

Gays Outnumber Bill's Supporters At Meeting

Wausau, WI- Hundreds of people most of them Gays, Bisexuals, Lesbians and their allies turned out for a hearing on an anti-Gay Marriage proposal sponsored by State Representative Lorriane Seratti, (R-Spread Eagle). The hearing called by the Chidren and Family Services Committee was held at the North Central Technical College Campus in Wausau on Monday March 10, 1997.

The proposal, Assembly Bill 104, would forbid same sex marriages performed here or in other states.

Throughout the six and half hour hearing, opponents and proponents traded barbs and attacks before the committee, a majority of which had already endorsed the bill before hearing any testimony on it.

Those in favor of Seratti's proposal claimed that the measure was necessary to protect marriage. Nearly all of those favoring the law made reference to biblical passages, with at least one speaker indicating support for the death penalty for Gays and Lesbians.

Those opposed to the bill, including a number of ministers and rabbis, called the measure unnecessary and said it was inspired by hatred.

Testimony opened with Seratti citing polls showing that the majority of Americans oppose same sex Marriage. The Republican claimed that Gays are only "3%

in Milwaukee, announced that after several months of negotiation their respective Boards

of Directors voted unanimously to merge the organizations

CPI Board President Harry Spiegelberg, a retired executive from Kimberly-Clark Corporation in Appleton, said "It is the smartest move we could make to guarantee long-term, high quality services in northeast Wisconsin.

ARCW Board Chair Ed Hashek, an executive with Bank One Corporation in Milwaukee, called the merger "a perfect partnership that will strengthen both agencies enabling us to better serve the HIV/AIDS community in

Wisconsin." Because of growing difficulties in securing government resources and a sense of donor fatigue within the private sector, leading ASOs in many parts of the country are, for the first time, seriously considering mergers and consolidations. In Chicago, the Howard Brown Health Center recently announced its merger with Stop AIDS Chicago. In San Francisco, dozens of ASOs have committed to a three-year plan to achieve consolidation. "We are determined to increase AIDS

services in the most cost-effective way," said ARCW Executive Director Doug Nelson.

With the merger of CPI, ARCW will operate with a budget of \$7.5 million, 130 employees and more than 1,400 active volunteers. ARCW is the largest AIDS service organization in the Midwest. In 1996, ARCW received the highest rating for cost effective use of funds in a national survey of AIDS service organizations conducted by POZ Magazine, a monthly periodical published by and for people with AIDS.

It was not going to be a good day. It was Monday morning. The dark. heavy hanging clouds low over the mountains told me it was going to rain. I hoped I could get to the

Jim Simpson was the owner and editor of the small town paper where I worked as a reporter. He was in his late 50's, a short, stout man with iron-gray hair and robust

According to office and town gossip, he'd once been a reporter for the Washington Post, one of the best, so they said. He'd gotten fed up with city life, had come to Hastings (pop.1500), and bought the Trib.

When he took it over, the Trib was on the last sidewalk of time, a little weekly that was heading into bankruptcy fast. But under Simpson's hand, it flourished mainly, I thought, because he wrote for it.

In my opinion and that of many others as well, Simpson was a brilliant writer. He had a sagacious grasp of politics that, combined with a razor wit, made his editorials and op-ed pieces a pleasure to read. As a result, the Trib had a reach far beyond Hastings and the Turkeyfoot Valley. As with William Allan White and the Emporia Gazette of another state and earlier years, the Trib was read in the halls of power and influence from Washington to

My admiration for him was second to none, but I had good reason to feel strong affection for him, too. In April, a little less than four months

Gay Group Sues State Rep.

Detroit, MI-AP- A Gay-Lesbian group is suing state Rep. Deborah Whyman, (R-Canton) saying she made campaign comments alleging the group engaged in illegal activity by encouraging men to have sex with boys.

Jeffrey Montgomery, president of the Detroit-based Triangle Foundation, a Gay-Lesbian anti-violence organization, said they filed the suit alleging libel, defamation, slander and other complaints Friday, February 28th, in Wayne County Circuit Court.

According to the suit, Whyman distributed campaign materials which said the Triangle Foundation had made large contributions to Whyman's opponent.

"That group has proclaimed its support of sex acts between grown men and boys!"

Whyman wrote, according to the suit.

"They are engaging in illegal acts," Whyman said in a phone interview with The Associated Press Friday.

Montgomery said while there are sodomy statutes on the books, the current interpre-tation has not found that people will be cited unless the conduct includes a minor, force, money or public activity.

The suit asks for at least \$10,000 in damages.

Texas Court Explains Ruling on Log Cabin

Austin, TX-AP- Government action is required for there to be a violation of the Texas Constitution's guarantees of free speech, equal rights and due course of law, the state Supreme Court ruled Friday, February 28th.

The decision came eight months after the Republican-dominated court allowed the Republican Party of Texas to deny a GOP Gay and Lesbian group an exhibit booth and advertising space at the party's state convention.

In explaining the June ruling, the state's highest civil court for the first time confronted whether the state constitution's rights are subject to the same doctrine developed by federal courts for the U.S. Constitution.

U.S. constitutional civil rights protect only against governmental action, in the shape of laws, customs or government proceedings, and the same applies to the Texas Constitution, the court said.

A political party is a "state actor" in some instances, such as when it conducts elections, but a private organization in others, such as handling some internal affairs, the court said in a ruling authored by Republican Justice Greg Abbott.

In the case before the court, the Republican Party's denial of a booth and advertising

space to the Log Cabin Republicans was "an internal party affair rather than an integral part of the election process," the ruling said.

Same-Sex Marriage Faces Referendum
Olympia, WA-AP- As if a multimillion-dollar plan for an outdoor football stadium
for rain-sodden Seattle weren't controversial enough, backers of a ban on same-sex marriage want to hop on the same June ballot.

Supporters, worried that the measure could stir public passions on both sides of the marriage issue, also are calling for swift punishment of hate crimes that could occur during the campaign.

The state House is preparing to vote next week on a referendum that would send the same-gender marriage ban to the ballot. Gov. Gary Locke vetoed such a bill last month and the Senate failed to override. Republican majorities now plan to bypass him and place it directly before the voters. want any harassment.

Harassment is the Same No Matter What Sex

Boston, MA-AP-Lewd gestures, raunchy comments, requests for sexual favors. If they happen in the workplace, they're grounds for a sexual harassment lawsuit, even if both the aggressor and the victim are heterosexual men, Massachusetts' highest court

ruled Tuesday, February 18th.

The Massachusetts Supreme Judicial Court ruled Tuesday that three former male employees of a Massachusetts lumber yard were entitled to compensation after being sexually harassed by two male supervisors.

Leonid Melnychenko, James Quill and Stephen LaRochelle worked at a West Springfield branch of the national chain 84 Lumber Co. between 1989 and 1990. All three

The men claimed that their supervisors, Richard Raab and Eliasel Roque, subjected them to a constant stream of verbal and physical abuse. They said Raab grabbed their genitals, fondled their buttocks, exposed himself to them and requested sexual favors. Raab and Roque were fired after the allegations were raised.

The employees sued the company, and Hampden County Judge Daniel Ford awarded the men a total of about \$144,000 in June 1993 on the grounds of sexual harassment. Lawyers for the men said the total figure will nearly triple including interest and attorneys fees following the SIC's decision. neys fees following the SJC's decision.

before, I'd come to the Trib for an interview. I was just about to graduate from Penn State 70 miles to the north and I dreamed of working for Simpson on the

My major prof had told me he could be formidable, so I'd come well prepared for the standard questions. He asked none of them. Instead, he'd leaned back in his swivel chair, the springs squealing in protest over his considerable bulk and laced his hands together behind his head.

"Tony--that's your name, ain't it?" he asked, his voice sounding like sandpaper going over rough wood. He stopped to give me the once over.

I wasn't surprised that he knew my name. It was on the resume I'd sent him. What did surprise me, however, was his use of "ain't." Later I would learn that he thought that his familiarity with the English language gave him a license to use it according to his own rules.

