Update on London Gay Pub Bombing

As the Toll Rises, A Suspect Arrested And Royals Speak Out

London - A third person died from injuries he received when a nail bomb exploded at the Admiral Duncan, a London Gay pub. The pub, one of London's most popular Gay clubs, was packed when the bomb went off on Friday, April 30. Two people died at the scene. Another 73 people were injured. As of press time, six of them remain in critical condition.

The blast was the third bombing of a target frequented by minorities during the month of April. Other blasts targeted Bengaldeshis and London's Afro-Caribbean community

Acting on a tip from the public, London police arrested a 22 year old engineer, David Copeland. The suspect is charged with three counts of murder and three counts of causing an explosion. Police said Copeland acted alone for motives they had not yet determined. He was seen on video taken by cameras at an earlier blast.

'There appeared, and still appears, to be no trigger event or specific date that has sparked these attacks, which clearly were the responsibility of the same person,"said David Veness, assistant commissioner of the Metropolitan Police. Authorities say Copeland is not connected to any of the groups who've claimed responsibility for the previous blasts.

Prince Charles made an appearance at the site of the bombing. The heir to the British Throne said he was there to show a" little bit of concern and solidarity." The Prince added, "The important thing is to realize that these are not just attacks on particular communities, but on all of us really."

AROUND THE NATION

NH Repeals Gay Adoption Ban

Concord, NH - The New Hampshire State Senate sent Governor Jeanne Shaheen a bill that would repeal the state's ban on LGBT adoptions. The bill, HB90, passed the House in March. The Senate voted 18 to 6 in favor of ending the ban.

Brendan Denhey of Out and Equal, a New Hampshire LGBT civil rights group, said, "The Senate knew this bill was about supporting the best interests of children seeking adoptive or foster parents." Kerry Lobel, Executive Director of the National Gay Lesbian Task Force also praised the action commenting, "The real winners today are the overwhelming number of children waiting to be adopted into loving, caring families. The best interests of the children should always triumph over bigotry.'

Florida is now the only state that bans LGBT adoption.

Texas Judge Rules MCC Unacceptable in Custody Case

Dallas, TX - In a ruling that shocked many legal observers, Texas Judge Keith Nelson said that the daughter of a Lesbian could not attend Sunday school classes at the Metropolitan Community Church. The ruling came as part of a custody case.

The judge wrote, "The primary issue is where the child would attend Sunday school and church... the intent was for mainline churches to be utilized in the religious training of the daughter. This would include the Catholic Church, and church in the Protestant faith such as Presbyterian, Methodist, Baptist, Christian and Episcopalian, which are considered to be the standard religious institutions in the Protestant field. The Metropolitan Community Church does not fall within this category.'

The woman said she had tried to take her child to other churches listed in the Judge's order, but her daughter insisted on going back to MCC.

"This is a violation of the First Amendment protections to freedom of religion," said Troy Perry, who heads the 300,000 member Protestant Denomination. "This is not only shocking, it's an attack on LGBT families and people of faith. What in God's name will it take to get the government out of our lives - or from attempting to control our LGBT families?"

Perry said that an appeal of the Judge's decision was filed on Friday, April 23.

Columbine Killer's Were Gay Says Right Wing

Denver, CO - Datalounge reports that while the rest of the country searches for answers to the Columbine High School murders, the right wing is charging that the killers were Gay. On Tuesday, April 20, Eric Harris and Dylan Klebold entered the school, set off bombs and fatally shot 12 other students and a teacher before killing themselves.

Some Columbine students told the media that the killers were taunted by athletes, who called them "faggots." That prompted some conservatives to make an issue out of the alleged sexual orientation of the killers. While on CNBC's Geraldo Show, Jerry Falwell told the viewing audience that the killers were Gay. He repeated that statement during an interview on NBC's Today Show. Robert Novack, a conservative columnist, pressed Attorney General Janet Reno about the sexual orientation of the killers during his Crossfire show on CNN.

The Family Research Council issued a press release titled "What Are the Media Hiding?" In it the group says, "No American news outlet has reported that bisexuality could have played a part in the tragedy.'

