered phone calls I finally talked to Jacquelyn Weber of the core and was told that no I was not to be granted full membership. I was hurt that these lesbians could be so callous and gutless as to send out information about upcoming events all the while knowing that they had decided that I was unwelcome and to not have the guts to inform me of their decision.

What the core decided was that I would be able to attend any day events but I was not allowed to attend overnight outings. I would not be granted membership but that I also would not be asked to pay dues (how sweet of them). I was also told that this decision on inclusiveness for transsexuals would not lead to full membership. When asked the basis for the decision I was told that members of the organization would be uncomfortable in the prolonged presence (i.e. overnight) of a transsexual, but they could tolerate my presence at day events.

I am saddened that some members of the Gay and Lesbian community continue to harbor such outdated discriminatory ideas as a persons gender is determined by her genitals shape at birth and that the dominant majority cultures discomfort with minority disadvantaged group is a sound basis for denial of rights to equal access and opportunity. The later is hard to fathom as this discomfort of prejudice is the underlying basis for discrimination against Gays and Lesbians by the straight majority. Now this same argument is being used against transsexuals.

If you agree that Wisconsin Outdoor Women membership policy is discriminatory and wrong, I would ask that you write and let them know how you feel. If you are presently a member withhold your dues and boycott all W.O.W. functions. Finally the members of the core should be called to account for decisions and callous behavior toward transsexuals. On Outing

TO THE EDITOR:

The recent stories about Congressman Kolbe's (R-AZ) "outing" only mention his vote against same-sex marriages. In fact, Kolbe's own Dec. 12, 1995 rider destroyed funding for an Indian AIDS prevention program and inserted a clause to withhold cultural, religious and environmental protection laws that protect a sacred Apache mountain, Mt. Graham. Kolbe promoted these exemptions so University of Arizona telescopes could desecrate this sacred mountain. I am an openly Gay candidate who ran in the Democratic primary in the district of Rep. Regula (R-OH), Interior Appropriations chairman. Regula and Kolbe conspired to sneak the rider in at the last minute.

The Congressional Record read: "Amendment No. 178: Deletes Senate language requiring the Indian Health Service to prepare a report on HIV-AIDS prevention needs, and inserts in lieu thereof a provision which allows the construction of a third telescope on Mount Graham, in Arizona..."

Kolbe sold out the AIDS-afflicted Indian community and replaced it with a rider allowing Kolbe's UofA pals to desecrate a sacred Apache mountain. Kolbe erroneously claimed the homophobic and racist aspects of his rider were coincidence, and the HIV study costly. In fact, he intentionally waited many months to inject his "coincidence" at the final 1995 joint Senate/House conference. It was no coincidence. The irony of this non-coincidence is that the AIDS study cost was minuscule compared to the billions in grazing subsidies, below-cost timber sales, and coyote killing for private ranchers in the Kolbe/Regula bill.

Every U.S. university has rejected or abandoned this UofA outrage against human rights, the environment and due process. Only foreign partners remain.

Outing is likely for legislators who pursue homophobic, racist agendas.

TO THE EDITOR:

I am writing in response to David Nahmod's commentary in your last issue of the Wisconsin Light. I found myself in complete agreement with his article having had close long-term friendships with several Gay male friends. However, I would like to stress that a lack of respect for each other and a lack of self respect is not limited to the Gay male community. It is alive and well in the Lesbian community as well. Though I do not have AIDS, I find myself somewhat alienated as a Lesbian within our Lesbian community for some of the same reasons you cited in your article. I find that the way we treat each other as women is equally shameful.

Your article brought back several memories of my

own personal experience and that of friends and acquaintances and their negative experiences in relationships; going to local Lesbian bars both here in Milwaukee (bars which I no longer patronize) and in other cities and finding myself waiting for exceedingly long periods of time without being served when the bar isn't even half crowded; of attending local Lesbian groups and determining that if you don't drive the "right" kind of car and have the "right" kind of job, that you are on the outside of that group. Add to that the great racial dividing line between the Caucasian Lesbians here in Milwaukee and those of color (particularly black Lesbians) and you have a very divided community. I find, even as you stated in your commentary, that a simple attempt to initiate conversations is at times, impossible or frustrating. I have observed that with some women this attempt is misconstrued as an attempt to either break up a relationship or to "make a pass" at someone. I am left often wondering why some women are dating each

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Lesbian, Gay, Bisexual and Transgender Youth Rally at RNC

San Diego, CA — The first-ever gathering of Lesbian, Gay, Bisexual and Transgender youth at a national convention drew a crowd of more than 150 youth and supporters at the 1996 GOP Convention. Gay youth from across North America denounced the conservative anti-Gay and anti-youth policies the GOP, and expressed their determination to resist conservative policies on education, health care, immigration, affirmative action, and other issues.

The Queer Youth SpeakOut was a result of a year of planning by Alex Garner and Russell Roybal, Youth Co-Chairs for LGBT VOICES '96. "The lives of L/G/B/T youth are directly threatened by GOP policies," said Garner. Organizers seized the opportunity of the national convention as an arena for raising the visibility of L/G/B/T youth and addressing the diverse issues that affect them, including HIV, education, violence and discrimination. Garner and Roybal opened the rally with rousing speeches for the crowd, followed by

Dick Wagner, Gay Madison Leader, **Runs for Dane County Executive**

Madison-Richard Wagner, the former chair of the Dane County Board of Supervisors has announced that he is running for Dane County Executive. Wagner, who is openly Gay, served fourteen years on the Board of Supervisors.

He was appointed by Governor Anthony Earl in 1983 to serve as Co-Chair of the Governor's Council on Lesbian and Gay Issues. Wagner works for the State Department of Administration as a Budget and Management Analyst. Governor Martin Schreiber appointed him to the Wisconsin humanities Council and the Wisconsin Arts Board.

While on the Board of Supervisors Wagner served as Chair of the Public Protection and Judiciary Committee successfully conducting shuttle diplomacy between the city and the county for a consolidated 911 dispatch center. As Chair of the Finance Committee in 1986, Wagner managed the multi-million dollar mid-year adjustment to die county budget when federal and state revenues were significantly reduced. He is the father of the Dane County Conservation Fund and sponsored the county ordinance for the Marlin Luther King Jr. holiday.

Most recently he served as Co-Chair of the Dane County Committee on Commuter Rail.

During his first term or the County Board in 1980 he sponsored Dane County's nondiscrimination ordinance on the basis of sexual orientation.

Wagner founded and served as Co-Chair of the New harvest Foundation. Lie serves on the Board of the Madison AIDS Support Network and the Rodney Scheel House. His commitment to urban civic life and historic preservation has been recognized by two orchid awards from Capital Community Citizens. In 1994 he received a Stonewall 25 Award at the Wisconsin Pridefest celebration,

Wagner announced an initial support committee that brought together a wide group of Dane County Citizens. The Committee included former Dane County Republican Sheriff Jerome Lacke arid Democratic State Representative Doris Hanson. Also on the Committee is former Dane County Supervisor from the Town of Madison Kevin Bonds. Its Treasurer is Connie Ferris Bailey, tile executive director of Operation Fresh Start.

That if they come after my Queer migrant community they are coming after all of our lives."

Air Force Major Debra Meeks Acquitted on **Charges of Consensual Sodomy**

Washington, D.C. — Air Force Major Debra Meeks at Lackland AFB in San Antonio, Texas, has been acquitted on all charges that she had engaged in consensual sodomy with another woman. Had Major Meeks been convicted of the charges she could have faced up to eight years in prison.

C. Dixon Osburn, Co-Executive Director of Servicemembers Legal Defense Network, stated, "The decision was the right one. There was no evidence to support the charges against Major Meeks."

Osburn added, "We should not lose sight of the fact, however, that had the Air Force followed its own regulations, Major Meeks would have never had to fight for her life at a court-martial. Americans should be very concerned that some military commanders are willfully violating regulations and that the civilian authorities in control of the military are doing nothing to hold those commanders accountable. That must change.'

