A student at UWM, Michael is a former Miss Black Gay Wisconsin and active as a police recruit trainer with the Human Rights League.

Del Slowik, Food Coordinator - The sauce on the Philly brats, meatball sandwiches, and Friday spaghetti dinner is Del's secret recipe. So are the meatballs. His job, at its most basic, is to figure out what people want to eat and to make sure it's served up delicious. Park East - PrideFest Sponsor

"We think of ourselves more like an inn than a large downtown hotel," says Shari L. Harrison, general manager of the Park East Hotel, 916 E. State St., Milwaukee.

With only 159 rooms and a location in a historic residential area near downtown, the hotel is small and homey enough to allow its staff to recognize and welcome guests. Its quiet neighborhood is close to Summerfest and nightlife - in fact, some rooms offer splendid views of the lakefront and the city.

"The most important description of the hotel," Harrison says, "is the feeling of the personal touch and the feeling of being at home while still being within striking distance of the city."

Park East Hotel, one of the sponsors of PrideFest, is offering special room rates of \$60 per night for guests who call (800) 328-7278 and ask for the PrideFest rates. The hotel will provide shuttle service between the hotel and festival.

For the past three years, the hotel has been a sponsor of PrideFest and the host hotel for other LesBiGay events such as the Country GALA dance conference and the Commitment AA and NA meeting. Harrison says the hotel was gay-friendly before she became general manager, and as an open Lesbian, she has made sure it welcomes a diversity of guests.

One thing has changed since the Park East became a sponsor: Every guest room and suite along with other portions of the hotel have been remodeled. Every room includes new teal or purple furniture and carpeting, a computer/fax outlet, and a videocassette player.

Every bathroom was remodeled after consultation with the cleaning staff to make them especially easy to keep spotless. Honeymoon suites include whirlpool tubs.

One entire floor is smoke-free. Several rooms are handicapped-accessible, with lower closet bars, handles on doors, speciallydesigned bathrooms, and lower drawers on furniture to be easy to reach from a wheelchair. Throughout the hotel, signs and other accommodations exceed ADA requirements, Harrison says.

"We also spent as much or more on mechanicals as cosmetics," she says. "It's unusual for a hotel to spend on things you can't see." Guests might not notice improved emergency systems or special plumbing that can maintain water pressure even when everyone takes a shower at 7:30 a.m. They would notice if these things weren't there.

The hotel continues to offer free guest parking and free 24-hour movie, sports and news channels. Free shuttle service connects the hotel to downtown sporting, cultural, and entertainment events. Health club passes are available.

The hotel can also provide banquet, convention and meeting room facilities.

The hotel's Signatures Restaurant offers full service breakfast, lunch and dinner menus and room service. Next door to the restaurant, the Newsroom Bar displays the Milwaukee Press Club's collection of hundreds of signatures, including future president Teddy Roosevelt (1899), baseball batting champ Babe Ruth (1922), and actors Cary Grant (1955) and Sarah Bernhardt (1918).

Awarding the Community's Best

Every one of us has done important things to help create equality among people of all sexual orientations, but certain people's efforts have been extraordinary. Three kinds of awards will be presented during PrideFest at the Hess Stage after the parade Sunday, June 9, to honor those who have moved our community significantly forward.

Stonewall Awards

The Stonewall Awards are intended to recognize those who best exemplify the spirit of Stonewall. This could be individual acts of courage in standing up for LesBiGay rights or working in the background making it possible for others to stand up.

The idea behind these awards is not necessarily to recognize leaders, but to recognize those who are less known but make important contributions. It is hoped these award-winners will serve as examples to others and foster greater community involvement.

The number of awards to be given in a single year is open. In the first year of awards, 1994, ten individuals received Stonewall Awards.

Community Service Awards

Begun in 1989, the Community Service Awards are presented to those who have consistently shown outstanding service to the community, usually one per year.

Lifetime Achievement Awards

This award was initiated in 1994 when it was presented to Jim Keppner, the founder of the Gay and Lesbian Archives in Los Angeles.

AWARDS/HONORS

Bill Meunier

PrideFest Founder

Bill works hard. Everyone who knows him knows that. He had a dream to make Wisconsin PrideFest into a respected national Pride celebration, and he was part of a core group that made it happen.

For that accomplishment and other successes, Bill Meunier will receive a Lifetime Achievement Award at PrideFest this year at the Hess Stage after the parade Sunday.