You sure it ain't David?" Simpson

"No, I just look like the statue is all." That was only the truth. In face and form I was the double of whoever had modeled for Michaelangelo.

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

Same-Sex Marriage

There is absolutely no cause whatever in reason that we can see why same-sex couples cannot enjoy all the legal benefits of marriage. We believe that all legislators and

other fair-minded who think the issue through will agree.

• Although the Religious Right has tried to make it so, we contend that same sex marriage is not a religious issue. It is an issue of civil rights and the equal enjoyment of those legal rights that are granted solely and only by the state. No one is asking, nor will anyone ask, any church to change its rules and bless a union that

Marriage is not now a church monopoly, nor has it been for centuries. On a personal note, this editor's parents were married by a Justice of the Peace. Their being married and the rights they had as a result, were conferred by the state, not a

church. Heaven help anyone who dared to tell them they weren't married. Same-sex marriage is not taking anything away from society, but adding strength and stability to it. Same-sex marriage involves rights, but it also involves the assumption of responsibilities. It is to society's good that same-sex couples assume those responsibilities.

Same-sex marriage can not threaten differing-sex marriage. It is without the realm of reason to think that differing-sex couples will stop getting married or, if married, run off to the divorce courts when same-sex couples can marry.

It is silly to think that the best way to enhance marriage is to prevent it.

It is beyond reason to think that love is gender-oriented. It is not.

Being Lesbian or Gay is not an act. It is a state of being, an integral part of the person.

It is equally beyond reason to think that same-sex marriage will "encourage" homosexuality. Sexual orientation is a state of being. It cannot be encouraged or changed. There are no "ex-Gays." There are only Gays and Lesbians who act

straight. They are still Lesbian or Gay.

The bill, currently being considered seeking to ban recognition of same-sex marriages in Wisconsin does not have its roots in reason and clear thinking. We are forced to believe that its roots lie elsewhere; in the dark, irrationalities of bigotry and

We are forced to believe as well that the hearing held Monday, March 10th, in Wausau, had as its sole purpose the airing of ignorance, flung against a minority who

it is acceptable for some to hate. We decry the hateful, ignorant words that were spewed out in Wausau by the Religious Right. We were taught that before you opened your mouth, you should know what you're talking about. Given the presumed fact that the Religious Right people aren't Lesbian or Gay, we find it outrageous they should speak on a subject

they know nothing about. We are forced to draw an analogy between this Wausau hearing and similar hearings in other states in earlier decades that sought to prevent African-Americans to each other or interracial marriage. Those had no base in reason. This one doesn't ei-

Merger of ARCW and Center Project

Wisconsin Light applauds the news of the merger between the AIDS Resource Center of Wisconsin (ARCW) and Center Project, Inc. (CPI) of Green Bay. We believe that the merger will not only strengthen both agencies, but will eliminate unnecessary duplication of services and especially, administrative functions and needs.

The AIDS epidemic is far, far from being over. Instead, as reports show, it is spreading among women and African-Americans. While the new protease inhibitors seem to be offering a chance to make the disease chronic, no one is sure what the long-term effect of the new "cocktail" of drugs will be. We do know one thing, however. They are terribly expensive. Also, reports show that the protease inhibitors are not helping some people at all.

From everything that we know, the cost of fighting the disease is not going to decrease. AIDS service organizations are being forced to expand nation-wide. This, at a time when badly needed funds—never very plentiful to begin with—are limited. Keeping necessary administrative costs to a minimum, avoiding duplication of services and personnel, and increasing cost-effectiveness, only makes sense. The ARCW/CPI merger effectively assures this.

The numbers of people infected and affected by this disease are not small. Neither are the numbers decreasing. We believe that fighting a disease of this magnitude re-

quires strength. The new merger will, we believe, supply this strength. Strength provides clout. No matter that some may disdain it, lobbying the government for finds is vital. Clout is necessary for this, as is familiarity with how it is done.

We believe this merger strengthens AIDS advocacy in Wisconsin and will generate more badly needed funds for the fight against AIDS.

Having said all this, we believe also that there is room for every fighter in the field. Sometimes we say "People Living with HIV/AIDS." too glibly. Each and every person effected by this disconstruction. affected by this disease is different and each has different needs.

For example, some profit by counseling and groups. The BestD Clinic is justly admired for this. Some have spiritual concerns that need to be met. St. Camillus ministers strongly in this field. At the same time, ARCW has a national reputation for aggressive AIDS prevention programs, comprehensive health and social services, and its unique

leadership on community-based AIDS research.

The important thing that needs to be remembered, we believe, is that when it comes to the fight against AIDS, there is a need for each and every person who will lend their heart and hands. There is a need for strength. There is a need for cost-effectiveness. There is a need for compassion, for understanding, for empathy as well.

We commend the boards of ARCW and CPI for accomplishing this merger. We urge all people who care to give and yet give again of their resources and themselves so that suffering may be assuaged.

from a terminal cancer. Earlier, when the diagnosis had been made, he had been asked by her doctor how he wanted to proceed. My friend answered that he wanted no tubes stuck into her, no wires, no machines. Let her go in peace, he said. The doctor nodded and told him that they would treat her "conservatively, which meant that she would be kept comfortable and free of pain.

Throughout the weeks that followed, my friend spent much time with her. She had been such a vital person, so intelligent and full of life. Now, she could not leave her bed and was bearly able to talk. All she could do was hold his hand.

There came a time when the heavy, carefully prescribed drug doses, administered intravenously, no longer worked. His mother's suffering was terrible to see. On day she looked up at him through

tear-filled eyes and whispered, "Help me."

> He knew the nurse well. They went together to the room. While my friend watched, the nurse closed his mother's eyes and gently smoothed her hair. "It is well," she said, looking at him across the bed. She came around to where he was and hugged him as he cried.

> There were choices made here, personal choices, by independent human beings. Agreement or advice from third parties was neither asked for nor wanted.

> I have kept that story close held over the years, but I was reminded of it when I

read Jerry Smith's letter in Saturday, March 1⁸⁷'s Milwaukee Journal. Smith, who signed himself a client of the Milwaukee AIDS Project, strongly and, in my opinion, beautifully, maintained his right and the right of all, to choose a peaceful and dignified death.

As Smith points out, there are those, such as the Right to Life people, who deny that right. The group believes they are following the tenets of their religion. I will grant them that. But in doing so, they have no right or place to deny me my rights, including the right of making the final decision as to how my life shall end upon this earth.

By right to life, I understand a life full of vibrancy and purpose. To be so crippled by terminal disease, to be so painracked that I can no longer function, is not life. It is a form of living death. I don't want that, not for myself. I will not have it. Neither do I want it for anyone I

A great many years ago I stopped after church to talk to the priest.

"Tell me, Father," I said, "when it comes down to it, are you going to stand before God in my place?"

"No," he answered, "I can't do that."
"Will the church do it?"

"No. You must stand before God your-

I remember standing there for a moment, thinking, while my mother, beside me, was having a silent fit.

'Okay," I said to the priest, "then what do I need either of you for?"

He had a thoughtful look on his face be-fore he replied, "Perhaps you don't."

The point of this is that I will make my own choices. I assert that right. In doing so, I will respect your religion—just long as you (unless asked) keep it ov

Following that little conversation with the priest, I did set out of my own on a search that has involved my whole being and continues to do so. In the process, have integrated my being born Gay and what I have done with that.

I have chased this being. I have "seen" the fringe of its robe as it disappears around a comer and tiring of the effort, ve quit. It's always just at that moment, when "It" will turn, look back, smile and wink. So, I'm off after It once again.

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As AIDS Deaths Decline, Incidence of HIV **Increases Among Women and Minorities**

Milwaukee-Women, minorities and children increasingly are feeling the effect of the AIDS epidemic, a report on Milwaukee-area HIV cases shows.

