



LA Cop Sues George Michael

Los Angeles – A Beverly Hills undercover police officer, Marcelo Rodriguez, has filed a slander suit against pop music star George Michael. Rodriguez was the officer who arrested Michael for indecent exposure in a men's room at a local park.

h Rodriguez suit alleges that the former star of Wham! defamed him by repeatedly claiming that officer waved his genitals at Michael to get the singer to expose him-It also self. says that video music



Michael made "mocks" Rodriguez and portrays him as violating the law.

Rodriguez is asking for \$10 million in actual damages plus punitive damages, attorney costs and medical expenses. Michael told the press that although his attorneys advised him to settle the matter out of court, he would not offer Rodriguez "a dime."

Wake Forest U. Stifles Criticism of Anti-Gay Move

Raleigh, NC – The trustees of this private university stirred up a hornet's nest when they issued a decision banning the campus chapel from performing same-sex commitment ceremonies. The Board cited the university's historic Baptist tradition. Wake Forest was founded as a Baptist university but no longer has any official connections with that denomination.

The decision came in response to the Wait Chapel decision to allow a Lesbian couple to use its facilities for a commitment ceremony.

The campus newspaper, The Old Black and Gold, came out with a stinging editorial denouncing the decision. The paper said that two years ago, the Trustees ignored howls of protests from Baptists when it allowed alcohol sales at a campus coffee shop and wondered why Baptist tradition is being cited on this issue. The editorial called on the campus community to fight the decision.

Faced with mounting criticism, the University ordered the campus radio station to restrict its coverage of the matter to the school's official press release. The Raleigh News and Observer reports that Sandra

Boyette, Wake Forest Vice-President of Public Affairs, asked the station to confine its reporting to the official statement rejecting the ceremony so that the coverage would be unbiased.

The station is now asking for guidelines outlining its journalistic freedom. The chapel is expressing its disappointment, and the Lesbian couple is looking for a new site for their commitment ceremony.

Christians Sue to Avoid LGBT Ordinance

Louisville – In a move that could affect LGBT civil rights laws around the nation, the American Center for Law and Justice (ACLJ), a Religious Right legal foundation, is suing the City of Louisville over its LGBT civil rights ordinance.

The suit was filed on behalf of J. Barrett Hyman, M.D., a local doctor who says that his religious beliefs prevent him from complying with the new law. The suit says that Hyman's religious beliefs compel him to refuse employment to anyone he knows to be Lesbian, Bisexual, Gay or Transgendered.

"By forcing employers who object to homosexuality and Transgenderism to hire people who practice those lifestyles, the City of Louisville is attempting to legislate its own view of morality at the expense of the fundamental rights of its citizens," said Francis J. Manion, Senior Regional Counsel for the ACLJ Midwest office.

If the suit is successful, it could result in a spate of similar suits around the country.


LGBT activists say the suit is part of a new strategy from the Religious Right to challenge LGBT civil rights laws. The centerpiece of that strategy is the Religious Protection Act (RPA) which is being considered by the U.S. Senate.

RPA's sponsors say the act is needed to prevent Christians from being forced to abide by LGBT civil rights laws. The RPA passed the House of Representatives on an overwhelming vote. Its outlook in the Senate is uncertain.

P-FLAG Cuts Barnes and Noble Ties

Washington – The national office of Parents and Friends of Lesbians and Gays announced that it has cut the group's ties to the Barnes and Noble bookstore chain. The group was an online affiliate in exchange for a percentage of book sales made through its website link to a Barnes and Noble Internet store.

P-FLAG Executive Director Kristen Kingdon said that as a grassroots group, P-FLAG was concerned about the number of independent LGBT bookstores who've been forced to close as Barnes and Noble expand-

Kingdon said the move came in response to concerns expressed by independent book-sellers and P-FLAG chapters. She added the group felt that Barnes and Noble does offer benefits to the LGBT community. She cited the chain's discounted book cost and the access to LGBT literature that the chain provides to those who live in areas where locally owned LGBT book stores are not present.

Chicago Checkers Boycott

Chicago – According to the Chicago Free Press, a group of 75 demonstrators calling for a Checker's boycott picketed the chain's drive-in restaurant at Halsted and Addison. Led by the Chicago Anti-Bashing Network (CABN), the protestors say restaurant employees refused to intervene or even call the police when a Gay customer was bashed on its premises.

Steve Schering said that he asked restaurant employees to call the police after three people, who attempted to steal his wallet, threatened him. They did not do so. Schering said the alleged thieves were a Transgendered individual, a drag queen and their male friend.

