Fiji Controversy

Fiji Islands - Politicians in this South Pacific island nation are engaged in a bitter debate over whether the government is trying to tamper with its new constitution for political purposes.

The Fijian constitution is one of only two national constitutions that specifically bar discrimination based on sexual orientation. The government of Prime Minister Mahendra Chaudhry is proposing a constitutional amendment that would outlaw same sex marriages and allow for the prosecution of what it calls "unnatural offenses."

Chaudhry's government says that the amendment is a response to pressure from Fiji's powerful churches, which objected to the constitutional provision. His opponents, however, say that the amendment would also allow the government to ignore constitutional protections for indigenous Fijians who barely outnumber ethnic Indians. They charge that Chaudhry is using anti-Gay feelings to gain support for amendment, which would allow him to tamper with other parts of the constitution.

Man Admits Bombing Gav Pub

London, UK - A 23-year old man accused of planting a bomb in a crowded London Gay pub has pleaded not guilty by reason of diminished capacity to charges of murder. David Copeland told a London court that he planted the nail bomb at the Admiral Duncan pub last year. The bomb killed three patrons and injured

Copeland also admitted planting bombs aimed at London's Black and Bengali communities. He entered the same plea to charges related to those explosions.

Nigel Sweeney, senior Treasury counsel, told the judge that the preliminary view of the Crown was that the pleas of manslaughter were unacceptable. Judge Michael Hyam imposed strict reporting restrictions and adjourned the

Gays Rights No Joke

Toronto, Canada - Jokes that demean Gays and Lesbians are now defined as harassment under a new sexual orientation policy by the Ontario Human Rights Commission.

The Ontario Human Rights Code already bans discrimination based on sexual orientation or same-sex partnership status. Now the Commission has released a policy paper stating "Despite the addition of sexual orientation as a protected ground in the code, discrimination and prejudice against gays and lesbians continto be serious social issues." The policy lays out the examples of discrimination that may be violations of the code. They include employment discrimination and banning Gays and Lesbians from using public accommodations. The Commission also stated, "Homophobic epithets, comments ridiculing their individuals because of sexual orientation or same-sex partnership status, or singling out an individual for humiliating or demeaning 'teasing' or jokes" would be considered harassment."

The policy also requires offering individuals who are involved in same-sex relationships, the same spousal benefits provided to those employees in "opposite-sex relationships" under company pension and health benefit plans.

Parents Want Apology from Judge

Sydney, Australia - The Sydney Sunday Telegraph reports that a group of parents are demanding that openly Gay High Court Justice Kirby apologize for remarks he made to their children during a classroom speech.

Justice Kirby gave the speech at St Ignatius College, Riverview. During his remarks, Australia's first openly Gay judge told the 10, 11 and 12 year old students that it was okay to be Gay. Justice Kirby also told the boys the church was wrong to condemn Gavs and order them not to have sex."To demand a life of celibacy of the millions of homosexual people in his world, as some churches do, is not only totally unrealistic, it is completely unreasonable," he said. He urged the boys not to "join the herd mentality" which labels gays "poofters" and "queers". You should reject 'poofter-bashing' and harassment of people you might think to be gay - this is the conduct of cowards," he said.

The Judge's remarks elicited howls of protests from the Catholic Parents Association. Its President Marilyn Flood said Kirby should apologize for his remarks. "You send your child to a Catholic school because you hope they will earn a particular set of Christian values," said Ms. Flood. "You wouldn't expect someone to go there and promote a lifestyle which is against Church teachings.

Kirby was invited to the \$18,000 a year private school to speak on social justice issues.

Sydney Archdiocese spokesman Father Brian Lucas said what happened at Riverview was a matter for the Jesuits, who run school. "What

the Jesuits do is up to them," he said. "Justice Kirby has his own, obvious, point of view which is at odds with Catholic teachings on the meaning of marriage. He has taken the opportunity to push his own point of view. The public will make up their own minds about the appropriateness of that," Father Lucas said. St. Ignatius issued a statement saying Justice Kirby was invited to espouse his personal philosophies on social justice. "Obviously (that) does not imply assent to or disagreement with whatever views may be expressed by distinguished guests," the statement said.

Anti Gay Murder Protested

Sao Paulo, Brazil - Hundreds of Gays and Lesbians gathered for a candle light vigil to protest the murder of a Gay man in this city known for its tolerance of sexual diversity. A gang of skinheads attacked and beat Edson Neris da Silva and a friend as they crossed a public square in the City's center.


Da Silva suffered a fractured skull and had numerous other injuries. He died during treatment at a hospital emergency room. His friend who was also injured left before being treated. The extent of his injuries is not known.