Minorities accounted for 75 percent of newly-reported cases of HIV infection in the city of Milwaukee in 1995.

New cases among women have doubled in the past five years, according to the report by community and government health agencies. In the past, Gay white men have bome the brunt of the epidemic.

The trends show the need to move bevond safe-sex campaigns aimed at Gay men and needle exchange programs for drug users and to offer additional preven-tion programs to reach women of childbearing age and youths, said City Health Commissioner Paul Nannis.

The programs might include such strategies as training women to be AIDS prevention experts in their neighborhoods and within special risk groups such as fe-male partners of drug users, he said.

"There's nothing as effective as a neighbor talking to a neighbor" to drive home a health message, Nannis said.

The report was prepared by the HIV Planning Council and the Ryan White HIV Services Consortium, which oversees use of federal Ryan White Care Act money. The groups include representa-tives of community and AIDS service

Two years ago, city officials called a meeting of some of the groups to develop a strategic plan for dealing with AIDS on the local level. The intent was to build on a prevention plan by the Milwaukee Indian Health Board in 1993 and a care and treatment plan by the consortium in 1991.

It was estimated in 1991 that 12,600 people in the Milwaukee area would be infected with HIV by 1995, but only 5,300

Janice Hand, program director of pediatrics at the Medical College of Wisconsin and chairwoman of the Ryan White consortium, agreed.

"The second wave is now much more evident to us. Women and people of color are a bigger concern," she said.

dropped significantly for the first time since the epidemic began in 1981, the government reports.

AIDS deaths in the United States fell 13 percent in the first six months of 1996, to an estimated 22,000 people, down from 24,900 deaths in the same period a year earlier, the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention reported Thursday, Febru-

The CDC also said that while the number of people diagnosed with AIDS continues to climb, the growth rate is slowing. In 1995, about 62,200 people were diagnosed, an increase of less than 2 percent over the 61,200 new cases in 1994. The growth rate from 1993 to 1994 was 5 per-

"This is one of the first bright spots we have seen in this epidemic," said Christopher Portelli, executive director of the National Lesbian and Gay Health Association in Washington. "But we hope it is seen as a call to arms rather than a chance to relax and breathe a sigh of relief.

President Clinton also said this was no time to let up in the fight against AIDS.

In the months and years ahead, we must continue to work together as a nation to further our progress against this deadly epidemic," he said.

The first signs of the drop in AIDS

deaths came in January, when New York City reported a 30 percent decline in 1996.

The CDC credits better treatment for AIDS patients, including new drugs, and better access to treatment through state and federal programs.

What's still unclear is the impact of a new class of drugs called protease inhibitors. The AIDS death rate leveled off in 1995, before those medicines became widely available.

Not all doctors are sure that AIDS is

making an about-face.

"In my view, this decline is unfortu-nately only a lull," said Dr. Irvin S.Y. Chen, director of the AIDS Institute at UCLA. "Not all patients are responding as effectively as the majority of patients. There are some patients for whom the drugs are not effective.'

A growing number of people are living ith AIDS each year, the CDC said. In June 1996, 223,000 Americans age 13 and older had the disease, a 10 percent jump from mid-1995 and a 65 percent increase

And some advocates point out that AIDS patients, as they live longer, will need more help, not less.

"We are concerned that people will misinterpret this news," Portelli said. "We would hope to see more money and support for better access to medical services. New drugs are not all we need.

As of December 1996, 581,429 Americans had been diagnosed with AIDS since 1981: 488,300 men, 85,500 women and

7,629 children. And some new trends are worrying health officials. As is being seen in Milwaukee, African-Americans accounted for 'When you come to Survival/Revival the more cases of AIDS than whites for the first time in 1996, 41 percent compared to 38 percent. Hispanics accounted for 19 percent, and other races 2 percent.

MAP Becomes First in Wisconsin to Practice Unique Model of Harm Reduction

Milwaukee— Embracing a cutting-edge al-cohol and drug treatment philosophy known as Harm Reduction, the Milwaukee AIDS Project (MAP) has been granted a state li-cense for Alcohol and Other Drug Abuse (AODA) treatment. MAP becomes the first in Visconsin and one of less then a dozen AODA providers in the country to utilize the Harm Reduction model which targets injection drug users (IDUs) and other substance users that have not succeeded in the traditional abstinence-based programs.

MAP's AODA treatment program is an extension of its large, clean needle exchange program, Lifepoint, that reaches thousands of injection drug users in the streets and drug houses of Milwaukee. Lifepoint also provides HIV testing, HIV risk-reduction counseling, With the help of better drugs and treat-condom distribution and now with its new liments, the number of AIDS deaths has cense, treatment for alcohol and drug abuse. condom distribution and now with its new li-

"We are experiencing in Milwaukee what every needle exchange study contends; that a successful needle exchange program gets more users into drug treatment," said Doug Nelson, executive director of MAP. "At a time when Milwaukee County has scaled back funds, limiting and making AODA providers less accessible, we had no choice but to pursue a drug treatment program with a harm reduction approach that is a natural extension of Lifepoint.

MAP received its AODA outpatient and day treatment certification from the Wisconsin Department of Health and Family Services on February 11 and will operate the unique drug reatment program out of its Dennis Hill Harm Reduction Center at 4311 Vliet Street, which is the operating headquarters for MAP's street outreach and needle exchange

The Harm Reduction model MAP will be implementing is very different from the standard AODA treatment providers who are abstinence-based, meaning people must remain off of alcohol and drugs while in treatment-an approach MAP's Hill Center says is not for

Rather, the Harm Reduction model focuses on small, incremental positive changes in a person's behavior, setting individualized goals that may or may not mean total abstinence from alcohol or drugs. It does not require complete abstinence from drug use. This less rigid approach, which is comparable to many HIV prevention strategies, teaches the dan-

gers of drug and alcohol use and helps an in-dividual identify and reduce these and other harmful behaviors in their life such as having unprotected sex, family conflict and/or criminal behavior.

"Harm Reduction works by helping individuals make safer choices," said Jacque Stock, AODA coordinator at MAP's Hill Center. "We meet people where they're at with their alcohol or drug use and assist them in achieving small steps that will result in positive lifestyle changes.


For example, "A typical IDU's first step when entering the Hill Center's program might be to stop sharing needles with other drug users. Second, to teach the individual how to clean their own needles... to stop injecting... to switch to a less harmful and addictive drug... to smoke instead of inject... snort... reduce levels... all leading to positive changes for the individual. one-step-at-a-time and giving positive feedback for short-term goals reached, the client continues making progress, further reducing his or her involvement in other harmful ac-

For MAP, those safer choices mean lowering people's risk for contracting HIV and reducing the spread of AIDS in Milwaukee. "Yes, our mission is to stop AIDS but we also want to help people get off drugs and make healthy choices for their lives and their families," said Stock.
MAP's needle exchange program, also

based on the Harm Reduction model, will serve as a major referral source to the Hill Center. In 1996, Lifepoint provided 76 successful AODA referrals and 272 referrals for HIV testing in Milwaukee. A total of 3514 people exchanged needles in 1996. The statistical breakdown was as follows:

The Wisconsin Light is proud to say that as far as it can determine, it was the only one of Wisconsin's four Gay based publications to be present at the Anti-Gay Marriage hearing in Wausau. We are pleased to bring you some of the behind scenes details about what happened that you won't read elsewhere

How Long Was It?
In an effort to bring attention to the inequity in the law, Action Wisconsin put together a partial list of laws and programs that Gays and Lesbians can't take advantage of without being married.

The list was laid out starting at the main entrance into the hearing building, went around the corner and extended past the

hearing room. All told it was 163 feet long. Action Wisconsin people say the list was only "a small fraction of federal programs." That we are squeezed out of.

No state programs were listed although a list of these would undoubtedly be equally as long.

We Are Family Rings True At the Mad Hatter

Regulars at Wausau's Mad Hatter Bar were stunned and pleased when on Sunday night they were inundated with dozens of people who came up a day early to

prepare for the hearing.

