Looking at the Far Right

For some of us, it may seem like the world has gone mad, or at least has been turned upside down. Jerry Falwell tells his followers to "love homosexuals." The leading Republican Presidential candidate preaches "compassionate conservatism." Pat Buchanan, the man who once told Tennessee voters that he would "settle accounts for our ancestors," now calls for a "racial reconciliation."

Has Hell frozen over? Are those pigs we see flying in the sky? To find out *Wisconsin Light* spoke with noted author and political researcher, Jean Hardisty. As the Executive Director of Political Research Associates, Hardisty's work includes monitoring the religious right and other conservative elements from coast to coast. Her new book, *Mobilizing Resistance*, examines the resurgence of the right wing in America.

Ms Hardisty will be appearing in Milwaukee on November 16 and in Madison on November 17.

WI Light: The right wing in America is a diverse group. It includes some Republican politicians, white supremacists, and the militias. Is there as some claim, a "right wing conspiracy?"

Jean Hardisty: The linkage is ideological. You have Trent Lott appearing before groups that he never should have appeared before. The real danger lies in the ideological traffic between the far right and the Republican Party.

I used to talk about bridges being a kind of transit point. I could count the bridges from the right to the Republican Party on one hand, Pat Buchanan and David Duke. Now, the traffic is so heavy that there are a lot of ideas flowing from the far right to the Republican Party and back again.

WI Light: What are some of those ideas? How do they affect Gays?

JH: The anti-government message is a very powerful one. It's not specific. It applies to protecting minorities and all sorts of roles the government plays in protecting our democracy. It's a very powerful weapon that can be trained at any liberal idea.

If you can undermine the idea that government has a positive role to play, you can really take aim at all the programs the government has. They can bring all of those roles under the rubric of "We don't want government to interfere."

One of the arguments used against the passage of a Federal hate crime law is that this is big government interference in something should be left to the states. That's an example of how this line of thinking works

WI Light: Does that line of thinking promote violence against LGBT people?

JH: Most of the time the violence is not tied to a particular sector of the right. It can be the results of anti-Gay sentiments promoted by things like the rhetoric of the Christian right.

With hate crimes, what you're dealing with is a more vague ideology. They may be committed by someone who's been exposed to a right wing group and shares that group's thinking.



Letter from the Publisher

Our search for a new editor for Wisconsin Light goes on. With pardons to all those who have applied, no "qualified" candidates from Wisconsin have surfaced. The funniest interview was with an eminently qualified candidate with a degree from a prestigious school of journalism. He had experience as a managing editor of a national magazine. Unfortunately, he thought Wisconsin Light concerned itself with the Wisconsin utility industry. Other candidates have, on the surface, had great credentials but simply did not have the necessary depth of knowledge about the LGBT community.

It will not be easy to replace Bill Meunier. His experience, writing ability, exceptional phone skills and never ending dedication to the cause of LGBT civil rights is a combination that is formidable. Unless another local candidate surfaces, our search will more focus on experienced journalists from other areas. That can be problematic, as he/she will have to acclimate themselves to Wisconsin's unique LGBT community with our stunning successes as well as our parochial power structure. There will be a learning curve, particularly concerning local people and issues. At a minimum, we must insist that the Editor of Wisconsin Light has a solid background in the LGBT world and that they are dedicated to being an inclusive community builder.

Behind the scenes, our new Internet project is moving along. The possibilities are endless, so focus is essential. We must do what we do very, very well. We, others who see what we see, and others who will copy us, will close the gapping holes that now exist. Bill's skills are already in evidence as we hone our plans to enter into this rapidly expanding LGBT Internet world. The thought of vitually endless space for content is exciting when you have been constrained to publishing a few dozen pages per week in print form.

The Internet is particularly well suited for expanding coverage of the arts, most specifically music and film. The ability for live interchange offers nearly endless possibilities. Sports and issues of concern to various smaller groups, within our community, can be properly addressed. Being the absolute best source for LGBT news will be the bedrock of our activities but Bill's creative ideas for the use of these technologies will make the experience fun, something that seems to be missing from other efforts.

An important hurdle has been cleared as we have received substantial financial commitment from a California based group. Also, the hiring process goes on. We have been rewarded with numerous applications from local artists and Internet designers and look forward to making these selections shortly.

We still can't be too specific in these pages concerning our designs but we are truly excited about this new challenge and how it will strengthen and its ability to provide the absolute best in news and entertainment. You will have to wait for our introduction, still some weeks away.

If the repercussions were not so serious, I could be amused by some of the recent discussion on Wisconsin LGBT publishing. Yes, it would be easier if we consolidated our efforts. We could achieve much more without the massive duplication of effort. I still remain committed to working with Publishers to achieve the best results for our community. However, barring that, we will be fierce competitors for readers and dollars. We are clearly winning this battle and have absorbed all, or nearly all, of the growth of advertising dollars and readers in the last year. That

It is a cooperative spirit, in the light of real fiscal responsibilities, that may not survive. We can no longer pretend that all things are equal. Neither of the other publications has any full-time persons involved, other then themselves. Neither publishes weekly. Neither produces anywhere near the volume of locally written news content. Neither has made any commitment to building a community controlled and owned weekly newspaper.

My recent comments were not designed to get sympathy but only to encourage a dialog and understanding of the economic realities. One writer for InStep asks, why can't we just leave things the way they are? It simply is not possible. We will continue to do our best to absorb even larger portions of the pie. New marketing efforts are underway and new strategic alliances have, and are being, formulated.

Going into a weekly publication schedule has been a monumental effort by all those involved. Our growing pains are evident for all to see. Our intent is not always so apparent. Let me be as clear as I can be. Wisconsin Light will not, can not, give the market to the remaining publications. That simply will not happen. Local control in a cooperative environment is what we have been working towards.

Massive marketing and resources are available but at what cost. We believe that local control is essential but it is not the only option. There will be a weekly publication for Wisconsin's LGBT community. What is at stake is that local control. Building a sane economic system to deliver the best to the public is our simple aim. We can no longer pretend that minimal and voluntary efforts will be adequate. Wisconsin deserves one of the finest LGBT publications in the nation. That is what this is all about.

African American Gay Man Vie For Historic Win

New Orleans - Larry Bagneris may become the nation's first openly Gay African American state legislator. Bagneris was one of two candidates to advance from an eight person primary for a New Orleans seat in the Louisiana State House of Representatives.