Sao Paulo police arrested 18 people including two women in connection with the attack. Brazil admits that since 1990 over 1,600 Gays and Lesbians were murdered due to their sexual orientation. Two Transgendered individuals were found murdered in separate parts of Sao Paulo in the hours leading up to the vigil

Anti-Dr. Laura Campaign Launched

San Francisco, CA - The Horizon's Foundation launched an ad campaign to convince Dr. Laura Schlessigner to stop attacking Gays and Lesbians on the air and in her newspaper column. The group, which says it is America's oldest LGBT advocacy organization, purchased ads in the San Francisco Examiner, San Francisco Chronicle and the Los Angeles Times.

The ads say that Schlessinger's anti-Gay rhetoric is based on discredited theories and are doing "real harm to real people." They feature a picture of a radio beneath the head-line: "The problem with Dr. Laura's anti-Gay rhetoric is it doesn't stop even after you turn it off"

The ads were accompanied by a letter signed by 78 rabbis, priests and ministers Gay rights advocates and more than 100 child welfare groups, health organizations and civil rights groups.

"She issues an invitation to think of gays and lesbians as inferior, as less than human. As an adult I can decline that invitation; kids can't," said Peter Teague, Horizons Executive Director during a Thursday press conference.

"Statistics speak for themselves about the impact those words have. It's extraordinary."

Teague said that Gay teens and those thought to be Gay face verbal harassment and even physical violence.

"It's alarming. We have an obligation to say something about that," Teague said.

Schlessigner reacted to the campaign with a forceful attack on her critics. "Unless I have hallucinated, I have never made an antigay commentary," she said. "I have made anti-Gay-activist-agenda commentaries." Among other things Schlessigner has called Gays and Lesbians "perverts", "deviants" and the result of "biological error."

The *Dr. Laura Show* will soon make its television debut. Paramount has syndicated and sold the TV version of Dr. Laura to dozens of television stations around the country.

GA Hate Crimes Bill Advances

Atlanta, GA - Southern Voice reports that the Georgia State Senate passed a hate crimes bill by a vote of 30 to 23, just one more than the 29 votes needed for approval.

The bill has now been sent to the House, which voted 85 to 81 in favor of a motion that would have shielded it from amendments. The bill's backers, however, needed 90 votes in order to keep the legislation from being amended.

The bill is attracting widespread support from Georgia's Democrats but scorn from the legislature's Republicans. The legislation dubbed the Anti-Domestic Terrorist Act would allow harsher penalties for a crime if the judge determines a victim was selected because of "actual or perceived race, color, religion, national origin, ancestry, ethnicity, gender, disability, or sexual orientation."

A stricter sentence for a hate crime could range from an additional \$5,000 fine for a misdemeanor to an extra five years in prison and additional \$15,000 fine for a felony.

Among the recently reported anti-Gay crimes in Georgia are the 1997 bombing of an Atlanta Lesbian nightclub and the 1999 murder of a female impersonator.

Harlem Uneasy over Gay Killings

New York, NY - The New York Daily News reports that residents of the Harlem area are uneasy and angry over the lack of Police success in four unsolved murders of Gay men that stretch back to 1997. African American and Gay activists say that the NY Police are not giving the unsolved killings the priority they deserve.

All four of the victims were African American Gay men who were killed in their homes. All died from multiple stab wounds. In two of the cases a telephone had been ripped out from a wall. Nevertheless the NY Police say that there is no evidence the killings were related.

That viewpoint does not sit well with politicians like openly Gay State Senator Tom Duane. He told the *Daily News* that the Police are not devoting enough resources to solving the murders. "Violence and murder within the Gay and Lesbian and African-American communities are still not always given the attention they deserve by 1 Police Plaza," said the Manhattan Democrat.

Anti-Gay Stance Rocks Newspaper Chain

Los Angeles, CA - The LA Times reports that a community newspaper chain has been shaken by the resignations of editors and writers protesting the chain's refusal to print positive news about Gays or abortion. The chain of five Gazettes covers San Luis Obispo County.

The controversy broke when the chain's owners Mary and David Weyrich ordered Ron Bast Editor of the *Atascadero Gazette* to pull a small announcement publicizing a P-FLAG, Parents and Friends of Lesbians And Gays meeting. Bast quit as did the *Atascadero Gazette* publisher and two of its three reporters.

Staff members at the San Luis Obispo Gazette soon joined them where the editor, two columnists and a writer quit. Three other staff members have also since resigned their positions with the chain.

The Weyrichs' issued a statement that attacked their competitors for covering the situation and that said their viewpoint of homosexuality is one that was held by a majority of people in the recent past.

Todd Hansen chief operating officer for all five of the Gazettes told the 6 *Times* that his papers were not anti-Gay. We don't have any problems with homosexuals. We just don't like the acts they do," he said.