Schering said the attack by the three resulted in a head wound that required nine stitches. A restaurant employee, who the paper said joined other employees in chanting anti-Gay insults at the protestors, claimed that Schering threw a soda at a Transsexual and provoked a fight. The employee said he would like to "beat (Schering's) fag ass myself."

Schering said he spilled the soda because the man who stole his wallet pushed him after he grabbed it back. He says the man threatened him, and he then asked restaurant employees to call the police.

Lorraine Sade Baskerville, a Trans Activist told the *Free Press* that there are numerous conflicts between Gay men and Transgendered persons in the area. She accused Gay men of being jealous of Transsexuals because they "go all the way" in expressing their femininity. Baskerville also said she thought the restaurant should have called the police.

The picketers also targeted the Halsted

neighborhood police station, which is located across the street from the restaurant. They said that the police did little or nothing to help Schering when they arrived at the scene.

Local YMCA to Include Same-Sex Couples

Kalamazoo, MI - The Kalamazoo Gazette reports that a local YMCA has developed a new membership policy that covers non-traditional families.

The policy came about after a Gay couple attempted to purchase a family membership last year. The new policy defines families as households, thereby allowing a second adult to qualify for reduced membership rates.

Terry Kuseske, YMCA Board President, told the *Gazette*, "There are women and men in the Gay/Lesbian community that have families and children. They wanted to find a place with a healthy environment that could foster the development of their children, and they found that at the YMCA."

Kueske added that some Board members did not want to remove the word "family" from the membership policy. "There were those who were afraid that if we stopped using the word 'family,' it would diminish service to families."

YMCA Director Bruce Siebold said that some Board members did not want to remove the word family from the discounted membership policy. "We have a strong commitment to families in whatever form they present themselves," said Siebold.

Bradley for LGBT Rights...

Washington – In an interview with *The Advocate*, Democratic Presidential contender Bill Bradley says he supports extending the 1964 Civil Rights Act to include discrimination based on sexual orientation.

Bradley's campaign released two statements on LGBT issues to coincide with the publication of the interview. In one statement, the candidate blasted California's Knight initiative. The Knight initiative bans state recognition of same sex marriage. The other statement said that Bradley supports domestic partnership benefits. While he was a Democratic Senator from New Jersey, Bradley voted for the Defense of Marriage of

Act, which forbids federal recognition of same sex marriages.

The leading contender for the Democratic nomination, Vice-President Al Gore, has also denounced the Knight initiative and called for domestic partnership benefits:

...Bush Isn't

Des Moines – Texas Governor George W. Bush, the leading contender for the GOP Presidential nod, elaborated on his anti-Gay stance in response to questions from an Iowa religious activist.

Bill Horn, publisher of *Straight From the Heart*, an anti-LGBT newsletter, told the Associated Press that the Bush campaign says the Governor opposes same-sex marriages. He also reported the Bush camp to have said that the Governor disagrees with the New Jersey Supreme Court ordering the Boy Scout troupes to stop discriminating against Gays.

The Bush responses to Horn's questions come in addition to his statements against hate crime laws that include Gays and LGBT adoptions. He also recently stated that he favors keeping the Texas sodomy law, which prohibits LGBT sexual intimacy on the books.

Transsexual Settles Rights Case

Hoboken, NJ – *The Record* reports that a Transsexual former police officer settled her civil rights suit with the Hoboken Police Department.

Janet Aiello was known as John Aiello when she began taking female hormones in 1993. In 1995, Aiello decided to go on sick leave to begin a year-old experiment in living openly as a woman. Doctors require such a test before performing sex-change surgery.

The Police filed disciplinary charges against Aiello for failing to report to work. The courts dismissed the charges, and Aiello sued for discrimination.

Neither Aiello's attorney nor the City Attorney revealed the terms of the settle-


Chicago Rights Commission Sues Methodist Camp

Chicago – The Chicago Tribune reports that the Cook County Commission on Human Rights is suing a Methodist Campground, The suit asks the courts to bar the campground from expelling a Chicago family because they showed support for a

Gay couple who had been banned from renting or buying a cottage at the camp.

The United Methodist Historic Campground is trying to revoke the ownership rights of Bill and Nannette Graham. The Grahams said the camp management sent them a letter saying their cottage ownership would be terminated as of June 21. They said the letter came after they invited the Gay couple to stay at their cottage and posted a sign welcoming Gays in one of their cottage windows.

The camp's attorney, John Juergensmeyer, said the purpose of the campground is to provide worship and spiritual experience. He said the Grahams were disruptive. A letter sent to the Grahams by the campground management said their ownership would end because of their "dissatisfaction with decisions made by the board and your display of defiance."