"What a wonderful achievement it would be for Larry Bagneris to take a seat in the same Legislature whose halls are still haunted by the shameful and all-too-recent memory of David Duke," said Gay and Lesbian Victory Fund Executive Director Brian Bond.

The Victory Fund is supporting Bagneris, who has come under attack for his homosexuality and race. An anonymous campaign mailing sent out to voters a few days before the October 23 primary attacked the candidate for being Gay and African American.

"The mailing's sole purpose was to foment irrational fear among the electorate about the irrelevant fact that this candidate happens to be both Gay and African American," noted Bond. "It was nothing more than the shameful peddling of political prejudice."

Bagneris came in second in the Oct. 23 election, behind frontrunner Karen Carter. The two will face each other in the November 20 election. The Victory Fund is urging Gays and Lesbians to contribute to the Bagneris campaign. Donors can send

Shepard Trial Watch

Laramie - In their opening statement to the jury, lawyers for accused Matthew Shepard murderer Aaron McKinney said their client killed Shepard in a fit of rage after the Wyoming college student made a sexual advance at him. McKinney's attorneys claimed that their client was under the influence of drugs and never meant to kill Shepard. They insisted that he is guilty of manslaughter, not first degree murder.

Judge Barton Voight reacted sharply. Voight dealt the defense team a hard blow ruling that it could not use the so-called "Gay panic" defense in his courtroom. The Judge said the defense has no basis in Wyoming law.



McKinney's girl friend testified that he and Henderson told her they targeted Shepard by pretending to be Gay.

Other testimony dealt with the brutality of the attack. A coroner testified that although he was not conscious, Shepard might have suffered for hours while hanging from the fence where McKinney and Henderson tied him. Two jurors openly wept while viewing photos of Shepard's battered body. The prosecution rested its case by playing McKinney's hour-long confession. Although Henderson was brought to the courthouse, he did not testify as had been expected.

The defense opened its case with Michael St. Clair who told jurors that Shepard made a sexually suggestive remark to him on the night that he met McKinney and his accomplice Russell Henderson. "It set off something inside, said St. Clair. "It made me angry." The defense was still presenting its case as *Wisconsin Light* went to press.

Democrats Blast Bush on LGBT Issues

Washington - Democratic National Committee Chair Joe Andrew lashed out at Texas Governor George Bush, the leading Republican contender for President, over his positions on LGRT issues

In October, LGBT activists were stunned by press reports that during a secret September 24 meeting with conservatives Bush said, if elected President, he would not appoint anyone he knew was Gay or Lesbian. He added that he would not fire anyone he found out was Gay after they had been appointed.

Last April, Bush said he wouldn't have any problems with appointing Gays and Lesbians to serve in his administration if he became President. A Bush campaign spokeswoman defended the Governor's remarks, telling the press that she couldn't believe Gays and Lesbians would share his philosophy. "Bush talks a great deal about being compassionate, but in the end his anti-Gay views show him to be an old-fashioned right-wing conservative," said Andrew.


The episode is the latest LGBT flap faced by Bush. Hate crime activists say that Bush killed a Texas hate crimes law last spring in large part because it included protections for Gays and Lesbians. Last summer, Bush came out against Gay adoptions.

LGBT Couples Sue for DP Benefits

Anchorage AK - The Alaska ACLU is suing the State of Alaska and the City of Anchorage because they don't provide domestic partners benefits for their LGBT employees. The suit filed on behalf of eight couples revisits an issue Alaskans thought they settled in 1998 when voters approved constitutional amendment banning same sex marriage.

"The safety net that other couples in Alaska depend upon for security and financial stability, in both the lives that they build together and the retirements that they plan together, are denied to the plaintiff couples merely because they are Gay," the lawsuit says.

The suit seeks to overturn a state law that allows employers to refuse to grant DP benefits and to force the State and City to offer them.

WI Light: So you are saying the impact of some right wing groups is on the general climate and promotes anti-LGBT feelings.

JH: The environment in which people conduct their politics is very important. It's probably more important in a democracy than in any other system. It affects the public mood and the direction people will take.

I felt that the role of Ronald Reagan, in the takeover of the GOP by the right wing, changed politics in this country. It allowed a lot of right wing ideas to increasingly take hold. That created an environment in which it became easier and easier to be anti-choice, anti-Gay, anti-feminist and especially anti-liberal. When you create that environment, you aren't necessarily sending people out to create violence, you are setting a tone and creating an inhospitable environment.

WI Light: Gays and Lesbians have some civil rights laws now, get elected to some public offices and have made some gains. Some of us think that the danger has passed. Has it?

JH: I agree that mainstream public opinion in this country is less intolerant than it used to be. I think that's entirely the work of the Gay rights movement. It has reached the point where the Christian right has had to moderate its tone and change its rhetoric.

You see that in the X Gay movement, where now the message is "Hate the sin; love the sinner." The message used to be "Recognize the sin, and exclude the sinner from society."

WI Light: Are you talking about the impact of things like Jerry Falwell meeting with Mel White and 200 Gays?

JH: The bad news is that while the Christian right has now taken up this softer face, it hasn't moderated its position. Now people can feel that if you are Gay or Lesbian you are less under

attack. Yet, the anti-Gay legislation goes on absolutely uninterrupted. Some of this softer rhetoric will be more effective than the anti-Gay organizing.

The Falwell/White meeting is a perfect example of this shift, abandoning the extreme rhetoric but not the ideological position. Falwell was smart to make that move. What he's done is give himself a much more reasonable profile. The extremists who picketed the meeting did him a service. They placed him closer to the mainstream by demonstrating at the door and yelling, "Faggot Faggot!"

A younger Jerry Falwell didn't care. But the Christian right in general doesn't want to remain outside of the political dialogue because doing that failed to change things.

WI Light: If there is linkage between the various sectors of the right, what does that say to Lesbian and Gay conservatives?

JH: There's a certain amount of conservatism in the Gay and Lesbian community that was not recognized in the past. All of us are aware that there are places in the LGBT community where there is agreement with the right's agenda.

They support the free market or have done well in a high growth company. They have some leanings with free market capitalism that causes them to be against government regulation. When you join with the right on those issues, you are joining with people, who share only a part of what you believe. You are joining with people, who don't share a large part of your agenda.