Don Johnson Buys Gay Videos, Sex Toys

San Francisco, Ca - Actor Don Johnson was seen at an adult book store spending hundreds of dollars on hardcore gay videos, sex toys and lubricants often used by gay men

The "Miami Vice" star was recorded on a CCTV camera renting the all-gay video "Cop Daddies" Playtime" during the shopping spree.

The 50-year-old star visited San Francisco's Adult Media store in November 1998 just before midnight, when he was dating his now wife Kelley Phleger.

An eyewitness said, "He was very relaxed and very into his shopping. He even lit up a cigarette." Johnson, apparently asked the clerk for help in finding the gay porn section.

According to the eyewitness, a young man entered the store shortly afterwards and the pair checked out kinky videos and sex toys together.

Johnson now insists he was buying the items as an adult joke for a pal's birthday.

His publicist Elliot Mintz says, "On an occasion Mr. Johnson did purchase some items at a pornography store as gag gifts for a bachelor party that he delivered later that day at the Coventry Motor Inn."

A source at the Inn contradicts the story, claiming, "If Don Johnson was having a bachelor party in that room, it was the smallest one ever. When he checked into the Coventry and filled out that registration card, it asked how many people were in the room. Johnson filled in 2.


Bigot's at Liars Night Club

Chicago,IL - Two bouncers at Liars Nightclub, 1665 W. Fullerton Avenue, savagely assaulted a Gay man, Chad Edwards, early last Sunday morning in a crime clearly motivated by anti-gay and transgendered hate. While pulling his hair to keep him upright, two bouncers pummeled Edwards' head with 15 to 20 punches as one taunted his as a "fucking faggot." Chicago police later compounded the hate crime by falsely arresting the profusely bleeding Edwards and his roommate, despite being called to the scene by the victims.

The incident began when Edwards, his roommate Kurt Schneider, and Edwards' boyfriend, "Maria," a transgendered person, entered the crowded Liars Nightclub at approximately 12:15 am Sunday. The first indication that there might be trouble came when a bouncer checked Maria's identification at the door and rolled his eyes as he looked at an id which showed a man, yet he saw a woman standing before him.

As the group was leaving, more trouble started. The attack on Edward's would have continued, save for the fact that Schneider picked up a heavy metal street pole and yelled at the assailants to stop. Police were called from a nearby bar, and even more problems occurred.

When the police arrived, they interviewed Edwards, Schneider, and Maria, as well as the two bouncers who assaulted the three, and a

manager who witnessed much of the assault. While initially unbiased, the police's demeanor towards the three victims changed abruptly once they discovered Maria was a transsexual while checking her id. This subsequently resulted in the false arrest of Edwards.


Edwards has filed a complaint against the police with the City and has twice attempted to have criminal charges filed against the two bouncers. The police have refused to arrest the bouncers.

CABN is assisting the victims of this antigay, anti-transgendered hate crime. CABN has demanded that the two bigoted bouncers and the manager be fired by the Liar's Club. CABN has also demanded that the City of Chicago fire the officers who compounded the hate crime by making false arrests.

He is a third-grader in special education classes, he sometimes struggles in school but is a hard worker. He attends special



To be the one who makes Tracy feel safe and comfortable contact the National Adoption Center, 1-800-ADOPT. Talk with them, and they will get the ball rolling.



Interview with Ben Affleck Star of Reindeer Games

ambridge bad boy, Ben Affleck, is back on the big screen after this past summer's - vulgar but critically lauded Dogma, the film in which he costarred with best buddy Matt Damon. In Reindeer Games, opening Friday, he is an ex-con caught up in an action thriller - a la John Frankenheimer (director of the 1962 classic, The Manchurian Candidate and most recently, Ronin) - of epic proportions.

"I'd never had the opportunity to work with such a master," says Affleck of Frankenheimer, whose career in the director's seat has spanned six decades, beginning in the early 1950's.

Playing an ex-con required Affleck to spend some time in a real jail which, to him, was all in a couple of day's work. I asked the good looking and young Affleck whether or

not he felt uncomfortable surrounded by a bunch of real convicts, many whom were more than glad to see him walking the corridors. "Walking down the prison halls and hearing cat calls was kind of funny, actually," comments "But from Affleck. what I heard, most of the Gay sex is voluntary. I know that

rapes do occur but I think there is a lot of voluntary Homosexuality in prisons." Affleck did admit that he was not brave enough to ditch his clothes and take a shower in the jail he spent time in, while getting into character.

Those familiar and fascinated with John Frankenheimer's genius directing talents will not be disappointed with his Games. A director from the old school (refined, polished, articulate and well dressed), Frankenheimer is quick to point out that he only works with those whom he chooses to work with. "I certainly would never work with someone I would not want to have dinner with," he says. During the forty plus years he has been directing, the list of actors he has shepherded has grown among the many; Angela Lansbury, Ingrid Bergman, Sir John Gielgud, Robert DeNiro, Gene Hackman and Gary Sinise.



and we told them that they were."



