Milwaukee Alderman Pass, Mayor Signs Domestic Partnership Ordinance

Milwaukee - With a Common Council vote of 10 to 7 and the signature of Mayor John Norquist, the Cream City said "Yes" to LGBT couples on Tuesday, July13. The Council approved Alderman Mike D'Amato's proposal to establish a Domestic Partnership Registry at the City Clerk's office. Later that afternoon Mayor Norquist signed the ordinance into law.

With those actions, Milwaukee joins Madison and over 50 other US cities, villages, towns and counties in recognizing the existence of LGBT relationships. The establishment of the Registry constitutes the biggest political victory won by Milwaukee's LGBT community in the last decade.


The Alderman voting in favor of the Registry were: Mike D'Amato, Paul Henningsen, George Butler, Mike Murphy, Marlene Johnson, Fred Gordon, Marvin Pratt, Jim Witkowiak, Wayne Frank and Don Richards.

Voting against were Council President John Kalawitz, Annette Scherbert, Susan Brier, Dan Schramm, Tom Nardelli, Jeff Pawlinski, and Willie Hines.

The debate on the proposal was brief. Knowing that they had to votes to pass the measure, its backers opted not to speak. That was not true of those who opposed passage.

Alderman Scherbert said "There is a line to draw." She also questioned whether Gays and Lesbians would soon be coming and asking for the right to register "more than one partner."

Two Brothers Arrested in Slaying of Gay Couple

Tie to Synagogue Arsons Possible

Redding, CA – Two brothers, Benjamin Matthew Williams, 31, and James Tyler Williams, 29, were arrested in connection with the slaying of Gary Matson, 50, and his partner of 16 years, Winfield Scott Mowder, 40. Matson's brother found the victims in their bed inside their home in tiny Happy Valley. Both men were shot.

The police believe the victims knew their killers. The suspects worked in the landscape industry, as did Mowder.

Police believe the suspects may also be responsible for fires set at three area Synagogues. The June 18 fires caused more than \$1 million in damage. Officers said they found "extremist type" white supremacy publications at the home shared by the Williams brothers.

'Federal explosive experts cordoned off the Williams' neighborhood, while police removed bags of evidence from their home. Authorities said they found evidence that linked the suspects to the Synagogue arsons and property taken from the murdered victims' home.

Police arrested the men at an area shopping mall. Both were wearing bulletproof vests.

Murder of Soldier May Be Hate Crime

Washington, D.C. – The National Coalition of Anti-Violence Programs (NCAVP) and the Service Members Legal Defense Network (SLDN) are calling for an investigation into the murder of a Fort Campbell Kentucky soldier who may have been killed because he was Gay. Private First Class Barry Winchell, 21, was attacked by another soldier while in his barracks on base during the early morning hours of July 5. Winchell died at a hospital the next day.

Both groups say they have received "numerous calls" alleging that Winchell was murdered due to his sexual orientation.

Court Rules that Partners Have Parental Rights Too

Boston, MA – Gays and Lesbians who help their partners raise a child have visitation rights after the couple breaks up, said the Massachusetts Supreme Judicial Court.

The court ruled on a suit filed by a Lesbian who had helped her former partner raise her son. The Justices said the woman was a "de facto" parent of the child and is entitled to parental rights under the law.

"It is to be expected that children of nontraditional families, like other children, form parent relationships with both parents, whether those parents are legal or de facto," Justice Ruth Abrams wrote for the fourmember majority.

In a sharply worded dissent, Justice Charles Fried said the court was taking an unwarranted step towards endorsing samesex marriages.

Mormons Weigh In California Marriage Battle

San Francisco, CA – The Mormon Church has quietly instructed its 750,000 California adherents to support the anti-same sex marriage Knight Initiative during California's March 2000 Presidential primary.

The instruction came in a letter read at services throughout the state during the last two weekends in May. The letter urged California Mormons to "do all you can by donating your means and time to assure a successful vote" on the March 2000 ballot measure..."

Dan Rascom, a Mormon Church spokesman, said the letter had the approval of the highest authorities in the church. He added that Mormons should consider it "inspired and coming from the Lord."

The letter raises questions about the church's role in the political arena. Like other churches, the Mormons enjoy tax exempt status. Federal law prohibits tax exempt groups from becoming overtly involved in politics. The Mormons donated \$1 million in support of last fall's anti-same sex marriage referendums in Alaska and Hawaii. Both of those ballot measures passed by a wide margin.

The letter created calls for the Internal Revenue Service to investigate whether it should rescind the Mormon's tax-exempt status. Church authorities said they were not concerned about an IRS investigation. "This is a moral issue, not a political issue," said Rascom.

Last month, the IRS revoked the taxexempt status of the Christian Coalition due to its involvement in partisan campaigns.

Students Sue to Get Gay Group

Manchester, NH – The Union Leader reports that a group of West High School students is suing the School Board to gain recognition of a Gay Straight Alliance group.

One West High graduate joined two students in the federal court suit. The suit uses a 1984 federal law written after extracurricular religious groups were denied access to schools. "This is a very clear-cut violation of federal law," said Jennifer L. Levi of the Gay & Lesbian Advocates & Defenders, which is representing the students. "As long as there are noncircular clubs at a high school, which is not in dispute in this case, no student group may be treated differently based on the content of speech at proposed meetings.

