### Pride Proclamation

We are a people whose song has not yet been fully sung. We sing with many voices, and many harmonies, all of them blending to produce the same music. We sing for justice. We sing for equality. We sing for our lives.

Ours is a song of power and unity. A song of personal triumph over fear. We sing a song that reaches from the crevices of the earth to the heavens above.

There was a day when our song was seldom if ever sung. Even when it was sung, it was with whispers, and in the darkest of shadows. Then one day in June of 1969, those who some would consider to be the last among us were the first to raise clear, resonant voices. They sang of anger, they sang of courage.

Their voices were soon joined by others. Their singing grew so loud that the world was forced to take notice. They helped shape our song into one of hope, inspiration and truth, no one who has felt that music, and heard that song will ever forget it.

That is not to say that there are not those who object to our song of freedom. They call our love for each other "perversion". They call hate a "family value". They call violence "a public service". They call disease "God's punishment".

Yet the last twenty five years have shown us that everything is possible. We have gone from the days of bar raids, to a day when Lesbian and Gay culture is out in the open. We have gone from the days of shame to the days of pride. We have had moments of thrilling victory and moments of crushing defeat.

Through it all our song continues. It lives in each of us, in our minds and in our hearts. It rises and falls in intensity. It is refreshed and renewed as more join the chorus, each singing their own verse. No matter how hard they try, those who hate can no longer stop our singing.

We have learned that our song sounds best when we sing it together, undivided by sex, and color. We have seen that when we set aside our differences and concentrate on our commonality we set a shining example for all to follow.

Our answer to those who oppressed us, those who would slam shut the closet door, those who would bring back the days of shame is the song of our lives. When we display our many talents, we sing of our diversity and our unity. When we march we sing of justice and courage. When we display our rich history, we sing of our pride.

Therefore, the Pride Council and the PrideFest Board, calls upon all Gay, Lesbian, Bisexual and Transgender people and those close to us, to gather in celebration on June 11th and 12th on the grounds of Milwaukee's War Memorial Center.

Together we will give our answer to those who spread fear and bigotry as we sing, and we laugh, and we dance, and we learn and we play. Together we will renew our bonds to each other and learn from each other.

It is our time to shine. Together we will shine. Together we will celebrate a quarter century of singing our song.

# What's NOW For '94?

hat's new at PrideFest? This year's celebration has so many new features it may be easier to ask what isn't new. For starters, the festival has relocated to a new site on the park land just North of the Milwaukee War Memorial Art Center.

PrideFest will feature expanded hours. The festival officially opens at Noon on Saturday and will run until 10:30 pm Saturday evening. Sunday's festivities begin with an Inter-Faith Service at 10:30 and conclude at 10:00 pm.

With all the new attractions the need for the expanded hours and the new site are obvious. The new Harvey Milk Stage will feature some great acts. With the tented Harvey Milk Stage, PrideFest will have two entertainment stages, the Harvey Milk Stage and the outdoor, CCF Alyn Hess Stage both boasting new sound systems provided by Select Sound.

The PrideFest Lite Beer Volley-Ball Invitational is another exciting addition. The tourney will take place all day on Saturday with sixteen teams from around the nation expected to participate.

The new Milwaukee Invitational Classic Car show is promises to be a hit with Festival goers. Sponsored by the Lake Michigan region of the Lambda Car Club the show is expected to attract dozens of vintage autos.

The new PrideFest Dance Tent sponsored by *In Step Magazine* and Madison's Club 3054 will hold a "spin off" of the state's best dj's. The new Multi-cultural Tent will display the works of artists and craftspeople of color.

A large number of acts are making their PrideFest debut. In fact, so many high quality acts approached PrideFest some had to be turned away.

An expanded food and drink menu features several new items. Of course, all of the PrideFest food and drink is reasonably priced.

The new games area gives visitors a chance to win cash or prizes at the game of their choice. The new History Tent will feature videos, lectures and the largest display of Gay and Lesbian history anywhere in the country.

The Wisconsin Pride Parade will have some new wrinkles with a new route and a new judging category for decorated vehicles.