Never let it be said that the folks in Wausau aren't friendly. They made sure the newcomers felt welcome and at home.

Many of them showed up the next day for the hearing. This took at least some small amount of courage given the fact that the hearing received extensive coverage from small town Wausau's local television stations.

She Made It!

State Representative Barb Nottestein represents the largest concentration of Gays and Lesbians in the state on Milwaukee's East Side. When a Committee member told some people that Nottstein would not make the hearing, many were disappointed. disappointed.

Nottestein had been waiting for six months for a medical appointment that was scheduled for the hearing day in another city. After trying (and failing) to convince the Republicans on the Committee to reschedule, Nottestein cancelled the appointment and came anyway.

"I wouldn't miss this for anything," she told The Wisconsin Light.

Meetings, Meetings and **More Meetings**

Informal meetings were held on Sunday night to prepare people for the next day's activities. More than a few eyes rolled when it was announced that another meeting was called for 7:00 AM on hearing day.

Many but by no means all of those who were in Wausau on Sunday showed up for Breakfast at Annies.

Not everyone was there on time Said one observer, "No wonder we don't have our rights. We are too tired from all these early morning and late night meetings to fight for them.'

Overdahl Booed

For the most part, those listening to the testimony kept silent while those they disagreed with spoke. An important exception to this rule was made when Ralph Overdahl was speaking.

Overdahl whose group was handing out brochures saying that Gays should be denied "civil rights given to moral citizens," arouses special enmity.
When he said that "400 Gays had at-

tacked a church," it was all most of those opposing the bill could take. Boos and hisses permeated the room.

State Representative Shirley Krug looked shocked and asked Overdahl when the alleged incident happened. The "Reverend" finally (under pressure from Krug) admitted that the Gays didn't physically attack the church, but were on the church's property and refused to leave property and refused to leave.

Overdahl's own group, Wisconsin Christians United, has been known to picket churches sympathetic to Gay rights.

The Numbers Game

It was widely believed that the hearing was called for Wausau because it is as one person put it, "The buckle on Wisconsin's bible belt."

Democrats on the Children and Family Services Committee begged for hearings in Madison and Milwaukee but were turned down by their Republican counter-parts (all of whom had endorsed the bill).

The theory was that since people would have to take off work and travel to Wausau, organizations in Milwaukee and Madison would have a hard time getting their troops to come.

At first it looked like the theory was correct. The numbers of Christian Fundies present far outnumbered those of the Gay activists and their allies.

But then the tide turned. Car caravans from Milwaukee and Green Bay arrived. Followed by a bus and more cars from Madison. Finally, a contingent of local Gays and Lesbians led by Madhatter owners Anne and Vicki arrived.

By the time the first speaker in opposition finished his testimony, those opposed to the bill were in a solid majority and

erupted in applause.

The look on the faces of some of those-supporting the bill was one of shock They seemed surprised to find themselves out numbered.

After that initial burst of enthusiasm, AB 104's opponents mostly confined themselves to extending both arms high above their heads and shaking their hands while wiggling their fingers so that the committee could see how many people

liked what they just heard.

It provide highly visible evidence of who had won the battle of the numbers.

Biased Against Milwaukee?

Some people thought the Committee may have been biased against Milwaukee. Although several dozen Milwaukee residents registered to testify, no one could recall any of them being given a chance to

One Milwaukee man said he was one of the first people to register and still wasn't

To some this seemed to be unfair. The committee had run out of green registration slips and had to print up some white ones. Yet there were a pile of green slips sitting on the table while those who filled out white slips (and obviously registered later) were being called.

Wacko's, Fruits & Basters

As might be expected there was a wealth of misinformation about the Gay lifestyle being foisted on the hearing.

But despite some anger, many Gays and Lesbians and their straight supporters couldn't help but laugh at some of the

For example when one woman said that comparing heterosexual relationships to homosexual ones was impossible because it was like comparing apples to oranges, someone in the back remarked "Why they're both fruits," to the delight of everyone in earshot.



I know, I know!! No this isn't a school room. During the Anti-Gay Marriage hearing in Wausau, opponents of the bill raised their hands and shook them in the air when the agreed with what a speaker said, providing visible evidence of how many in attendance were opposed to AB 104.

They were pleasantly surprised when for a change, the Fundies found themselves in a minority at a public hearing. There were knowing looks and a sense of pride on the faces of many people.

As one man from Eau Claire put it, "No

matter what, they can't say that we were out organized on this one. They had everything going for them and they still couldn't bring more people than we did."

Answer the Question Please!!

The trio of Krug, Nottestein and Young, three Democratic Women on the Committee did their best to pin down the Seratti supporters by asking lots of questions. Few of these questions were ever an-

For example when one man read a passage from Leviticus calling for the death of Gays, a shocked Rebbeca Young asked "Would you favor the death penalty for Gays and Lesbians." The man responded by saying "Would challenge God's law?"

The affort they put forth was anywer.

The effort they put forth was appreciated by those opposing the bill who sometimes applauded the questioner.

Nottestein particular was withering in her questioning and would throw in her own comments.

The Republicans on the Committee asked very few questions. One Republican asked a Lesbian whether or not she would say that Seratti had no right to introduce the bill. The woman replied, "Of course she does, but I don't recall saying that she didn't."

Chairman Huebsch who has said he things Gays are immoral and chose to be Gay asked a few witnesses if they were m favor of Gay marriage. With one exception they answered yes.

Patrick of Milwaukee is the second Wisconsin portrait. He has been HIV positive for five years but has been a volunteer at ARCW

for ten.

Milwaukee-Once again the Make A Ray Bachhuber, M.D., Aurora Medical Group, Deckner Site; Brian Buggy, M.D., Infectious Disease Associates, Medical Director of Milwaukee AIDS Project; Peter L. Havens, M.D., M.S., Associate Professor of Pediatrics and Epidemiology at Medical Col-lege of Wisconsin, Director of Wisconsin HIV Primary Care Support Network based at Children's Hospital of Wisconsin; and Cassandra Welch, M.D., Medical Director of Milwaukee Health Services.

Bachhuber has been a physician in the Green Bay area since 1982. When he arrived in Wisconsin, he gave a speech on AIDS and has been considered the AIDS expert in Green Bay ever since. Before practicing in Wisconsin, Bachhuber was the chief medical resident in Portland, Oregon, where he saw one of the first patients diagnosed with AIDS in the nation. Bachhuber sees how AIDS affects all people whether in the cities or rural

Buggy chose to specialize in infectious diseases in his medical career in the '70s. Shortly after making his selection, the field of HIV and AIDS began and the epidemic has mirrored his professional career ever since. He is also the Medical Director at the Milwaukee AIDS Project. Buggy's patient load is primarily from within the Gay community

Havens has been involved in pediatrics since the early '80s. He was involved in the care of the first children with HIV infection and AIDS at the hospital where he did his residency. Havens has been helping HIV and AIDS patients in Milwaukee since 1987. Havens sees how AIDS is affecting children.

Welch attended medical school in Milwaukee but did her residency out-of-state. She, however, returned to Milwaukee and began working in internal medicine. It was after Welch saw her first AIDS patient and became involved with his care, his family and his friends that she became dedicated to fighting this disease. Welch sees how this epidemic is significantly affecting minorities and drug us-

We Are All God's Children, Gunderson Tells **Church Conference**

Ann Arbor, MI- Former Republican U.S. Rep. Steve Gunderson of Wisconsin told the National Conference on Religion and Gay Rights that a Lutheran congregation near his home in McLean, Va., has accepted him and his partner, Rob Morris, as openly gay members.

This is who we are. We are the children of God. We are the Lord's creation. We are a part of the Christian family," Gunderson said.

The four-day conference, attended by 300 clergy and laypersons from 10 de-nominations and 20 states, ended Sunday,

The conference was also presented with a study showing that Gay clergy have ignored church laws and remained sexually active, but they have avoided scandal

while remaining strong in their faith.