While the suit proceeds, the Manchester School Board is considering a request to allow the group to meet at the High School. The lawsuit was filed Friday in Concord.

West High Principal Robert A. Baines told *The Union Leader* that he disagreed with the suit. "Anybody can go to court," Baines said last night. "I don't think there's any basis for any court action because we've handled it responsibly, the way people in this community would expect us to handle it."

Baines denied the group's request for recognition. The lawsuit says that school officials told the students to take the issue to, the school board, something other extracurricular groups are not required to do.

Milwaukee TV Station Removes Web Link and Apologizes

Milwaukee - Following the trail left by an email about a story run by a local TV station, Wisconsin Light was led to an anti-Gay Internet website and an apology from Milwaukee's

WTMJ Channel 4 television station.



The email, received by Wisconsin Light on Wednesday, July 7, contained a news article from WTMJ's website. The article said that Wisconsin Christians United (WCU) had mounted an ad campaign in opposition to Milwaukee's

Domestic Partnership ordinance, but it gave no details about the campaign. The email included a link to a page on the WTMJ website. That page included the article and other news stories covered by the station.

Just below the article was a link to the WCU website. A check of that link showed that nearly the entire site was devoted to anti-

Gay articles and statements.

Referring to PrideFest, one WCU page said, "The entire event was enough to make any sane man sick to his stomach after viewing the line-up of individuals as they marched past flaunting their perversion. PrideFest participants once more publicly proved that mankind can base themselves lower than the four footed beasts of the earth."

Other pages purported to show the "facts" about homosexuality. One said 27% to 33% of Gay men engage in "painful and violent sex," and that 17% of Lesbians indulge in

Sadomasochism. Other claims contained within the site included statements that Gays and Lesbians are more likely to molest children than heterosexuals are, and that they are more violence prone as well. One page used a graph to "show" that the average life span for Gay men is 42 years.

Wisconsin Light contacted WTMJ with questions about both the news item and the link to the Wisconsin Christians United site. Three WTMJ employees, including the web master for the site, were unable to provide any information on the story or the link to the WCU site.

Mary Alice Tierny, a spokeswoman for WTMJ called Wisconsin Light the following day. Tierny said the page containing the story and the link was no longer on the WTMJ site.

With regard to the WCU link, Tierney said, "When we put stories on our website, we try as often as possible to include a link. That gives the reader a chance to get a perspective and more information on a story. That's generally speaking how we operate. As a reader, you can find out more about these people, what they say, and how they say it."

Tierney said the page with the story and the link was added to the Channel 4 site over the holiday weekend when fewer staff members were on hand. "If we do a story about an organization and they have a web site, it's our policy to put a link to their site with the story. This was not intended to be an endorsement," she said.

In fact, there was a disclaimer above the Wisconsin Christians United link. It said that the station was not responsible for the content of the site.

Wisconsin Light asked if the station would link its site to groups that preach anti-Semitism or racial superiority, such as the Ku Klux Klan or the Aryan Christian Nation.

Tierney responded, "The bottom line is this. We want all our viewers to find our website as a usable and comfortable place to come. Clearly by putting this link in we offended some people in our community, and we are very, very sorry.

UW-Parkside to Offer LGBT Study Course

Gay Bashings at Summerfest?

Milwaukee - The Wisconsin Light received reports of two anti-Gay incidents that occurred during the last weekend of Summerfest.

On Saturday, July 3, two Lesbians reportedly told other customers at the LGBT owned Annex cafe that a group chased them off the Summerfest grounds earlier that evening.

Dominique Moses told the Light that on Sunday, July 4, she observed a group of men beating a man who was wearing a Gay pride T-shirt. The beating took place on the Summerfest grounds outside of the Pepsi stage area around 11:45pm.

Moses said the man was wearing a Gay pride shirt. "Some guy saw it, and all of the sudden like ten guys started beating up on him," she reported. Moses said the victim might have brushed up against one of the men who beat him before the attack.

She also said that "a bunch of people" were watching the beating and did nothing to intervene. Moses said Summerfest security appeared on the scene "a few seconds" after the victim had broken away from his attackers. "He took off the shirt and ran away," said Moses. "Then some guy said, 'There's your Gay pride for you."

She added that after the incident, some people in the crowd cheered. "They were all giving each other handshakes and stuff like that," said Moses. Unfortunately, she didn't know what action the festival security took, because she and her companion left the area due to concerns

Patrice Harris, a spokeswoman for Summerfest, told the Light that the festival had no record of the beating incident. She said the lack of a victim would have made it difficult for the festival's security to act.

Harris was emphatic is stating that Gays and Lesbians are welcome at Summerfest. "We are a festival that is open to everyone. It's unfortunate when some people can't respect the rights of others."

'UW-Madison's 10% Society is being honored for work to increase awareness of LGBT issues in Madison. As a UW student group, the 10% Society works for a homophobia free campus. The group provides educational, cultural and social opportunities for UW students, faculty and staff. It organizes two weeklong LGBT awareness series, "Coming Out Week" and "Out and About," on the campus. In February, the 10% Society brought over 1,000 students to Madison for the annual Midwest LGBT College Student Conference.

