





Phelps Clan Provokes Canadian Ire

Ottawa, Ontario — A small group of American anti-Gay protestors provoked a firestorm when they burned the Canadian flag to protest a Canadian Supreme Court's ruling that gave LGBT couples the same rights accorded to unmarried straight couples.

The group, members of Fred Phelp's Westboro Baptist church, appeared outside the Supreme Court building to hold a demonstration. They sang a distorted version of the Canadian national anthem, spoke out against homosexuality and then burned the flag. A police officer guarding the group admitted that he had to tell the group how to burn the flag. He said he did so in the interests of public safety, but was "disgusted" by the protestors.

Phelps' daughter, Margie, who led the group, pronounced the demonstration "a success." Five of the ten protestors are related to Phelps.

The incident provoked an outcry in the Canadian media and renewed calls for legislation to outlaw flag burning in Canada. As the demonstration began, a passer by shouted at the group, "Get the hell out of our country, bastards — who the hell do you think you are?" Mounties on the scene kept the man away from the protestors.

NJ Supreme Court Strikes Down Boy Scout Ban

New York - The Lambda Legal Defense and Education Fund announced a major win in its effort to force the Boy Scouts of America to accept homosexuals. The New Jersey Supreme Court unanimously ruled that the Boy Scouts couldn't discriminate because of sexual orientation. The decision marks the first time a State's highest court has ruled against the policy.

The court said that as an organization that is non-selective in its membership and that receives substantial government support, the BSA could not claim an exemption from the State's Gay civil rights law. In an 89 page opinion, Chief Justice Deborah T. Portiz wrote, "The human price of...bigotry has been enormous. At a most fundamental level, adherence to the principle of equality demands that our legal system protect the victims of invidious discrimination."

In a concurring opinion, Justice Alan Handler wrote that being Gay does not take away, "one's ability to participate in and contribute responsively and positively to society."

The case filed by Eagle Scout James Dale nine years ago appears headed for the US Supreme Court. The NJ court ruling does not apply to Wisconsin, but a Supreme Court ruling striking down the policy would.

Gaither Murderer Convicted

Rockford AL – Charles Butler was convicted of Capital Murder in connection with the brutal slaying of Billy Jack Gaither. Butler and an accomplice, Steven Mullins, lured Gaither to a remote location where they killed him.

The case attracted national attention. The news media and President Clinton condemned the slaying. It helped to prompt a renewed push for federal hate crime legislation that includes Gays and Lesbians.

During Butler's trial, Mullins testified that he and not Butler struck the fatal blows. Mullins said that he slashed Gaither's throat and then beat him with a tire iron. He also testified that Butler helped him with the attack.

Mullins said that he wanted Butler to help him because "he hates queers too." Butler's attorney, Billy Hill, contended that Mullins is a closeted homosexual who wanted to lure Butler into a sexual encounter with him and the victim.

Hill claimed that the murder occurred because Mullins was afraid Gaither would expose him. He called a string of witnesses who testified that despite Mullins' alleged homophobia, the skinhead had many Gay friends. One man testified that Mullins engaged in an oral sex act with him.

None of that mattered to the jury, which said that only the murder was relevant. Judge John Rochester sentenced Butler to life in prison without the possibility of parole. Prosecutors dropped their demand for the death penalty at the request of Gaither's family.

Robertson Got Paid Off

Atlanta – Christian Coalition founder Pat Robertson told CNN that he "laughed all the way to the bank" after his deal with the Bank of Scotland was scuttled due to remarks he made about Gays and Scotland.

The bank had hoped to market its services to Robertson's TV audience, but Robertson

publicly called Scotland "a land of darkness" where "homosexuals are riding high." A public outcry resulted from the remarks and the bank dropped the deal.

A bank source told Glasglow Daily Record and Sunday Mail that Robertson initially demanded \$150 million dollars to call off the deal. The sources told the paper that Robertson was paid \$3 million pounds (approximately \$4.8 million dollars).

The controversy spilled over and affected Robertson's other British business connection. Last month, the Laura Ashley Corporation forced him off its Board of Directors. There is no word on what if any compensation he received for leaving that position.