A study of 26 male and nine female pastors in the Evangelical Lutheran Michigan conference.

Church in America found that all had been sexually active and 21 lived in long-term same-sex relationships, despite a church rule requiring Gay clergy to remain celi-

"No church policy has stopped these persons from falling in love, from having sex, from being parents, from loving the Lutheran Church, from going to seminary, from hearing a call to ordained ministry. said University of Michigan sociologist Carolyn Riehl, director of the study.

"We found that these 35 people all were responsible people," Riehl told the Detroit Free Press. "None of them have been involved in sexual scandals or have been accused of misconduct."

"Particularly, this can work in smaller churches where we all know each other and care about each other," said the Rev. John Rollefson, the Lutheran campus minister who organized the University of

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

David Carroll Draws Present and the Past to Bathe the World in Musical Beauty

There are people who appreciate art. Those are the vast majority of us. There are people who are artistic. These are the ones who understand art and even, at times, can create it.

times, can create it.

There are, however, those few, the ones who "see" something closed off to the rest of us. These are the ones, the very few, who can bring their vision into our material world. We know them by their creations, and by the far away look in their eyes. We know them because we see so often pain in their eyes the pain inso often pain in their eyes, the pain in-curred with creation. We say to them, Suffer more so that you can create more, so that we may have more beauty in our

Such a one is David Carroll.

He is a widely renowned pianist, resident in Milwaukee, a musician who can entice from his piano the melodies the fingers of true love can bring from a lover's lips. One recent evening, he sat down for an interview.

Terry Boughner: David, let's get a little biography. Are you from Wisconsin, what?

David Carroll: Well, I was born in Lancaster, Wisconsin, raised between Prairie du Chien and Milwaukee. I come from a family of six kids. I've been in Milwaukee for 18 years now. Oh, I dream about getting somewhere else now and then, but Milwaukee's been a good place to go school and to live. I don't regret staying here as long as I have.

TB: Where did you go to school? UW-La Crosse and UW-Milwaukee and the Conservatory of Mu-

TB: David, what got you into music? DC: Well, I was always a rather strange child who didn't fit in with the other children. I remember when I was in second grade and saw my first piano. It was an old upright at my parents' friends' house. I was just fascinated with it. I walked up to it and began to play—to run my fingers over the keys.

You see, when my family moved from Milwaukee to Prairie du Chien, the wind went out of my sails. I had nothing to do. I knew I was different. So, when I touched the piano, it was like coming home. I threw myself into my music to keep from losing my mind, basically.

My music gave me something to do so that I didn't have to deal with all these small town kids who I had nothing in common with at all.

The thing is, I really didn't start on the piano. I started on the organ, playing for church. A nun taught me. Sister Angeline was her name. God only knows what happened to her. She was really nice. She taught me all the basics. Pretty soon, I was playing for two churches, 5 Masses a

was playing for two churches, 5 Masses a weekend, and funerals. That was when I was between 12 and 14 years-old.

I started taking piano in 5th grade. That grew inside me. When I moved away, the organ kind of fell away because I fell away from the church. It just seemed so false somehow. I didn't want to be a part of it anymore. The piano stayed with me.

Now, I play the organ only once in awhile, when the Cream City Chorus does something at a church.

something at a church.

You've got to remember that it's been a long time since I played the organ. There are stops and keyboards and a keyboard at your feet, too. And each organ is different, a whole different ballgame.

ily—though sometimes you get sabotaged by a crappy instrument. You don't realize it until you sit down at it and find out it hasn't been tuned in about a year and a half or something.

TB: Do you have a favorite organ?
DC: The one at All Saints Cathedral is really nice. The one at the Unitarian church is really nice, too, but it's old. It probably needs a little work. The best organ that I've heard is at Jesu Church.

St. John's Cathedral has a beautiful or-gan, but I haven't even had a chance to look at that one.

TB: How long have you been in

DC: Oh, I'm not in school anymore. I of money. I shouldn't have gone to school when I did, right out of a small town, because I had so much to learn-just figuring what it's like to be Gay. I wasn't fo-

There are other art forms out there. I always look at my music as interactive with other art forms. For example, doing art opening receptions or doing music for a theater production. I just love to do those. You test your metal as a musician. You just interact.

If you can walk into an art opening and play music that fits the artwork on the walls, I think then you know what you're doing. Or when you can pick out music to fit a certain period of time for a certain theatre production, that means you've done your homework.

TB: What are you trying to say in your music?

DC: I'm trying to channel the past. I don't want the past to die. So many peo-ple don't have any respect for the past. I don't want that elegance-Requiem that we're (the Cream City Chorus) doing, I don't want that to die out. I don't want the feeling of it to die out.

So many people today are so caught up in this pop mentality in this disposable culture. They're so concerned with the

here and now and the future. I'm really kind of disgusted with our culture, you

TB: Talk to me about Faure's "Req-

DC: Oh, I think it's one of the most elegantly written pieces of music I've ever heard. I've been listening to that since I was in grade school. This (the Cream City Chorus spring concert) is the first chance I've had to perform it. I'm throwing myself into it. I hear it running through my head all the time.

It's Faure at his height. It's the human spirit praying for redemption, for release, for eternal rest.

TB: Do you compose?

DC: Once in awhile. I write things that are like little theatre pieces. When I write music, I write it like a script, like poem, like a scene. I picture a scene and then I picture the music to match that. It's like I'm writing a little sound play.

TB: Who's your favorite composer?
DC: Oh God, I knew you were going to ask me that. Going by the amount of music that I have, I'd have to say, Debussy, either her or Ravel.

This may be strange to say this, but when I go every day to play at the Milwaukee Center, my influences are the weather. That influences me dramatically. And of course, my mood and what season

TB: You seem to enjoy social life. DC: Sure. I don't want to be a hermit. I like people. I want to be around people. That's why I left a small town. That's what music is, a large part of it, meeting

TB: What's in your future? DC: I want to travel. I want to see all the magical places: Egypt, Venice, Rome, Athens. Once I've had my Grand Tour— I'll tell you, Europe is pulling me very strongly right now. I'd like to play in some little café and watch all kinds of people pass by. I want to live someplace

that's old as old can be. I want to walk down a street that's 2000 years old. I don't think I'll ever find a significant other, I've got my piano. That's enough.

Milwaukee—Jamie Nabozny, winner of the 1996 "Pathfinder" Award from the Gay, Lesbian and Straight Teacher's Network, will address participants of the second Diverse & Resilient conference on April 17, 1997. Nabozny a Gay youth, suffered multiple physical assaults from seventh through eleventh grade in a Wisconsin school district. He will share his experiences and the results of his ground. experiences and the results of his ground breaking law suit.

Nabozny's experience illustrates the need for further awareness of Gay youth in Wisconsin. The 1997, Diverse & Rewas in school until 1985. Then, I ran out silient conference and mini-grant program will address the social and the HIV prevention needs of Gay youth in Wisconsin.

To be held in Oconomowoc, the second conference is open to all youth-serving professionals. Keynote speakers and breakout sessions will provide information, program examples and skillsbuilding activities needed to create or enhance HIV prevention programs for Gay youth in Wisconsin.

The Diverse & Resilient conference is also intended to foster the development or enhancement of local HIV prevention initiatives. Participants are urged to attend the conference in community or organizational teams. Conference attendees will be encouraged to collaborate with youth support systems in their communities to apply for one of five \$5,000 mini-grants.

Last year's conference, held in downtown Milwaukee, was attended by over 120 youth-serving professionals from around Wisconsin. This year, over 200 professionals will attend. A contingency of Gay youth will take part in the conference as well, and share their ideas and points of view with other conference par-

The 1996 conference and mini-grant cycle funded five groups to develop or enhance local HIV prevention services. With Diverse & Resilient funding, "Gav Youth Milwaukee" successfully operated a statewide toll free hotline for Gay youth. Staffed by Gay youth, the hotline continues to serve Wisconsin's youth by providing support and referral services on weekend evenings.