Ally of the Year — Sandy Torkelson



Scherbert added that she objected to a paragraph of the ordinance, which was at the heart of the matter. That paragraph said the Council found that the City has in interest in recognizing LGBT relationships.

Brier was the object of an intensive lobbying campaign put forth by her LGBT Bay View constituents. Nevertheless, she announced that she would vote in opposition. Brier said she believed her constituents were against it.

In announcing his opposition, Schramm told the Council that while everyone has right to make "choices" in how to live their lives, he has the right to not to accept" those choices. Schramm warned the Council members about the political consequences of their vote. "April is coming up," he said in reference to next April's City elections.

Pawlinski said that his calls ran 15 to 1 against the proposal. He said the County and not the City should be taking up the issue.

Nardelli said he was concerned that those who register their relationship might suffer from discrimination since the registrations will be public record. He also said that he did not receive any phone calls in support of the Registry. Nardelli concluded by saying his constituents wanted him to vote against it and they elect him to represent their views.

The Aldermen speaking against the ordinance seemed to be trying not to alienate Gays Lesbians and their allies with their comments. That didn't matter to many who attended the meeting in support of the Registry. Several said they would remember the "No" votes in future elections.

Following the vote, Religious Right activist and West Allis resident, Bob Braun said that his group would sue to have courts void the ordinance. Braun told the local media that the ordinance is "unconstitutional."

After the vote, D'Amato told Light, "I could not be more proud of my colleagues for cutting through the mean spiritedness and the hatred of the opposition. They saw the light about the true purpose of this legislation, which is simply to extend to people the rights they deserve."

He added, "A year from now, the controversy will be forgotten and couples will register as a regular part of our daily lives without fanfare."

Downtown Alderman Paul Henningsen and Sherman Park Alderman George Butler co-sponsored the ordinance.

Henningsen told the *Light* "The ordinance is only fair and just and is actually a very limited effort to recognize the rights of all our citizens in our very diverse city."

Butler said, "I am glad it went the way it did. As large as our diverse city is, we have to be tolerant of the lifestyles of others. We can't walk around with blinders on all the time."

Wisconsin Light columnist Mike Fitzpatrick, President of Action Wisconsin, said "I certainly hope that the State's Joint Budget Conference Committee takes note of this vote, and eliminates the anti-Gay, anti-Family, anti-domestic partnership budget amendment passed by the State Assembly."

The vote climaxed one of the most intensive lobbying campaigns ever to come from Milwaukee's LGBT community and its allies. That campaign started with a May 3 Town Hall Meeting at Milwaukee's LGBT Community Center. Well over 100 people attended the meeting to discuss the D'Amato proposal. Most of them signed up to assist with the Milwaukee Domestic Partnership Task Force effort to get it through the Council and signed into law.

Among other activities, the Task Force distributed flyers, mailed updates, issued press releases and made hundreds of phone calls to drum up support. Task Force Co-Chair Patrick Flaherty told the *Light* "This a great day for our community which came together in a big way. Everyone has pitched in and it's so rewarding to see it pay off. This day belongs to all those Gay and Lesbian couples who have stuck it out for 10 or 20 years without any societal support."

Flaherty and other supporters argued that the ordinance was a matter of fairness. They contended the Registry would help those engaged in LGBT relationships to gain domestic partners benefits offered by their employers. Those benefits can include health insurance coverage, emergency family and medical leave, and discounts on products and services.

Opponents of the registry led by Ralph Ovadal's Wisconsin Christians United (WCU), were active as well. WCU, which is headquartered in Monroe, Wisconsin, distributed anti-Gay literature in a door-to-door campaign that targeted several Aldermen. It also paid for a radio ad campaign that urged opponents to contact the Council.

The WCU effort did generate some calls and letters. However, sources within the Common Council told *Light* that the majority of the opponents who contacted it were from outside the City.

Observers noted that at the June 22 Judiciary and Legislation Committee's public hearing on the Registry proposal, the vast majority of those testifying against the ordinance lived outside the City of Milwaukee.

During the hearing, supporters including clergy members, corporate representatives and citizens argued that the issue was a matter of fairness. Opponents quoted from the Bible and warned that it would lead to same-sex marriages.

The week before the vote, Alderman D'Amato told *Wisconsin Light* that he believed he had the "bare minimum" of votes to pass the proposal. "I am cautiously optimistic," he said. Nevertheless, the backers of the registry took no chances. As the vote approached, they kept up the pressure with phone calls.

While the Domestic Partnership ordinance is now law, the City Clerk will not be registering couples immediately. The ordinance takes affect September 1.

Gays and Lesbians won't have to wait that long to celebrate the establishment of the Registry. The Domestic Partners Task Force will hold a celebration party at the LGBT Community Center from 6pm to 8pm on Tuesday July 27.

The Mayor Calls the *Light*, Signs Ordinance

Mayor John Norquist has been viewed as a friend to Milwaukee's LGBT community. However, during most of the debate over the ordinance, the Mayor was publicly uncommitted on the issue.