AIDS Audit Hoax

Washington, DC – Capitol Hill reports that Congresswoman Nancy Pelosi (D-CA) was the victim of a hoax when someone using her stationary circulated a letter demanding a General Accounting Office audit of federal AIDS spending. The prime suspects are members of the AIDS Accountability Council and ACT-UP San Francisco.

Both groups claim that the AIDS crisis is over. They contend that people are not dying from AIDS but from the drugs those with AIDS/HIV take. Last month the group took over an AIDS research office in Atlanta demanding that the researchers admit, "AIDS is a lie."

According to the group's press releases, the government is perpetuating the "AIDS lie" in order to help drug companies make more money.

Third Ward, Walker's Point Hit with Gay Posters

Milwaukee – A group decided to "decorate" buildings in the Historic Third Ward with pro-Gay posters in the early morning hours of Wednesday, August 4.



The vandals used wall-paper to affix their posters to windows, bricks and concrete.

The Wisconsin Light office, the LGBT Community Center and several South Second Street bars were also targeted.

Late in the afternoon, Wisconsin Light Editor Bill Meunier confronted three persons who had just placed additional posters on the Wisconsin Light office and several other buildings. Among those posters was one advertising a Lesbian Avenger meeting. The group fled when Meunier left to call the Police.

On Thursday, a spokeswoman for the Historic Third Ward said that area business owners were speculating that the vandalism was caused by Religious Right Christians who were trying to make the LGBT community look bad. The Association declined comment when Wisconsin Light contacted it on Monday, August 9.

That same day, Bob Schmidt, owner of the M&M Club, told *Light* that the culprits had been identified and that over ten businesses were planning to press charges.

Guernsey Gala Tally Nearly \$18,000

Green Bay — An overflow crowd at Buddies saw host bar contestant Hope claim the crown as head heifer in the 8th Annual Gay Guernsey Gala on Saturday, August 7. The month-long, "dollar-a-vote" benefit pageant raised just under \$18,000 for area programs and services of the AIDS Resource Center of Wisconsin.

Gala founder, chief promoter and show hostess Elsie Bovine announced that Guernsey contestants had raised \$17,868. The total is a 49% increase over last year's pageant. Donations received by performers during the show were not included in the announced total.

Hope tallied \$9,323 to take the title. Katrina Kaye, representing Napalese Lounge, was first runner up with \$5,040. Second runner up, Kelli Jo Klein of Brandy's II, collected \$1,260.

"I am absolutely stunned!" Bovine said. "Even with one week less to raise money this year, the contestants just out did themselves."

Sharon Beckers received the second annual Gay Community Choice Award during the pageant.

Beckers has been active in the LGBT community since the '70s. She is known for her many acts of personal generosity. She is also a singer/composer and has lent her musical talents to benefit shows for over two decades.

A group of area LGBT business owners and professionals created the award to recognize "unsung heroes" in the Green Bay Gay community.

ARCW will use the funds raised by the Guernsey Gala for services to clients and for prevention programs in the Green Bay area. 56% of the clients served by the northeast region of ARCW reside in Brown County.

Baldwin Calls for Hate Crimes Law

Washington - Congresswoman Tammy Baldwin (D-WI) urged the House of Representatives to approve legislation she co-sponsored to extend federal hate crime protections to cover gender, sexual orientation and disability.

"Passage of this act is going to be important on both a substantive and symbolic basis," Baldwin said at a news conference. "We need Congress to enunciate clearly that hate-based violence targeted against women, Gays and Lesbians and people with disabilities is wrong."

The House Judiciary Committee is considering the bill that Baldwin is co-sponsoring. Rep. Sheila Jackson-Lee (D-TX) is the main sponsor of the bill.

"Too much of what we do conveys the message that we don't believe in equality for all," said Baldwin, the first open Lesbian in Congress.

According to the State Attorney General's office, Wisconsin reported 54 hate crimes in 1998 and 58 in 1997.

"I have to believe that hate is motivated in

part by fear," Baldwin said. "And it's absolutely essential for that reason that Congress speak out loudly and clearly that it is wrong."