A Gay Look at the Fall TV Season

Just a few years ago, network TV was devoid of any LGBT characters. Now as the 1999-2000 TV seasons opens, viewers can tune in and turn onto 28 lead, supporting and recurring characters on primetime network and cable television shows. In fact, it will be possible to see LGBT characters every night of the week.

The 28 LGBT characters contain six new roles. The new characters include a man who leaves his wife when he realizes he is Gay, a sixtysomething couple, and a soap opera star struggling with the closet.

Experts place varying degrees of importance on the role openly LGBT characters play on societal attitudes towards Gays and Lesbians. But no one disagrees that positive portrayals of Gays can help shape public consciousness and accelerate a general movement towards greater acceptance (or at least tolerance) of the LGBT com-

munity. NBC leads the pack with eight LGBT characters.

ABC has including TV's only Transgendered character. Fox has five including two who are animated. CBS will

present

three LGBT characters in recurring roles. Warner Brothers will have

three, two of which are animated. Showtime has two and HBO has

While there is reason for Gays and Lesbians to be pleased with the new line up, there are some shortcomings

TV's avoidance of people of color in

Transgendered character and only five Lesbians.

To many it seems likely that the network executives have finally discovered what marketing firms have known for years: urban white Gay males have a lot of disposable income. Accordingly, they are offering a set of charlead and supporting characters on network and cable TV.

Another concern is the unrealistic nature of those characters. Some are included for comic relief. Nearly all of them are single and dateless. If they do date, we seldom if ever see whom they are going out with.

For example, Will of Will & Grace did not have any dates during the show's inaugural season, while his

heterosexual sidekick, Grace, did. Regular viewers heard about his best friend Jack's dates, but they didn't see them.

The lack of TV LGBT romance has led GLAAD to say that the vast majority of the LGBT characters "are Gay in name only." Others, however, may disagree with that viewpoint. They point out that Ellen went from being a ratings success to a ratings bomb in her post coming out season.


Although network execs say that this year Will is set to develop a social life, others aren't so sure. As Wisconsin Light.

Deep Inside Hollywood columnist Romeo San Vicente reports, when an NBC exec was asked whether the show's most flamboyantly Gay character, Jack, would gain a love interest, he "changed the subject quicker than Anne Heche unloaded her U-Haul at Ellen's."

Despite some obvious drawbacks, there is reason for the LGBT community to be somewhat pleased with the upcoming TV season. It reflects growing acceptance of Gays and Lesbians within American society.

America is tuning in to a glimpse of LGBT life. That glimpse may have a narrower focus than the LGBT community would like, but many believe it can also open up wider vistas in the future.

That does a disservice to Gays and Lesbians of color who struggle to gain recognition and acceptance within their communities of color.

While the 28 LGBT characters is more than most observers would have believed possible just a few years ago, only 18 of those characters are in lead or supporting roles. That's a small fraction of the 542



Action Wisconsin, Mark **Pocan Sponsor Town** Meetings

Madison - A proposal to give same sex couples at least some of the privileges enjoyed by their married heterosexual counterparts will be the focus of three "town hall" meetings to be held in early October. Action Wisconsin and Rep. Mark Pocan (D-Madison) will sponsor the three sessions to be held in Milwaukee, Madison and Green Bay/Fox

The meetings will review a statewide domestic partnership bill. The legislation sponsored by State Representative Frank

Boyle (D-Superior) will be introduced within the next few weeks. The bill would give same-sex couples, who register with their County Clerks, marriage-like rights. It would not legalize LGBT marriages.

Final revisions being made to the proposal are expected to be completed by September 30 according to Pocan.

"The introduction of this legislation is an important first step in creating dialogue and educating the public on matters of equal treatment for members of the GLBT community," Pocan said in a letter circulated statewide on September 17.

The town hall meetings will review the legislation and allow community members to discuss strategies for obtaining co-sponsorship and moving the legislation forward in the Assembly.

Perspective and participation building are additional goals of the town meetings according to Action Wisconsin President F. M. "Mike" Fitzpatrick. "A key element of the meetings will be helping the LGBT community obtain an overview on the multi-year journey, which will take its very first steps in mid-October," Fitzpatrick said. "Early involvement by stakeholder couples in establishing public dialogue also is critical."

ARCW Gets Housing Grant

Milwaukee - The AIDS Resource Center of Wisconsin has announced a \$375,000 oneyear grant renewal from the Housing Opportunities for Persons With AIDS (HOPWA) program. The grant amount represents a \$66,000 increase over the amount ARCW received for the program last year. The agency says the grant will allow it to provide financial assistance, housing counseling, care and support services for over 750 people living with AIDS/HIV.