GLAAD spokesman Ben Stilp said, "Lesbian and Gay organizations, along with our straight allies, are carefully monitoring right wing extremist attempts to exploit this national tragedy for their political and financial gain by scapegoating the Gay community and perpetuating unfounded rumors."

Youth Coalition Hosts Midwest Regional Conference

Minneapolis - The National Youth Advocacy Coalition (NYAC) invites LGBT youth, service providers, teachers, counselors, parents, friends and other allies to attend the Second Midwest Regional Conference June 4-6 in Minneapolis. The conference is expected to draw over 200 people. It's sponsored by NYAC, District 202, and the Minneapolis Youth Diversion Program.

NYAC hopes to advance the field of LGBT youth advocacy, services and resources. The group organizes regional conferences so LGBT youth and adult allies from designated regions of the country can come together to share expertise, network, gain skills and organize around the range of issues affecting their lives. Conference planners hope participants will return to their communities empowered to create change.



The meeting, held at the LGBT Community Center, included discussions on the proposal, strategy on getting it passed and breakout sessions where specific ideas on building support were discussed.

Alderman Mike D'Amato, the principal sponsor of the proposal, told the group that everyone must work hard to convince the Common Council to approve the registry. Aldermen Paul Henningsen and George Butler, co-sponsors of the Partnership proposal agreed with D'Amato.

During the breakout sessions, volunteers discussed mobilizing the community, dealing with the mainstream media and general strategy. Organizers said they were encouraged by the turnout and by the number of people who volunteered to help with the effort.

Religious Right Attacks Governor Thompson Over Gay Conference Letter

Madison - Ralph Ovadahl, head of Wisconsin Christians United is making an issue over a letter Governor Tommy Thompson signed to welcome LGBT students to a Madison conference. The letter was included in a packet given to attendees at the Midwest Lesbian Bisexual, Gay, Transgendered College Conference. The conference was held February 19-21 at Madison's Convention and Civic Center. It attracted a record 1,200 students from 20 states.

According to Ovadahl, the Governor's office received numerous telephone calls protesting the letter. He also claimed the Governor's office told him the letter was a forgery

Not so said Jason Rasmussen, who chaired the conference. Rasmussen told Wisconsin Light that Madison's Convention and Visitor's Bureau had arranged for the letter. "It was a form letter," said Rasmussen, who added that the letter encouraged conferees to visit other attractions, such as the Madison zoo, while they were in Madison.

Rasmussen said there was nothing "pro-Gay" in the letter. He added, "The Governor has issued letters like this for other conferences. They are used to generate more tourist dollars. I

don't understand why anyone would have a problem with this. It was a totally appropriate thing for the Governor to do."

Governor Thompson's press office was not able to provide a comment on the matter before the Light went to press.

The annual report covered SAGE-Milwaukee's 5th year, which was another year of solid progress for the group. "Attendance at events is already beginning to pick up and we expect to continue to grow using the facilities of a center devoted exclusively to our community," said SAGE - Milwaukee Founder and Chair Eldon E. During 1998, SAGE sponsored 59 events, which the report calls, "the longest and most impressive yearly list of accomplishments since our beginning.

In '98 \$5,845 came into the organization from various sources, and a total of \$6,051 was spent (nearly 39% for rent alone), leaving a deficit of just \$207. Total assets as of the end of '98 were a healthy \$7,695.

SAGE hosts events at Milwaukee's LGBT Community Center every Friday evening. The Center is located at 170 S. Second Street. SAGE events are open to the public.

Chris and Mavis

Mavis and Chris remind you of your favorite aunt, the one that never married. They're quick with a joke, but full of good advice, too.

There weren't any "Lipstick Lesbians" when they met. Lesbians classified themselves as "fems" and "butches." Chris, 52, is the fem. Mavis, 62, is the butch. She is also a bit of a rouge. If not for Chris, Mavis, who says, "I feel like I'm 20," would probably still be on the prowl at the bars.



It was November 23, 1968. "I was looking for love," says Chris. "I was looking for fun," chuckles Mavis. "She said she was innocent, but those stories I heard from her friends. No, I don't believe that," laughs Chris.