His spokesman, Jeff Fleming, told the local media that the Mayor had an open mind on the question and wanted to hear from both sides. That caused some concern among the Registry's supporters.

The suspense ended on Thursday, July 8 when the Mayor and Fleming called Wisconsin Light Editor Bill Meunier to tell him that he would sign the ordinance.

"I support it, and I intend to sign it," said the Mayor. "I think it's reasonable. It doesn't get into the issue of expanding city benefits, which I think is an issue that has to be costed out. There's no cost to taxpayers. I think that couples who care to express their love for each other in a relationship should be able to do so."

The Mayor said he had not gotten many calls about the issue, but that most of those he had received supported the registry. He added, "I have had a lot of people talk to me about this. Except for Bob Braun (a Religious Right activist from West Allis), they have all urged me to support it."

The Mayor said that in thinking about the Registry, he thinks about lyrics of the Beach Boys song *Wouldn't It Be Nice*. When asked which part of the lyrics, the Mayor said, "The whole song." The lyrics are as follows:

Wouldn't it be nice if we were older Then we wouldn't have to wait so long And wouldn't it be nice to live together In the kind of world where we belong

You know its gonna make it that much better When we can say goodnight and stay together Wouldn't it be nice if we could wake up In the morning when the day is new And after having spent the day together Hold each other close the whole night through

Happy times together we've been spending I wish that every kiss was never ending Wouldn't it be nice

Maybe if we think and wish and hope and pray it might come true Baby then there wouldn't be a single thing we couldn't do We could be married And then we'd be happy

Wouldn't it be nice

You know it seems the more we talk about it It only makes it worse to live without it But let's talk about it Wouldn't it be nice

Mayor Norquist said that he would not be able to attend PrideFest this year due to a longplanned family vacation. "I will attend other events instead," he said. When asked who would sing *The Summerfest Polka* in his absence, the Mayor provided a good rendition of the song with great gusto over the phone.

While the Mayor didn't sing when he signed the Domestic Partnership Registry ordinance, the sound of his pen moving across the paper was music to the ears to Milwaukee's LGBT Community.

Questions and Answers about the Registry What Does the Ordinance Do?

The ordinance allows City of Milwaukee same sex couples to register their relationship with the City Clerk for a fee of \$30.

What are the advantages of registering? Registering couples will receive a certificate providing legal proof of their relationship. This can help them in getting domestic partnership benefits if their employer offers them. It can also make it easier to gain hospital visitation rights in the event of illness or an accident.

Who Can Register?

The Registry is open to same sex couples living in the City of Milwaukee. However, there are some limitations. Registrants must be at least 18 years of age, couples must not be related to the degree that would bar marriage in the State of Wisconsin, and registering couples must have *ONE* or more of the following:

- · Joint ownership of a car or truck
- · A joint bank or credit union account
- · A joint credit account
- · Joint ownership of a residence
- A current lease for a residence that identifies them as co-renters
- · Wills that name each other as primary beneficiaries

What If the Relationship ends?

The ordinance provides for termination of the registration by filing a notice with the City Clerk. Those terminating their registration cannot register a new relationship for a period of one year, unless the termination was due to a death or a legal marriage

CAPITOL REPORT

STATE BUDGET DEBATE

As I write this, we are in the midst of a "great" budget debate. It is not unlike watching sausage being made. Garbage in, garbage out and in between it's a grind.

We are still waiting to see how the end product turns out. One benefit of the process is that it clearly defines the ideals of the two parties. Anyone can easily identify which set of principles most reflects his or her own beliefs.

The Democrats were able to develop a budget that stands for basic human values such as health care, education, the environment, HIV programs, anti-smoking legislation, and protecting a woman's right to choose, while at the same time delivering tax relief.

Consider what the "compassionate" Republicans stand for and ask yourself if you would have a difficult time deciding whom to support in an election.

The Assembly Republicans passed a version of the budget bill that would:

- · Prohibit the state and its agencies from providing any domestic partners health care coverage and that bans domestic partnership coverage from even being discussed during collective bargaining negotiations.
- · End coverage for HIV drug prescriptions, mammograms, kidney disease, diabetes and maternity care, among other things, from the small business health insurance program
- Cut AIDS service funding by \$61,300
- · Close Mazo Beach
- Kill the state recycling program
- · Cut funding for anti-smoking programs in
- · Cut funding by \$3.7 million dollars for grants to community, migrant and homeless health centers
- · Reject federal funding for the Supreme Court child abuse prevention program (the only state to do so)
- · Cut the "percent for the Arts" program by
- · Eliminate the \$750,000 down payment on campaign finance reform
- · Eliminate all funding for family planning services provided by the Department of Health and Family Services

The Assembly's Democratic version of the budget included all of these programs. It also had a larger property tax break package than the Republican plan does.

While they decimated these needed programs, the Republicans provided a \$13.5 million tax break for corporations. That corporate tax break will increase to \$80 million within four years. That is 13% of the total amount of corporate taxes collected by the State of Wisconsin, which already has the second lowest corporate tax rate in the nation.