"Some members of the community are under the impression that the city buys and hangs the flags when in actuality this is all done by PrideFest," commented Co-Director Michael Lisowski. We wonder why blacks don't join mainstream gay life. It never occurs to us to be part of their lives. In that spirit, I called up a black gay acquaintance and asked him if he'd invite me to his next gathering of "SGL" friends (Same Gender Loving).

"Look," I said, "I want to go on a glorious safari. Will you be my guide?"

If it was anyone else, my friend would have decked me. But he knows I push envelopes harder than the post office. A week later I'm the last-minute surprise guest at a pot-luck dinner of thirty SGL women. They capped off the meal with a movie rental. "Great!" I thought. Until I saw what they had picked. Imagine being the only white male watching *The Color Purple* in a roomful of black women.


A week later I'm the only white guy at a SGL poetry reading. I was treated about the same as black men are treated in gay white gatherings: As a curiosity. The only difference was nobody made me feel like I shouldn't be there.

As the evening began I braced myself for the onslaught of anger and hostility that would surely be aimed at white society in the poetry. It was my first lesson in the difference between gay and straight black folks. Both have plenty to say about "the man," but only one has plenty to say about "the minister"

The church is to black society what K is to circuit society – the promise of transcendence amid tribal music, hypnotic dancing and laying-on of hands. But the church gives black gay folks more of a hang-over than K ever could to circuit queens. When the guy with the bullet turns his back on you, all you've lost is a snort. When the guy with the collar does it, you lose your mooring.

And so, that night I heard scorn heaped on the black church by the members it so cruelly turned away. You couldn't help but be moved by the rage and hurt aimed at an institution that provides sanctuary from a racist white society but not from a homophobic black one.



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President John McCain?

Party rules may prevent John McCain from getting the nomination, but if he does, Republican chances of recapturing the White House are markedly improved. McCain, a true blue conservative with a genuine populist streak, has caught the imagination of voters in a way that will not diminish as the months go on. He proudly boasts that he will, "beat Al Gore like a drum." He has reason to be optimistic but first must brush aside the candidate of choice amongst the Republican Party elite. For the majority of them, the choice for many months has been George W. Bush, the unimpressive Governor of Texas. We can only wish them well.

Bush wouldn't even be in the running if it weren't for Daddy. For that matter, he wouldn't even be considered Texas gubernatorial material. Senior Bush may seem somewhat mild mannered, but remember that he was the National Republican Party Chairman and then CIA Director before losing the nomination to Ronald Reagan in 1980. It's not possible to claw your way to these positions, the Vice Presidency and then the Presidency, without some smarts and a fair amount of ambition. Now he wants his proginy to create a legacy for the Bush clan. Yuck!

Dad and his friends are playing every trick in the book, including shutting down

McCain-leaning polling places in South Carolina, to insure success. It may work. Despite a groundswell of public support in the last month, within Republican Party faithful, Bush appears to be holding the line. SuperTuesday could well be defining.

While losing Independents and crossover Democrats, those who consider themselves Republican continue to support Bush by a wide margin. That gives him a distinct advan-

tage in the pursuit of nomination delegates. The undemocratic truth is that in many states, the candidate who gets the most votes may not get the most delegates. In California, it's a winner take all race and only Republican votes count. In the nation's largest state, McCain could get the most votes but none of the delegates. How's that for democracy?

The money race is tightening, but the Bush organizational advantage and its ability to compete everywhere may ultimately swamp the McCain tide.

McCain had an important Dad, too. An admitted party animal, and this was one goodlooking young man, he was "encouraged" by his father, the Admiral of the Pacific Fleet, to pursue a military career. Shot down over North Vietnam, he was held prisoner for

friends finance his purchase into the Texas Rangers baseball team. These differences don't actually form a basis for McCain support, but who can deny a distinct fall electoral advantage to the war hero?

Besides issues of personal history, it is the populist streak that propels McCain. Many Americans are disgusted by the pervasive influence of money on our electoral system. If you are comfortable with the rich having such extraordinary access to government,

then nothing I say here will sway vou. However, most Americans are disturbed by this legal bribery and how it effects the fundamental concept of one person, one

For a Republican - partnering with a liberal Wisconsin Senator no less - to take on this corrupt system is refreshing to say the least. For Republican to take on the Christian Coalition and the new

right is almost remarkable. Just in the past few days, McCain has criticized these purveyors of anti-gay rhetoric in unprecedented ways. He urged that, "the Bob Jones's of the world come out of the 16th century and join the rest of the human race in an era of toler-

Even more surprising is McCain's rejection of the tired Republican princi-

pal that giving more money to the rich will solve all problems. He actually has the nerve to say that the wealthiest class in the history of mankind is not due a bigger cut of the pie. Their houses are large enough. Their cars the best. They travel the world over. Their kids go to the best schools. Why anyone would think that the likes of Ted Turner and Bill Gates need a tax cut is beyond me, but millions of Americans do.