Two weeks and a Thanksgiving weekend trip to meet Mavis' approving parents in Green Bay later, Chris moved in with Mavis. "I couldn't get rid of her," wisecracks Mavis. Not, of course, that she wanted to. The romance that blossomed continues more than 30 years later.

What's their secret? "Friendship first" says Chris. "Then romance, trust and respect." Mavis agrees adding that monogamy is very important to them as well.

Mavis is a cancer survivor. She underwent a mastectomy and lost a kidney 12 years ago. She is currently in a two-year remission from bone cancer. Her health problems have left her body weakened, but her spirit is undaunted.

"I don't know what I would have done without Chris," she said. "Chris, the Lord and our dog got me through." Mavis would come home from work and lay down on the bed. Meanwhile Chris would fix dinner.

She still does all of the cooking at their near South Side home. Well, maybe not all of the cooking. "Once a month or so, I can get her to make grilled cheese sandwiches and tomato soup," laughs Chris. "She was supposed to do that tonight, which is probably why she suggested we do this interview."

Chris also cooks over an open fire at their trailer in Campbellsport. "Chris is a great cook,"

says Mavis. In addition to camping, and romantic evenings at home, Chris and Mavis enjoy nights out at Kathy's Nut Hut.

Chris hails from Ontonagon, Michigan. The region's economy forced her to move from the Upper Peninsula. "Back in those days there wasn't a lot of industry up there. We had copper mining, but women weren't allowed to work there," said Chris. "Women had a choice of being a waitress or getting married — to a man."

She made her way to Milwaukee. Since coming here, Chris has held a variety of factory jobs. For a time, she was a big rig truck driver for Schneider Transportation. "I was one of their top producers," said Chris with pride. "The money was good, but they wanted me to work three week shifts. I didn't want to be away from home that long."

Chris wants to retire early. She started a web page design and advertising business, CM Marketing, in order to supplement her income. Mavis beams saying, "Chris can do anything she wants to do. She's very talented."

Mavis retired from the Postal Service two years ago. During her last 12 years on the job,

many Gays and Lesbians their age, Chris

and Mavis were not overtly involved in the politics of Gay liberation. That does not mean that they didn't contribute to that cause. Both came out to

their families. At work, they didn't make an issue of being Lesbian, but they

didn't hide it either.

Chris took Mavis to a company Christmas party last year. "The party is supposed to be just for the workers and their husbands or wives," she said. "I took Mavis. They know."

Both ladies are deeply spiritual, but for years, they shunned organized religion. They resent the anti-Gay attitudes of most churches. "They just want to control us," says Chris. "God didn't make us to be controlled." Mavis agrees adding, "We have a right to love God, too."

Drawn by its weekly local cable TV show, Mavis and Chris joined Milwaukee's Metropolitan Community Church last October. Mavis calls its pastor Reverend Lew Broyles "a gift from God."

Mavis and Chris want to be legally married. About 20 years ago, they looked for a church where they could have a commitment ceremony, but were unable to find one. Last summer, they participated in the mass wedding at PrideFest.

Whether the state recognizes it or not, they consider themselves to be married. Looking forward to 30 more years of life together, Mavis says, the butch and fem thing doesn't matter anymore, "Now we are just one."







Saving Social Security The Right Way

The Republicans in Congress have lost their way. After spending months doing the right thing in pursuing the impeachment and removal of President Clinton, polls show that they are extremely unpopular. As a result, they have been casting about trying to find a message that will regain their popularity.

One has to wonder what drugs the Republicans are using. It seems that up until now they have settled on tax cuts as their salvation. Poll after poll has shown that the vast majority of Americans do not care about tax cuts. The voters are just too fat and happy for that approach. They would rather use the surplus to shore up Social Security, which continues to be the number one issue for Americans.

It is time for Republicans to seize upon a new message and unite around it. This new message should be: "Save Social Security — The Right Way!" Behind this simple statement would be a proposal not only to retain the Social Security surplus for Social Security, but also to convert Social Security into an Individual Retirement Account program.

Not only will this proposal score big points with the voters; it is good policy. It is simply not enough to call for using the budget surplus to buttress Social Security. That will not be enough to save it. Even if the entire budget surplus is dedicated to saving Social Security, it will still go bankrupt soon after the baby boomers reach retirement age. There are not enough younger workers to keep that Ponzi scheme going.