It comes down to priorities. If you care about health, education, individual rights, campaign finance reform, AIDS funding, the elderly, the poor and tax breaks, you will like the Democrat's plan. If your vision is so myopic that you only care about tax breaks for yourself and big business; you support the Republican's plan.

Remember these issues when the next election rolls around. We need your support so the Democrats can gain 5 seats in the Assembly in November of 2000 and return it to the ideals of the majority of Wisconsin's citizens:

Help our elderly, poor and homeless, protect the rights of the LGBT community, educate our youth, protect a woman's right to choose and provide for property and renters

I read with bewilderment, Jim McFarland's From the Right column in the June 23 issue of Wisconsin Light. In it, he discussed his conundrum about who he would have supported if Ron Greer had won the Second congressional district's GOP primary and thus opposed Tammy Baldwin in the general election.

Do you support someone who wants to treat you as a criminal because of who you love, eradicate your constitutional rights, distributes anti-Gay publications in the work place and believes that you do not deserve equal protection under the law? Or do you support the State's first openly elected Lesbian lawmaker?

Mr. McFarland seemed concerned about LGBT issues, but after all Greer would have been for tax cuts. Pleeeease!

Upon further reflection, I realized that this is the mindset of many Republicans. They believe that money is more important than basic rights, freedom, and caring for your fellow human. Greer or Baldwin? Yikes!

DOMESTIC PARTNERSHIPS: ONE STEP FORWARD TWO STEPS BACK?

ONE-STEP FORWARD: Congratulations to everyone in Milwaukee who worked on the Domestic Partnership Registry.

Milwaukee joins Madison as the only places in Wisconsin where LGBT couples can gain recognition of their relationships.

TWO STEPS BACK? Representative Steven Nass (R- Whitewater) offered an amendment to the budget which would prohibit State money from being used to provide benefits to Domestic Partners of State Employees and would prohibit this issue from being used in collective bargaining. The Assembly Republicans supported it without opposition.

To date the Conference Committee, which is hashing out a compromise between the Senate and Assembly versions of the budget, has yet to remove this provision. I am hopeful that with the leadership of Senator Chuck Chvala (D - Madison) the amendment will be removed.

Dear Editor:

The "quality of life" campaign of Milwaukee Police Chief Arthur Jones is currently being criticized as being too extreme.

Extremism on Jones's part should not come as a surprise to anyone who knows anything about him. Consider the case of men being arrested in our parks for alleged lewd and lascivious behavior. In a recent newspaper interview, Chief Jones was asked about such arrests. His reply was, "The law is clear as it relates to disorderly conduct in a public place or lewd and lascivious conduct in a public place."

The law may be clear to some, but not to Jones who is stretching it beyond its intent. The particular Wisconsin Statute on lewd and lascivious behavior (944.20) defines the offense as a sexual act "with the knowledge that they are in the presence of others," or as "publicly and indecently expos[ing] genitals."

According to notes in the statute, "publicly" is dangerously over-broad wording, and the application of the statue should be limited to "constitutionally permissible goals of protecting children from exposure to obscenity and preventing assaults on sensibilities of unwilling adults in public."

Now how does that very clear wording of the statute square with Chief Jones's use of night vision equipment to patrol the bushes of Juneau Park at midnight? Of course, Jones's abuse doesn't square with the statute. People in the dark of the bushes at midnight don't know if they're in the presence of others because nobody can see anybody. There are no children in the bushes at midnight, and if you have to use night vision equipment to see what's going on, it's obvious that any adults are not "unwillingly" going to see something to offend them.

Chief Jones has demonstrated that he doesn't know what the law is in the case of our county parks, and there's no reason to believe he knows it in any other areas either. So much for his concept of "quality of life." He is, in fact, abusing the law and misusing it as an instrument of persecution.



HIV and AIDS are widespread throughout sub-Saharan Africa. AGOA would force the governments to comply with inhumane International Monetary Fund regulations. Foreign debt repayment would have priority over life-saving health care and educational initiatives.


We prefer the fair trade alternative, the HOPE for Africa Act (H.R. 772) authored by Rep. Jesse Jackson, Jr. (D-IL). It attacks the AIDS epidemic through a combination of aid, debt relief and policies increasing the availability of life-extending medications to sub-Saharan Africans with HIV/AIDS.

Rep. Tammy Baldwin is a co-sponsor, and this bill deserves Rep. Barrett's support.

Conversations with the Cast of American Pie

Beverly Hills, CA – Not too often does a film come along that is destined to take its place in movie history as a bonafide hit, such as American Pie. And not too often is a film, which is expected to rake in megabucks, released by a major studio without star power. In fact, the only somewhat recent films that come to my mind that have made money without big name stars are Steven Spielberg fantasies, i.e. E.T. and Jurassic Park.

Nearly 20 years ago, however, there was a little film called *Porky's*, which no one expected to make it big. Not only did it make it big, *Porky's* went on to gross, in the United States alone, over \$130 million. There were no big name stars, no big name director, no spectacular special effects. Actually, there was a lot of raunchy humor and juvenile antics: high school boys sticking their penises into holes they carved out adjacent to the girl's locker room, etc., etc.

American Pie begins where Porky's left off: no big name stars, no big name director — just a script laden with bathroom humor and sex and a cast of teenage unknowns. All of them, however, are easy on the eyes, very easy.