The charges against Major Meeks resulted from a witch hunt by the Air Force Office of Special Investigations (OSI) at Lackland AFB from December 1994 to September 1995. The Air Force's written report shows that agents interrogated the accuser about Major Meeks and eleven other women, at the agents' own initiative and without cause, after the accuser had made an unrelated complaint against Major Meeks, her landlord. At the time, the

accuser provided no information against Major Meeks or the other women.

It was shown at the court-martial that the accuser made the allegations against Major Meeks because, in her own words, she wanted to "hurt" her.

Major Meeks, who is assigned to the 319 Training Squadron, was due to retire from the military on March 1, 1996 after twenty years of honorable service. Major General Hobgood canceled her retirement orders specifically to court-martial and try to imprison Major Meeks. Major Meeks now looks forward to her retirement after her two year nightmare

Defense of Marriage Act Slated for Senate Floor September 5

Washington, D.C. — The Senate will, for the first time in U.S. history, debate a Gay civil rights bill on September 5 when it takes up the anti-Gay Defense of Marriage Act.

According to an agreement reached before Congress recessed for the month of August, the Defense of Marriage Act will come to the Senate floor at 10:00 a.m. EDT on September Debate is scheduled to last two hours.

During that time, Senators Edward M. Kennedy (D-MA), Joseph Lieberman (D-CT), and James Jeffords (R-VT), will introduce the Employment Non-Discrimination Act as an ENDA would outlaw job amendment. discrimination based on sexual orientation.

"This strategy has benefited the community by forcing a debate on employment discrimination against Gay people," said Daniel Zingale, HRC political director. "Nonetheless, the Human Rights Campaign continues to vigorously oppose the so-called Defense of Marriage Act.

Supporters of DOMA will also have an opportunity to offer amendments to the bill. "We expect any amendments from our opponents to be as noxious as the overall bill," Zingale said. All amendments must be submitted to the Senate leadership by close of business September 3.

The anti-marriage bill passed the House on July 12 by a vote of 342-67. No amendments were attached to the bill in the House.

The Human Rights Campaign encouraging readers to urge their U.S. senators to support the Employment Non-Discrimination Act (S.932) as an amendment to the Defense of Marriage Act (S.1740), and to oppose DOMA itself. The Politics of AIDS Funding Make 1996 **Election Critical**

It was three years after the AIDS crisis began before the Reagan Administration let it be know that it wouldn't veto a measure providing funding for research, provided that the amount was small and that the allocation bill didn't mention AIDS.

The announcement and the allocation were timed for the 1984 Elections. Any doubts about that were wiped away when 18 months after the allocation bill passed, not one dime had been spent and the applications for grants had not even been printed.

That first step towards federal funding to fight AIDS was precursor of things to come. During the Reagan and Bush years, statistics of those affected by AIDS were held down, and most of the money allocated to fight AIDS was in reality used for other purposes.

For example, if the Federal Government allocated 100 million to fight cancer, they would apply to the AIDS allocation. "After all they said "People with AIDS can get cancer."

Big shows would be made of passing massive AIDS allocations. Conservative columnists would waste reams of paper complaining about AIDS money was a waste, "special treatment" and used to promote immorality.

Things changed when President Bill Clinton took office. The Clinton admin-istration stopped the practice of counting money spent on other diseases as being spent on AIDS. Under Bill Clinton if Congress allocated 1.2 billion for AIDS then 1.2 billion WILL in fact be spent directly on fighting AIDS. Moreover, Clinton has actually increased

AIDS spending even while cutting spending in other areas.

The results achieved by the Clinton policy are evident. New drugs and treatment methods have been developed. There is real hope that we may be close to finding a way to beat AIDS down to a chronic instead of a fatal disease.

Unfortunately that is still just a hope, but its more than we had in 1992 when Clinton

Despite Clinton's best efforts some things The Republican Party in never change. Congress has by and large dragged its feet on AIDS funding.

For example when the latest version of the Ryan White Care Act, the main funding vehicle for the war on AIDS, passed Congress, Newt Gingrich and Bob Dole kept it bottled up in a conference committee for months.

Despite the GOP, the last four years have seen gains in funding, in research and in All of those gains along with potential gains in the future will be at risk in the November elections.

My friends in the Log Cabin will be happy to tell you about how Bob Dole voted for the Ryan White Act. What they won't mention is

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until White died and his cause was taken up by the media and Hollywood stars, Dole was virtually AWOL in the war on HIV

What they also won't tell you is that nearly everyone in the Senate was a co-sponsor of the bill. They won't talk much about the GOP Platform that Bob Dole is running on either.

That platform DOES advocate money for finding a cure for AIDS. It DOES NOT advocate money for research, education, prevention, life services for PWA's or life prolonging drugs.

That's why many observers fear a Dole victory in November. When combined with continued GOP control of Congress (as appears likely) Dole and closet case Kemp in the White House would be disastrous for proponents of AIDS funding.

Forget about any increase. It won't happen. Forget too about any concept of fair treatment. Between Trent Lott in the US Senate and Newt Gringrich in the House, the Christian Coalition will have Congress just where it wants it to be.

In addition to the pressure on Dole from the radical right's henchmen in Congress, there is Dole's promise of a 15% across the board tax

The fact is that you can't cut taxes without cutting spending. If you really believe that AIDS funding won't be high on the list of Republican targets for spending cuts then I suggest immediate therapy, or at the very least a thorough reality check.

How many of us will do that reality check? How many of us have become almost immunized against outrage over AIDS? As the disease has gone on and on taking its toll, perhaps we have become anestisized.

Yes there are many issues in the 1996 campaign. AIDS is one that should be important to all of us. The stakes are high and

the risks are great. When all is said and done the real decision

is whether or not we can afford to gamble our future and untold hundreds of thousands of lives on the words of a man supported by our most virulent enemies?

Or do we support the incumbent, Bill Clinton, a man who has done more to fight for us, especially on AIDS issues in the last four years all of his predecessors combined?

Hundreds of thousands infected with HIV await our answer.



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


Brendan Buell, a sophomore, added: "We didn't realize you had a buddy program and all the support you give to your clients."

For the Pet Shop Boys, Coming Out Has Given a New Thrust to their Music

For more than a decade, pop icons Neil Tennant and Chris Lowe have epitomized Gay disco. As the craftsman behind the Pet Shop Boys, Tennant and Lowe have been shaping the direction of Euro-pop dance music and mixing it with a Gay sensibility.

With four number one singles and more than a dozen Top 100 songs in the U.S., including "Always on My Mind," "It's A Sin," "Opportunities," "What Have I Done To Deserve This" and the chart topping "West End Girls," the Boys have become one of the most influential pop bands of the '80s and '90s.

But despite rumors of being Gay and garnering a huge Gay fan base all of over the world, the duo have avoided coming out publicly, until now.

Having passed the 40-year old mark and fallen in love, Tennant felt the time was right to talk about being Gay. (Of course, many people assumed their collaboration with Liza Minnelli in 1990 and last year's campy single, "Absolutely Fabulous," based on the hit British TV show, was their coming out.)

"In the past, I had resisted (saying I was Gay), partly because when we first started in the mid-80s we were very much a pop group, and I didn't want to be categorized as an outrageous Gay pop star," admits Tennant, in his first openly Gay interview in the U.S. "We have always preferred to be enigmatic. Part of the Pet Shop Boys image has always been to be enigmatic and not define things. I think in pop music that works very strongly, because people imagine things about you ... you are a creature of their imagination. And I like that."

Tennant and Lowe return to the music scene September 10 with their first release of new material in nearly three years. Entitled "Bilingual," the Latininfused opus is the Pet Shop Boys' eighth release, and their first for Atlantic Records. (Their last release was 1995's stunning two-disc compilation of bonus tracks and B-side singles.) The album's first single, the infectious "Before," recently topped Billboard's dance music charts.

