# It's Our Turn Milwaukee Domestic Partnership Registry Hearing June 24

#### An Editorial Statement from "Wisconsin Light"

A vote for Milwaukee's proposed Domestic Partners Registry ordinance should be an easy one for Milwaukee's Aldermen to cast.

The Registry won't cost the City a penny. It will help hundreds of uninsured same-sex domestic partners to gain health insurance and other benefits from private employers. It will make it easier for the partners of hospitalized Gays and Lesbians to use Wisconsin's Hospital Visitation law. It will promote stability in LGBT relationships.

Common sense, indeed common decency and simple humanity, dictates support for the Registry. Yet, the vote on Alderman Mike D'Amato's proposal is too close to call.

We call for justice but the Aldermen have heard other voices too. The hate mongers are out in force. The Aldermen have heard the usual anti-Gay rhetoric accompanied by the normal threats of electoral retribution if they do the right thing.

One particularly odious piece of literature being circulated around the City argues against the Registry by claiming that Gay men caused the holocaust. What should be laughable isn't. This type of statement just becomes more fodder for violence.

The fact is that some people will believe that claim. Just as some people believe the many other falsehoods spread by these self-appointed arbiters of the word of God. Every time we call for justice, the attacks seem to grow more vicious.

Its warped view of homosexuality has become a mantra, and a powerful fund raising tool, for the Christian right. That mantra is repeated on radio stations, TV programs and in letters to the editor.

Many of us learn to ignore the hate filled venom directed at us. Unfortunately, as the suicide rate among LGBT teens shows, many of us are not immune.

The zealots have had their say. Now it's our turn.

We can either let others define how society views us or we can define that view ourselves.

The fight for a Domestic Partners Registry provides us with an excellent opportunity to do just that

You can take advantage of that opportunity in several ways.

 Come to the Judiciary & Legislation Committee hearing on the Domestic Partners Registry scheduled for 9am, Thursday, June 24 in Room 301b of Milwaukee's City Hall. Even if you don't want to testify, your presence is important. It will show support for those who do. Furthermore, you can register your support of the Registry with the Committee Clerk. Your presence can send a powerful message of hope to our LGBT youth.

2) Call your Alderman at 286-2221 to let him or her know that this issue is important to you.

3) Ask your friends, parents, grandparents and other family members to call too. It's time to talk about *our* "family values."

4) Write your Alderman at City Hall, 200 E. Wells Milwaukee, WI 53202.

No one will speak for us if we are not willing to speak for ourselves. Speaking out will not convince everyone that it's time to end the unequal treatment faced by LGBT citizens in Milwaukee but it will help. Passage of Alderman D'Amato's proposal won't end all of the inequities we face but it is a start.

It's time to end the silence. Let us begin.





# Milwaukee's "Home of Our Own"

Part 2 of a *Wisconsin Light* series on Building Centers

Milwaukee – It is a cold day in November. Wind gusts of up to 40 miles per hour whip around a grayish building located in the Walker's Point area of Milwaukee. Despite the chilly weather, a constant stream of people walk into that building. They are there for the opening of what many hope will bring a renaissance to Milwaukee's LGBT community, a home of its own, its own Community Center.

Before the night is over, a crowd of 400 Gays, Lesbians, Bisexuals and Transgendered individuals will tour the new Milwaukee LGBT Community Center. Milwaukee Mayor John Norquist, Milwaukee County Executive Tom Ament and other political figures will join them.

There is a sense of exuberance. There's a feeling that Milwaukee's LGBT community has arrived. There's also recognition that its new "Home of Our Own" is still a work in progress.

Yet, the air is full of hope – hope for renewal of the LGBT community, re-energized to come together around this first floor facility at 170 S. Second Street.

That hope did not come about easily. It took more than two years of hard work to bring it about. That work included dozens of meetings, a feasibility study, a community survey and fundraisers.

It began in an upstairs meeting room at the BESTD Clinic. The Clinic's main engines, Ross Walker and Erv Uecker, told a small group of people that they were willing to put thousands of dollars into the establishment of an LGBT community center.

What followed that intimate meeting were hundreds of conversations, dozens of other meetings and a flurry of excitement. Two and a half years and a fire that destroyed a tentative site later, the doors were opened to a new LGBT Milwaukee.

What's happened since? According to the Center's only paid staff member, Executive Director Neil Albrecht, "Lots."

"We've brought in our nine subtenants," he says adding, "We actually have a tenth subtenant

Albrecht also says there's been a "huge surge" of activities at the Center. "An evening doesn't go by when there's not two or three functions or meetings taking place," he says.

Several visits made by this author to the Community Center confirm that statement. For example, on a recent Thursday night, a group of jovial people is meeting in one of the conference rooms. In the lounge area of the large community room, the Pink Writers Group, a group of LGBT authors, sits and discusses the topic of the day.

Volunteers are working in both Albrecht's office and at the reception desk. The Domestic Partnership Task force is putting together a mailing in another conference room. Meanwhile volunteers were at work in several of the offices rented by LGBT organizations.


All of that activity generates music to Albrecht's ears. He sees the Center playing key roles

## LETTER FROM THE EDITOR

# Construction Season in LGBT Wisconsin

Dear Readers,

They say that summer is the construction season. Look around and you'll see buildings going up and lots of road construction. In our LGBT community, every season is construction season. For generations, we've been building a community. I've been reminded of that fact several times in recent weeks.

This issue and recent issues of Wisconsin Light show many examples of "build-ons."

The battle to establish a Milwaukee Domestic Partnership registry is coming to a head. Ten years ago, we wouldn't have dreamed of an idea like this one. After ten years of construction, it may become a reality.

Last November, the long held dream of a "home of our own," a Milwaukee LGBT community center, became a reality. That home is still under construction. Plans for new programs and services are being carefully designed.

I've seen the "carpenters," the "masons" and the "architects" at work.

In our last issue, we announced the news that Jerry Johnson and Terry Boughner will receive the PrideFest Lifetime Achievement Award for their work on the *Wisconsin Light*. It is a richly deserved recognition. At *Wisconsin Light*, we are building on their 11-year effort to keep this paper flourishing.

Last Wednesday, I went to Madison to visit the new OutReach Center. What I saw impressed me. The people at OutReach are building on the work of two organizations that merged to become one, the United and the Madison Gay Lesbian Bisexual Resource Center.

In Green Bay, the contestants in the Gay Guernsey contest are working hard to build on last year's record setting \$12,000 total.

Throughout Wisconsin, Action Wisconsin's Board and volunteers work to build a strong statewide network. Once that network is in place, it will become a strong force to build a fairer state for all of us.

The CAIR program has been officially notified that it will continue to be one of only three AIDS Prevention/Intervention Research Centers in the country. My congratulations to the CAIR staff. It has five more years to build on what it has accomplished in the last five.

If you look at the above examples (and numerous others), you'll see a rainbow river running through all of them. They are successes because we made them successes. They show that when we put aside pretty concerns and jealousies, when we worry more about results than we do about who is on what turf, we build great things.

We should be more concerned about getting and holding the nails than we are about who is holding the hammer. Our concern should be finding new carpenters and masons so that the building will go on for generations to come.

No one can foretell what we will build in the future. Our needs now are not the same as they were ten years ago. They are different from what they will be ten years into the future. Something that won't change is the need to keep building.

And so we build. We tear down the old, unneeded structures and put up new ones. We blaze new trails to take us in directions undreamed of just a few years ago.

I have yet to meet anyone who can't play a part in the ongoing effort to build a community. We need "architects" to design new programs. We need "carpenters" who volunteer to make those programs work. We need "masons" to help lay solid financial foundations.


What we don't need are "sidewalk supervisors" trying to tell the rest of us that the wrong people using the wrong tools in the wrong way are in charge.



One of those areas is fostering the growth of other organizations. Albrecht says, "It's not always about the Center and how we can grow the Center. It's about other LGBT organizations and how we can help them grow."

He cites PLFAG as a good example of that. "PFLAG is one of our latest tenants," he says. "They are doing more now than they ever have in their history, in terms of organizing, expanding their organization and increasing their visibility. It's because they know there's a place where they consistently meet. We provide an environment where they can get things done. It's conducive to getting things done. It's comfortable for people."

Eldon Murray, Founder of SAGE Milwaukee, agrees with Albrecht's assessment. He says his group's activities have seen increases in attendance since it moved them and its office to the Center.

One of those activities was the Village Elders exhibit. The 32-panel display profiling LGBT senior citizens in New York was at the Center for two weeks in early May. The night before the opening, 50 LGBT teens were present for a youth dance.

"The kids were fascinated by it. That's an amazing example of the diversity in our community and how the Center brings that diversity together," said Albrecht.

That type of cross-fertilization bringing diverse groups of people within the larger LGBT

community into contact with each other's lives is one of the ways the Center can help foster community growth.

The cross-fertilization extends beyond that one exhibit. Albrecht says, "Not only do I provide assistance to the organizations, but they learn from each other."