In addition, Clinton's Social Security plan, which would have the government invest a portion of its trust fund in stocks and corporate bonds, is an extremely dangerous one. It's bad enough that we have so many government pension funds investing in the private sector and trying to impose ridiculous social engineering reforms on the companies in which they invest such as affirmative action quotas and "socially responsible" investment requirements.

Clinton's proposal would put a huge percentage of stocks in the hands of the Federal government. That would give it immense power to direct the policies of private companies and impose those ridiculous social policies. (Or, depending on who is control, the social policies of the fundamentalist Christians — e.g. forcing companies to require their employees to take abstinence-only oaths or forcing them to fire all Lesbians and Gays.) In short, Clinton's plan amounts to a stealth nationalization of our nation's private companies. It is no wonder that Federal Reserve Chairman Alan Greenspan so vociferously condemned it.

Clearly, the right way, the only way to save Social Security is to convert it into a program of Individual Retirement Accounts as Chile has done so successfully. This would allow each worker to decide how his or her Social Security taxes are invested. The government could hold a certain percentage of these taxes to pay for a minimal guaranteed amount of Social Security benefits regardless of the performance of the investments chosen by the worker. The balance of the benefits received by retirees would directly correspond to the performance of the investments chosen by them.

This proposal combines the advantage of the higher rates of return, which are available in the stock market, with the advantage of allowing individuals to decide how their tax money is invested. The higher rates of return will ensure that the baby boomers and those who come after have something to show for their Social Security taxes when they retire. It will also ensure that they actually have a much larger retirement nest egg than they would have under the current Social Security formula.

For Republicans, "Save Social Security — The Right Way" is a win-win situation. Republicans will be making the centerpiece of their campaign the only policy proposal — other than huge tax increases — which can actually save Social Security from bankruptcy. They will also be advancing a proposal which will be popular, not only because it will save Social Security, but also because it will give individual workers the power to invest their own Social Security taxes. Polls have shown that an overwhelming majority of voters supports allowing workers to direct the investment of their Social Security taxes.

It is time for the Republican leadership in both the House and the Senate, and all of the Republican Presidential candidates, to unite behind this one simple message. They must unite behind one issue if they are to change the perception of the voters that Republicans stand for nothing other than impeaching Clinton. In addition, most of the issues, which have been bandied about, are losers with the middle of the road voters. Only "Saving Social Security — The Right Way" can save the Republican Party from an untimely demise.

Why Should We Care?

Last months school board elections have left Wisconsin's largest school district solidly in the control of business backed "reform minded" elements within the Milwaukee education community. It is right to expect more of the district. What was once, not so very long ago, a jewel within America's public school systems, is now a typically troubled urban district with far too many underachieving students.

Besides the enormous tax dollars involved, our own personal security is at stake. The politics of hate may be complex, and while there does seem to be a new menace within wealthy and bored youth, the educated are not generally fertile ground for advocates of hate and violence. The well educated do not, in great numbers, jeopardize their futures with stupid, irrational and painful acts that have terrorized certain communities, including ours, for centuries. Hitler's appeal, not so different from today, was to the angry, young undereducated and underemployed.

And for those who chose to see a racial component to crime, I suggest uneven educational opportunity is more to the heart of the matter. Preparing citizens for a quality future is a much better bargain than the jails, courts and a very expensive police presence.

This new school board has some difficult questions to answer. Just how does allowing the flow of monies to private schools help those that remain in public schools? How are current MPS students helped by esoteric arguments that competition from private institutions will force the schools to get better? And, while parents may have the right to instill there own sense of morality, should public dollars go to institutions that teach intolerance?

MPS does already have mammoth resources but it is also true that they must educate a large and disadvantaged population with thousands less, per year per student, than their suburban counterparts. And, if money doesn't matter, why do suburbanites spend the extra dollars?

Personally, I would trade spending for education over the costs of crime and welfare any day but not for bloated, centralized bureaucracies that intercept resources before they reach the classroom.