Somewhat reminiscent, at least in the vulgarity category, of last summer's *There's Something About Mary, American Pie* exposes us all to nine of the hottest teens, — boys and girls, — at an 'all-American' high school, devoid, of course, of any minorities, including Gays.


Recently, I had a chance to sit down with all nine stars (separately) and talk to them about their roles in the film, which is destined to become a 'classic.' How many other films are there where kids can relate to 'fucking' an Apple Pie? (I, of course, tried a cantaloupe at age 15, or so, after being told that it was the 'best' feeling.)

I spent 20 minutes with each of the major players in the film. I found Seann William Scott (who plays Stifler), Chris Klein (who plays Oz) and Jason Biggs (Jim) to be the most interest-

ing and, okay, I admit it, the cutest. H o w

either the plumbing department guy or the kitchen appliances man? You know the type: perfect teeth, perfect coif, perfect jaw line, perfect face, a perfect body and, of course, the perfect age: between 18 and 30. You get the picture.

Twenty two-year-old Seann William Scott, an up-and-coming (literally) actor grew up in a small Minnesota town where he enjoyed playing high school sports and going to the movies. He never expected to be cast in

"I worked at Home Depot for three years in LA after moving there f r o m



and kind of just fooled around with acting. I had a few small appearances on some of the most forgettable television shows," says Scott, smile beaming at least six inches across his beautiful face. "I collected carts in the parking lot and did a little bit of unloading of trucks before being promoted to the plumbing department."

He added, "One day, while eating lunch in the break room, I was reading the Los Angeles Times and came upon an ad for a casting call for 'Untitled Sex Comedy.'" Yes, that was the working name of American Pie before it got its name."

"I went to the audition never thinking I'd get a role in the film," said the devastatingly beautiful, blonde Scott. Not only did he get a role in the film, he got a big one and is well on his way to becoming a 'name' in Hollywood.

Scott has no reservations about the film's vulgarity or potential 'effect' on young kids who are going to all try to get into it. "If teens can 'do' X-rated things, and they all do," he says, "why can't they see an R-rated film?"

One of the funniest situations in *American Pie* involves Scott. During a party, he enters a bedroom with a significant other and picks up a cup, which appears to be full of beer. It does have beer in it, but it also has a load of cum. He drinks it and soon realizes that it was not 'just' beer.

Reflecting on the scene, he laughs. "I never knew cum tasted like egg whites." Egg whites, he says, are what were used in place of the real stuff.

Another hysterical scene, at the very beginning of the film, involves Jason Bigg's character and his sausage. Literally.

In the scene, we see 21-year-old Biggs covering his erect penis with a sock as his father walks into his bedroom. Not only is Biggs, the character, lucky enough to stuff an apple pie and a sock, but he also has sex with a foreign exchange student on the internet.

"The hard-on scene," says Biggs, "was very technical. They insisted on using a sausage, a warm sausage from the catering truck, under the sock," he says with a frown, maybe secretly wishing they had used his instead.

One must also take note that Biggs, one of the most pretty of the boys in the film, lost about 20 pounds since filming. Now he is in tiptop shape and happy to take his shirt off. "I lost all of my baby fat," he says laughing.

The \$11 million film (very cheap by Hollywood standards) also boasts Chris Klein, star of this past spring's sleeper hit *Election*.

Growing up in Nebraska and making it into movies (after bumping into *Election* director Alex Payne in a high school hallway) gives

Klein, who jokes about his parents still being happily married after 20 years, a reason to be happy. The stud of an actor, with a somewhat cocky personality, is one of American Pie's most intriguing.

At 20 years of age and a student at Texas C h r i s t i a n University, Klein is poised to make

it big. Confident, sexy, cool and young, the steady Klein has no regrets about having taken the roles he has in both *Election* and *American Pie*.

In American Pie, Klein plays the lacrosse player/singer. As he did in Election, Klein steals every scene he is in. We all remember the scene in Election in which he is lying in bed

and praying, thanking God 'for what I am told is an incredibly large penis.'



Ah, to be in New York City in the summer of 1977. The economy slumping, the crime rate sky-rocketing, a major blackout occurs resulting in rioting and looting, the temperatures soar above 100 degrees, and there's a serial killer afoot — David Berkowitz, the "Son of Sam."

It's a terrific setting for a movie, and Director Spike Lee chose it for this convincing cultural exploration. *Summer of Sam* explores '70s pop culture and how paranoia, fueled by random murders, illuminated the worst aspects of human nature. Like *Boogie Nights*, this picture delves beneath the facade of glamour that was the Disco Era and discovers a hollow, rotten core.

The film focuses on a small group of Italian-Americans in "da Bronx." There's Vinny (sexy John Leguizamo), the slick Travolta wannabe, married to lovely Dionna (Mira Sorvino). Ritchie (Adrien Brody), Vinny's closest friend, adopts a Punk persona completely at odds with the neighborhood disco kings. He's scorned for dating Ruby (Jennifer Esposito), the local slut, and for working as an exotic dancer at a local Gay club. Other players include Luigi (Ben Gazarra), the local Mafioso; Gloria (Bebe Neuwirth), Vinny's oversexed boss at the hair salon; and Berkowitz himself (Michael Badalucco).