The Center provides more than meeting space for its tenants and other groups. It provides office space at or below market value. That's unique among LGBT Community Centers. It also provides services for those tenants and other groups. They can use the fax and copy machines. Recently, PrideFest donated a "sort box" to the Center. The box allows organizations to save postage costs by distributing mail to up to 60 groups.

While the Center has provided a host of services to LGBT groups, it has not ignored those who are not involved in any organizations.

"It's great if you are a board member of HRL (The Human Rights League) or P-Flag or some organization," said Albrecht. "That certainly gives you a reason to come down. But maybe you don't want to be in an organization.

Maybe you just want to come down and hang out and get involved in some type of activity."

The Center does offer some drop-in activities. Among these are the library, the Saturday Movie Series, an Entrepreneurs Group (Fourth Thursday of the month), a Spirituality Group (every Sunday), A Book Club (1st Thursday/Month), Writers Group — "Pink Ink" (2nd Thursday/Month), Rainbow U Lecture Series (4th Thursday/Month) and SAGE events for Seniors (every Friday).

A Diversity Discussion Group and Tai Chi lessons begin this month.

Just as it took time to open the Center, it will take time to develop more programs for it. The Center's Board and Committees are assessing how they can meet additional community needs. Among the possibilities are referral and information services, support groups and social activities. Anyone wishing to help with this process is welcome to join it.

While many observers are pleased with the progress the Center has made, not everyone agrees with the way it has conducted business. One business owner in particular has been critical of the Center's internal structure. He accuses the Center of being "politically correct" because of the racial and gender quotas it employs to fill its Board of Directors.


Section 2 of Article VII of the Center's bylaws reads in part, "The Directors shall be composed as nearly as possible of an equal number of women and men. No less than 25% of its members shall be people of color, "People of Color" shall be defined throughout these Bylaws as those who identify themselves primarily as Native Americans, African-Americans, Latino/Latinas, Asian-Americans, or members of any other group which is subject to widespread discrimination in the United States."

The section also says that if the Board is unable to meet its affirmative action goals, it will have six months "to rectify the situation." If after six months, the Board is still not able to recruit enough people of color or women, it can't conduct any business other than:

"1. Administrative and maintenance activities which are necessary for the organization's survival, the care of its employees, the protection of its assets, or for keeping the organization in compliance with applicable laws, and

2. Activities which are directly related to rectifying the discrepancy in the composition of the board."

When asked about these provisions, Albrecht defends them. He says,

for the expenditure of \$152,000. The expenses include Albrecht's salary, rent, and program,

public relations, membership, advertising and fundraising expenses.

Albrecht is confident that the money will be there. He says it will be garnered through special events, private donations and corporate sponsorships in addition to rent money provided by the Center's tenants.

The current fundraising plan calls for the Center to raise \$25,000 from Special events, \$40,000 from individual donors and \$20,000 in corporate sponsorships.

As of May, the Center had raised \$16,000 from special events and \$5,000 in individual dona-

tions. There were no corporate sponsorships. In June, the annual Challenge party put another \$11,000 into its bank account.

Albrecht says the fundraising goals are "very attainable." He points out that the individual donations the Center has received came in even before it launched its major donor campaign. That campaign is to begin next month. Corporate sponsorship proposals are in the process of being prepared as well.

Albrecht makes a compelling case for what he calls "a very reasonable price tag." A review of the programs and budgets of Community Centers in other cities indicates that Milwaukee's budget is not out of line for what it is trying to accomplish. In fact, it may be too low.

Albrecht says the price tag brings "an increased quality of life, which is the mission of the Center. Right now, our identity in the community is very rooted in the taverns. It provides an alternative, an additional component to our identity. It provides us with recognition, programs and services. Above all else, it says that we're strong enough to have our

own Community Center."

The activity observed on any given night at Milwaukee's LGBT Community Center seems to indicate that there are many who agree with Neil Albrecht. The Center has attracted a large, diverse group of supporters.

"The Community Center is about community," says Albrecht. "If you want to support your community, it provides a vehicle for doing that."

Walk through Milwaukee's LGBT Community Center and you may get a better understanding of the word "community." You'll find LGBT Seniors and teens, out and proud activists with busy agendas, people who stopped by with time on their hands, Gay jocks and couch potatoes, and everything in between, all of them rubbing elbows with each other.

Their isolation ended, Milwaukee's LGBT groups are seeing each other, talking to each other


and beginning to work together. Large and small groups of people who are not involved in any organization are coming together, too. Over 150 people were at a Town Hall meeting to discuss the City's proposed Domestic Partnership Registry. Six writers were present at a recent meeting of Pink Ink.

They share ideas. They share dreams. Talk to many of those people, and you will find that they are beginning to understand that for all the diversity that exists within the LGBT community, there are common bonds that tie us together.

There are only a few watershed events in the life of any community. Neil Albrecht, his Board and hundreds of others believe that one of those events occurred last November 10, when the LGBT Center opened its doors.

It was a cold day with a brisk wind. There are those who say the winds of change were blowing, ushering in a new era for LGBT Milwaukee. The LGBT Community Center is open now, but it's still a work in progress, and it probably always will be.

Seven months later, the winds of change continue to blow. They blow through the meeting rooms, the offices and the hallways. They blow through the lives of those who enter a grayish building at 170 S. Second Street in Milwaukee's Walker's Point neighborhood.

# Center for AIDS Intervention Research Receives Funding Renewal until 2004

Milwaukee – Wisconsin will continue to be a leading research center in the global fight against AIDS. Citing what it calls a "highly innovative, forward looking" research program, the National Institutes of Health renewed the Medical College of Wisconsin's Center for AIDS Intervention Research (CAIR) designation as a national HIV/AIDS prevention research center.

The CAIR program is one of only three such centers in the country and the only one that exists between the East and West coasts. The renewal means that CAIR's researchers will receive a \$4.75 million grant to support their efforts for the next five years.

CAIR focuses its efforts on research into AIDS/HIV prevention and intervention strategies. The program shares its research results with AIDS groups around the country and around the world.

Over 5,000 women, men and adolescents have received HIV prevention services and care through CAIR research projects. Participants in these studies include Gay men and youths; women and teens living in low-income, inner-city housing developments; persons leaving incarceration; severely mentally ill adults; homeless men and women; and youth in high-risk situations.

"We are pleased that the NIMH has recognized CAIR's work as worthy of continued investment," said Jeffrey A. Kelly, Ph.D., director of CAIR and professor of psychiatry and behavioral medicine. "By supporting the infrastructure of CAIR's research program, this grant gives CAIR a solid foundation from which to continue its work to develop new HIV prevention approaches and to improve the health and quality of life of persons living with HIV disease."

CAIR research has targeted many aspects of HIV prevention and intervention. Its programs have helped identify those most at risk for HIV and develop strategies for reducing the risk of HIV transmission. Its researchers evaluate strategies to help persons living with AIDS/HIV from new treatment advances. They also work to meet the mental health needs of persons living HIV/AIDS.

CAIR researchers have developed approaches for helping HIV-positive persons cope with bereavement due to the loss of loved ones to AIDS and determined the special needs of older adults who have the disease. CAIR has also pioneered new methods for providing mental health services for HIV-positive persons in rural areas of the country by connecting them in support groups through telephone conference calls.

A key objective of CAIR's research program is the sharing of its research findings quickly with community-based organizations that provide AIDS services to clients. To ensure that its research benefits the community, CAIR has undertaken information exchange programs with the frontline staffs of 75 AIDS service organizations in 44 states. In this way, results of CAIR's research in HIV prevention and care can rapidly reach organizations and agencies so that their programs directly benefit from new findings.

As part of its center renewal, CAIR articulated its planned research priority agenda for the next five years. CAIR's plans for future research focus on meeting the demands of the evolving AIDS epidemic. High on its list of priorities is treatment-related research that can assist per-

sons living with HIV to maintain and improve their health.

Treatment advances, such as combination therapy drug "cocktails," mean that HIV-positive persons can live longer. CAIR researchers are working to develop ways that will help persons using these treatments to adhere to the difficult regimens required by them. That research also aims to help these individuals regain a focus on healthy living.

Over the course of ten years, members of CAIR's investigation team successfully developed community-level HIV prevention interventions to reach large numbers of Gay men, women, and adolescents. These interventions hold great promise as a means to reduce the number of persons contracting HIV infection.

CAIR's research plans call for an expansion of projects evaluating the effectiveness of community-level interventions and for populations that remain at risk, including young men who have sex with men, heterosexual men, and injection drug users.

CAIR will also expand its international HIV prevention programs. Of the 47 million people worldwide living with HIV, 95% live outside the United States, primarily in developing countries.

In 1999, CAIR will provide HIV prevention research training for seven visiting scientists from Russia, a country poised at the brink of a major HIV epidemic. In addition to continuing its existing HIV prevention training program for Russian researchers, CAIR will pursue research opportunities to adapt the HIV prevention lessons learned in the United States to other world areas threatened by the AIDS epidemic.