The economics of education should be of concern to all. However, the concerns of the LGBT community are also personal and individual. We too, are sisters, brothers, aunts, uncles, parents and grandparents. We too, have children whom we love, involved in our lives. And who, if not us, will speak for the thousands of LGBT students, who with their own special needs and qualities, represent our future generation. We, as an active part of a greater community, must also bear this responsibility. Protecting children is in everyone's best interest.

Reform is surely needed but simplistic remedies that do not deal with the needs of today's students cannot be the whole answer. We should wish the new Board and the new Superintendent of Milwaukee Public Schools the best of success but we also should be watching them — very carefully.

Bent

Orion Home Entertainment Video, 105 minutes

Max (Clive Owen) is a handsome, devil-may-care young man who lives for the decadent nightlife of Berlin while the Nazi threat unfolds around him. Thrown into a concentration camp, Max quickly learns that survival depends upon hiding his homosexuality.

While there, he bonds with an openly Gay prisoner, Horst (Lothaire Bluteau) and learns a life-altering lesson: without love, life is not worth living. Bent also feafamed tures Gay actor lan McKellan (Gods and Monsters) and even rock legend Mick Jagger!

Based upon Martin Sherman's groundbreaking play, Bent powerfully explores Nazi persecution of Gays during World War II.

Didn't Do It For Love

This one-of-a-kind documentary profiles Eva Norvind, the infamous New York dominatrixturned-therapist. 

Entrapment

Does ruggedly handsome Sean Connery still have what it takes to headline big-budget action films? Last year, he went down in flames with The Avengers, but for four decades Connery has been one of Hollywood's favorite leading men. Now, from Director John Amiel (Copycat) comes Entrapment, a much-publicized caper movie pairing Connery with Catherine Zeta-Jones (The Mask of Zorro). The result is distinctly lackluster.

Part of the reason for Entrapment's failure is Connery's unenergetic performance. He's still likable and charismatic, but now he seems no longer capable of that James Bond spunk that once defined his screen personality. It's not just a matter of age. He's saddled with a script that is inconsistent, laughably implausible and riddled with gaping flaws. While Zeta-Jones' beauty enhances the screen, she hasn't much to do, except tag along behind Connery and look sexy. Heck, I could've done that!

The film takes place during the final two weeks of 1999, focusing on the pursuit of master thief Robert MacDougal (Connery) by insurance investigator Gin Baker (Zeta-Jones). Her scam to reel him in involves baiting him with overcoming the impressive security system at Bedford Palace to steal a \$40 million ancient Chinese mask.

Entrapment stubbornly remains devoid of conflict. Most of the movie features "Mac" and Gin planning and executing various capers, which is fun the first time but tedious thereafter. All of the action and excitement comes in the final 20 minutes, but by that point there have been so many twists, contrivances and implausibilities that the effort is wasted.

What about romantic chemistry? Unfortunately, with the exception of a few fitful sparks here and there, Connery and Zeta-Jones never click. There's minimal sexual tension, often seeming more like father and daughter than would-be lovers. Entrapment demands some heat from Mac and Gin's relationship and its absence further weakens an already chilly motion picture.

Connery's opportunities to play the handsome leading man are fast running out, so it's particularly unfortunate that his talents were wasted on this poorly written, dull, over long, unromantic film. Entrapment is a snare for all those lured to theaters by Connery's name, Zeta-Jones' beauty, and the false promise of an exciting caper film.

Life is full of surprises. Eddie Murphy managing a comeback after Holy Man, for instance, or the manic Martin Lawrence revealing an unsuspected gift for understatement. Or for that matter, a movie starring both of them that's so bittersweet and balanced you forget they were in Boomerang.

While Life is certainly no treatise on race, crime or the misfortune of being black and in Mississippi in 1932, it never forgets the plausibility of its story. The focus of the camp itself turns from hard labor to baseball games and barbecues. There's a terrific fantasy sequence in which Ray Gibson (Murphy) imagines the nightclub he's going to open in New York. His bunkmates join in, including the often irritating Claude Banks (Lawrence). But there's always an underlying sense of loss and an awareness that men like Claude and Ray could easily have been forgotten inside Mississippi's legalized plantation system.