The 42-year old Tennant doesn't view "Bilingual" as the Boys' coming out album, (although, the U.K. vinyl 12" of "Before" sports a photo of a giant penis on the al-

bum's outside sleeve). He says there have been hints of their Gayness in almost every one of their recordings.

The Boys' 1991 release "Behaviour," for instance, featured the tune "Nervously," a song about desire between two men who are meeting for the first time, which Tennant originally wrote in 1981 before he met Lowe. "To Speak Is A Sin," and "Liberation" from 1993's "Very" dealt directly with being Gay. In fact, most of "Very," was written from the view point of Tennant as a Gay man in love.

And of course their brilliant cover of the Village People's "Go West," took the '70s classic about the Gay dream of living the Gay life in San Francisco and gave it a '90s twist, with an undercurrent of how that Gay dream has been savaged by AIDS.

But Tennant remains slightly weary of wearing the Gay label on his shirt sleeve, fearing people would try to pigeon-hole the Boys into a category based on their sexuality.

"The Gay label doesn't really bother me, as long as it's just not something that is restrictive. I just don't think one should live one's life as a Gay man. I don't think that sexuality necessarily implies a life style package that comes with it," he says.

"As I write the words in the Pet Shop Boys songs, I deal with (being Gay) in them. I always have done that. I probably deal with them slightly more openly now, which I quite enjoy doing. Although 'Metamorphosis,' a rap (on the new album), about growing up Gay and realizing what you are and how you are going to deal with it and all that stuff, I suppose I wouldn't have done that a few years ago."

So, what does the press-shy Lowe think of the Boys' new found openness? "Chris is completely against people categorizing themselves as Gay or straight for that matter. He just thinks people are sexual," Tennant says.

"The thing is, if you were just sexual, if you look at it as sexual preference, it doesn't carry so many assumptions with it, so many cultural assumptions with it. And I know a lot of people enjoy all of the culture that goes with it."

And no, Tennant and Lowe are not, and

have never been, lovers.

'The Island of Dr. Moreau' is Exciting and Scary Enough to Entertain

The author of some of the most visionary of all science fiction novels, H.G. Wells created worlds far beyond the comprehension of his contemporaries. Vividly mixing science fact with imagination, Wells' fantasy futures, seen today with all the clarity that hindsight can bring, seems if not actually inevitable, then at the least reasonable.

Such is the case with H.G.Wells' Island of Dr. Moreau, admittedly not amongst Glenn's favorite sci-fi novels. 1996 is the centennial anniversary of this novel which director John Frankenheimer has set in the near future to incorporate some of the fantastic, fascinating developments in genetic engineering. These developments now make the previously incomprehensible concept of creating creatures more perfect than either man or animal by integrating the DNA of both, seem all too frighteningly possible.

The film begins with the discovery of Edward Douglas (David Thewlis), the survivor of a plane crash and alone, adrift on a raft on the ocean. Miraculously he is saved by Montgomery (Val Kilmer) and taken to a tiny mysterious island. There, Montgomery tells him, he will be able to radio for help.

Initially the island appears to Douglas to be some kind of tropical paradise yet he does sense something amiss when Montgomery snaps the neck of a fuzzy

His new home quickly proves to be anything but an idyllic paradise as Douglas soon finds himself a prisoner in the home of Dr. Moreau.

Managing to escape, Douglas begins to explore and almost immediately he finds himself in the laboratory and what he sees there is both thrilling and terrible, uncovering the secrets of the mysterious Dr. Moreau and his experiments.

To bring to life the legendary, shall we say larger-than-life Dr. Moreau, a brilliant if demented scientist, who could imagine a better choice than that legendary demented but brilliant, larger-than-life Mar-Ion Brando?

Dr. Moreau has spent his life seeking to create a perfect being, one lacking the violence and baseness encountered in humans. Yet what Douglas encounters is a household, an entire island in fact, of creatures that in appearance and in temperament exist somewhere between that of animal and of human.

The one exception is Moreau's strange, beautiful daughter, Aissa (Fairuza Balk) with whom Douglas begins to develop romantic urges.

Still, appearances can and indeed, often are deceiving.

Douglas soon learns that Aissa's seeming perfection is but an illusion, her human form is only maintained with the aid of a special serum, one which the evil Montgomery has been holding back.

(As Aissa begins to revert back to her animal state she increasing looks like a wigged out Michael Jackson.)

Dispensing justice at one moment, a plate of biscuits the next, Brando's Moreau is at turns sympathetic and ridiculous. As big as a house and be-decked in an astonishing variety of kaftans, Brando has elevated Moreau from the typical 50's B-flick crazy scientist schtick to almost heroic proportions. His is an exciting, if perhaps a not terribly original interpretation but indeed one which he carries off with his usual flair.

Ever the moralist, Wells has the creatures rebel against their fate, that piteous, tenuous state neither animal nor fully human. It is impossible to not feel for these amazing beings, who, while seeking a soul cannot fully escape their true, animalistic instinct.

Existentialism is all well and good but this is still Hollywood Summer Blockbuster time so, gosh darn it, there better be some action or the masses, too, will

revolt. One of the creatures discovers the small implant chip which enables Dr. Moreau to control all of "his children" and rips it right out of his arm (his? hers?

its?). Discovering the means of his control, in the creatures' eyes Dr. Moreau is no longer "father", no longer a God. His fate is sealed. So too is Montgomery's, long the creatures' evil keeper, who has taken this opportunity to descend fully into madness, although Glenn was unable to

ascertain exactly why.

The Island of Dr. Moreau proves to be highly entertaining, a few gaps in logic notwithstanding, as director Franken-heimer keeps the pace zipping along nicely. Particular mention must be made of the makeup wizardry which is simply phenomenal.

Marlon Brando inevitably steals the show here and his surprising piano duet with Majai (Nelson de la Rosa) is a par-

David Thewlis is fine as usual as the oh so normal Edward Douglas. Only Val Kilmer seems a bit lost in the underwritten role as Moreau's assistant Montgom-

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

'The Fan', a Film About Big League Ball, Gets No Farther Than the Cellar

Glenn had not the opportunity to read Peter Abraham's best-seller upon which this Tony Scott film is based, but from the previews, The Fan looked awfully familiar, another film featuring Robert DeNiro playing some pyscho stalker -- not a particularly appealing nor an especially novel

One imagines that prospective films about pyscho stalkers just don't get made unless DeNiro's available. Thankfully the most he's able to do is one psycho/stalker flick a year.

Armed with his usual biggie Popcorn and Pepsi, Glenn found himself expecting the worst.

Here DeNiro plays Gil Renard, a knife salesman from the "old school", when quality counted for something and profit wasn't the name of the game. Gil's dad started the business during an apparantly kinder and gentler era. Now Gil's sales have slacked off and he finds himself the odd man (pun fully intended) out. Boss Garrity (Dan Bulter) warns Gil it's his way or the highway.

These early scenes are surprisingly effective. DeNiro and director Scott have envisioned Gil as the prototypical "angry white man", a 90's Willy Loman hawking knives that are a cheap imitation of those his beloved father crafted so many years

Gil is dreamer of the American dream whose wasted life has begun to demonstrate the obvious hollowness of such a fantasy. What's left in his life is a burning passion for the game of baseball. It was on a distant little-league field that Gil had his one bright and shining moment as a hero. He could've, he should've, but he didn't become the baseball star he'd always dreamt of becoming. So now, so very many years later, he lives vicariously through the San Francisco Giants and in particular their new star centerfielder, Bobby Rayburn (Wesley Snipes).

When Gil loses his job, baseball becomes his life, appearing at virtually every game (thankfully he paid for his season ticket before he got canned) cheering Bobby's season-long slump has everyone else at Candlestick Park booing

When we first see Bobby, he shows all the arrogance one would expect from a major league baseball star with .314 lifetime batting average and a \$40 million dollar contract burning a hole in his pocket.