As a multidisciplinary research center, CAIR brings together specialists from different scientific fields to collaborate on its research efforts. The Center currently employs 11 full-time faculty researchers and nearly 60 research staff.

CAIR's funding comes from research grants provided by the National Institute of Health, the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention, and other sources. Because CAIR is the only HIV prevention research center in Wisconsin, the Center brings to the state HIV/AIDS prevention funds that otherwise would not be available locally.

#### Wisconcin Light Web Site Wins Award

Milwaukee – Wisconsin Light is pleased to announce that its web site, www. "light.com, has won a Rainbow Award. A committee formed by Gayamerica.com gives the Rainbow Awards to LGBT web sites.

A page on the Rainbow Award's web site says that the committee looks for "excellence in content, design, creativity, presentation or overall concept of the site submitted/nominated." Commercial and noncommercial LGBT sites are eligible to receive the honor.

Wisconsin Light's Graphic Designer, Scott Deibel, is the webmaster for the paper's web site, which has undergone several design changes over the last few months.

Publisher Greg Quindel said that he was pleased to know that others are recognizing the hard work and creative effort put forth by Deibel. "Just as we strive to be the best newspaper we can be, we work hard to have the best web site possible," said Quindel. He added that Wisconsin Light's web site is a "lifeline" for those who don't have easy access to a newspaper. "For many people, our site is their main source of information about the LGBT community."

"We are not going to rest on our laurels," said Quindel. "Users are going to see some exciting changes in the coming months."

#### **Bashing Outside Madison LGBT Club**

Madison – Madison's Capitol Times reports that Madison police say an early morning beating outside a Madison Gay bar early Tuesday was a hate crime.

Police are seeking two men who attacked a customer outside of Club 5 at 2am on Tuesday, June 1. A man confronted a 26-year customer as he entered his car. The attacker shouted slurs while he punched him.

When the victim fought back, a second man emerged from the car and attacked him as well. The victim was able to escape his attackers and run back into the bar. He told police that he had seen the men in the bar earlier in the evening. His car was damaged during the fight.

One of the attackers was described as white, 6 feet tall, 165 pounds, with buzz cut blond hair. The second suspect was white, 5'10", 155 pounds with medium length dark hair. The suspects were driving a maroon four-door car. The police had not arrested them as of press time.

#### Village Elders Exhibit a Success

Milwaukee – The month long showing of the acclaimed Village Elders exhibit is being hailed as a success by SAGE-Milwaukee, the group that brought the exhibit to Milwaukee during Older Americans Month in May. The exhibit profiles the lives, attitudes and loves of elderly Gays and Lesbians in New York.

It was on display at Milwaukee's LGBT Community Center, the offices of the Milwaukee County Council on Aging, and the Washington Park Senior Citizen Center. The Milwaukee displays marked only the second time Village Elders was exhibited outside of New York.

SAGE leader Eldon Murray told *Wisconsin Light* that he was very pleased with the response. "The opening night reception at the Community Center was very good," said Murray. He added that a staff person at the County Council on Aging told him that the exhibit was among the best "she had ever seen." Additional praise was garnered from the Washington Park center, which held three major events during the time Village Elders was on display there.

Village Elders created a stir among the LGBT teens attending a youth dance at the LGBT Community Center the night before its opening. "The kids were just fascinated by it," said the Center's Executive Director Neil Albrecht.

The exhibit's Milwaukee sponsors included: SAGE, the Cream City Foundation, the Metropolitan Community Church, *Wisconsin Light*, the Milwaukee County Council on Aging, Milwaukee's LGBT Community Center and an anonymous individual.

# Mllwaukee Domestic Partners Registry Hearing June 24

Milwaukee – Members of Milwaukee's LGBT Community, their families and friends are being urged in the strongest possible terms to attend a June 24 hearing on East Side Alderman Mike D'Amato's proposal to establish a Domestic Partners Registry in Milwaukee. D'Amato introduced an ordinance to establish the registry during the May 11 meeting of the Common Council. The ordinance is co-sponsored by Aldermen Paul Henningsen and George Butler.

The Milwaukee Common Council's Judicial and Legislative Committee will hold the hearing, which will take place at 9am in room 301B of Milwaukee's City Hall. During the hearing, City of Milwaukee residents will be able to testify and/or register either for or against the D'Amato proposal.

Supporters of the Registry are hoping that the majority of those testifying will speak in favor of the proposal. "Our community must mobilize to attend this hearing," said Patrick Flaherty, co-chair of the Domestic Partnership Task Force. "This is the best opportunity we have to show the widespread community support that exists for the registry."

A strong show of support at the hearing could be crucial to getting the Registry through the Common

Council. Alderman D'Amato told Wisconsin Light "When the Council votes on the registry, it could go either way. It's going to come down to one or two votes. A big crowd of supporters at the hearing could make the difference."

Flaherty and others on the Task Force have been hard at work spreading the word that those favoring the proposal should call their Aldermen and voice their support. "We've been doing a good job so far," he says. "I think that's going to change because now there is a hearing date and the media is going to cover it more. The other side has a TV station (WVCY) and a radio station (WVCY AM). They are really good at scaring up a crowd."

The work may be paying off. Sources at City Hall say that every member of the Common Council has received calls and letters supporting the proposed registry. Nevertheless, every City Hall observer contacted by *Wisconsin Light* said they are expecting a close vote when the Common Council considers the issue.

Flaherty and Alderman D'Amato say its time for the LGBT community to step up the pressure. "We need mothers and fathers and grandparents to call their Alderman and come out to the hearing too," said D'Amato. "We have to make it clear that the Registry has widespread support in the City."

Those opposing the Registry are active as well. Conservative Christian activists are urging their followers to fight against the Registry.

The actions of some of those followers have some crying, "Foul." Wisconsin Light has learned that several cars parked outside of Milwaukee's LGBT Community Center were egged while the May 3 Town Hall meeting on the Domestic Partners Registry was being held there.

Last month, Wisconsin Christians United (WCU) a group of Fundamentalist Christians headquartered in Monroe, Wisconsin went door to door distributing literature in opposition to the proposal in at least one Aldermanic district.

The WCU flyer claimed that Domestic Partner benefits would be expensive for City of Milwaukee taxpayers. It read in part, "It is wrong for government to force hard-working taxpayers to subsidize destructive lifestyles which violate deeply held moral values. It is also expensive. If the City of Milwaukee grants benefits to domestic partners, your tax bill will go up considerably, just as it has in other cities which have taken such action."

D'Amato answered the WCU charge by pointing out that his proposal does not give Domestic Partners benefits to City employees or to anyone else. "This is about helping private employers who wish to provide those benefits for their employees," he said.

He added, "The proposed Registry would not be funded with tax dollars. It won't cost the taxpayers one cent." The only other registry in the State of Wisconsin is in Madison. Madison Alderman Mike Verveer told Wisconsin Light that couples in that city pay a \$25 fee to register. "The City actually makes money from it," he said. The Milwaukee Registry would charge a fee of \$30.

"When the Council votes on the registry, it could go either way. It's going to come down to one or two votes. A big crowd of supporters at the hearing could make the difference."

An article attached to the flyer urged employment and housing discrimination against Gays and Lesbians. It also accused Gays of being responsible for the Nazi holocaust. Local activists say that the article is typical of the "hate-filled rhetoric coming from the Christian right."

If established, the Registry would allow same sex couples to register their relationship. Its advocates say that this will help them to qualify for domestic partner benefits offered by many private companies to the domestic partners of their employees. These benefits can include health insurance, emergency family leave, and discounts on good or services. Nearly every employer who offers domestic partner benefits requires documentation showing the relationship exists.

City Hall insiders say that Milwaukee Mayor John Norquist is in support of the Registry. During an interview with Wisconsin Light, Alderman D'Amato said the Mayor has promised to

sign the Registry ordinance if it is passed by

the Council.

Others are also lining up behind D'Amato's proposal. The Wisconsin Chapter of the American Civil Liberties Union has endorsed it as has AFSCME I ocal 1091.

of the American Civil Liberties Union has endorsed it, as has AFSCME Local 1091. Earlier this month, 12 Milwaukee area religious leaders sent a letter in support of the Registry to members of the Common Council.

Mixed in with all of the arguments for and

against the Registry are political considerations. Those considerations may favor the Registry. Several Aldermen say that the majority of calls opposing it are from outside the City. Furthermore, the Religious Right has a poor track record in Milwaukee electoral politics.

On the other hand, Gays and Lesbians and their families make up a sizeable voting block in the city. They are seen as likely to remember how their Alderman voted on the Registry when they go the polls in the next election and even beyond that. Politically active members of Milwaukee's LGBT community are virtually unanimous in saying they would not be able to forget or forgive a vote against the Registry.