That doesn't mean you have to follow some sort of ideological agenda. It means you have to be careful not to place your allegiance with those who share only a smart part of your ideology. It means we have to be very careful about the company we keep.

Conservatism from within is an important problem for the LGBT movement. Importing positions from the right into the movement will ultimately work against

equality for all minorities.

WI Light: We read more about militias and the fringe elements of the right as we read more about bate crimes. Is there a connection?

JH: I don't think so. I think we are just keeping hate crime statistics more diligently than we used to. I wouldn't go so far as to say that there's more being committed. There's a little part of me that fears that all this attention they are getting could mobilize more hate. However, I think the only way to go is to shine a light on these events so people can see how truly awful they are.

WI Light: It seems that over the past two decades, the far Right has had an increased influence on the electoral process. We have the Taxpayers Party, and now Pat Buchanan appears to be the favorite for the Reform Party nomination. Is that something we should worry about?

JH: The fact that we could generate, as third parties, an extreme far right party like the Taxpayers party and a party that could become far right like the Reform party, says a lot about the state of democracy in this country.

There are a lot of people, who either aren't voting or who join marginalized parties that give expression to their resentments.

WI Light: Are you saying conservative Republicans are moderates in the American right wing?

JH: There is some truth to that. It was even true when Ronald Reagan ran. A lot of people had no idea they were voting for someone as far right as Ronald Reagan was. Ideas from the Christian Right permeate through the Republican Party, but they don't have total control over it and

that frustrates them.

The right wing controls the Republican platform at every presidential election. The platform is extremely right wing. What we need to know is that it takes a lot political muscle to control the party's platform.

Right wing Republicans feel marginalized because they haven't got an iron grip on the entire party. That's why some, like Buchanan, are bolting.

Can they keep George Bush from being nominated? I don't think so. They aren't going to get their man, Gary Bauer. This poses a problem for the Christian Right. It's not unusual for them to feel that the candidate is not the one they really want.

There's a sense in the right wing of the Republican Party that they are constantly thwarted and marginalized. They feel they should always be in control because they have a lock on the truth. They think that they're not always in control because of these sell-out moderate Republicans.

Their analysis is that if they had control of the platform and the candidate, Dole never would have lost. They really believe that they never win because their party never nominates a true right winger.

They think that if they were just allowed to run with it, the American people would follow them. Most professional political strategists believe the opposite. In this system, you do best when you move towards the Center.

Even when they get a candidate like Ronald Reagan, someone from their sector, they still complain. Towards the end of his second term, the Christian right complained that he didn't do enough on abortion, family values and anti-Gay things.

WI Light: You mention the level of frustration felt by the new right. History is replete with examples of frustrated people making minorities into scapegoats. Does that play a part in the right's attacks on Gays?

JH: They maintain that homosexuality is a symptom of the decline of values in society, the break up of the family. That worked well through the 80's because it was playing to an environment that wanted to scapegoat Gays and Lesbians. As the LGBT movement has made more inroads, I don't think that's working as well.

The two-parent family, where the husband worked and the wife stayed home, was a pr model in the 50's and the right wing movement is organized around a nostalgic vision of America. That has proved to be popular because it's associated with secure, more predictable times.

What was so predictable about the nuclear times, I am not sure. In terms of social behavior and social climate, the norms were much tighter, you were church going, heterosexual and kept your children close.

The decline of the family is something that's been framed by the new right. It's built into the promotion of traditional values. It also points people away from how economic changes have affected the family. People's need to work has caused some rearrangement.

Some of the nostalgia is economic. The right wants a return to the time when the government didn't regulate companies, when unions weren't as strong. There's tremendous anti-union sentiment in the right.

WI Light: Conservatism is clearly on the rise in America. What bappened to liberalism?

JH: When the new right came on the scene, it knocked off a number of prominent liberals by using techniques that were pretty new to the system. The attack ads, on TV and direct mailings, that made devastating allegations that the liberals destroyed the economy or were soft on crime were new tactics then. We saw almost the entire liberal leadership knocked off. That frightened the Democratic Party and the liberals backed off.

The Democrats decided to go with the Clinton wing, the centrists.

Depending on your point of view, you might see that either as political wisdom or as giving up on the Democratic Party.

That is characteristic of what has happened to liberals. They are either intimidated or they went into hiding, making sure their voting records won't show up on the list of the top 10 people the right will say "we need to get rid of."

There are some exceptions, like Ted Kennedy and Paul Wellstone. I think it's interesting that Bill Bradley thinks there's enough political room for him to imply he's a liberal.

WI Light: Some analysts say that throughout its history American has been a conservative country with a few major breaks when liberals beld sway, like the Roosevelt era and the 1960's. Is this period just a swing back to the normal pattern?

JH: It is a conservative country. There's a lot of agreement about that among historians. But I don't think that this is normal. I think there was a swinging pendulum that didn't swing very far left at any given time. It did swing and there was a time when women got the vote and unions were formed. The history of the country is conservative, but it's not without periods where changes are made.

I think there's an extra punch of this swing to the right, because it's a reaction in part to some success on the part of liberalism. The intent is to go farther than the norm. Conservatives came into office with Reagan saying they were going to revolutionize the system. What they really meant was that they wanted to turn the clock back and undo the changes that came in the 60's and 70's.

WI Light: What do you think people should do to counter the influence of the new right?

JH: We've taken so many hits in the last 20 years that we need to rebuild the movement. We need to strengthen our organization. We need to listen to people who are potential recruits to the

movement, people we haven't been listening to in the past.

We need to sharpen our analysis when we present our vision of this country and what we want it to look like. We need to speak from the heart and make it clear enough to understand.

The Gay movement has done this very well. It's one of the better examples of really speaking to the public in ways that they can understand. The fact that Wisconsin has Wisconsin Light really shows that LGBT movement has the resources to maintain a strong infrastructure.

That's not true across the movement. The right has de-funded a lot of poverty work. Housing is in a shambles because it was de-funded. So were a lot of social programs that were designed to level the playing field. It may take years to rebuild but certainly, it can be done.

Jesse Helms Clashes with Baldwin and Colleagues

Washington DC - Senator Jesse Helms (R-NC) ordered Capitol Hill Police to remove Congresswoman Tammy Baldwin (D-WI) and nine of her colleagues from a Senate Foreign Relations Committee hearing on October 28.