But there's a fly in the oinment, another player, Juan Primo (Benicio Del Toro) on the Giants already has Bobby's number 11 on his uniform and Mr. Primo isn't inclined to give it up.

(One might have thought that someone holding out until Opening Day for a \$40 million contract would have thought to have added a demand for his uniform number among his other demands.)

The first game features a spectacular collision in the outfield between the two disputing players and also Bobby's game winning grand-slam but from there it's all downhill for Mr. Rayburn who becomes obsessed with the notion that his slump is due to his being forced to wear some other number.

About the point that Gil decides to take matters into his own hands is just about the point that The Fan tailspins into an unpleasant, entirely implausible mindless

While stalking Bobby at his ocean-front home, Gil has the good fortune to save Bobby's young son Richie from drowning. Bobby is suitably grateful and welcomes Gil into his home (and his closet in a

rather dubious but certainly curious clothes fetish scene). Gil is clearly a base or two short of a baseball diamond but things seem to be going okay until Bobby admits that the end of his slump came because he simply stopped caring. Wrong, wrong, wrong. Very wrong. Sooooooooo wrong!

Bobby tries to send Gil on his merry way but before he goes, Gil takes Bobby's son and jeep, leaving behind a little souvenir, something of a testament of his love. (That's right, Gil's been carrying around a hunk of this human flesh in his pocket!?!)

With young Richie Rayburn in tow, Gil seeks out his old Little League catcher, Coop (Charles Hallahan) who seems a bit surprised to see Gil. Seems Bobby isn't the only one Gil's been stalking.



At the time of its initial London stage production in September, 1966, Orton's infernally black comedy, Loot, was loudly denounced in the press for its outrageously incendiary treatment of themes ranging from grave robbing and murder to police brutality and shifting sexual identi-

That the flamboyant Orton and his lover, Kenneth Halliwell, openly flouted societal conventions and had already had several unhappy encounters with the law, was undoubtedly irksome to those acquainted with his personal circumstances.

However, more damning in the eyes of the general theatre-going public than Orton's own lifestyle, was the fact that he had the temerity to expose the hypocritical societal underpinnings of the British status quo with such a wickedly literate gusto.

Thus, though the somewhat flawed initial production drew fire from many quarters, it was nevertheless possessed of all the elements (truth, clarity of perspective, and a calculating offhanded outrageousness) necessary to ensure its immediate and continued success.

On the basis of the success of Loot, Orton came to the attention of the Beatles who commissioned him to script a film (the unproduced "Up Against It.").

With the production of his next plays,

Funeral Games and What the Butler Saw, Orton firmly established himself as the master farceur of his generation and was poised to rise to the heights of the contemporary theatrical scene. His ascension was abruptly halted, however, when, during the early morning hours of August 10, 1967, Orton's lover bludg-eoned him to death with a hammer prior to killing himself with an overdose of sleeping pills.

The details of Orton's life were later documented in the 1987 Stephen Frears film Prick Up Your Ears, featuring Gary Oldham as a wickedly mischievous Orton.

Thirty years after its initial production, Loot retains its vibrantly anarchic tone and reminds us that while many attitudes and taboos within society may appear eerily unchanged, there also continues to be a delightful pleasure in affronting these

Center for AIDS Intervention Research (CAIR)

AIDS is the most serious infectious disease epidemic of modern times. About one million Americans have contracted HIV infection, and at least 40 million of men, women, and children worldwide already have the disease. However, new HIV infections are preventable and some of the adverse consequences of HIV disease can also now be prevented.

The mission of the Center for AIDS Intervention Research (CAIR) is to conceptualize, develop, conduct, and scientifically evaluate the effectiveness of new intervention strategies to prevent HIV infection in populations vulnerable to the disease. CAIR's research also seeks to identify improved strategies to promote health and alleviate adverse mental health consequences of HIV among persons with the disease and among their loved ones.

CAIR's Research Team

CAIR is a multidisciplinary HIV prevention research center. Supported by an AIDS research center grant from the National Institute of Mental Health (NIMH) and based in the Department of Psychiatry and Behavioral Medicine of the Medical College of Wisconsin, CAIR's HIV prevention research is carried forward by a team of 11 faculty investigators who devote their full effort to AIDS prevention, another seven investigators affiliated with CAIR, and a fulltime research and administrative support team of approximately 30 persons.

CAIR investigators reflect the disciplines of community, clinical, health, social, quantitative, and educational psychology; public health and epidemiology; psychiatry, infectious diseases, and community medicine; anthropology; biostatistics; and other fields. Investigators from a range of scientific backgrounds work together at CAIR to advance the science of AIDS prevention.

HIV Prevention Projects Undertaken at CAIR

CAIR investigators and research staff are presently undertaking HIV prevention research activities in a number of areas. These include:

HIV
Prevention
for Homeless
and Severely
Mentally Ill
Men and
Women

A number of studies have shown alarming rates of HIV infection among homeless and severely mentally ill adults in our inner cities. In partnership with homeless shelters and mental health centers in Milwaukee, CAIR investigators are evaluating the effectiveness of smallgroup HIV prevention programs in settings that serve the homeless and the severely mentally ill.

Community Level HIV Prevention Interventions

As a community epidemic, efforts to prevent AIDS must be undertaken at a community-wide level. Since 1988, CAIR scientists have been developing and evaluating the effectiveness of HIV prevention approaches that mobilize AIDSvulnerable communityincluding young gay men and inner-city women-to bring about reductions in rates of high-risk behavior in their communities.

Promoting the Long-Term Maintenance of Risk Reduction Behavior Change

The threat of AIDS has become a permanent part of the American and world health landscape. Because risk for HIV disease is a sustained threat, approaches are needed to help persons at risk for HIV not only make but also sustain their behavior change efforts. CAIR scientists are determining the effectiveness of interventions to help gay men and other persons at risk for HIV to maintain behavior changes over long periods of time.

HIV Prevention Approaches from the Research Arena to Frontline Community-Based Organizations

Translating New

Research advances in HIV prevention methods must be quickly and effectively transferred to community-based and public health organizations so the new approaches can be used in the field. A group of CAIR investigators and staff are working with the staffs of over 75 AIDS prevention organizations throughout the country to share information about effective new prevention approaches developed at CAIR and to gain input from these organizations about community needs.

Evaluating the Cost Effectiveness of AIDS Prevention

CAIR has established a scientific core within the center to study the cost effectiveness of different HIV prevention approaches. At a time of great accountability and tighter public health budgets, CAIR's cost effectiveness studies core evaluates the cost of HIV prevention programs in relation to the number of infections averted and quality of life years saved by preventing AIDS cases.

CAIR has initiated projects evaluating the effectiveness of mental health interventions to assist men and women with HIV/AIDS cope with the stresses of their disease, to help persons who have lost loved ones to AIDS cope with their bereavement, to meet the special needs of persons with HIV/AIDS living in rural areas with few available support resources, and to understand the spiritual and coping issues faced by persons with AIDS and their caregivers.







They also rely on violence in their quest for power. Whether it's roughing up a bad guy, robbing a bank or staging a kidnap-ping, these women don't hesitate to use a little brute force to level the playing field. Is this really the way women act when they get together?


We're all People

Is this a new day in Hollywood where women producers and directors are making films about girls taking charge and not being disposable mats/girlfriends/secretaries/plot props?

Aleksa Palladino: Hopefully, in the next few years, gender will become secondary--that it doesn't matter whether a woman directed a film, it doesn't matter if a man directed a film; it's just that it was directed and it's either good or it's bad. ... It's not important. We're all people.

Angelina Jolie: It's important for women to feel empowered as women, but I think we make a mistake ... by saying, "Not only are we equal, but we're better because we've been through this (oppression)." I think we need to say what we say and be who we are and not make an angry statement.