An informed Common Council source told Wisconsin Light that despite the pressure from both sides, four Aldermen have not indicated which way they will vote on the proposal. Flaherty, D'Amato and thousands of Milwaukee Gays and Lesbians are hoping that more letters and phone calls and a strong show of support at the June 24 hearing will help those four Aldermen to decide in favor of the Registry.

### Domestic Partnership Registry Hearing Questions and Answers

When is it?: Thursday June 24, 9am

Where is it?: Room 301B, Milwaukee City Hall

Who is holding the hearing?: The Common Council's Judicial and Legislative Committee Why is it important?: The Judicial and Legislative Committee will hear testimony both in favor of and against the registry. It will then discuss the proposal and vote on whether to recommend its passage to the full Common Council.

A strong show of support for the registry could help convince the Committee to recommend passage. It would also send a strong signal to the Common Council that there is broadbased support for the Registry

Who should attend?: Advocates for the Registry say that everyone and anyone who supports the proposal should attend the hearing.

What if I don't wish to testify?: Even if you don't wish to testify, you can still show your support for the proposal by filling out a card and marking the box that reads "In Favor Not Testifying."

How long will it take?: It is hard to say how long the hearing will last. The Committee's Chair, Alderman Wayne Frank, has said that City of Milwaukee residents will be given preference. That means those living outside the City will be allowed to speak only after all City residents who have asked to testify have spoken.

What is the recommended dress?: There is none. Come as you are.

What's the best way to testify in favor of the Registry?: The supporters of The Registry offer a few tips for those who want to testify. These include:

- Speak from your heart Simply tell the Committee what the Registry would mean to you and others you know.
- Be Positive Try to avoid engaging in a running debate with those who oppose the registry.
- Say something new Try to avoid repeating what others have said before you.

Anything else I should know?: Yes there is. The Religious Right will be at the hearing in force. Be emotionally prepared to hear some harsh words about Gays and Lesbians. Past experience has shown that arguments with religious activists can quickly escalate into shouting matches and worse. Therefore, it's probably best to avoid contact with them.



# Danny Glover Named Chair of AIDS Walk

Milwaukee — Actor and social activist Danny Glover will lead this year's 10th Anniversary AIDS Walk Wisconsin, slated for Sunday, September 12 along Milwaukee's lakefront. The AIDS Resource Center of Wisconsin (ARCW) named Glover Honorary Chair of the Walk on Monday. He is expected to help recruit walkers throughout the summer and attend Wisconsin's largest AIDS fundraiser.

Glover is well known for his leading roles in the recent movie Beloved in which he co-starred with Oprah Winfrey, in Steven Spielberg's The Color Purple, the Academy Awardwinning Places in the Heart and in the mega-hit Lethal Weapon film series in which he co-starred with Mel Gibson.

Throughout his career, Glover has been a strong advocate for human rights and helping youth.

"I come to the AIDS Walk for the serious purpose of intensifying the

fight against AIDS in Wisconsin," Glover said. "I worry that a new generation of American youth are at high risk for HIV because of an unwarranted and dangerous complacency. I will challenge the people of Wisconsin to walk with me and to work harder to defeat AIDS."

Doug Nelson, ARCW's Executive Director, praised Glover's commitment. "He's a powerful advocate. He's serious about AIDS, he's correct that AIDS complacency is a big problem, and he will be a terrific motivator."

Nelson cautioned that HIV infection rates continue to rise in Wisconsin. He also expressed concern that protease inhibitor drug therapy — that was extending the lives of many — are now, regrettably, failing for up to one half of people with HIV/AIDS taking the drug treatments.

AIDS walkers help the organizations fighting AIDS to provide life sustaining services, and research and prevention activities. Because people with HIV/AIDS are living longer, AIDS service organizations face bigger caseloads than ever. The false impression that the pandemic is mostly behind us, or at least under control, has lead some people to cut back on their giving.

"As a celebrity who is committed to AIDS, Danny Glover will inspire walkers for this phenomenal event," Nelson said. "He will bring a powerful message, especially for communities of color where the AIDS epidemic is intensifying."

Nelson added that with the African American State of AIDS Emergency — which was declared in 1998 by the Congressional Black Caucus — a portion of the AIDS Walk proceeds will be earmarked for minority community-based organizations providing AIDS services. In total, at least 17 Wisconsin benefiting agencies will be recipients of AIDS Walk funds.

Glover will speak at the AIDS Walk Breakfast and the Opening Ceremony and will speak to the expected 10,000 plus walkers during a kick off ceremony. He will also participate in a red ribbon cutting with other Wisconsin dignitaries. The Walk begins and ends at the Summerfest Grounds.

Last year, nearly 10,000 participated in the Walk when Chastity Bono was Honorary Chair. They raised \$632,888, which was distributed between 19 Wisconsin AIDS organizations. In 1996, Bette Midler helped the Walk raise over a million dollars.

Besides Midler and Bono, past Chairs include Vice President Al Gore and Tipper Gore, Ervin "Magic" Johnson and Gay Olympian Greg Louganis.

In addition to AIDS, Glover works with young people to help them overcome addictions and stay out of gangs and prisons. His efforts include increasing literacy, self-determination and education opportunities for youth.

Glover also supports worldwide humanitarian efforts in his role as a Goodwill Ambassador for the United Nations Development Program focusing on eradicating poverty, saving the environment, creating jobs and advancing the rights of women. He has served on the boards of the Human Right Watch and Amnesty International.

#### ENDA, Hate Crimes Act Unlikely to Pass Say Dems

Atlanta – Openly Gay Congressman Barney Frank (D-MA) and Democratic Party National Committee Chairman Joe Andrew told Southern Voice that two key pieces of LGBT civil rights legislation are not likely to pass until after the next con-

gressional election.

Frank and Andrew said ENDA, a bill to ban job discrimination against Gays and Lesbians and the Hate Crimes Prevention Act, HCPA, which would provide federal penalties for hate crimes committed against Gays and Lesbians, would never be passed by the current Republican controlled Congress.

"As long as Dennis Hastert (R-III.) is the speaker of the House of Representatives, Republicans will do anything and everything they can to keep ENDA from passing and to keep federal hate crimes legislation from passing," Andrew said. "They're going to do it. They've said they are going to do it and they are proud they are going to do it, and yet we still have Gays and Lesbians across America who are supporting Republicans. There is a logical inconsistency there that it is part of my job to point out."

"It's one of the big differences between the parties: Gay and Lesbian rights," Frank said. He added, "The Republicans are just too tied in to the homophobes."

Kevin Ivers, a spokesman for the National office of the Log Cabin Republicans had a sharp response for Andrew and Frank. He told Southern Voice, "Their real goal is not to pass the bills - their goal is to take over the Congress," Ivers said. "As much as (Frank) says things like that, he is smart enough to know that it's not who controls the Congress that matters, it's who supports the bills, and that support has to be bipartisan. We'll pass [the legislation] by working together, not throwing bombs at each other."

Ivers pointed out that the only time ENDA was brought to a floor vote was in 1996, in the Republican controlled Senate. ENDA failed to pass by one vote when nearly every Republican voted against it and nearly every Democrat voted for it.

The 1996 vote was brought about as part of a compromise that tied DOMA, the anti-Gay marriage act to ENDA. Democrats threatened to filibuster DOMA unless the Republican leadership allowed a vote on ENDA. Eventually both sides agreed to a straight vote on both pieces of legislation without amendments being attached to them.

For its part, the Human Rights Campaign insists that there is a chance to pass both bills. David Smith of HRC says the group thinks there is a good chance to pass the Hate Crimes Act. Polls have consistently shown a healthy majority of the American public supports its passage.

HRC believes ENDA will be more difficult to push through. One reason may be the recent announcement that the National Gay Lesbian Task Force is withdrawing its support of the legislation. NGTLF says that while it won't work against the bill, it can't support it because Transgendered individuals are not specifically mentioned in the bill's wording.

HRC believes that mentioning Transgendered individuals in the bill would make it nearly impossible to get ENDA passed.

Last fall, the US Justice Department announced that it would prosecute employment discrimination based on Transgendered status in selected cases. That decision was based on a Supreme Court ruling that prohibited same-sex harassment on the job. During a March press Conference, Presidential Assistant Richard Socarides told *Wisconsin Light* that Transgendered individuals would be covered by the Hate Crimes Prevention Act because it includes penalties for hate crimes committed because of the victim's sexual orientation or gender.

#### Apuzzo Leaves White House, Rejoins NGLTF

Washington – Lesbian activist Virginia Apuzzo is leaving her position as Chief of the White House staff to take a position with the National Gay Lesbian Task Force think tank, the Policy Institute. Ms Apuzzo, who was the highest ranking openly LGBT official ever to serve in the government, will be holding the newly created Apuzzo Chair, at the Institute.

At the Police Institute, Apuzzo will serve as a senior strategist, write and lecture on a wide range of issues and steer several specific projects to increase support for LGBT equality in both the public and private sectors.