As one might expect, the jokes are often crude. The ones involving imminent sodomy and same-sex relationships within prison walls have an uncomfortable air of homophobia about them. This is a film some members of the LGBT community might find offensive for that reason. But if you manage to overcome thoughts of being laughed at, you may find yourself laughing along with the characters instead. It is possible in Life to overlook flaws of insensitivity.

The passage of time is poignantly marked by the gradual vanishing of Ray's and Claude's prisonmates, intercut with a roll call of history — the history they've missed: Jackie Robinson, Martin Luther King Jr., Malcolm X, the moonwalk. Murphy and Lawrence are funny, of course, but Life is also ennobled by the sense that injustices do occur in this country.

Life is a very funny, surprisingly poignant story of two unjustly imprisoned convicts and their life on a Mississippi work camp. Classy teamwork by Eddie Murphy and Martin Lawrence means that — this spring at least - don't judge a movie by its poster, or even the rap sheets of its stars.

On a more contemporary note, Miramax recently acquired Get Bruce!, a documentary





Prayer Warriors: A Gay Man's Battle For His Soul

As Christian groups such as Focus On The Family and the Center for Reclaiming America take out full-page newspaper advertisements that claim lesbians and gay men can be "cured" of their sexual orientation through reparative therapy, it is apparent that some factions of Christianity are in a battle to eliminate homosexuality.

How such battles can manifest real consequences of pain and loss in real people's lives is superbly illustrated in Stuart Howell Miller's Prayer Warriors: The True Story of a Gay Son,

His Fundamentalist Christian Family, and Their Battle for His Soul (Alyson Publications, 224 pages, \$13.95). This author's diary of mental anguish and grief offers as hard evidence the products of bigotry, homophobia and intolerance. At the same time, Warriors provides inspiration of hope as Miller comes to terms with his life, his family and his God.

That major Gay right of passage — coming out to one's parents — is never an easy task, so Miller was particularly methodical when he outted himself in 1992. During a visit to his hometown of Nashville, he first told his brother and sister-in-law, in what he calls the "pre-liminary round."

Armed with literature for parents of gay children, Miller, then 26, told his parents, "I'm gay. I've known it for a long time and I wanted you to know." Since he had dropped hints over the years (once telling his mother never to ask him about dating women), Miller was unprepared for his parents' surprise reaction. Yet, the real surprise for him was not their intoler-

ance or refusal accept the truth — it was their "solution."

"God is going to take care of this," Miller's father calmly told his son. "The first thing we need to do is to acknowledge the fact that you're homosexual. And then we can begin the process of change." A stunned Miller maintains his composure as he explains that his sexual orientation is innate. His parents are steadfast as they refer to their son's "lifestyle choice" and begin a psychological war on his heart and mind.

Soon after his return to Los Angeles and his job at the Gay & Lesbian Center, the author learns that his favorite aunt has disowned him. "You... went back to your sweet little lifestyle and left the rest of us to wallow in your sin," she writes her nephew. "Did you really expect us to have compassion on you? I'm not Jesus!"

Again, however, it is Miller's parents —his father in particular, who pack the biggest wallop in what Miller calls "a self-righteous, eightpage, typed, single-spaced rant." A self-appointed theologian, the author's father offers his own interpretation of the Bible as Divine Truth and tells his son he is fighting for his salvation.

Miller's father explains that he has assembled 27 "prayer warriors" who have a collective mission: to "petition the Father to rescue" Miller from himself. Through chilling and obsessive prose, the mind-set of a fundamentalist with delusions of grandeur is revealed.

"This will not be stealthy jungle warfare but battle out in the open, exposing the forces of evil for who and what they are," he says, words reminiscent of dialogue from The Exorcist. "The Lord views men lying together as abominable and worthy of death. Since we don't live under a Theocracy we are not obliged to carry out the sentence."

Thankfully, Miller had nurtured solid friend-ships, often with co-workers, both in Los Angeles and in Nashville. But as the strain of his parents' war continued to haunt him and his friends couldn't empathize, Miller felt hollow and alone. "They didn't know that a fundamentalist Christian will cut off his arm if he believes its God will," he reveals in a spiral of depression, anger and self-doubt. "And that's the situation I felt I was in. I had become an appendage, a rotting limb to be healed or amputated."