Mike Gifford of the ARCW staff told Wisconsin Light that the funds will be used for rent subsidies, security deposits and assistance with utility bills. Gifford said that the funds could only be used for those ARCW clients living outside of the metro Milwaukee area. Gifford said that Federal regulations require a separate grant for the

Milwaukee area.

"Our goal is that nobody with HIV and AIDS in Wisconsin shall be homeless," said Doug Nelson, ARCW Executive Director. "Receiving the HOPWA grant brings us closer to fulfilling that vision."



An ARCW statement received by Wisconsin

Light says that Wisconsin now has a record number of people in need of housing and HIV support services. The statement said that the grant will allow ARCW to help its clients manage the complex issues faced by those living with AIDS/HIV.

"Providing a safe and stable home environment is the essential starting point for someone battling HIV. Once housing is secured, we can help a client begin a good routine of care," Nelson said. "If you don't have a bed to sleep in at night or aren't sure where your and your child's next meals are coming from, it is very difficult to maintain medical drug regimens.

Action Wisconsin Issues Alert

Madison - Action Wisconsin is asking the LGBT community and its supporters to oppose two new anti-Gay bills scheduled to be introduced in the State Legislature later this

State Representative Stephen Nass is circulating the bills. LRB 1390/1 would prohibit the State from offering Domestic Partners benefits. It would also bar State employee unions from bargaining for those benefits. LRB 1391/1 would ban municipal employee unions from bargaining for Domestic Partner benefits unless the municipality agrees to discuss them.

Action Wisconsin says the bills would interfere with the collective bargaining processes by regulating what unions can and cannot ask for. The group also asserts that Nass is using misleading and false information to gain support for his proposals.

Action Wisconsin is asking its supporters to call their State Representatives and State Senators to ask them not to co-sponsor the Nass bills. A Lesbian Musical Comedy for Everyone

Madison – It's difficult to describe what Oblivia, the all new Lesbian musical comedy, is all about. Even its creators, Madison's wildly funny Dykasaurus improv troupe, can't agree on that point. Oblivia,

troupe, can't agree on that point. *Oblivia*, which may be the first ever Lesbian musical comedy, will have a one weekend run at Madison's Esquire Theater from September 30 to October 2.

While Dykasaurus is an improv troupe, *Oblivia* is not an improvisational effort. "We have a huge budget," said Producer and Head Writer, Abbie Hill. "There's a live musical combo, special effects, sets, the works."

Hill says that the play is a replacement for Madison's famed Lesbian Variety Show weekend. "The Variety Show producers are taking the year off," she said. "Oblivia gives everyone a chance to see great talent in a nice setting."

Her co-Producer, Lynda Finn, points out that unlike the Variety Show, *Oblivia* is open to men. "I hope that we see a lot of men and straight people. Humor is universal; I know they will be entertained."

Hill and Finn say that there is something in *Oblivia* to please everyone, including men. *Oblivia* has enough humor and social commentary plus some very good music to keep everyone entertained, no matter what sex or sexual orientation they happen to be.

"It's about Lesbian relationships," said Mary Waitrovich, the renowned singer-songwriter, who wrote most of the music. "And it's a satire on Lesbian life in the Midwest."

"It's a satire on Olivia cruises," insists Abby Hill. "We've always wanted to make fun of the Olivia cruises because of the way they are advertised."

"It has political significance too," said Lynda Finn, pointing out that one of the characters, "Donna," is a short woman who wears red and white and loves Wisconsin Badger football.

"It's a love story," said Waitrovich, who points out that the cast includes several couples at different stages of their relationships.

The fictional Oblivia is a pontoon boat that offers cruises on Madison's Lake Mendota. The Cruise Director, played by Finn, fills the boat's pontoons with Astro Slide, a sexual lubricant. "I have to wear

makeup and a wig," laughs Finn. "I feel like I'm cross-dressing."

Finn is smuggling the lube into Madison, so that the cruise line can pay for its next outing. Once the lube gets to Madison, it

Cabaret Balkan

In the Balkans, ethnic and religious hatreds run deep and reach back centuries. Here in America, half a world away, it's easy to throw around terms like "ethnic cleansing" and "war crimes" with little thought for the harsh realities that underlie the words. It takes a movie like Goran Paskaljevic's Cabaret Balkan to bring home the truth of what is transpiring.

Cabaret Balkan, like the images we've seen on CNN and MSNBC, is devastatingly powerful and almost impossible to watch. The majority of moviegoers go to theaters to escape the real world, but films such as this bring us face-to-face with the deepest, darkest ugliness that civilization has to offer: a brutalizing, misogynist, racist dictatorship.