Apuzzo helped shaped NGLTF in the 1970's and 80's when she served on the organization's Board of Directors and as its Executive Director.

# Porn Found in Anti-Gay Senator's Office Computers

Washington, D.C. – When President Clinton nominated openly Gay diplomat James Hormel to be the US Ambassador to Luxembourg, Senator James Inhofe (R-OK) helped lead the fight to keep the Senate from voting on the appointment. Inhofe used a courtesy hold to prevent a vote that would have confirmed Hormel's appointment.

Inhofe called Hormel "immoral." The Senator attacked Hormel because the philanthropist endowed the San Francisco

Library's Gay and Lesbian Center. According to Inhofe, the Center contained pornographic materials. Nearly all of the materials he cited are also available in the Library of Congress.

Now comes word that X-rated materials that are not available either in Hormel's center or the Library of Congress can be found in the office of United States Senator James Inhofe. *Roll Call*, the Capitol Hill newspaper, reports that a check of the computer system in Inhofe's office found such a large collection of lewd and lascivious materials that it "messed up the Senator's computer system."

A Roll Call source said that three male staffers were responsible for the pornography. A spokesman for the Senator acknowledged the scandal saying those staff members who were involved have been disciplined. There was no word on what action the Senator took.

#### Clinton Issues Gay Pride Proclamation

Washington, D.C. – Saying that Americans should "Remember throughout the year the Gay and Lesbian Americans whose many and varied contributions have enriched our national life," President Clinton issued his annual "Gay Pride Proclamation." The President's statement commemorates the 30th anniversary of the Stonewall riots that launched the modern LGBT civil rights movement.

The Proclamation notes that earlier this month the National Park Service included the Stonewall Inn and the adjacent neighborhood on the National Registry of Historic Places. It also renews Clinton's plea for Congress to pass the Employment Non-Discrimination Act and the Hate Crimes Prevention Act.

President Clinton is the only American President ever to issue a Gay Pride proclamation.



### Funeral Law Seen as LGBT

Providence, RI - Rhode Island's Gays and Lesbian couples have been given a right that most married opposite couples take for granted, the right to plan their own funerals. A bill passed by the State Legislature allows its citizens to designate an individual who will be in charge of their funeral.

Sponsored by openly Gay Rep. Mike Pisaturo, the Funeral Designation Act passed the House with a unanimous vote. The Democratic legislator said that while working for AIDS Service agencies, he had seen the same sex domestic partners ignored and sometimes even barred from their partner's funeral.

During the debate in the State Senate, Republican State Senator Leo Blais offered an amendment that would have put the deceased's next of kin ahead of the designated agent on the list of authorized funeral planners.

Blais told the Senate, "People making a conscious choice to live this homosexual lifestyle have no right to usurp the rights of their family in this matter." The Blais amendment lost on a vote of 35 to 11. The Senate then passed the bill by a vote of 44 to 3. Governor Lincoln Almond is expected to sign the bill into law.

#### Anti Gay Marriage Bill Defeated

**Portland, OR-** Conservatives suffered a surprising setback when the State Assembly voted against a measure to put an anti-Gay marriage referendum on the ballot. Joint House resolution 29 was sponsored by 18 legislators with heavy backing from the Christian Coalition and other conservative groups. It was intended to reverse a state court decision that mandated the provision of domestic partners benefits to state employees.


If passed and then approved by the voters, the measure would have amended the Oregon State constitution to define marriage as a union between a man and woman.

#### Lesbian Alleges Rape By Police Officer

Norfolk, VA – The Virginia Pilot reports that Police Officer Roosevelt Henley is charged with raping a Lesbian after asking her if there was anything he could do to change her sexual orientation.

Officer Henley came to the woman's home to break up a fight between her ex-girl friend and a friend. The woman alleges that the officer put the woman in his squad car and ran a background check on her. He then told the woman that there was a warrant out for her arrest, but allowed her to return to her home to get identification.

The woman says that once they were inside, Officer Henley rechecked her social security number and told her that there had been a mistake and she was not the person who was being sought. The woman says the officer asked her if "there was anything he could do to change me." When she answered that there wasn't, he assaulted her. If convicted, Officer Henley faces a sentence of five years to life.



LGBTers are not the first nor will we be the last group to be the object of the wrath of these "Christian" groups. Change is hard.

Mary and I recently watched the movie Inherit the Wind. It was the latest remake of the 1950's era movie based on the trial that made Clarence Darrow famous. Creation vs. Evolution. During the movie, there was a scene outside the courthouse. It reminded me of the scene outside of PrideFest. People carrying big signs that say you are a sinner for not following the Bible to a "T"

I have tried to reason with these sign carrying folks, but there really is no point to doing that. They are in their own world. It is amazing that people get along as well as they do in this world. I guess we can be thankful for civilization. Madeleine Albright has her work cut out for her.

An acquaintance traveled to Washington D.C. to the Gay and Lesbian March on Washington back in 1993. He shared a funny story. He said he had been on an elevator in a fairly nice Washington hotel with friends.

A very well groomed woman in her late 60's, early 70's stepped on to the elevator. She glanced over at them. Their wild march clothing made who and what they were obvious. The woman, chin high, caught my friend's eye and simply said, "When worlds collide." It said a lot and encapsulated the moment.

This will help to fund educational activities and programs, which will touch many segments of our community.

The "Christian" Right seems to think we have some huge evil "agenda," some colossal plan to undermine the nuclear family. Most of us probably feel that those that wish to form a nuclear family should have that right. Just as we think that we should have the right to have our families look the way we wish them to.

It is a challenge to our society to make room for people who are different. Not bad, just different. My dad always used to say to me, "You're different." I didn't know what he meant by that. But hey, we are all different.

If you are reading this, I challenge you out there, whoever you are. You can help. Volunteer somewhere. Write out a check. Sign a petition. Talk to your neighbors, your Alderperson. The only people we can change are ourselves. Once we do that, can the rest of society be far behind?



### **EDITORIAL**

In our last issue, we reported that President Clinton made James Hormel America's first Gay Ambassador. Clinton gave up on his 18-month effort to get a Senate confirmation vote for James Hormel, his openly Gay nominee to be Ambassador to Luxembourg. With the backing of Senate Majority Leader Trent Lott, Conservative Republican Senators placed "holds" on the nomination, blocking a vote on it.

The President gave Hormel a recess appointment. Clinton's move bypassed the Senate.

In the aftermath, Senator James Inhofe (R-OK) said he would put a hold on every presidential appointment to block votes on them as well. Below is sampling of what America's press is saying about the appointment and Inhofe.

The Chicago Tribune: "Blocking the Hormel nomination has made the GOP seem like a party of petty prejudice. To allow it to hold up other critical business — such as the confirmation of Lawrence Summers as Treasury Secretary — would make it appear bone headed too."

San Jose Mercury New: "The Constitution permits the President to make appointments when Congress is in recess. Clinton has been somewhat reticent in doing so — but he's right to shove this one into the face of the Senate opposition, lest anti-Gay hysteria carry the day."

"If the GOP leadership permits Inhofe to block the nominations of Lawrence Summers as Secretary of the Treasury and Richard Holbrooke as Ambassador to the United Nations, as he vows to do, it will demonstrate the political depths to which it has sunk."

Miami Herald: "Sure, politics can be mean-spirited and unpleasant at times, but the game that Sen. James M. Inhofe (R-OK) is playing goes too far. He confuses politics with bigotry..."

"The Senator says Mr. Clinton's action was a 'flagrant abuse of the recess appointment power. Of the appointment, the Senator describes Mr. Hormel as a 'Gay activist who puts his agenda ahead of the agenda of America."

"The senator is wrong on both counts. During his time in office, Mr. Clinton has made 57 recess appointments. Yet President Ronald Reagan made 239 such appointments and President Bush made 78. And it is Sen. Inhofe who attempts to hold the nation's agenda hostage with his anti-Gay crusade."

The Arizona Star: "For his part, Clinton made the recess appointment only after two attempts to get the Senate to confirm Hormel, once in 1997 and again this January. Republican leaders, however, would not let the appointment come to a vote."

"Despite Hormel's qualifications, Inhofe is outspoken in his opposition. In truth, Inhofe is the one who is putting a personal agenda ahead of America's agenda."

**Tulsa World:** "Actually, if anyone has made a mockery of the confirmation process, it is Inhofe. The courtesy hold is intended to temporarily delay consideration of a presidential nomination when questions arise. It is not a ploy to block an appointment favored by the president and a majority of the Senate.

"The Constitution says that ambassadorial and other appointments are made 'with the Advice and Consent of the Senate.' Nowhere does it say, 'with the Advice and Consent of Jim John fo.""

**OUR VIEW: Clinton Made the Right Choice** 

For 18 months, President Clinton tried to get a Senate vote on his nomination of James Hormel to the post of Ambassador to Luxembourg. There is only one reason why that vote never occurred: James Hormel is Gay.