While many of the characters are too often stereotyped, these limitations in characterization are at least partially overcome by strong acting. In particular, Leguizamo, Sorvino and Brody give strong portrayals of their characters.

As the film progresses, tension builds, the heat intensifies and paranoia escalates in Vinny's neighborhood. After dark, the streets are empty and so are the discos. For anyone appearing a little "abnormal," like Ritchie, one wrong move can make them a suspect and target. Although essentially a period piece, *Summer of Sam* works better as an examination of how the need to assign blame can result in grave injustices.

There's an edginess to the film that makes watching it an unsettling experience, opening a window on the '70s that juxtaposes pop culture references with something dark and monstrous. The result, while not wholly successful, is compelling and disturbing.

OUT in the the the Miss Saigon

Are a large cast, lavish sets and costumes, and eye-popping visuals enough to create a successful musical? Of course not. You also need decent acting, fine voices, an interesting plot and memorable tunes. Boublil and Shoenberg's *Miss Saigon*, currently showing at Milwaukee's Uihlein Hall, partially succeeds in reaching those goals.

The plot is conventional and derivative of the Puccini opera, *Madame Butterfly*. American man falls in love with Oriental woman. They are separated. He moves on with his life, she spends years faithfully awaiting his return. Finally, reunion ends tragically for all involved.

What Miss Saigon really needs to overcome predictability and survive comparison to Puccini is only partially supplied. The set design, costuming and lighting are all in good order, combining forces to make sure there's always something interesting to look at. It also needs good acting from a strong cast. That it more or less provides, too.

But in terms of voices, unfortunately one of the weakest is that of the title character. Kim Hoy, while decently conveying fragility and vulnerability, also has a somewhat brittle voice. She's often lost in duets or ensemble numbers or simply overwhelmed by the orchestra. On the other hand, Greg Stone (as the GI male lead, Chris) has a marvelously cultivated singing voice, which easily communicates.

Miss Saigon lacks good songs. There are long passages of uninteresting music. Once the final curtain has fallen, you're at a loss to hum a single tune. Even so, the orchestra and sound design do their best with the material, such as it is.

A high note is struck by Joseph Anthony Foronda, who portrays the pimp and club owner, "The Engineer." He steals the show with his wily characterization, becoming in essence the glue that holds *Miss Saigon* together. His theme song, *The American Dream*, effectively displays his lust for fortune, fame and passage to the States. Foronda's portrayal is convincing and entertaining, avoiding the pitfalls inherent to such a role.

Miss Saigon in the end is much like other modern musicals. You go home praising so much of what you saw, but so little of what you heard.





The Brandon Teena Story

Ask anyone if they know of a brutal homophobic murder and chances are they will mention Matthew Shepard and perhaps Billy Jack Gaither. Few will utter the words "Brandon Teena."

That may change after Cinemax presents The Brandon Teena Story, a critically acclaimed documentary that reviews the

events surrounding the 1993 Nebraska slaying of the female to male Transgendered individual. The film will begin airing on Cinemax at 9pm on July 26.

Filmmakers Susan Muska and Greta Olafsdottir do a masterful job in using *The Brandon*

Teena Story to raise issues that many if not most Americans would rather not think about. The treatment of members of the LGBT community, the role of the sexes, how rape is viewed and used, and how hatred can drive some of us to unspeakable acts are all brought to the forefront by the film.

Brandon Teena was a female-bodied 20year-old who passed as a man without surgery or hormone treatments. Late in 1993, he moved to from Lincoln Nebraska to Falls City. For two weeks, everything went well. Brandon

> found new friends and even acquired a girlfriend, Lana.

Then things went terribly wrong. Two of Teena's male friends, John Lotter and Marvin Thomas Nissen, discovered his "secret." To make matters worse, Lotter was Lana's former boyfriend.

He and Nissen responded to Lana's continued affection for her new boyfriend by beating and raping Teena.

When Teena tried to press charges against

the men, he was met with ridicule and abuse from the local Sheriff. The men remained free. A frightened Teena and a friend, Phillip De Vine, 22, fled to the Humboldt farm house

where another friend, Lisa Lambert, 24, lived with her nine-month-old son, Tanner.

Hours later, Lotter and Nissen broke into the house. Within a few seconds, shots rang out. Within a few minutes, Teena, De Vine and Lambert would all die. Only Tanner was spared by the killers.

The next day, Lambert's mother discovered the bodies and her crying grandson. This time the Sheriff responded. Lotter and Nissen were quickly taken into custody. Both confessed to the crime. Lotter is awaiting execution on Nebraska's death row. Nissen is serving a sentence of life in prison without the possibility of parole. He received that sentence in return for pleading guilty to the murders and testifying against Lotter.

Called "Riveting... A sobering, downright shocking look at homophobia" by the New York Times, the award winning Brandon Teena Story is more than a documentary about a murder. It takes a hard look at Brandon Teena, his friends, his killers and the people who could have prevented the tragedy that befell him. It also brings out attitudes shared by many Americans who have never heard of Falls Church or Brandon Teena.