In La Crosse, a collaboration of the Coulee Region YWCA, the Rainbow Revolution Book Store, and the La Crosse County Health Department, forged the La Crosse Alliance for HIV/AIDS Prevention for Youth Dealing With Issues of Sexual Orientation. The alliance worked with a new youth group called GALAXY to help develop their own empowerment, essential for HIV prevention efforts. Weekly meetings were held at the bookstore, and the alliance sponsored a pride

In Racine, Diverse & Resilient funded Youth 4 Youth, the first-ever Gay youth organization in the Racine County area. A drop-in center provided a safe place where youth could socialize and discuss issues of concern to them regarding growing up Gay in smaller cities and their HIV prevention needs.

In northwestern Wisconsin, the area AIDS Service Organization collaborated with the area chapter of PFLAG to assist area school districts to develop in-service trainings for teachers and to implement policies regarding bias motivated acts. NOWAP also used Diverse & Resilient funding to begin the Rainbow Club, a support program for area Gay, Lesbian

and Bisexual youth.
Finally, the Children's Outing Association (COA) of Milwaukee won a grant to creat a more Gay-friendly organization. Their efforts included making it known that COA was a safe space for Gay youth, starting a library of Gay-themed books and magazines, and staff training regarding Gay youth and their HIV prevention

Seratti called on the committee to endorse her bill saying that Gays wanted to radically redefine marriage." tended that allowing Gay marriage could lead to polygamy, marriage between adults and children and between adults and animals. According to Seratti, "Wisconsin should not allow its policies to be set by D.C. organizations."

Ironically the next witness testified over peaker phone from his DC office. Robert Knight, from the Family Research Council, a Right Wing religious anti-Gay organization told the committee to approve Scratti's bill. According to Knight the Gay lifestyle is unhealthy. As proof of his claim, Knight said the average Gay man only lives to age 42.

Both Knight and Seratti cited studies used by the State of Hawaii in its court case against Gay couples suing for the right to marry in that State.

In a statement that had even some of her supporters shaking their heads, Seratti said that her bill was not discriminatory. "Gays and Lesbians will still be able to get married by choosing members of the opposite sex." she said.

After two more witnesses invited by Seratti to speak finished, witnesses invited

to speak in opposition took the floor. Rev. Charles Wolfe of the Plymouth United Church of Christ in Madison told the committee that the bill amounted to a public stoning of the Gay community. This is an invitation to the Assembly to pick up a stone and throw it at Wisconsin's Gays and Lesbians," said Wolfe.

As he finished the bill's proponents sat

stunned as well over half the large, crowded room broke out in loud applause and cheers.

Answering Knight and Scratti who cited studies they said proved that homosexual-ity was harmful, Dr. Lawrence Wu, a nationally renowned expert on marriage and homosexuality said that he and four other renowned researchers had filed a friend of the court brief in Hawaii objecting to that State's use of their research in its case against Gay marriage. Wu said that Ha-waii had drawn the wrong conclusions from the research done by him and by

Following the invited witnesses was a stream of people both for and against the

Those who were in favor claimed that they were following God's law, that homosexuality was unnatural and that passage would end the threat of any lawsuits should another state legalize same sex marriage. They claimed that homosexuality was unhealthy. Many speakers said that homosexuality could be cured.

Opponents including a number of ministers disputed the claim that the Bible condemns homosexuality. One minister, Cindy Crane, from the Evangelic Lu-theran Church of America called on those opposing the bill to "forgive the hatred" of those who are against same sex marriage.

Another speaker, former Dane County Supervisor Mark Pocan, said "People who use the bible for hatred are to Christianity what Cheez Whiz and Velveeta are to real Wisconsin cheese."

Many of those urging AB 104's passage said that their support of it was not motivated by hatred, but at the same time called the Gay lifestyle "perverted" and said that if same sex marriage was allowed it would lead to "acceptance of homosexuals.'

Opponents said that comments like these proved the measure was motivated by hate. One Radical Christian Group, Wisconsin Christians United, was handing out brochures that homosexuals should not be allowed "the same civil rights as moral citizens."

Several proponents went so far as to describe Gay sex acts with one man stating

beth Freeman won her freedom, the right that allowing same sex marriages would to legally marry and to protect her chilber endorsing the "ingesting of feces, urine and other body fluids.'

At least one Seratti supporter, Ken Egre of Hustisford, indicated support for the death penalty for Gays and Lesbians. He was heartily congratulated by some of those who came to support the bill.

Seratti's supporters said that the bill was needed. But that point was disputed by others who pointed out that Same Sex marriage was already against Wisconsin

As one Lesbian speaker put it, "When I told my son I was going to come today, he said 'So you are going to a hearing to speak against a bill that won't let you do something that you already can't do.

A number of opponents cited their own relationships and brought their children with them. They pointed out that many of the benefits of marriage were unfairly denied to them.

Ten year old, Sol Kelly-Jones brought tears to eyes of many as she spoke about her two mothers and her fear of those who "hate my family." Speaking to other chil-dren in her situation Sol said "Keep up the hope that someday we'll have equal benefits and stuff. You're not alone.

Sol's remarks were so poignant that he The Wisconsin Light has printed ull

them in full on page 1.

The back and forth exchange sometimes brought out heated comments from speakers and from those listening to them. When one man talked about what he said was a real case in Colorado where a man wanted to marry a horse, State Representative Barb Nottestein (D-Mil) bristled. "I find your comments offensive," she said, 'We are talking about human beings not animals."

Nottestein, Shirley Krug (D-Mil) and Rebecca Young (D-Madison) often weighed in with sharp questions for those supporting the bill.

Krug asked a Missouri Synod Minister if he felt the State should interfere by telling churches performing sex same marriages that they couldn't. After some hesitation, the minister replied that the state had no right to interfere with a church.

The Republicans on the Committee asked very few questions of either supporters or opponents.

Gay and Lesbian activists were elated by the turnout among their supporters. Before the hearing, opponents of Seratti's bill charged that it was being held at a time and place calculated to keep people away. Nearly all hearings are scheduled for Thursdays and are held in the Capitol

Building. Despite their fears, car caravans, buses, and individuals arrived from throughout the state. By the time the hearing started, it was clear that a solid majority of those in attendance opposed the bill.

"I am just elated," said openly Lesbian State Representative Tammy Baldwin. 'We actually outnumber them despite everything."

Those sentiments were echoed by vol-unteers from Action Wisconsin which helped get the word out about the hearing.

By the end of the hearing, the disparity in numbers was quite clear. The Committee Chairman, Represenative Micheal Huebsch (R-La Crosse) was having a hard time finding speakers for Seratti's proposal

Before the hearing adjourned Nottestein asked that hearing be recessed instead of adjourned so all of those against the bill would have a chance to speak, at a reconvening. Huebsch, a co-sponsor of Seratti's bill said no more hearings would be held and brought the gavel down.

Most observers expect AB 104 to pass the State Assembly where it has support from nearly every Republican in the GOP controlled chamber. It's fate in the Democratic controlled Senate is more uncertain. Because as far was we could determine,

TA: Party at other clubs on my nights off. like to compare what they are doing to what we are doing."

WL: What all goes into your job?

TA: In addition to operating the equipment, I also advise the Club on what equipment it should be using and I have to keep up on the latest music.

WL: What are the biggest challenges you face as a DJ?

TA: The biggest challenge is to get people out there to dance. This is especially true when you play the new stuff. They have to hear a song 10 or 20 times before they start dancing to it.

A lot of DJ's will give up on a song if it doesn't work the first time and then six months later that same song is number 1 or the most requested.

It takes some courage to keep playing it until it catches on. Of course the trick is to know which ones will catch on and that's a big challenge.

WL: How do you decide which songs will make it.