Hormel and his backers played by the rules. He has a record of outstanding service to his country. His supporters lined up well over 60 votes for his confirmation.

Unfortunately, the rules mean nothing when bigotry rears its ugly head. Three Republican Senators, aided by their Majority Leader Trent Lott, decided that the will of the American people as expressed through its elected representatives and President was not as important as their petty prejudice. They placed holds on a vote to confirm Clinton's choice.

Make no mistake about it. This battle was about more than James Hormel. It was about whether any of us can stand up for equality without fear of retribution.

The gang of three never questioned Hormel's qualifications. Their complaints centered on his support of LGBT causes.

The conservative cabal's refusal to allow the democratic process to take place left the President with a hard choice. He could allow this intolerable situation to continue, or he could bypass the Senate, angering its Republican leadership. The President chose justice over political expediency.

In so doing, President Clinton sent another message of support for the right of LGBT Americans to receive fair consideration. Moreover, he pointed out to LGBT America that who sits in the White House really does matter.

Now the same people who refused to let the Senate do its constitutional duty say the President betrayed the constitution by making the appointment. One of them, Senator James Inhofe, is threatening to block all of Clinton's nominations with holds.

Inhofe's complaints smack of hypocrisy. For over a year, he refused to allow the appointment process laid out in the Constitution to proceed. Now he complains that Clinton used that document to get around him.

The constitution lays out a framework for the people to express their will. It was not designed to be a tool for thwarting that will. Furthermore, while recess appointments are mentioned in the Constitution, Senate holds are not.

Inhofe, and Lott should still allow a vote on this nomination, even if it is only a symbolic one. Then they should get on with the business they were elected to conduct.

# Liam Neeson -A Gentle, Macho Irishman

New York City – Liam. It sounds like such a unique name. A stage name, one who had high hopes to make it big in the movie industry and may have created to keep himself separated from all the Johns and Joes.

Liam Neeson, this year's most recognizable face on screen — *Phantom Menace* and the upcoming summer film *The Haunting* — does have an unforgettable name.

It is not, however, as conjured up as one may think. All he did was take the last four letters of his given name instead of the first four, W-L-L, as most in the world do, as a nickname. "I like the way it sounds," says the striking yet gentle giant and former boxing champion.

It isn't hard to picture Neeson in a boxing ring. His 6'4" frame still supports the impressively muscled physique that made him Northern Ireland's teenage boxing champ. The image of pugilist toughness is allayed agreeably by Neeson's face.

His handsomeness, while undeniably rooted in the ruggedness of his features, is tempered by a distinctly sensitive cast to the eyes and mouth as well as a once broken nose. One's overall impression of Neeson is that of a man who could throw a solid punch if need be, but who would then likely help the recipient of the blow up off the floor, and probably buy him a pint.

Neeson's Catholic family was a distinct minority in the predominantly Protestant town of Ballymena. His recollections of his upbringing in the bucolic burgh paint a picture of a hardworking community that witnessed little of the sectarian prejudice that plagues much of Northern Ireland.

"At the age of nine, I began taking boxing lessons at the All Saints Social Club," he recalls out loud, seated in a suite at the Regency Hotel in the middle of Manhattan on a recent warm spring afternoon. "It wasn't long before I sustained a broken nose in the ring. I never even went to a doctor to have it fixed. The trainer reset it there, right on the spot."

The accident, if you will, did not deter the young, lean, Irish boy. He had soon bested the

lot of challengers All Saints could muster, at which point Neeson began boxing on the amateur competitive level. At 46, Neeson is no longer throwing punches in the ring. He is, nonetheless, throwing more than a few in George Lucas's smash box-office success Phantom Menace.

In the prequel to the first three Star Wars films, Neeson plays the larger-than-life maver-ick Qui-Gon Jinn in the tradition of every mythical hero from Hercules to John Wayne. He is strong and tough when necessary but gentle and soulful when circumstances permit.

Neeson is quick to point out that he has consciously borrowed from the Hollywood archetype of the lone cowboy. "I draw on another great mythmaker, (the first being *Star Wars* creator George Lucas) the director John Ford," he says. "I loved his films. I guess at a very early age, you want to emulate these people. Stoic figures like John Wayne, Gary Cooper, and those people who had a presence and just commanded attention."

When the first Star Wars was released back in the late 1970's, Neeson was a 24-year-old actor in Northern Ireland's Lyric Players repertory theater, performing in productions such as Juno and the Paycock. "It was an especially violent time with the IRA, the Protestant Unionist militias and the British occupying forces battling in one bloody skirmish after another. Quite a bit of bombing had gone on, if memory serves me right, the day before Star Wars was released," he says.

"I remember thinking, 'I'd like to go see this film if it's still showing with all the trouble.'" Neeson did make it to a showing of the film at a theater smack dab in the middle of the fighting. "It was very crowded. The film transported me into another world," he adds.

"I totally believed that world. I totally identified with the story. It's a deceptively simple story of good and evil, and discovering the good and evil within yourself. It's one of those classic Arthurian tales. You know — where the hero has to confront a nemesis and overcome it. Then there is a trial of strength or an ordeal he has to go through and come out the other end having learned something about himself

and about society in general. And to use that to hopefully advance civilization."

"That's basically what the Arthurian legend is. What Star Wars is. And probably what every mythological story in the

history of the world is."

By Liam's late teens, fisticuffs no longer held the appeal they once had. He forsook a professional boxing career

in favor of attending the University of Belfast to study physics and computer science. As it turned out, his heart just wasn't in his studies and he flunked out.

"For a time," he says, "I worked as a forklift driver at the Guinness brewery, but feeling obliged to get a college diploma to please my parents, I again enrolled in school, thinking I wanted to pursue a career in teaching. It was too much. My heart was just not in it and I quit."

Amidst the two years he continued in school, however, Neeson took some drama classes. He had found his calling. He began to appear in local productions all around the country.

While appearing in a production of John Steinbeck's Of Mice and Men, Neeson was discovered by film Director John Boorman. Somehow, Boorman saw a mediaeval knight yearning to be set free in the actor's lumbering half-wit Lennie. Boorman cast Neeson as a secondary character in his widely hailed yet bizarre Excalibur in 1981. That was Neeson's first film and set him on the course he has not yet strayed.

I say "yet" because there was talk recently, in many newspapers, that Neeson would be retiring from film.

"Nonsense," he says to me, when I ask him point blank about all of the stories about his imminent retirement. "You know what?" he rhetorically asks, in a soft spoken; not annoyed tone. "I had just finished a play on Broadway. I had not seen my family for quite a long time and I was sort of burnt out. That comment stemmed from a sudden burst of anger. I don't think I'll give up acting for a long time."

Up until now, Neeson has starred in 31 films. Among the many are his two favorites, Schindler's List, for which he was nominated for a Best Actor Academy Award, and Michael Collins, Neil Jordon's tribute to the Irish rebel. Other films included in his resume are last

year's Les Miserables and 1987's Suspect opposite Cher, in which he played a homeless mute falsely charged with murder.

Until five years ago, Neeson was very comfortable being a ladies man. He courted quite a number of Hollywood's leading ladies. Among the many: Julia Roberts, Barbra Streisand and Helen Mirren. The lady's man days are over now, though. Ever since he began seeing Natasha Richardson, daughter of Vanessa Redgrave, he has become more of the family man type of guy.

Neeson married Richardson. The happily married couple has two young sons, Michael and Daniel. There is no little Liam Jr. running around. Yet!

Now that *Phantom Menace* is in theaters and Neeson gets a reprieve for the time being, at least, from playing Qui-Gon Jinn, he is anticipating the release of *The Haunting* later this summer.

In *The Haunting* Neeson plays a professor who conducts a mysterious psychological experiment on three test subjects — one of them being Catherine Zeta Jones (*Entrapment*, *The Mask of Zorro*) in Jan DeBont's (*Twister*) latest

The Haunting is a remake of the 1963 film of the same name, which was directed by Robert Wise (The Sound of Music). Both films are based on Shirley Jackson's novel, The Haunting of Hill House. "I never wanted to be caught dead in that house after dark," says Neeson.

Chances are, millions of moviegoers will be caught with the lights on in many movie houses when *The Haunting* is released, and scared nearly to death.



### **Austin Powers:** The Spy Who **Shagged Me**

Sequels are faced with having to surpass or at least maintain - the freshness and spontaneity of the original, and Mike Myers certainly adds a great deal of both to his sequel to 1997's Austin Powers: International Man of Mystery. Nevertheless, the film is also strongly derivative. Punch lines that were uproarious in the first film are frequently attempted again, with unfunny always



charm that made for a welcome (if sophomoric) movie. The Spy Who Shagged Me attempts to recapture its predecessor's "mojo," as it were, and succeeds... partly.