The story starts in June of 1987, in Chicago, where a contingent of Milwaukeeans joined Chicago's Gay Pride Parade, as they had for the past several years. Milwaukee had hosted small Gay Pride Parades of its own in the early 1980s. Despite the warm welcome in Illinois, some people started asking why Milwaukee couldn't do its own celebration again.

One of those persons asking was Bill. He had already been active in groups like the Gay People's Union, one of Milwaukee's first Gay and Lesbian organizations. He had worked as a tireless organizer for neighborhood groups and for his church festival. He had participated in political campaigns nurturing allies of the LesBiGay community and bringing in new allies.

He did all that and many other things in the Gay community. His direct personal style could sometimes startle people, but as one long-time friend puts it, "No one can ever say Bill's not always thinking of the community."

In September of 1988, a variety of LesBiGay organizations held events as part of "Rightfully Proud," the Milwaukee Lesbian and Gay Celebration. On June 17, 1989, the Milwaukee Lesbian and Gay Pride Committee held its first Gay/Lesbian Pride Parade and Rally at Cathedral Square downtown. The event was repeated the next year as "The Gay '90s, Look to the Future."

It was nice, but it wasn't nice enough for the Bill and his ambitious cohorts. In 1991, with

the theme "Together in Pride," the Pride celebration moved to Juneau Park. It stayed there for the next year, "Pride Fest '92," and for the "Forward in Pride '93 PrideFest."

But that wasn't good enough. There wasn't enough room for all the participants, performers, and vendors. So PrideFest, as it was officially known by then, moved down the hill to an area just north of the War Memorial Art Center along the lakefront.

The year 1994 was the 25th anniversary of the Stonewall Rebellion in New York City, the pivotal event in LesBiGay history that Pride celebrations commemorate. In that year, Milwaukee's PrideFest celebration called itself "Our Time To Shine." The next year, 1995, with fireworks added to the lineup, PrideFest celebrated "Live the Dream."

But already the limitations of the lakefront site were clear. It was too small and crowded. Renting stages, electrical generators, portable toilets and a million other things made the site expensive. The financially prudent step was to join Milwaukee's other festivals in their use of Summerfest grounds. Logically, it was the right thing to do. As a measure of pride, it was a sweet victory.

No festival runs easily. Behind the scenes you'll find countless hours of work and gallons of blood, sweat and tears. Bill has given more than his share. Along the way, he arranged for the first LesBiGay fundraiser in the City Hall Rotunda. Because of him, rainbow flags flew along Milwaukee's downtown streets. Bill became the most frequent guest on Milwaukee's cable access television's "Queer Program."

For all that and more, Bill will receive PrideFest's top honor.

AfterWords PrideFest Literature Tent

Ever since his first novel, "Fag Hag" was published in 1992, Robert Rodi has been delighting Gay readers. "Closet Case," "What They Did to Princess Paragon," and "Drag Queen" have followed, each featuring Rodi's uniquely hilarious perspective on contemporary Gay life. He has brought these talents to "Birdcage: A Novel," based on the hit Robin Williams/Nathan Lane film (Plume, \$10.95).

Regular readers of our very own
Wisconsin InStep have long enjoyed "Roberts'
Rules," a regular column penned by
syndicated columnist Shelly Roberts, author of
"Hey Mom, Guess What!" and "The Dyke
Detector." Just in time for Pride, Ms. Roberts
brings us another humorous volume, "Roberts'
Rules of Lesbian Living" (Spinsters Ink, \$5.95),
a delightful send-up of "life-instruction"
books, here filled with fabulous Lesbian
truisms.

Since the publication of "Being Homosexual," Richard Isay has been recognized as a leading authority on the psychological development of Gay men. AfterWords is particularly pleased to present Mr. Isay upon the publication of his new ground-breaking work, "Becoming Gay" (Pantheon, \$23.00), a timely and deeply personal account of what it means to accept and live fully by one's true nature.

Betty Berzon, Ph.D. is a long-time psychotherapist and activist and is the author of two classic Gay/Lesbian best-seller: "Permanent Partners" and "Positively Gay." In her new book, "Setting Them Straight: You Can Do Something About Bigotry and Homophobia in Your Life" (Plume, \$10.95), Ms. Berzon provides a unique battle plan for confronting the discrimination that is a part of every Gay and Lesbian person's life, whether it comes from strangers or from friends and family members. Ms. Berzon's appearance at PrideFest was still tentative at publication time of the Pride Guide.