Led by Congresswoman Lynn Woolsey (D-CA), the Congresswomen were trying to present Helms with a letter signed by 100 congressional supporters of a treaty that bans discrimination against women. The US signed the 1979 pact, but has not joined the 165 nations that have ratified it.

When the Congresswomen entered the Committee room with the placard, Helms halted the hearing and said, "This is a hearing on China and we have guests who are not interested in that. They want to demonstrate on another issue. I hope the security people will escort them out in the corridor and let them wait there."

Woolsey responding by asking the Senator to accept the letter. Helms ordered security officers to "Escort them out!"

A Capitol Hill source told *Wisconsin Light* that the Congresswomen did not go to the Committee hearing to disrupt it or to demonstrate. The source said that the Congresswomen wanted to present the letter to Helms at his office. However, when they arrived Helms' staff said he was not in and claimed that they did not know where he was.

The women learned of the hearing and headed to it. When they arrived, they stood silently in the back. "They weren't standing to demonstrate," said the source. "They stood because there were no seats available."

Baldwin called the incident, "horrifying and shocking." Her spokeswoman, Jerilyn Goodman told *Wisconsin Light* that the Congresswoman "expects professional courtesy from all of her colleagues."

Goodman added, "She's never had a problem when she's asked other senior Republican legislators like Henry Hyde or Jim Sennsenbrenner for meetings on various issues. She finds it more than unfortunate that Senator Helms is refusing to meet with her on an issue that's very important to all of us."

Barron Murder Victim May Have Been Gay

Barron – An investigation into the brutal October 20 murder of Barron resident, Michael J. Hatch took an unexpected turn last week due to speculation that the victim may have been Gay.

According to the Associated Press and the *Barron News-Shield*, one of his attackers helped Sheriff's deputies locate Hatch's body in a cornfield on October 21.

Three individuals, Ray C. Walton, 33, Cory L. Kralewski, 21, and Mary C. Reed, 34 were arrested in connection with the murder. Kralewski apparently knew Hatch well; they had attended high school together.

Although Barron county investigator Al Lenz said that the trio is telling conflicting stories to investigators, it is known that the murder followed a night of drinking at local bars.

Hatch was profoundly deaf and wore hearing aids. He often used written notes to communicate. Reed told investigators that throughout the evening Kralewski was playing "head games" with Hatch and that both Walton and Kralewski "were writing a lot of stuff on paper for this kid to read."

Investigators have some of those notes in their possession, but they declined to release their content. They did say that Hatch apparently had not been drinking alcoholic beverages, although his attackers drank significant amounts of alcohol over a six-hour period.

Several sources say that robbery is a possible motive. According to *News Shield* reporter Bob Groshong, several witnesses say Hatch won "a significant sum of money." playing video poker machines.

Reed claims that she talked Kralewski into going to a second bar but that Hatch followed them there. After further conversation, all four decided to go to a third tavern. After leaving that bar, Hatch and his attackers drove to a remote spot near the Barron-Dunn county line.

The three men left their vehicles and both Kralewski and Walton beat Hatch with tire irons. According to Reed, Kralewski struck the fatal blows to the victim's head. Kralewski claims that he began the beating but that Walton "took over." Reed says that the men took \$40 from Hatch.

On October 26, Action Wisconsin (AW) and the Midwest regional office of PFLAG began receiving e-mails about a possible "Gay angle" to the murder. AW contacted several area members, local reporters and the Barron County Sheriff's Department.

Despite reports from both Gay and straight sources, that Hatch was Gay, his sexual orientation remains unknown. As reported by Lenz and Groshong, the family has strongly denied that hatch was Gay. Bob Jansen, owner of the Gay-identified Main Club said that while some of his customers said they knew Hatch as a Gay man, he did not know the victim.

Based on currently available information, Action Wisconsin cautiously concluded that Michael Hatch's real or perceived sexual orientation does not appear to be a factor in his murder. "Bad things happen to all kinds of people, whether they're Gay or otherwise," AW President F. M. "Mike" Fitzpatrick said.

However, Mary Reed's reports of 'head games,' and the unknown content of the recovered notes give Fitzpatrick pause. "Two key questions remain unanswered at this time, he said. "First, why would the investigators even ask the Hatch family if their son was Gay unless they have evidence that warrants such a suspicion? Second, is there any Gay-related content in those notes?"



Information for Patients About VIRACEPT® (VI-ra-cept) Generic Name: nelfinavir (nel-FIN-na-veer) mesylate

For the Treatment of Human Immunodeficiency Virus (HIV) Infection

Please read this information carefully before taking VIRACEPT. Also, please read this leaflet each time you renew the prescription, just in case anything has changed. This is a summary and not a replacement for a careful discussion with your doctor. You and your doctor should discuss VIRACEPT when you start taking this medication and at regular checkups. You should remain under a doctor's care when taking VIRACEPT and should not change or stop treatment without first talking with your doctor.

WHAT IS VIRACEPT AND HOW DOES IT WORK?

WHAT IS VIRACEPT AND HOW DOES IT WORK?

VIRACEPT is used in the treatment of people with human immunodeficiency virus (HIV) infection. Infection with HIV leads to the destruction of CD4 T cells, which are important to the immune system. After a large number of CD4 cells have been destroyed, the infected person develops acquired immune deficiency syndrome (AIDS).

VIRACEPT works by blocking HIV protease (a protein-cutting enzyme), which is required for HIV to multiply. VIRACEPT has been shown to significantly reduce the amount of HIV in the blood. You should be aware, however, that the effect of VIRACEPT on HIV in the blood has not been correlated with long-term health benefits. Patients who took VIRACEPT also had significant increases in their CD4 cell count. VIRACEPT is usually taken together with other antiretroviral drugs such as Retrovir® (zidovudine, AZT), Epivir® (lamivudine, 3TC), or Zerit® (stavudine, d4T). Taking VIRACEPT in combination with other antiretroviral drugs reduces the amount of HIV in the body (viral load) and raises CD4 counts.

VIRACEPT may be taken by adults, adolescents, and children 2 years of age or older. Studies in infants younger than 2 years of age are now taking place.

DOES VIRACEPT CURE HIV OR AIDS?

VIRACEPT is not a cure for HIV infection or AIDS. The long-term effects of VIRACEPT are not known at this time. People taking VIRACEPT may still develop opportunistic infections or other conditions associated with HIV Infection. Some of these conditions are pneumonia, herpes virus infections, Mycobacterium avium complex (MAC) infections, and Kaposi's sarcoma. It is not known whether VIRACEPT will help you live longer or reduce the number of infections or other illnesses that may occur.