Cabaret Balkan powerfully illustrates what happens when a pocket of civilization collapses, featuring a collage of stories that take place during the course of one night in Belgrade.

During the film, we are introduced to more than a dozen characters, many of whom are on screen for only ten or so minutes. We drift in and out of their lives, moving from one story to another, each more distressing than the last. We see acts of violence, sexual violation and irrational rage, and there's always the sense that the perpetrator one moment might become the victim the next, power is so transitory.

The film jumps from scene to scene almost randomly, giving us glimpses of a world most of us prefer to pretend doesn't exist. Often, we don't see the ending of many of the scenarios laid out before us, and when we do, it's usually because the temporary protagonist is killed. The cumulative effect of this is to leave the viewer dazed and perhaps a little disoriented.

Cabaret Balkan shocks its audience into considering things that most of us are willfully ignorant of. Director Goran Paskaljevic's motives are straightforward: he wants to show the world the depth of senselessness that is tearing his homeland apart. Cabaret Balkan isn't just an autopsy of Belgrade's disintegration; it's a cautionary tale. The message is the same one the late, great Stanley Kubrick presented in A Clockwork Orange, but the tone is more immediate and the implications far more dire.

Hauptmann

Bruno Richard Hauptmann is one of those names that sticks in your memory. He was obviously some famous person or you wouldn't recognize it, but sometimes the exact facts escape you. To refresh your memory, Hauptmann was the German immigrant who was found guilty of the kidnapping and murder of Charles Lindbergh, Jr., then 20 months

On March 1, 1932, someone broke into the 2nd story window of Charles and Anne Lindbergh's Hopewell, NJ home. The botched kidnapping attempt ended tragically with the death of their infant son. It was dubbed "The Trial of the

Century" when the police finally got their man. Or did they? That question is thoroughly and effectively examined in John Logan's dramatic play, Hauptmann, currently in production by Next Act Theatre.

The play begins with Hauptmann (C. Michael Wright) already in prison, awaiting execution. He tells his side of the story over a two-hour period, asking us to judge for ourselves whether or not he was a coldblooded child killer or the innocent victim of a mid-century media frenzy whipped up to achieve justice at any price for America's hero and his family.

The play is economical in scale. Every actor portrays more than one character, simply changing a few items of clothing and altering the voice and mannerisms to do so. Even Wright dons spectacles during his recounting of the trial to portray Hauptmann's ineffective lawyer. Set design by Maureen Chavez-Kruger is likewise simplicity itself.

Wright's portrayal of the doomed Bruno Hauptmann is superb. He manages a German-accented English well enough to convince, yet always clear enough to understand. Another stand-out performance comes from Daniel Mooney, who's

Present Music is New Music

Tired of the "old standards?" If you're eager to hear an eclectic blend of new, diverse musical compositions, Milwaukee-based Present Music has a lot to offer. Founded in 1983, this fine group of classically trained musicians delivers the future of music.

At its season opener on September 10, Artistic Director Kevin Stalheim treated the audience to two works composed and performed by Qu Xiao-song. Born and raised in China, Qu blends vocal lines and instruments from his Chinese folk tradition with Buddhist, Daoist and Confucian philosophical traditions. The result is often magical, evoking visual and emotional journeys.

Qu Xiao-song did not disappoint his audience, who rose to a standing ovation after the performance of his first scheduled work, Fang Yan Kou, subtitled "a Buddhist ritual for dead spirits," at the Milwaukee Art Museum. The cave-like acoustics of the room added to the spiritual feel of his two pieces performed, the second being a representation of nature in Ji #2.

One of its core of seven musicians, pianist Phillip Bush opened the concert with 6 of 24 Time Curve Preludes, composed by William Duckworth. Despite this challenging series, which shifted from a sense of hurriedness to tranquility, Bush played in every work performed that night.

The performances of Four on the Floor and Night Passage were fantastic. The first piece for piano, violin, cello and bass used an underlying boogle beat to evoke a fast-paced, dizzying journey. Night Passage, commissioned by Present Music in 1992, took the listener on a trip to "a night in the center of a busy city, visiting bars and night clubs." Both pieces were well received by the appreciative audi-

Dangerous Reading

Murder & Mayhem Weekend

As any fans of the genre will tell you, really good murder mysteries are addictive – far more compelling than the latest dance re-mixes, decidedly more sinful than chocolate, almost as painful to quit as cigarettes. Okay, maybe not quite as good as sex. But close, pretty dam close.

So, what is the extraordinary appeal of Lesbian mysteries and, far more recently, Gay mysteries?