Growing to Go

Girls Town, three tough teen-age girls avenging the death of their best friend. In a script largely improvised by its stars, Lili Taylor, Bruklin Harris and Anna Grace, the women turn to themselves for strength and support. That and some well-placed punches and crafty grand lar-

Crime and violence factor: Breaking and entering, theft, assault and battery, and a satisfying rampage against a car.

Why have women been marginalized in

Lili Taylor: They only want to see a couple kind of women _ who are safe, non-threatening--and they are not going to shake anything up. Other kinds of women shake things up too much and they are too uncomfortable. ... I don't want to make it seem like we're not making any progress at all. We're making progress here and there. Things are happening, but by no means at all are we at a place that's acceptable yet. There's still a lot of growing to go.

Go Girl

Set It Off, Jada Pinkett, Queen Latifah, Vivica Fox and Kimberly Elise as four women who get revenge on "the system" that reduced them to a hardscrabble childhood in the L.A. projects.

Crime and violence factor: Bank-

robbing.

Why is there so much violence in many of these films about young women em-

powering themselves?

Vivica Fox: Because the only way we're going to get men as well as women to come into the theaters, you gotta have a little violence. It's trying to cater to all facets of the audience. ... Some girls like to see movies (with violence). Maybe one reason why I don't like seeing it in the past is that I haven't seen women doing that, it's always guys. With women, you've got someone to cheer for too, like





The Pet Shop Boys: Neil Tennant and Chris Lowe

Pet Shop Boys: They're Out Of The Closet And Speaking Out About Being Gay

"The only person who has asked that is my mother. No we never were lovers," he says. "But when you look back on the kind of photographs we used to do, people obviously would think that. It sort of looks like that — sort of the older guy and the street kid."

Born and raised in Newcastle, in the north part of England, Tennant was raised very Catholic, and went to a Catholic school, where he was seen as "soft." By the time he was 12, he knew he was different..

"I remember being 12 years old and reading an article in a magazine about Oscar Wilde. It said he was a homosexual. And I thought, 'Oh my God, I'm a homosexual.' I remember feeling so upset, 'Oh my God, I'm a homosexual,' he recalls. "And there was a boy I used to get the bus home with at school and I realized that I was in love with him and I burst into tears."

In the early-1970s, Tennant moved to London. Though many of his friends were Gay, including his best friend, he remained uneasy with his sexuality.

mained uneasy with his sexuality.

"It was the '70s, and I found the Gay scene fantastically off putting. If you look back to the clone era ... I used to think I don't want to be that. I don't want to have a mustache and wear 501 jeans. In those days, to be Gay was to wear a uniform—men with mustaches, wearing white 501 jeans, white T-shirts and Dr. Martin shoes," he says, noting that in the mid-1980s he started to become more comfortable with the whole scene.

"Then it loosened up (in the '80s) with groups like Culture Club coming around, and the clone thing started to die. Gay clubs were really at the forefront of club culture, of dance music culture and that really fascinated me. Gay clubs were hip without the bullshit. In straight clubs there was a lot of bullshit about different kinds of music. It was always about being ultra cool, where as Gay clubs were about having fun and they had great music."

In 1980, Tennant met musician Chris Lowe, and a year later the two formed the Pet Shop Boys, named after three of Lowe's friends, who worked in a pet shop and were nick-named the pet shop boys.

"We used to say that it sounds like the name of a rap group. When we made our first record, we didn't have a name, so we thought we'd be the Pet Shop Boys," says Tennant, who recalls that in his first ever interview as the Pet Shop Boys, a woman reporter told Tennant that she heard their name came from "this thing in New York where Gay guys get hamsters and put them in plastic bags and shove them up their asses ... A lot of people think that is really how we got our name. But it's not true."

In 1984, Tennant and Lowe released their first single "West End Girls," on an independent label. Two years later, the song was picked up by a major recording company and within weeks of its release,

topped the charts in nine countries, including the U.S.

"Our music was very influenced by what people would regard as Gay music," he says. "Of course, in Britain, by the late-80s pop music was Gay music. ... And, by end of the 1980s, partly because of us, and a few others, like Dead or Alive, it became terrible mainstream pop."

But while the group's popularity soared, they remained steadfast about not discussing their sexuality. People could read into their music whatever they wanted to, but neither Tennant or Lowe were prepared to confirm or deny anything.

"In the 1980s, all my friends knew I was Gay. There was no two ways about that. And our music was very influenced by what people would regard as Gay music," he says. "(But) we were very much a pop group with the young audience. And although I was technically a homosexual, I wasn't a practicing homosexual. I didn't have a lover. I mean I had sex occasionally, but I didn't really have a very swinging sex life. I felt I was technically Gay, rather than practicing ... And I preferred that the whole thing was enigmatic."

Still, the Boys have never shied away from dealing with the Gay issue, albeit subtlety, in their songs. They also became one of the first mainstream pop groups to deal with the subject of AIDS in their music, doing so since 1986, when Tennant's best friend learned he had the disease.

"In 1986, AIDS was still comparatively

"In 1986, AIDS was still comparatively rare in Britain. And it was an incredible, fundamental shock, cause I didn't even know anyone who knew anyone with AIDS," says Tennant, whose friend died in 1989. "And, it has been in my life ever since, in terms of knowing people

For the better part the last 10 years, Tennant has incorporated his feeling into his work, most notably in "It Couldn't Happen Here," "Hit Music," and the B-side single, "Your Uncle Funny," a song about two families that meet for the first time when they come to pay their respect over the death of one of the lovers.

"I write about subjects that affect me," he says. "Knowing several close friends who have died at a young age because of the same disease has a profound affect on your life. I mean at the same time, we were having success in the late-80s with the Pet Shop Boys, my best friend was in a hospital bed with drips sticking out of his arm. I always had this permanent contrast between (my) life and (my) best friend's life which kind of makes you feel terrible "

And Tennant scoffs off rumors that either one of them has the disease. "I think if people know you are Gay or think you are Gay, people rather horrifyingly assume you've got AIDS," he says. "People just think Gay equals AIDS in a lot of the straight media."

But while he doesn't get bogged down with rumors, he does take issue with the public's need to have celebrities come out as HIV-positive. "We always come back in our contemporary culture that celebrities

apparently are responsible for everything. I think it's pathetic. AIDS is a disease. We need to learn about the disease. It's not going to make life easier if you know Tom Cruise has got AIDS. The disease is still a disease. And I think people try to hang these things on celebrities. I think people expect nowadays celebrities to somehow solve their problems because they can't be bothered to solve them themselves," he says.

"I admire Magic (Johnson) for what he has done. But is he really an effective spokesperson about AIDS? It would be much more effective to tell young people about AIDS, and have a real person with AIDS, who lives around the corner come into their school or their home to talk to them about it. That would be 100 times more effective than Magic Johnson. Cause I think when a celebrity does it, it makes it seem like a celebrity disease. It trivializes it. It downplays it. AIDS is a disease that anyone can get. People should realize that it's a normal disease. It's a human disease."

With their new found outness and fab new recording, Tennant and Lowe move into the last half of 1996 with a renewed sense of direction. Still, Tennant hopes the public doesn't reduce them into a onedimensional Gay bubble.

"Our songs speak to Gay people because the lyrics are written by me, and I'm a Gay man. But I would hate for us to be categorized, to be disloyal in some way, as a Gay group. We make music for whoever wants to like it. We make pop singles that we hope would attract a wide audience as well. To be honest, I'm kind of against the categorization of splitting up of our society into communities of race or sexuality or any other classification. I would like society to be one community really. I know that isn't possible, but I think it's something we should all aim for."

And judging by the new set's rich lyrical substance and rhapsodious harmonies, it is highly unlikely that the mass public will simply view the Boys as two Gay musicians. In fact, as the millennium approaches, it's more apt that Tennant and Lowe will be seen as innovative pioneers of cutting edge music, and musical trend-setters.