There is no proof that VIRACEPT can reduce the risk of transmitting HIV to others through sexual contact or blood contamination.

WHO SHOULD OR SHOULD NOT TAKE VIRACEPT?

Together with your doctor, you need to decide whether VIRACEPT is appropriate for you. In making your decision, the following should be considered:

Allergies: If you have had a serious allergic reaction to VIRACEPT, you must not take VIRACEPT. You should also inform your doctor, nurse, or pharmacist of any known allergies to substances such as other medicines, foods, preservatives, or dyes.

If you are pregnant: The effects of VIRACEPT on pregnant women or their unborn babies are not known. If you are pregnant or plan to become pregnant, you should tell your doctor before taking VIRACEPT.

VIRACEPT.

If you are breast-feeding: You should discuss with your doctor the best way to feed your baby. You should be aware that if your baby does not already have HIV, there is a chance that it can be transmitted through breast-feeding. Women should not breast-feed if they have HIV.

Children: VIRACEPT is available for the treatment of children 2 through 13 years of age with HIV. There is a powder form of VIRACEPT that can be mixed with milk, baby formula, or foods like pudding. Instructions on how to take VIRACEPT powder can be found in a later section that discusses how VIRACEPT oral Powder should be prepared.

If you have liver disease: VIRACEPT has not been studied in people with liver disease. If you have liver disease, you should tell your doctor before taking VIRACEPT.

Other medical problems: Certain medical problems may affect the use of VIRACEPT. Some people taking protease inhibitors have developed new or more serious diabetes or high blood sugar. Some people with hemophilia have had increased bleeding. It is not known whether the protease inhibitors caused these problems. Be sure to tell your doctor if you have hemophilia types A and B, diabetes mellitus, or an increase in thirst and/or frequent urination.

CAN VIRACEPT BE TAKEN WITH OTHER MEDICATIONS?

VIRACEPT may interact with other drugs, including those you take without a prescription. You must discuss with your doctor any drugs that you are taking or are planning to take before you take VIRACEPT.

- Drugs you should not take with VIRACEPT:
 Seldane* (terfenadine, for allergies)
 Hismanal* (astemizole, for allergies)
 Propulsid* (cisapride, for heartburn)
 Cordarone* (amiodarone, for irregular heartbeat)
 Quinidine (for irregular heartbeat), also known as Quinaglute*, Cardioquin*, Quinidex*, and others
 Ergot derivatives (Cafergot* and others, for migraine headache)
 Halcion** (triazolam)
 Versed** (midazolam)
 Taking the above drugs with VIRACEPT management of the control of the contro

- Taking the above drugs with VIRACEPT may cause serious and/or life-threatening adverse events. Rifampin (for tuberculosis), also known as Rimactane®, Rifadin®, Rifater®, or Rifamate® This drug reduces blood levels of VIRACEPT.

Dose reduction required if you take VIRACEPT with: Mycobutin® (rifabutin, for MAC); you will need to take a lower dose of Mycobutin.

A change of therapy should be considered if you are taking VIRACEPT with:

Phenobarbital
 Phenobarbital
 Phenytoin (Dilantin® and others)
 Carbamazepine (Tegretol® and others)
 These agents may reduce the amount of VIRACEPT in your blood and make it less effective.
 Oral contraceptives ("the pill")
 If you are taking the pill to prevent pregnancy, you should use a different type of contraception since VIRACEPT may reduce the effectiveness of oral contraceptives.

HOW SHOULD VIRACEPT BE TAKEN WITH OTHER ANTI-HIV DRUGS?

Taking VIRACEPT together with other anti-HIV drugs increases their ability to fight the virus. It also reduces the opportunity for resistant viruses to grow. Based on your history of taking other anti-HIV medicine, your doctor will direct you on how to take VIRACEPT and other anti-HIV medicines. These drugs should be taken in a certain order or at specific times. This will depend on how many times a day each medicine should be taken. It will also depend on whether it should be taken with or without food. Nucleoside analogues: No drug interaction problems were seen when VIRACEPT was given with:

Retrovir (zidovudine, AZT)

Zerit (stavudine, 3TC)

Zerit (stavudine, d4T)

Videx* (didanosine, ddl)

If you are taking both Videx (ddl) and VIRACEPT: Videx should be taken without food, on an empty stomach. Therefore, you should take VIRACEPT with food one hour after or more than two hours before you take Videx.

Nonnucleoside reverse transcriptase inhibitors (NNRTIs):

When VIRACEPT is taken together with:

Viramune* (nevirapine)

- Viramune® (nevirapine)
 The amount of VIRACEPT in your blood may be reduced. Studies are now taking place to learn about the safety of combining VIRACEPT with Viramune.
- VIRACEPT has not been studied with other NNRTIs.

- Other protease inhibitors:
 When VIRACEPT is taken together with:
 Crixivan* (Indinavir)
 The amount of both drugs in your blood may be increased. Currently, there are no safety and efficacy data available from the use of this combination.
 Norvir* (ritonavir)
 The amount of VIRACEPT in your blood may be increased. Currently, there are no safety and efficacy data available from the use of this combination.
 Invirase* (saquinavir)
 The amount of saquinavir in your blood may be increased. If used in combination with saquinavir hard gelatin capsules at 600 mg three times daily, no dose adjustments are needed. Currently, there are no safety and efficacy data available from the use of this combination.

WHAT ARE THE SIDE EFFECTS OF VIRACEPT?

Like all medicines, VIRACEPT can cause side effects. Most of the side effects experienced with VIRACEPT have been mild to moderate. Diarrhea is the most common side effect in people taking VIRACEPT, and most adult patients had at least mild diarrhea at some point during treatment. In clinical studies, about 20% of patients receiving VIRACEPT 750 mg (three tablets) three times daily had four or more loose stools a day. In most cases, diarrhea can be controlled using antidiarrheal medicines, such as Imodium® A-D (toperamide) and others, which are available without a prescription.

Other side effects that occurred in 2% or more of patients receiving VIRACEPT include abdominal pain, asthenia, nausea, flatulence, and rash.