Long-time AfterWords favorite and best-selling Naiad author, Jackie Calhoun, is a happy addition to our roster of authors. Jackie's most recent title is "Changes." Later in 1996, Naiad will publish "Love or Money," the seventh novel from this popular Wisconsin writer.

AfterWords is particularly pleased to present local author Will Fellows, author of the soon-to-be published "Farm Boys: Lives of Gay Men From the Rural Midwest." Publication of this intriguing title from the University of Wisconsin Press is due in September.

Interfaith Service Sunday, June 9

Gays, Lesbians, Bisexuals, and supporters will join in worship at the PrideFest Interfaith service at 10:30 a.m. Sunday, June 9, at the Hess Stage.

"We come together as people from different faiths," said the Rev. Lew Broyles, pastor of the Milwaukee Metropolitan \$10 to \$15.

New this year are key chains with the slogan "Pride is the Key" for \$1.50, coffee mugs with the slogan "Filled With Pride" for \$5, and Bic Lighters that say "Carry the Torch" for \$2.50.

Refrigerator magnets, lapel pins and bumper stickers will be \$1. Cloisonne pins of the Rainbow Flag, pink triangle, rainbow triangle, leather pride, and lambdas will cost \$4 to \$7.

Members of MCC, Dignity, Integrity, and Lutherans Concerned will participate in the service, but Broyles said it will be "not just Christian" in its focus. The service will include music, prayers, and reflections. About 200 people attended last year.

Brides and Grooms to be Wed

Sunday, June 9

Marriages mean a lot, said the Rev. Lew Broyles, pastor of Milwaukee's Metropolitan Community Church. They mean a lot politically these days, but they are more than an imitation of Straight customs.

"They show we are sincere and genuine in our promises to one another and in our promises to the Divine," Broyles said.

This year as in previous years, PrideFest will host a wedding at 6:30 p.m. Sunday, June 9, at the Hess Stage. In addition to numerous couples renewing their vows last year, 77 couples exchanged vows for the first time.

Clergy from three denominations will officiate. A wedding cake similar in size but not design to last year's, which served 620 people generously, will be provided to participants and their wedding guests. Special music will again be performed.

To participate, couples must register for \$10 at the MCC/Wedding Booth in the Market Place, which will be marked with a banner reading "PrideFest Wedding Registration." Each couple will receive boutonnieres, a certificate, and a wedding photo. They will also receive a copy of the vows for the ceremony.

PrideFest Fireworks Light Up the Sky With Pride

Best of all, this is the second year PrideFest has had fireworks. Miller Brewing Co. for two years has generously underwritten the cost of the display.

The fireworks will start at about 10:15 on Saturday night, June 8, with a rain date of Sunday night. The rockets will be launched from the island near Summerfest, so the best viewing will be at the lakefront.

This show is designed for PrideFest. The shooting crew headed by Joe Maz has been working since fall to plan every burst, every color and every boom, just as they did last year. Watch for pink triangles in the sky and the colors of the Pride Flag blending with the stars.

"The finale will be spectacular, just like last year," said Mike Hall, PrideFest vice president working with Bartolotta's. That means loud. Loud and proud. "The more noise the better," said Mike.

Dancing Day and Night

Expect a bigger and better dance tent this year. With co-sponsorship by Madison's Washington Hotel, New Bar and Rod's, and La Cage Dance Nite Club in Milwaukee, the dance tent should be like last years - only better.

La Cage will provide better equipment and lights. Guest DJs from around the state will provide every kind of music but country. (You'll find that elsewhere at PrideFest.)

The dance tent will be open from noon to festival close Saturday and Sunday. Celebrate Pride by moving your feet! Fireworks displays involve more than lighting a few fuses. Show producers want a display that will start with a bang - no pun intended - and will go on to paint the night sky with fireworks that compliment each other in shape, color and sound. Eventually, they try to build to a climax that will thrill the eyes and ears of spectators.

Some colors, which are produced by certain chemical combinations, can be tricky to create. Some shapes, like triangles, require careful packing as the fireworks shells are stuffed with explosives. At every step, safety comes first. They don't call them "bombs" for nothing.


And every year, Bartolotta's adds a few fireworks innovations. Something's going to blow up in a way you've never quite seen before. Be there.

