Something to read? To acquaint you with the periodicals and other publications available at the Center I will list five and name two typical articles contained in their latest publication. If you would like to check these out, feel free to visit the Center during open hours: 1-5 and 7-10 PM.

- 1. Contact—National Gay newspaper printed in Houston, Texas. Contains a Gay guide which is updated every three weeks.
- 2. Integrity--Publication for Gay Episcopalians.
- 3. Dignity -- Monthly publication for Gay Catholics. Boston and Chicago editions.
- 4. The Advocate--New Format and type style with features on records, films, and politics still make this the most widely read of gay publications.
- 5. Gay Times--Lots of explicit pictures with several stories and articles on more erotic themes.
- 6. RFD--A magazine for Gay country men to break down their isolation and let them share their dreams and delights.

EQUAL OPPORTUNITIES COMMISSION (EOC)

Recently the EOC had the range of their interests expanded to include that of "sexual preference." This breakthrough marks a beginning of the breakdown of the legislation affecting Gay people in Madison. Kudos to those on the Commission, advisors and committed Councilpersons who helped to get this amendment passed. The Gay Law Students' Association, especially, deserves credit for providing assistance and encouragement.

The enclosed Leas and Rental Guide is for your perusal if you are interested. It does a good job of spelling out many areas where the EOC can be of assistance to you. Please note on the back page that "sexual orientation" is a listed category for which it is now not <u>legal</u> to discriminate. Redress is possible. If you require legal assistance of wish to discuss the possibility of discrimination further, call George or any of the Center's counselors at 257-7575.

At the State Assembly David Clarenbach reports that he is working on amendments to existing legislation which would expand state laws on open housing and public accommodations to include sexual preference.

At the University of Wisconsin, The University Committee—Madison has proposed that nondiscrimination relative to faculty employment be expanded to forbid discrimination on the basis of sexual orientation. This is a positive move to end the fear and anxiety implicit in employment situations.

If you know of areas where improvements have been made or are being made in Gay rights, pleas let me know so that fact can be publicized.