Could it be that our community finds itself so effortlessly seduced by the strong, independent and, most importantly, sexy protagonists, both male and female, whose day-to-day adventures make our monotonously humdrum lives, seem horribly pale in comparison? Unable as we are to be heroes ourselves, solving crimes and bringing the bad-guys to justice, we must settle instead to merely live vicariously through our favorite fictional gumshoes.

The well-constructed murder mystery formula is itself uniquely satisfying. Each new mystery from our favorite authors, featuring familiar characters we often come to regard as friends, is a complete story, possessing a beginning, middle and an ending that successfully offers closure. In so much current fiction, writers often drop you into the middle of the story and then pull you out before the action seems to have wrapped up.

Then there is the genre's marvelous certainty that goodness will inevitably triumph over evil. Such certainty is surely a soothing balm against each day's newspaper accounts of fresh new atrocities. Similarly, there is something awfully comforting in that the crimes in most murder mysteries have a reassuring motive.

The group of nine Lesbian and Gay mystery writers appearing at Afterwords 3rd Weekend of Murder & Mayhem are amongst the best the genre has to offer.

Lesbian Writers

The first Lesbian mysteries were published in the early 1980s. Since then, the genre has grown to be one of the most popular in Lesbian literature.

Ellen Hart, a native of neighboring Minnesota, had just published her latest book, Hunting the Witch. Hart's series features restaurant owner



Jane Lawless and her hilarious sidekick Cordelia Thorn. In Hunting the Witch, Jane and Cordelia investigate the death of a man who may be connected to Jane's girlfriend, Julia. Patricia Kastner, introduced in Hart's last book, Wicked Games, also makes a return visit.

Cordelia must be the most popular name for Lesbian sidekicks. This time Cordelia Brown is a friend of Lindsey Gordon, heroine in the mystery series by **Val McDermind**. Lindsey is a Lesbian feminist socialist journalist from England who investigates murders.

Conferences Are Murder is the third book in this series. However, if you go to England, you find two more Lindsey Gordon

mysteries. Hopefully, Spinsters Ink will find a way to get the other books in this series on American bookstore shelves. Val McDermid is also the author of the Kate Brannigan mystery series.

There aren't any Cordelias in the mystery series by Claire McNab. This fine Aussie series features Detective Inspector Carol Ashton. Set Up is the 11th book in the series; Lessons in Murder, introduced in 1988, was the first. Readers

have been able to follow the trials and travails of Ashton as she deals with her son and lover over the years while still solving serious crimes. Claire McNab also wrote *Under the Southern Cross*, a non-mystery fiction book. Popular Lesbian mystery writer **Katherine V. Forrest** edited many of McNab's books. Forrest began writing Lesbian fiction with *Curious Wine* and *An Emergence of Green*. Both books have become Lesbian classics. She then branched out to science fiction with *Daughters of a Coral Dawn*, and a collection of short stories, *Dreams and Swords*. But Forrest found a real home in the mystery genre when she created the character of Kate Delafield, first introduced in *Amateur City* back in 1984. The latest outing of LAPD Detective Kate Delafield is *Sleeping Bones*. In it, Delafield, with a new partner, investigates a murder at the La Brea Tar Pits.

In Tell Me What You Like, Kate Allen introduced Lesbian cop Alison Kane and offered readers a tantalizing glimpse into the shadowy world of the Denver leather scene. Now in her fourth offering, Just a Little Lie, Allen sets Alison on a blackmail case while her dominatrix lover, Stacy, struggles to organize a Leather and S/M conference for Lesbians.

Gay Mystery Writers

Minneapolis is the setting for R.D. Zimmerman's Lambda-award winning mys-


tery series featuring Gay television newsman Todd Mills. In the series debut, *Closet*, Todd Mills was outed on his own television station after his lover is murdered and subsequently becomes the prime suspect. In Zimmerman's latest, *Outburst*, Todd and his lover, homicide investigator Steve Rowlins, race against the clock to find a killer who has developed a taste for watching Gay cops die.

nist Mark Manning is likewise a newsman, an award-winning newspaper journalist. Debuting in Flight Dreams, Mark Manning is in hot pursuit for a missing heiress but then becomes awfully sidetracked by his

romance with handsome Neil Waite. Body Language, Craft's most recent novel, Mark must find a killer much closer to home, after his cousin

is murdered in Mark's hometown during Christmas festivities.

The deadly world of academia proves to be fertile ground for Lev Raphael's Nick Hoffman series of murder mysteries. Let's Get Criminal finds Stefan and Nick teaching at State University of



Michigan. Nick learns that an obnoxious colleague is offered a better contract. When this same obnoxious colleague turns up dead, Stefan looks to be the hottest suspect. Nick is forced to don his amateur sleuthing outfit. More academic mischief occurs in *The Death of a Constant*

Lover, when Nick witnesses the murder of a student during a riot.