Get the idea? If you thought PrideFest was a great celebration in the past (and it was) just wait. As the saying goes "You ain't seen nothing yet."

# WISCONSIN E Pride Parade

ore than any other aspect of PrideFest, the annual Wisconsin Pride Parade is a true commemoration of Stonewall. Just as we did 25 years ago, Gays, Lesbians and Bisexuals will take to the streets to let the world know we are no longer ashamed and afraid.

The 1994 Wisconsin Pride Parade will be held on Sunday, June 12th at 12:30 PM. The parade assembly will take place in front of the Alyn Hess Stage. Special preparade entertainers and speakers will get the crowd fired up.

Lesbian and Gay political analysts say this year's parade is more important than ever. Wisconsin Light political columnist and PrideFest Co-Chair, Bill Meunier is among them, "The homophobic right is trying to organize Wisconsin. They have a new group with chapters in 12 cities. They intend to repeal AB70, our civil rights law. We need

Parade organizers, Rick Finger and Sheldon Schur have added a new judging category, "decorated vehicles" to this year's parade.

Floats and Decorated Cars will compete for three awards to be given in each category, Best Use Theme, "Stonewall 25 Our Time to Shine", Best Presentation and Special Merit. Marching units will compete for two Awards of Special Merit.

The new decorated car category gives individuals and organizations an opportunity to be creative without the large expense that a float entails.

The parade route is as follows: Leave the PrideFest grounds, head North on Lincoln Memorial Drive to East Mason. West on Mason to Prospect, South on Prospect to Wisconsin, West on Wisconsin to Jackson, North on Jackson to Kilbourn, East on Kilbourn to Prospect and then back to PrideFest.

Fees for the parade are as follows: Floats and Marching Units \$30.00, Decorated Cars \$20.00. Due to costs of insurance and parade permits, PrideFest must insist that all groups pay the required fee.

Hill is an African American who served as the Gay/Les/Bi liaison to former New York Mayor, David Dinkins and is scheduled to speak in the Stonewall tent on Sunday June 12th at 1:30pm. Kochman is the Executive Director of the New York chapter of SAGE, she is a nationally known expert on aging in our community. She will be speaking in the tent on Saturday June 11th at 2:00.

ay Power Comes To Sheridan Square" read the headline in the New York City's Village Voice. It was the first edition of the paper after the Stonewall riots in the last weekend in June, 1969, the event that would set off with an explosive thunder the modern movement for Gay liberation.

How come? Why then? Was it planned? Who did it?

Perhaps it happened because Judy Garland's body was lying in state uptown. Then, as now, she was a favorite among Gays. On the night of June 27-28, they had gathered in their numbers on Christopher Street, in the Stonewall and other bars off Sheridan Square, to mourn her.

Perhaps it was because in the previous three weeks, five Gay bars in the area had been hit by cops.

What ever it was, the police expected no trouble. These were only "fags," after all. Queers, "sissyboys," didn't fight back. The vice cops had been through all this uncounted times before.

In the wee hours of Friday, June 28, Deputy Inspector Seymour Pine arrived with his eight officers at the Stonewall Inn, 53 Christopher Street. They piled out of cars and the paddy wagon and hustled inside.

The Stonewall Inn was a favorite haunt of African American and Hispanic drag queens. It was packed that night. One by one, they were arrested and escorted out.

Business as usual, for the cops. But things changed.

A crowd had gathered outside and began to yell and chant. "Pigs! Faggot Cops!" they screamed. More patrons were pushed out, including a Lesbian. She wasn't going any further and started to fight. It was she who began it, she who provided the spark that set off the blaze. It was her struggle that encouraged the bystanders. The shouts grew louder. People began throwing coins, then a bottle and another and another, until the cops were driven back inside, prisoners in the bar they'd come to raid.

It took 45 minutes for reinforcements to arrive. The cops beat a hasty retreat. But Gays scented freedom, they felt it's first taste, and they were not finished, not yet.