There were other side effects noted in clinical studies that occurred in less than 2% of patients receiving VIRACEPT. However, these side effects may have been due to other drugs that patients were taking or to the illness itself. Except for diarrhea, there were not many differences in side effects in patients who took VIRACEPT along with other drugs compared with those who took only the other drugs. For a complete list of side effects, ask your doctor, nurse, or pharmacist.

HOW SHOULD I TAKE VIRACEPT?

VIRACEPT is available only with your doctor's prescription. The light blue VIRACEPT Tablets should be taken three times a day. VIRACEPT should always be taken with a meal or a light snack. You do not have to take VIRACEPT exactly every 8 hours. Instead, you can take it at normal times when you are eating.

Take VIRACEPT exactly as directed by your doctor. Do not increase or decrease any dose or the number of doses per day. Also, take this medicine for the exact period of time that your doctor has instructed. Do not stop taking VIRACEPT without first consulting with your doctor, even if you are feeling better.

Only take medicine that has been prescribed specifically for you. Do not give VIRACEPT to others or

Unit take medicine that has been prescribed specifically for you. Do not give VIRACEPT to others or take medicine prescribed for someone else.

The dosing of VIRACEPT may be different for you than for other patients. Follow the directions from your doctor, exactly as written on the label. The amount of VIRACEPT in the blood should remain somewhat consistent over time. Missing doses will cause the concentration of VIRACEPT to decrease; therefore, you should not miss any doses. However, if you miss a dose, you should take the dose as soon as possible and then take your next scheduled dose and future doses as originally scheduled.

Dosing in adults (including children 14 years of age and older)
The recommended adult dose of VIRACEPT is 750 mg (three tablets) taken three times a day. Each dose should be taken with a meal or light snack.

Dosing in children 2 through 13 years of age
The VIRACEPT dose in children depends on their weight. The recommended dose is 20 to 30 mg/kg (or
9 to 14 mg/pound) per dose, taken three times daily with a meal or light snack. This can be administered
either in tablet form or, in children unable to take tablets, as VIRACEPT Oral Powder.
Dose instructions will be provided by the child's doctor. The dose will be given three times daily using the
measuring scoop provided, a measuring teaspoon, or one or more tablets depending on the weight and
age of the child. The amount of oral powder or tablets to be given to a child is described in the chart below.

In measuring oral powder, the scoop or teaspoon should be level.

* 1 level scoop contains 50 mg of VIRACEPT. Use only the scoop provided with your VIRACEPT bottle.

1 level teaspoon contains 200 mg of VIRACEPT. Note: A measuring teaspoon used for dispensing medication should be used for measuring VIRACEPT Oral Powder. Ask your pharmacist to make sure you have a medication dispensing teaspoon.

How should VIRACEPT Oral Powder be prepared?

The oral powder may be mixed with a small amount of water, milk, formula, soy formula, soy milk, dietary supplements, or dairy foods such as pudding or ice cream. Once mixed, the entire amount must be taken to obtain the full dose.

Do not mix the powder with any acidic food or juice, such as orange or grapefruit juice, apple juice, or apple sauce, because this may create a bitter taste.

I didn't really think about it much right away. I just kept walking and talking about other things. A dream I had that night caused me to think about it a lot more. In my dream, I was again walking through DC. I ran into Mayor Norquist while passing the Postal museum. He looked at me, said, "You're so homophobic", and kept walking. Next came the President. He said the same thing. Public figure after public figure came up to me and told me I was homophobic.

Stom Thurmond, alas, was absent from the pack. The one that left the biggest mark on me was Senator Feingold. Not only did he tell me that I am homophobic; he took my new leather jacket. The Senator said, I can't hide behind it any longer and that I had to face the world without my protection. Confused? Moi aussi.

It was weird. The jacket was serving as my protection and as a metaphor for who I am. I'm pretty well known in this little town of ours between writing for the *light* and the whole Project Q thing, but I can still hide. I can very easily deny who I am because of the way that I look and act. I can say "no"

when someone says asks if I'm the kid, who writes for the *light*. I can play dumb when they ask if I remember them from the Domestic Partnership victory party.

Sadly, I can also say no if someone asks me if I'm Gay. But now, I didn't have a jacket. They took it away from me. There was nothing left for me to hide behind. I was exposed to the world like a baby's ass the days it's born. I had nothing to protect me from the elements.

I'm protecting myself from the hate and fear that surrounds who I am. When I hide, I am also perpetuating that hate and fear by not letting people know that I am who I am. Well, not any more.

We won't be recognized as real people unless we all stand up for ourselves and what we believe in. We have to look others and truthfully say "I am not homophobic, now give me my damn jacket back!" We must look at our friends, family and neighbors and say "We're here, we're queer and we are unzipping our jackets so everyone can see who we are."

We must wear our pink triangles, rainbow flags, bear paws and those light blue hankies we put in our back right pockets with pride. We must do it always, not just during the three days of PrideFest.

If you see me anytime soon, feel free to compliment me on my new jacket. The pink triangle pin I put on it makes it look even better.


Christian Editor to Speak November 7



e lost another one of our own this past September 23 when Sarah Ann Ford passed from this plane of existence. Sarah was truly a gift to the African American community, the LGBT community and the entire Milwaukee community. Her memorial service, held at the Art Museum, was a special tribute to the beautiful spirit that she was.

Lung cancer claimed Sarah's life. My mother died of the same disease, so when I heard of her diagnosis, I feared the worse. I last saw Sarah at the July performance put on by Real Read, an African American LGBT theatrical troupe from Chicago, at Centennial Hall. Her bright spirit shone through the obvious effects of her struggle with the disease.

Sarah Ford will be missed by many. She was truly an inspiration. During her memorial service, County Supervisor Dorothy Dean, in touchingly poignant remarks, called her a " strong and beautiful flowering tree living on in our hearts". She was a very special, and a very great person.

I didn't know Sarah well but she always had a warm smile and hand shake for me whenever I ran into her. She had been a closer friend, in previous years, with my partner Mary when their paths first crossed at Marquette University. Sarah was the Director of Marquette's multicultural center and Mary was Director of Residence Halls. Sara made a lasting impression on Mary who would speak of her with respect and affection.

Sarah was a bridge builder. That was clearly evident by the attendance at her memorial service. The list of accomplishments she achieved in her 48-year life is awesome. In addition to being a magazine publisher and television talk show host on Milwaukee's ABC affiliate channel 12, Sara was an arts consultant and economic development specialist

She also worked as a program officer for the prestigious Milwaukee Foundation and was instrumental in bringing about key development projects on Martin Luther King Drive and Capitol Drive among other things. A First Lieutenant in the Wisconsin Army National Guard, Sara was President of, and sang with, the Heritage Chorale. She was a Delta Sigma Theta Sorority Member.