Madison Queer History Project

Madison – We all know what happened at Stonewall. It's an important part of Gay history. But what about Madison's Gay history? How did the Gay community become such a prominent part of the community at large? What events or people shaped our community? On July 18, a small group of people held the first meeting of the Madison Queer History Project. This small meeting was the first step in what hopefully will someday be a historical archive of the Madison Gay community.

The next important step in the process of documenting our legacy is to organize a structure for this project. This will be done by setting up a mission statement, charter and by-laws for this newly formed organization. The immediate short-term goal is to incorporate as a non-profit organization.



vendors provided those in attendance with a good variety of offerings.


PrideFest The Parade was the biggest yet, as over 64 units took the streets of downtown Milwaukee in a colorful display of LGBT pride. PrideFest '99 also included additional activities such as the very popular hugs provided by members of P-FLAG.

What PrideFest was lacking, however, was customers. According to Volunteer Coordinator and Marketing Director, Susan Cook, attendance at PrideFest '99 was 13,700. Last year's attendance was 14,744. Cook felt that a light rain on Saturday afternoon was responsible for the drop. Two years ago, the festival confronted two days of rainy weather and attracted around 12,500 people.

The Possum Queen finale highlighted Friday night's festivities. The contest raised over \$41,000. The Tommy Polubinsky Memorial Award was for the first time presented to two winners. Wisconsin Light's Dear Ruthie and the Boot Camp's Bobby. The award is given to the individual(s) whose support for the contest and contributions to

the community are exemplary. A sparse crowd was on hand early Saturday afternoon.

The Light was the only Wisconsin publication with an entry in the parade, although Quest magazine owner Mark Mariucci arranged for a float from Rainbow Over Wisconsin.

The parade award winners by category were Decorated Car; First place - Backstage Productions: Second - Downtown Auto Body; Third - Brown Deer United Church of

drill team; Third - The Milwaukee Pride Band.


The best use of theme award went to Brandy's II. The Triangle bar won the Judges Choice award.

Being Ourselves

Have you ever kissed your lover in public, held their hand, comforted them or hugged them in celebration? Did self-consciousness erode the sensation? If you are any of a number of "non traditional" couples, chances are it has.

A few weeks ago, my partner and I held hands as we walked through Jazz in the Park on Cathedral Square. I saw several turn their heads in surprise. People in Milwaukee are not used to seeing same sex couples doing this. It is a simple, yet seemingly radical, act.

When I lived in San Francisco, you knew who the tourists were by who gave double takes at these public displays of affection. Everyone else was used to it. It was part of the fabric of society.

San Francisco, a beloved town to many, has been known by some as Sodom and Gomorrah West. That thought is so pervasive that my mother (God rest her soul), when visiting me there some years ago, suggested we name two newly acquired goldfish Sodom and Gomorrah. I guess she thought that would be cute. Ha, ha. Luckily for me, despite her inclinations and the guilt trips of some, she accepted me for who I was.

San Francisco is a special place. It is loved in every sector except by those who are stuck in old, worn out ideas. It is truly a melting pot city. It got that way by a lot of adversity, confrontation and just plain willingness to be different.

Perhaps the natural beauty of San Francisco's surroundings makes it easier to be more accepting of differences. I also have a theory that the steep hills, that always cause you to change altitude, keep you in such a state of change that you are willing to accept almost anything after a while.

Everyone should have a chance to live there. I feel blessed that for almost nine years I called it home. It was a place where I felt that no matter who I was, I could be exactly that.

There are a few other unique places where social strictures have loosened to allow for the truly fabulous feeling that all are accepted. It is rare and nice to find them. We could create that here.

A friend just returned from a month in Italy where she was studying architecture. Her partner couldn't go with her. She shared how painfully beautiful and romantic it was in Italy. The traditional village where she was staying was several centuries old. She was saddened by the thought that even if her partner had been there, they would not have felt comfortable expressing their feelings in public. All around her heterosexual couples were kissing and holding each other.