As Summer Ends, It's Time To Curl Up by Autumn's Fires and Enjoy a Good Book

Gay Fiction

Will summer never come?

Many Milwaukeeans bemoaned the lateness of warm weather's arrival to the city of festivals. Those brave and hearty souls who were determined to make this year's Pridefest the best ever, despite near arctic conditions. Once here, summer never seems to hang around very long and before anyone knows, it's almost Labor Day.

And here we are with the Annual Gay & Lesbian Book Roundup in the Wisconsin Light's Fall Book Section.

The past few months found several new and exciting titles from such writers as Andrew Holleran, Brad Gooch and Clive Barker.

From Clive Barker comes Sacrament (HarperCollins HC \$25.00), a novel totally unlike anything this "Horror Master" has ever

Famed wildlife photographer Will Rabjohns has made his reputation chronicling the fates of endangered species. Including his own. For even as Will rises to the pinnacle of his career, he is witnessing his own world - San Francisco's close-knit Gay community - rav-

The Beauty of Men (Morrow HC \$24.00) probably isn't the Andrew Holleran novel fans of his classic Dancer From the Dance were expecting. Instead, after nearly a decade of silence Holleran has crafted a brilliant, lyrical story of a Gay man ashamed to be mourning the loss of his own youth as so many around him have died young, victims of the AIDS virus. Perhaps unexpectedly bleak, this is a work of astonishing clarity and poignancy.

No recent title is as blatant as Brad Gooch's The Golden Age of Promiscuity (Knopf HC \$24.00). Evoking the raw, often shocking New York Gay club scene of the 1970's, Gooch's compelling, fascinating novel brings to life a subterranean world of drugs, dim lights, strange back rooms where medievelseeming acts are performed and intimacy is

Gay Porn stars aren't supposed to be writers, right? Well, maybe not. Aiden Shaw, the English-born star of such Falcon videos as "The Backroom" and "A Roll in the Hay,"

has just published a semi-autobiographical novel, Brutal (Miliveres Pb \$12.95). Set mainly in London's underground club scene, Brutal explores the life of a young man who makes a living as a prostitute but is trying to challenge what he has become - a person out of control on drugs, alcohol and abusive sex.

Honorary "Gay man" Poppy Z. Brite explores the world of the serial killer in Exquisite Corpse (Simon & Schuster HC \$21.00). Definitely not for the squeamish, Exquisite Corpse features a Dahmer-like protagonist Mills mystery, Tribe (Dell Pb \$5.50). Warily beginning a new romance, Todd finds himself helping an old girlfriend when the son she gave up for adoption returns and leaves his baby. She and the baby become the target of stalkers members of a cult of realots who will stop at nothing to reclaim the child.

In Paperback

Lesbian LAPD homicide detective and ex-Marine Kate Delafield reluctantly attends a 25th reunion of those she served with in Vietnam. But after her hotel room door is sprayed with bullets and one of the reunion guests is murdered, Kate must solve the heinous crime and save her and lover Aimee's

Claire McNab's popular Australian Detective Inspector Carol Ashton makes her seventh appearance in Double Bluff (Naiad Pb \$10.95). Someone is stalking television star Madeline Shipley but is she the prey of a psychotic fan or is it just a smokescreen to divert attention from the real target - Carol Ashton? As Carol becomes increasingly embroiled in her most challenging case ever, the danger widens to include her own family.

Another long-time Naiad mystery writer, Lauren Wright Douglas starts a new series with Death at Lavender Bay (Naiad Pb \$10.95). When Allison O'Neil is called for the reading of a relative's will, she learns that she has been left a B&B in the little town of Lavender Bay, Oregon.

From the new Alyson Press comes a debut novel from Jacquelyn Park, A Stone Gone Mad (Pb \$9.95). When sixteen-year-old Emily is discovered in the arms of a female schoolmate, she is as appalled as her family. This searing story of lies and concealment wonderfully captures the hurt, the doubt and the confusion of a double life as Emily finds the strength to finally face the truth.

Fast Ride with the Top Down (Alyson HC \$19.95) by Harper Grey introduces a true heroine for the conflicted, overheated '90's: Lacy Blackwood. Lacy and younger brother Franco as kids tried to figure out life by watching TV sitcoms. After many aimless years, Lacy's world becomes even wilder with the arrival of a seductive heartbreaker - a femme who is more fatale than Lacy is quite ready for!

Long lost Lesbian novels have begun to turn up with some frequency. First Naiad's Barbara Grier announced Forbidden Fires (HC \$21.95), Margaret Anderson's never-beforepublished novel of Lesbian love. Here for the first time is Anderson's unsurpassed portrayal of romantic love, which fictionalizes an episode contemporary with - and totally absent from- her well-known autobiographies.



Sapphire is a remarkable new voice in Lesbian literature and in her electrifying new novel Push, Sapphire has created an astonishing heroine: Precious Jones. In a voice that shakes the reader by its language, its story and its unflinching honesty, Precious records her journey from Harlem's lowest

Okay, there are still a few Lesbian romances out there including Judith McDaniel's Yes I Said Yes I Will (Naiad Pb \$10.95). Unitarian minister Rachel Smythe has spent her life caring for others. Susan Meyers, a high-level government official knows too well the demands and compromises that life in the closet brings. When their lives intertwine, each woman must confront her own fears before she can surrender to the ecstasy of allconsuming love.



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"Virtual Equality" is a Grand Epic of Gay/Lesbian/Bisexual Liberation

Wisconsin state law prohibits discrimination on the basis of sexual orientation, but homophobia and anti-Gay violence are widespread. Every year, masses of Gay and Lesbian Americans hold hands and chant in Gay Pride parades; but the majority of the time you won't see them touching their partners in public. Our Gay and Lesbian movement is fighting for our right to marry; but in Gay culture, unstable relationships, promiscuity and public sex are rampant.

This is Urvashi Vaid's theory of "Virtual

Equality", a cultural/political condition wherein politically and socially stigmatized Gay and Lesbian Americans have made certain, superficial gains, while the fundamentally homophobic, anti-sex attitudes that are the root of our oppression remain unchanged. Virtual Equality is the appearance of justice without the substance. In other words, we might have gotten invited to the White House, but that didn't get us into the military. Hollywood actors might wear red ribbons, but the number of Gay or Lesbian characters in TV and film are sadly few.

In her award-winning book of the same name, Virtual Equality (Doubleday, \$14.95 paperback), Urvashi Vaid uses this theory to make an eloquent case for the reassessment and revitalization of Gay and Lesbian liberation. In its sweeping historical scope and scholarly tone (this book could easily have been titled The Rise and Fall of Gay Liberation), Virtual Equality binds Gay and Lesbian activism to its roots, candidly examines its great triumphs and its tragic flaws, and proposes an uncomfortable but necessary path out of our current dilemmas: do we follow the leadership of Log Cabin conservatives and assimilate into straight culture; or, like "radical fairies" like Queer Nation, do we transform the straight world to suit "Queer sensibility"? Are we a singletrack movement, focusing only on "Gay issues", or do we fit into a framework of liberation from racial, gender, and class-based oppression as well? Urvashi Vaid finds fault and value in each of these approaches.

In Virtual Equality, Urvashi Vaid also chronicles her own initiation into Gay and Lesbian activism. First through feminism, then the Women's Music movement, then at the beginning of the AIDS epidemic through ACT-UP, and finally through involvement in nationally-based activism as head of NGLTF, Vaid references hundreds of devoted musicians, poets, public figures and activists who inspired her and political development. Vaid argues that Gay and Lesbian activism has done a poor job of reaching out to the majority of Gay and Lesbian Americans; and her point is proven by the fact that of all the

individuals she references and quotes, nearly all are unknowns in both Gay and mainstream culture. It seems that, unfortunately, even our own best advocates end up in the closet not as prisoners, but as junk.