Sara was also a volunteer. Her list of volunteer activities seems endless.

My own personal experience in working with Sara occurred when we served together on the Human Rights League Board. She led our Board's strategic planning. One of the ideas fostered in those sessions was the creation of the Political Action Committee, which got on its feet this year.

Sarah worked quietly with a dedication and purpose. She was about love.

There are other special people who pass through our lives, but we seldom know just what effect someone might have on us until it is too late and they are gone. I recall Sarah Ann Ford here as we struggle with community in Milwaukee. The community of Same Gender Loving and LGBT people is what we make of it.

There are other bridge builders, who are alive and well in this community. They are people who consistently look for a greater good and attempt to build towards that. They are people, who build bridges with the larger community, the whole of Milwaukee, to make it a safer place for all of us.

I don't know what drives some of us to seemingly accomplish so much. Some people seem to have the dedication right from the start, while others get sick of the old way of doing things and are finally ready for action and change.

There are many bridges to build. PrideFest's theme this year was about building those bridges. While some of us complain about the way things are, there are others who are beacons trudging on and getting the job done sometimes in the face of incredible obstacles.

Sometimes we work well together and sometimes we don't. All of us are products of our early training. Some have succeeded in transcending self and simply working for justice. Sometimes it seems easier to kvetch and moan about the way things are and what people should have done. If we do that too much we get trapped in negativity. However, I know what complaining is and I know what acceptance is. Sometimes complaining is the first step towards action and acceptance.

While I think the transition to a new century and a new millennium is simply going from one day to the next, maybe it can be a time to reassess our own way of being in the world. Then, what we carry into the next day will be another critical component to that bridge we are building. We can remember and honor the inspiration provided by Sarah Ann Ford and people like her who have managed to transcend the difficulties and curve balls that life has thrown them and work for the greater good.

McFarland Column

Too bad Mr. McFarland can't understand these simple facts.


Too bad Mr. McFarland has "no answer" when his heterosexual Republican friends pose such questions.

The Music in Meryl's Heart

NYC - When I was a preteen, most kids my age were going crazy over films like Return of the Jedi and Ghostbusters and

actors Harrison Ford and Bill Murray. Unlike most other kids, I was always intrigued by 'adult themed' films and was mesmerized by the world's greatest living, working actress.

I first became aware of Meryl Stréep at age eleven. In 1982, my friends were running off to see E.T. and The Empire Strikes Back for the ninth and tenth times. I remember sneaking off to the neighborhood theater to see Sophie's Choice, and the year after that, Silkwood.

Maybe it was because I was a reader of the New York Times' and the Boston Globe's arts sections at an extremely early age. Maybe it was simply because I recognized genius at work. Regardless of the reasons, I always knew that Meryl Streep was an actress of incomparable talent.

I never imagined, fifteen years and seven Academy Award nominations later, that I would be sitting face to face with Streep talking about her most recent accomplishment, Music of the Heart.

Arriving fifteen minutes late, and obviously, at first, uneasy to be the subject of an interview, Streep settled into a chair in a suite at The Regency Hotel and began to unwind, sipping from a mug of tea.

"I don't enjoy this aspect of film making,"
Meryl says, of the marketing and publicizing
of films. "It's so strange. I am always at least
ten minutes late for interviews but once I get
to them, I am usually put right at ease. The
same goes for parties. I am not too keen on
going to them, but if I am forced to, once I
arrive, I am usually put at ease pretty quicklv."

Dressed to kill, in understated yet elegant blue floral print and matching scarf, Streep dooks motherly and why not? She has reared a nineteen, sixteen, thirteen and eight year old. Streep entered the room a star.

Streep's performance in the true story Music of the Heart is her latest bid for an Academy Award. She has received a total of eleven Academy Award nominations during her two decades plus long career.

Her role in The Deer Hunter gamered her first Oscar nomination. Manhattan, Kramer vs. Kramer, The French Lieutenant's Woman, Sophie's Choice and Silkwood followed. So did Ironweed, Out of Africa, and A Cry in the Dark. Postcards From the Edge, The Bridges of Madison County and One True Thing round out her eleven nominations in

twenty-three years. Streep has won two Academy Awards; first for Kramer vs. Kramer, her then for Sophie's Choice.

The only other actress to achieve a greater feat is **Katherine Hepburn.** Hepburn,

however, received fourteen nominations in a career of over forty years. If Streep keeps up at Hepburn's pace, she will nearly double Hepburn's nominations before her career comes to a halt.

Streep is poised to win her twelfth Academy Award

nomination this year with Music of the Heart. Although Streep beat out **Madonna** to play the lead role in Music of the Heart, her professionalism hampered her from dissing the queen of pop. "As far as I know, there were some creative differences between Madonna and **Wes Craven**, the film's

director. I know that she did begin to learn to play the violin and spent many weeks with the real **Roberta Guaspari**, which the film is based on and became good friends with her."

The biggest surprise of Music of the Heart may not be Madonna's exit from the film but Wes Craven's attachment to it. The creator of the A Nightmare on Elm Street and Scream fran-

chises seems most unlikely to helm a true, inspirational, inner city, elementary school story.

Craven laughs the thought off. "When I signed on to Scream, I was told by Miramax that I could do a 'petticoat' picture as well," he says. "So, I looked at the list of

films they had on their slate and the two I had the most interest in, Shakespeare in Love and

Goodwill Hunting, were already taken. I seen Academy Award nominated documentary Fiddlefest, which, released when Small became Wonders, and I decided that it could become a great commercial film if it had the right cast."

The queen of languages and dialects, Streep, got one of her biggest challenges with *Music*, when it came to learning how to play the violin.

"They, [i.e. the violins] added to the level of chaos in the film," says Streep. "You know how when you go to the ski slopes and see

knee-high to a grasshopper kids flying past you on one leg down the slope? Well, it is even more humbling to hear kids who are seven, eight, nine years old play the violin as if they were jumping rope. Granted, it took many of them weeks and months to get it down pat. There were so many that it just came naturally to, and I had to pretend to and learn how to, be the teacher, who

taught them how to be so good."