The salesguy, the housewife and the small businessman, all dreaming of riches, call into talk radio to berate McCain as a traitor to basic Republican tax principals. Belling, Limbaugh and the rest of their top-bracket ilk, egg them on and castigate McCain as, "worse than the devil, a truly evil individual."

McCain is betting that a responsible (i.e. Clinton) tax policy and true campaign finance reform will shake just enough support from Gore/Clinton to catapult him into the White House. Clinton fatigue does seem to be real. Despite phenomenal economic success, the country is itching for a change. McCain economic advisors, sensitive to this and to the solid record of economic success.

say, "they won't fix what ain't broke." This again will make it all that much easier to pull that lever for McCain.

And don't forget about that other funny guy from Texas, Ross Perot. If Bush gets the nod, you can bet that there will be a vigorous fight from the Reform Party, even if Perot has to stomach Pat Buchanon. For him, it's personal. The Bushes snubbed him, and he's never going to forget it.

A war hero who actually wants to do something about the money juggernaut, and isn't just about giving more money to the rich, will play well against Al Gore - and even better against the unlikely candidacy of Bill Bradley. The Republican base, despite their whining, will have nowhere else to go.

The wounded Bush, running on tax policies that failed his father in '92 and again Bob Dole in '96, without even the pretense of the will to take on the Washington financial establishment, is not about to create a Reagan type revolution

Many consider abortion rights to be akin to Gay rights in that it establishes parameters for government involvement in adult sexual and reproductive behavior. Both Bush and McCain are strong anti-abortion rights candidates. However, McCain has been clear that he doesn't feel there is the political will to criminalize this activity and has said that he

> will not champion the passage of the pro-life Constitutional Amendment called for in the Republican Party platform. He also believes in common sense, rape and incest exclusions. It is this essentially status quo position that enrages the Pro-Life movement, but it also makes him more palatable to the majority Pro-Choice voters.

On Gay rights, McCain and Bush are not really all that different. Neither expresses support for any part of the Gay Agenda. However,

McCain has taken on the far right and their "self appointed spokespersons, Jerry Falwell and Pat Robertson." (The enemies of my enemies are more to my liking than the friends of my enemies.)

While Bush wouldn't even give them the time of day, McCain did at least meet, and accept money from, the Log Cabin Republicans. There is a difference between these two, but don't expect either one to go to bat for your right to protect your job, much less for your right to a career in the military. Don't expect either of these two to fight to expand the legal parameters of your relationships. For that you will have to look at the Democrats in the race.





Nabucco

With the grand opera Nabucco, the great Italian opera composer Giuseppe Verdi had "arrived," setting him off on a very successful, life-long career as Italy's foremost operatic composer. Given its historical significance, it's somewhat surprising Nabucco isn't very frequently performed. It was, thus, a breath of fresh air when Milwaukee's Florentine Opera Company undertook its production, performing it on February 18,

19 and 20 at Uihlein Hall.

While Nabucco is without a stand out, solo aria, it does have the powerful choral aria "Va, pensiero," in which the captured Hebrews lament their lost homeland and captivity. In this opera, it is the chorus that is the star of the show, and Verdi

employed it in scene after scene with notable originality, singing in a language both natural and unaffected. In the hands of Chorus Master Scott S. Stewart, Verdi and Solera's work came off beautifully and powerfully.

Which is not to besmirch the major characters. Donnie Ray Albert portrayed the title character with great strength, yet vulnerability. His prison scene at the start of Act IV was particularly effective. Albert's was a magnificent demonstration of Nabucco's two opposing emotions: outraged authority and lyrical ten-

derness. Also, Linda Roark-Strummer showed vocal aggression, occasionally tempered by gentle contemplation, as Nabucco's supposed daughter, Abigaille. Another excellent performance came from Stefan Szkafarowsky as the Hebrew Priest, Zaccaria. These three, plus the supporting cast, were all in excellent voice.

The Florentine Opera production of Nabucco brought out the "grand" in this grand opera. N. Benois' costume designs were colorful, detailed and convincing. The set designs by Claude Girard were equally eye-catching, and included a large idol that crumbles apart near the end of Act IV. Finally, Conductor Arthur Fagen lead a wellrehearsed, clear sounding orchestra in Verdi's fine score.