We learn that Lotter and Nissen felt

deceived when they learned that their friend Brandon was not all that he appeared to be. We find out that the local sheriff was so abusive when Teena tried to press charges for the

rape and attack that even his deputy was offended.

We find that despite the horrible murders, the two women Brandon Teena knew best, Lana and Lotter's sister, Michelle, were branded as "Dykes" and "Lesbians" by the locals.

Was the rape a way of showing Teena that, although Lana preferred him to Lotter, he was "still a woman?" Why despite the clear signs that Lotter and Nissen were out of control didn't their family and friends reign them in before it was too late? Could anyone have prevented the murders? Was the whole thing just an isolated incident in small town America?

Through a series of interviews with the killers, their family members and others, *The Brandon Teena Story* raises these and other questions. It is up the viewer to look for the answers. In posing those questions, Muska and Olafsdottir make it clear that they could be easily modified and asked of other people in other situations in towns and cities around America.

The Brandon Teena Story makes it painfully evident that while Brandon Teena is dead and his killers are in prison, the root cause of his murder remains alive and well in Falls Church and elsewhere in America.



Milwaukee – Through July 24, the Milwaukee Institute of Art and Design (MIAD) in its Fredrick Layton gallery is hosting Photoflexion II: The Masters. Featuring mostly male subjects, Photoflexion offers a look at the history of body building, from the turn of the century through the present day, via compelling photography. The subjects are often nude, as seen through the eyes of a variety of photographers.

For centuries, people have labored to achieve the ideal body. The standard for physical perfection has changed over time, influencing fitness, fashion, social mores and art. Body building glorifies this ageless pursuit, creating living sculptures of strength and grace. Photoflexion captures this idealization of the human body through stunning photography drawn largely from the collections of the Doan Family and the Doan Family Foundation, Inc.

."The selected works explore the changing cultural perceptions of the ideal body and how photographers have used the human figure

over the past century," said curator William S. Doan, secretary of the Foundation.

"Photoflexion also shows the way in which photography has interacted with older traditions of the fine arts."

The first Photoflexion exhibit toured the country in limited appearances in 1981. This new exhibition features recent acquisitions to the Doan collection and contemporary works on loan.

The photographs include those by Professor Desbonnet in his first major showing

in U.S. galleries, and works by Don Whitman, Al Urban, Jr. and Charles Tillman, Jr. The exhibit also includes the work of well-known photog-

> raphers Tom Bianchi, Bruce Bellas, Douglas Kent Hall and Chicago's openly Gay photojournalistic artist Israel Wright.

> The Doan foundation commissioned Wright to photograph Cornell Walker and other bodybuilders in Chicago's South and West sides. State-of-the-art large format ink jet printing for original photographs was utilized to create the prints of Wright's images.

The Milwaukee Journal Sentinel art critic, James Auer, called the exhibit "racially diverse, historically important, occasionally explicit and really a rather peculiar touring show."

Body building as performance art began at the 1892 Chicago Exhibition when master showman Florenz Ziegfield introduced muscleman Eugene Sandow to a world-wide a u d i e n c e . Photography, still a relatively new process, was the perfect medium to capture and popularize the sport.

Over the next century, the visual mass media helped body-builders such as Charles Atlas, Steve Reeves and A r n o l d Schwarzenagger establish careers through commer-

cial endorsements, fitness courses and films.

That does not mean that photographers of male body builders found their work to be universally accepted. In the 1950s and '60s, they often found themselves under arrest or

The Photoflexion II exhibit should be of great interest to anyone who is interested in the male form as a work of art. It is also interesting from a Gay historical perspective. Men's Health, body building magazines and the infamous Athletic Model Guild, all of which had a large homophile readership, published photos of bodybuilders in casual nude or scantily clad poses. Censorship made these publications the only source of homo-erotica in the 1940s through early '60s.

Photoflexion II: The Masters is in the Frederick Layton Gallery of MIAD, 273 E. Erie Street, through July 24. The gallery, which is open to the public, offers free admission and is handicap accessible. Gallery tours are available Tuesday through Saturday from 10am to 5pm. 
banned from showing studies of nude male bodybuilders. Several of those contraband photos appear in the exhibit.

In a Shepherd Express Metro review, R.M.

Ryan commented, "This exhibit probably sets a record for having the most square inches of full-frontal male nudity ever to appear in a respectable Milwaukee venue." Ryan described the style of images as "generally pictures men in swimming suits showing off their muscles. The other images... are homoerotic pictures of men wearing stringheld pouches to both cover and accent their genitals or pictures of nude men, often with their penises just as poised as their biceps."

The poses and idealized forms of body building personify the ancient images of gods and heroes. Several of the photographs in the exhibition reflect the influence of classical figure studies, such as Michael Harwood's juxtaposition of a bodybuilder with a mythological sculpture.

Female bodybuilders also appear in the exhibit, although they are in smaller numbers than their male counterparts. Bulging muscles rarely appear in images of women through the ages, which have fluctuated between attenuated gothic figures





Speaking of hysterical, that's what the editor will be if I don't wrap this up. I hope to see you out and about soon. Meanwhile, stay safe and be proud.