Mark Zubro is the author of two popular series. In A Simple Suburban Murder, Zubro introduced high school teacher Tom Mason and his celebrity ball player lover Scott Carpenter. Mark Zubro's latest, Drop Dead, features Gay cop Paul Turner (first introduced in Sorry Now) investigating the murder of a gorgeous male supermodel.



It's an honorable and difficult path, one that admire and respect. My concern, in the midst

of all this "Gay is okay" hoopla, is that there are a lot of people who are left out of the equation, namely single and kinky people, who threaten the hell out of a society scared to death of its own booty

It sounds to me a lot like "Gay is okay as long as you act like us." For many of us, that ain't gonna happen anytime soon. Before you write a furious letter to the editor scolding me for being against Gay marriage, adoption, and family building, know that I think marriage and kids are completely groovy and noble callings. But right now, they aren't for me.

So go on, brothers and sisters, send me postcards from Hawaii. Have all the kids your little ovaries and bank accounts can manage. I'll be their favorite babysitter.







This film is based on the assumption that real life convicts wrote hot letters to real life porn stars and arranged to meet them for sex when they got out of prison. How the porn flick people got into the deal is never explained. The porn "stars" have all been in Gay porn films. With the exception of Paul Morgan, none of them are really in the "star" category.

What makes this film interesting is the interviews with the cons before they meet their porn star correspondents. Although we never see the interviewer, his interviews after asking for name, age and "where ya from?" get right down to the nitty gritty of what it felt like being in prison for the first time. A few questions about homosexuality in prison and then a question or two to establish the con's philosophy about himself follow.

Then the selected porn star enters and is introduced to the con, complete with a formal handshake. The ex-cons are, obviously, real.

A few more questions; the interviewer disappears; the sex begins. It is plain vanilla

sex and not very exciting, although there are a few surprises along the way. Gamble, a huge muscular black con, winds up as a bottom for Morgan. Another con, Corona, wasn't kidding when he said he had 9 1/2. One of the bragging cons virtually begs his porn star, after the sex is over, to compliment him, but the porn star isn't impressed.

There is a certain freshness and honesty that makes this film interesting and appealing if you simply remember that not every sex experience is going to send you right off to heaven.

I liked Corona who when asked where he was from answered, "Corona, California," even though it exposed the fact that his last name was not truthfully given. He was older than the other cons. He was obviously new to having sex before the camera, and his nervousness showed it.

When it was over, the off-stage voice complimented him. He grinned and seemed to be relieved that he had managed to do so well. His partner, who also got compliments, broke me up when he said the thing he had learned from this experience was to "relax."

This 1986 award winning video is an alltime best seller. The state of the art technique, the great cast headed by Jeff Stryker, who became a star after this flick hit the video stores, and the work of Director John Travis make this a must see. Sentenced to 30 days in the slammer, Stryker discovers that he can pass the time by trading sex for favors and goods. In scene one, wavy blonde-haired John Davenport screws the hell out of boyish Michael Gere. The slim Davenport pumps Gere until both produce prodigious cum shots. So, too, does Stryker who is watching the action from his cell across the way.

In the next scene, butch bottom Jeff Converse offers his ass, a grope and a joint to Stryker in return for a good hard fuck. Stryker obliges, and the two getting it on is hot.

A very steamy prison scene follows. Tom Mitchell, Tony Marino and Gary Owens get it on without the benefit of soap in a scorching threesome. The highlight here is Owens sitting on both Mitchell's and Marino's dicks at the same time.

Travis very carefully crafts every scene is this video. The camera work is excellent, the cast attractive, and the sex sizzles. *Powertool* is an absolute must for any serious collector.



Speaking of Cockrings

It's the poor man's Viagra. It's the gizmo your trick forgets and you discover on your bedside table the next day. It's the simplest sex toy there is, except for maybe your palm. It's the cockring.

It's based on the principles of fluid mechanics. The cockring allows blood to flow into a soft dick but more or less traps it there once a hard-on has been achieved. This prolongs and intensifies erections. It also cleverly enhances your beneath-jeans basket for those times you want to stand out in a crowd.

There are three traditional styles of cockrings: the impressively shiny metal model, the rubber stretch-on jobbie, and the leather snapon. Now there's a new kind, the gel ring, which is taking the Gay community by storm.

They all do the job, tightly surrounding the base of the cock and balls, but the first two can be a bear to get on and off. You've got to guide your balls, most likely one by one, through the more or less unvielding ring, then get your shaft to fit through what space remains. Or you might find it easier to start with the shaft.