Uncle Vanya

Anton Chekhov has long been acclaimed a master of the short story - stories that make excellent transitions to the theatrical stage. The Boulevard Ensemble clearly proves this to be so with its current production of Uncle Vanya, the second in a quartet of highly successful Chekhov plays originally produced by the Moscow Art Theater. It is a fine example of Chekhov's style, emphasizing internal drama, characterization and mood rather than plot, and focusing on the tragicomic aspects of banal events.

Uncle Vanya is truly a character-driven play, and Boulevard has assembled a very strong cast more than up to the job. The best of the group includes David Flores (Vanya), who alternately storms, rages and sinks into the abyss of depression over his life's course. Terry Tuttle (Yelena) lends both sexu-

ality and humanity to her character. John Starmer (Astrov) gives a powerful, convincing performance as a neighboring doctor who rants passionately about the abuse of the forests by careless people almost with as much heart as he pursues Yelena him-

self. He, meanwhile, is the object of Sonya's affection (Stacey Meyer, who brings sentimentality and depth to her character).

Director Maureen Kilmurry notes that, since the action in Uncle Vanya "could take place anywhere," and that its content "transcends time and space," there

was no attempt to conform to Chekhov's 1899 setting. But rather than changing the time and place specifically (as is often done to "refresh" old chestnuts), Kilmurry gives no us no specifics. Does this work? It's just a personal preference, but I prefer to have a defined setting. I also think audiences respond better to more detailed roadmaps a better sense of what's going on in the world of the characters - a sense of their place in history. Budget constraints, of course, played a role in this, which is perfectly understandable.



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In the Movies Review by John Jahn

"It's not a musical revue," announced Dale Gutzman from the stage of Centennial Hall. "It's not a play. It's a musical entertainment," Such is how Bill Roddick's new show, In the Movies, was introduced to the audience last weekend.

In the Movies follows four Milwaukeeans searching for movie fame among Hollywood's elite. Gutzman's character (named Dale appropriately enough) seeks to direct a movie based upon the lives of three "ordinary," "real" people. He goes down into the audience and brings forth three "volunteers," who are, in fact cast members.

Through the course of two acts and 16 songs, we follow Dale, Ellen (Jodi Schwalbach), Bill (Vince Lombardo) and Jenna (Lynn Worden) on a journey of selfdiscovery. They at first think their seemingly average lives have no place on the big screen. For a while, though, they become convinced of the idea, and are increasingly star-struck. But, through unhappy experiences, introspection, soul searching, and a meeting with a Wizard of Oz-clone, The Dreammaker (Larry J. Lukasavage), they eventually decide they don't need an autobiographical movie. Their "ordinary" lives will do just fine,

In the Movies suffers from being half an hour too long. Part of the problem is the fact that Dale frequently goes into the audience to ask questions like "What has been the biggest scene in your life so far?" These efforts take up time, bring the action to a screeching halt, and produce nothing except frozen responses from embarrassed audience members. There is also an over-long "Hollywood party" scene in Act Two which goes nowhere dramatically or musically.

The cast lacks snappy timing, leaving many would be humorous moments lying flat. The obviously ill rehearsed chorus and supporting cast make their participation distracting by their sheer amateurishness. The singing can best be described as lifeless and weak (though Gutzman has his moments).

Director Curtis Hanson truly "arrived" three years ago with the atmospheric, moody, superb film L.A. Confidential, an instant critical success. We've had to wait three years for his next effort. Meanwhile, Grady's personal life is screwed up. His wife has left him; his married girlfriend, Sarah (Frances McDormand) - also the college's chancellor - is pregnant with his child; and a student named Hannah (Katie Holmes) - who rents a room in his house - has a crush



on him! Finally, there's James Leer (Tobey Maguire), a brooding young man with great writing potential. Grady has taken him as a protégé, but the experience turns out to be much different than he

One thing that was definitely welcome in this film is that Michael Douglas has finally moved beyond trying to play the macho sex symbol, and does an excellent job in the Grady role. But rising star Maguire isn't quite as good as James, seeming too flat at times, as if there's nothing beneath his character's cool exterior. Frances McDormand is delightful. but, like Holmes and Downey, Jr. she's underutilized.

It shows that Hanson is not afraid to broaden his horizons. And, with vivid characters, an irony-laced narrative and a wellwritten screenplay, Wonder Boys does provide a decent share of entertainment.



Milwaukee Chamber Orchestra A Top Ensemble By Charles Grosz

To attract an audience, most orchestral music directors experiment with ideas and repertoire, in attempt to offer a fresh look at compositions centuries old. Stephen Colburn offered such alternative views last Thursday with his Milwaukee Chamber Orchestra, achieving impressive results.