In this film, Powers (Myers) finds himself newly single and playing the field again, but his plans are interrupted by the return of Dr. Evil (Myers). Evil's son, Scott (Seth Green) returns, as do Number Two (Robert Wagner) and leather-clad Lesbian, Frau Farbissina (Mindy Sterling). New bad guys include a dwarf clone of Dr. Evil, Mini-Me (Verne Troyer), and an obese Scottish henchman named Fat Bastard (Myers again).

The plot revolves around Dr. Evil's attempt to steal Powers' "mojo" (sexual stamina). Teamed with sexy CIA agent Felicity Shagwell (Heather Graham), Powers must not only reclaim his virility but disable Dr. Evil's Moonbased laser.

There's no use analyzing the supporting roles. Once you're beyond Myers' creative and energetic performances, none are particularly noteworthy. Despite loads of low-brow, bathroom and body function humor, The Spy Who Shagged Me does have its high points.

Its best laughs involve silhouettes of Powers and Shagwell in a tent which appear from outside to be extraordinarily kinky sexual acts. There's also a cleverly-edited sequence

that has various bit players and star cameos coming up with different ways to describe a spaceship that resembles male genitalia. It's juvenile but amusing.

Come to think of it, "juvenile but amusing" is an excellent way to sum up The Spy Who Shagged Me. It's certainly watchable, but that's far from a ringing endorsement.

#### Limbo

The final moments before the credits roll of Writer-Director John Sayles' Limbo will outrage some viewers, as unconventional and unexpected as they are. But the important thing is that Savles chose a resolution that is in keeping with the tone and title of the picture.

Expect the unexpected from John Sayles, a director who never stops taking risks or seeking new sources of inspiration. He has set films in many varied places: New Jersey during the '60s (Baby, It's You); the Tex-Mex border (Lone Star); Ireland (The Secret of Roan Inish); the bayous of Louisiana (Passion Fish); and Central America (Men with Guns). Limbo takes us to Alaska, the "last, great American fron-

Limbo follows three characters trapped in an emotional paralysis from which, it seems, only death will free them. Joe Gastineau (David Strathairn) is an introverted, lonely man haunted by a past that includes a tragic fishing accident. Donna De Angelo (Mary Elizabeth Mastrantonio) is a second-rate lounge singer whose life consists of onenight-stands, professionally and personally. Her daughter, Noelle (Vanessa Martinez), is

a disturbed, suicidal teenager lapsing into acts of self-mutilation. As it slowly unfolds, Limbo plays like a sim-

mering romance and tale of redemption, but then Sayles takes us in unexpected directions. Joe's half-brother, Bobby (Casey Siemaszko), shows up looking for help (he's being hunted by drug dealers). This complication in the lives of Joe, Donna and Noelle is nothing short of disastrous

Sayles gradually, deftly builds his characters, continually exposing new facets of their personalities. Nearly every scene offers a unique disclosure about them. Often, these are not sudden or shocking, but they're always substantial. The film is also populated by a gallery of rich, supporting players. Even the most inconsequential individuals have an interesting trait or two.

Limbo possesses great cinematography that makes the sense of cold and gloom palpable. Alaska has a certain grandeur but also a cold, cruel side that is illustrated here. The acting is appropriately toned-down and restrained. As thrillers go, it is a sedate film, but that's the point.

# A Gay Fall on TV

#### Preview by John Jahn

Last week, the major broadcast television networks previewed their 1999-2000 primetime seasons for advertisers. Several with existing LGBT characters will be returning this fall. There will also be some new series, which will have LGBT characters in them. But what's up with UPN? This network is the only one that, unfortunately, will feature no Lesbian, Bisexual, Transgendered or Gay characters this fall. No big change, though. They didn't have any last season, either.

While disappointing, of course, there was a time when no television networks had any regular LGBT characters. Occasionally, a hairdresser, salesman or butch female would show up for an episode or two, mostly so straight America could have a laugh. But the days when LGBT characters were embarrassingly stereotypical are, seemingly, long over. Yes, the times they are a changin', and not a moment too soon!

Here is a brief run down of both new and returning TV series for this fall that will features at least one recurring character representing the LGBT community.

#### ABC

Oh, Grow Up is an ensemble comedy featuring Ford (John Ducey), the youngest of three friends who separates from his wife when he realizes he's Gay.

Wasteland is an one-hour drama from Dawson's Creek creator Kevin Williamson. The story of six 20-somethings right out of college, Wasteland features Brad Rowe who starred opposite Will & Grace's Sean Hayes in the feature film Billy's Hollywood Screen Kiss. The Gay character, Russell (Dan Montgomery), is a closeted soap opera star who is eventually outed by the tabloids.

The ABC network will be welcoming a Lesbian character this fall to Then Came You, a sitcom about a newly-single woman in her 30's who has a romance with a 24-year-old woman.

Drew Carey is back, including Drew's heterosexual, cross-dressing brother, Steve (John Carroll Lynch), who is currently dating Drew's nemesis, the "voluptuous" Mimi.

NYPD Blue will be back with Gay receptionist John Irvin (Bill Brochtrup).

Spin City's Carter Heywood (Michael Boatman), the Gay Director of Minority Affairs, will be back for the show's next season.

#### CBS

Of the six new shows premiering this fall on CBS, none are scheduled to include even a single Lesbian or Gay character.

Of the network's existing shows, Nash Bridges, starring newlywed Don Johnson, will be back. The show includes a recurring Lesbian character, Nash's sister, Stacey (Angela Dorhmann).

Chicago Hope, which remains on the network's fall schedule, will no longer feature Gay Dr. Dennis Hancock, since actor Vondie Curtis Hall is departing. That's the bad news. The good news, however, is that we will see more of Gay, anal-retentive assistant, Andy (Todd Louiso).

#### NBC

Of the six new shows premiering this fall on NBC, none are scheduled to include even a single Lesbian or Gay character.

Nevertheless, of existing shows, Will & Grace, American primetime's first show to premier with an openly Gay character, returns to Tuesday nights this fall with attorney Will Truman (Eric McCormack) and the fabulous Jack McFarland (Sean Hayes) in tow.

ER returns without Lesbian Dr. Maggie Doyle (Jorja Fox), alas, but with recurring Gay nurse Yosh Takata (Gedde Watanabe).

Friends returns with the recurring roles of Ross' Lesbian ex-wife, Carol Wylick (Jane Sibbett), and her spouse, Susan Bunch (Jessica Hecht).

Suddenly Susan is back with the Gay mailroom guy, Pete (Bill Stevenson), and his husband, Hank,

The Profiler will be back fighting crime with Gay computer pro, George Fraley (Peter Frechette).

On the minus side. Homicide: Life on the Streets, primetime's only show with a Bisexual character, Detective Tim Bayliss (Kyle Secor), has been cancelled. Mad About You leaves the network after seven successful seasons, which often featured Lesbian couple Debbie (Robin Bartlett) and Joan (Suzie Plakson).

#### Fox

Of the eight new shows the network will premier this fall, one will include Lesbian or Gav characters. Action, the Jay Mohr sitcom, will feature one "ambiguous" character and another, a closeted, married television executive named Bobby who will be Gay.

Of the network's returning shows, Beverly Hills, 90210 will be back this fall with more from Samantha Sanders (Christina Belford), Steve's Lesbian mom, and The Simpsons' Waylon Smithers (voice of Harry Shearer) will return to kiss up to Mr. Burns.

#### **Warner Brothers**

The youth-oriented WB network will feature Gay characters on two series aimed at teenagers. Popular, a new high school drama, will welcome a Gay, Asian-American character. Dawson's Creek returns with the Gay character, Jack (Kerr Smith), who will join the Capeside High School football team on the teen drama.

# OUTside America.

#### A Wisconsin Light Exclusive

London – Summer is upon us, gentle readers. Some of us will stake our claim at Bradford or Mazo Beach. Others will prefer the bucolic serenity of Cudahy. (Charge resuscitation paddles, stat!) However, for those of you with at least one week vacation and a sense of adventure, may I suggest an overseas destination? Whether you are a seasoned traveler, or the holder of a virgin passport, London should be on your short list.

#### **Getting There:**

London has several advantages as a foreign destination. Every major airline services Britain, and the resulting competition keeps the airfares reasonable. Check for weekly specials through your travel agent, or online through your preferred airline's web site. Don't forget charter flights — some round trip seats from Chicago can go as low as \$329!

Additionally, the flights to the UK are the shortest to Europe. (After a plastic meal and a screening of *The Waterboy*, every minute counts!) Another benefit for choosing London is the common language, except when speaking with taxi drivers, of course!

Upon arrival, you'll find that both major airports, Heathrow and Gatwick, are connected to the city center with trains. Unless you have more dollars than Jesse Helms has latent issues, take to the rails and save 75% on the taxi fare. As a Gay or Lesbian traveler, you might be a tad anxious when passing through customs. Britain's archaic views on sexual freedoms are among the most conservative in Europe.