Despite the political and legislative gains of the past two decades, Vaid's long involvement with the Gay and Lesbian movement has also unearthed the uglier side of our existence. Internal homophobia, racism, sexism, classbias, opportunism and excess are all embarrassing add-ons to our legacy of oppression. Both anecdotally and by oppression. observation, Vaid does our dirty work for us, exposing the uncomfortable truths that we as Gay and Lesbian Americans would like to ignore, and calling for an up-front, public dialogue on how we, as Gay and Lesbian Americans, can put our own house in order.

But for all its incisive political analysis, its oop culture savvy, and it's powerful vision, Virtual Equality fails to do the one thing Vaid claims Gay and Lesbian activism must do: it fails to speak to the common Gay and Lesbian experience. Though well-researched and soundly written, the book's dry, analytical tone masks over the vigor and moral vision that Vaid so desperately wants to return to Gay and Lesbian liberation. Instead of speaking to the Gay and Lesbian masses, as it were, Virtual Equality is a book by activists, for activists. This book could (and should) be re-written into twelve or more magazine articles, which, with more of Vaid's fire-andbrimstone morality and less of Andrew Sullivan's patrician rambling, could inspire thousands of Gay and Lesbian readers across the country, adding fuel to a people and a beset by either burn-out, movement complacency, or both.

In Urvashi Vaid's personal history and in its observations of our collective history, in it's ability to embrace the Gay and Lesbian movement's global future without denouncing its radical past, Virtual Equality demonstrates a profound political and philo-sophical maturity. Ms. Vaid comes to the conclusion that, regardless of our political, cultural, social, or religious views, we as Gay and Lesbian Americans must find a common moral and political ground from which to found a unified movement in which everyone can participate and from which everyone can benefit. According to Vaid, if we can look at ourselves honestly and keep our eyes on the prize, a successful movement, both on the local and national levels, is possible.

'And Say Hi To Joyce' is Funny, Priceless, a True Gem of a Book To See Ourselves

Deb Price is the Ellen Goodman of the Gay community. You may know of Ellen Goodman. Her syndicated columns appear in the local fish wrap, a.k.a. The Milwaukee Jour-

Deb Price is also a syndicated columnist who happens to be a Lesbian. Her columns are syndicated through the Detroit News and the Gannett News Service to hundreds of newspapers around the country, except here in Milwaukee.

But not to fear. And Say Hi To Joyce is a collection of Price's columns now available to you in book form.

And Say Hi to Joyce is co-written by Price's "lovemate" Joyce Murdock, a journalist in her own right.

Murdock puts each column into context with her commentaries. She explains the initial reaction by the press to Price's column, the hate mail and homophobia directed at Detroit News editor and publisher Bob Giles for allowing the column to exist, and the campaign by Gays and Lesbians across the country to keep the column ongoing.

Price writes with compassion and a love for our community. She tackles such issues as Gays in the military, Gay marriages, the Clinton election, and whether or not you should take your lover to your high school

Price's writing style is breezy, charming, and well, sometimes makes our lives sound

really interesting. In Price's first column she posed the question of how to introduce Murdock

There's no confusion when a woman says: "This is my husband." But how do I introduce the woman I've lived with for six years to my boss? Is she my "girlfriend" or my "significant other"? My "longtime com-panion" or my "lover"? Who says the Gay rights movement hasn't made a lot of progress? In just one hundred years, we've gone from the love that dare not speak its name to the love that doesn't have a name.

In one of her final columns in the book Price writes about being single.

Most Lesbians we know just aren't comfortable being single for a really long time, say six weeks. Lesbian couples often form faster than an infatuated woman can whisper, 'Are you allergic to cats?" No wonder the world's most famous Lesbian riddle is "What does a Lesbian take on a second date?" Answer: "A U-Haul.

And Say Hi To Joyce is a great collection of articles that break the stereotypes around Gay and Lesbian life. Pick up a copy to read what we, in Milwaukee, have been missing. You just might find yourself writing a letter to our local fish wrap urging them to carry Price's column. It could happen.

"Pederasty and Pedagogy in Ancient Greece" Shows a Little Known World

William A. Percy is known to the Gay community as the co-author of Outing: Shattering the Conspiracy of Silence (reviewed in Wisconsin Light, May 26, 1996). He is also known for his advertisements offering a \$1000 reward for information leading to the outing of church prelates. Because of the superficial historical generalities in Outing, I thought this book would be as superficial and inaccurate. I was

Pederasty is the practice of an adult male taking an adolescent male as his lover. In ancient Greece the practice was institutionalized as a way of raising citizens. The adolescent was not merely the lover of the adult, but also his student in the arts of citizenship, trade and warfare. The adult was

an unmarried male who himself once was the adolescent lover of an older man. The boy is a sexual outlet for young men who often did not marry until 30 years of age.

As Percy notes, the practice was a form of birth control, limiting reproductive sex to older males. Sex between adult males is not part of the institution. In all, the practice sounds rather heterosexual. This is not exactly the "Gay-positive" ancient Greece This is not often touted by Gay activists.

Percy's contribution to our understanding of Greek pederasty is in its history. Percy demonstrates what others had suspected: there is no evidence of the practice before the 7th century BCE. For instance, it is completely absent in the works of Homer and Hesiod.

Percy traces the practice from its origins in Please turn to Ancient Greece Page 27

Past Is Once Again Present From Gifted Author Rita Mae Brown

Once more, the history of the Deep South has been made a gift to readers of the unusually talented Rita Mae Brown. Longtime fans of Brown's witty, articulate style will not be disappointed with this latest offering, a tale of one woman's struggle to make sense of her life and its many trials, finally understood by viewing it through the telescope of time.

Those who haven't yet enjoyed the singular pleasure of spending time with one of literature's brightest lights will find their investment in Riding Shotgun time and money well spent. Much as I love having read almost every work from this gifted author, I always envy a bit those who are discovering her for the first time; there are few experiences I can recall quite as joyously surprising as my first romp through a Rita Mae Brown novel.

In Riding Shotgun, the excitement and energy of the foxhunt is the backdrop against which the life of Pryor Deyhle Blackwood — "Cig" to her friends — plays out as a roiling pot of emotional uproar, fired by her late husband's infidelities, upheavals in her adolescent children's lives, betrayals by best friends and trusted relatives, and the strain of making financial ends meet.

In Cig's story, the counterpoint to the tradition of the hunt is the all-encompassing tyranny of modern technology: Cig, a real estate agent, can't function without her fax machine, cell phone and all the other wonders of the Electronic Age.

Realizing her enslavement to these modern miracles, she develops an unhealthy disdain for them that culminates in a hilarious but vaguely disturbing encounter with her television set.

Through an eerie development in the field during a hunt, Cig finds herself transported back in time to 1699 in Virginia's Tidewater, and experience with an earlier generation of the Deyhle family.

The slower pace of life and its pared-down, to-the-bones structure are a balm to the exposed nerves of Cig's embattled psyche. In a welcome atmosphere of familial warmth and uncommon directness, Cig's spirit recovers and flourishes. Despite her strange attire and unfamiliar speech patterns, she dazzles the small community as her namesake, the Pryor Deyhle of 1699, a distant cousin and self-possessed debutante recently returned from London.

Thus begins Cig's unwinding of the immense ball of yarn that is history, both personal and national, and of her comprehension of how our culture has evolved. Not surprisingly, Cig finds herself torn between her comfort in a world long past and the desire to return to her own time, where her children and her own life await her, along with all the turmoil of the impending 21st century.

Though the storyline not so subtly calls on that all-important element of fiction — the willing suspension of disbelief — it is not jarringly implausible, and the promise of fun and adventure draws the reader in just as surely as a good children's book. Reinforcing believability for the reader are the myriad details woven defly throughout the exposition and even the dialogue.

It's a credit to the author's thorough and scholarly research that we learn so many idio-syncrasies of colonial Virginia life at the turn of the eighteenth century, and to her skill as a writer that we don't realize while reading what a tremendous research effort she put forth.