TA: It's a gut feeling that you get. Do you like the song, does it have a good message, does it relate to an experience like a break up or a new love, a party or some other experience. Basically can you relate to what the artist is trying to say. Plus it has to have a good driving beat or a good hook

WL: What is good hook?

TA: A good hook is a part of the song that

people walk out of the club humming. For example: "Finally" from Ce Ce Pendiston, or "100% Pure Love" by Crystal Waters.

WL: What new songs do you think will

make it big in the future?

TA: "Shake that Body" by Robi Rob's Club
World and "Sonic Groove" by Catalina and
"Look Into My Eyes" by Planet Soul. My
favorite right now is "Anytime" by Dianna Dee with Obession.

WL: What changes may be on the horizon for the Club Dance scene?

TA: The new equipment that is coming out is phenomenal. Everything is going to be CD based instead of vinyl. We will be able play CD's just as easily as records. And the sound from the CD's is superior to records. Plus they last longer and take up less space.

That means that Dance Clubs can carry bigger libraries of songs.

WL: Do you work in an occupation other than being a DJ?

Beyond Whatever Else it is, 'Donnie Brasco' Tells of Two Male Friends

After experiencing the super creepiness of David Lynch's Lost Highway and the subsequent, not totally unexpected nightmares, Glenn sought more traditional cinematic entertainment. Next on the schedule came Donnie Brasco, a gangster flick based reportedly based on true events.

Although based on real people and actual events, Donnie Brasco proves to be a respectable descendent of such classic Hollywood motion pictures as White Heat and Little Ceasar, in which legendary actors James Cagney and Edward G. Robinson transcended the genre creating memorable, heroic figures.

Glorifying mobsters might not be politically correct in '90's America but as is apparent from Mike Newell's new film, it is not an entirely lost art.

Donnie Brasco's title character is an FBI undercover agent played by Johnny Depp. Donnie Brasco is really Joe Pistone who has left his wife and three children, taking on the criminal persona of a "jewel Seeking to infiltrate mob operations, he is befriended by Lefty Ruggiero (Al Pacino), an aging "wise-guy", dedicated but never remarkable enough to have made it into the big-time.

Slipping easily into the role as Joe/Donnie's mentor, Lefty vouches for the young man and proceeds to instruct him in the rituals and responsibilities, of the business. In a racket where all is dependent upon rigid rules of loyalty, but which foster an uncertain atmosphere in which anyone might get "wacked" at anytime by anyone, including loyal friends and associates, it is perhaps a bit surprising that Joe/Donnie's relationship with Lefty easily and quickly transcends simply partnership.

Continually tested, Joe/Donnie begins to immerse himself ever more deeply into the Mafia hierarchy, and in the process Joe/Donnie begins to change. Although quite subtle at first, Joe/Donnie increasingly perceives just how blurred the fragile line that separates gangster Donnie Brasco from Agent Joe Pistole has become.

This transformation first manifests itself in incorporation of Donnie's raw language and gangster philosophy into Joe's outside life, resulting in increasingly strained relations with his family. Perhaps even more disturbing, at least to his superiors, is Joe's increasingly less frequent reports back to the Bureau.



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Significantly into the film, Newell leaves Joe's wife, his superiors and, quite naturally the audience, to wonder if this welldecorated agent isn't in fact changing

there's plenty of disturbing, graphic violence, enough to appease even the most jaded moviegoer. Newell even sprinkles in a few laughs but there really isn't anything particularly fresh or original here. Nor is the film's climax particularly surprising

What provides Donnie Brasco with its stature is the compelling, complicated relationship between Joe/Donnie and Lefty. While we may expect that Joe/Donnie's feelings for Lefty are going to get in the way of the sting operation, we cannot help but be surprised at the strength of the bond between the two men, a bond which seems to transcend simple, traditional "male bonding" and which increasingly takes precedence over Joe/Donnie's other, real life.

Al Pacino is no stranger to gangster roles and like those legendary actors before him: Cagney, Robinson and the like, here finds himself in the role of a lifetime. Pacino invests Lefty, just a small-time crook, a mere spoke in the wheel of the mob with a grace and poignancy that suggest that Donnie Brasco is something more substantial than it actually is.

More surprising is just how good Johnny Depp is as Joe/Donnie. Older and lacking the pretty boy looks helped ignite his career, Depp proves that he has matured as an actor, his transition from infiltrator to friend wonderfully revealed a step at a

In less capable hands than Pacino and Depp, Donnie Brasco might have emerged as little more than a typical gangster flick.

Glenn has long been struck by the inherent, implied homoeroticism that characterize such gangster films and Donnie Brasco proves to be no exception. The bond between the two men might extend far beyond simple notion of Male-bonding but that Joe/Donnie will ultimately betray Lefty and happily, heterosexuality return to wife and family is not only expected, it is downright required.

Still, as Glenn left the darkened cinema, he couldn't help but think how such an otherwise convincing film had somehow ended on an alarmingly and disappointingly false note.

Howard Stern's 'Private Parts' is (Surprise!) a Decent Movie

Like most people, I suppose, I have an opinion of Howard Stern—the New York City-based "shock jock" of the shaggy, long hair, prominent proboscis, and sewer mouth. We don't receive Stem's radio program in Milwaukee (nor anywhere in the state, in fact), nor do any stations plan to pick it up.

Would his extremely rude, in-your-face show find an audience here, as it currently does in 35 other radio markets? Probably not. And, to be sure, there is some of that Howard Stern in his first movie, Private Parts (based on the book of the same name by Stern himself).

However, the bottom line on this movie isn't Stern's obnoxious radio personality transferred to the film media (if you want that, by the way, you can catch his TV show on cable's E!TV), but rather a very funny, sweet, romantic comedy about how Howard Stern, the little nerdy geek, grew up to be the #1 radio personality in NYC and self-proclaimed "King of All Media."

In fact, Private Parts, directed by Betty Thomas, is as much a tender love story and homage to Stern's wife (played by TV's "Murder One" Mary McCormack) as it is about the rise of a media superstar and "genius."

Private Parts features many funny, tender scenes. Stem battles with an uptight jerk of a radio director at WNBC; his initially rocky relationship with radio co-host Robin Quivers (playing herself), and his efforts to start a family with his wife.

Private Parts is a loving romance, combined with the modern day story about the revenge of a nerd. It's rated R, and rightfully so, given some nude scenes and the sometimes raunchy language (hey, this is Howard Stern, folks! What do ya expect?).

We learn that the "real" Stern is a family man who's very much in love with his wife. revealed to us in a funny, heartwarming, sweet little film. No, I never thought I'd be using adjectives in describing anything whatsoever to do with Howard Stern, let alone a movie he stars in, but here I am.

On my trademark 1-10 scale, Private Parts rates an 8. I still can't believe it.

'Lost Highway' is a Fascinating Film, But One That is Not Especially Satisfying

Reviewed by Glenn Bishop Believe me, faithful readers of Wisconsin Light, the life of a movie critic is not all free movies and buckets of buttered popcom. A perfect example was last night's screening for the new David Lynch film: Lost Highway.

A dangerously overflowing crowd at Milwaukee's Downer theatre impatiently waited for the newest from that king of cinematic weirdness. With no respite from the audience's antics forthcoming, Glenn thought perhaps that he had wandered mistakenly into Rocky Horror. Sadly, no

Lynch's masterly Blue Velvet was fresh, original and disturbing. Worse luck, coming so early in his career, Blue Velvet has created such continued high expectations that all subsequent efforts seem pale in comparison.

Something seems terribly, terribly wrong, in all possible senses, right from the start. In what seems to be a prologue, an admittedly long, astonishingly staggeringly slowly-paced prologue, Madison (Bill Pullman) and Renee (Patricia Arquette) are confronted and confounded by the appearance of mysterious video tapes that begin to appear daily on their doorstep, right along side the morning paper. Seems someone is stalking them, going so far as to enter their bedroom as they sleep and take illicit

Then a suddenly explosion of violence occurs. Just as suddenly, Fred is convicted of the murder of his wife and is As he waits on sentenced to death. death-row, Fred is plagued with terrifying headaches. So bad are these headaches that one moming he wakes up and he's somebody else. That's right. He is an entirely different person. Played by entirely different actor.