As the prayer warriors continued their letterwriting campaign they enlist the pen of Miller's 12-year-old sister, Abby, who tells her brother that God "can either change you or kill you." While every letter from each warrior conveyed the same message of hatred, it was Abby's note that devastated Miller. Writes the author: "If my father's letters hurt and my mother's letters hurt, Abby's nearly killed me." Instead of anger, however, Miller finds peace and forgiveness through the teachings of the book *A Course In Miracles*, new age guru Marianne Williamson and his own private prayers. In the process, the young author becomes a better man. "God, help me to forgive," he writes. "Teach me what forgiveness means. Show me how to love again."

Miller's lessons were hard earned as he accepts his insecurities as well as total responsibility for how he views himself. The revelations should strike a cord with lesbian and gay readers who are estranged from their families. "The most frightening thing about letting your family go," Miller writes, "is that suddenly you have no one to blame."


Prayer Warriors is non-fiction; hence, there is no happy ending in the traditional sense. The last chapter does not end with Miller enjoying Thanksgiving dinner with his parents, lover in tow. As it chronicles the frightening odyssey of the author, Warriors reveals the emotional damage that can be inflicted on loving individ-

uals by those who profess to love them the most.

"I realized I would probably never have a close relationship with my family again," Miller writes in the final chapter. "But I was blessed with incredible, loving friends, and I let them become the family I longed for."

If you like the preppie, All American, boynext-door types, you will revel in this film. You will have to ignore a small tattoo here and there, but the good looking faces, very average bodies, and impressive endowments will remind you that a new crop of eager and handsome young men come of age regularly — sort of like sturdy flower plants coming up each spring! The plot is a little thin; just something to hang a lot of well photographed group sex on, but who cares when the actors are so eager and refreshing?

The first scene features four young college students who are studying group sex in their sociology class and decide to experiment by doing field research at the library by chowing down on each other in the rear stacks. The well-endowed Spike leads the way, wearing only a pair of horn-rimmed

glasses, which keep getting in the way of the action. He finally abandons them finding that he can feel his way around quite easily.

The four have gone through the combinations orally and have begun the anal study when three more young preppies come into the library. They are shocked for a couple of minutes at what they see, but are so turned on by it that they are soon involved in their own three way.

the Hung Directed by William Higgins Reviewed by Andy James During most of the late 1970's and early 1980's William Higgins reigned supreme in the realm of Gay porn. Although he has quite a few well-known titles to his credit, *The Young and the Hung* is considered by many critics and fans to be Higgins best work.

This is a video that has everything, sex in the woods, a hayloft orgy, T-room sex and even some kink with a watermelon. That, plus an attractive cast that stays rock hard throughout, explosive cum shots, great camera work and high production values, make this a must have for any collector.

The action starts with Chris Lance and "virgin" hitchhiker, Grant Fagan. Lance shows Fagan the ropes in a hot scene that takes place in a seat, and then the back, of a pick up truck. Great camera work captures a hot 69 between the two. The close ups of Fagan's thick totally stiff cock as it plows into Lance are standouts. After the two studs shoot their loads, they switch positions. Lance, the hunky blonde, gives Fagan's butt hole a real workout.

Poor Chris, twice is not enough for him. He heads to the local diner where after some interesting eye contact, he engages in some hot T-room sex with Brian Estevez. Lance sucks Estevez to perfection through a glory hole. The resulting cum shot is one of the hottest ever seen. Estevez does a hands free orgasm that splashes into the next stall.

The two head to a motel room for more action. Estevez does another hands free money shot as Lance fucks the hell out of him. It's worth the price of a rental — if not the price of purchase — just to see these two go at it.

The next scene is equally hot. Three

allegedly straight jocks, hunky Richard Gere (not the movie star), Ken Kearns and Tex Anthony meet up in a barn. After looking at some magazines, the horny boys decide to take out their sexual frustrations on a water-melon and then on each other. The action is fierce as all three have multiple orgasms. By the time they are through everyone has every hole explored. This is one hot scene.

Next, we see Richard Gere again. Gere kindly offers the cyclist, Troy Ramsey a place to sleep in the barn. Soon Gere is offering his dick as well. Ramsey accepts both with pleasure — and who can blame him.