It's this facility with words that is perhaps the most disturbing thing about Brown's work for some readers. I have a friend who, though admitting to reading all the author's books, insists that she is "too clever by half and too aware of it."

It's not an entirely unfounded allegation, as Brown's wit is of the well-honed and occasionally biting variety and her ability to sling her arrows home true is matchless.

However, this is the temptation that brings some of us back again and again to worship at the altar of Brown: The promise of some well-placed barbs hurled irreverently in the direction of society's sacred cows, resulting in some of the finest Southern barbecue this side of Whistle Stop. My guess is that anyone who finds Ms. Brown "too clever" might have just a wee bit of the green monster of envy sharing space in her bed.

As for me, as long as Brown's not on an overtly political soapbox (a la Venus Envy), I welcome the refreshing breeze that blows up North here now and again from the Charlottesville area.

I appreciate her ability and willingness to couch relevant and necessary eye openers in the often self-deprecating humor of her characters. Devastatingly human and frequently flawed, they remain relentlessly hopeful in the face of the worst life has to offer.

In the case of Riding Shotgun, Brown tackles the increasingly inhuman ways we treat each other. In a recent interview with Jann Malone of the Richmond Times-Dispatch she posits, "We're actually losing our ability to reach out to one another, to deal with differences, to be respectful, to make

room for somebody who maybe has a different world view but is a decent human being. I don't say that people have to love each other, but we can at least work toward respect. I will settle for simple tolerance."

Like the author, her characters are searching for a way back to the road off which our society has made "a wrong turn," just looking for a little decency.

Though Brown makes a point of letting people know she doesn't appreciate the label of "Lesbian writer," she nevertheless has been a constant voice for our community, including at least one Gay or Lesbian character in all her fiction, and Riding Shotgun is no exception, despite the fact that the protagonist herself is straight.

Fans of Brown's series that began with Six of One and had its sequel in Bingo will be glad to learn that the third chronicle of life in Runnymede, as it revolves around the irrepressible Hunsenmeir sisters, is currently in the editing stages at Bantam. Tentatively titled Loose Lips, this installment takes us through the Second World War with Juts, Wheezie, Nickel and their fellow "Runnys" who have yet to put closure on the War Between the States, perched precariously as they are astride the Mason-Dixon line.

This prolific writer also has currently on the shelves a fictionalized account of the life of Dolly Madison, and has finished her fifth collaborative effort with her cat, Sneaky Pie, The Bloody Queen. As a followup effort, the famous feline will offer Car Wash, sixth in the popular Mrs. Murphy mystery series.

Brown recently told Ellen Kanner of The Washington Blade that she wrote Riding Shotgun as a wake up call to a nation of whiners.

"Our ancestors knew life could be capri-

cious and cruel. Now people want fulfillment, they want answers, they want to know they're safe. You're never safe, and there are no answers" Regardless, if her current output is any indication, fans have no need to fear that Rita Mae Brown will stop challenging us with the questions any time soon.

Harper will be appearing at 7:00pm and will read from her new book and present a slide presentation based on the two books. Both books are published by New Victoria.



Andy Humm, writing in LGNY, reports that "sources" who worked in upstate New York politics in the mid 1970s—when Kemp represented Buffalo in Congress—said that they "knew" that Kemp belonged to a Gay club in the city.

Even the very pro-Republican New York Post has reminded its readers in a Kemp profile that Kemp was implicated in one of the more interesting brouhahas in the years when Ron Reagan was governor of California.

In 1967, Washington, DC syndicated columnist Drew Pearson identified Kemp as the "athlete" involved in an alleged "homosexual ring" with connections to the Reagan cabinet.

Kemp was asked about the story in a 1988 "Today" show interview on NBC. Kemp denied the rumors, but characterized the inquiry as "acceptable scrutiny" given the fact that he was running for president at the time.

The Post also reports that inside conservative think tank sources report that Kemp had trouble raising sufficient funds in his bid for the party's presidential nomination because of the intra-party rumors about his private life.

Kemp's Record Makes Him a Leading Homophobe

Kemp's record on Gay and Lesbian issues is bleak. Humm reports that as a member of Congress, Kemp consistently sided with the notoriously homophobic Congressman William Dannemeyer (R-CA) on anti-Gay and anti-AIDS amendments.

As Secretary of Housing and Urban Development under President Bush, he refused to sign an agreement with unionized workers to ban discrimination based on sexual orienta-

In 1996, in a TV interview with David Frost, Kemp came out against Gay teachers, saying, "I think a school should have the right to choose what type of example we have for our children in public schools."

As recently as this past May, Kemp spoke out against Justice Anthony Kennedy's 6-3 Supreme Court decision overturning Colorado's Amendment 2. "They (Gays and Lesbians) shouldn't get special rights," he said.

Dan Quayle Too

Dan Quayle was no friend of Gay people either. All this is more than faintly reminiscent of the rumors that surfaced in 1988 about Quayle. Humm said that he interviewed the young man alleged to have been Quayle's lover and he denied that anything had ever happened.

Nevertheless, Hinckle reports that both Gay and non-Gay Republican circles in San Francisco are "abuzz over the Kemp situation."

Bob Ross, publisher of the **Bay Area Reporter** told Hinckle that the staff of his paper was holding meetings to figure out how to deal with the story.

County GOP Central Committee member, Don Casper, told Hinckle that the stories of Kemp's private closet life were so well known in political circles that "it is impossible that the Dole people didn't vet this. They had to know what they were getting into," Casper said.

Casper doubted that it would be possible that Kemp would not be asked about his sexual orientation sometime during the campaign

paign.

"How he answers that question will be a defining moment for the Republican Party in terms of policy on private sexual activity," said Casper.

What should Kemp's answer be?
"The best answer is, 'It's none of your business,'" said Casper.

Crete through Sparta, Athens and the islands. He also discusses how the Greeks provided their male gods and heroes with boy lovers, such as Zeus with Ganymede and Herakles (Hercules) with Hylas.

The study provides interesting slices of life from ancient Greece. However, this is an academic study, so it is not for everybody.

Travel

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What makes this book interesting to me is Percy's involvement in radical Gay activism. Anyone who is familiar with Percy's radical writing may find this example of his scholarship an interesting counterpoint. And

it is solid, impressive scholarship.

Occasionally the biases of **Outing** surface. In the Introduction, Percy complains at length about the lack of pornographic writing from the ancient world (pp. 3-6). Percy hints darkly of concerning and the destruction of

the ancient world (pp. 3-6). Percy hints darkly of censorship and the destruction of documents. Of course, before the invention of printing the survival of any text was

precarious.

He notes that Latin texts survived better than Greek, but that is because Rome never fell to Arab and Turk conquerors like Alexandria and Constantinople. What Greek literature we have was what the refugee scholars could grab as they fled Constantinople when it was conquered, and a great deal of it is full of "pornographic" text which greatly embarrassed Victorian scholars.

Considering the vast volume of Greek text which does survive, perhaps it would be more appropriate to be happy we have as much as

other if they have such a lack of trust in themselves and between their partners. I could probably present a laundry list of negative behavior exhibited in the Lesbian community alone as I'm sure you have within the Gay male community. However, this is not the point of my response.

I think that two important points to note is that while issues like "Gays in the Military" and "Same-Sex Marriages" are perhaps important, we also need to address how we can create a shared vision, a focused view of where we'd like our community to go via open dialog as opposed to sticking our heads in the sand accepting "business as usual" and pretending that our community does not have major issues to cope with internally. This, I feel is a very big task. As I see it, our views about political stance, race and gender issues seem to keep us continually divided. I feel that unless we create unity amongst ourselves, we as a community will not advance very far. I feel that David's commentary has certainly helped to open the door and expose the areas needing improvement within our community

Secondly, and <u>most importantly</u>, we must learn to respect ourselves and love ourselves as humans, as people. It is then that we will be better able to give respect to others as well as receive it.