The program opened with J.S. Bach's Ricercare a 6 from the Musical Offering, as arranged by 20th century composer Anton Webern. Contemporary arrangements of classical works are akin to a cinematic remake of a vintage film. Structure, form and dialogue remain intact, but an expanded pallet of special effects are available to update the clas-

Remakes are rarely as artistically successful as the original, but in this case Webern serves Bach well. Nearly a dozen players are each assigned individual parts, and Webern uses the color of each instrument to emphasize line and the clarity of counterpoint. The fine musicians of the Chamber Orchestra delivered a delicate, intelligent reading which allowed the

listener untroubled navigation through this dense polyphonic masterpiece.

Johannes Brahms composed two Serenades for orchestra early in his career, both flowing with melody and optimism. The second Serenade in A major is unique in that the composer included no violins, instead featuring the viola section as the dominant string voice of this five movement work. The effect should be one of rich texture and candlelight, as if viewing an old master painting shimmering with a golden patina.

Mr. Colburn's decision to reduce the string section to just four players may have been innovative, but it ultimately proved anemic. A full compliment of strings would have provided the warmth this piece deserves; though the four-featured players played magnificently. Violists Nathan Hackett and Brek Renzelman exhibited rock solid technique and beautiful phrasing. Scott Tisdel pulled a beautiful tone from his cello and bassist Catherine McGinn provided excellent pitch and rhythm, though her sound was at times timid. The woodwinds often covered important string lines, and several sour chords in the Minuetto surprised. considering the caliber of players. Mr. Colburn dictated brisk tempos throughout and maintained an appropriate folk-music atmosphere.

Following intermission, Stravinsky's 'Ragtime" for 11 instruments proved an interesting choice, in part due to the artistic decision to feature the originally scored cimbalom in place of the commonly used piano. This Hungarian hammered dulcimer added a honky-tonk flavor to the fourminute performance, though the poor amplification system was both unnecessary and distracting.

The reading lacked a certain sarcastic wit, but was enjoyable none the less. The dynamics would be effective with a more exaggerated range, and accents with a real punch would not have been out of line. Stravinsky most likely never heard authentic ragtime music played live, but considering his thirst for contemporary musical genres certainly had copies of Scott Joplin piano scores. What Stravinsky produced was a piece influenced by the ability to follow the soloist through innumerable tricky tempo changes. This performance proved that all involved were not only up to the task, but soared high above the expected, taking the audience along for the ride.

Ms. George presented herself a total artist, demonstrating technique, musicality and a stage presence far beyond what her youthful appearance would suggest. Her performance was one of confidence without the bravura, presenting herself as participant, not prima donna. Intonation never wavered, her fluid bow arm a study in control even during quiet double-stop legato passages. Milwaukee is lucky to have her.

The orchestra proved itself a top ensemble, sympathetic while accompanying and determined in the tuttis. There were moments of over generous fortes early on, but most likely attributed to the excellent acoustics of the Schwan Concert Hall at Wisconsin Lutheran College rather than inattentive players. Wonderful solo playing from all the principals, with special mention to Ms. McGinn, who's masterly handling of the many exposed bass passages, was exemplary.

Mr. Colburn held it together with clear beats and a forward drive, which threatened, controlled chaos, and delivered uncontrolled excitement. The sell out crowd was generous and honest with its approval. On the way out, many searched the lobby for information concerning the next concert. If this MCO concert is of typical quality, the March 9th concert should



Finding a house to buy is a lot like finding a boyfriend or girlfriend. When you finally find one you like, the first thing you do is to try to change it.

When I finally paid off my last student loan recently, I decided that it was time for me to put down roots. Or at least come up with some other large debt that I can use to fill the gaping emptiness in my life where my student debt used to be. Besides, there's only so much you can do with an apartment, and even though my gay design genes are limited at best, I am a great organizer. I like projects and plans. And I've re-organized one too many boyfriend's closets. 'Order out of chaos, I said. You labeled my socks and divided them by color," he replied in shock.

The first thing I did when I decided to take the plunge into the turbulent waters of buying a place was to find a real estate agent. A family oriented agent, that is. I needed someone who would understand my special concerns about living space. Proximity to the gayer areas of town is important to me.

Easy access to restaurants, movies, and my favorite coffee house are key. I'm not looking for a house in the extreme suburbs, no matter how affordable it might be, and I am definitely not into major yard work. I got enough of that when I was growing up. (I learned to drive on a riding lawnmower. And I drew out detailed landscaping plans for our yard in my spare time.)

Ultimately, for the choice of agents, it was a toss-up between a tough-as-nails lesbian (did

you see the movie *The Negotiator?*) and a gay man with construction experience. My lesbian friend is an exception to the stereotype of lesbians and power tools, and I'm looking for a fixer-upper,(again, isn't it just like dating?), so I decided to go with the guy with construction experience. Unlike some gay folks, I don't walk into a house and say, "That wall must go!" My skills do not extend that far, and I was terrible at Tinker Toys. I needed the remodeling advice.