The Car Show Returns - Sat., June 8 & Sun., June 9

For the third year, hot cars are coming to PrideFest. You'll see mint-condition chrome, leather interiors, tail fins, the works - all up close and personal. Sponsored by the Great Lakes region of the Lambda Car Club, the Wisconsin PrideFest Invitational will attract classic autos from throughout the Midwest.

Last year's show drew two dozen beautiful vehicles that charmed auto enthusiasts and casual car fans alike. About 70 different vendors, organizations, and artists have things to give you and things sell you in the PrideFest Marketplace, located at the Williamsburg Village.



Individuals are welcome to join with any of the groups that are marching, or if they prefer, to join in at the end of the parade.


Because PrideFest has a new site this year, the Pride Parade has a new route. (See map.)



"It's bold, it's bright, and it's strong," said artist Barb Peterson, "and symbolizes a lot of different things that our community identifies with or is represented by."


That's how Barb describes her 1996

has been working as a graphic designer for almost 18 years. She is developing her own freelance graphic design business, Wild Child Design, (414) 384-9453.

"I'm familiar with the creative end of things as well as the production part of the job," she said, "which allows me to capitalize on the design and actually get it to reproduce the way it's supposed to."

She also works in the fine arts and has some sculptures on display at her artists' cooperative, Gallery 218, at 218 S. 2nd St., Milwaukee. In October, Peterson hopes to hold a one-person show.






When The Yell Leaders released an album, "Thursday," critics became more confused by the range of songs: "a friendly, pensive sound that feels great as the weather gets warmer," said one reviewer. "The songs' intelligent lyrics express many different personal feelings that most of us can relate to very well." The members of The Yell Leaders may be familiar to Milwaukeeans: Mary Schmid, vocals; Julie Straszewski, vocals; Bobby Tanzillo, drums; Brian Wooldridge, bass and vocals (yes, one of the Wooldridge brothers); and Joe Vent, guitar and vocals.

Band members also donated a song,
"What Life Brings," to the Large Thumb Club's
annual fundraising compact disc, which will
benefit the Camp Heartland Project summer
camp for children with HIV/AIDS.

The Yell Leaders will appear on the Hess Stage at 3:15 p.m. Saturday.

Country Cousin: Jeff Miller

The John Deere Diva

One of the top national acts on the Gay country music scene, the Jeff Miller Show has been enjoyed in clubs, festivals, and rodeos in 43 states and 5 Canadian provinces. His highenergy, top 40 country show keeps the "John Deere Diva" in the road some 33,000 miles a year.


He will appear at PrideFest (sponsored by the Proud Crowd) on the Harvey Milk Stage at 1:30 p.m. Sunday, June 9, to kick off an afternoon of country music.

Recently, Jeff performed as the country headliner for RSVP Cruises, hosted the International Mr. Leather Contest, and profiled in the monthly Gay video magazine, Network Q.

Dance drives his show with a solid mix of two-steps, line dances including the obscure but popular "Wild Wild West," waltzes, shuffles, swing, and even a polka — the "Condom Polka," sung to the tune of "Beer Barrel Polka": "Roll on a condom / Show who you're with that you care / Roll on a condom / Before my legs hit the air"

Jeff adapts songs for his audiences.
Sometimes it's flipped pronouns or other subtle changes. Other times it's a total rewrite, as with his most requested song, "Something in Black," a leather fantasy and a rewrite of "Something in Red." Jeff admits his version is "absolutely filthy," but it has made him a legend in the leather community and led to his invitations to host the Mr. Leather Contest and Pantheon. Jeff followed up that parody with a leather version of "Trashy Women."

Jeff's performance has been heavily influenced by dance. He learned ballet in rehab for a basketball injury. After discovering a fondness for dance, he switched his college major from marketing to musical theater. That background gives him "stage presence to spare," some say.

Speaking of basketball, Jeff won a gold medal in basketball at the 1986 Gay Games II with Team San Diego and performed his music at the 1990 Gay Games III.

This February, Jeff was called on to headline the Australian Line Dance Ltd. Harbour City Hoe Down at the Sydney, Australia, Mardi Gras festival. It was the first time that an American, Gay or Straight, was invited to appear.

Jeff has sung professionally for more than 15 years in everything from '50s groups to gospel quartets to Broadway touring companies. The hat is no act - Jeff has been competing on the Gay rodeo circuit for more than seven years.

Jeff Miller stands to be one of the first openly Gay country singers on a major label. Some call him a hunk with his emerald-green eyes and 6-foot, 6-inch frame. See what you think.