She was out for a hike in the countryside near where she was staying when she saw two women stealing a kiss. They stopped when they saw her. She wanted to say, "...it's okay, I'm one too!" I asked if they would feel comfortable here, and since her partner works in the school system, the answer was no.

Change has always been hard. Often it's born on the winds of violence. We don't want violence. Change can also be subtle, and it often requires overcoming that adrenaline rush that accompanies fear.

There is a lot of work to do if we are to create the society we want. Other groups who have demanded equality hearten me. The NAACP and Latino groups have protested the lack of representation of people of color on the network sitcoms for the fall. I wholeheartedly agree that the whole of society should be represented.

Although I am of European heritage, I cannot stand to see only "white" people reflected on TV shows. How boring! We also need to see more positive LGBT representation on the air-

waves

If we don't express ourselves in our true nature, how can we expect other people to ever accept us in our true nature? If the media doesn't represent us as we are, it will not be easy to get past the distortions of the past.

Be yourself. That has always been a radical act no matter who you are. There is a lot of pressure to conform to the dominant culture. It's not easy to show the world who you are, especially when it's so easy to "pass."

I have to admit that I also am a head-turner when I see a same gender or mixed race couple showing their affection in public. Unless it is in the context of a place where everyone does it or a safe and loving place, or people I know, it seems out of place.

I try to be discreet. I pray for them because I know that they are committing a radical act. They are changing the consciousness of society.

To the Editor,

We are writing to tell you about an experience we just had during Gay Pride weekend in Madison. We went with a group of friends. There were nine of us together in our little group. We all had the best time.

We got there Saturday around noon, checked into our hotel rooms and headed straight for the Picnic. We were all pretty amazed, as none of us had been to such an outing before. There were so many people, all of whom were nice and pleasant to be around. We ate good food, played games, laughed, talked and were silly.

Sunday morning, we all went to the Capitol building and listened to the speakers. All were quite interesting, and we learned a lot that day. One speaker stands out in our minds most of all, Tammy Baldwin. Her speech was powerful. It made us think about our rights and what we can do to make things happen for us as Lesbians and parents.

We marched down the streets of Madison to the park. We sang at the top of our lungs, chanted and even wiggled our butts. We had the best time. At the park, we mingled with Gay and Lesbian couples from all over. We listened to Kate Clinton, who by the way is just hysterical.

Soon it was time to pack up and head for home. All of us were feeling really good about ourselves. We stopped at Burger King for dinner. At this point our group was six womyn.

We walked into Burger King, just like any group of six people would do. As we entered the building, a young man behind the counter looked at us and said, "Ewwww, yuck. Lesbians."

At first we were inwardly angry and felt powerless, but then we remembered the speeches we had heard that day. We knew we did not have to take such comments from anyone. We took the boy's name, got the number of the Burger King we were in, ordered our food and sat down to eat.

Before we left Burger King, the Manager had fired the young man for his comments. On Monday morning, I (Trisha) called Burger King to file a formal complaint about the way we were treated. The man who took the complaint was very nice about the whole thing and said that he understood our concerns.

On Friday, July 23, we received a call from the Regional Manager for the Madison area Burger King. He apologized over and over and understood why we complained. He told us that the young man was in fact terminated. He also stated that all of the employees who worked at that Burger King would be attending a class on discrimination.

He stated we would receive a written letter of apology from the Corporate Offices of Burger King, which would send vouchers for all of our meals so that we might go to another Burger King and enjoy our meal that was ruined that Sunday.

I guess the real purpose of this story is to say that we can stand up for ourselves, be heard and get satisfaction. We do have rights, and it is time we all stood up and fought for them.

We are very proud of the difference we made with Burger-King, no matter how small it might seem. We are making a difference!



It's 7:35am on a Monday morning. Thousands of students around the state are waiting for the bell to ring out the start of a new school week. A good portion of them is queer.

For them, going to school is different. For them, it might be a struggle. They may be fighting to conceal who they are for fear of harassment. They may be struggling to hold back feelings they hold for someone, out of fear of what might happen if those feelings come out. No matter where we go to school, chances are that many of us are struggling.