Entering the UK with poppers is not against the law. Items such as dildos, whips, handcuffs and other nocturnal accounterment aren't illegal, but in light of recent court cases, you may be questioned as to their intent. Customs will take special interest in videos, books or magazines, which show anal or oral penetration or S&M.

#### **Daytime Diversions:**

London is a tourist-friendly destination, a vast network of buses and underground trains serve all sights and hotels. Travel passes, good for one, three or seven days, are available at underground stations or at over 2,000 newsagents. A seven-day pass requires a passport size photo. Do keep all tube ride tickets, as you will need to produce them at the end of your journey.



Whatever your tastes, you will face an amazing selection of excursions in the city. The National Gallery, located on Trafalgar Square is one of the world's best art museums, and it's free. Other worthwhile sights include Houses of Parliament, St. Paul's Cathedral, Tower of London (to see a REAL Queen's family jewels!) and Buckingham Palace (though pass at the inside tour — expensive and patronizing).

For lunch or an afternoon coffee, check out Old Compton Street, the Gay epicenter for day-

time cruising. Located in the tourist center, just a few blocks north of Leicester Square, you will find several fine Gay owned restaurants, coffeehouses, pubs and shops.

Here you will discover the Admiral Duncan Pub (most recently the sight of a homophobic bombing) which is being refurbished for an early summer reopening. In any Gay establishment, pick up the two free Gay publications – The Pink Paper



and Boyz.

Both provide complete information about Gay life in the city, including maps, articles of interest and classifieds. Be prepared — London prices are quite high. Lunch can easily climb to \$20, and bottled beer sells for \$5, though night bar staff expects no tipping.

In the afternoon you may want to dive into the huge Harrods department store, stroll leisurely among the royal residences in the beautiful St. James park, or just sit in Leicester or Trafalgar squares, watching the boys and girls. Try to schedule your vacation so that you can be part of the "London Mardi Gras '99" celebration on July 3rd. Britain's largest Gay and Lesbian celebration will feature a major parade, main stage entertainment, as well as dancing 'til dawn and much more.

#### **Evening Events**

London is second to none in its offering of quality entertainment. If you are an arts buff, you will revel in the city's four world class orchestras, several major dance companies, and the two opera houses. (Covent Garden is currently closed for renovations, and the English National Opera singing all of its productions in English.)

For lighter entertainment, there are many comedy clubs, as well as rock, folk and jazz venues, and many "art" cinema houses, showing avant-garde films. For a complete weekly listing of all events in the city, purchase the magazine *Time Out* at any newsstand — truly the best two pounds you will spend.

Of course, no visit to London would be complete (or believed!) without spending at least one night at the theater. Whether your tastes extend from comedy, gripping drama or musicals, almost anything offered by West End theaters should be uniformly excellent.

Only a fool who would pay full price for any theater or opera ticket. In Leicester Square stands the official Half Price Ticket Booth, which from noon on the day of the performance sells only the high priced main floor seats at half price, plus service charge. The downside is they accept cash only and do not offer a choice of seats. Other ticket booths in Leicester Square offer a choice of discounted seats, but depending on demand, prices and seat location will vary.

#### **Nighttime Nasty**

So the sun is down, and it is time for a bit to trolling. London hosts well over 100 Gay pubs and clubs in all shapes and sizes — much like the clientele! The publication Boyz

offers a short description of all establishments, including hours of operation.

Plan your itinerary carefully; some places close at 11pm, others close between 2am and infinity. Though location may dictate which club you might visit, Londoners do provide a few recommendations.

For the footloose, dance with the masses at Trade Or G.A.Y., which features live entertainment such as Boy George and Sister Sledge. Also highly recommended is Saturday night at the Vauxhall Tavern for "Duckie", a throbbing dance battle royale.

For those toughs who prefer more slap than tickle, the Hoist should be your first stop, then follow the crowd to the late night Backstreet. Both enforce a strict leather/rubber/uniform dress code. Women may be more comfortable with "Girls Night" at Used.

For drag, both on stage and off, Saturday night at the Wayout Club is the place to be. Wherever you go, be prepared for a body and bag search. Following the recent bombings, Gay establishments are taking no chances with the safety of their patrons. Trains run until midnight, and afterwards there are night buses or private car services — about half the prices of taxicabs. Any questions or problems, call the Gay help line at 0171-242-1010.

And off you go! Make reservations, pack up a few pounds (Sterling, that is!) and prepare for an unforgettable trip. London will provide you with campfire stories for years to come.

## Innovative Tennis League Leads Gay Sports into Y2k

It wasn't enough just to hold a season. The Metro Milwaukee Tennis League-(MMTL) is trying to make THIS season into a cutting edge for the future and innovating new ideas for the next and more seasons to come. The League Coordinators have come up with a format that now encompasses:

Gay Games 2002 Dates Change

Montreal, Canada – If you are thinking about going to the next Gay Games, be aware of a change in the schedule. New dates for Gay Games VI and a change in Federation of Gay Games leadership highlighted the Federation's mid-year meeting held in Montreal at the end of April.

The date change means that the "Gay Games VI and Cultural Festival — Under New Skies" will take place in Sydney, Australia from November 2-9 in 2002. The games were originally scheduled for September of 2002. Although the original September dates were to coincide with the end of the Northern Hemisphere summer, Sydney organizers cited warmer local weather and longer daylight hours as the deciding factors in changing the schedule.

"At the Gay Games last summer in Amsterdam, the streets were filled with people having a great time late into the evening," said Tom Seddon, Sydney 2002 board member. "In September the sun goes down in Sydney around 5:30pm, but by November there are an extra two hours of daylight. We're convinced this change is the right thing to do, and we're happy the Federation Board has approved it enthusiastically."

Sydney 2002's representatives announced ambitious outreach goals for the Asia/Pacific region, an area of the world that's been underrepresented at previous Gay Games. They also described their staffing structure, with many volunteers already in place, and their plans for obtaining government support and corporate sponsorships.

Sports competitions will be clustered in two main zones, one at the Olympic Park in Homebush and the other downtown at Sydney Harbor. Organizers say this will make it easy for participants to attend a variety of different events held in close proximity to each other. Sydney 2002 also plans to bring some cultural events directly to the athletic sites.

In a separate development, the Federation of Gay Games Board of Directors replaced its Executive Committee when the officers stepped down to permit a change of leadership.

"The Federation is a very different organization now than when it was founded 10 years ago," said Acting President Gene Dermody. "We have more and more sports and cultural groups joining the Federation Board and fewer individuals. The groups have taken an increasingly active interest in the day-to-day business

of the Federation, and that's requiring us to examine our internal management structure."

"Over the next several months we're going to look at improving communication between the Acting Executive Committee officers, the other directors and the Federation's various committees," Dermody said. "It's a tribute to the commitment of our former officers that they have remained on the Board to help us go forward with the Federation's work."

The Acting Executive Committee consists of Dermody (San Francisco, California; International Wrestling Alliance), Vice President Derek Liecty (Oakland, California; Individual Federation Director), Treasurer Joseph E. Pasquarella Smith (Seattle, Washington; Team Seattle), Recording Secretary Charles Carson (New York, New

York; International Gay & Lesbian Aquatics), and Corresponding Secretary Roy Vestal (Denver, Colorado; Lesbian & Gay Bands of America)

The acting officers will serve until an election can take place at the Federation's Annual Meeting in Berlin next October. Team Berlin, which had one of the largest contingents at Gay Games V in Amsterdam will host that meeting.

"Our transition team has a lot of work to do over the next six months," said Dermody. "We got a good start in Canada last week thanks to our host, Equipe Montreal. It will be great to take the Federation back to Europe for its next meeting."

#### **Afterwords Gives Back**

Milwaukee - Afterwords Bookstore & Espresso Bar announced the second annual cash disbursement from the Afterwords 10% Club. Members of the Club pay a \$10 annual fee. Members receive a 5% discount on the purchase of all non-sale items. Afterwords donates an additional 5% of their purchase prices to the LGBT organization of the member's choice.

Club members also receive special mailings access to "member only sales" and other perks.

The disbursements take place during National Lesbian and Gay Book Month, which is celebrated each June. This year, 12 local LGBT groups and AIDS-related organizations will receive a total of \$743.81.


The recipients of this year's funds are: the AIDS Resource Center of Wisconsin, the BESTD Clinic, the Lesbian Alliance of Metro Milwaukee, the Oberons, the Gemini Gender Group, St. Camillus AIDS Ministry, the Cream City Foundation, the Cream City Chorus, Bi-Definition, PFLAG and Senior Action in a Gay Environment (SAGE).

Afterwords owner Carl Szatmary says that the percentage of sales donated by his store is much higher than that donated by other bookstores with similar programs. "It's Afterwords' way of thanking our customers for their patronage and thanking the community organizations for their ongoing support," he said.

Since the Afterwords 10% Club began, over one hundred individuals and couples have joined. The amount of money that Afterwords returned to the local LGBT community in the first, annual disbursement amounted to \$466.68 in 1998.