Kathy Priestley Sings With Spirit

In her performances around Wisconsin, Kathy Priestley has won praise for songs rich with the complexities of human experience, and for lighting up a stage. She has been compared to Mary-Chapin Carpenter for enlightening her listeners by a gentle pulling of their heart strings.

Kathy will sing at the Rainbow Cafe at 1:30 p.m. Sunday, June 9.

Her most recent album, "Salt of the Earth," includes three memorable cuts. "Our True Love" tells the story of two lovers who find their survival depends on facing their problems together. "Sweet Grama Rose" is Kathy's tribute to her grandmother, an influential force in her musical career. "I Believe," a song about survival, is dedicated to Kathy's late friend Andrea Reimer, who died after a long battle with breast cancer.

Her music as a cross-over of country, rock, and blues. Straight-from-the-heart lyrics and driving guitar complement her husky voice. Audiences sometimes find a piece of themselves hidden in her lyrics.

Tracey Rose Finds Humor in the Ordinary

Sometimes Tracey Rose performs with maxipads stuck to her forehead, knees, shoulders, hips and feet - for good, practical reasons, as she can explain. She also can explain the humor in corkscrews. She can tell her coming-out story in rhyme.

She will bring her humor to PrideFest's Rainbow Cafe at 6 p.m. Saturday.

Tracey has also performed at the Michigan Womyn's Music Festival, National Womyn's Music Festival, Women's Comedy Conference, clubs, and college campuses. She won the USA Network College Comedy Tour in December, 1995.

She's also a graduate student in advertising, "something where a good sense of humor and good comedy writing skills can be very, very valuable," she said.

Being out, she said, hasn't caused her as much problems as her androgynous appearance. "People think I'm a guy, and that's where I really get a lot of negative reactions from people," she said. "I'm not going to change the way I look because some people can't handle ambiguity or uncertainty. Look at these breasts. Do they look like they belong to a man?"

Humor, Tracey said, proves that people have a lot in common regardless of their sexuality. "The maxipad bit is not Gay- or Lesbian-specific at all, and that has people rolling on the floor."



Romanovsky & Phillips Will Flaunt It

By their estimate, Paul Phillips and Ron Romanovsky have performed for more than 3 million people since their songs about the foibles of romance, politics and lifestyles first hit the stage in San Francisco in 1982.

They've played in more than 200 cities plus at two LesBiGay national marches in Washington and at more than 100 Gay Pride events. They'll also perform at the 1996 Wisconsin PrideFest on the Hess Stage Friday night.

The cabaret duo has sometimes been compared to the Smothers Brothers, although they insist the Smothers Brothers should be compared to them. Romanovsky and Phillips have sold more than 70,000 albums and won awards from a variety of groups, including the Christopher Street West Association and the American Society of Composers, Artists and Publishers.

Their most recent album, "Let's Flaunt It," ran into trouble getting produced because the lyrics of one song suggested that God must be a queen because parts of the world are just too well-decorated. Cover photos of Ron and Paul wearing nothing but well-placed musical instruments didn't help, either. They concluded that not everyone can take a joke.

Paul, at age 9, won first place in the New Jersey state baton twirling championship. He had made his stage debut as a singer at age 7, and in high school showed "great promise" as a cheerleader. As a teenager, he once cooked dinner for Ted Koppel.

Later, at Wheaton College in Illinois (Billy Graham's alma mater), Paul was barred from participation in the Men's Glee Club European tour because he wasn't "manly enough." In Bloomington, Ind., he was thrown out of a bar for dancing with another man and filed the first U.S. test case to ever go to a hearing of a local human rights ordinance protecting Gays and Lesbians.

Ron describes his childhood in suburban Pittsburgh as miserable. He ran away from home, flunked gym class, and wrote novels to cope with harassment from homophobic classmates. As soon as he could, he moved to San Francisco, began writing songs, and met Paul in Golden Gate Park in 1981.

Ron is now an active member of the Friends of the Accordion and the Closet Accordion Players of America, and has combined accordion playing and Rollerblading to create the sport "Squeezeblading," something that might catch on at McKinley Park in Milwaukee.

Catch their show - and be prepared to laugh.

Jason Stuart, Truthfully Funny

"There's nothing funnier than the truth," said Jason Stuart, a comic who will appear in the Saturday night Gayla on the Hess Stage.

He came out in 1993 on the television show "Geraldo," which proved to be smart career move. "Since coming out, my shows have been selling out," Jason said. "The more I tell the truth, the more successful I become."