The metal and rubber rings have their advantages: the metal one looks brutally sleek, in a Tomorrowland sort of way. The rubber model is light, cheap, and if discovered can be explained away as an O-ring destined for space shuttle repairs.

There are disadvantages to these nonadjustable rings. The fit, especially with the metal ring, is crucially important. Too small a ring, and you'll never get it on. Too large, and it won't hug tight enough to do the job. Furthermore, getting the rings off can be tough, since the flesh that once fit through snugly will still be somewhat engorged.

In a pinch, a rubber ring can always be sliced through. However, unless you like the idea of a hacksaw next to your privates (and some guys most likely do), a lube-slippery metal ring can take patience, skill, and maybe a dick-shrinking hunk of ice to remove.


Which brings us to the adjustable leather cockring. It's the one-size-fits-all workhorse, the GMC Jimmy of penis adornment, Sure, it has drawbacks, notably the unwashable nature of leather, a potential problem where butt germs are concerned. But a leather ring's snap-on ease makes getting it on - and getting it on - a breeze. There are usually at least a couple of snap positions to adjust for cock size (which, in deference to male egos, we'll call "big," "bigger" and "biggest").

At its simplest, the leather cockring is a plain strip of cowhide that fastens into a loop, but man has ingeniously come up with plenty

of variants. Most commonly, the ring is decorated with a row of silver studs; it can become a decorative wristband when visiting the family on the way home from a date.

On the kinkier side of things, rings may be lined with sharp tiny spikes, the agony and the ecstasy combined in one handy package. And then there are the more baroque variations. like the charmingly named "Gates of Hell," which features a series of rings that fit tightly along the length of the your shaft.

The new kid on the block is the gel ring. It looks like what a Gummi Bear would use on




his dick, and is soft, very stretchy, and washable. It has a less vise-like grip than the other rings, which means it can be put on and taken off while hard and is less likely to cause dis-

It's also versatile, usable on just the base of the cock or the balls. Eventually it may stretch out of shape or break, and oil-based lubes will destroy it, but hey, at less than five bucks apiece, who cares?

It's safe to use any kind of cockring, as long as the thing isn't way too tight or kept on too long. If you're snapping a leather ring down on someone else, it's only polite to make sure you don't pinch little bits of delicate skin or pull any hair. Hell, some guys don't like to use cockrings at all, but for those of us who do, the little fellas are a bargain-level investment in sexual technology.

In the early '70s the Wreck Room opened its doors and quickly became known as the local leather bar. Owners Wayne and Bill offered a suitable atmosphere for the local leather S&M folk, and leather people soon became comfortable meeting in its public space.

A few other bars opened and closed soon afterwards. It wasn't until the Boot Camp Saloon debuted on East National did Milwaukee have a second permanent leather address. The Wreck Room eventually closed, but was recently replaced by the Milwaukee Eagle.

As was the case with the rest of the world, AIDS decimated the leather community, robbing it of its best and brightest. It had a far-reaching impact on the leather community.

From the '70s and earlier, the leather SM world was dominated by a rule of law known as "Old Guard" leather. This lifestyle was based on traditions and guidelines set down by players of a long time past. Specific rules, timelines and etiquette dictated what a person learned, how and

The training was almost universally consistent, as the leather SM community was a closed, secretive society. Following the HIV plague, people interested in pursuing a leather lifestyle had no mentors to turn to, so "New Wave" leather people began to appear.

These were folk who followed their own instincts in leather training. The centuries old traditions and teachings were being replaced by a trial and error system. Soon after that the communication and tight community that bound the diverse leather groups dwindled, thus plunging the leather society into an unprecedented chaos.

Only during this past decade has there been a reemergence of national and global reunification of groups interested in championing safe S&M play and informational training.

Meanwhile, back in this Great City on a Great Lake, several leather clubs evolved. Their members participate in various social and charitable activities. Bars such as the Boot Camp Saloon and the 1100 Club sponsor these groups, usually by hosting a regular monthly club night.

As mentioned in a previous column, leather people are not to be feared. The leather world is an infinite fusion of sexual tastes. Some men prefer just to wear the sensual skins of the leather. while others wouldn't even think of a sexual experience without all manner of erotic accouterment.

Leather guvs are not out to hurt strangers. They want to offer an exciting sexual experience to a consenting partner. You will find that many heavy participants of the leather lifestyle are professional members of society, highly regarded in their fields. Next time you notice a leather-clad Adonis, ignore the feeling of intimidation and fear, saddle up and start a conversation. You will probably be glad you did.