Throughout the weekend, day and night, Gays took over Christ-opher Street. They came from all over the city, from Jersey and farther afield to take part. Gay cheerleaders in a Gay chorus line, led Gay Power cheers. "We are the Stonewall girls/We wear our hair in curls/We

have no underwear/We show our pubic hair!" Shouts of "Christopher Street Belongs to the Queens!" and "Liberate Christ-opher Street!" rang to the echo.

At one point, the cops returned in full riot gear only to be met by the drag queen chorus line who went into a full kick routine.

Early Sunday morning, poet Allen Ginsberg walked along Christopher Street. "You know," he said to a companion, "the guys are so beautiful. They've lost that wounded look that fags all had."

The Village Voice was right. Gay power had come to Sheridan Square and it would never be silent again.





### PrideFest To Enjoy New Lakefront Home

PrideFest organizers want to make sure that you know they have moved Wisconsin's Pride Celebration to a new site. The new site is located just North of Milwaukee's War Memorial Art Center.

That's just down the hill from the old site at Juneau Park. The War Memorial Center is located at the Eastern end of East Mason Street. Mason is one block north of Wisconsin Ave.

Milwaukee area residents will recognize the site as the same spot



used by the Lake Front Festival of the Arts. It is a large grass covered area right on the lake.

The festival has been moved to accommodate all of the new attractions that have been added to PrideFest. The addition of a second entertainment stage, a history tent, a sports area, games area, and multicultural tent, plus the Milwaukee Invitational Classic Car show and other new attractions made it impossible to stay put.

"We really couldn't pack anything more into our Juneau Park site without creating severe crowd congestion," said PrideFest Co-Chair, Bill Meunier. "There simply wasn't enough clear ground space to allow us to add all of the tents we are planning to put up."

In addition to the extra space, the new site has another advantage, parking. The O'Donnell Park Parking Pavilion is located just two blocks South of the new site. The pavilion can hold 1,200 cars. Parking spaces are also available on the street in the Juneau Park area.

Visitors will be asked to voluntarily donate \$1.00 when they enter. This will help PrideFest keep attendance and defray costs. No one will be allowed to carry in food or drink they are accompanied by children.

### History Tent Opens Window on Past

### Largest Exhibit of It's Kind Featured at PrideFest

Before we can determine where we are going, we must know where we are and where we've been.

With that in mind, PrideFest with the help of the Brondino & Iverson Law firm, is providing our community with a chance to learn about a past not mentioned in school textbooks. The PrideFest History Tent will feature the largest display of Gay/Les/Bi history anywhere in the country.

Covering 100 years from the 1880's through the 1980's, the exhibit was assembled by the International Gay and Lesbian Archives. IGLA founder, Jim Keppner, will be on hand to answer questions.

On display are depictions of early forerunners of the movement in the 19th century as well as the development of the movement in this century from the first national and local organizations to the Marches on Washington.

The History Tent boasts a video viewing area, provided by Milwaukee's Video Adventures. Videos of Lesbian and Gay history will be shown while the tent is open. Brief lectures on historical

events will be presented every hour on the hour.

The PrideFest History Tent is dedicated to the memory of "The Thousand," a group of gay teenagers murdered by Nazi Germany on September 18, 1944 at the Auschwitz Concentration Camp.

According to eyewitness, noted author Elie Weisel, the teens were forced to strip naked in the middle of the camp. Realizing that most were about to be killed, the entire group attacked the guards in a desperate bid to escape. After the guards were done clubbing victims into submission they forced the stonger teens to carry to weaker ones to the gas chambers where all were killed. An estimated 1,000,000 Gay and Lesbian persons were murdered by Nazi Germany.

The infamous Article 175, which the Nazi's used to arrest, torture and kill Gays and Lesbians was finally taken off the books by Germany in March, 1994. To this day, the German government has refused to offer an apology or reparations as it has with other groups victimized by the Nazi regime.

### THE CHICAGO ARREST 1925

The entire membership of Chicago's Society for Human Rights, the first known Gay rights group were arrested. After two trials they were finally cleared, but the group was dead.