Once we started looking, I realized that finding the right house or condo, humble hovel, wasn't going to be as easy as I thought. There are two basic types of existing homeowners. The LGBT homeowner, and the handicapped, otherwise known as straight.

Almost every place you look at that is owned by LGBT folks is move-in quality. Crown molding, fabulous kitchens, up-dated bathrooms (gotta love those two-headed showers), open, airy, and bright. (Not unlike my last boyfriend after I'd completed his retraining and released him back into the dating pool.) But the houses built by LGBT folks are priced to match. Then there are the ones owned by the artsy or frou-frou LGBT folks. The ones with the koi ponds beside the patio and the dog house with the miniature marble staircase. This is where the queer gene goes too far.

It's a whole other experience when you look at homes owned by straight folks. The difference is sometimes astonishing. It's a lot like being in the movie *The Wizard of Oz* and going back to Kansas. Everything goes from

techni-color to black and white. I find myself wondering, "How do these people live this way?"

Is it environmental or genetic? There are kitchens in need of a wrecking ball, hideous carpets covering perfectly good hardwood floors, and wallpaper that would make a cannibal queasy.

I have developed a coping mechanism to adapt to the shock of looking at such places. First, I walk in and gasp in initial shock and dismay. Then I close my eyes, click my heels together three times, and repeat, There's nothing like crown molding, there's nothing like crown molding! Buying a straight-owned home is a little like dating a guy direct from his parents farm in Iowa. There may be a lot of potential there, but a lot of work has to go into it. And I'm just not into complete reconstruction. I am not a Lesbian.

Still, I've learned to look at a place and immediately imagine it as I would want it to be. And in a way, that's the same approach I've always taken to life as a gay person. I look at things the way they are, and I imagine them the way I want them to be. Then I just do it.



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

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Money for Nothing

Nearly everyone likes the idea of getting something for nothing, whether it's gift certificates for reading e-mail from MyPoints

Bonusmail (online at http://www.mypoints.com) or money earned-while websurfing from AllAdvantage (at http://www.alladvantage.com).

Thanks now to a partnership between financial heavyweights Deutsche Bank and Goldman Sachs. There is a new web venture named PayPal (online at http://www.paypal.com). It seeks to revolutionize person-to-person financial transactions on the net – and they'll be so grateful for your registration they pay you \$10 just for signing up. They also fork over another \$10 for every friend, colleague, associate or ex-lover you refer!

This particular marketing technique – known in the e-commerce industry as "viral marketing" – is one websurfers are seeing more frequently these days. It is a way to get users to sign up for the nascent Hotmail web-based e-mail service by including a link at the bottom of each outgoing message. Viral marketing can now be found all over the net. Not all offers netizens see are from reputable outfits, but even the wariest surfer can relax when an online program is

backed by some of the biggest names in international banking and electronic commerce.

Registering for PayPal is straightforward, though the various security features intended to safeguard both their money and yours suggest that you choose a time to sign up when you can concentrate on what you're reading online without distraction. All you need be armed with (beyond the usual like your name and address), is a MasterCard or Visa or one of their branded check cards, which work just fine. Depending on the speed of your Internet connection, the whole process should not take more than five minutes.

The first part of the sign-up process is the one in which you create your identity on the system, supplying to PayPal your name, e-mail address and real-world address. At the bottom of the online form, the site asks for the e-mail address of a referrer; if you're like me in hating blank spaces, just use mine — michael@michaelstewart.com. Of course you could use www.ARCW.org and they will get the referral credit. Then hit the "Submit" button, wait a moment and check your e-mail.

Completing and submitting this last screen finalizes the registration process. It magically deposits your \$10 signup bonus into your account, where it remains available to you to send to others through the PayPal system, or to withdraw and have automatically credited to your bank account or sent to you in check form.

Laser Hair Removal Interview with Dr. Weiner

Let's face it. Most of us have unwanted hair on various parts of our bodies. And, most of us have tried just about every product on the market to remove it. The problem is, hair grows back. Fortunately, LASER technology now offers a safer, more effective solution.

LASER – Light Amplification by the Stimulated Emission of Radiation – is the production of light at just one wavelength. According to Michael A. Weiner, MD, board certified plastic reconstructive surgeon, "Laser hair removal is revolutionary technique with enduring result. It leaves skin feeling smooth, clean and fresh."

Dr. Weiner said that laser hair removal is a gentler, faster, more effective solution to unwanted hair. "Traditional hair removal techniques provide temporary solutions. People often experience allergic reactions and painful ingrown hairs when using over-the-counter products."

Here are some of the most commonly asked questions about laser hair removal:

Q: What does LASER hair removal feel like?


A: Most insurance companies do not cover the procedure, however, payment plans are usually offered.

"Make sure all of your questions are answered before you make your decision to undergo hair removal."