That was the case for me. I went to a school where I already didn't fit in. I was one of only a few white students in one of the largest schools in Milwaukee. To be Gay — I was very open — made it harder.

I still remember the day I walked into school and saw "cock sucker" scrawled across my locker. I still think about the girl who took it upon herself to tell my entire English class that I had "a little sugar" in my tank.

I often reflect on the time I was ostracized in a sex education class for asking about anal sex between men, even though it was covered in the book. The day my driver's education teacher thanked someone for telling him I was "that way" still resonates in my mind.

Although I didn't have a perfect high school experience, I feel even worse knowing there were some who had to suffer more. By now, we all know about Jamie Nabozny and his story, but do you know the rest?

Do you know about the Riverside University High School Lesbian student who was mock raped in the boy's bathroom by students saying that they could make her straight? Did you know the Milwaukee Public School system expelled a Gay student because he verbally and physically confronted his harassers?

Are you aware of the young girl in middle school who committed suicide because of her inability to accept her sexuality? Let's not forget about the countless students who don't have to experience these things because they just dropped out, so they wouldn't have to deal with the abuse.

These are all horrible stories. What makes it even more unbearable is that there are supposed to be policies and procedures in place to protect these students.

Milwaukee Public Schools, the largest public school district in the state, has a Gay and Lesbian Advisory Committee. It's a group of teachers, community educators, parents and students, who work to make sure MPS is free from heterosexism, homophobia and harassment.

I've worked with the Committee for several years now, and I see the work they're doing. They go into schools to educate teachers on LGBT youth issues. The members explain that teachers can be held responsible for not stopping abuse or harassment when they know about it

Unfortunately, we know that this doesn't work. In most cases, we know that when an LGBT student is harassed, it isn't by a teacher or administrator, it's by another student. Although there are advantages to educating teachers on the students they work with, we have to educate the students on the lives of the people they go to school with.

PFLAG recently put billboards up saying "Someone you know and love is Gay or Lesbian." It's a great idea. While I was a student at Custer High School, we had a Gay-Straight Student Alliance. It put posters up throughout the school with basically the same message.

Although there was a lot of giggling in the cafeteria, overall it was a very productive project. The posters got the students and staff talking. Sure, there was a little bit of "they're talking about you" comments going around, but there were some "my best friend is Gay" comments, too.

Once the students realized that someone they knew and loved was Gay, the talking stopped. There was open discussion and support. Everyone realized that they probably did know someone who was Gay or Lesbian. At the beginning, a few posters were torn down. After a few weeks, they were a protected sight at Custer. It's been over a year now and a few of them still hang. That's an accomplishment.

In closing, I'd like to relay what a suburban school administrator at one of our workshops said to us: "There are no Gay students here." I think once we open the eyes of our teachers and principals and show them that not only are we there, but that we matter, we will finally start to make some progress. Only then will we be an important part of the student body. Only then will we have a voice.

qualities, or in this case faults, perfectly. It also costars Neve Campbell's older brother (albeit by only 18 months) Christian, a very cute thing, alongside newcomer J(ohn) P(aul) Pitoc.

Spelling plays the consummate fag hag to Campbell's character, a young NYC Theater composer, who is head over heels for J.P.'s character, a Gay stripper (with a body to die for).

I had a chance to speak to the two remarkably handsome stars of *Trick* recently, Campbell, more of an angelic looking preppy boy who could pass for Neve's twin, and J.P., handsome in the young, studly way. Body of death, rough, tough yet hot face.

Both were charming, insightful and eager to talk about what is, for both of them, their first film to make it to the big screen. Born in Toronto, Christian Campbell, who plays the cherubic Gabriel, got involved with *Trick* after Tori Spelling's name was attached. "I had no idea that *Trick* was going to be the Real McCoy," says Campbell, referring to Spelling's star power.

Campbell, who hails from an acting family, was born to a Scottish father and a mother from Amsterdam. "My parents came to the U.S. as immigrants before Neve and I were born and started a dinner theater," adds Christian. "So, acting is in my blood."

Add singing and dancing to his resume as well. Campbell is currently starring on stage in Hollywood in the hit *Reefer Madness*, which I had a chance to catch recently. It is hilarious and he shines brightly. He continues in the role through the end of October.