Coming out was a smart move personally, of course. "It's very, very tiring, being in the closet," he said. He has taken his comedy performance, "I'm Out . . . Jealous?" to clubs

around the country and to comedy shows across the television dial.

"The show is about me," he said. "I don't know what else it could be about. I could pretend to be Tom Cruise and do his life. It'd be a lot more interesting. But I can only talk about me."

Because Jason is an openly Gay comic, his shows have been picketed by conservative Christians carrying signs like "Fags Should Die!" in Kansas City, Tallahassee, and Walt

Coming On Strong

With his first album, "Strong for You," Jeff Krassner has impressed critics with his sincerity and for the sizzle he put into a samesex version of Dusty Springfield's "Son of a Preacher Man." Jeff will appear as part of the Saturday night Gayla on the Hess Stage.

"I wanted a cover song I could be real out on," Jeff said, "something where me using the original pronouns would be a little controversial." When he began his singing career in the early 1980s, Jeff wondered about coming out. He did, and decided, "if I'm honest and the work is good, people will respond."


He eventually became executive codirector of Outmusic, an organization that provides opportunities for up-and-coming Gay and Lesbian songwriters, musicians, and singers.

"If I'm strong enough to be out, maybe it will help someone else," he said. "I didn't have that when I was a kid." He began his career as a featured performer at Catch-A-Rising-Star and The Improv, opening for Robin Williams, Rodney Dangerfield, and Jerry Seinfeld. In addition to the many clubs and industry showcases in which he's performed, Jeff has worked on five Grammy shows and pre-shows, and fronted for two bands.

Jeff has toured western Europe for a year in 1988-1989 in the 20th anniversary production of "Hair," eventually playing the lead role of Berger. He headlined an outdoor concert for the participants in the Boston/New York AIDS Ride and sang for crowds at Pride events in Philadelphia, Boston, and New York. He rocked the crowd of 55,000 people with his original music at Yankee Stadium's closing ceremonies of Gay Games IV on a bill with Patti LaBelle and Cyndi Lauper.

In May, he performed in his home town of Philadelphia for its PrideFest '96. This July, Jeff will perform at the closing concert of the opening weekend for the 1996 Summer Olympic Games in Atlanta.

Meanwhile, his first album has won critical praise for its energy and depth.

"I sing it the way I feel it," Jeff said. "And I do have a real soulful white-boy voice. Black music has been a big influence one me. Even as a kid, it resonated for me. Maybe it's the freedom in it, the freedom within the oppression that I identified with. Music has been my refuge for as long as I can remember."

He said he wanted an album that would be true to himself at this point in his life. "I wasn't worried about what's charting right or not. If so, I would have given the album more of an alternative edge," he said. "I wanted more of a soulful, honest album, not R&B as it is now with a lot of techno and drum machines."

Except for "Son of a Preacher Man," Jeff wrote all the songs on "Strong for You." The songs vary from rock to soul to gospel to hot dance tunes. He writes from personal experience, and the title song, "Strong for You," is about "everyone living with HIV or AIDS, about anyone who feels it's not safe to say who they really are," Jeff said.

"Strength, I think that's what we need. I want to inspire people."



Disney World, which scared him at first and shocked his own religious sensibilities. He has also received support he never would have gotten as a closeted Gay man.

He's performed at a lot of AIDS fundraisers, something he says he's proud to do. But he can joke, sardonically, at the toll the disease has taken on the Gay community. "We deserve something free. Like a car."

Jason is also pursuing an acting career. He has appeared in "seaQuest DSV," "The John Larroquette Show," "Murder, She Wrote," "Kindergarten Cop," and as the lead in "Gay TV: The Movie." He's also developing a sitcom pilot with Paragon Entertainment.

Gay Symbols Through the Ages

Today, the most widely recognized symbols of the LesBiGay movement for civil rights are the Pink Triangle and the Lambda. But over the centuries, many other symbols have also served to represent us in one way or another. The following are, I think, some of the more interesting ones:

Labrys - The double-headed ax known as a "labrys" appears in art as far back as ancient

Crete. The walls of Crete's palaces, temples and homes depicted members of the allfemale Amazons who carried the labrys into battle. In modern times, it has been adopted as a Lesbian symbol to be seen in jewelry and other forms of art. Barbara G. Walker in her "Woman's Encyclopedia of Myths and Secrets" traces the labrys back to mythological times when it was used as a scepter by the goddess Demeter (also known as Gaea or Artemis). Walker speculates that it

may originally have been used as a battle ax by female Sythian warriors, who adopted it as a symbol when the goddess's shrine at Delphi was taken over by a male priesthood.