"It's really tiring,"
Streep says, of learning to play the instrument.
"You could see the fatigue of this teacher in my portrayal of her. It's like she is asking, 'When is this day going to be over?"

Streep's violin practice was reminiscent of what the students in the

film went through. They took the instrument home only to have their parents, and in Streep's case her kids, shiver in the corners of the house, with ears covered, praying for a quick end to the practicing.

"It took me quite some time to get it right. But when I did. I realized what a beautiful instrument it was," Steep says, of learning to play the violin. "I took piano lessons as a teenager for a vear and a half comparison. With the violin, I learned to play it

The Straight Story

ight off the bat let me say this: don't let the title of this movie turn you off! Besides, to miss seeing The Straight Story is to miss the unique opportunity to see a Grated, Disney film by David Lynch, the filmmaker responsible for Eraserhead, The Elephant Man, Blue Velvet, Twin Peaks and Lost Highway. And don't let the rating and film company discourage you. This is a movie for adults that will bore hapless kids out of their little skulls.

In The Straight Story, Director Lynch uncharacteristically doesn't try dissecting middle Americahe celebrates it. Those familiar with his previous efforts will spend much of the film waiting for its placid nature to veer off into darkness, but they'll wait in vain. It's as near to perfect filmmaking as I've seen in recent years. From the first scene to the last, every shot is perfectly framed, every sequence carefully composed and edited. Lynch's approach still displays some quirkiness, but it's controlled and focused.

The Straight Story is based on a real story. Veteran actor Richard Farnsworth, in the best performance of his long and uneven career, plays Alvin Straight, a 73 year-old man living in Laurens, lowa with his daughter, Rose (Sissy Spacek). Alvin's health is beginning to deteriorate, but this won't stop him when he learns one day that his estranged brother, Lyle (Harry Dean Stanton), has suffered a stroke. Alvin decides to make the 320-mile trek to Mt. Zion, Wisconsin on his own, via his only means of transport: a 1966 John Deere lawnmower.

The bulk of the film follows Alvin on his unique journey. He encounters a runaway, a woman who has just struck a deer (her 13th), a helpful family and a fellow World War II veteran. One of the film's most powerful scenes is watching these two veterans retell their personal war stories, both tragic and heart-rending. The film also possesses its share of Lynchian comedy.

The Straight Story is paced beautifully, allowing Alvin's character to develop so that the climax has genuine emotional impact. It's a slow pace (what else would you expect from a film concerning travel by lawnmower?), but it allows us to soak in its gorgeous cinematography, featuring numerous shots of autumn leaves, rolling hills and corn fields. The Straight Story may lack the surreal, compelling quality that has defined David Lynch's other features, but it is nevertheless an example of an artist working in peak form.

Journey of Man

he highly-anticipated film by the renowned performing artists known as Cirque du Soleil, Journey of Man, will be previewed at an event in Milwaukee on Wednesday, November 10. The Humphrey IMAX Dome Theater will host "Margaritas & IMAX," an evening with food, cocktails and two screenings of the new film.

"We're thrilled to be among the select theaters that Sony Pictures Classics has chosen to preview this spectacular film. It won't have its world premiere until May of 2000," commented Lynn Hamilton, the Humphrey's Director. "We decided to turn it into a party so that all of Milwaukee can see the film in advance."

Journey of Man is a visual and musical celebration of life, featuring the unique performers of Cirque du Soleil. Its plot follows a mystical journey through life's stages. Speaking of Erotic Tickling

he three muscular and naked guys on the TV screen pin a fourth guy to the bed. They reach out to his vulnerable, squirming body, and... start tickling him until he breaks down in hysterical laughter.

Yes, it's a tickle-porn video – maybe not everyone's cup of erotic tea but part of a growing scene. There are tickling Web sites, Tickle Master Magazine, and even Tickle fest, a yearly gettogether of tickling devotees from all over the country. For most of us, it may seem a bit of a giggle, but guys who are into tickle-torture love it – a lot.

Tickling enthusiast Ken Ludden, one of the organizers of the 1999 Ticklefest, praises the boyish spontaneity of the whole thing. Indeed, there's a sense of fun about the scene that harks back to boyhood moments when you got tickled until you just couldn't take any more.

Although tickle-play often incorporates aspects of bondage and domination, many, perhaps most, tickle scenes don't include any genital sex, or even genital contact. Perhaps that's why a surprising number of straight-identified guys are eager to engage in a good sensual bout of man-to-man tickling.

Feet are ticklish spots for many of us, so there's a sizable overlap between tickling and the foot fetish scene: However, not every bottom's feet are a major laugh-producing zone (or "Tspot"). For some, it's the armpits, the sides, tummy, or the inner thighs.

Part of the challenge to tickle-tops is discovering just which buttons to push, and how hard. The feather may be the symbol of the tickle scene, but many guys respond better to fingertips. Some get off on soft stroking, while others may need a rougher touch.

However they're produced, helpless shrieks of laughter are a hallmark of a successful scene. Unlike SM scenes, where bottoms can often process pain using breath control and concentration, a well-tickled bottom is pretty much past control, and the torture can be excruciating. Perhaps unsurprisingly, then, tickling seems to be one of the few scenes where tops outnumber bottoms.

Tickle scenes lend themselves to all sorts of roleplay. Ticklefest '99, for example, was themed around fraternity initiation. A dozen "pledges," blindfolded and stripped down to their boxer shorts, were led through a dungeon with a variety of bondage apparatus and brought from one playstation to another. At these stations they were restrained and tickled by a succession of tops with varying techniques and equipment. Gales of laughter filled the air as tops hit the "pledge's" sweet spots.

Finally, all the bottoms lay side-by-side and were gang-tickled for 10 solid minutes, until they were gasping for air (and the hard-working tops were about to collapse from overwork).

Sound like fun? In some ways, it seems like SM Lite, a way to explore bondage and domination without any dark, threatening overtones of pain. More than one person told me there is a certain amount of embarrassment and shame for some participants, who, unlike big, butch leather guys, get off on such "childish," "unmanly" play.

But the concept of "play" is key. Good tickling scenes, with or without sex, can be a deeply enjoyable, sensual, erotic experience and satisfactory for all concerned. For a fetish that's only been around in an organized scene for some 20 years, tickling has gained a core group of fervent ticklers and tickless.

For them, sexuality really is a laughing matter.