Very laid back and quiet, yet charismatic, Campbell explains how hard it was to film Trick.

"It was the hottest, stickiest summer that I have ever experienced," he explains of the shoot last year in New York City. "The studio we were shooting in was in Brooklyn and not air-conditioned. However, I must say that Jim (Fall, the director) did a spectacular job at creating a great mood on the set."

Many, actors and the public alike, have assumed that Tori Spelling is somewhat difficult to work with. Reputations sometimes precede actors. Campbell has something to offer about that assumption.

"J.P. and I pulled diva attitude long before Tori did. In fact, I can't even remember one instance when she complained about anything, J.P. and I were always complaining about how hot the set was," he says.

Pitoc is a native of New York City. His heritage is traced to South America on his father's side and Eastern Europe on his mother's. His parents met at an "English as a Second Language" class in NYC. He got his role in *Trick* by "dumb luck," he says.

"I was in a play in the East Village and got a call by the Director. He had been thumbing through HX Magazine (NYC's preeminent Gay rag) looking for a boy with both a great body and what he had hoped was the ability to act. Here I was in an ad in my underwear for the play I was in. He saw my body and was hopeful that since I was in a play, that I could act."

Pitoc, whose body is obviously a product of a lot of hard work, explains how it got to be in the shape it is in. "I'll tell you," he says. "I am

an obsessive, compuls type of guy, and I became addicted to working out. I was kind of a fat little kid. When I started working out and saw how much different I could look like, I kept at it. For three years, I worked out six days a week for hours at a time. In college, I got into boxing a n d kickboxing. Those two sports helped me get even bigger," he adds. Pitoc. at first, was hesitant about the role. "Well," he says, "It was a Gay movie, and I was to be the go-go Christian Campbell

and dance with a big bulge. I am a young actor and this was going to be my first movie. At first, though, I had no idea that it was going to be anything other than a small movie. I had no idea that it was destined to make it big at Sundance or that even Tori Spelling was going to be attached to it. When I found out that she was in it, I signed on right away."

Things look good for both stars of *Trick*. "Christian and I have gotten to know each other a lot better now since the film has been completed. We have become great friends," said Pitoc.

Offers have also been coming in for both actors.

"I have been auditioning in LA for the past couple of months," says Pitoc. "Things look good."

Things certainly look much better for Pitoc now. He almost never made it into acting, "I tried acting lessons when I was twelve, and I was terrible at them," he says. "It was in high school that I started doing plays and realizing that it was something I wanted to do as a career. Thank God for that ad in HX," he says, laughing.

The Thomas Crown Affair

The Thomas Crown Affair is a remake of a classic from 1968 featuring Steve McQueen and Faye Dunaway. Pierce Brosnan and co-star Rene Russo are comparing themselves to giants, to which they don't quite size up. Simply put, the Brosnan/Russo coupling can't generate the erotic tension ignited in the McQueen/Dunaway pairing of three decades ago. In particular, a 70-second

sex scene comes off as generic and uninteresting. We do get ample shots of Brosnan's nicely sculpted, hairy chest and a few shots of some cute buns (if they're really his) but other than that, the scene just drags.

Thomas Crown is a wealthy businessman who dabbles in art theft because it amuses him, not because he needs the money. With the help of hired henchmen, Thomas



masterminds the theft of a \$100 million Monet from New York's Metropolitan Museum of Art. Once he has the painting, he adds it to his private collection, never intending to sell it. Catherine Banning (Russo) represents the insurance company that stands to lose a lot of money if the painting isn't recovered. Working with Detective Michael McCann (Denis Leary), she quickly narrows the list of suspects to one – the right one. But Catherine gets a little too close trying to outsmart Crown and ends up falling for him.

The capers, which are more complex here than in the original, are fun as long as you don't think too deeply about the contrivances necessary to pull them off. Realism is not one of *The Thomas Crown Affair*'s strong points (it wasn't in '68, either). At least there's something of a trade-off: McQueen/Dunaway generating much more erotic tension; Brosnan/Russo being far superior in depicting the heists.