Myrtle - In 1894, poet and criminologist George Cecil Ives formed the Order of Charonea, one of the earliest known Gay organizations. He designed rings for members which incorporated the number 338 (for the original "army of lovers," the Sacred Band of the Greek city of Thebes, which was defeated in 338 B.C. at the Battle of Charonea); the letters Z, L, and D (for zeal, learning, and discipline); and wreathes of myrtle and calamus.

Phoenix - The phoenix, a mythical bird found in African legends of scarlet, blue, purple, and gold, was fabled to live for five centuries, then to burn itself on a funeral pyre and rise from the ashes, even grander than before. In a 1989 "Love Letter to the Movement," entertainer and activist Robin Tyler proposed the phoenix as a fitting symbol of the Lesbian and Gay movement. "The time has come," she wrote, "to look ahead to positive images. Our courage, our will to love, and our strength through the struggles, while

still maintaining our humor and our ability to live, has made us extraordinary. Like the phoenix, against all odds, we have risen again and again."

Rhinoceros - In 1974, two activists on Boston gotatired of letting the mass media decide just how Gay people were to be depicted to the public. Bernie Toal and Tom Morganti initiated a media campaign using a lavender rhinoceros as a symbol of Gay people. They prepared

three placards for placement in local subways. Why the rhino? Toal explained, "The rhino is a much maligned and misunderstood animal and, in actuality, is a gentle creature - but don't cross him or her!" And, as someone else pointed out, it's always horny.

Gay - The word's use as a term to describe male members of our community is much debated. For example, John Boswell in his book "Christianity, Social Tolerance, and Homosexuality" finds it being used as we do in the South of France during the Medieval period. Others dispute that, saying it was first used in 19th century London as a term to describe female prostitutes. Since homosexual men were supposed to act like women, the word was used to designate them, and so acquired its modern meaning.

The Rainbow Flag

Color has long been associated with Lesbians and Gays. In Victorian England, the color was green. Lavender became the color of choice for the Gay and Lesbian movement in the late 1960s.

A frequently heard chant in the early post-Stonewall Pride Parades was "Purple Power." The pink triangle, although first used by the Nazis to identify Gay men in concentration camps, became a popular symbol of liberation in the 1980s.

So it is natural that LesBiGays today have adopted a flag of many colors.

In 1978, Gilbert Baker of San Francisco made the first Rainbow Flag. Using a sports flag, "The Flag of the Race," as his model, Baker dyed and sewed the material himself. The original Rainbow Flag had eight stripes.

The colors were pink, red, orange, yellow, green, blue, indigo, and violet. According to Baker, those colors represented sexuality, life, healing, sun, nature, art and harmony.

Soon Baker was looking for someone to mass produce the flag. He approached the Paramount Flag Co. At that time, the color hot pink was not commercial available, so the flag was reduced to seven stripes.

In November 1978, San Francisco's Gay and Lesbian community was devastated by the assassination of Harvey Milk, the city's first openly Gay public official. In response to this tragedy, the 1979 San Francisco Pride Committee decided to use the Rainbow Flag as a symbol to show their community's strength and unity.

The committee eliminated the indigo stripe so it could divide the colors evenly along its parade route, three colors on each side of the street. The six color version soon became popular, but its popularity was largely limited to San Francisco.

Then in 1989, the flag received national attention. John Stout sued his West Hollywood landlords when they prohibited him from flying the flag from his apartment balcony. Stout won, and the attention his suit garnered brought the Rainbow Flag to the forefront of Lesbian and Gay symbols.

Partly as a result of that suit, the International Congress of Flag Makers recognized the Rainbow Flag in 1989.

Today untold millions of rainbow bumper stickers, pins, shirts, and flags are displayed and worn by Gays and Lesbians throughout the country. Gilbert Baker's flag may have lost two of its stripes, but the idea remains the same.

The Rainbow Flag symbolizes our unity and our diversity. Whenever and wherever someone raises a rainbow flag for the first time, they are doing more than just displaying a flag. They are writing a new chapter in the proud history of the movement it represents.

AIDS fundraiser, benefiting AIDS service and education providers throughout the state.

In a letter to the AIDS
Resource Center of