### MAGAZINE SEIZED 1954

Postal Inspectors seize One Magazine on the grounds it is obscene. Courts agree and say that One is without social values because it dicussed homosexuality without the "this is poison" label. One Magazine was finally cleared by the Supreme Court. Prior to this decision, films, novels and articles could only discuss homosexuality if they expressed absolute moral disapproval.

### CONFERENCES HELD 1966

Kansas City hosts the first ever national conference of what was called "homophile organizations." Later, a larger gathering was held in San Francisco. Splits in the movement emerge at the end of this conference as conflicts erupt over strategies, styles and goals.

### 1950 MATTACHINE FORMS

Three friends, Bob Hull, Chuck Rowlandand Dale Jennings join Harry Hay and Rudi Genernich to quietly and cautiously start what grew into the Mattachine Society, the forerunner and fountainhead of America's Gay/Les/Bi rights movement.

### 1967 CALIFORNIA BAR RAIDS SPARKS ACTIVISM

Protests following harassment and raids at the Patch II bar in Wilmington CA, lead to the small newsletter PRIDE becoming The Advocate. Three new groups were also formed HELP, the first Gay/Les/Bi legal aid society, SPREE the first Gay film, theater and social club and the Metropolitan Community Church, which now functions on a world wide basis.

### 1959 STONEWALL RIOTS

Gays and Lesbians riot in New York's Greenwich Village after police raid the Stonewall Inn, quickly transforming the quiet "homo-phile" movement into a fast growing world wide confrontational Gay Liberation movement. Congressional Quarterly, writing about this event says "Gay and Lesbian history must be seen in two periods, before Stonewall and after Stonewall."

### WISCONSIN'S FIRST 1969 ORGANIZATION FORMED

Wisconsin's Gay Liberation
Organization is formed. The group
later changes its name to
Gay People's Union and is still in
existence 25 years later.
GPU starts the VD Clinic, (now The
Brady East STD Clinic), a hot line,
support groups, Gay/Les/Bi sports
activities, a legal defense fund,
a public speakers bureau, the first regularly scheduled Gay/Les/Bi radio
show in the nation, a highly regarded
news magazine, The GPU News.

### FIRST NATIONAL 1979 MARCH HELD

The first National March on Washington is held. Nearly 100,000 Gays, Lesbians, and friends from every state and territory in the US, lobby, party and hold concerts in Washington D.C.

### FIRST STATEWIDE 1982 GAY/LES/BI RIGHTS LAW

Led by Leon Rouse, Wisconsin's Gay and Lesbian community stuns the world by winning passage of the nation's first statewide Gay and Lesbian rights law. Rouse along with activists, politicians, and church leaders from Milwaukee and Madison engage in a hard fought lobbying campaign. Governor Lee Dreyfus rejects a last ditch conservative lobbying campaign and signs it into law, making Wisconsin, "The Gay Rights State."

### 1977 DADE COUNTY REJECTS RIGHTS LAW

Led by Anita Bryant, voters of Dade County overturn a Gay/Les/Bi rights law. The referendum results led to similar referendums in other cities and to massive Gay and Lesbian protests in many cities where no Gay and Lesbian group had existed before.

### 1978 HARVEY MILK ELECTED

Harvey Milk, becomes the first open Gay elected to a major political office in the United States winning a seat on San Francisco's Board of Supervisors. Ten months later, he and Mayor Moscone were assassinated by former Supervisor Dan White.

### 1981 AIDS OUTBREAK

Doctors in Los Angeles, New York, and San Francisco report the outbreak of a mysterious collection of aliments often quickly fatal that seem to affect primarily gay men.

### 1992 CLINTON INCLUDES GAYS

Presidential nominee Bill Clinton, becomes the first nominee of a major party to call for Gay and Lesbian rights in his acceptance speech.

### 1992 COLORADO BECOMES THE HATE STATE

Colorado voters face a proposal to ban the passage of Gay/Les/Bi rights laws and approve an anti-gay referendum known as Amendment 2. Later Colorado courts overturn the referendum results.