It goes without saying that those who are intrigued by the plot should rent the video of the '68 version in order to see the characters done fully right. This new interpretation does a few things better than the original and some things worse. All in all, this remake offers another argument for Hollywood to stop robbing its past and focus more on investing in new, intelligent screenplays.



Founded in 1972, the Lambda Legal Defense and Education Fund was the first legal advocacy organization devoted to the

advancement of LGBT civil rights. From its first case, a fight to gain tax-exempt status, to the present day, Lambda Legal Defense and Education Fund has been a key player in the LGBT civil rights movement.

"Lambda's casework establishes legal precedents that aid not only its clients, but the LGBT communities in which they live, and frequently the nation as a whole," said Roberts. "Our impact litigation strategy helps establish a foundation of civil rights for Lesbians, Gays and people with HIV/AIDS, which has positive and growing implications over time."

The Lambda Legal Defense and Education Fund is seen by many as one of the most essential organizations for America's LGBT community. Consider the

case of Jamie Nabozny, a Wisconsin teen who sued the Ashland School Board for failing to protect him from anti-LGBT harassment while he was a student.

The only alternative open to Nabozny and his parents was a lawsuit. No court had ever held school officials responsible for failing to stop abuse meted out by students. Arguing a case that, if successful, would set new case law requires an intensive amount of work. Nabozny and his parents did not have the resources to hire an attorney, who would put in the amount of time required.

Lambda provided the legal team and the expertise to help Nabozny win a precedent shattering decision that in essence said our schools must protect ALL of their students

Lambda is also working with the University of Wisconsin to defend the University's right to provide student fee money to LGBT organizations. In that case, four Christian Fundamentalist students are suing the University. They contend that it is improperly using their fees by giving a portion of them to groups they don't agree with.

Lambda has also defended the rights of those with HIV/AIDS. Its attorneys helped wage the battle to convince the U.S. Supreme Court to include those with HIV/AIDS under the terms of the American's With Disabilities

A big Lambda victory came last week when the New Jersey Supreme Court ruled

from abuse. Lambda's victory was more than a win for Jamie Nabozny. It was a victory for untold hundreds of thousands of LGBT stu-

Other students, often with Lambda's help, are filing suits that use the precedent established by the Nabozny case. The case heightened awareness of the problems faced by LGBT teens. From coast to coast, school officials put anti-harassment policies in place.

The Nabozny decision does not stand alone as a Lambda success story. In fact, it's impossible to think of an LGBT civil rights issue that Lambda did not take up with America's legal system. Perhaps its biggest win came in the case of Romer vs. Evans.

In that case, the U.S. Supreme Court threw out Colorado's Amendment 2 and for first the time declared Gays and Lesbians to be a legitimate minority group entitled to equal treatment under the law.

Lambda's efforts have broadened during its 27 years in existence. Cases like Nabozny's would have been unthinkable back in 1972. In the 1990s, they are routine.

In the 1990s, Lambda is also raising legal challenges to bans on same-sex marriages. Its briefs helped to convince the Supreme Courts of Alaska and Hawaii that such bans were illegal. The voters of those states amended their state constitutions to ban same-sex marriages.

As this is written, Lambda attorneys await a Vermont Supreme Court decision on the right of LGBT couples to marry. That decision may well legalize LGBT marriage in that state. Unlike Alaska and Hawaii, Vermont does not have a law that would allow right wing elements to place a constitutional amendment on the ballot.

If the Vermont Court rules in favor of LGBT marriage, it will open more courtroom battles. You can be sure that Lambda's lawyers will be in courtrooms around the country fighting to ensure that LGBT marriages performed in Vermont are recognized in other states and by the Federal govern-

that the Boy Scouts of America cannot discriminate against Gays. If upheld by the U.S. Supreme Court, the case could settle the long simmering feud between the Boy Scouts and the LGBT community.

The Boy Scouts, the right to get married, protecting LGBT teens from harassment, and fighting for Gay civil rights and are among the many reasons why a large crowd is expected to be on hand at the Astor on August 20.