Instead of Fred Madison, now he seems to be teenaged auto mechanic Pete Dayton (adorable newcomer Balthazar Getty). Pete awakens with some severe head wounds but absolutely no clue as to how he ended up in the death row cell of convicted murderer Fred Madison. Not being murderer himself, at least as far as Prison Officials can deduce. Pete is released. One of filmdom's most curious mom and pop (Lucy Butler and Gary Busey) bring the lad home.

Almost immediately Pete's rather curious relationship with the mysterious (is there any character in Lost Highway who is not "mysterious") gangster Mr. Eddy/Dick Laurent leads the gullible youth to a disastrous affair with, you guessed it, the mysterious Alice (Patricia Arquette, again) who, despite dyed-blond locks, looks an awful lot like the recently butchered Renee (perhaps because both are played by the same actress).

More weirdness. More violence. Then suddenly he ain't Pete no more, now he's Fred Madison (again played by Bill Pullman) again. More weirdness. More violence. A few more visits from a strange, dare we say mysterious, evil troll played by Robert Blake. After an excruciating 135 minutes, Lost Highway blessedly hits a dead end.

Filled with typical Lynch cinematic touches, replete with those elements that so characterized the classic '40's noir films, boasting an especially powerful, relentless soundtrack and enough red herrings to keep the most alert guessing,

Lost Highway proves to be fascinating but perhaps not especially satisfying.

Eventually, arbitrarily, all leads back to the film's opening scene, nominally recalling Pulp Fiction.

Lynch's veritable tumble of scenes prove shocking for their casual mix of violence and eroticism. Lurking behind the Lynch's flourishing style and an abundance of cinematic deceptions and conceits is a barely concealed contempt for his audience who must, as Glenn did, leave the cinema wondering what the hell it all meant.

Lynch has indeed created a complex. perhaps needless complicated conundrum with Lost Highway. Less certain is whether Lynch is playing a little joke upon us mere mortals or if he too, in the end, proved to be utterly clueless.

Best Actress

ver, it is based on a very literate work of fiction and is filled with fine actors with spectacular credits. This certainly enough for Glenn and should be plenty for Oscar.



'Lesbian Vampires' is a Fun-Filled, Delightful Romp

It is a romp. It is fun. It is a farce in the best sense of that word. Vampire Lesbians of Sodom, currently being presented as part of Milwaukee's Theatre X's Late Night Series, is a charmingly funny play from beginning to end.

Written by Charles Busch, Vampire Lesbians is a one act play in three

Lesbians is a one act play in three scenes that tells the tale of a Vampire-Succubus (Elaine Thorton-Wyler) of old Sodom and her Virgin/Sacrifice (B.J. Daniels). Much against their will, but inextricably linked, they travel through time together from the City on the Plain to the 20th century USA. Along the way, they commit just about every satire of which it is possible to conceive. The result for the audience is a rollicking good time.

There are plays which are funny in their own right. Their humor can stand alone and carries the actors along. Vampire Lesbians is not one of them. Instead, the play depends largely for its humor on the skill of the actors in presenting it; their gestures, their facial expressions, their intonations, in short, their art.

B.J. Daniels shows her genius for the stage. Her timing (all important in humor) is impeccable. Her gestures, her nuances

of expression are beyond reproach. She seizes the audience by the funny bone and never lets go.

Daniels is amply seconded by Thorton-Wyler. While Daniels conveys a humorous innocence, Thorton-Wyler combines evil and pathos in a delicious and delightful

Daniels is good. Thorton-Wyler is good. Together, as foils for each other, they are superb.

Tracey Hassinger (Renee, Tracy) is little short of perfect playing a cross between Little Orphan Annie and a girl scout lost in the clutches of "sin."

Director Amy Zeh, familiar to Milwaukee audiences for directing Shakespearean plays, among other things, deserves every kind of credit in leading her cast to pull this off. What could so easily have degenerated into mere spoof, Zeh has elevated to a marvelous Gay-themed farce.

If you get the impression that I liked the play, you're right. If you get the impression that I had a fun time, again you're right. And I say neither of those things lightly. I am not, shall we say, an aficionado of the theatre.

This one, however, I can honestly tell you is a "must see." It is good. It is fun. You'll have a great time.

Theatre X's Production of "Vieux Caree" is Both Fascinating and Rewarding

Few are likely to suggest that Tennesse Williams was not the greatest playwright of the Twentieth Century. To his credit, after all, are such works as The Glass Menagerie, A Streetcar Named Desire and Cat On a Hot Tin Roof, plays overflowing with moments of amazing power, tremendous eroticism and the sheer magic of lyrical poetry.

Swirling throughout the best of William's canon of plays, sadly, are a host Gay characters, lurking in the shadows of the narrative and seeming to serve only to lament William's despair with his own homosexuality. Particularly vivid is the imagery, in Suddenly Last Summer, of Sebastian beaten and literally consumed by the Mexican youths whose sexual favors he sought.

Less well known and rarely staged is Vieux Carre, William's last and most autobiographical play which curiously is also his most Gay positive.

Set in a run-down boarding house just around the corner from the jazz bars of Bourbon Street, *Vieux Carre* proves to be something of a memory play. As if tearing pages from his own biography, Williams offers as his narrator a young, budding writer, quite simply and appropriately named The Writer (Jonathan Wainwright)

A collection of familiar Williams characters inhabit this boarding house run by the fiery Mrs. Wire (Flora Coker), a woman who increasingly confuses The Writer for her long lost son.

On one side of the little cubicle The Writer inhabits is Nightingale (Michael Neville), an aging Gay painter increasingly succumbing to disease. Unabashedly Gay, Nightingale senses in The Writer a young man desperately yearning for any

human contact. If such human contact is in the form of intimate, physical contact, that will likely suit Nightingale quite nicely.

The room on the other side of The Writer's little cubicle is Jane (Suzette Nelson), an attractive young woman who has opened her heart (as well as her little room) to Tye (Robert Bruce Janacek), a strapping, sensual man who, quite effortlessly, manages to maintain the sexual tension amongst the rooming house's various tenants.

As expected with those who people Tennessee William's world, the characters in *Vieux Carre* are people who seem to live on life's fringes. Tired and sick, left only with lost dreams and fresh regrets, Mrs. Wire and Nightingale, Mary Maude and Miss Carrie and particularly Jane have reached journey's end.


Only The Writer, young and naive and lacking life experience, looks towards a future that we know will fulfill his dreams of writing success, if providing only a finite and rather insufficient amount of personal happiness.

Particularly effective is Jonathan Wainwright in the pivotal role of Williams' fictional stand-in. Combining innocence with an appealing awkwardness, Wainwright's Writer is believable and engaging. The always marvelous Flora Coker is equally capable as the cantankerous Mrs. Wire and Iyalosa Adekola Adedapo is especially impressive in the smaller role of Nursie.

If lacking clarity and the majesty of Williams' earlier, more acclaimed works, Vieux Carre is nevertheless a fascinating and rewarding work which comes memorably alive in the hands of director John Schneider.

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





children. No one is even hinting that those laws should be touched.

Either they are mentally incompetent or Lorraine Serratti and her supporters know all of this.

The reality is that their concern about us is limited to their ability to use us in rais-ing money and votes. Which brings us to bill, that never should have been introthe third reason for Anti-Gay Marriage

Bills, politics.

Why else would they raise the phony issue of Gay marriage? Are these marriages legal now? No. Even under the best of circumstances legalized Same Sex Marriages are at least a year away in Hawaii.

If Gay marriages are legalized in the Aloha State, there will be plenty of time to pass anti-Same Sex marriage bills. But then the timing may not be right for collecting campaign contributions.

Now if only we could put the sentiments that inspired it in the deep freeze too.





