

Cream City Foundation (CCF) awarded two grants during their 2nd Quarter grant cycle. Grants were awarded to the Milwaukee LGBT Community Center and Plymouth Church. A \$5,000 grant to the center will be used to support the Center's Anti-Violence Project, providing education and outreach to the LGBT community and other professionals around the issues of domestic violence and sexual assault. Plymouth Church was awarded a \$1,200 grant to hire a LGBT intern to provide ministerial support to LGBT students and others near and on the University of Wisconsin-Milwaukee campus.

We are so pleased with the diversity of proposals we have seen," said Michael Salinas, CCF Executive Director. Salinas said the foundation is on track to distribute a record amount of funds for the 2002 grant year. "CCF is working to ensure that the foundation can provide the charitable funds necessary to meet the increased need out there. That includes future as well as current needs," said Salinas.

Cream City Foundation is a community-based philanthropic foundation that distributes funds to programs that enhance the quality of life for the Lesbian, Gay, Bisexual and Transgender communities in Southeastern Wisconsin.


Community Shares: Your Community. Your Choice

"Community Shares of Greater Milwaukee", formerly ACHOICE, officially launched its 2002 workplace giving campaign. The annual kick-off event was held on Thursday, August 22nd at Washington Park. The new name better defines this organization's role as a family of non-profit organizations that share workplace-giving dollars to help others in the Greater Milwaukee community. Cream City Foundation has long been an active member of the federation and the funds provided to CCF through Community Shares is an important source of support for the foundation.

Community Shares was created in 1981 to give Milwaukeeans a choice in who they support with their workplace-giving dollars. By filling that role, they've been able to help many local, independent charitable organizations, like CCF, and the thousands they serve.

Today, the federation of Community Shares members numbers 53 agencies.

Every autumn, public and private employers sponsor campaigns to encourage their employees to become philanthropists. This is generally called "workplace giving". The donor choice program allows employees to directly designate donations to agencies outside of United Way's umbrella - such as CCF. Community Shares, CCF, and 52 other agencies relies on people like you for support. You can contribute to Community Shares in both the public and private sector. In the public sector (government offices and educational facilities), employees can find information about Community Shares in their official campaign. materials. If you work in the private sector, you can find information on Community Shares through the United Way's Community Donor Choice Program. If you haven't received any information, just ask your workplace-giving campaign coordinator, human resources manager or other appropriate staff for information. CCF COMMITS \$4,000 TOWARDS THE John M. Cowles Memorial Scholarship Fund. WORKS TOWARDS RAISING OVER

Friday, November 1st, 2002 will mark an important occasion in the history of CCF. That date marks the birth date of John M. Cowles, the namesake of CCF's John M. Cowles Scholarship Fund.

\$10,000 MORE.

John M. Cowles was an active and vibrant member of the LGBT community who died of complications of AIDS on January 12, 1990 at the age of 36. John was born in Wyoming, Michigan on November 1, 1953. He attended the University of California, Berkeley, and Michigan State University where he earned the B.S. in Chemistry in 1975. He later attended Marquette University and received a Ph.D. in Organic Chemistry in 1983. John worked as an organic chemist at the University of California, San Francisco, and at his untimely death he was a Senior research Chemist at Miller Brewing Company where he obtained two US patents for hops chemistry. John was happy and proud to be gay and was pro-active in LGBT issues.

He was an enthusiastic supporter of the LGBT community and would have contributed much more had he lived on. He was a founder and president of GAMMA, an early CCF board member, was active in AIDS awareness and prevention programs as early as 1982 and was active in the GAMMA Rays volleyball league. John was also an avid cook and bridge player. His professional passions were scientific research and the teaching of science.

For those who knew him, his long illness was painful and his ultimate loss of life was a great sorrow. He had so much more to do.

In his remembrance to the community and his devotion to science, the John M. Cowles Memorial Scholarship Fund was initiated in the Fall of 1990. The scholarship fund is an aid to other LBGT students majoring in science and a fitting legacy to his continued memory. Dr. David F. Stowe and Christina Cowles, the two individuals originally involved in establishing the fund through John's estate, have pledged their support in working with CCF to refocus attention towards the replenishment of the fund, with a goal of reaching permanent endowment status. CCF has committed to adding \$4,000 to the fund, with a goal of raising \$10,000 more dollars within the next few months. CCF is also developing an aggressive outreach plan to create greater awareness of the fund to donors and to LGBT students and administrations at colleges and universities throughout Southeast Wisconsin. "Compared to people at large," said David Stowe, "relatively few LGBT students pursue careers in science. The John M. Cowles Scholarship will assist deserving Milwaukee area LGBT students at the undergraduate level to develop careers in the natural sciences."



CCF is holding "A Toast to Scholarship", a reception to help keep John's legacy growing. The event will be held on Friday, November 1st, at 6:00 PM at the historic Brumder Mansion, located at 3046 West Wisconsin Avenue in Milwaukee. The reception will include entertainment provided by vocalist Jerry Grillo and guided tours of the 1910 Victorian mansion by hosts Bob and Carol Hirschi. Additional sponsors of the event include the University of Wisconsin-Milwaukee's LGBT Resource Center, Marquette University Gay/Straight Alliance, Grasch Foods, M&M Club, Brumder Mansion and Jerry Grillo.


